Still Search for 2 Missing Men

Search for two missing airmen from Wurtsmith Air Force Base, who disappeared April 16, continued this week by area law enforcement officers.

Michael Bodi and Russell Blank, both 24, turned up missing Monday, April 17. Blank's wife returned from an out-of-town visit and found that the men had not reported to work at the base.

A capsized canoe was found the following day near the mouth of the AuSable River at Oscoda. It is believed the men had left Sunday on a canoe trip down VanEtan Creek and into the AuSable River.

Joining the Oscoda Township Police Department in the search were Michigan State Police, Iosco County Sheriff's Department, Wurtsmith Air Force Base and United States Coast Guard.

Federal Grant to Aid Special Ed. Teachers

Tawas Area School has been notified that its application under a 1966 federal act for scholarships to train faculty members in the field of special education has been approved.

John Alexander, acting elementary principal and director of federal programs, told members of the board of education Monday night that the school has been approved for four \$500 grants to aid in summer study.

Four teachers indicated last February that they were interested in this field. Alexander is now determining if they are still interested in studying this summer.

Because of the scarcity of special education teachers, the board of education and administration has felt it a necessity to obtain interested teachers from the local faculty and offer assistance with specialized training.

After completing specialized courses, teachers would be working in various fields of remedial work in the local system.

Need for a teacher with special qualifications to work with trainable retarded children was emphasized Monday night by Mrs. Marvin Davenport of the Iosco Association for Retarded Children.

Mrs. Davenport said that volunteers had been conducting classes for the past three years at First Baptist Church, Tawas City, and that great improvement had been seen in the children.

Efforts are now being made by

the Iosco Intermediate School District to obtain a teacher with qualifications to handle such a program. It is estimated that there are 22 trainable retarded children in the county.

Such an accredited program would receive full financial support of the state. Classes could be handled in rented quarters but, again, the scarcity of accredited teachers in this field is very acute.

Mick Reports on Teaching Vacancies

Two of the five teaching vacancies in elementary grades have been filled and six vacancies in the high school faculty remain, according to a report Monday night by Supt. Reynold Mick.

Teachers signing letters of intention to teach here in 1967-1968 include Miss Patricia Davidson and Bernard Goretzki.

Miss Davidson, a 1962 graduate of Bay City Central, is a graduate of Northwestern University with a master degree in mathematics education. She received her bachelor of science degree from Denison University. She will teach junior high mathematics.

Goretzki has a bachelor of science degree from Central Michigan University. He has taught four years and comes here from Port Austin. He will teach shop.

High school vacancies to be filled include three English teachers, one French and English or a French and Latin teacher, one commercial teacher and one vocal music teacher.

Mick said it appeared likely that from four suitable applications, the commercial position should be filled. Applications have also been received for the French position and vocal music. One application has been received for a kindergarten position.

In other business, John Alexander, elementary principal and federal program director, is to report at the next meeting on a program which may see Tawas Area participating with Whittemore-Prescott Area in the latter's "Headstart" program this summer. About seven preschool children from Tawas would have qualified had there been a program here last summer. Whittemore-Prescott is to conduct its program this summer at the Sherman School.

Alexander said that Tawas Area's federal grant for continuing a remedial program for elementary students this summer was approximately \$577 less than last year's grant. He said the program "could live" with this reduction and he did not expect the deficiency in funds to be serious.

Representatives of Whittemore-Prescott Area, Hale Area and Tawas Area are to hold a joint meeting to hear a proposal from representatives of the Mott Foundation at Flint. Possible participation under a private grant may be received for hiring a director, training and purchase of equipment for a summer program to train high school dropouts and an adult education program for persons wishing to complete a high school education.

The board approved priorities listed for home economics and foreign language as presented by department heads to complete action on the recent curriculum study.

Mrs. Eber Wetzel of the home economics department listed purchase of blackout curtains, a demonstration mirror and replacement of several sewing machines as priorities for her department. Purchases are to be made according to money available.

Mrs. Richard Anderson of the language department recommended that the school purchase new texts for modern teaching of French by the audio-lingual method, as opposed to the present traditional method of teaching. This was also approved. The board authorized receiving of bids May 22 for replacement of the school's station wagon.

Parker Vows Fish Feeding Project Will Get a 'Fair Test'

"If I live long enough, this project is going to get a fair trial even if I have to spend \$10,000 out of my own pocket."

Speaking was Edward Parker, who was told Thursday night by conservation department representatives that his fish feeding proposal on Tawas Bay may run into trouble, with state statute relative to the littering of public waters.

Parker vowed that he had "not yet begun to fight" and, if his plan was stymied in Michigan, he would ask Canadian authorities if they are interested. He believes they are.

Following Parker's presentation of his 60,000 hours of research at Guiley Pond and More Trout, Incorporated, where he discovered that fish thrived on processed wastes, state conservation department representatives suggested that a check be made with the attorney general's office before any project is started.

Owen Bennett, law enforcement supervisor for the Roscommon District, said that an act of the 1963 legislature prohibited introduction of foreign substances into public waters and said that the attorney general's office should be asked for an opinion to clarify if the processed wastes would be considered fish food or merely litter. If the latter, he said he was duty-bound to enforce the law.

Another representative of the conservation department, David Shetter, who has charge of the Hunt Creek Trout Charge Department, suggested that samples of the processed waste be submitted to Lansing for further testing

before any definite action is taken on a fish feeding plan. Max Hunt, regional fishery supervisor, Roscommon, expressed interest in Parker's fish feeding plan, but was of the opinion that possible water pollution should be avoided at all costs and that a ruling should be obtained before commencement of the project.

Some 27 persons attended the public informational meeting called by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

In explaining his proposed project, Parker drew a parallel between growing crops or raising livestock on land with his method of feeding fish. He said that all life varies in relation to the food available.

The unique aspect concerning fish, Parker pointed out, was that compared with the one or two offspring each year by animal life, each female fish brings thousands of eggs into streams annually.

"It is a constant fight for survival for these young fish and there is not enough food for even a tiny fraction of them," he said. Parker said his research had disclosed that food introduced into the stream had shown fantastic results by improving the survival rate of fish and also caused the fish to grow at a rapid rate.

Through his research, Parker stumbled on the fact that pulverized fish waste dispersed in water improved health of the fish and everything connected with life at the bottom of the stream.

He used a glass fish tank to demonstrate his method of food dispersal in water at Thursday night's meeting. He emphasized that it was necessary to start out with small quantities of food in order to prevent possible pollution. As more and more fish were attracted to an area, he said that food could be introduced at a higher rate. He estimated that 95 percent of the food introduced would be consumed in 15 minutes.

Parker estimated that his method of feeding would cost slightly more than one cent per pound of food, as compared to seven cents per pound of food in fish hatcheries.

Parker said he had invested \$3,000 in boats and equipment to conduct his proposed pilot study on Tawas Bay and would soon be ready to put his plan into operation. He believes that one pound of food introduced into the water would bring a harvest of 100 pounds of fish. He stressed the fact that the project would be under close supervision in order to prevent harmful effects of pollution.

Harold French, water plant operator at East Tawas, said he was vitally interested in anything that could effect the quality of water in Tawas Bay, inasmuch as it was the source of drinking water for the Tawasites.

Parker said he believed the fish would consume all food introduced into the water. "There are a lot of things we do not know, but I am basing 30 years of experience and thousands of dollars out of my own pocket in research to say that this plan will work."

Through rigid control, he said, the feeding could be stopped immediately. (See PARKER, page 8.)

Cobo Hall Attacks Cause Trip Change

Because of recent attacks on school children at Detroit's Cobo Hall, seniors from Tawas Area High School will not be making their annual government day trip to the Motor City.

"We just would not want anything like this to happen to any of our students," said Thomas Pintkowski, high school guidance counselor, who appeared before the board of education Monday night.

For the past six years, seniors have made an overnight trip to Detroit and visited plants of the Ford Motor Company. Evenings were spent in visiting theaters and sightseeing in the downtown area.

An alternate trip is now being planned either to Mackinac Island, Lansing or Dow Chemical Company, Midland.

Rep. Prescott Cosponsors Bill

Rep. George A. Prescott was a cosponsor of the Implied Consent Bill, House Bill 2038, that passed the Michigan House of Representatives last week by a 72-31 margin.

"Accident figures prove that the drinking driver causes a large percentage of all accidents in the state, fatal and nonfatal," said Prescott. "If we in Michigan ever hope to see some lessening of the continuing slaughter on our highways, we have to do something to discourage the drunk driver."

"I am convinced that this piece of legislation is good for the state and its citizens. The bill protects the nondrinking driver but also contains constitutional safeguards for the drinking driver. This is not the total answer to the solution of our traffic safety problems, but it is, I feel, a giant step toward this end."

Should the senate pass the bill, Michigan would be the 19th state in the nation to pass this type of legislation.

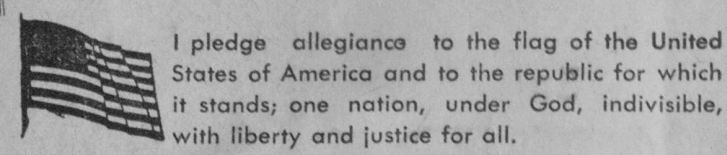

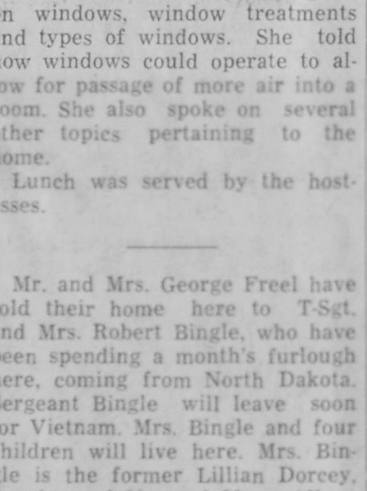

A Million A Year

Would you believe it? That is how many people accidentally swallow medications, cleaners, polishes, household detergents, turpentine, pesticides and a host of similar products that would seem to be impossible. In fact, some authorities believe the figure to be higher. Most of these accidents, of course, happen to children who cannot read labels and who cannot judge which things are meant to be swallowed. While spring cleaning, store these items away from reach of children and label properly for the benefit of all. Adults can protect themselves against poisoning accidents by reading the label, storing internal medicines separately from other products and being sure to turn on the light before giving or taking any medication.

What is Rhubarb?

"Is rhubarb a fruit or a vegetable?" Isn't it interesting how such questions sometimes pop up? That one came up at a recent fair board

meeting when the committee was revising the premium list, classes and premiums.

Rhubarb is listed as a vegetable, though it is usually thought of as a fruit. My encyclopedia reference says it is one of the few perennial vegetables and belongs, according to classification, to the smart-weed family.

I really do not care if it is fruit or vegetable (or herb, as some authorities emphasize). It is just plain yummy. Pineapple comes to market about the same time as rhubarb is in season. Cut equal amounts of fresh pineapple and fresh rhubarb into one-inch pieces, add half as much sugar and cook together until tender.

You do not like rhubarb pie? What an experience you are missing!

Early spring is the time to divide the root and replant, being sure to have one or two buds on each piece of root.

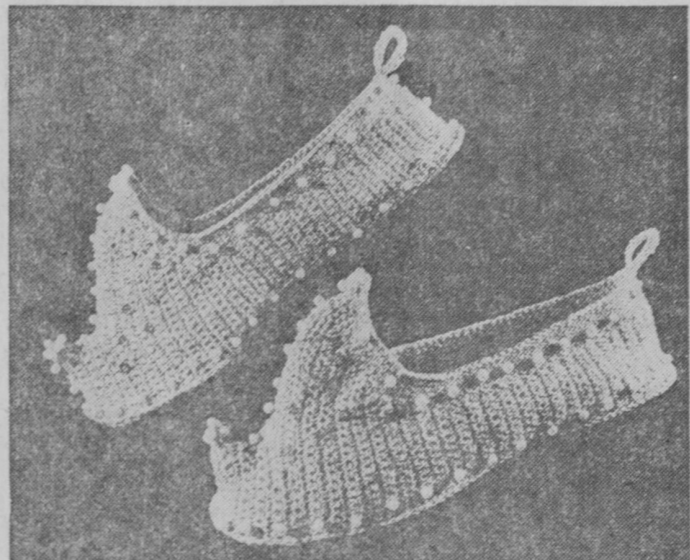

Tawas Senior Wins Bentley Scholarship

Miss Toni A. Miller, niece of Miss Burnetta Miller, East Tawas, has been named winner of an Alvin M. Bentley Foundation scholarship award for excellence to Siena Heights College for the academic year 1967-68.

Miss Miller's scholarship amounts to \$500 and is one of the major awards presented to 59 Michigan colleges and universities by the foundation this year.

She has maintained a 3.9 average and ranks third in her class of 127 at Tawas Area High School.

"The achievement of scholastic excellence attained by Miss Miller justifies our faith in making it possible for her to pursue a course of higher education," Mr. Bentley said. "Mrs. Bentley and I are proud to assist in fulfilling her ambition."

Scholarships were given this year to students who had achieved a high degree of academic excellence and who applied for the scholarships at the 59 Michigan institutions receiving the grants. Selections of the winners were made by the scholarship committees of the colleges and universities.

The Bentley Foundation is currently contributing \$78,000 for scholarships for the academic year 1966-67. Its commitments for the school year will bring total contributions to nearly \$439,000 for the six years the foundation has been in operation.

Trustees of the foundation determine each year which Michigan institutions will benefit from the foundation's program "to administer funds for science, education and charitable projects." The institution, itself, determines who will receive the individual scholarships, which may amount up to a maximum of \$500.

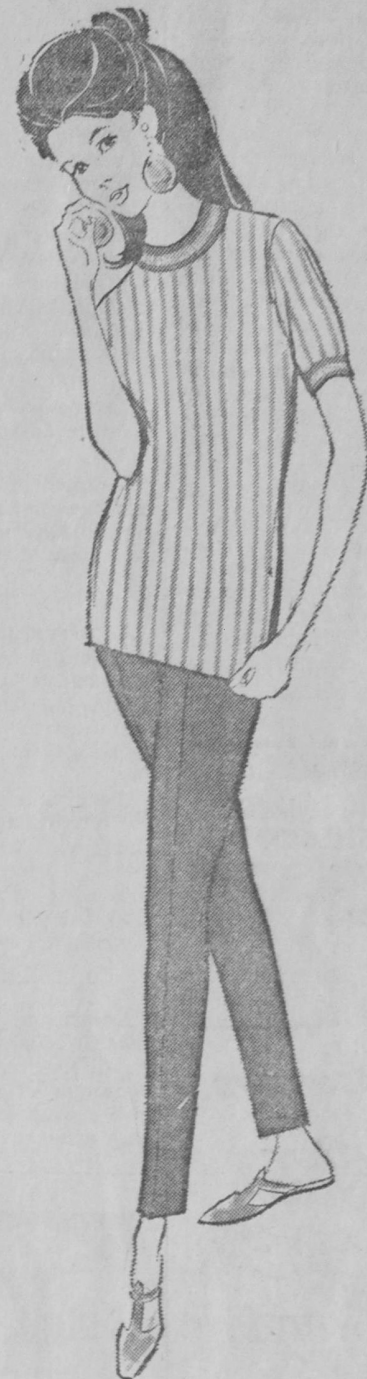

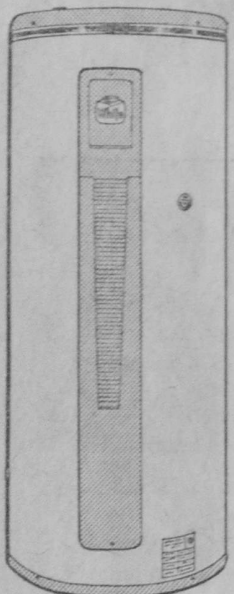

Through efforts of local officials, the ban on fishing for perch has been lifted on the Tawas River. The river has been closed several years for fishing until May 1, when the perch season is over. As soon as word was received that the ban had been lifted, the banks were lined with fishermen.

State Rep. Fred C. Holbeck has proposed that the governor hold office for only one term, thus eliminating any need for building up a political machine through approximately 5,000 political appointments. He believes that the governor, "who holds the most important office in the gift of its people," should be able to give his whole time and thought to the great problems that daily confront him and that worry and planning incidental to a campaign for re-election should be removed by a constitutional provision prohibiting more than one term. He cited the many commissions, departments and boards of the state, created during the past 10 years, as one of the principal reasons for the present crisis in taxation.

Prospective CMU Students Must Register

Forest Chats

The aspen is flowering, the smelt are running and the United States Forest Service is planting trees. That must be enough to prove it—spring is here at last.

Each spring, the Tawas District planting crew swings into action to get cut-over lands back into production. The goal this year is 180,000 seedlings, properly spaced and planted in clearings left from past years pulpwood harvest. With a little help from mother nature, Howard Belcher and Donald Stitt of East Tawas and Walter Redmond of Whittemore will complete this sizeable chunk of reforestation by June.

In addition to providing for future timber and pulp needs, wildlife is getting a helping hand. Last year, Ranger Loren Woerpel experimented with several species of food and cover shrubs and the results were very favorable. Because of this we have decided to expand the program and combine it with our regular pine planting procedure.

An assortment of 4,000 stems including autumn olive, silky dog wood and white oak will be planted in strips, clumps and around the edges of openings purposely left for wildlife. This is one way to create the edge effect so necessary to game. They enjoy the food and romping space right on the edge of a forest which offers them cover and sanctuary.

People will need wood and wild things will need food and cover. The planting program this spring considers both sets of needs.

Results for March DHIA Isosco Testing Program Given

There were 16 dairy herds in Isosco County on the dairy testing program. Three of them use the official testing program that provides more detailed information than the owner-sampler program. In the owner-sampler program, the farmer collects his own samples. In the official DHIA program, the dairy tester is paid an additional fee for collecting the samples.

In the official DHIA program, the farmer also receives a feed cost figure that tells him how much it costs to produce 100 pounds of milk. Average is based on cows in herd, milking and dry.
