



#### Editorial-

We hate to say "we told you so," but we cannot help but pass on a few comments regarding a news article appearing in the daily press last week.

Despite strong opposition from commercial fishing interests, stated the Detroit Free Press, "The conservation department Friday unanimously gave its tentative approval to new regulations that would nearly halt gill net fishing in Lakes Michigan and Superior and raise the walleye size limit in Lake Erie to 151/2 inches."

Sports fishing interests mounted an overwhelming campaign supporting the move, "which has long been advocated by the department's fish biologists," said Tom Opre, Free Press outdoor editor.

While we are rather surprised over the last statement, recalling what was said by a former fish division chief and other state biologists at a hearing here nearly two years ago when practically all regulations as to size of perch taken by gillnetters were removed, we are happy that the biologists are finally showing some concern.

We quote again from the Free Press: "The final barrier for firmly establishing trout and salmon populations once again in the Great Lakes is commercial fishing-more specifically, gill nets. The bad features of gill nets are that young, small fish cannot escape and most of the fish entangled in the net by their gills, are dead when the net is brought up. Thus few game fish, such as trout, can be returned alive to the water.

These were the very words said at the November 1965 hearing at East Tawas, only ignored by biologists, who chose to believe a stunted fish theory caused by an overpopulation of perch in Saginaw-Tawas Bay.

We would hope that the department of conservation would also consider an investigation of fishing on Lake Huron. For the second straight year, sport fishing for perch is at a very low ebb and Tawas and other Lake Huron communities, long noted for perch fishing from piers and boats,


It is time for everyone to take an enlightened look at the Great Lakes fish population-commercial fishermen and sport fishermen included. It was once thought that fishing on Lake Huron would last forever, but what happened to the herring, white fish, lake trout, walleyes and now perch? The finger of blame can rightly be pointed at pollution, over fishing and the sea lamprey, in that order

The department of conservation is now in the process of introducing new species of fish into the Great Lakes, which will benefit all fishing. It is hoped that the coho salmon will help to curb the population explosion of the alewife. We do not advocate removal of all gill net fishing on Lake Huron, but we do believe that fishing-both commercial and sport-should be subject to more strict control. This is for the protection of the fishermen's own livelihood and for the preservation of a natural resource.


## Base Tours are Continued This Month

Ellifritz added that generally a person must, have five years of work under social security in the 10 years before his disability to qualify for benefits.

"Whether or not you are found eligible to receive disability insurance benefits," Ellifritz said, "you may be offered help in improving your condition and in preparing for and finding work." He explained that when a person files an application for social security disability benefits, the State Vocational Rehabilitation Agency provided with the details of the

Ellifritz advised disabled persons not now receiving disability benefits to get in touch with their local social security office if they have any questions or wish to file a claim.




