Grant Township Officially Organized 100 Years Ago; Name Honors General

One hundred years ago, a petition of Pardon Worden and 14 other freeholders was honored by the Iosco Board of Supervisors and territory described in their application was detached from Tawas Township and erected into a new township known as Grant.

Anniversary of that event was officially observed April 1, 1967, at a township board meeting. All residents of Grant Township are observing the birthday this week, August 13-20, during a centennial celebration.

Heading up the committee in charge of the observance is Mrs. George Kindell. Members of the program committee are Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Ball, Mr. and Mrs. Dale Butzin, Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Ponke, Mr. and Mrs. Dale Strauer, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Lenczewski, Mr. and Mrs. Hazen Warner, Mr. and Mrs. Kindell.

Present officers of the township board include L. S. Little, supervisor; Mrs. Ann Hayes, clerk; Olen Herriman, treasurer; Mrs. Kindell and Mrs. Lucille Blackmore, trustees.

An early account of Iosco County written by James O. Whittemore in 1867 said that when the first attempt at cultivating the plains was made in the spring of 1861, there were no roads into the interior. All manufactured goods came into and left Iosco, as well as transportation of passengers, by boat.

In the spring of 1862, G. O. Whittemore, founder of Iosco, planted spring crops to test the soil of the plains for farming and cut through the present route of the old State Road.

In the spring of 1863, the first family ever locating on the plains was that of George P. Vorce. With his household goods loaded upon a wagon and surrounded by his family, he made the first start into the interior.

"It required considerable faith and courage to leave old neighbors and friends and push on into the wilderness alone and over roads that were almost impassable," said J. O. Whittemore in 1867.

According to a record book of the township, Worden, Benjamin F. Chappell and William Webster were authorized by the board of supervisors to preside at an organizational meeting of the township on Monday, April 1, 1867, which indicates that numerous other families followed Mr. Vorce's lead.

Organization of Grant Township followed within two years of the close of the Civil War. While Tawas City had been founded in 1854 and Iosco County three years later, it was not until the late 1860s that any real progress started on settling the county.

Population of Iosco numbered 175 in 1860, 395 in 1864 and jumped to 3,163 in 1870. While lumbering was the principal lure, many discharged veterans flocked to the area to claim homesteads. This was the case in the emer-

Sand, Floyd, Little Island, Bass, Chappel (one "l" was dropped from the original spelling), Indian and Island Lakes, all located within Grant Township. These families, along with farm families and other year-around residents along M-55 and connecting roads, are honoring pioneer families during the week-long centennial celebration.

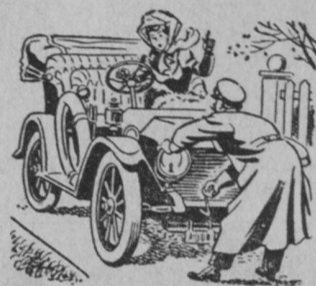
As was stated by Mr. Whittemore in his 1867 sketch, "No lovelier scenery can be found in Michigan than in Grant Township, amid the beautiful lakes, which have waters clear as crystal.

Around them stretch vast rolling plains interspersed with groves of timber and watered by innumerable creeks."

Heavy growths of jack pine and aspen have changed the scenery of the plains, while the groves of timber mentioned in the sketch felt the bite of the woodman's axe long ago. The beautiful lakes remain to be enjoyed by thousands of vacationseekers each year, fulfilling the word description of Mr. Whittemore that "Everyone who visits here is charmed with the beauty and magnificence of the scenery."

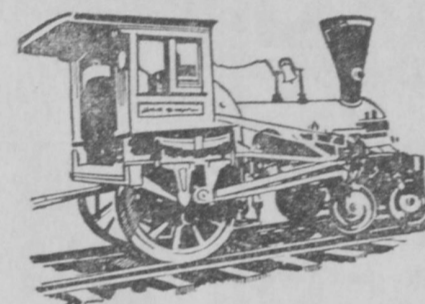

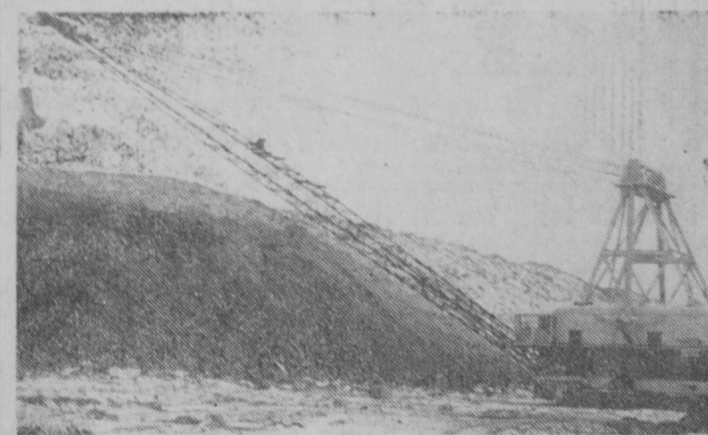

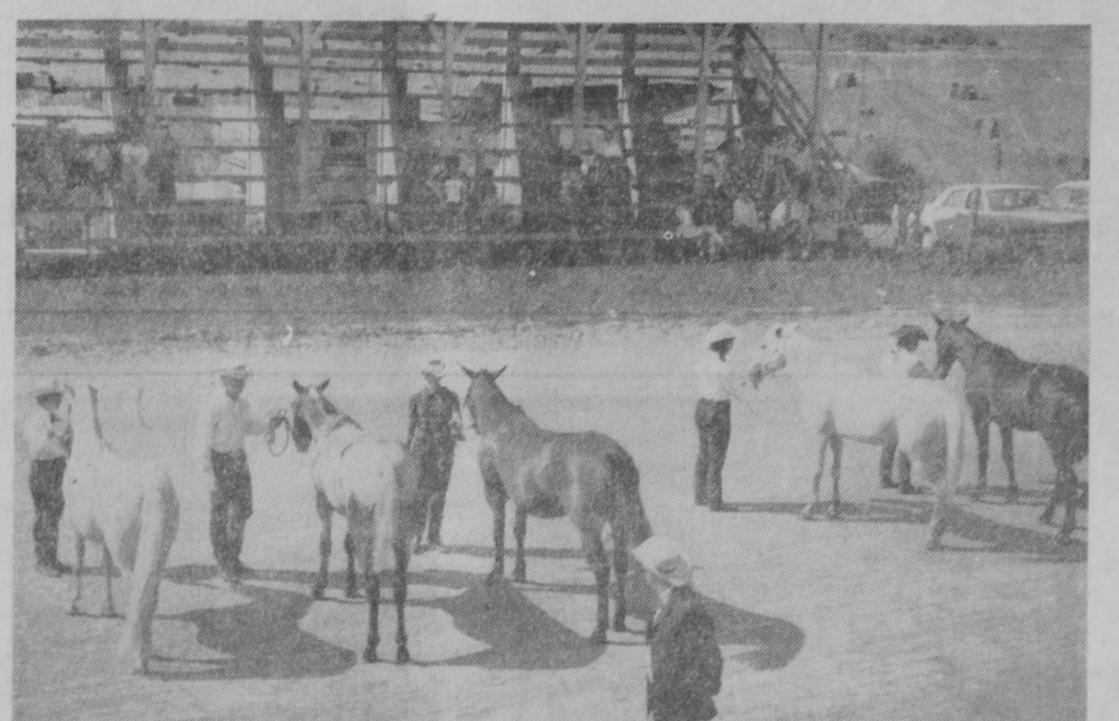
Base Tours are Continued This Month

- SS Disability Payments No Longer Limited**
- Disability payments under social security are no longer limited to persons with permanent disabilities," Paul M. Ellifritz, Social Security district manager, reminded residents this week.
- Monthly benefits can now be paid, Ellifritz explained, if the insured worker is under a disability which has lasted, or can be expected to last, for 12 calendar months or longer.
- For payment to be made, the worker's disability must be severe enough to prevent him from doing not just his regular work but any substantial gainful work. A person's training, age and work experience is considered in determining disability.
- Ellifritz added that generally a person must have five years of work under social security in the 10 years before his disability to qualify for benefits.
- "Whether or not you are found eligible to receive disability insurance benefits," Ellifritz said, "you may be offered help in improving your condition and in preparing for and finding work." He explained that when a person files an application for social security disability benefits, the State Vocational Rehabilitation Agency is provided with the details of the case.
- Ellifritz advised disabled persons not now receiving disability benefits to get in touch with their local social security office if they have any questions or wish to file a claim.

If it had been another time and another place, many of the rivers could have been the AuSable 100 years ago. The main river watersheds are still used to economically transport logs and pulpwood downstream to mills so we had a chance to see how the AuSable must have worked in the old lumbering days.

A glass cube filled with rusty cans and junk, floating in a quiet reflection pool beneath a waterfall, elegantly spoke out against littering. Unfortunately, the Canadian exhibit speaks an international truth and one with which we are familiar here.

The French exhibit was entitled "Terre Des Homes" and translates "Man's World." After spending quiet evenings around a campfire with my family, breathing the freedom of the forest, I am more convinced that it is really "the world man lives in." I wonder if we will learn the significance of this before the day comes that the flora of our forest floor is completely replaced by old cans, glass and rubbish.

DHIA Supervisor Gives Report on 14 Herds in July Testing Program

There are 14 dairy herds in Iosco County on the dairy testing program. Two of them use the official testing program that provides more detailed information than the owner-sampler program. In the owner-sampler program, the farmer collects his own samples. In the official DHIA program, the dairy tester is paid an additional fee for collecting the samples.

In the official DHIA program, the farmer also receives a feed cost figure that tells him how much it costs to produce 100 pounds of milk. Average is based on cows in herd, milking and dry. Supervisor for the program is Duane Reinke.

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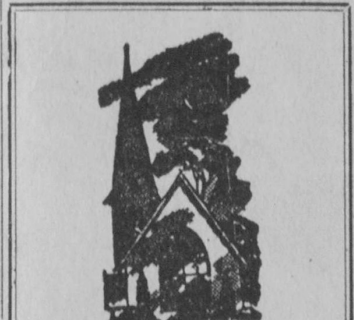
