





under way this summer on the Consumers Power and Michigan Gas Storage Company (a subsidiary of the power company) systems. For the next three summers, Consumers Power crews will inspect, clean and test almost 525 miles of pipe ranging in diameter from 12 to 26 inches. When the pipe was first installed, it met every specification of a rigid code, established by both the company and the American Standards Association. Now, says John B. Simpson, vice president, the company is backing up the original test

specifications on pipe laid before 1955 by hydrostatic testing at pressures exceeding the most that will ever be demanded of the steel in regular service. It takes a certain amount of ingenuity to test and clean pipe while still maintaining service for the more than 700,000 customers of the utility. "We are using a combination of ground corn cobs and sand for the cleaning and then we inject water for the pressure test," Mr. Simpson said. Strange elements, indeed, in this modern age of electronics.
