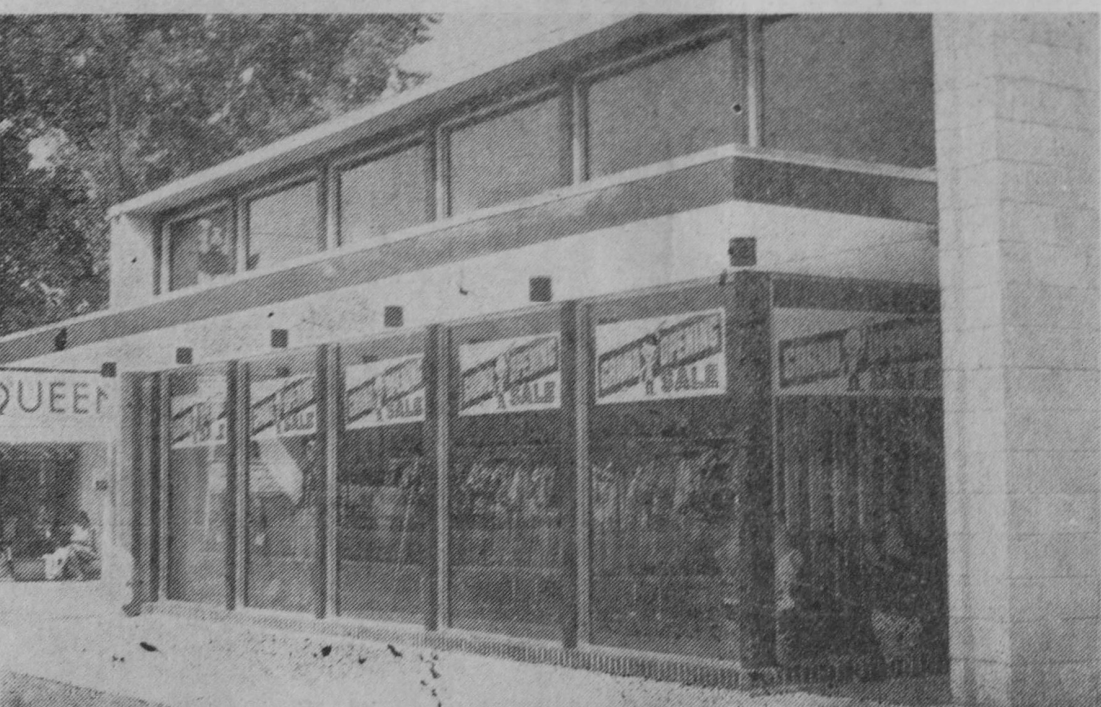

Hale Crash Fatal; Six Hurt at East Tawas

Mrs. Elizabeth Mullett, 50, Roseville, was killed instantly Friday morning in a one-car accident about four miles north of Hale on M-65. She was the county's 14th traffic fatality of 1967. Iosco County Sheriff's Department officers said Mrs. Mullett lost control of her car as the road dipped in the area of Smith Creek. The car went into a skid and rolled over before coming to a stop 175 feet from the shoulder of the road. John Mullett, 13, the victim's son and a passenger in the vehicle, was treated for cuts and bruises at Tawas Hospital and released. The victim's body was taken to Moffatt Funeral Home, East Tawas, and then transferred to Detroit. A rash of auto accidents over the week-end resulted in minor injuries to six persons at East Tawas. One of the injured was riding a bicycle and another was a pedestrian. Robert L. Duquette, 15, 1174 Meadow Road, Tawas City, escaped with minor bruises Thursday when the bicycle he was riding crashed into the side of an automobile at the intersection of East State and Tawas Streets.

East Tawas Police said the boy was riding a borrowed racing bike and apparently forgot the brakes were operated from the handlebars. He drove into the side of a car driven by George W. Graves, Sand Lake. The driver was not held. George W. Hutchinson, 69, East Tawas was treated Saturday morning for mouth injuries at Tawas Hospital when his car ran off Tawas Beach Road and struck a telephone post. Three Tawas youths received minor injuries and were treated Saturday night at Tawas Hospital when their car hit a power pole on Adams Street, East Tawas. Injured were William Cholger, 15, Tawas City; David Lixey, 16, and Truman F. Barbier III, 16, both of East Tawas. A third East Tawas youth, Steven Crisenbery, 16, escaped injury. A seven-year-old Flint boy, Mark Storms, was treated at Tawas Hospital Sunday morning when he was struck by a car at the corner of US-23 and Newman Street, East Tawas. The boy ran in front of a car operated by Robert M. Ridenour, 26, East Tawas, who was making a legal left turn off Newman Street onto US-23. The driver was not held.

Extra Millage Gets Voter OK

Tawas Area School voters approved Monday's special proposal increasing the tax limitation by 1 1/2 mills for one year, 466 to 404. Winning in all precincts but one, the vote was as follows: Alabaster, 37 yes, 19 no; Tawas City, 147 yes, 116 no; Tawas Township, 64 yes, 77 no; East Tawas, 218 yes, 192 no. While the majority was by no means overwhelming, Leonard Sarki, board president, called the election a vote of confidence for the board of education. Another jubilant board member said he would have been happy even if the proposal had won by only a single vote.

School Set for Opening of 1967-68 Term

Custodians are putting the finishing touches on cleaning Tawas Area School buildings for the opening of the 1967-1968 term Tuesday, September 5. Registration at the high school is to be completed today and, according to Billy R. Wilder, principal, any new students not registered may still contact the school office this Thursday or Friday. Ten new teachers are included in the high school faculty this year, according to Mr. Wilder. Of this number, seven are recent college graduates. Included are Miss Kathleen Hanon, a 1967 graduate of Michigan State University, who will be teaching French; Miss Mary Loper, a 1967 graduate of Central Michigan University, English; Mrs. Dawnell Kennedy, a 1967 graduate of CMU, commercial; Jerry Bedard, a 1967 graduate of Eastern Michigan University, physical education; Mrs. Susan Bettell, another CMU graduate, art and junior high English; Bernard Goretski, CMU, drafting; Mrs. Sandra Bethe, Sam Houston State College, Texas, junior high mathematics. Others added to the faculty this year include Mrs. Patricia Pellett, mathematics, an undergraduate of the University of Michigan and recipient of a master degree from Northwestern University; Herman Rollin, a graduate of Western Michigan University, who taught last year at West Branch, is now a member of the high school English department; Robert Curry, a graduate of Michigan State University, who taught last year at North Branch, will be teaching biology. He replaces Richard Stock, who has received a leave of absence and is teaching in Alaska. Both Rollin and Curry are graduates of Tawas Area High School. Curry in 1961 and Rollin 1962. Rollin is also an assistant coach. One new teacher has been hired this year for elementary grades, according to Miss Clara Bolen, principal. This is Mrs. Elina Wilder, wife of the high school principal, who will be teaching second grade at the East Tawas Elementary Unit.

Improvement of vocational education at Tawas Area has long been considered and, last year, voters approved two additional mills of taxes for two years to complete work on a new addition to the high school and to renovate former quarters used in shop instruction as classrooms. Supt. Reynold Mick said Monday night that contractors for the project were of the opinion that the addition would be completed by the mid-October deadline, although there have been some delays. One of the renovated classrooms is being completed this week and others are being rushed to completion in order that they may be used during the first week of school.

East Tawas Police are studying possible prosecution against six youths apprehended Monday night in the process of "decorating" Newman Street by painting a large flower on pavement at the Westover Street intersection. Court action may be sought requiring removal of the flower with paint thinner and "elbow grease."

Seek Actual Eye Witnesses to M-65 Fracas

Iosco law enforcement authorities are investigating an incident Saturday night in which a Whittemore youth was beaten by a group of about six persons. Ronald Worden, 18, Whittemore, was driving south on M-65 when a 24-year-old Flint man walked onto the highway in front of the car. Iosco Sheriff's officers said the man apparently had disregarded traffic and allegedly had been attempting to provoke motorists. Worden told officers he did not see the pedestrian, who was struck by the former's car. The man was not injured. The Whittemore youth was pulled from the car by a group of five persons, apparently friends of the pedestrian, and severely beaten about the head. State police and sheriff's department officers called to the scene had to contend with a near riot during their investigation. About 100 persons had gathered at the scene, following Saturday night's program at the Whittemore Speedway. Officers quoted the Whittemore youth as being unable to identify the assailants. Pros. Atty. J. Richard Ernst said Tuesday morning that his office, along with police, was attempting to locate actual eye witnesses to the incident in order that prosecution could be commenced.

TA Principal Gives Student Dress Rules

No well-defined policy has been adopted by Tawas Area Schools in regard to length of boys' haircuts or length of skirts worn by girls, according to Prin. Billy R. Wilder. It would be a matter of judgment. Wilder told board of education members Monday night. Wilder said that hair styles worn by boys should be neatly combed and not extremely long. Boys with "shaggy" haircuts will be ordered to see a barber before returning to school. The principal said that length of skirts worn by girls was a judgment area. Mini skirts are not to be allowed, but Wilder said he did not plan to get out a tape measure to check the length of skirts. Rules of dress are to be spelled out to students the first day and administrators are to meet with officers of the student council to draft rules for a code of dress. In other business conducted Monday night, the board accepted the low bid of Gase Baking Company for providing baked goods in the hot lunch program. Ammond Resterine Oil Company, low bidder, was awarded a contract for furnishing gasoline and fuel oil, while Nelkie Dairy, low bidder, was awarded the contract for furnishing dairy products. The board also authorized accepting Nelkie's bid for furnishing chocolate milk in the high school hot lunch program. Serving of chocolate milk is to be at the discretion of the administration because of additional work required in cleaning the cafeteria or classrooms, in the case of elementary grades. Cost of the chocolate milk is to be 6 1/2 cents per one-half pint.

TA School Bus Routes Announced for Term

Prin. Billy R. Wilder and Edgar Jenkins, transportation director, this week announce the 1967-1968 bus schedule for Tawas Area Schools. School is set to open the new term September 5 and the following is the way buses are to operate. Bus No. 1, Whitney, William Roiter, driver: Pick up Whitney area along US-23 to Alabaster, then to Zion Lutheran School, Tawas City Elementary Unit. The bus proceeds to the high school, East Tawas Elementary Unit, Immaculate Heart of Mary School and Tawas City Elementary Unit. Bus No. 2, Townline, Clarence King, driver: Pick up on Townline Road, then to Tawas City unit and pick up high school students, proceed to high school, then pick up along M-55 to Burrell Subdivision and IHM School, then to East Tawas unit. Bus No. 3, Wilber, Mrs. Doris Zaharias, driver: Pick up Wilber-Baldwin area to M-55 at Zubek's, then to high school. Pick up St. Joseph students, then to St. Joseph School and to East Tawas unit. Bus No. 4, Meadow Road, Mrs. Shirley Killey, driver: Pick up Merlin Jordan's, then turn south at McArdle corner. Pick up Meadow Road to Tawas City unit, pick up high school students and proceed to high school unit. Bus No. 5, Douglas and Bay Drives, Richard Wunderle, driver: Go to Prescott Dock and pick up all students along US-23 to Tawas City city limits. Pick up all parochial and high school students from Townline Road to Lake Street, then proceed to high school. Return to Trinklein corner, making the trip to Townline Road and Lake Street, picking up all eligible students. Return to Tawas City unit, then to East Tawas unit. Bus No. 6, Sherman, Mrs. Betty Steinhurst, driver: Pick up students in Sherman area. Pick up Busch and Bischoff on M-55 to high school. Then to Emanuel Lutheran and IHM. Iosco Schools Ready to Open

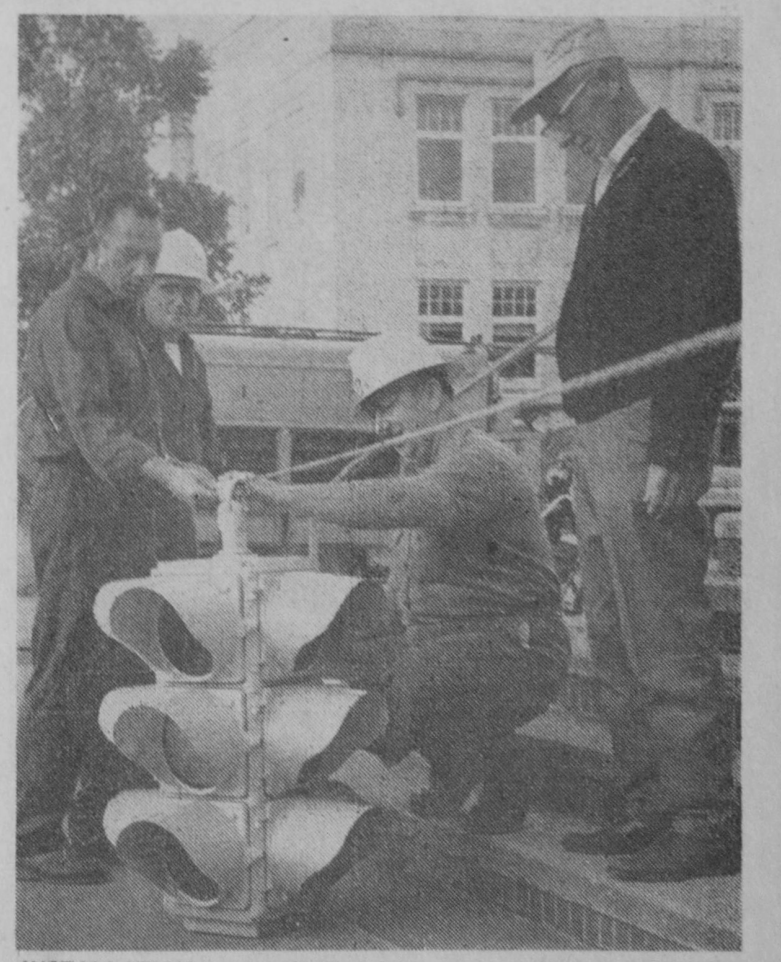
All but one public school of Iosco County opens the 1967-1968 fall term next Tuesday morning. The lone exception is Whittemore - Prescott Area, which opens September 6 with a half day of school. Projected enrollment for the four schools of Iosco is 7,150, according to a report Tuesday morning from the Iosco Intermediate School office. This includes 1,720 students at Tawas Area School, 4,000 at Oscoda Area School, 910 students at Whittemore-Prescott Area and 520 at Hale Area School. Kindergarten pupils of Tawas Area and Hale Area are to report to school Wednesday, September 6, on regularly scheduled buses.

ET Officials Happy With Interest Rate

Work on constructing East Tawas' new sewage disposal system moves into full swing shortly, following the sale last Thursday of two separate bonding issues to finance its construction. The Detroit firm of Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Smith was successful bidder on purchase of the bonds. The sale included \$300,000 in general obligation bonds, at a net interest rate of 4.84 percent, and \$480,000 in revenue bonds, at a net interest rate of 4.965 percent. Only one bid was submitted to the East Tawas Council on the two bond issues and city officials were happy with the interest rate charges. Supt. of Public Works Paul Roper said that all felt satisfied with the two proposals because of the present bond market. Hill and Thomas Construction Company, Lansing, is to construct the sewage treatment plant at a cost of \$320,050. The firm had started brushing operations at the site earlier in the summer and will now move into full construction. Fraser Brothers, St. Charles, was low bidder on constructing sewer mains at a cost of \$484,986.30. East Tawas received a federal grant of \$120,000 for this project, plus an engineering grant of approximately \$35,000. Both construction bids have been approved by the regional office of the Water Resources Commission.

Chest Receives Budgets From 10 Agencies

Budget requests were received from 10 different agencies at meetings conducted August 22-23 by the Tawas-Whittemore Area Community Chest, according to a report from John Skrocki, campaign manager. Budgets were received from the American Red Cross, boy scouts, girl scouts, Michigan United Fund (35 agencies), youth activities fund, retarded children, Salvation Army, Lutheran Social Services, Michigan Children's Aid and Catholic Family Services. Several of the agencies asked for an increase over money allocated last year. The campaign committee is to meet in early September to map plans for the upcoming community chest drive.

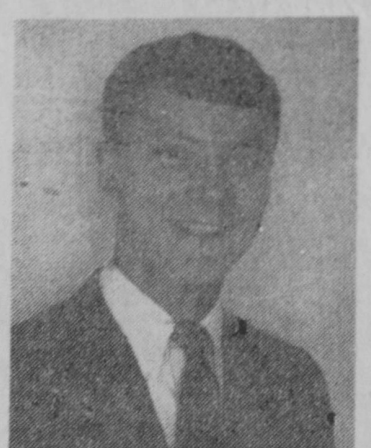


Louis A. Vaupre Heads Fund for Negro College

"Salute to the Flag" ceremonies held at Soldier Field, Chicago, Illinois. He was one of more than 10,000 navymen who formed a human "Living Flag" in honor of all men and women who are, or have been, in the United States Armed Forces.

During his training, he studied military subjects and lived and worked under conditions similar to those he will encounter on his first ship or at his first duty station. He also received instruction in seamanship, survival techniques, military drill and other related subjects.

Returns Aboard Attack Carrier

Airman Apprentice Martin J. Dewald, United States Navy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Dewald, Turner, returned to San Diego, California, aboard the attack aircraft carrier, Bon Homme Richard, when it completed an eight-month assignment as part of a carrier strike force off the coast of North Vietnam.

Operating from "Yankee Station" in the Gulf of Tonkin, the carrier launched its pilots on a total of 11,500 strike and combat support missions and averaged one major air strike every other day. She made a total of 10,885 arrested landings during her de-

ployment. Her pilots are credited with destroying 14 enemy jet planes.

Pilots from the carrier were the first to locate and then demolish vital thermal power plants near the capital city, Hanoi, North Vietnam. In three successive air strikes, "Bonnie Dick" pilots reduced North Vietnam's electrical power production by an estimated 50 percent.

Targets for the carrier strike pilots included airfields, trucks, railroads, missile complexes, highways, bridges, strategic supply routes and numerous other sites. Carrier pilots delivered a total of 5,503 tons of ordnance on North Vietnam military targets before the ship ended its third Vietnam combat tour.

Eight Juveniles Arrested on Bolen Cabin Burglary

Eight juveniles, ranging in age from 13 to 16, were turned over to probate court authorities after breaking into the Bolen hunting camp north of East Tawas August 22.

Chief of Police Donald Docking tracked the boys from the hunting camp to a cabin on the lake shore where they were identified by a resident.

Loot recovered included three cases of beer, two cases of soft drinks and \$31 in cash. Restitution of \$119 was made to pay for destruction caused by the boys, residents of Birmingham, Midland, Flint, Grosse Pointe Woods and Detroit. They had been vacationing here with their parents.

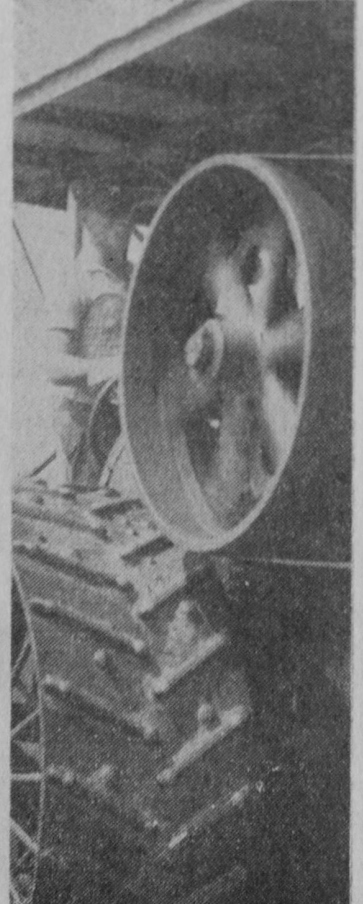

"A WOMAN'S WORLD" WITH Lee Murray

Salads are family fare because they are loaded with the foods one needs every day, made attractive by crispness, refreshing flavor and eye appeal. Of course, salads come in many forms; they may be used as appetizers, garnishes, accompaniments, etc. With so much variety, one never has to get into a salad rut.

GENERAL POINTERS
Rinse and trim greens and avoid bruising. Pat dry before chilling. This allows an oil dressing to cling properly.
Chilling is vital to any salad. For even better results, chill the mixing and serving bowls, too.

In order to retain the sweetest flavors, always break or tear the greens. Keep in mind that unpeeled tomatoes are sturdier and keep their shape better. Their juice does tend to water down the dressing, so add them at the last minute before serving.
Some fruits discolor after peeling, so brush them with citrus or pineapple juice.

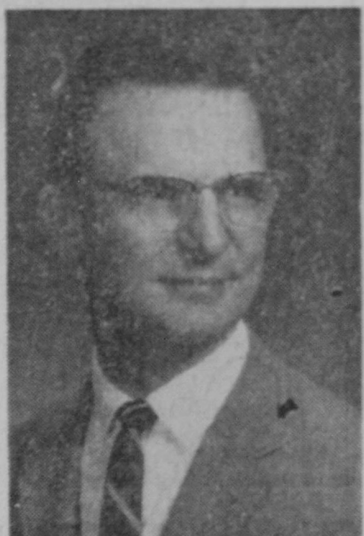
SIMPLEST TRIMS
Many raw vegetables make colorful, easy-to-prepare garnishes or relishes. Chill thoroughly before serving.

LANCED OLIVES
Cut washed, peeled carrots into narrow, three-inch strips. Draw sticks through pitted ripe or green olives.

CURLY CELERY
Cut cleaned celery into three-inch lengths, then slit into narrow parallel strips, cutting from each end almost to the center. Chill until curled in ice and water. Drain.

RADISH DESIGN
Cut cleaned radishes in thin, lengthwise, parallel slices, leaving them connected at the base. Chill in ice and water until slices spread apart. Drain.

TASTY ADDITIONS
Salads can be more tempting when served with foods that are crisp or crunchy; toast, bread sticks, rye wafers or cheese crackers. Try spreading thin rye bread (right from the refrigerator) with garlic butter and oven toasting them until slightly browned.

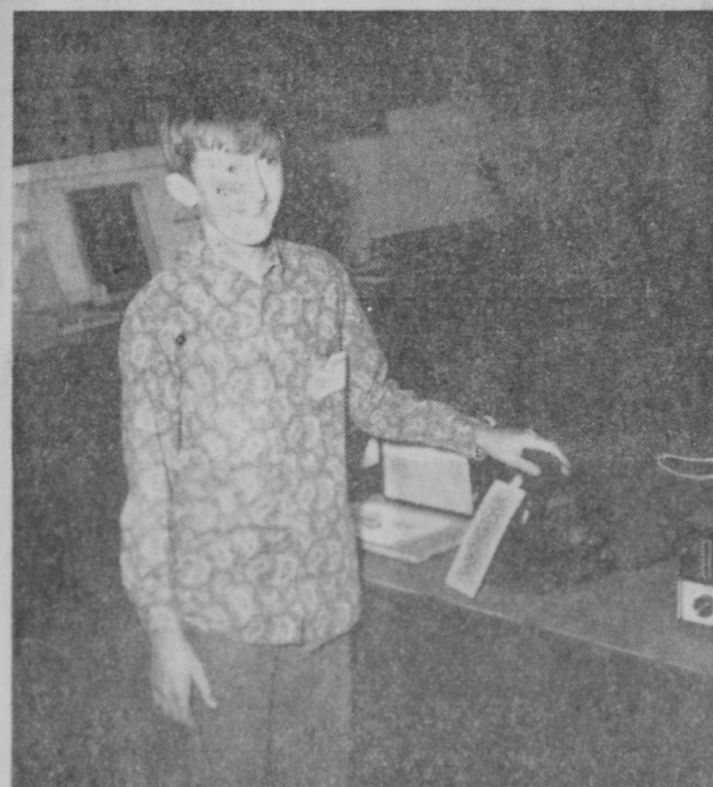

A MAJOR cleaning and testing operation is under way this summer on the Consumers Power and Michigan Gas Storage Company (a subsidiary of the power company) systems. For the next three summers, Consumers Power crews will inspect, clean and test almost 525 miles of pipe ranging in diameter from 12 to 26 inches. When the pipe was first installed, it met every specification of a rigid code, established by both the company and the American Standards Association. Now, says John B. Simpson, vice president, the company is backing up the original test

specifications on pipe laid before 1955 by hydrostatic testing at pressures exceeding the most that will ever be demanded of the steel in regular service. It takes a certain amount of ingenuity to test and clean pipe while still maintaining service for the more than 700,000 customers of the utility. "We are using a combination of ground corn cobs and sand for the cleaning and then we inject water for the pressure test," Mr. Simpson said. Strange elements, indeed, in this modern age of electronics.

Bursting Water Mains Caused Standish Trouble

Bursting water mains at Standish, caused by a special phosphate treatment used to remove iron deposits, has resulted in an emergency water situation and an even more serious problem for public works crews—coping with the almost impossible task of isolating leaks in a system with no shut-off valves.

Two big breaks in the main transmission line from wells emptied the water tank and had city officials on edge for hours. Fire anytime during this period would have been disastrous.

Old cast iron mains, their interior walls heavily coated with iron deposits, were apparently depending on the scale for strength. As the scale was eaten away, mains weakened and began to burst. Use of the phosphate has been discontinued.

Alternate routes bypassing the defective mains were available later in the week when portions of the city's new water system were rushed to completion.

Family Living Education

Outdoor Fun For The Week-End

With another big week-end coming up, enlist the help of family members who can safely cook over charcoal and plan an informal easy meal. Children can help by preparing potatoes for the grill, for instance. Have them wrap thick slices of potato, peeled or unpeeled, on a 10 or 12-inch square of well greased aluminum foil. Season with salt and pepper, add one tablespoon of butter and a few slices of onion. Wrap the package tightly but not breaking holes in the foil. Bake over hot coals for 45 minutes. Prepare as many packages as will be necessary.

Perhaps others in the family can roast corn over the fire, too. Pull back husks to remove the silk and tie husks securely. You may want to soak in ice water until placing them over coals for 20 minutes, turning frequently until the husks are browned.

Tomatoes can be cut in half, seasoned with salt and pepper and a slice of onion, wrapped in foil and baked 15 to 20 minutes. Brown rolls or biscuits in a covered pan over the coals.

meat, finger salads and fresh fruit for dessert, what meal could be easier?

Now Is The Time To

Make some more jam and jelly, sealing correctly and safely. Use a standard canning jar and vacuum lid as when canning fruit or use paraffin. If using paraffin, it should not be thicker than one-eighth inch. A thicker layer has a greater tendency to pull away from the edge, exposing the jam to bacteria growth. Put a few jars aside for Christmas gifts and to exhibit at the fair next year.

Put up outdoor chrysanthemums, between now and the end of September when buds have taken shape. Use a seven to nine-inch pot size, with a stone or piece of broken pot over the drain hole. Dig up a large ball of soil with the roots then water immediately with a soluble fertilizer. Keep in the shade for about a week, then keep at a cool temperature in the house. Move to an enclosed porch or cellar at night.

Eat what you can and what you cannot, can or freeze.

Take your poinsettia plant indoors and place in a sunny position. In order to produce blooms, the plant should be in complete darkness from 5:00 p. m. to 8:00 a. m. every day from the end of September until color shows in the brackets about the middle of December. Night temperature should be between 60-70 degrees Fahrenheit.

Buy Peaches By Color

Good peaches need not blush and many of them never do. It is the background color and not the amount of red or blush that indicates a ripe peach. . . a good thing, for all varieties do not blush to the same degree. Choose peaches with a yellow or creamy background, a bright and fresh appearance and firm but not hard to the touch. Sun Haven are best for freezing, Elberta best for canning, most others good for canning or freezing.

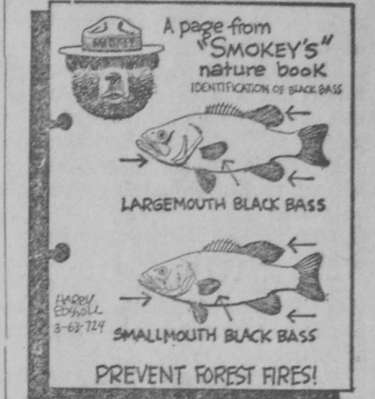

er bridge were furnished by Mrs. Tillie S. Robinson and were cut on what is known as the Milo Stevens farm. The spiles are exceptionally fine timber.

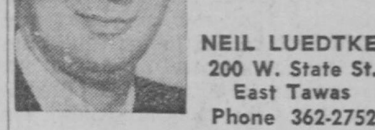

Proceedings of Iosco Board of Supervisors

AUGUST SESSION

August 16, 1967

Pursuant to July adjournment, the Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order at 9:30 a. m. by Chairman Smith who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Belson, Campbell, Chrvia, Everett, Gerard, Higgins, Hosbach, Jocks, Kasischke, Little, Lixey, McElheron, Mead, Mielock, Smith, Stephan, Weible. Absent: Blust, Hester.

Communications were read and referred to the proper committees by the chairman.

The regional library treasurer's report for the month of August was presented by Mr. Gerard to be placed on file in the clerk's office.

Mr. Kasischke presented the following resolution and moved its adoption:

Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

I submit the following resolution for consideration by the board and respectfully ask its adoption:

The Iosco County Board of Supervisors salutes Grand Township on the occasion of its 100th anniversary and expresses a wish for its continued growth and prosperity.

Signed: Walter Kasischke

Supported by Little and carried. Mr. Davenport, county agricultural agent, and Supervisor Chrvia reported on the National Association of Counties Convention at Detroit which they attended July 29 to August 2. Both agreed that it was an informative and enjoyable experience.

Mr. Davenport requested a meeting with the cooperative extension committee later in the day.

Mr. Mielock reported on a meeting of the bylaws committee of the regional planning commission held at Delta College on July 28 relative to the preparation of the bylaws. They are completed and will be tendered to the full committee for approval on August 22, according to Mr. Mielock. He also stated that they are asking for a change in legislation, so that each county might have representation instead of the existing nine man committee representing 14 counties.

Committees were ordered to their respective duties, balance of the board to be at ease, subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 11:40 a. m., Mr. Higgins introduced the following resolution from the floor and moved its adoption:

Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

Resolved that the sheriff's department be authorized to advertise and sell all material impounded and found in the county and held for six months or more according to Section 54, Public Acts of 1959.

Signed: Edw. Higgins, John H. Weible

Upon support by Belson, the resolution was adopted on the following roll call. Ayes: Belson, Campbell, Chrvia, Everett, Gerard, Higgins, Kasischke, Little, Lixey, McElheron, Mead, Mielock, Smith, Weible. Nays: None.

Register of Deeds Albert Buch addressed the board concerning his attendance at the registers of deeds annual convention, reporting to the members that Public Act No. 134 of the Public Acts of 1966 provides that the counties shall receive the revenue from the tax on conveyances of real property which heretofore has gone to the federal government. The act is to become effective immediately upon the repeal of the federal tax which is expected to become effective January 1, 1968. This would mean additional revenue for Iosco County of approximately \$7,000.00 per year, according to Mr. Buch.
