Roll on floured board to 1/8 inch thick. Cut with various shaped cookie cutters, bake on a greased cooky sheet. These are really good — Do shake some plain white sugar over some of them — yummy.

 $\frac{1}{2}$  cup light corn syrup Keep popcorn hot and crisp in a slow oven. Combine the five ingredients, cook to hard ball stage (250°). Remove from heat and add vanilla. Slowly pour syrup over hot popped corn, mixing well to coat every kernel. If you wish, stir in some candy red hots for color. Butter your hands lightly before pressing popcorn mixture into balls.



Every dieter knows that fruit pies are loaded with "sugar and spice and everything nice and fattening." They can scarcely be considered appropriate fare for serious weight watchers. Not, that is, unless some calorie-cutting tactics have been employed in the kitchen.

Calorie-concerned cooks are discovering that extra, unnecessary calories can be subtracted from many favorite dishes, simply by substituting low-calorie, even no-calorie ingredients for those that are excessively high in calorie count. 





At the end of the twelve days any fragments of the log that remained were carefully collected to be used again the following year to kindle the new Yule log.









