Death Takes Veteran Real Estate Developer

N. J. Crocker, 88, an East Tawas realtor for nearly 40 years, died of a stroke Saturday, December 23, at Tawas Hospital. He suffered an attack Friday at his Ottawas Beach home and was rushed to the hospital.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at Christ Episcopal Church. Burial followed at Greenwood Cemetery, East Tawas.

Born September 20, 1879, at North Branch, Mr. Crocker had

been in the lumbering business until World War I at Wilmington, North Carolina. He then returned to Michigan where he was engaged in the lumbering business at Gaylord.

He was married to the former Hilda Buell of Gaylord on November 15, 1904.

After leaving the lumbering business, in which he had been engaged for 15 years, Mr. Crocker entered the real estate business at Detroit, staying there for about five years.

Mr. and Mrs. Crocker first came to East Tawas in 1928-1929, where they purchased property and began to develop Green Gables Resort on the new Huron Shore Road and entered the real estate business.

Mr. Crocker was one of the principal real estate developers in the county, including such subdivisions as Ottawas Beach, Huron Shore Hills, Crescent Beach No. 1 and No. 2, Sunset Beach and Birchcrest Subdivision.

In 1945, he began development of subdivisions in Tawas City which eventually led to five additions: The Elms, First Addition to the Elms, Second Addition to the Elms, Elms Gardens and Elmwood Forest, the last in 1947. This development brought 162 new building lots to the Third Ward.

As part of his subdivision development in Tawas City, Crocker deeded a beautiful plot of land to the city in August 1948 to be used as a future public park. The property included 15 different species of trees.

He was a member of Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas.

Besides his wife, he is survived by a son, Buell, Midland; a daughter, Mrs. Stuart (Annette) White, Birmingham; eight grandchildren; five great grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. Maye Lazendy, Pontiac.

Anyone interested in filing for the above city offices, on either the Republican or Democratic ticket, has until January 2, 4:00 p. m., to file nominating petitions. From three to five signatures are required on each petition. Blanks are available at the city hall.

AuGres Awaits Notification on Harbor Finances

AuGres officials are awaiting notification from Washington, D. C., on a starting time for a federally-financed harbor of refuge. An appropriation to finance construction was signed into law November 20. Announcement had been made last summer that formal approval of the harbor had been given and a 1968 construction start was possible.

The city announced last summer that assurances had been received that the Michigan Waterways Commission was prepared to construct a 60-foot marina near the US-23 bridge. The city has 700 feet of frontage in that area.

The harbor would include a 12-foot channel approximately one mile southeast from the mouth of the AuGres River into Saginaw Bay with an earthen breakwater protecting the lake side of the channel for about 3,000 feet.

Putnam Files Sentence Appeal

Jonathan L. Putnam, who was sentenced November 27 to a prison term of 50 years to life, has requested assistance of counsel to perfect an appeal from the sentence.

Anyone convicted has the constitutional right of appeal within 60 days of sentencing. Putnam filed his request from Jackson Prison on December 21.

13 Head of Cattle Lost in Barn Blaze Sunday

Fire early Sunday morning destroyed a large barn at the James Sturtevant farm, located six miles northwest of Whittemore and south of M-55.

Lost in the blaze besides the barn were 13 head of young cattle and 4,000 bales of straw.

Mr. Sturtevant, a grade A milk producer, awoke about 3:00 a. m. to find the barn in flames. He and his son, James Jr., 22, ran into the blazing structure and turned the herd of dairy cattle into the barnyard.

The younger man sustained froz-

en feet and is undergoing treatment.

Whittemore Fire Department, assisted by Plainfield Township Fire Department, answered the call and efforts of firemen and neighbors saved a barn filled with baled hay only 50 feet from the burning structure, as well as a filled silo and contents of the milk house.

The young cattle lost in the blaze were in loafing pens and the Sturtevants were unable to release them.

The milk cows were moved to

the Earl Partlo farm on Mills Station Road while a decision is made by the Sturtevants as to possible reconstruction. The barn and contents were partially insured.

In order to aid the Sturtevants in their loss, Michigan Milk Producers Association, of which they are members, is to pay 70 percent of the weekly milk check normally received by them for the next two months.

Dairy Farmers Say Current Milk Prices Continue to 1968

Dairy farmer members of the Michigan Milk Producers Association have notified dairies current bottling milk prices will continue through April 30, 1968.

The price was established by the Great Lakes Milk Federation on August 1.

Great Lakes is the pricing arm for more than 30,000 dairy farmers in 20 cooperatives serving markets in nine states. MMPFA was a charter member when the Great Lakes regional bargaining-marketing organization was formed in 1960.

In Southern Michigan, the current Great Lakes dairy farmer price for milk sold in the Detroit and Saginaw Valley area is \$6.40 per hundredweight, or slightly more than 27 cents per half gallon. Prices in other areas of Michigan are slightly lower.

Dairy farmers receive payment

for their milk on the basis of a "mixture" of the prices paid by dairies for milk that goes into bottles and that which is used to make such genuine dairy products as cottage cheese, whipping cream and so forth. About 70 percent of all the grade A milk produced in Michigan is sold as bottled (class 1) milk.

Hound Tracks 'Lost' Fox

"Old Blue" out-foxed "Foxie" in a hunt within the city limits of Tawas City last Friday.

The fox, a pet of Ken Thibault and kept at his gasoline station located at Townline Road and US-23, broke its chain the previous night and disappeared.

There was no tracking snow and Thibault called on a buddy, Robert Allen of National City, to bring his hound to town for a fox hunt.

"Old Blue" sniffed the ground around the empty kennel and then took off across US-23, with Allen and Thibault close behind. The dog tracked the fox in a wide circle, crossing the highway twice and finally made its way back to the service station. There, they found "Foxie" huddled in a ditch and waiting to be returned to captivity.

Allen and his father, Austin Allen, are expert fox hunters and they are in hopes of seeing some good tracking snow after the first of the year. "Old Blue," who has probably run 150 fox in his lifetime, has a good nose and does not need the snow.

It was a good hunt despite the fact that there was no snow and the trail was entirely within the city limits.

Auto Crash Suit Started for \$135,000

A \$135,000 auto negligence suit was filed Friday in Isosco Circuit Court.

The suit is being brought by Arthur Heilig, individually and as next friend of Arthur Heilig Jr., a minor, and Nancy Heilig. Named as defendants were James O. Freeman and James D. Freeman.

The Heiligs received injuries in a crash April 9, 1966, on M-65, one mile north of Wickert Road, Plainfield Township.

The plaintiff's vehicle had been involved with another car in a collision and the Heilig vehicle was then struck by the northbound auto driven by James D. Freeman and owned by James O. Freeman.

Heilig claims in his petition that the driver of the other car ignored the accident scene, made no effort to slow his vehicle and was traveling at a speed that would not allow him to stop within the assured clear distance ahead.

The petition asks damages of \$25,000 for Arthur Heilig, \$10,000 for Arthur Heilig Jr. and \$100,000 for Nancy Heilig.

School Taking Applications for New Coach

At a special meeting Wednesday night, Tawas Area Board of Education directed the administration to start taking applications now to fill the head basketball coach position for the 1967-1968 school term.

Coach Bill McIntosh, who retires from coaching at the end of the present school term, was appointed assistant principal earlier this year and had indicated that this would be his last season as mentor of the Braves.

McIntosh has been the head coach for the past 11 years and also serves as athletic director.

In other business, the board established a rate of \$3.75 per hour to be paid as the overtime rate for custodians when they are required to clean the gymnasium following other than school activities. The present rate is \$2.25 per hour.

The board authorized hiring of another teacher for social studies in the team teaching program.

Billy Wilder, high school principal, explained adoption of an honor study hall now being used at the high school. Wilder said that the program is geared to a small group and, as long as it proves successful, he believed it would be educationally advantageous to youngsters.

The school is presently interviewing two teachers to serve as replacement for the late John Breece and Mrs. Breece. The new teachers are to be hired at the start of the second semester.



Drunk Drivers Major Cause of Auto Accidents

Michiganians who plan to host a party and motorists attending parties or visiting bars over the Christmas-New Year holidays are all targets of a "First a Friend, Then a Host" traffic safety campaign announced today by Automobile Club of Michigan.

"Last Christmas season for the first time, we abandoned the traditional 'If you drive—Don't drink' admonition," said Fred N. Rehm, Auto Club general manager.

"We are now re-emphasizing that liquor is involved in over half of all Michigan traffic deaths. We don't condone mixing alcohol and driving."

"But we are recognizing that 80 percent of motorists do drink and then drive. That is why we are aiming this campaign at holiday hosts and bartenders to encourage them not to let guests overindulge before getting behind the wheel."

Rehm noted that the 44 Christmas and New Year's, 1966 week-end traffic deaths in Michigan comprised a 30 percent drop when compared with the same period of 1965.

"No one can say why this happened. But if hosts and drivers will be moderate in use of liquor, last holiday's reduction can repeat itself," Rehm said.

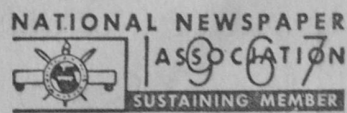

Church of the Nazarene Had Notable Gains During 1967

The Church of the Nazarene in 1967 had notable gains in membership, stewardship and in Sunday school enrollment. Also in 1967, participation in the Vietnam war made its sharpest impact on the denomination, it was reported this week at church world offices in Kansas City, Missouri.

Sunday school enrollment increased to 983,525—a gain of 57,000 over 1966.

Per capita giving was a record \$190.13 — an increase of \$10.43 above the previous peak of \$179.70 in 1966.

Giving for all purposes reached \$69,792,571—an increase of \$4,897,102 over 1966.

Mirroring the war impact, the names of seven Nazarenes killed in Vietnam were added to the war memorial plaque in 1967. This made a total of 16 gold stars on the Vietnam roll. More than 8,000 Nazarene young men were in the armed forces in 1967.

It appeared likely that the denomination would achieve its goal of 1,000,000 persons enrolled in Sunday school by the 17th quadrennial general assembly to be held in June at Kansas City.

The annual statistical report by Dr. B. Edgar Johnson, general secretary, showed a domestic net gain of 7,532 members, with a gain of 12,938 members overseas, for the total world membership gain of 20,470.

The Nazarenes had a net gain of 32 churches which brought the denomination's total to 4,958.

The stewardship gain very likely assures the Nazarene church of remaining in first place in the nation in per capita giving among all denominations with 100,000 or more members.

Bishop Woznicki Marks Anniversary

Stephen S. Woznicki, bishop of Saginaw Diocese which comprises 16 counties in Northeastern Michigan, marked his 50th year in the priesthood December 21. At that time, a Mass of Thanksgiving was celebrated and a dinner was held for the priests who serve with the bishop of this diocese.

Not only did the people of the Saginaw Diocese rejoice on the occasion of Bishop Woznicki's golden jubilee, Pope Paul VI sent him a letter of congratulations.

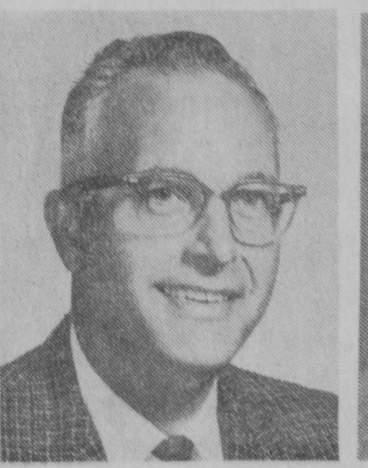

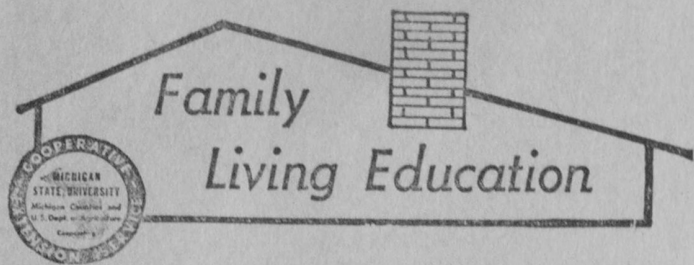

Bread Making Problems

Many of you made homemade breads over the holidays. If this was a new experience or in the rush of the season something went wrong with it, some of these questions may have been yours.

"My refrigerator dough smelled sour when I began to shape rolls. I had chilled it for only one day. What could be wrong?"

Answer: Unless the dough is punched every 20 to 30 minutes during the first few hours after it is refrigerated, until the dough is chilled through, it may develop a sour and sometimes unpleasant odor. The punching distributes the yeast uniformly through the dough.

"Sometimes when my loaves of bread start to cool, the upper crust pulls away from the loaf. What causes this?"

Answer: If bread has been allowed to rise longer than necessary—more than double in either the bowl or pan stage—the separa-

tion can occur. If the flour is weak—a blend of more soft than hard wheats, this would be even more likely to occur.

"Is it necessary to knead dough after the first rise and punch?"

Answer: No. Shape immediately without further handling. Kneading at this stage could break down the gluten, particularly if all-purpose flour is used. Punching the dough does not hurt it, but kneading involves pressure with the hands which can tear the dough.

"I don't see why my stollen dough takes so long to rise . . . It is such a good bread with lots of candied fruit and nuts in it . . ."

Answer: Possibly the fruits and nuts you add to the dough are taken directly from the refrigerator. Never add chilled ingredients of any kind to a bread mixture. Warm raisins, prunes, fruits, nuts, etc., in a piece of aluminum foil in a slow oven for a short while.

Women Drivers of Snow Scooters

Now, the men know engine mechanics but perhaps they do not tell you rules or reasons for the rules. Instead, a warning such as "do not drive it too fast down

hill" may be misinterpreted to only mean dangerous to riders.

Actually, he meant more than that. You will wonder at me suggesting use of a scooter—I do not own nor drive one—but word comes from Bob White, MSU engineering extension specialist, who says that motor damage is common in some scooters because of over-speeding the motor.

Mr. White says some scooters have no governor. With a centrifugal clutch, the motor is disengaged from the drive assembly at idling. When the throttle is opened, the load tends to serve as a governor, limiting the top engine rpm. In this case, a long climb at full throttle, or even a full-throttle run on level ground, will not result in engine over-speeding.

He warns, however, that runs at full throttle, particularly steep downgrades, may result in over-speeding the engine. Repeated instances of over-speeding can cause rapid engine wear and occasionally engine failure. On scooters with an un-governed engine, throttling back somewhat on downgrades can help prolong the engine life, maybe your own life!

When we accept the pleasure of using expensive mechanical equipment whether snow scooters or electric kitchen appliances, it is our responsibility to know rules and the reasons for the rules.

New Auto Contract Aids Some Veterans

Many of the 78,000 Michigan veterans who are in receipt of non-service connected pension payments are now in the process of reporting their annual income to the VA. A good percentage are retired personnel formerly employed by the automobile industry. As such, under recent contracts negotiated between the industry and the unions, this group will realize an increase in retirement income in 1968.

Robert M. Fitzgerald, manager of the VA Regional Office, Detroit, has this message for automobile retirees who may be concerned as to what effect this increase will have on their VA pensions. PL 89-730, which became effective on January 1, contains a protective clause which provides that no VA pension, or death indemnity compensation benefit will be reduced or discontinued due to an increase in retirement benefits before the end of the year in which the increase was received. As such, automobile retirees receiving VA pension would not be reduced or discontinued before December 31, 1968, even though their increase will place them above the established income ceiling.

Mr. Fitzgerald states, however, that the anticipated increase should be noted on the income statement so that the VA may project adjustments after December 31, 1968, if they become necessary.

Receive Unexpected Aid

7-Cap Funds Help Child Care Center

John McCormack, director of Seven CAP, Incorporated, announced last week that a reprogramming of unexpended funds has been approved by the Office of Economic Opportunity. The amount of \$3,521 has been approved to operate a retarded children's day care center. Included in the \$3,521 is \$1,000 to be spent on dental work for low-income retarded children. Mr. McCormack stated that this has been a real community action effort.

The program was started by a group of local mothers lead by Mrs. Wilma Crawford of West Branch. With the cooperation of the West Branch-Rose City School District and the COOR Intermediate School District, a project has been developed and submitted to the Michigan Department of Mental Health for funds to initiate a day care facility. The funds approved by the Office of Economic Opportunity are for six months only. It is hoped that the state will be in position next July to approve pending application with them for continuation of the program.

Functions of a day care center are to provide training or learning experience in the area of self-care, language development, sensory training, social skills and simple work skills. Day care programs are both child and parent centered.

For the parent, the program provides relief from the 24-hour burden of care for the child and through counseling to aid in the understanding of the problems at hand.

Highway Dept. to Reconsider US-23 Signing

State Rep. George A. Prescott, Tawas City, reports that the state highway department has acceded to his request for further consideration of instant redesignation of Highway US-23 between Bay City and Standish as M-13. Redesignation was scheduled upon completion of the 25-mile extension of I-75 between the two cities and Prescott pledged his support in seeking a delay so that Northeastern Michigan area businessmen could proceed in a more orderly manner in replanning their area promotional activities. "Weather delayed the opening of the new highway until spring,"

Prescott said, "and I just received word from the state highway commission that it now has time to study the problem to develop a solution which may be satisfactory to all concerned."

Com. W. D. Nunn of East Tawas confirmed the report to Prescott and promised a February meeting with commissioners and area businessmen.

Prescott was turned down in his initial effort to delay redesignation and objected strongly to an implication that area businessmen and elected officials were trying to "exploit" the numbering system to "induce" motorists into inconvenience.

"We want all the help we can get in promoting the natural beauty of our area and the existing US-23 route," Prescott concluded. "We feel this is to the advantage of tourists generally and the State of Michigan as well."

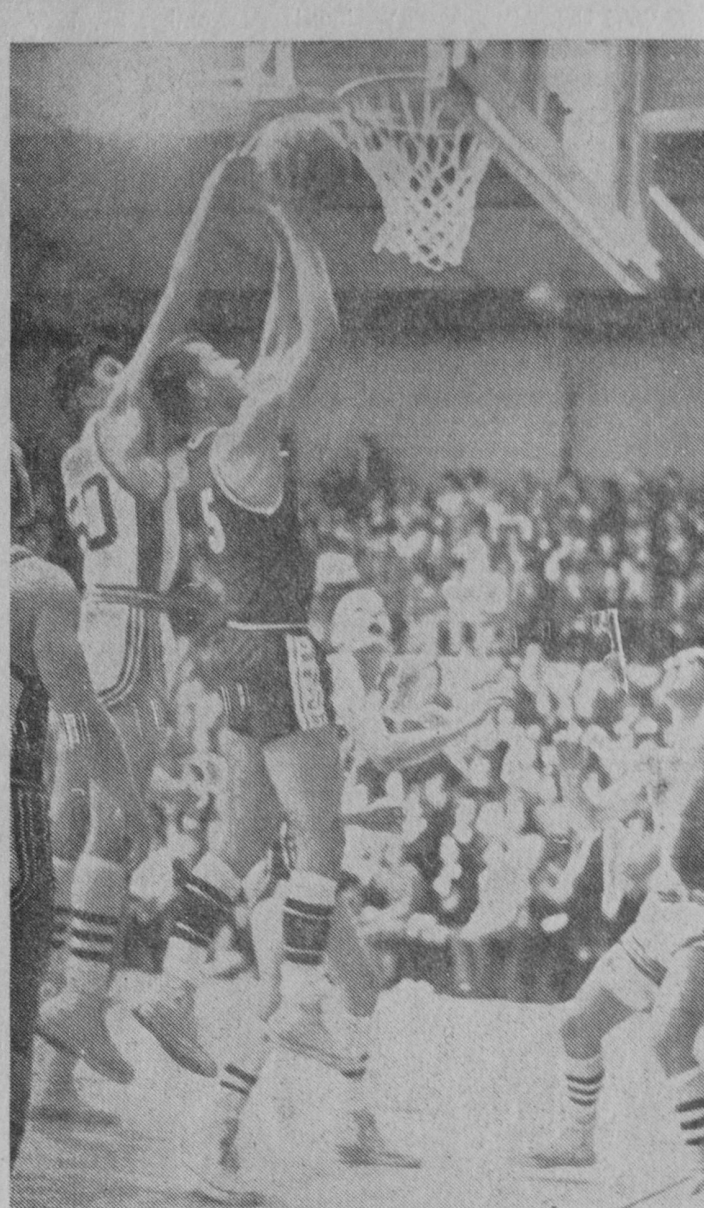
