The amount of \$3,521 has been ap-proved to operate a retarded chil-

dren's day care center. Included in the \$3,521 is \$1,000 to be spent on dental work for low-income retarded children. Mr. McCormack stated that this has been a real community action effort.

The program was started by a group of local mothers lead by Mrs. Wilma Crawford of West Branch. With the cooperation of the West Branch-Rose City School District and the COOR Intermediate School District, a project has been developed and submitted to the Michigan Department of Mental Health for funds to initiate a day care facility. The funds approved by the Office of Economic Opportunity are for six months only. It is hoped that the state will be in position next July to approve pending application with them for continuation of the program.

Functions of a day care center are to provide training or learning experience in the area of self-care, language development, sensory training, social skills and simple work skills. Day care programs are both child and parent centered.


