## Ken Wojahn Buys Merschel Cleaners

Recent sale of Merschel Cleaners, East Tawas, is announced this week.

New owner of the business is Kenneth Wojahn, 25, a 1959 graduate of Tawas Area High School, who returns to his hometown after spending seven years of employment in the cleaning business at Southfield.

Taking off a few minutes Monday from an extra heavy load of work caused by the lack of patron travel during last week's storm, Wojahn said he had always wanted to return to the Tawas area, but his purchase of the East Tawas cleaning establishment came quite by accident.

"We were up here one week-end in December and a friend suggested that Merschel's might be looking for a manager," said Wojahn. "Instead, it turned out that I bought the business."

Wojahn and his wife, the former Judy Miller of Tawas Township, were classmates at Tawas Area High School. Her brother-in-law, Kenneth King, also a former Tawas man, operates a cleaning establishment at Southfield and Wojahn had worked for him since 1959.

Wojahn is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Wojahn of East Tawas. His wife is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Miller of Miller Road. They have one daughter, nine months of age.

Former owner, Carlton Merschel, who had operated the business for a little more than 35 years, said Monday that he was now devoting full time to his real estate business.

## Stands Mute to CCW Charge

A statutory plea of not guilty was entered in circuit court Monday for Harry E. Chope, Wayne, who is being charged with possession of burglar tools and carrying two handguns in a motor vehicle.

Chope had stood mute when arraigned before Judge Allan C. Miller. Pre-trial is set for February 20.

Clarence W. Parker, Flint, entered a plea of guilty to uttering and publishing and was referred to the department of corrections for presentence investigation. Bond was set at \$1,000.

Parker had drawn a \$70 check on a Flint bank. Harry Straley was the complainant.

## SP Detective Studies Voice Identification

A former Tawas man, Michigan State Police Det. Ernest W. Nash Jr., East Lansing, was among three Michigan men who shared in attending the first class in voiceprint identification held at Voiceprint Labs, Incorporated, Somerville, New Jersey.

Nash and Trooper Lewis S. Wilson, Bridgeport, are the first police officers to receive such instruction from the private organization. They, along with Dr. Oscar Tosi, Michigan State University physicist, just completed two weeks of training.

Viewed as a new tool in crime fighting and other types of investigation, voiceprint identification technique and equipment were developed by Dr. L. C. Kersta, under whom the three studied.

Kersta and other scientists have been working on methods of identifying human voices since World War II when need for this was indicated. Kersta scored a breakthrough five years ago in refining his technique and equipment.

In voice identification, a visual record or spectrogram of the voice in question is produced by a sound spectrograph. This is a pictorial representation of spoken words.

Kersta's research and study have demonstrated that the voice of a person, like fingerprints, is unique to the individual. He also is developing a system for classifying voiceprints which could then be searched by computer.

Voiceprint identification has already had successes in court cases, the New Jersey laboratory officials said.

This identification technique is

particularly applicable for law enforcement in investigating cases where voices can be recorded and checked for comparison with records of suspect persons; such as, telephone calls involving obscenity, bomb scares, extortion and the like.

Under consideration by the state police are plans to purchase this equipment for special investigation cases.

## Area Escapes Full Force—

# Storm Brought Travel to Halt

Iosco County escaped the full brunt of Friday's storm which crippled most of Lower Michigan, but there was enough snow—an estimated 10-14 inches—to completely snarl traffic in the area and cause a huge clean-up for snow removal crews.

Business and industry came to a virtual standstill Friday and much of Saturday. Northbound mail trucks were just unable to buck 10-foot drifts in the Tri-City and Flint area, while bread, milk and other food supplies normally delivered to local food markets were in short supply.

The snowstorm, accompanied by steady winds up to 35 miles an hour, swept the lower region of the great Lakes. Watching the plight of such metropolitan areas as Chicago, Illinois, and Flint being completely paralyzed by the storm, local residents were thankful that the major portion of the storm missed this area.

As it was, snow removal crews of the Iosco Road Commission and DPW crews of Tawas City and East Tawas worked around-the-clock on Friday and Saturday. By mid-morning Saturday, most thoroughfares were open to local traffic.

Crews were still busy on Monday morning clearing away huge piles of snow along US-23 and local side streets. The job probably will not be completed before the week-end.

Residents of the Tawas area awoke Saturday morning to find that most of the ice in Tawas Bay had moved out into Lake Huron. Only ice remaining was in the Perchville area, which is protected by the arm of Tawas Point.

The blizzard came right on the heels of a three-day mild spell which saw much of the snow remaining from past storms being flushed down street drains and streams as the temperature soared to over 40 degrees.

Without the mild weather, snow removal crews would have had trouble in clearing away last week's storm. As of January 16, the area had a snowfall of 37 inches. A storm the next day deposited another six inches and high banks of snow lined all roads until last week.

About three inches of snow fell yesterday (Tuesday), but it was not enough to further complicate highway travel. Areas to the south were hit by a mixture of snow and rain.

## Burglars on Prowl in Storm's Wake

Crime took no holiday in the wake of last week-end's storm which hit the area.

Seven burglaries of summer homes in the Douglas Drive area were discovered Monday morning, as well as a break-in at a Hale businessplace, victimized for the second time in two weeks.

A farm machinery sales building owned by Clark Brindley, one mile south of Hale, was burglarized over the week-end. Taken was \$50 in cash and cigarettes. Entry was made through a back window, the same method used a week ago.

Iosco Sheriff's Department investigated break-ins Monday afternoon at five summer homes at the southernmost end of Douglas Drive, Alabaster Township. State police were investigating two similar cases along the same road, only about a mile to the northeast. More burglaries may be uncovered as investigation proceeds.

Deputy Sheriff Jerry Kruse said Monday night that the take probably would run into several hundreds of dollars. Stolen were television sets, radios and household items.

The burglaries took place sometime Saturday night or early Sunday morning. Police found tracks of the burglars leading from Doby Road to the homes. Several sets of tracks in some instances, led officers to believe that two or more burglars had made several trips into each home to complete their work.

"It looked as though they forced a pry bar between the door and the jamb and then kicked it," said Kruse in describing the burglars' method of entry.

Officers found tables or stands with aerial lead-ins ending where television sets were once located. Doors were left ajar and the homes were open to the elements.

The burglaries were discovered Monday morning when a tax appraiser noticed tracks leading to the now unoccupied homes. He immediately notified police.

## Eligible Vets May File Now for Exemption

Veterans eligible for homestead tax exemption should file applications with local assessors before adjournment of the board of review, which in most cities and townships is about March 15.

Persons now on active duty may be eligible, as well as veterans of the Korean War, World War I and World War II, who are receiving compensation checks from the Veterans Administration. Unremarried widows of honorably discharged soldiers may also be eligible.

To receive the exemption of \$2,000 of state equalized value (\$4,000 cash value), the veteran or widow must make application annually. Forms are now available from city assessors and township supervisors. Those persons making application for the first time will have to show discharge papers, proof of property ownership and a recent compensation check from the Veterans Administration. Those who have applied in previous years may be required to show a recent compensation check only.

Persons who own real and personal property of more than \$10,000 state equalized value are not eligible. Also those whose income exceeds \$7,500 may not be exempted.

Other requirements are that applicant own and occupy a home—stead as of the previous December 31 and, if a veteran, have lived in Michigan six months before entering service or five years previous to making application. Widows application must certify that the husband lived in Michigan six months before entering service or five years before his death.

## Boost Room Rates at Tawas Hospital

A boost in room rates effective February 1 was announced this week by Sister Rose Helene, SSJ, administrator of Tawas Hospital.

Daily charge for private rooms is to be increased from \$35 to \$40, while semi-private room rate is to be increased from \$26 to \$30.

"We find the need to increase our semi-private and private room rates due to the demands of the hospital falling under the new law, whereby we must give time and a half for overtime and increase our minimum wage," said the hospital administrator.

Space in the 38-bed hospital is at a premium. "Patients and their families have cooperated wonderfully in not insisting upon private rooms, thereby reducing the use of corridors for beds," she said.

Nursery rates are to remain the same as in the past: Newborn, \$10; after discharge of mother, \$15; incubator, \$15.

## Donald Humphrey New J. High Teacher

"I guess I can now appreciate the teacher's side of the classroom. I think I am going to like it."

Humphrey graduated with honors December 10 at Michigan State University. He received a bachelor of art degree and majored in history.

Following graduation, he taught three weeks at Arenac Eastern and then started the second semester here January 23.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Humphrey of East Tawas, Donald was a member of the National Honor Society here during his

sophomore, junior and senior years, as well as being a member of the language club during those same years. He was a member of the student council as a junior.

An active participant in sports, Humphrey lettered in baseball, basketball and football during his high school days.

He expects to return to college next fall to continue his work toward a master degree, or return to the pre-law curriculum which he commenced at MSU.

"I am really undecided at this point. I am getting to like this side of the classroom," he said.

Donald's older brother, Gary, 30, is a member of the faculty at East High School, Garden City. His younger brother, Herbert, is a student at Central Michigan University. That might have some influence on his decision.

## Hospitals Say Medicare is Huge Burden

Michigan's hospitals are laboring under more than \$23,000,000 worth of additional financial burdens as a result of Medicare.

This is one of the statements made last week by Allan Barth, executive director of the Michigan Hospital Association, in a summary of results from a questionnaire circulated among 228 acute general care hospitals all across the state.

Barth said that projections based on response from the hospitals indicate that some \$21,150,000 in unpaid Medicare accounts receivable is currently being carried on hospital books. Another \$2,000,000 is the estimated payroll for additional employees required in processing Medicare claims and patient records.

"Medicare payment bottlenecks have contributed to the hospitals' fiscal difficulties. In a number of cases," Barth said, "hospitals have had to borrow money at high current interest rates in order to meet payrolls and other expenses. This in turn contributes to the rising cost of hospitalization."

The MHA director estimates that some 550 additional employees with total wages of \$2,240,660 will be required state-wide to handle the extra Medicare load. This is at an average of \$4,100 per employee.

Leading the list of administrative problems was the handling of Medicare bills for hospitalized patients. These impatient claims were considered problems by 78 percent of administrators responding. The bulk of the complaints concerned slow verification of eligibility and additional paperwork required to process claims.

Outpatient claims problems ranked next at 58 percent. Complaints were primarily concerned with extra paperwork and handling of the deductible portion of the bill.

Scouting is such a program. It needs help. How about it?

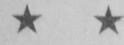
**Michigan's Law of Eminent Domain Needs Modernization**

While sportsmen, gardeners, and other conservation-minded people are rightly concerned over the needless destruction of our wilderness areas, too much of outdoor America remains completely unprotected from the ravages of ill-planned highways, highlines and pipelines.

Under Michigan's out-dated Law of Eminent Domain, any private property is subject to condemnation, regardless of esthetic or historical value.

Conservation experts of the state highway department and public utility companies make a conscientious effort toward protecting our diminishing woodlands, but much of this effort is often negated when alternate routes may prove a little more costly.

A considerable portion of Michigan's business is built upon the scenic splendor of her woodlands, lakes and streams. When right-of-ways are being purchased, highway and utility planners should avoid slashing woodlands.



**Self Protection**

It is a shocking comment on the American way of life when someone is criticized for protecting himself, particularly so when there is an acute police shortage.

This is the situation today at Detroit, where police and newspapers are taking small grocery store owners to task for learning how to use a handgun as protection against the criminal element.

While it is not a new stand for sophisticates of the daily press, for they have been hammering for anti-gun legislation for months—believing that it is right for only the police and criminals to have firearms, as it is impossible to prevent the latter from acquiring arms—it does seem to be a strange policy for police. One would think they would be pleased that the small grocers were taking the time to learn the proper handling of weapons, rather than to have them used dangerously on the premises.

If a few people had a little backbone in the Detroit area to stand up against some of the punks who victimize small merchants, perhaps the criminal element would think twice about entering a store where there might be a man ready to defend himself.

The real problem in this situation—big city public apathy toward aiding a fellow man in danger—can be ignored by calling grocers self-styled vigilantes, or by stating that the terror would be increased by giving them "lunch hour target practice."

Perhaps the Detroit police should take a note from a Florida city, which recently conducted training courses for women in the proper handling of firearms under sponsorship of the National Rifle Association.

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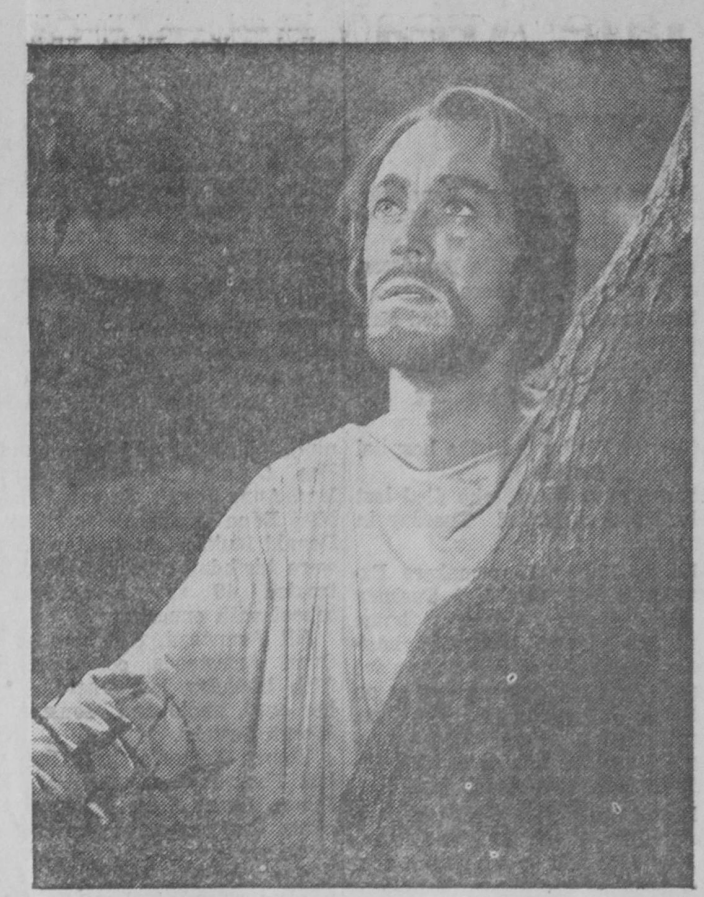

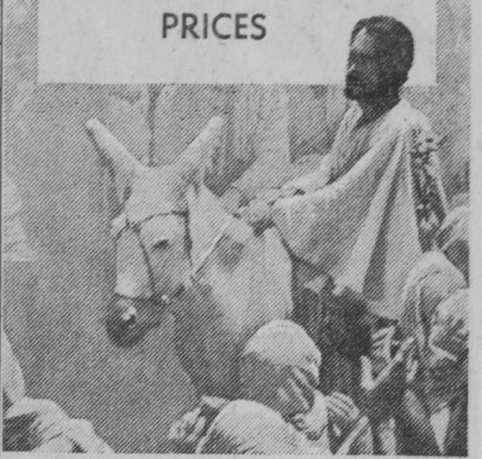
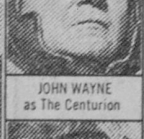

## Tax Division Bill Introduced by Cederberg

Rep. Elford A. Cederberg of Michigan's 10th Congressional District joined several colleagues Monday in introducing legislation in the house of representatives providing a new tax sharing program calling for a return to the states a share of the federal income tax collections as a means of helping the states solve their own problems.  
Under the proposal, three percent of all individual income taxes collected by the federal government in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1968, would be turned back to state and local units of government. This would increase until the states would receive five percent of the personal income taxes collected during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1971.  
The president's budget, submitted to congress last week, indicated the income collections in the fiscal year 1968 would be about 73.2 billion dollars. Three percent of this would be about 2.2 billion dollars which would be sent back to the states.  
Under the plan, 10 percent of the estimated 2.2 billion dollars would go to the 17 states with the lowest per capita income. Of the other 90 percent, the states would receive 50 percent for any purpose desired, five percent for strengthening state and local administration and 45 percent for the state's local subdivisions of government. Several tax sharing plans have previously been proposed but this is the first one providing 45 percent for local governments.  
Allocations to the states would be based on a simple "tax-effort" ratio multiplied by the population of the state. The tax effort ratio would be the sum of all taxes collected in the state, including income, real property, sales, etc., divided by the total personal income in the state.

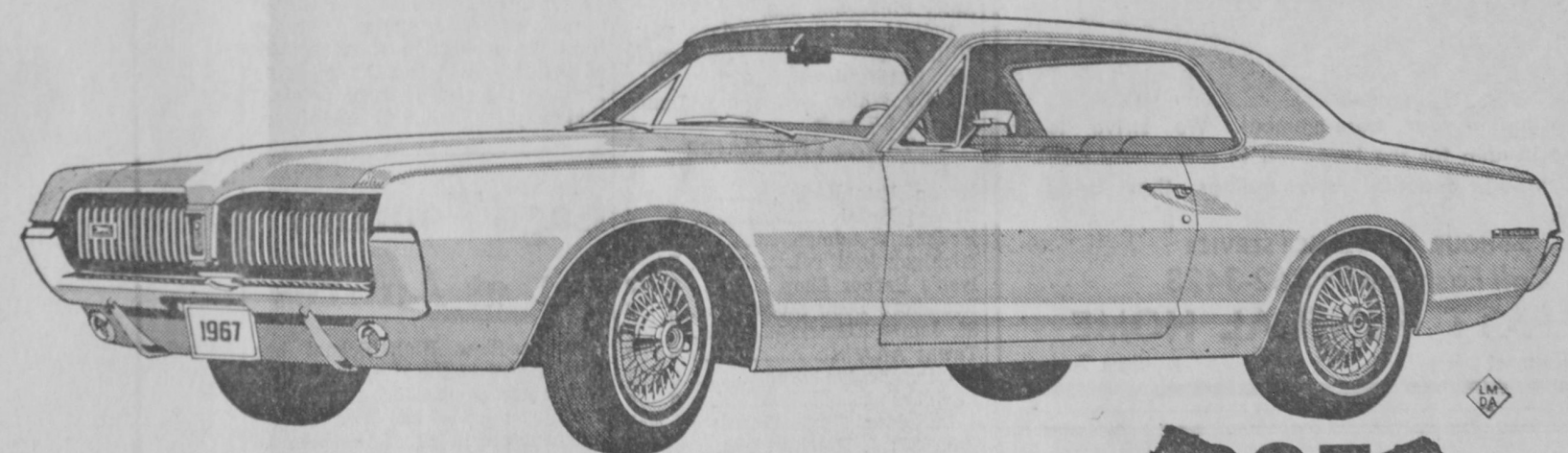


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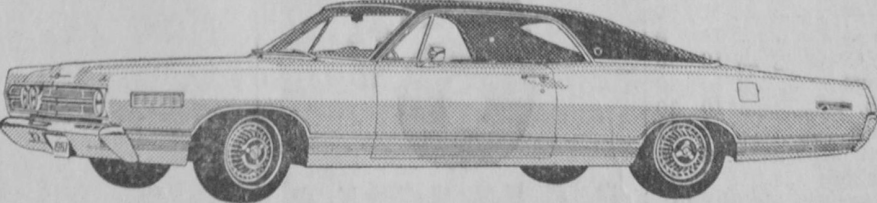

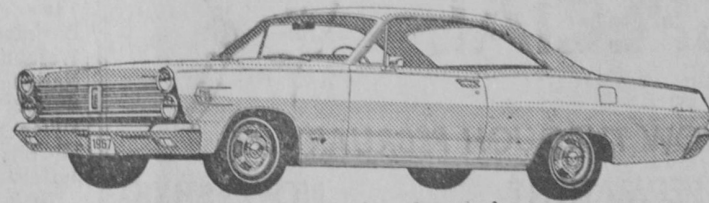

### Artificial Lighting of Indoor Plants

Some of the indoor decoration of modern homes and offices are plants. Often, they are placed where there is inadequate natural light so artificial light must be used to get satisfactory growth.

For most purposes, incandescent lamps provide the right kind of light rays. However, if more light is needed for flowering plants, such as African violets, gloxinias and begonias, fluorescent tubes are better because they give off less heat. These heat rays cause distorted growth of the plant.

If using fluorescent tubes, it is best to use half "daylight" and half "soft white" to provide a good balance of light rays. For seed germination, Richard Stinson of MSU's horticulture department says only "warm white" tubes should be used.

For detailed use of artificial lighting, ask at your Cooperative Extension Service office for free bulletin No. 553.

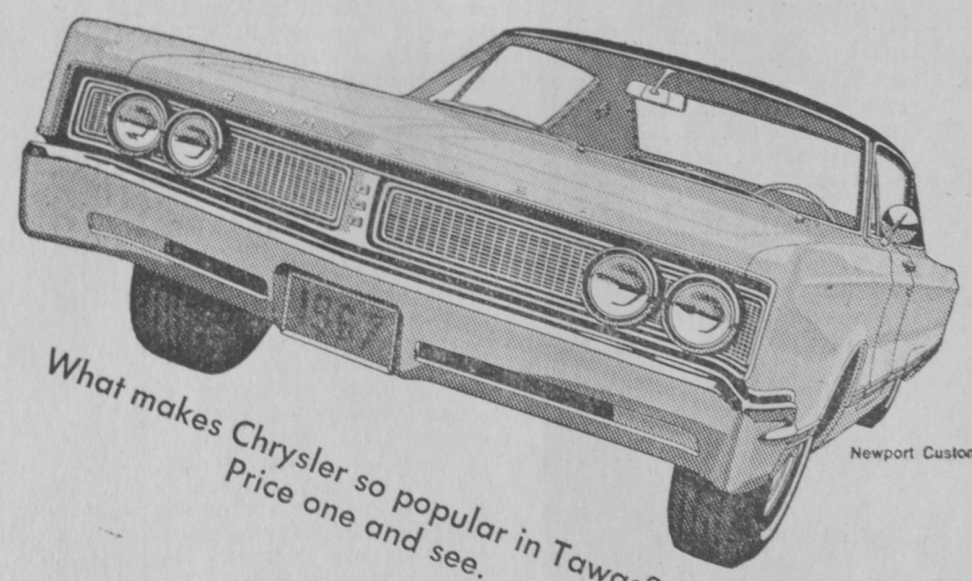
