## Land Fill Authority is Close to Reality

After about a year of discussions, a proposed Tawas Area Land Fill Authority is apparently one step closer to reality following a recent meeting between representatives of Tawas City, East Tawas, Tawas, Baldwin and Wilber Townships.

At meetings of city councils of Tawas City and East Tawas Monday night, Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works at East Tawas, was designated as official representative of the group to sign an agreement for a dump site with the United States Forest Service.

The proposed new dump would be located about one mile northwest of the present Tawas City dump off Monument Road. Exact location of the 20-acre site is 9.10 of a mile southwest of Monument Road on Galeon Road.

Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works of Tawas City, told the council that after obtaining property for the sanitary fill, a plan of operation would be submitted to the state health department.

Such an operation would require formal organization of a sanitary land fill authority involving the units of government interested.

Bublitz said that if negotiations for the property were immediately successful, the new dump could be in operation by fall or winter.

A meeting was to have been held Tuesday between Bublitz, Ropert and Loren Woerpel, Tawas District ranger.

It was stated that under the

land fill operation, the 20-acre site could handle needs of the various governmental units for nearly 50 years.

## Elmer Britt, Former Road Head, Dies

Elmer Britt, 77, Isosco County farmer, died at Tolfree Hospital, West Branch, Tuesday morning, July 18. He was born near LeRoy, New York, and moved to Turner at the age of 15.

A member of Turner Methodist Church, Mr. Britt served on the board for many years. He was a member of Omer Masonic Lodge No. 377, F&AM, and Bay City Consistory. He served as Burleigh Township supervisor for eight years, was a member of Isosco County Road Commission for 12 years and was a charter member of the Northeastern Michigan Hereford Calf Association.

Funeral services will be conducted Thursday, July 20, 3:00 p. m., at Turner Methodist Church. The Rev. Stephen Meeks and the Rev. Arthur Parkin will officiate. Burial will be in Cedar Valley Cemetery.

He is survived by his wife, Luella; two daughters, Mrs. Gerald Wyatt (Catherine) of Hale and Mrs. Fred Vance (Alice) of Garden City; two sons, Warren and Howard of Turner; 16 grandchildren, and one great grandchild.

## Iosco County Fair Set to Open Next Week

Iosco County Fair is only one week away. Gerald Bellen, president of the Iosco County Agricultural Society, and Richard M. Samson, secretary-manager, this week extended an invitation to all residents of Isosco and neighboring counties to attend this event July 26-29.

Next Wednesday morning will commence the assembling of exhibits at Plainfield Township Hall. Premiums are to be awarded for livestock, poultry, farm produce, flowers and plants, domestic arts, home economics, state fair special, antiques, conservation, 4-H Club, games, contests, arts, hobbies and handicraft.

Entry is limited to residents of Isosco County.

There will be three big days of harness racing with a total of \$10,000 to be awarded in prize money in 10 events.

A daily giant midway features famous rides and amusements by Skerbeck Amusement Company.

Besides the many other attractions, fair week is to be climaxed by a parade Saturday, 12:30 p. m., starting at Plainfield Township Hall.

One of the featured events in

the parade and during intermission at Saturday's harness racing events will be Jack Baird's Bagpipe Band of Bay City.

"We believe the 1967 event will surpass any other fair in the history of the Iosco County Agricultural Society," said the secretary-manager. "This is a family activity and children 12 years of age and under are admitted free each day."

## Park Receipts Down at ET

Receipts at the East Tawas City Park during June continued to be below the corresponding month for last year, according to a report Monday night by Joseph Badalucco, park manager.

Badalucco said that receipts totaled \$6,900 thus far this year, as compared to \$10,484 during the same period last year. Camp fees amounted to \$6,786, community building rental totaled \$66 and miscellaneous fees amounted to \$48.79.

The park manager said that unfavorable weather conditions, the fact that automobile plants had not closed down as yet for model changeover and Expo 67 had been contributing factors in the lower income.

In other business, Mrs. David Small was appointed as justice of the peace to fill the vacancy caused by the recent resignation of John Bolen.

Marlin Eaton resigned from the city's recreation committee and Wayne Pollard submitted his resignation as a member of the park board.

The council gave its approval to Hydro-Mate Sport Boats, Incorporated, to operate a boat livery at the state dock.

Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works, reported that brushing has started on access roads to serve the new sewer disposal plant. Top soil has been removed and work has started on sand fill.

Ropert said that work was proceeding on a small scale toward clearing the property, awaiting final action on the sale of bonds to finance the project.

John McCormack, director of SevenCAP, Incorporated, announced this week the hiring of Laurie E. Frank, East Tawas.

Mr. Frank will head the area opportunity center program. His responsibilities will include organizing and operation of rural information centers in the SevenCAP area. His staff will include six community aides, four volunteers and four neighborhood youth corps workers.

McCormack said that the centers will be an attempt to make information and services available to low income residents of the outlying areas.

Frank was formerly with Tawas Area Construction Corporation.

## Grand Opening July 20-22 for New Hale Shell Service

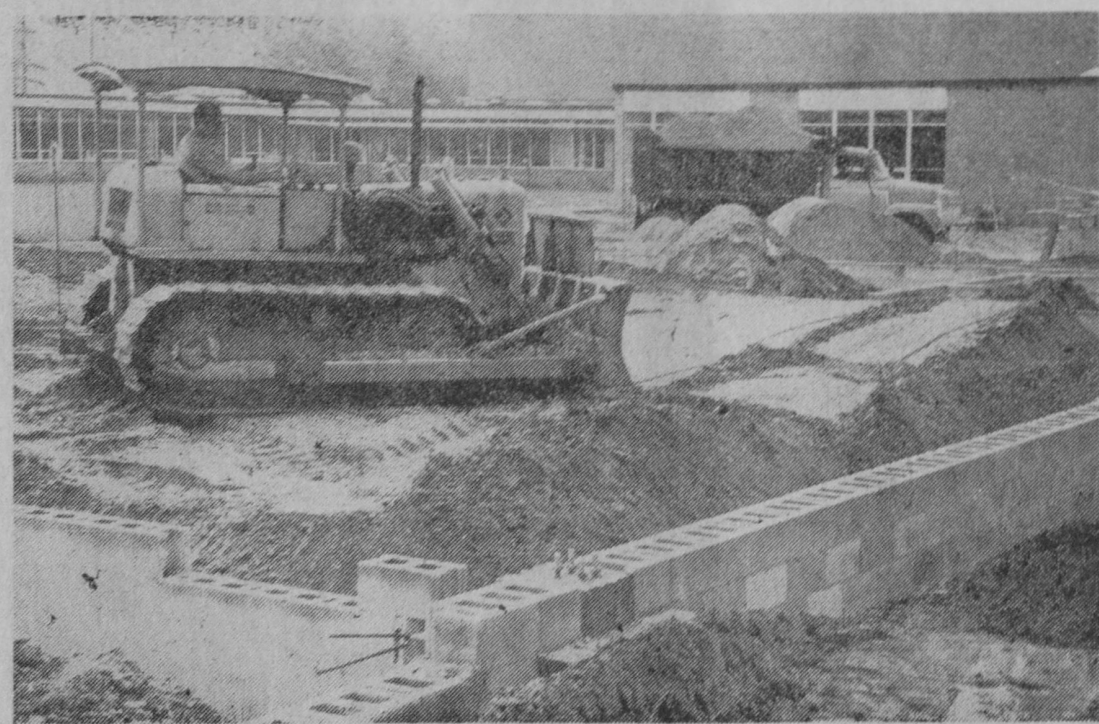

### Mrs. Taylor is Area Delegate to Convention

Twenty-five years of mission responsibility will be marked by over 2,000 delegates and guests at the International Silver Jubilee Convention of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League July 18-20 at Washington, D. C.

Representing the Timberline Zone area as a delegate will be Mrs. Ralph Taylor of East Tawas. Others attending from the area are Mrs. Ruth Albertson of Tawas City and Mrs. Hugo Schwab of Standish.

The LWML, an auxiliary organization of Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, will observe the silver anniversary by adding a special thank-offering project to its program. Founded in July 1942, the league began with a membership of 30,000 women in 15 districts and projects amounting to \$15,000. Today, the league numbers over 210,000 members in 39 districts and its current projects total over a quarter million dollars.

Scheduled for completion by convention time, these projects are Jeeps for Brazil missionaries, \$30,000; leprosy treatment programs in New Guinea, India and Nigeria, \$85,000; a translation center at Enugu, Nigeria, \$100,000; "Messengers of Christ" linguistic training and recruitment program, \$10,000; a girl's school at Nung Udoo, Nigeria, \$35,000, and equipment for a hospital at Yahe, Nigeria.

An election will be held to fill five international offices. Presidential nominees are Mrs. Warren Hartman of Richland, Washington, and Mrs. Albert Warnke of Des Plaines, Illinois. Retiring is Mrs. Gilbert O. Hankel of Empire, Colorado.

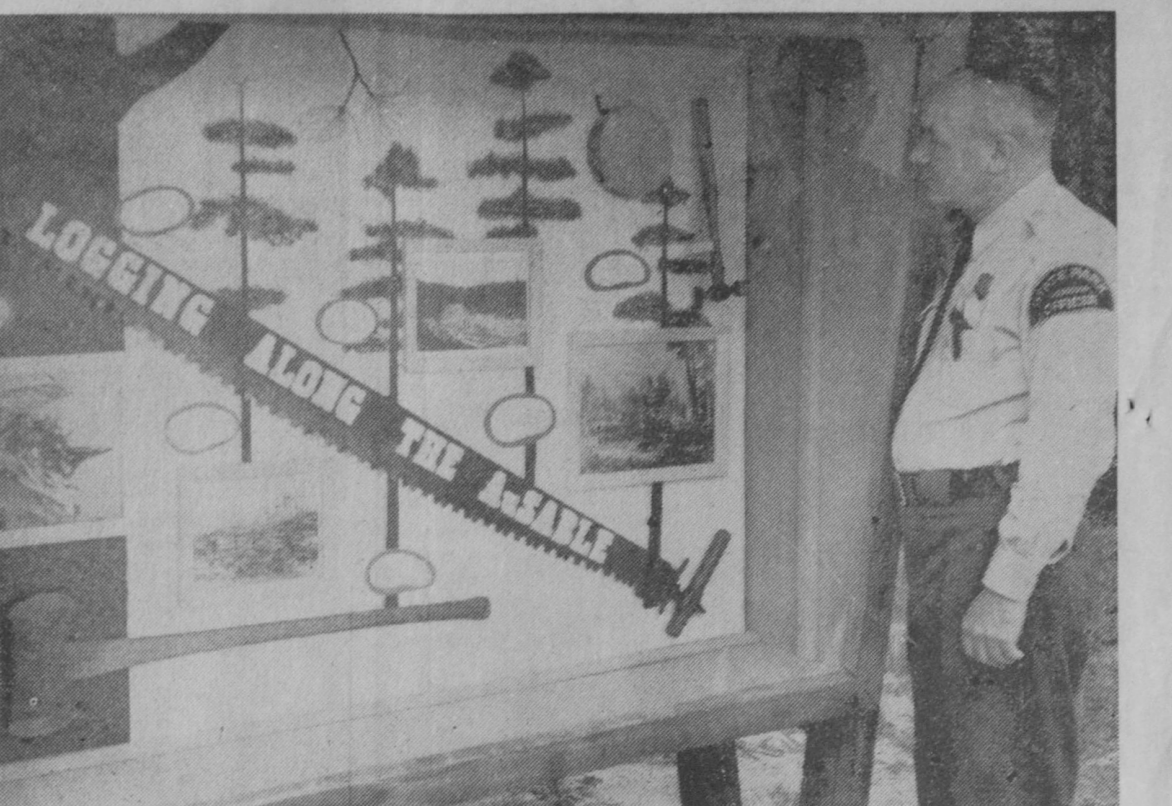

Rudolph T. Hernandez was released on a \$25 interim bond into the custody of his parents. No date has been set for the examination.

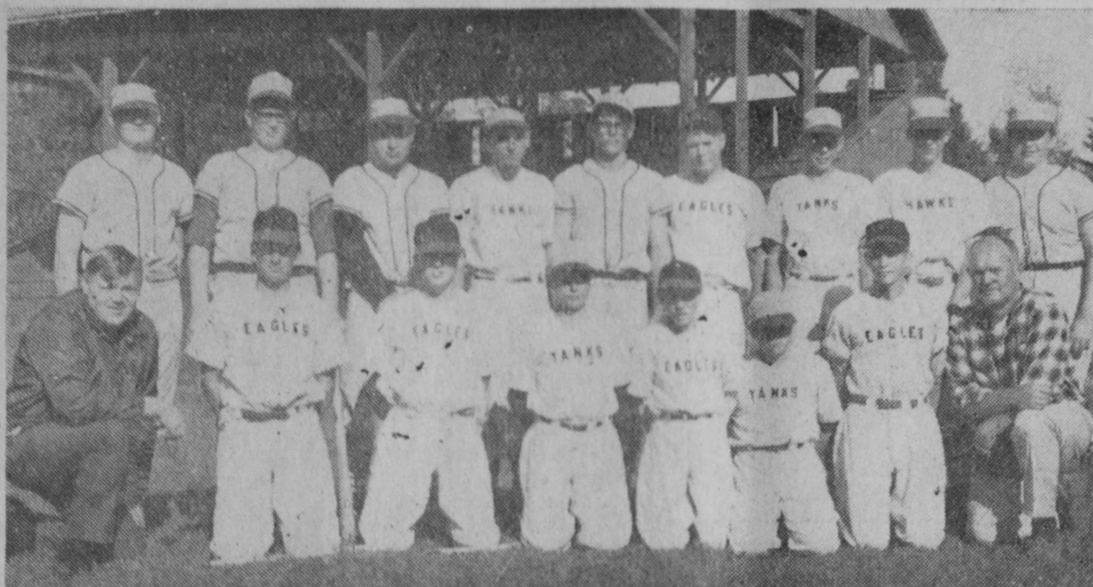
Hernandez and five juveniles, who were released to their parents after being petitioned into Isoco Probate Court, are charged with attempting to rob Joseph Kendall, National City.

## Intermediate District Reports on Special Education Program

Approximately \$50,000 was collected last year under the millage program approved by Iosco voters in 1966 for special education.

Ernest Jordan, intermediate school superintendent, reported Wednesday that one-half mill for special education had been levied during the 1966-1967 year. The remaining one-quarter mill approved by voters is to be added for financing the 1967-1968 program.

Jordan said that between payments from the intermediate school district and state aid to education, special education programs for handicapped children were being conducted in two Iosco schools at no additional cost to individual districts.

At Oscoda, four special education teachers are hired during the regular school year and two teachers for the summer program. Cost of the special education program in this district was \$47,000, of which \$39,000 went to salaries.

The district received \$32,000 in state aid for special education and was reimbursed \$15,000 by the intermediate district.

Tawas Area School has one certified type A teacher employed in its special education program. The district received \$2,800 in state aid and about \$5,000 from the intermediate district.

Besides salaries, other costs of the program paid by the intermediate district include services of a speech correctionist, diagnostician, furniture and equipment for schools.

Robert Mattson, intermediate district diagnostician, reported that he had evaluated 176 children during the past school year. Of these, 109 were at Oscoda, 52 in Tawas Area, 15 in Whittemore-Prescott and none at Hale.

Mattson spent most of his time at Oscoda, which has 55 percent of the intermediate district's enrollment and will have four type A rooms next year.

Enough children have been identified for two type A rooms at Tawas Area, but the district has been unable to hire a second type A teacher. This is the same case at Whittemore - Prescott Area where one teacher has been hired for next year and the school seeks a second.

No referrals were received from Hale Area for testing. The school has had a problem of finding a classroom and a type A teacher. It is expected that Hale and Whittemore-Prescott Area will probably serve such students on a cooperative basis.

Mattson said there appeared to be a good possibility that there will be a type C program at Tawas Area and there is a possibility that the same person can serve some students in Whittemore or Hale. The consultant has not been hired as yet but negotiations are in progress.

The intermediate district's

so far, have been unable to get someone interested.

An encouraging development during the year was expansion of the Child Guidance Clinic at Alpena. The clinic now has a psychiatrist, a clinical psychologist and two psychiatric social workers. The Iosco Intermediate District's diagnostician and school counselors have been making good use of these services to help Iosco's emotionally disturbed children.

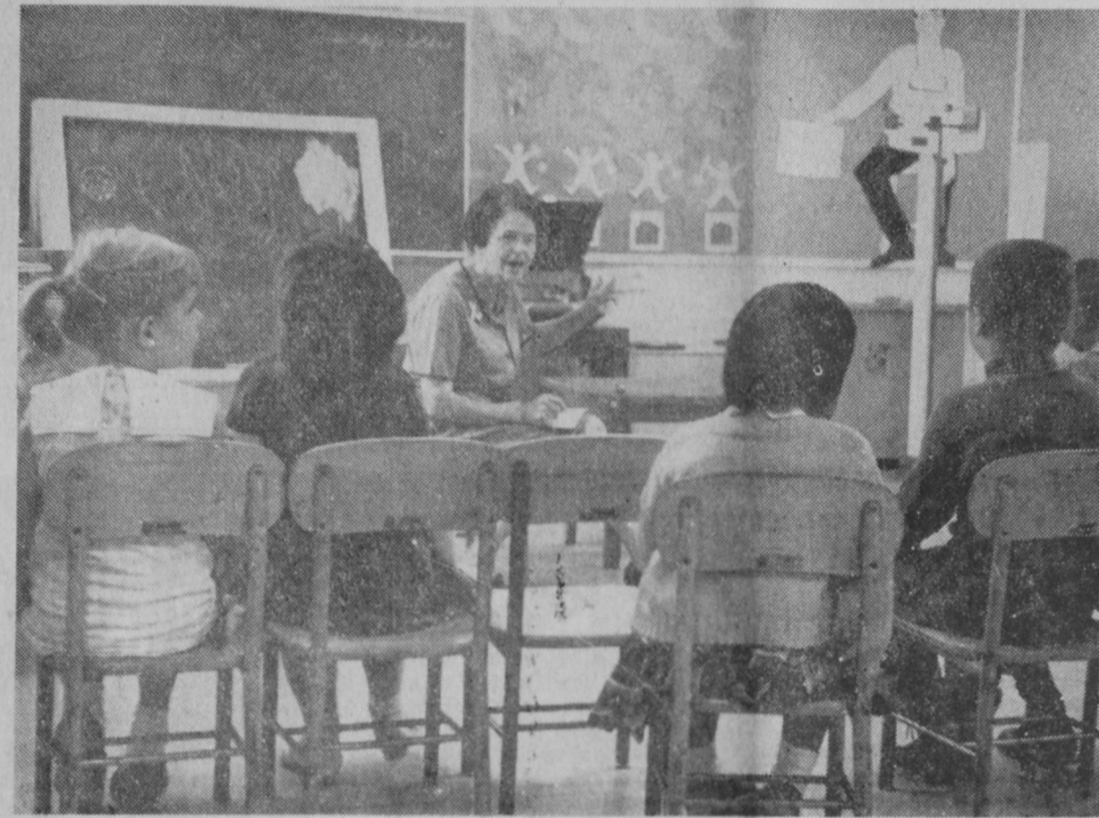

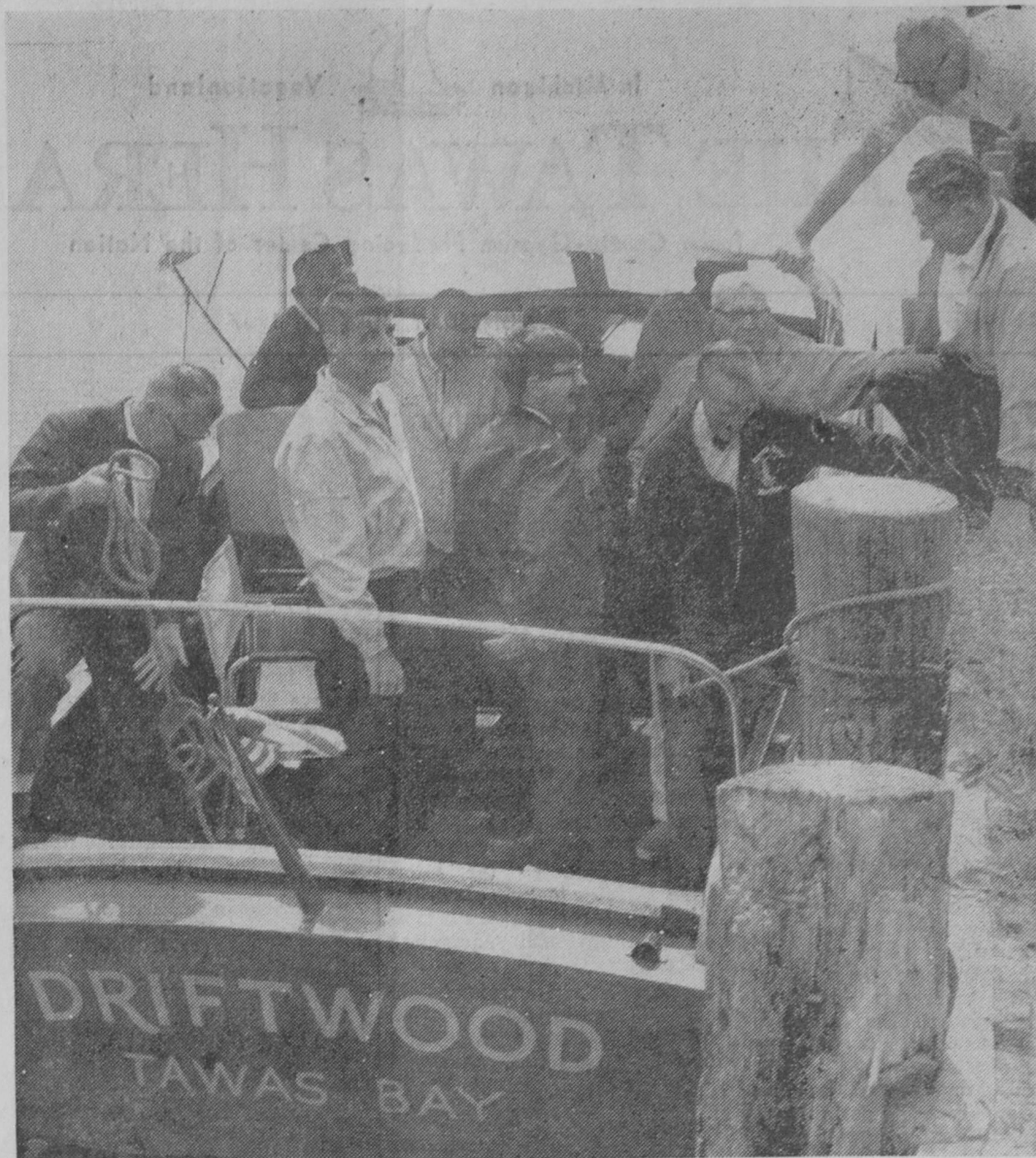

### Potato Bill

## Romney Inks Legislation for Crop Irrigation

Gov. George Romney has signed into law the bill that will allow Michigan farmers to petition for the right to use water from the Great Lakes for irrigation purposes.

The measure signed by the governor (SB 222) is known as the "Richardson-Prescott Potato Irrigation Act." Both Rep. George A. Prescott, Tawas City, and Sen. Robert L. Richardson, Saginaw, introduced an identical irrigation bill in the legislature this year. Richardson's was first to pass and Prescott then guided it through the house of representatives and was named co-sponsor of the senate bill.

Governor Romney lauded the legislation as a "tremendous boost to Michigan's potato production," and said it promised to "greatly increase jobs for Michigan farm workers."

All Michigan counties of under 400,000 population will be able to take advantage of the irrigation plan. Its initial benefit will be felt in potato production, but other areas of agriculture would also be able to benefit from the program.


The governor expressed the hope that such agricultural expansion will be undertaken so "this excellent legislation can contribute its full value to Michigan's economy."

The cost of irrigation programs will be divided between federal grants and local funds raised from long-term bond issues. Prescott said this was an example of "one way the legislature could provide a very beneficial program to benefit Michigan's citizens without putting added stress on currently tight state finances."  
Enactment of the irrigation bill, according to Prescott, is very likely to result in the construction of a 10 million dollar processing plant in the Munger area of Bay County, where a pilot irrigation project has been in operation since last fall.

### LAZY-DAZY DOUGHNUTS

Doughnuts are easily frozen and store very well. Just before serving, place on a cookie sheet in an oven preheated to 400 degrees Fahrenheit. Warm approximately five minutes... then try these variations!

### FILLED SUNDAES

Split doughnuts, then fill with ice cream and bananas. Top with a favorite sauce and nuts.

### LEMON PUDDING

Fill whole doughnuts with lemon pudding or pie filling. Top with grated lemon rind and nutmeg.

### PINEAPPLE PLEASURE

Fill whole doughnuts with crushed pineapple, then top with whipped cream. Garnish with a maraschino cherry.

### SATISFYING COFFEE

This beverage does deserve a little attention. Here are a few things to keep in mind. Depending on individual taste, use at least two tablespoons of coffee to three-fourth measuring cup of water. Always start with fresh cold water. When using a percolator, perk gently 10 minutes. And regardless of the coffeemaker, remove the grounds after brewing. There are available electrically heated trivets which insure freshness and controlled heat for serving.

### NIGHT LIGHT

Is your red climbing rose in bloom? Spotlight it at night with a pink tint (not solid red), portable garden light. This emphasizes the redness of the flowers without darkening the green leaves.

### STUFFED CABBAGE

In order to vary the stuffing for cabbage leaves, add one-fourth teaspoon ground ginger and one-eighth teaspoon ground cloves to two cups of cooked ham and one-half cooked rice. Serves six.

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# Forest Chats

**TAWAS RANGER DISTRICT**  
Huron National Forest

We celebrated a new year this month. For government agencies, a new fiscal year begins on July 1. During "Auld Lang Syne" season, it is good to pause and look back to see where we have been, to help us look ahead into the future. Let us look at some of the accomplishments on the district last year.

Timber sale contracts and permits were written for an equivalent of 16,748 cords of pulpwood. This was sold in 44 contracts and permits. Sixty contracts

and permits were administered during the year.

Over 12,500 acres of timber land were field examined and management plans and decisions made on these lands. Foresters marked for sale with paint 1,758 cords of pulpwood and cruised 14,900 cords.

Over 500 acres were reforested with red pine seedlings and 230 acres of older plantations were released from competing hardwoods. One hundred acres of red pine plantation were pruned to produce quality saw timber.

Some 6,500 wildlife shrubs were planted this spring. Most were planted using a method never be-

fore tried on a production basis. These shrubs were planted in the new pine plantings using the tree planting machine. Wildlife surveys were made which included five species of game birds and animals. Forty acres of deer habitat improvement work was accomplished by sportsmen's club cooperators.

To improve fire suppression capability, a new powerwagon pumper and a tilt-bed truck for hauling the fire line tractor were received and outfitted. Improved types of hand tools were employed for the first time. Crew and cooperators fought 22 forest fires last year, which burned a total of 147 acres. Two new fire wardens were appointed and 73 men attended the annual fire training meeting for cooperators. Seven miles of fire breaks were cleared in hazardous areas.

Maintaining six campgrounds, four picnic grounds and all attending facilities is a big job every year. Over 95,000 gallons of refuse is disposed of from these facilities each year. A new display was installed at the Lumbermen's Monument and extensive work was completed on the observation area and steep bank behind the monument.

A tour brochure was released on the multiple-use auto tour and an interpretive trail installed near Gordon Creek. Over a thousand school children and young people in youth groups worked, learned or were given tours and hikes on the district last year. Twenty talks and programs were given to local organizations. Over 160,000 people visited the Lumbermen's Monument.

Watershed structures and erosion control devices were built and maintained at Silver Valley and the Lumbermen's Monument. Water quality samples were taken at all swimming beaches on national forest lands.

Forty acres of cedar swamp, which included feeder creeks and waterfowl area, were purchased in Osceola Township to increase hunting areas and wildlife habitat base. Ten potholes for waterfowl nesting areas were blown with ammonium nitrate in Tuttle Marsh. All potential recreational development areas were re-examined and adjustments in planning for future developments to the year 2000 were made.

These are only some of the jobs that come to mind. Next year promises to be even more jammed-packed. As we strive constantly to do a better job, more work, more economically, new ideas and discoveries will be employed. There is always something new to learn about environment. This is what makes working in the living forest exciting.

## Mrs. Carl Adams Writes

# Final Installment on Recent European Trip

"Our time was fast slipping by as we headed north again around Boden See, a beautiful inland lake with hundreds of sail boats on the waters," said Mrs. Carl Adams of Hale in her final installment concerning the recent trip which she and Mr. Adams made to Europe.

"I should add that there are no cabins or buildings on the shores of the lakes in Germany. The government owns these shores and they are used by all the people for pleasure. We spent a few hours in Munich and Nuremberg, both beautiful cities with our western looks, our hustle and bustle and our same traffic problems. "Next, we stopped at the United States Army Post at Schweinfurt where we visited our nephew, Warren McMurray of Hale. I need not say that Warren was thrilled to see us, it was just a year to the day that he had landed in Germany. He said that he liked the country and that he was glad to be there rather than Vietnam, but that he would be glad to be back home.

"Warren was allowed to have the rest of the day off. Heinz took us to a restaurant that specialized in fish dinners. The fish were raised in large glass tanks behind the restaurant and the customer had the pleasure of picking out the fish that he would like cooked for dinner. Warren and Heinz had some time debating which fish was the largest and settled on the best, while Carl and I decided we did not wish to see our fish while it was still alive.

"After a delightful evening with Warren and a very elaborate trout dinner, Heinz and Carl drove Warren back to his post.

Warren assured us that he would be home in time for Christmas and we are sure he will. We tried to locate another Isoco County boy, Dennis Cross, but he did not seem to be at the base. "Next day we were up and going early, traveling through the 'Saginaw Valley' of Germany. Many women were hoeing in the beet fields. There were tractor cultivators in the potato fields, hay choppers in other fields and, along side of these modern machines, were little cultivators drawn by a milk cow. Heinz explained that some families had just a small plot of land, not enough to support machinery or horses, therefore, they substituted 'old bossey'.

"Toward evening, we saw many herds of cows being milked with a portable milker in the pasture lot. About every available foot of land is utilized—the front lawn is a garden, both vegetables and flowers. There are flowers blooming everywhere and each village has at least one flower shop. It is a proper gesture for one to take either flowers or a plant to whom-ever he visits. Heinz brought a beautiful bouquet of roses to me when he met us at the airport in Koln. As we were about to look up some of Carl's relatives, Heinz helped me find the proper plant to present to them.

"Carl was born in Essen, Germany, 61 years ago; he came to this country with his mother when he was nine years old and this was his first trip back. We first went to the home of a cousin in Hanover. He took us to Carl's uncle in Luther, a little village near Hanover. Uncle Conrad was de-

lighted and he recalled the day his sister and Carl left for America and how he had said that he would never see them again. And now, here was his nephew at last. He is 84 years old now, but if his health permits he may come to America in a couple of years with his son. Another uncle was contacted and before the day was over, 10 relatives sat down to a family dinner and tried to relive 50 odd years of separation.

"We spent two nights with them, then we had to get back to Dusseldorf at it was now Sunday and our flight was scheduled to leave at 8:00 a. m. the next day. We drove by Namen to say goodbye to Heinz's parents, but we had to stay for dinner with them as an uncle had traveled some distance by foot to meet the people Heinz had lived with in America and to give us a very nice book about Germany. Heinz's parents, too, gave us a book written both in German and in English with fine pictures of their section of Germany.

"All too soon we had spoken our farewells and were headed for Heinz's home, when I remembered that I must look up a brother of Ernest Ortlieb. Heinz knew just the route to take so that it would be on our way back. Before we knew it, we were visiting with Henry Ortlieb. He was very surprised to see us and very anxious to hear all about his brother and family. We only planned to stop a minute, but before we knew it the coffee pot was on and a delicious shortcake centered the table. It seemed one never got away from a place in Germany without eating. This was our last stop. We were now at Dusseldorf—the Rhine was again before us and as we crossed the bridge I took my last long look at this marvelous river. Ellen and Jon were waving to us from their apartment window when we drove up and everything was in order for us to pack, shower, eat and retire for our last night in this enchanting land.

"The next morning, Heinz, El-

len and Jon drove us to the airport and, as we waited for our plane, Heinz asked for my impression of his country. I answered something like this, that Germany is a beautiful country with everything that our country has, only more compact; that they have a culture, due to the age of their civilization, that we do not or cannot have; that I saw no signs of poverty—everything reflected wealth and prosperity and that they had more and larger banks than those in the United States.

"Kiddingly, I told him that I thought the lend lease plan should revert this way. He looked very serious and remarked that I had the wrong impression and that he would have to write and straighten me out—and I am sure that he will.

"Our flight was announced and, before we knew it, we were 30,000 feet above the earth, in God's country, with nothing but wonderment and pleasant memories and the hope that some day we might return."

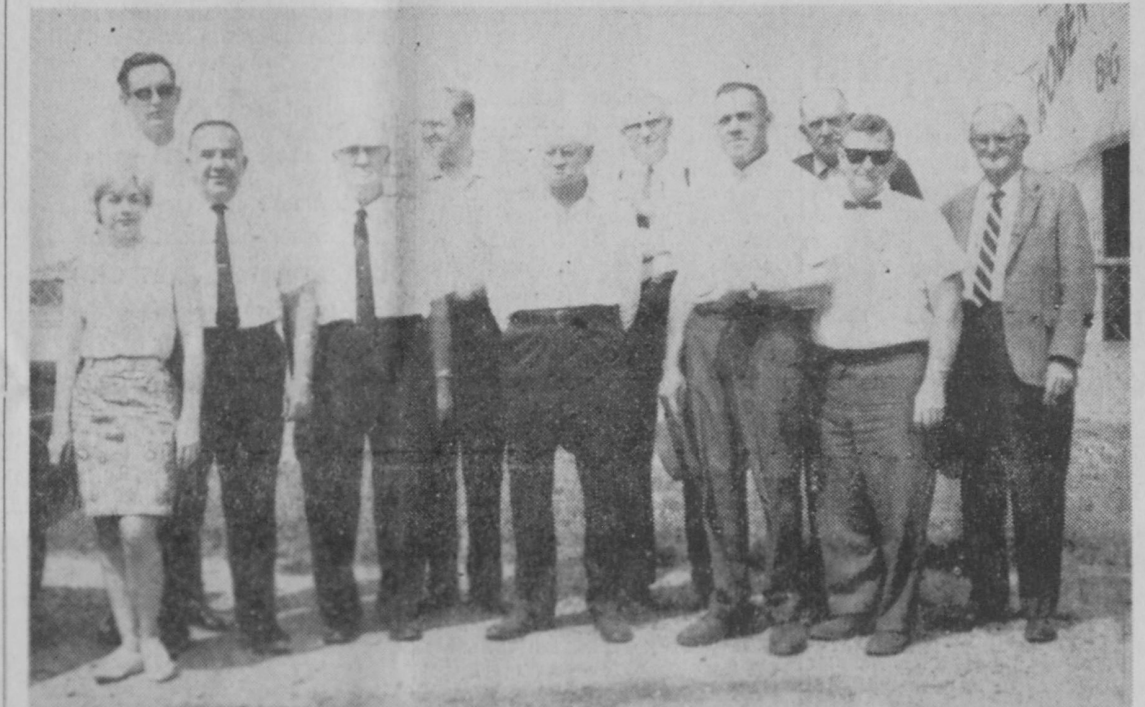
