## Tawas Host Army Recruiters This Week in 3-Day Seminar

Highlight of a three-day seminar for United States Army recruiters, to be held in the Tawas area July 6, 7 and 8, will be an address by United States Rep. L. Mendall Rivers, congressman from South Carolina and chairman of the house armed services committee. Rivers is to be featured speaker at a banquet Friday night at the Holland Hotel.

The sales seminar, designed to motivate and educate recruiters

in new methods of sales and counseling techniques, will include four workshops on sales training and class lectures by advertising and public information executives from army recruiting in Washington, D. C.

Guests who have accepted invitations to attend the seminar include: Col. Arthur A. Holmes, director of selective service in Michigan; Col. Michael Barszcz, deputy commander of the fifth district, Chicago, Illinois; Lt. Col. John Heaver, executive officer of fifth district, and Wesley Williams, army recruiting public information officer, Washington, D. C.

By conducting classes of this workshop type, recruiters will be better prepared to talk to future enlistees in the army. A workshop course will include discussion of school dropouts and the value of their staying in school.

## Mayor Cites Cemetery Law Discrepancies

Straightening out financial records of the city's cemetery again proved to be the major topic at Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council.

Mayor Russell A. Rollin Sr., former chairman of the cemetery board, said he disagreed with the recent audit of the cemetery books and said that the city had not been following the state statute governing cemetery accounts.

Rollin cited a law which requires that all money raised from the sale of cemetery lots be paid to the city treasurer and deposited in a cemetery fund. This money cannot be used for any other than cemetery purposes.

In the past, receipts have been placed in the city's general fund. Disbursements for work at the cemetery have always been higher than receipts from cemetery lots.

Rollin also cited the fact that money cannot be transferred out of the cemetery's perpetual care fund, which is received in the sale of lots. The general fund presently owes the perpetual care fund slightly over \$1,000. Once this fund reaches the proper level, interest received would help to defray cost of maintenance.

The mayor said he was taking the problem to the auditor and city attorney for action.

In other business, Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz reported that a traffic control light in front of the city hall would cost between \$1,800 and \$2,600. Fire trucks are hampered by traffic when entering US-23 and it was felt that a two-way stop light would be a safety factor, because of the cost of such a unit, no action was taken.

Tawas City councilmen were apologetic Monday night after failing to recognize a "stranger" at the meeting. Mayor Elden Smith of DeWitt, here on a vacation, was the toast of the town six weeks ago during Michigan Week's mayor exchange day. A person recognized the visitor, wearing summer sport fogs, and he was asked if he had something to bring before the council. Hasty amends were made and he joined the council table.

### Citizens Help to Eliminate Crime—

## Check-Mate Group Formed by Sheriff

Check-Mate—Citizens Help to Eliminate Crime—came into being in Iosco County last week following preliminary organization by the Iosco Sheriff's Department.

This action followed authorization of the county board of supervisors a month ago and full support of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

Success of Check-Mate is based entirely on the fact that any citizen who participates in the program can alert police officers to a crime or belief that a crime is about to be committed without fear of the person making the complaint being implicated.

Under ordinary circumstances when police officials receive a complaint on a crime, the person complaining is required to give his name and usually is asked to sign a complaint before action may be taken. This identification requirement is eliminated under Check-Mate.

In cities where Check-Mate has been in operation for some time, many crimes are stopped while in

progress or are averted. Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell said Monday that supplies of Check-Mate membership cards had been distributed to all law enforcement officers of the county. Anyone desiring membership in this important organization should contact the sheriff's department for full particulars.

## Second Body Found 15 Days After Tragedy

Body of Larry Mechere, 18, who disappeared with a companion June 17 while wading along Tawas Point, was discovered Saturday morning along the shore of Saginaw Bay in Alabaster Township.

Louis Kleekamp of Alabaster notified authorities that he had found the body on the beach in front of his cabin. State police, Iosco Sheriff's Department officers and Coroner E. John Moffatt investigated.

Mechere and a companion, Gerald Brenner, both of Saginaw County, had accompanied a St. Charles church group for a vacation at Tawas Point State Park. The group went swimming at 7:30 a. m. June 17 and when five of the group returned to shore for breakfast, Brenner and Mechere were seen running in shoal water on the Tawas Bay side of Tawas Point.

The boys disappeared into a heavy fog blanketing the area. Shoal water around the point extends out to a wading distance of more than one-half mile and drops off sharply.

Brenner's body was recovered June 23 by local law enforcement officers and a group of four volunteers from the Saginaw County Sheriff's Department.

## Nine Persons Hurt Early Monday in Crash Near Hale

Nine persons received injuries in a two-car crash early Monday morning on M-65 in Plainfield Township, about one-quarter mile north of the four-corner intersection at Hale.

A car driven by Robert Schleeck, 18, struck a car driven by George Putze, 31, Port Huron, from behind. Both vehicles were traveling north.

Besides the two drivers, injured and rushed to Tawas Hospital were Denny Barnes, 17, Curtisville; Laurence Straub, 17, Maybee; and Richard Lengerfelt, 20, Inkster, all in the Schleeck car; Elden Gubanche, Daniel Hewitt, Robert Putze and James R. Hewitt, all of Port Huron and in Putze's car.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said that details of the crash were sketchy. Ages of the occupants of the Putze car were unavailable.

## Swim Classes Start July 10

## 'Object' Hit Car; Glass Shatters

Iosco Sheriff's Department investigated a complaint Sunday in which an object thrown from one car, presumably a firecracker, made a large hole in the windshield of a car driven by Francis Skiver, 20, Alpena.

Officers said that Skiver was headed north on US-23 in Baldwin Township when an object thrown from a passing car exploded against the windshield. His car traveled about 100 yards before stopping. Three passengers and the driver were not injured.

## Investigate B&E of Grant Cabin

State police investigated a breaking and entering Sunday night at a cabin owned by Louis H. Braddock in Grant Township. A car containing four teen-agers had been spotted in the driveway by a Flint man. They had acted suspiciously and police were notified. Nothing was stolen from the cabin.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Krueger of Wilber Township and is a piano student of Mrs. Alden Phelps.

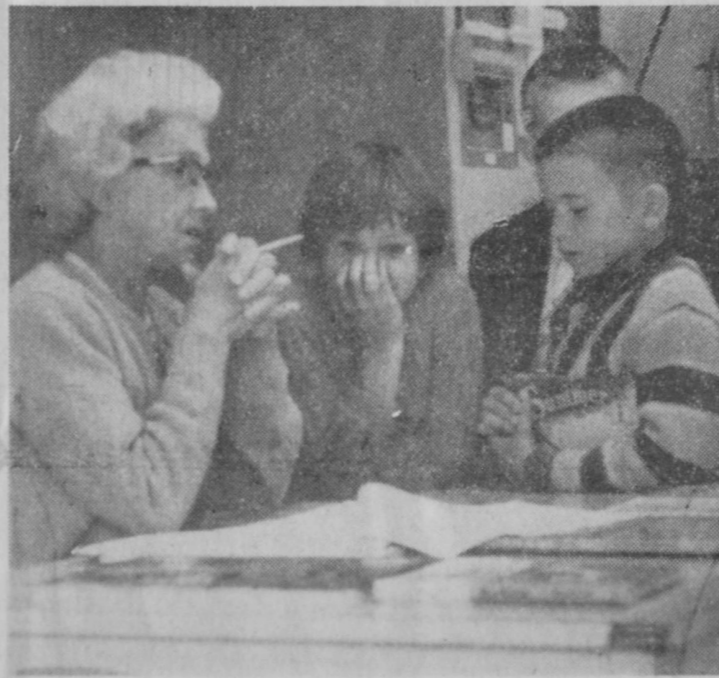
Presentation of the award was made Saturday at the conclusion of the camp by Dr. Eugene Grove, music department director at Central Michigan.

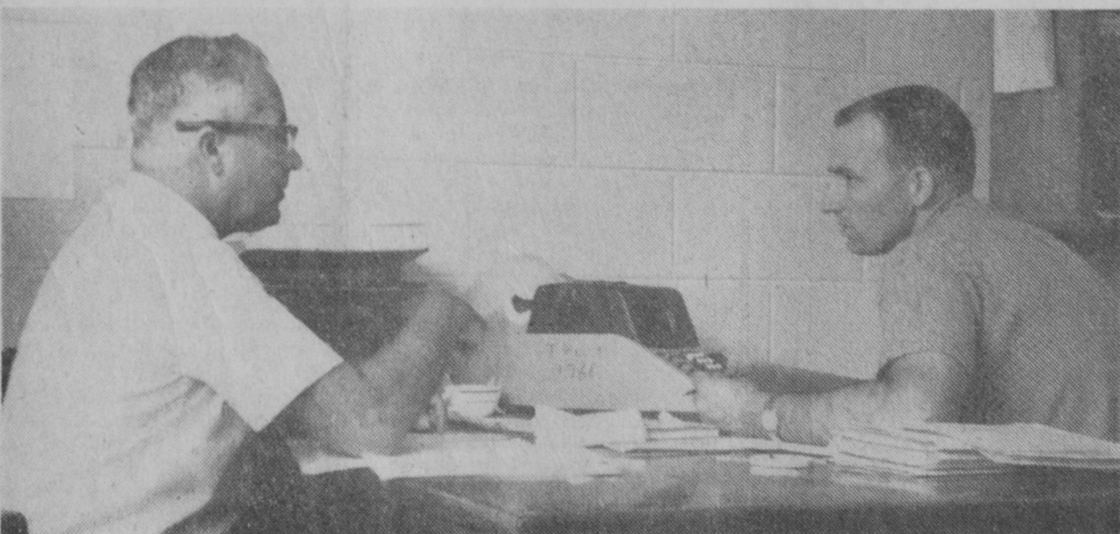
Typical classroom showing small number of students, which allows for individual instruction by teacher.

### Expanded This Year—

## 7-Week Program Helps TA Students

"The basic emphasis in this seven-week program is to concentrate on improving the ability of children in reading and arithmetic and we also hope that the child's attitude toward school improves."

Said Superintendent John Alexander, federal projects coordinator for Tawas Area School and director of the summer school program.

This marks the second straight year that Tawas Area School has participated in a program designed to help children, who have been recommended by teachers on the basis of standard achievement tests and performance during the regular school year.

Some 161 children in grades one through eight are enrolled in the program, differing from last year which started at the third grade level.

"Half of what we try to do is improve the child's attitude toward school and to nip in the bud, before he reaches high school age, any 'don't care' attitude about himself or toward school," said Robert Blood, guidance counselor for the program.

During the first two weeks of summer school, Blood has had responsibility of a comprehensive testing program for each child. These diagnostic tests are designed to determine areas in which children are having learning problems during the regular school year, isolation of weaknesses and then to concentrate a course of study in those areas.

No grades are given during the seven-week course—one cannot pass or flunk summer school—therefore, a child is not subjected to report card pressure. As a consequence, there are results noted which are not obtainable in a large classroom.

The normal classroom day consists of four 40-minute periods. Each child is enrolled in remedial reading, remedial arithmetic, has supervised library and physical education. Mr. Blood is available to all with counseling problems.

Through testing, students are first separated into different levels of learning ability. Classes number approximately eight students, which gives a great amount of time for individual instruction by the teacher.

As one teacher put it, "My classes during the regular school year number about 48 students. How much individual instruction can one give to those 48 students in a 45-minute class period?"

Alexander and his staff of teachers have found that the majority of those children attending summer school are very interested in the program and want to learn. "Actually, if a child does not want to come, it is a waste of time for him," said the director.

Testing has also shown that there are four or five students enrolled in the program who are "dragging their heels" during the regular school year. Results of achievement tests have shown that those particular children are not slow learners but may be just plain lazy.

"In those few cases, it is a matter of building a fire under them and that, again, emphasizes the need for improving a child's attitude toward school and himself," said Alexander. "At least, we are going to let him know about it."

The school sent home 220 invitations for participation in summer school, of which 172 were returned. Alexander said that this was a good indication that parents are interested in the program. Five or six children participating last year were not invited during 1967 because of behavior problems.

One of the rewarding side effects for the school has been that teachers gain additional knowledge and experience in working with such children and are able to experiment with different teaching techniques.

Members of the staff include Mrs. Carol Harwood, Mrs. Virginia Coyle, Mrs. Ellen McGuire and Robert H. Crawford, reading; Mrs. Lucille Michaels, Mrs. Isabelle Leslie, Miss Mabel Myles and James Garlow, mathematics; Mrs. Beryl Hoy and Miss Burnetta Miller have charge of the library and Roger Spencer handles physical education.

Another aspect of the summer program is a special educational room in which instruction is being given to 11 children by Mrs. Marian Kramer. Some of these children had attended classes conducted at First Baptist Church, Tawas City, during the regular school year.

### Family Living Education

Charcoal Broiling Fish  
The charcoal grill is ready to be used again as soon as possible, but you may be looking for a new idea. Because fish cooks so quickly, they are a natural for this popular method of cooking.

Use any pan-dressed fish, fillets or fish steaks. If frozen, the fish should be thawed.  
You probably will want to use a well-greased, long-handled, hinged wire grill because fish flakes so easily. Cook them about four inches from hot coals for 10 to 20 minutes, depending on the thickness of the fish.

Since charcoal broiling is a dry heat cooking method, thicker cuts of fish are preferable as they tend to dry out less during cooking than the thin pieces of fish. Also, to insure serving a juicy fish with a good flavor, use a sauce that contains some fat and baste the fish generously before and during the cooking.

A tasty sauce could be made by cooking one-quarter cup chopped onion and two tablespoons green pepper in two tablespoons melted fat. Finely chopped garlic could be added to this mixture. Add one can tomato sauce, two tablespoons lemon juice, one tablespoon each

Worcestershire sauce and sugar, two teaspoons salt and one-quarter teaspoon pepper. Simmer five minutes.

Cloudy Jelly  
Some of us are surprised when we learn that jelly is often cloudy because of some of the reasons given. Researchers tell us that jelly can be cloudy for one or more of the following reasons: Pouring jelly mixture into glasses too slowly; allowing jelly mixture to stand before it is poured, or possibly the juice was not properly strained and so contained pulp; jelly set too fast—usually the result of using fruit that is too green.

Quicker Baked Beans  
Have you often planned to make baked beans but completely forgotten to soak the beans the night before? Next time, do not change the menu. Instead, use the short cut method. For each cup of dry navy beans, bring three cups of water to a boil, pour in the beans and boil for two minutes. Cover tightly, remove from the heat and let stand one hour. Then continue cooking as you would have with the long overnight soaking.

Or perhaps you would like to try the packaged dry beans on the market that are precooked and take less time for cooking.  
Perhaps you prefer the canned beans and there are many varieties. In fact, 90 percent of Michigan's navy bean crop ends up in cans.

# Forest Chats

**HURON NATIONAL FOREST**

If the maze of forest roads and trails on the Tawas District could be untangled and laid end to end, their sum would equal a road over 300 miles long. That is a lot of road any way you look at it and just a glance at a forest map really shows what a complex web of woods roads we have.

Along with summer comes the tourist traffic and it seems that driving woods trails is an "in" thing to do these days. We are glad to see this become popular

because this is the best way to get a good look at our working forest. The unfortunate thing is that the carefree state of mind when on vacation and the inherent danger of woods driving are creating some mighty hazardous driving conditions.

Trail driving requires some skills and special concentration that most freeway trained drivers have not had the opportunity to practice. This lack of experience and a desire to see everything, plus the usual I'm-alone-in-the-wilderness feeling, turn the two-track road into a nightmare of blind intersections and hilltops.

Loose sand, shoulders, narrow

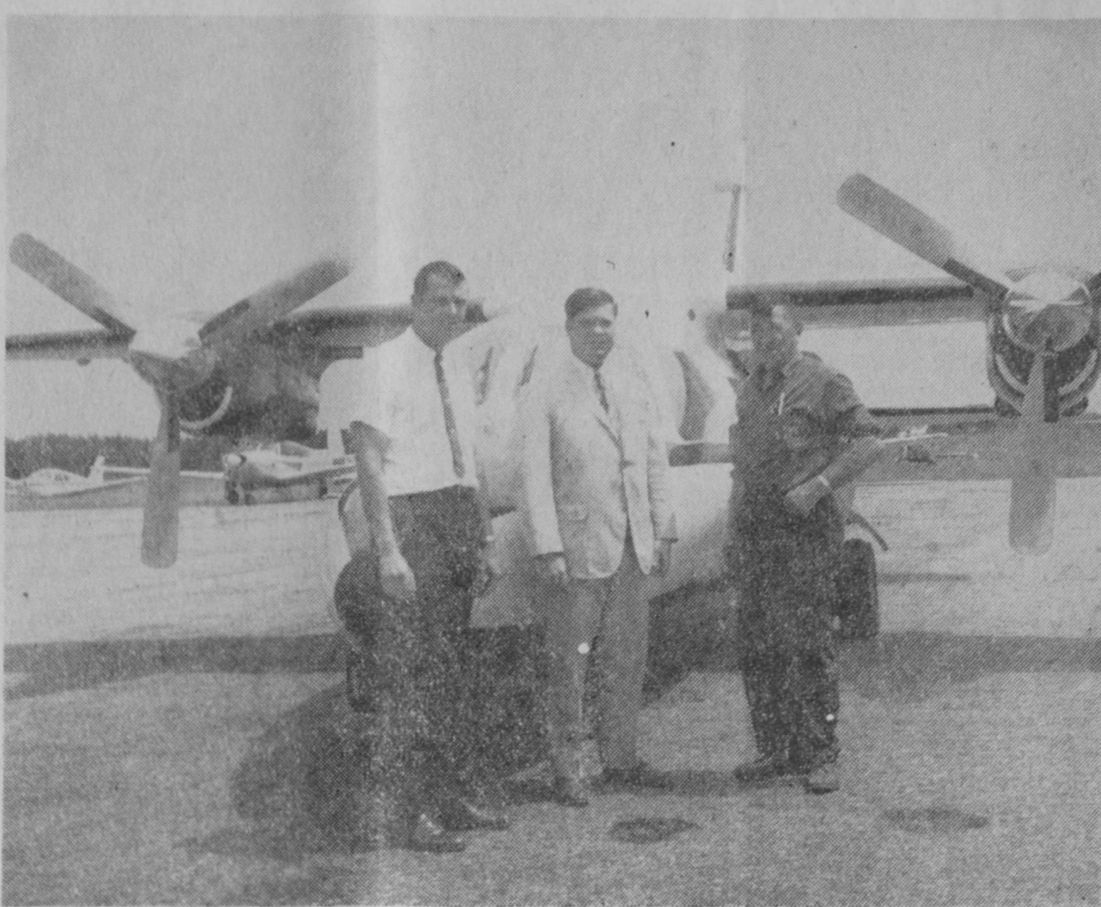
lanes, poor visibility and lots of trees to hit are facts of life out there. These conditions are not going to change easily or quickly. Driving habits are more flexible—so adopting a defensive driving attitude is the only answer to a safer motor jaunt through the forest.

Forest service trucks constantly travel these roads and it is a rare week when at least one driver does not report a near miss at some woods intersection. These trails are not made for rapid transit, but some people refuse to accept this fact. This is why we stress defensive driving to our employees—be aware of the other guy.

It is easy to be misled into thinking you are the only human in the woods, especially in Jack pine country. Two wilderness-wanderers surprising each other at one of these intersections or at the brink of a hill could end up in tragedy.

Illustrating that this does happen, three weeks ago on the Harrisville District, a forest service truck and a fisherman met on the brink of a hill on a two-track road. Both vehicles were demolished. Seat belts saved the forest service employees from serious injuries.

The forest service and you as forest residents have the responsibility of setting the proper example for safe woods road driving. It is worth the effort. Even if your defensive driving example is ignored by some, it will still help you avoid that serious accident.

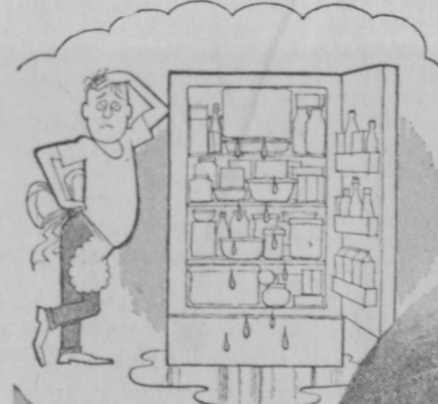

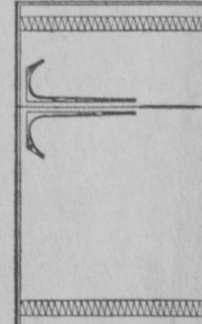

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# Proceedings of Iosco Board of Supervisors

JUNE SESSION  
June 21, 1967

Pursuant to May adjournment, the Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order at 9:30 a. m. by Chairman Smith, who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Belson, Campbell, Chrvia, Everett, Gerard, Hester, Higgins, Hosbach, Jocks, Kasischke, Little, Lixey, McElheron, Mead, Mielock, Smith, Stephan, Weible. Absent: Blust.

Communications were read and referred to the proper committee by the chairman.

Marvin Davenport, county agricultural agent, addressed the board to request a meeting with the cooperative extension committee, and at the chairman's request, reported briefly on a visit to a Big Rapids park in which he and four Iosco County supervisors participated to study park development. A brief discussion followed on the improvement and development of Old Orchard Park.

Mr. Henry Oates addressed the board, advising that the tax statements are being prepared for printing. He stated that they will be uniform for all units, and it may be possible to have the tax

rates printed on them. He also advised that he has received two (2) bids for tax roll paper from Doubleday and the Iosco County News, the bids being \$46.50 per thousand plus freight from Doubleday and \$46.50 delivered from the Iosco County News.

With reference to enforcement of the Plat Act, Mr. Oates advised that he has met with the prosecutor and the judiciary committee and they have drafted a suggested resolution regarding same.

Mr. Oates also reported regarding the Michigan tax law that states that all contiguous parcels within one section or subdivision owned by one person shall be assessed as one parcel unless the owner demands in writing, a separate assessment.

Mr. Oates further stated that he has written a series of three articles for the news media concerning the reappraisal of property by Gem Survey, tax equalization, etc.

Mr. Mielock reported for the tax allocation study committee on their meeting with the various school administrators on June 6. He advised that the meeting was very successful and that all concerned had resolved their differences to a great degree.

Treasurer Nelkie addressed the board concerning the county finances and requested a meeting with the finance committee and the chairman of the board to discuss the finances.

Committees were ordered to their respective duties, balance of the board to be at ease subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 11:55 a. m., Mr. Hosbach read the following resolution from the judiciary committee and moved its adoption:

Honorable Board of Supervisors: Your judiciary committee recommends that the board of supervisors direct the equalization director and the prosecuting attorney to assist and cooperate with all supervisors and assessors of the county in order to properly enforce the Plat Act of the State of Michigan. Copy sent to all supervisors.

Upon motion by Campbell, supported by Lixey, the board recessed until 1:30 p. m.

**AFTERNOON SESSION**  
Upon call to order at 1:30 P. M., roll call was ordered by the chairman. The same supervisors were present as at the morning session.

Chairman Smith appointed the following supervisors as a temporary committee to attend a meeting at Delta College on June 28, sponsored by the Michigan Office of Economic Expansion and concerning participation in a multi-county economic development district: Higgins, Belson, McElheron, Mielock and Chrvia.

Mr. Campbell read the following resolution from the finance committee and moved its adoption:

Honorable Board of Supervisors: We, the finance committee, recommend the expenditure of \$63,84 plus social security for the employment of one student under the Michigan State University work study program.

Mr. Everett reported briefly on the district four supervisors meeting of May 25 regarding the multi-county development plan and District Health No. 2 redistricting.

There being no support to Mr. Campbell's motion for adoption, it was declared dead by the chairman. The chairman then referred the question to the rules-of-order committee for further study.

Mr. Hosbach read the following resolution from the judiciary committee and moved its adoption:

Honorable Board of Supervisors: We, the judiciary committee, recommend issuing a proclamation, to be published in all local papers in Iosco County as recommended by Governor Romney proclaiming the ringing of the bells on the 4th of July. Copy of proclamation attached.

Mr. Hosbach of the judiciary committee presented the following proposed county ordinance and moved that it be adopted by the board:

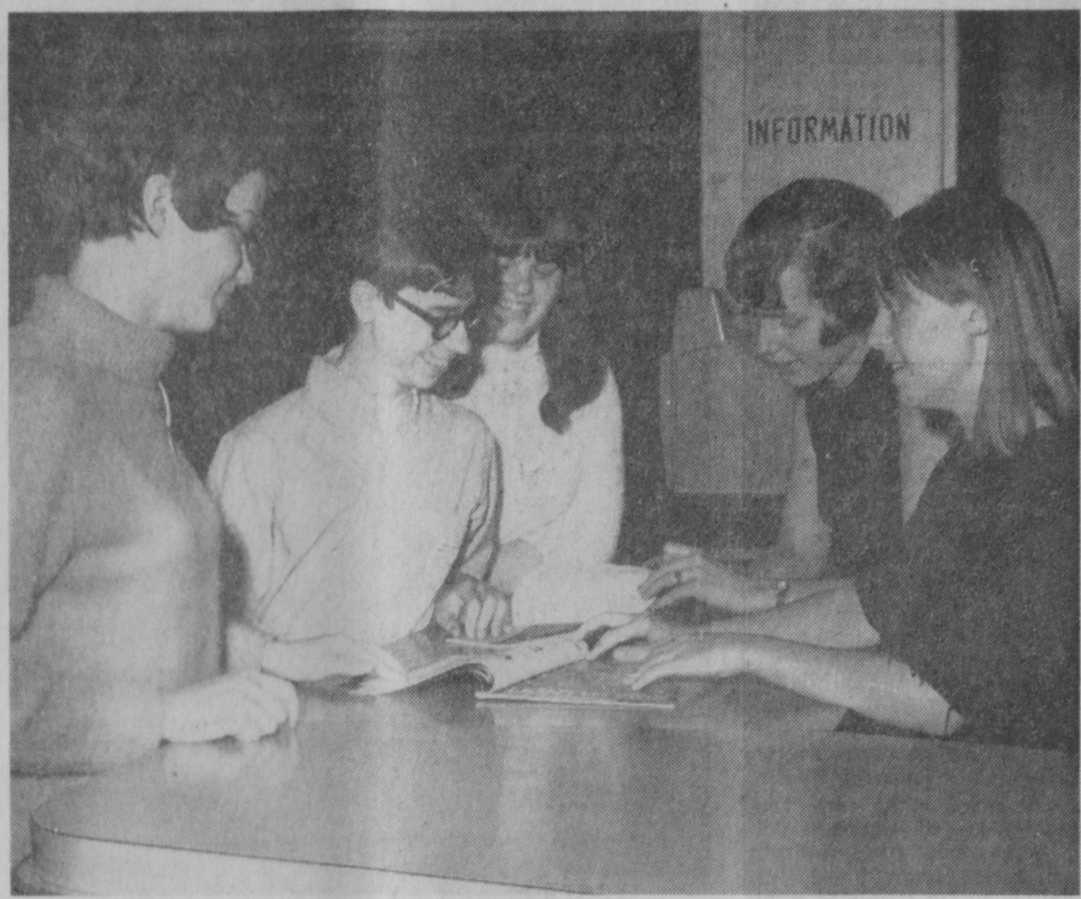

Mr. and Mrs. Carl Adams of Hale, who returned recently from a three-week tour of Germany, were guests of Heinz Siekmann and family of Dusseldorf. Mr. Siekmann is known by many in this area as he was the first exchange student to visit Isosco County. He lived in the Adams home for one year, 15 years ago and attended Hale Area School. Siekmann sends regards to all his friends, and if all goes well, he, his wife and son will be back in 1968.

The Adams traveled to Germany by plane, their first air travel and enjoyed it very much. The Siekmanns met them at their airport in Köln. "I must say for our first meeting, after 15 minutes with Heinz and our first visit with his wife, Ellen, and their seven-year-old son, Jan, every minute was an enjoyable one. They went all out to show us their country," said Mrs. Adams.

After a short rest, Mrs. Siekmann and Jan took them by automobile to Berlin. This trip, over 100 miles through Russian-controlled Germany into Berlin, was the only depressing experience of their entire vacation.

"It is hard to describe the harassment that one must endure to visit Berlin," said Mrs. Adams. "It is certainly a shame that this situation could not have been corrected when the Allies had the opportunity to have done just that. We were checked at four different points and at each made to wait, not only our turn, but until the guards saw fit to move us to the next check point.

"No doubt, they are in hope that the Western German people will break their ties with Berlin completely, but this I am sure will never happen. There were papers to fill out, the car was checked, the luggage and even the money counted to the penny that one had on his person. At the last stop, each person was charged 10 marks and allowed to go on down the corridor which was a well-guarded highway with lookout stations along every city block and high barbed wire fences on both sides—all the way into Berlin," Mrs. Adams stated.

While in Berlin, Mr. and Mrs. Adams were guests of Ellen's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Platsch. Again, they experienced the extreme friendliness of these people. They, too, did many things to make their two-day stay in Berlin very rewarding. Mr. Platsch took them for a drive that night to show the city by night with the many lighted fountains and the beautiful stores. He then arranged for a tour of the city for the next morning. Ellen accompanied them on the tour as she, too, had not been at some of the spots of interest in years. She explained the new construction and how the city was flattened with only one church steeple left standing after World War II.

The bus trip was along the "wall" for miles and at many points the bus would stop and passengers would climb lookout towers and look over into the eastern part of Berlin.

"There was very little activity over the wall and one could sense a sadness on the peoples' faces, the few that could be seen. Crosses have been erected by West Berliners at places where someone has lost his life while trying to escape to the West. There are freshly cut flowers kept at the foot of these crosses at all times.

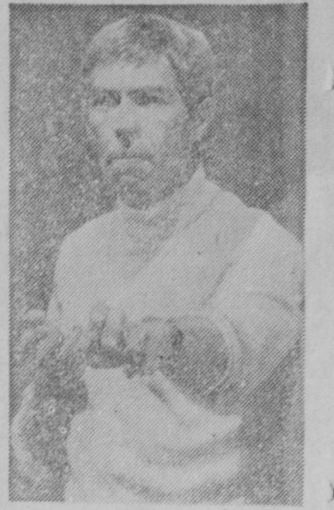
