

East Tawas Receives \$120,000 Federal Aid for New Sewer System

Confirmation of a \$120,000 grant for East Tawas' primary sewage treatment plant, outfall sewers and interceptor sewers was received Monday, according to two communications from Washington, D. C.

The grant is to come from the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration, it was reported by Cong. Elford Cederberg and United States Sen. Philip Hart.

This ends considerable speculation in recent months as to availability of a grant to East Tawas. Only last week, there was still some doubt here as to the final outcome but approval Monday in Washington settled the matter.

When its application for a low-interest-rate federal loan failed to

receive approval, East Tawas Council decided earlier in January to obtain its own finances through private sources.

Total estimated cost of the project when East Tawas voters approved a \$300,000 general obligation bond issue was \$750,000. Julius Hanslovsky, Lansing, the city's financial consultant, told the city in January that the estimated cost had now advanced to \$800,000 because of advancing costs of labor and material.

The city has already received a federal grant of \$31,000 to aid in engineering for the project. This work has been completed by Spicer Engineering Company, Saginaw, and has received approval from state and federal agencies.

According to information received Monday, the grant from the water pollution control administration was based on an eligible total cost of \$470,000 for the project.

Court Returns Parole Violator to State Prison

Harry Choep, 25, arrested here January 3 on two misdemeanors, has been returned to Southern Michigan Prison, Jackson, as a parole violator.

State police officers arrested Choep after his car was found stuck in a ditch on a dead-end road. He had improper plates on his auto and officers noted an un-cased and loaded 22 caliber rifle on the back seat of the car.

Arrested and lodged at the county jail, officers searched the car later and found two revolvers and a set of burglary tools in the trunk. A claim of illegal search of his automobile was made by Choep and an attorney was appointed to represent him in court.

On Monday, Judge Allan C. Miller upheld the arresting officers and the prosecution, citing a clause in the Michigan Constitution allowing such search of an automobile. The provision is presently being tested before the United States Supreme Court.

Charges of possession of burglary tools and concealed weapons were withdrawn on a nolle prosequi motion filed by Pros. Atty. J. Richard Ernst and Choep was returned to prison as a parole violator.

Fire flattened the Buckhorn Inn, M-55 and Plank Road, Tawas City, at 1:00 a. m. today (Wednesday). Owners closed for the night at 12:30 a. m. and a passing motorist saw flames shooting out of the roof about one-half hour later. Tawas City Fire Department was assisted by East Tawas firemen in battling the blaze. The frame building, with later additions, was constructed about 35 years ago.

Centennial, Too—New Fire Dept. Being Talked for Grant Twp.

Interest in promoting a fire department for Grant Township comes to a head next Monday night when those spearheading the drive will present a proposal to members of the township board.

Ronald Ponke, who has unofficially headed up a campaign to create a department, said Tuesday that prospective members were to meet Thursday of this week to develop prices on proposed fire fighting equipment and a fire hall.

This information is to be turned over to the township board for action.

Ponke said he believed the total cost would be about \$19,000 or \$20,000. About 20 men are interested in forming a department and many have stated they would donate labor to construct a fire hall.

If approved by the township board, the cost of purchasing equipment would be financed by asking voters to approve millage or possibly a general obligation bond issue.

Ponke said that voters were asked at the November general election if they believed the township should furnish its own fire protection. There were 155 persons in favor of the proposition and 80 against the measure. Ponke said that response of voters was better than anticipated.

Fire fighting service is presently furnished under contract with Plainfield Township Fire Department.

In addition to formation of a fire department, those interested are now making plans to hold a centennial program this summer in observance of the founding of Grant Township in 1867.

Ponke said that the Sand Lake area would probably be the hub for the program and preliminary plans are now being discussed. A meeting is to be held March 20 for further development of plans.

Those taking an active part in formation of the fire department include, along with Ponke, Dale Strauer, Ray Lenczewski, Henry Gage, Harvey Kendall, Victor Kendall, Larry Kendall, Hazen Warner, Edward Brown, Robert Kendall, Lewis Kendall, Allen Emory, George Kendall, Franklin Emory, Donald Warner and Carl Smith.

Tawas School Eyes Curriculum Changes—

Bigger Slice of Taxes Sought

A possible budget increase for 1967-1968 was revealed by action of Tawas Area Board of Education at its meeting Monday night.

The board went on record as directing Supt. Reynold Mick to incorporate proposed curriculum changes in its program for next year. As a result, the budget to be submitted to the county allocation board in April would be raised by approximately \$71,977.

Last spring, Tawas Area School presented a budget of \$287,700 to the allocation board and received \$245,900 under a tax split of nine mills granted to all county schools.

Board members and the superintendent expressed concern Monday night that it was very difficult to develop a budget for the following year when the state legislature had not as yet adopted a state aid bill for schools. The 1966-1967 state aid bill was not adopted last spring until after the allocation board made its preliminary split of available millage.

As a result, several hectic meetings arose between the allocation board, school people and county officials concerning financing of school operation, county and township government.

Under consideration at Tawas Area School, as the result of a current curriculum study, is a five-period day with 70-minute classes. It would be mandatory that high school students have a five-class schedule instead of the present four.

Included in the \$71,977 increase in the annual budget would be provisions for four additional teachers required for the five-period day, added books for classes, an additional shop teacher. Also included were salary increments for elementary and high school teachers and a remedial reading teacher.

Mr. Mick told board members Monday night that a slight increase was expected next fall in kindergarten classes and the present 167 pupils was too large a group for five sections. A fourth section would also be needed in the first grade, an additional section for second and third grades and a fourth section in the fourth grade.

The superintendent said that the school would end the current school year with a balance of about \$160,000. He said, however, that this money was needed to operate the school during the summer months and to finance operation until taxes and state aid

Tawas Area HS Band Repeats Its 'T' Rating

For the seventh consecutive year, Tawas Area High School band received a first division rating at the District IX Festival, held last Saturday at Clare by the Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association.

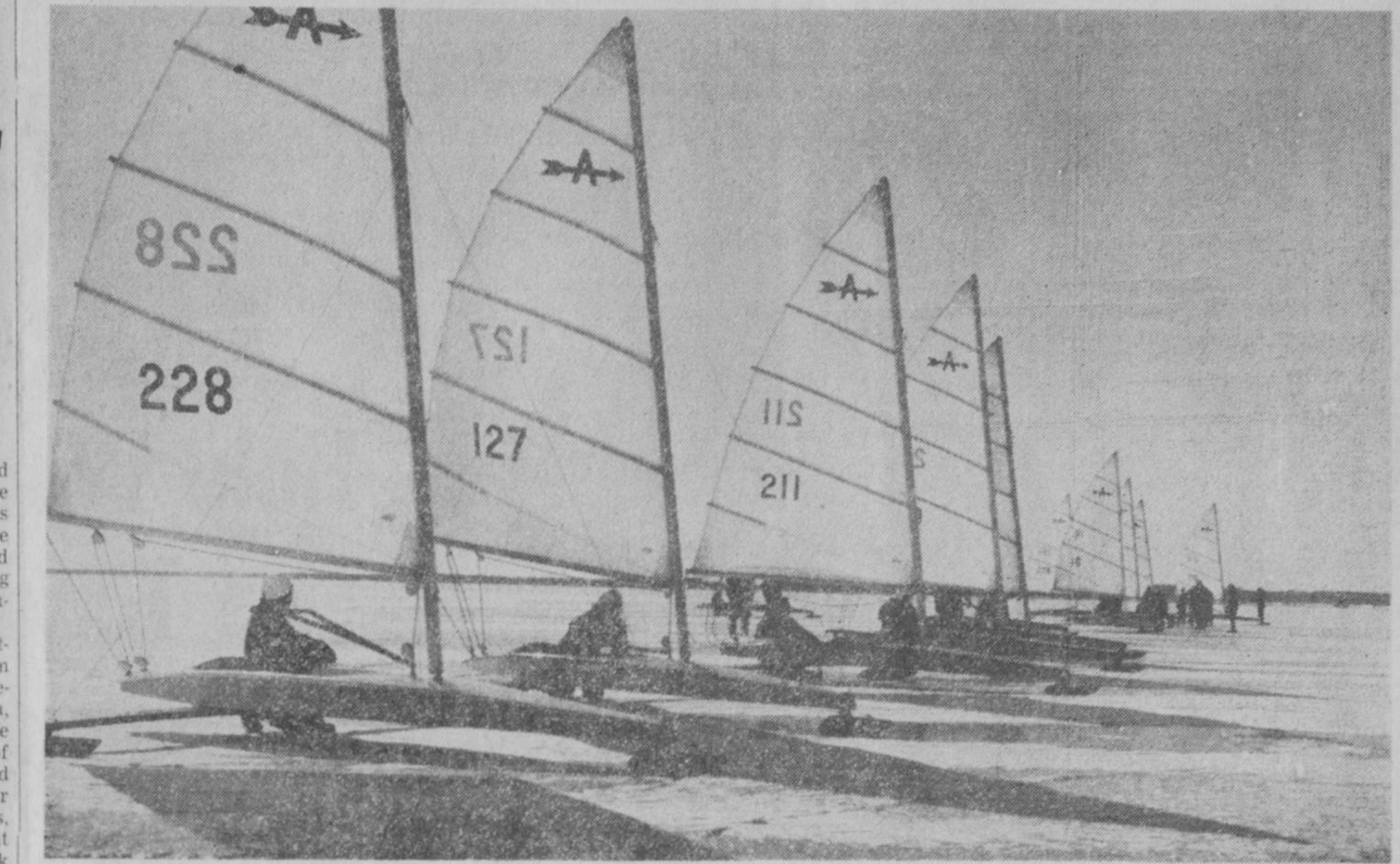
A first division rating is defined, in part, as "an unusually high standard of performance and musicianship, worthy of the distinction of being recognized as a first place winner."

The "T" rating makes the band eligible to participate in the state festival which will be held April 29 at Grand Rapids.

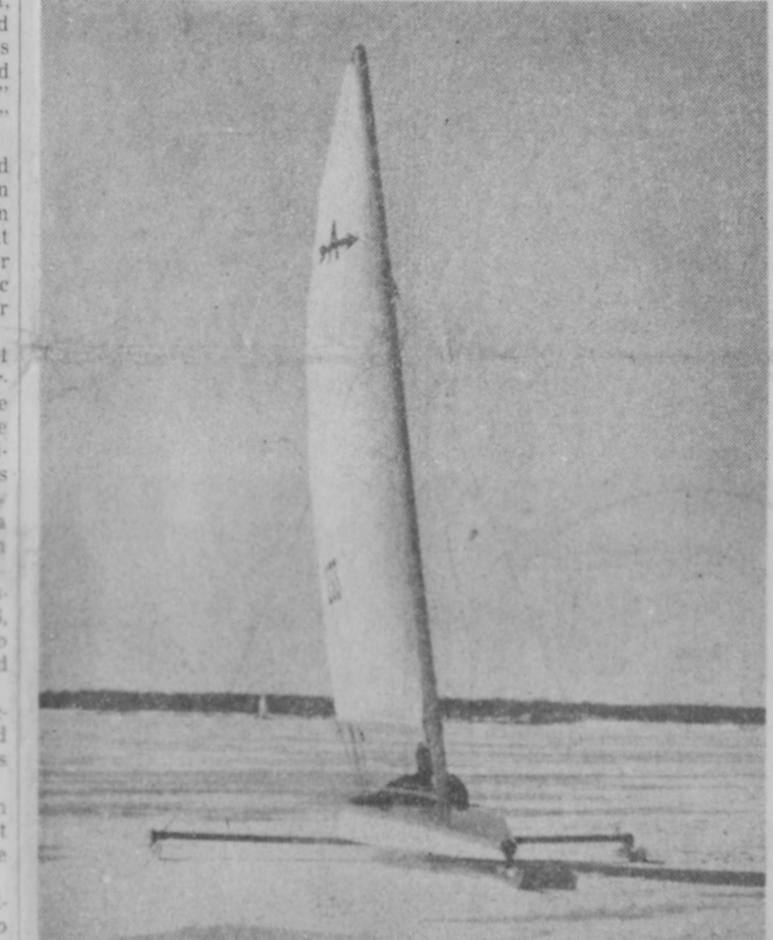

Bands compete against set standards which slightly vary between classes of schools. Each band performs three numbers before three judges, then sightread two selections before a fourth judge.

Tawas received two "1's" and a



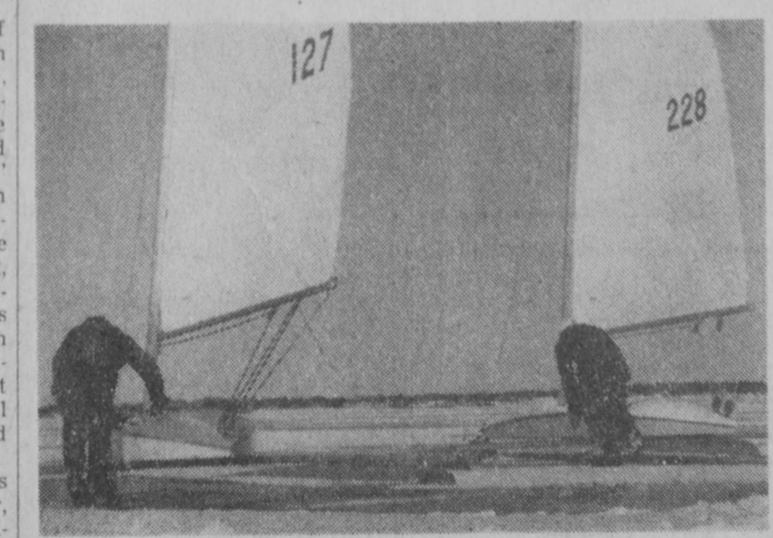
Ice yachts line up for Saturday's racing events on Tawas Bay.—Tawas Herald Photos.

Ice Yachts Furnished Colorful Week-end

Tawas Bay was the scene Saturday of its first organized ice yachting event as 15 members of the International Aero Association held five races each in singles and doubles.

The week-end also marked the largest number of ice boats seen on the bay in 30 years or more. Although organized ice yachting is new here, ice boating was once a popular winter sport in the Tawas.

Bright sunshine, cold weather, a brisk wind and near perfect ice conditions greeted skippers from as far away as Fox Lake, Illinois. Greater participation had been expected, including boats from Canada and the eastern seaboard, but unfavorable weather conditions in other parts of the country and unpredictable ice conditions here were blamed as reasons for the smaller crowd.

Dr. Donald Vercurryse, Lake St. Clair, sailed to the first place cup in singles events while Jack Hendrie, Grosse Pointe, won first place in doubles.

George Hendrie of Grosse Pointe, the hottest ice yachtsman in the meet, had to settle for third place after an infraction Sunday cost him a possible title.

Hendrie led racers at the conclusion of Saturday's events in singles with two first and a second. He had been running in second place in the first race Sunday but was disqualified when his boat hit the mark. Losing points for the infraction, Hendrie came back to win first place in the final race, taking three first place cups in singles, but finishing third with 63 points.

Vercurryse sailed steadily with two fifth and one first place finish on Saturday. He added a second and third on Sunday for 69 points. Donald Johnson of Fox Lake had 65 points on finishes of first, second, sixth, fourth and fifth.

Jack Hendrie totaled 73 points on finishes of three seconds and two thirds to win the doubles. Vercurryse was one point behind with three firsts, a fourth and a sixth, while Stu Jennings of Fenton finished third with 66 points.

Because of interest shown in ice yachting, the five members of Tawas Bay Aero Class fleet hope to expand activities next season. The local group is headed by William Cottrill of Oscoda.

Donald Tripp, owner of Sail Fish Marine, East Tawas, has been the driving force behind renewing interest in ice yachting and has been a competitor in state and national events.

The wind Saturday was a brisk 18 knots varying between the north and northwest. Speeds of about 60 miles per hour were made by the ice yachts. Conditions greatly improved Sunday with the wind hitting about 30 knots out of the west, which cleared snow off the ice. As a result, top speeds of boats soared to 75 to 80 miles per hour.

Members of the local race committee included Merle Amo, Detroit fireman who retired here recently and now operates sail loft on Tawas Point. Amo served as chairman and was assisted by John Alexander.

Mrs. Howard Boston, Mt. Clemens, secretary of the International Aero Ice Yacht Association, was official scorer.

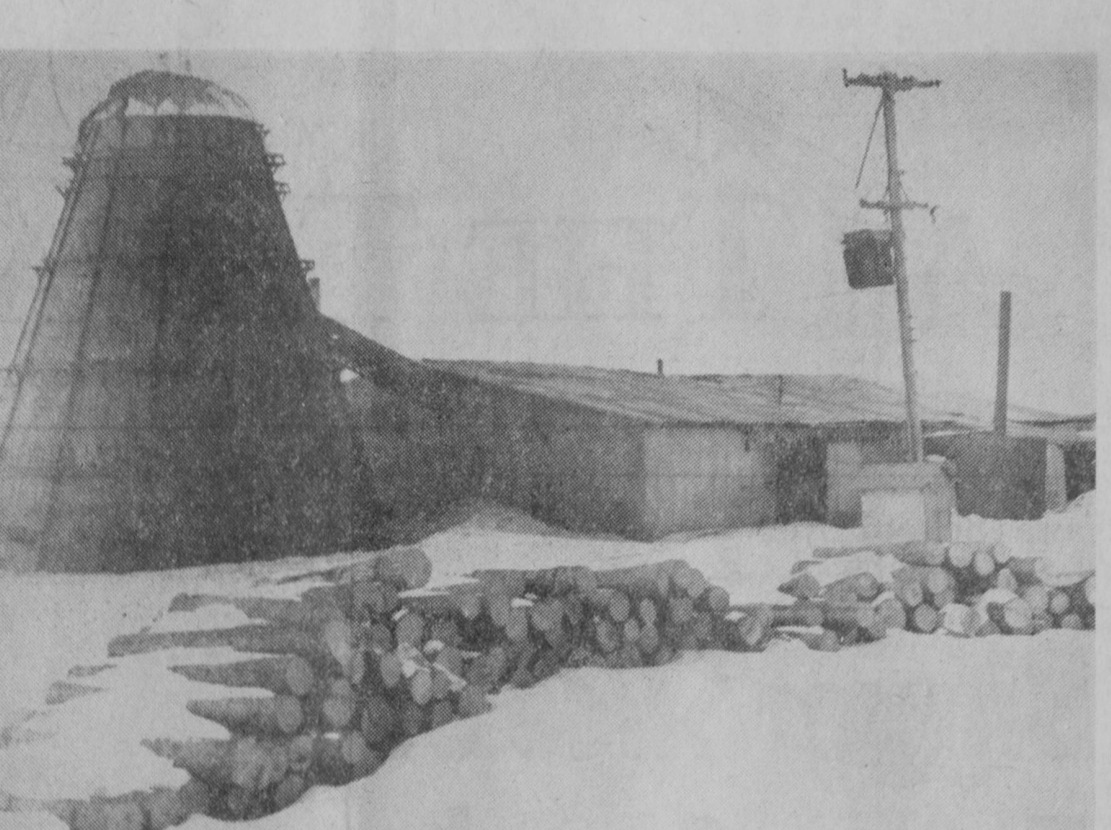

Hale Wood Products Hit by Fire Third Time in 15 Years; Reopening Said in Question

Fire struck a Hale industry for the third time in the past 15 years early Sunday morning and reopening of the firm remains a question in the minds of those now unemployed.

The frame and corrugated steel building of Hale Wood Products, owned by Albert Gardner, was gutted by flames in less than an hour. Firemen remained at the scene for about three hours.

The structure remained standing but, for all practical purposes, the major portion would be useless as support rafters were burned away, leaving an unsupported roof.

James Mann, Plainfield Township fire chief, told the Herald Sunday morning that he believed machinery used in the manufacture of wooden pallets was salvageable. Extent of damage to electrical motors was not determined.

About 30 persons were employed by the firm and provided a market for timber from local wood lots. Hale Wood Products manufactured pallets for plants operated by Dow Chemical Company and four semitruck loads were being shipped each week prior to the fire.

Exact cause of the blaze in the 53 by 80-foot building could not be determined by firemen. Mann said that the mill had not operated Saturday and the owner had checked the premises Saturday afternoon.

Earl Irish, who resides near the mill and is caretaker, said he had made a visual inspection from the mill yard around 10:30 p. m. Saturday and "everything seemed OK." Lights in his home flickered around 12:15 a. m. Sunday and, on opening the rear door of his residence, spotted flames on the

south side of the mill. He believed at first that a truck was burning, but soon saw flames in the building.

Having to cope with below freezing weather, firemen called it a stubborn blaze. A water tank truck made four or five trips for refilling with water before the fire was brought under control.

Established in 1946, the original mill burned to the ground in 1952. All equipment was lost and it took nearly a month to receive delivery on a new outfit.

A fire April 1, 1962, resulted in a \$10,000 loss to the owner, although most of the machinery was salvaged and work was immediately commenced toward building a new structure.

Firemen said that the property, as is the case with many sawmills, was uninsured.

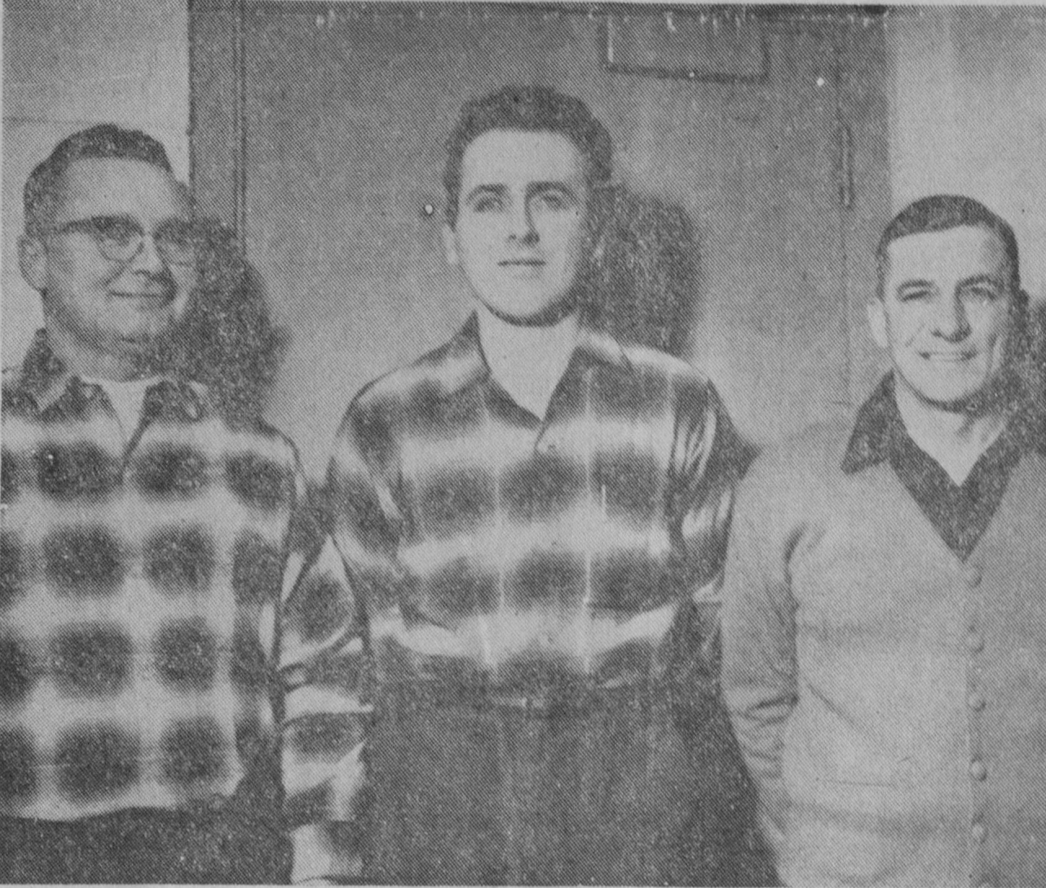

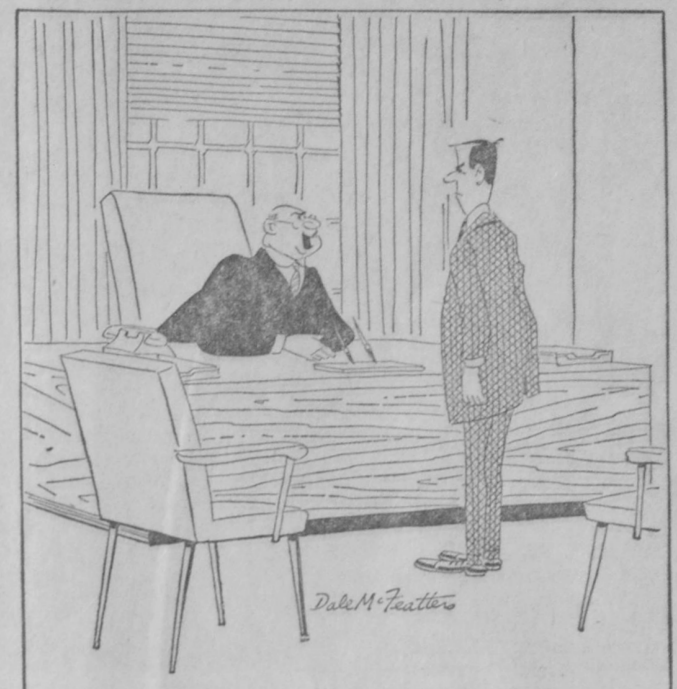

On Pins and Needles
HINTS FOR TEENAGERS

WHO SAID YOU CAN'T TELL A BOOK BY LOOKING AT ITS COVER

Ever notice how the fashion covers of magazines catch your eye when you pass a newsstand? Well, the coat you wear is your "cover" and makes headlines of its own. Coats on this winter's "Best Seller List" are as easy on the eye as large print and as exciting as any "Who done it"... and you're the author. So, pay particular attention to the "Cover" that tells your fashion story.

In McCall's 8463 there's an outline for a snappy fashion story... and at every fabric counter there's an array of color and fabrics to give you the brightest adjectives to work with. Now relax, making a coat is much easier than writing the great American novel.

MAKE IT VINYL

Snow snowing?... wind blowing? You'll not only weather the storm but light up winter's weariness with vinyl brightness from head to toe. (The pattern for the hat is included).

There are three types of vinyl on the market... the clear vinyl, the vinyl layer with the knit backing (the coat pictured here is made from the knit back vinyl) and the vinyl coated fabric. They are all easy to work with, but do require special attention; techniques too.

From the Coats & Clark Educational Bureau comes these tips to help make your "cover" a complete success.

Be sure to make the pattern alterations before you cut the material. Once vinyl is sewn, it can be taken in, but not let out because needle or pins leave holes. Secure the pattern to the vinyl with masking tape or pin in the seam allowance areas only. Mark the darts with a grease pencil or chalk on the back of the fabric. After the pieces are cut out, avoid folding them as they will crease. Roll the pieces you aren't working with if you don't have a place to lay them out flat.

Stitch the vinyl with mercerized cotton thread, regular or heavy duty, setting your machine at 8-10 stitches per inch (vinyl tends to tear if excess strain is applied to a seam sewn with smaller stitches). Use a medium needle, as a larger one may leave puncture marks. When working, if the vinyl sticks against the throat plate or presser foot, place a strip of tissue paper between the vinyl and the metal surface. (Another way of ending the sticking problem is to sprinkle talcum powder on the stitching lines).

Vinyl can't be pressed with an iron, so open the seams by finger-pressing, drawing your thumbnail over them. Then make a welt seam when possible.

Machine or handwork (using Silk Twist) and interface the bound buttonholes and mark the position of the buttonholes with masking tape. Button loops or metal zippers make excellent closures also. For clear vinyl, snap fasteners, which are hammered, not sewn into the fabric can also be used for a quick and easy closure.

One of the great things about vinyl is that it is easily cleaned, so when you pick out lining, choose a wash and wear fabric. Then you can wash the whole thing in the bathtub.

court system under Prescott's bill. Under Prescott's proposal, the new district courts would have jurisdiction in civil matters involving up to \$300 (\$1,000 in Traxler's) and concurrent jurisdiction with circuit courts in matters up to \$1,000 (\$5,000 in Traxler's).

Traxler's bill was drafted after an exhaustive study of a legislative court committee that included members of the Michigan Bar Association and other legal experts. The committee backs his bill.

In criminal matters, Prescott's measure gives jurisdiction to the new district court in all matters that now come under the justice courts.

The Traxler legislation provides for the district courts to handle matters involving misdemeanors punishable by not more than 90 days in jail and a \$500 fine.

Prescott's measure provides that before a person could qualify to

sit as a district judge who is not an attorney he would have to pass a test drafted by the State Supreme Court.

Between one and six district judges would be provided for each county, more, if necessary, for the more populous counties under the Prescott proposal.

There would be at least one district judge for each 114 square miles of area.

Areas up to 40,000 population would have one district judge; 40,000-75,000, two; 75,000-100,000, three; 100,000-150,000, four; 150,000-200,000, five, and more than 200,000, six.

This would give Ingham County six district judges, the same as provided in Traxler's bill.

Prescott's measure provides that districts with more than two judges would elect one for six years, one for four years, and one for two years, compared to 10, eight and six-year terms in Traxler's measure.

Introduces House Bill Would Allow Laymen to be District Judges

State Rep. George A. Prescott, Republican, Tawas City, introduced a bill in the house of representatives last week providing for a new lower court system which would allow laymen to be judges.

Justices have been campaigning hard and long to allow laymen to continue to sit as judges in the new district courts required to be established by January 1, 1969, under the constitution.

Unlike an earlier house bill of State Rep. J. Bob Traxler, Bay City, common pleas, recorders, municipal and traffic courts would be allowed to continue in existence under Prescott's measure.

Traxler's bill, which sets a prescribed number of district courts for each county or group of counties in the state, would also require new district judges to be attorneys.

Both bills propose that new district judges be paid \$20,000 annually, but Traxler's calls for the state to pay the salaries while Prescott's has them paid out of the county general funds.

In addition, Traxler's bill allows the boards of supervisors to supplement district judge pay up to two-thirds the amount of the county supplement being received by circuit judges.

Prescott's measure has the counties furnishing the court-rooms, facilities and staff of the new courts, while Traxler's provides that these services would also be paid by the state.

Certain fees and fines would be

turned over to the county general fund to pay for the new district

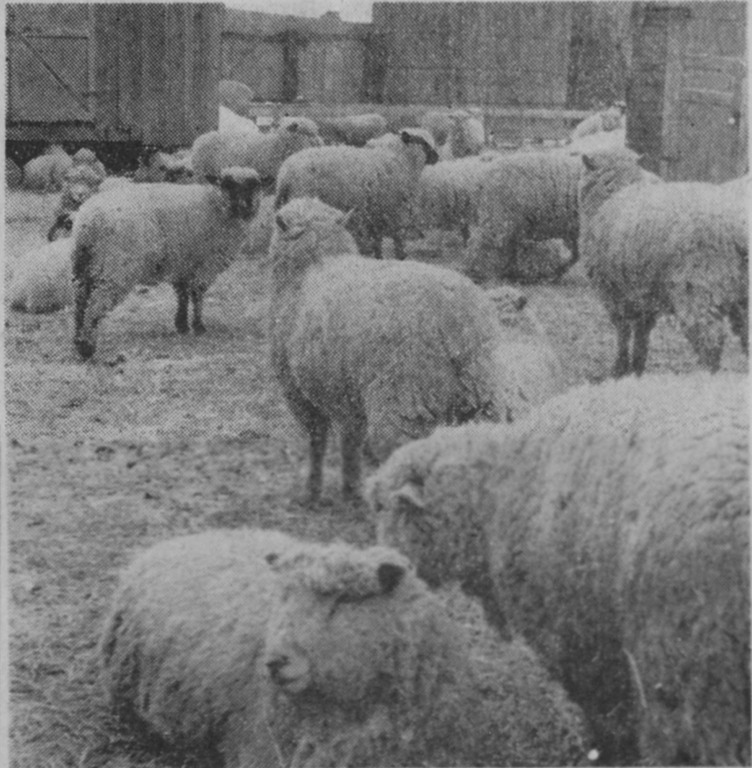

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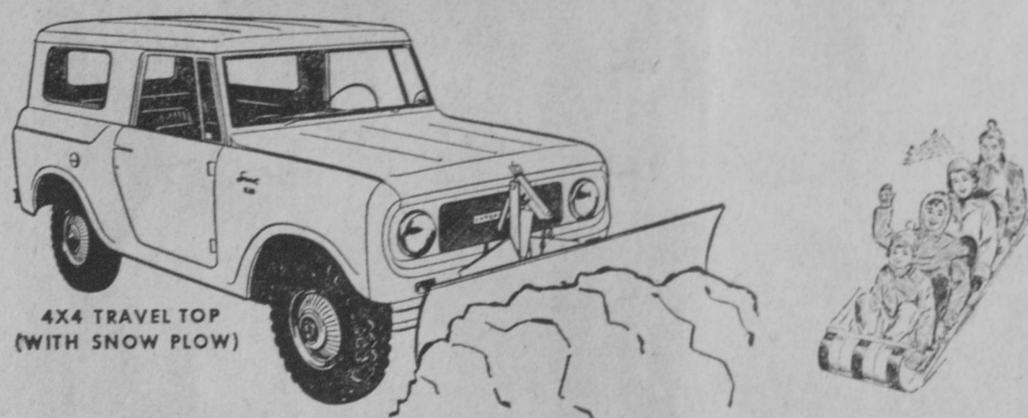

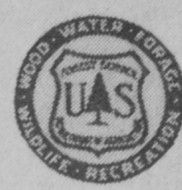

Forest Chats

Conversations about the weather around the Tawas area are certainly not all idle this winter. The folks who have dug out at least a half dozen times so far all have some real choice comments about our extra-heavy snowfall.

It may take a little of the ache out of your back muscles to know that you have actually been shoveling and plowing this year's supply of raw material for the largest factory in the area.

The factory I am referring to is the national forest and other forest land which helps produce pure groundwater and clear-running streams. Groundwater is this factory's finished product. This is what you get when you turn on the faucet—it is the spring the cows drink from or your favorite stretch of fly fishing water.

This new material in the form of rain and snow falls on the State of Michigan at the average rate of 84 billion gallons per day. If all of this were made into groundwater by the factory, or watershed, each person in Michigan would have about 10,000 gallons a day for his individual use!

Actually, only a small fraction of this total amount ends up as groundwater. Much of it is lost through immediate runoff and evaporation. Also, large quantities are used to restore the soil moisture that keeps crops and trees growing. After all this, about one-fifth of the original total volume moves slowly downward to the groundwater table.

The only way to maintain plenty of good quality water is to make sure it is replaced at least as fast as it is pumped out. In the northern Lower Peninsula, we

are not using more than what is being added—but the approximately 20,000 wells drilled each year in Michigan shows that it is going to be a closer race in the future. South of the Bay City-Muskegon line, the groundwater is already being pumped faster than it is being replenished.

Since there are more and more people using more and more water every day, the only way to win this race is to have a good, efficient groundwater-producing factory. A good factory or watershed is one that gives the greatest amount of groundwater and the stream-choking runoff. A forest with the proper number and size of trees in the right places is just about the most efficient groundwater-producing factory you can have.

Maintaining and improving the efficiency of our national forest watershed by regulating timber cutting, planting new trees cover and protecting it from damaging fires is another chunk of our job here on the Tawas District.

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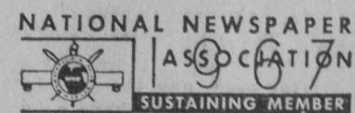

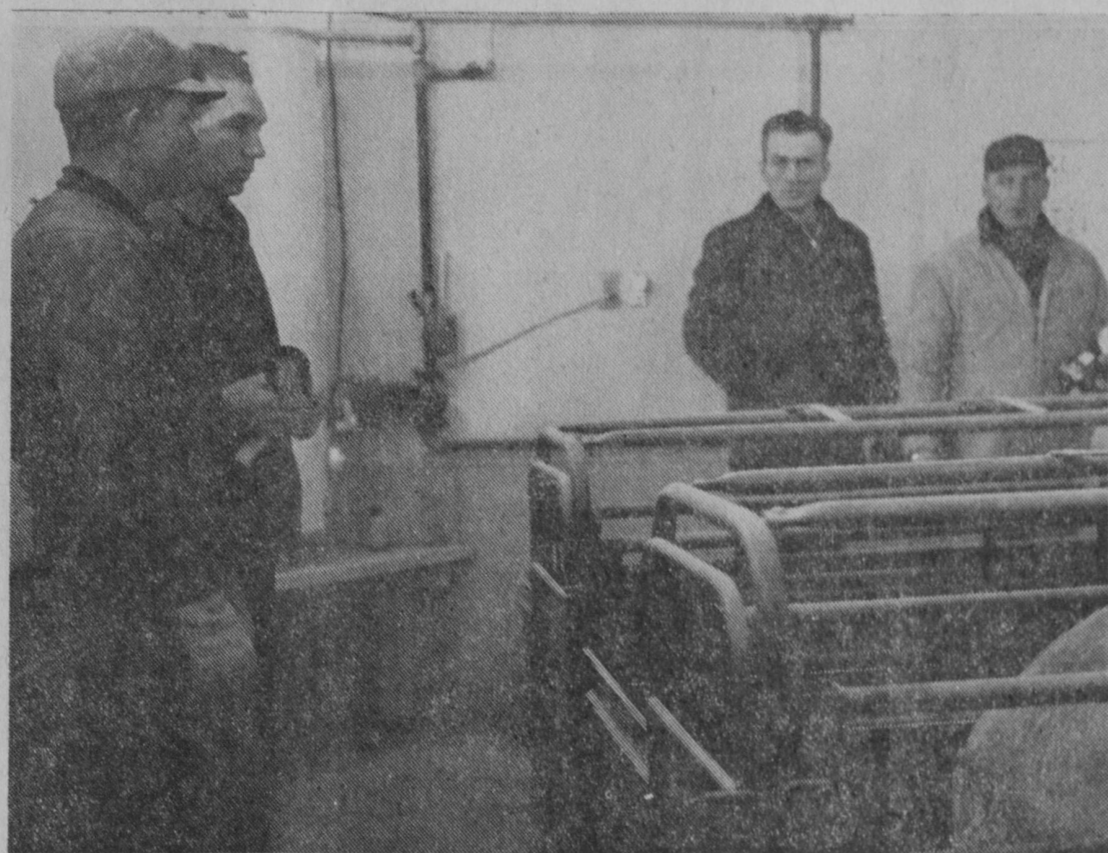

A Clean House-But How Clean?

It is always nice for a homemaker to have not only a logical excuse for a speck of dust but be able to base her reasoning on research! She can quote Ruth Kettunen, formerly in the Home Management Department, Michigan State University, who says the average homemaker considers cleaning one of the most tiring jobs in her home.

Mrs. Kettunen says that the amount and kind of cleaning done in each home depends on the number and age of the family members and their standard of cleanliness. How tiring the job will depend on the style, size and condition of the house; the money available for equipment and hired services, and the help given by members of the family. Climate and local conditions, and the time, energy, skill and management ability of the homemaker are also

factors.

Cleaning includes many different tasks to which you can apply work-saving suggestions. When you do, you will save time and energy, reduce fatigue, gain an increased feeling of accomplishment and discover that the search for ways of doing a job efficiently can make it more interesting.

Pinny Gets Aid for Sewer Proj.

An \$88,000 fund reservation for Pinconning was announced last week by the Department of Housing and Urban Development, less than 48 hours after Pinconning officials had decided to commence construction of new sanitary sewers with only private financing available.

The city council had decided to proceed with the project using \$236,000 available through a general obligation bond issue approved by voters last May. The following day, HUD approved an \$88,000 reservation in that community's water and sewer facility grant.

Construction is expected to start early in June. Bids are to be opened March 13, according to Spicer Engineering Company, Saginaw, the city's engineering consultant.

The federal grant will allow completion of the entire sewer project for Pinconning. Had it not been received, several segments of the project would have been dropped.

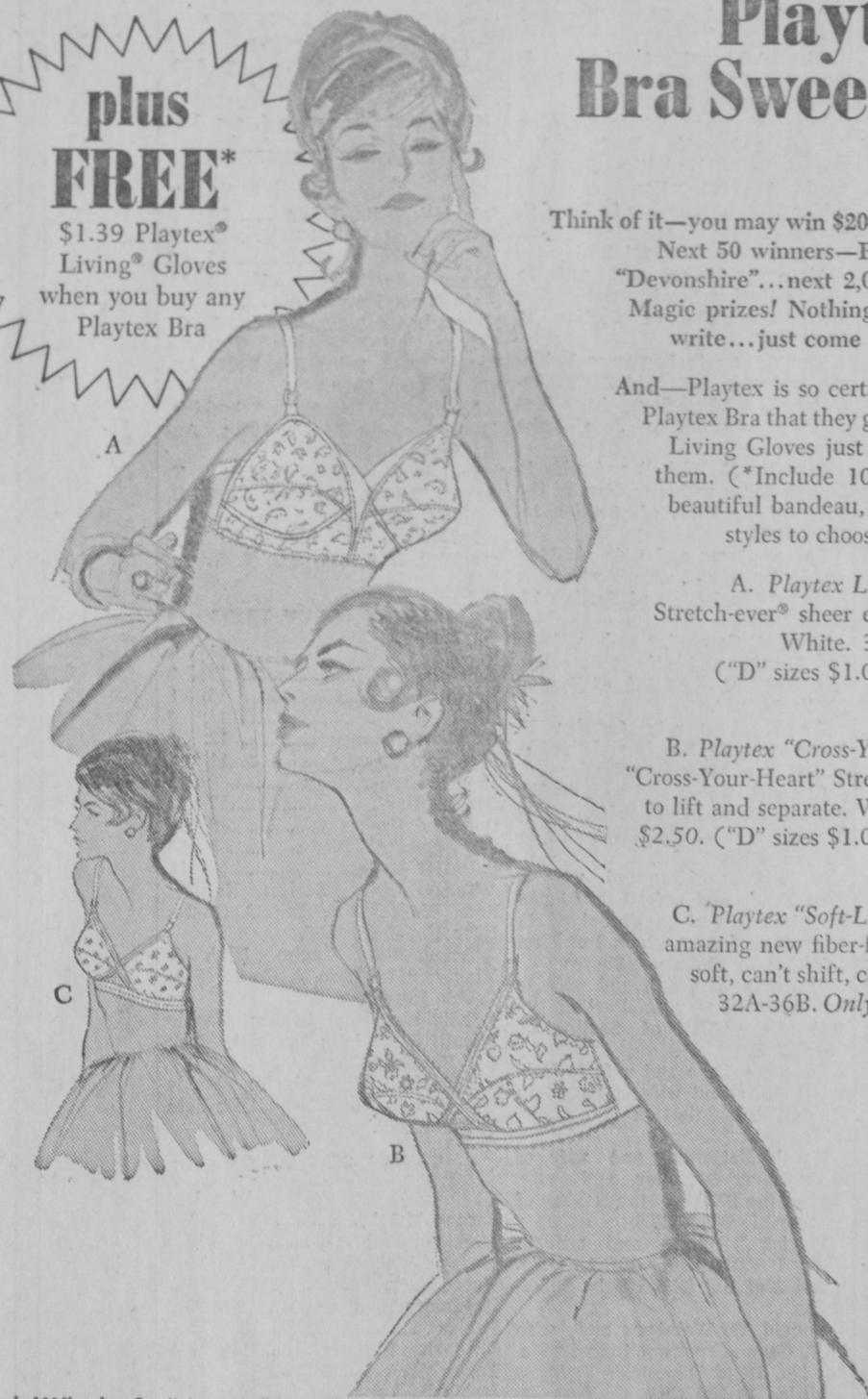
