

Preliminary Budget Goes to City Council

A preliminary budget of \$117,860 was reviewed Monday night for the 1967-68 operation by the Tawas City Council. A public hearing on the final budget is to be held April 17.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz anticipates that receipts during the next fiscal year will amount to \$116,800. The city had a budget surplus of \$10,624 at the close of the year.

Last year, Tawas City had actual receipts of \$112,017 and expenditures of \$112,649. Provisions have been made in the new budget to pay off two notes, repay money borrowed from the revolving fund for a new tractor and to pay for a parking lane along U.S. 23 opposite the county building.

In other business, Alf C. Wat-

son, city attorney, reported that the state finance commission would require the city to finance its Mathews Street sewer project through special assessment bonds rather than special assessment notes. The council authorized obtaining the service of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, Detroit law firm, to handle the arrangements.

Bids are to be taken at the next meeting for a new police car.

Salaries of city officers are to remain the same as last year: Mayor, \$150; clerk, \$650; treasurer, \$450 plus one percent collection fee; council members, \$6 per meeting attended; supervisors, \$150; fire chief, \$75.

Clean up days have been set for April 26, 27 and 28. Schedule of pickups is to be announced later.

Board of election canvassers appointed included George Myles, Carl Peters and John Lansky.

City Valuation Shows Hike of \$94,350

A \$94,350 increase in valuation was brought in last week by Tawas City's board of review. The board held its preliminary meeting two weeks ago and then held public meetings last Tuesday and Wednesday.

Grand total of real and personal property amounted to \$4,997,950, as compared to \$4,903,600 last year. This included new of \$260,275 and a loss of \$165,925.

Real property totals were as follows: Commercial, \$802,957, the same figure as last year; industrial, \$134,200, up \$900; residential, \$3,067,775 as compared to \$3,014,925 in 1966. This reflected \$75,425

East Tawas' total real valuation of \$5,484,550 showed a \$67,450 increase over 1966, according to a report from the board of review. Personal property valuation of \$893,400 was \$80,200 higher than the previous year.


new and a loss of \$22,575. Total real estate in 1967 is \$4,004,950, as compared to \$3,951,500 last year.

Considerable fluctuation was noted in personal property, where there was a \$142,700 loss in industrial. Mayor George Tuttle said this resulted mainly from lowering of inventories.

Personal property totals were as follows: Commercial, \$509,400, reflecting new of \$135,350 and loss of \$650; industrial, \$138,500, including new of \$16,875 and losses of \$142,700; residential, \$16,900, including new of \$475; utility, \$328,150, showing new of \$31,550.

Total personal property in 1967 is \$993,000, as compared to \$952,100 last year.

Winter's final storm hit the Michigan area Monday night, depositing about five inches of heavy, wet snow. It may have been the final storm of winter but it was the first snowfall of spring — Tuesday, March 21, being the magic day.

One Incident Locally in NFO Milk Stoppage

One minor incident has been reported in the Iosco area during the current strike by NFO members of Michigan and 24 other states aimed at boosting the price paid them for milk.

A Cloverland Co-Op tanker from the Prescott, Whittemore and Hale area was stopped Sunday afternoon on M-65 south of Twinning by more than 30 members of the National Farmers Organization. An attempt was made to dump the load of milk, but quick work of the Arenac County Sheriff's Department and Michigan State Police prevented this.

A valve stem was reportedly pulled out of one tire in an attempt to disable the tanker, but the truck was escorted to Standish by police where repairs were made. The tanker was then escorted on to Bay City where the load of milk was delivered.

The Cloverland Co-Op is made up of 31 area farmers who own two milk tankers hauling milk to Pinconning and Bay City markets.

The cooperative held an emergency meeting Thursday afternoon at the Reno Township Hall where members voted, 14-10, to continue hauling milk for those members who wished to continue shipments.

There were 24 members shipping milk Thursday and Friday, 22 shipped milk Saturday and Sunday. Other members elected to dump or separate their milk.

State police and sheriff's departments around the state reported numerous complaints from nonstriking farmers and milk truck drivers, who claimed intimidation and harassment on the part of strikers.

Spokesmen for the strikers have claimed their withholding action has been effective and that some dairies have agreed to pay more for raw milk.

The Michigan Milk Producers Association, a marketing group representing almost 90 percent of Michigan's 10,000 dairy farmers, opposes the strike.

NFO strike leaders say they do not want or approve of violence. No arrests had been made in the state as of Monday.

Meanwhile, Cong. Elford A. Cederberg of Michigan's 10th District, was one of 47 members of congress requesting President Johnson to make public the long secret Tariff Commission report on dairy imports which was submitted to him 10 months ago.

There is growing opposition in milk producing areas to continue dairy imports which are made possible through an executive order issued by the president under his emergency authority.

Congressman Cederberg introduced legislation known as the "Dairy Import Act of 1967" which is designed to tighten up these imports. He said that during the calendar year 1966, imports of milk increased by 300 percent over the previous year.

Alabaster Top Collector of Taxes in Iosco County

Alabaster Township is Iosco County's champion tax collector, according to a report Monday by County Treasurer Edward Nelkie.

The Alabaster Township treasurer collected 98 percent of the taxes levied for that unit, as compared to a county average of 89 percent.


Other percentages of taxes collected were reported as follows: Sherman, 95 percent; Reno, 94 percent; Oscoda, 91 percent; Grant, 91 percent; Burleigh, 90 percent; Tawas City, 89 percent; Tawas, 88 percent; Plainfield, 88 percent; Whittemore, 87 percent; East Tawas, 84 percent; Wilber, 84 percent; Baldwin, 81 percent; AuSable, 80 percent.

An increase of approximately 280 delinquent descriptions was returned to Nelkie's office for 1966 over the previous year.

A four percent collection fee is added automatically at the county office and interest is charged at the rate of one-half percent per month starting March 1, which adds up to 10 percent for the first year.

Total amount of taxes collected by township and city treasurers during 1966 was \$1,185,183.20. Of this, \$707,799 went to schools, \$171,013 for townships, \$306,370-41 for the county and \$1,790 in dog taxes.

The county's total listed above included \$250,151.44 for county operation, \$22,692.86 for the medical care facility, \$7,735.85 for the intermediate school district and \$25,790.26 for intermediate district special voted.

Nine-Man Commission Plan to Replace Board of Supervisors

A nine-man commission to replace the present 19-member board of supervisors has been adopted for Iosco County.

This action, taking effect in 1968, was adopted at the March session of the Iosco Board of Supervisors following guidelines handed down by the state and about three months of study by the board's apportionment committee.

The measure was passed by an 11-6 roll call vote last Wednesday afternoon. The board's six-man apportionment committee had been deadlocked over two different plans—nine man vs. 11-man—and left the matter for the entire board to decide.

Vote on the question did not seem to be a controversy between sections of the county or loss of representation by some units, but, rather, a determination on the part of supervisors to complete this task before work was handed over to a county commission composed of county officers and representatives of the two political parties.

The board had until April 10 to apportion the county into districts on a population basis according to the one-man, one-vote principal handed down by the state supreme court. This same decision resulted in a realignment of districts in the state legislature and may even extend into reapportionment of representation in city government and boards of education.

Under the nine-man commission

plan adopted by Iosco, some townships with a population as close to 1,817 persons as practical were grouped together to form one district, two townships are to remain as single districts, one township was split in half to form two districts.

Alabaster, Sherman, Burleigh and the City of Whittemore, with a total population of 1,884, were grouped into one district, as were Reno, Grant and Tawas, with a total population of about 1,923.

The Third Ward of East Tawas was grouped with Wilber and Baldwin to form one district. Tawas City (1,810), East Tawas (2,462), Plainfield (1,415) and AuSable (1,650) are to have one representative each on the new commission.

Oscoda Township, with a total population of about 4,000 persons, was divided into two districts, each with a single representative. The board had authorized a census to be taken in Oscoda Township and East Tawas' Third Ward as a means of determining the division. Census figures of 1960 were used for the remainder of the county.

James Campbell of East Tawas, chairman of the apportionment committee, said that had an 11-member commission been adopted using a figure of 1,500 as the average population, an entirely new census of the county would have been required.

The above apportionment plan will be in use from 1968 until new population figures are received from the 1970 census. The county would then be reapportioned into districts as nearly equal as possible for a 10-year period.

Groupings under the 11-man plan, said Campbell, probably would have had Reno, Whittemore and Burleigh combined into one district; Grant, Sherman and Alabaster as one district; Tawas Township and part of Tawas City as one district; part of East Tawas and Baldwin as one district; part of Oscoda and Wilber as one district; Plainfield, AuSable and the remaining portions of Tawas City and East Tawas would have had one representative.

John Weible, Alabaster Township supervisor, was of the opinion

City to Study New Housing Code

A special meeting is to be held Friday by the Tawas City Council to discuss possible adoption of a housing code patterned after one used at Saginaw.

Paul Chevis, chairman of the city's planning commission, told councilmen Monday night that such a code was necessary for the city to continue its efforts for a workable program under urban renewal.

The planning commission chairman said that members of that group had studied the proposed ordinance and had found it suitable for this community.

The code would establish minimum standards for new housing construction and present dwellings. It would provide a means for control of safety and sanitary standards for rental units.

Chevis felt that code would be a good start in the right direction for the community. Under terms of the application for urban renewal, the city must also update its electrical and plumbing codes.

Mayor George Tuttle said that enforcement of such codes may be a problem.

TA Bandsmen in State Festival

Twenty-two Tawas Area Band members traveled to Hastings last Saturday to participate in the State Solo and Ensemble Festival. Four instrumental ensembles, two instrumental proficiencies and two piano proficiencies qualified for this event by receiving a I at the recently held district festival. The instrumental groups received four I and two II ratings.

Band members who received a I were a woodwind quintet, Mary Lubig, Carol Hoshbach, Kharla Frank, Linda Dorey and JoAnn Smith; clarinet quartet, Miss Frank, Susan Schaff, Sallian Roach and Vicki Anderson; percussion quartet, Walt Clements, Tom MacMurray, Rick Greenlee and Dennis Wetzel; Miss Lubig, flute, passed proficiency 1 with a score of 91 percent.

In addition, the obvious student benefits of the festival are those of stimulating an interest in band instruments and the development of a desire for good music. The festivals also benefit instructors, provide an educational performance ground for teachers in instrumental music so that standards of instruction may be raised and also help promote the recognition and status of instrumental music as a curricular subject.

Hale Family Lost All in Recent Fire

Fire destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Ronchetto, six miles north of Hale, on March 10. The family was watching television when fire broke out near the furnace. All household articles were also lost.

A party line telephone in the home was not operating, apparently put out of order by flames. Other phones on the line were put out of commission.

East Tawas Sets Bid Opening on Sewage Plant

Bids are to be opened April 17 on East Tawas' new waste water treatment plant, according to action taken at Monday night's meeting of the city council.

April 17 is the closing date for bids and specifications compiled by Spicer Engineering Company, Saginaw, are on file at the city hall.

Supt. of Public Works Paul Ropert said Monday night that a 400-day completion date for this phase of the project would place an August 1, 1968, finishing date for the work. It is hoped that the project might be started before June 30.

Ropert said that included in the above construction would be a main control building, primary tanks, sludge digester, sludge drying beds and an outfall sewer to the Tawas River.

A number of revisions were made to specifications Monday night, according to terms of a \$120,000 federal grant received by East Tawas.

Total estimated cost of the entire project is around \$800,000, which includes laterals and trunklines. East Tawas voters approved a \$300,000 general obligation bond issue and the remainder is to be financed under special assessment revenue bonds and the federal grant.

In other business, a letter from Mrs. Temple Tait requesting extension of Alice Street to Woodlawn was deferred until necessary private property is dedicated for street use.

The recreation committee requested the city compile an inventory of city-owned property which might be used for future recreational use.

Recent building applications approved included one for Martin Thompson, new siding, \$150. A building application requested by Ervin Kuenzli for a new garage was denied because of nonconformity with the building code. The proposed garage was too close to the side lot.

The city is now advertising for annual bids on gasoline and fuel oil.

Next meeting of the council has been changed to April 6 because of a conflicting date with the April 3 election.

LaVoy Quits Post on Road Commission

Robert LaVoy, who was elected to a three-year term as Iosco County Road Commissioner last November, resigned from that office effective this month.

Notification was received last Wednesday by the Iosco Board of Supervisors. LaVoy listed personal reasons for his resignation.

No action was taken toward naming a successor. Walter Kasischek, chairman of the board's roads and bridges committee, told members that Pros. Atty. J. Riehard Ernst had requested additional time to investigate state laws in order to determine if an appointment could be made for the remainder of the term.

Donald Karcher, Oscoda real estate agent, had submitted his application to fill the vacancy.

In other business, the board authorized hiring of a part-time clerk in the treasurer's office for six weeks to assist in preparing delinquent tax rolls.

The board allocated \$634 toward purchase of a radio for the deputy sheriff's car at Whittemore.

The county is to request permission from Consumers Power Company to use \$650 from Old Orchard Park receipts as an appropriation to East Michigan Tourist Association for county advertising. The power company approved an allocation of \$12,500 from Old Orchard Park money to be used for purchase of property at the mouth of the AuSable River for park purposes.

Plainfield Supervisor Ends Long Service to County

George Webb, 75, Plainfield Township farmer who has been active in township, school and county affairs for more than 40 years, attended his last session of the Iosco Board of Supervisors March 15.

Deciding to retire from politics last year, Webb was not a candidate to succeed himself as Plainfield Township supervisor in the November election. Named as his successor was Dennis Chrvia.

Webb served from 1925 until 1935 on the Plainfield Township Board of Education and then "retired" from public life. After only two years away from office, he was nominated as township justice of the peace and served on the township board for eight years.

"I did not attend the 1945 Republican caucus and I was nominated for supervisor," recalled Webb. "They sent a man out to see if I would run and, after thinking it over, decided I would like the job."

During his 22 years as a supervisor, Webb has seen his township grow from a valuation of \$700,000 to more than \$7,000,000 today. In 1945, the tax roll consisted of about 80 pages. There are now 402 pages in the book.

As township assessor, Webb has seen 94 subdivisions formed in Plainfield. Much of this activity has been in resort property around the numerous lakes within the township. The township has constructed two halls since he was a member of the board and one burned to the ground.

Plainfield has a total of 183

miles of township roads. "Because of poor traveling conditions in the old days, various parts of the township hardly associated with each other. Since reorganization of many school districts into one, plus improved conditions for travel, our people are a lot closer," he commented.

Born in Northern Ohio, he came here with his parents in 1901. Since the death of his wife last year, he has continued to operate his 240-acre farm. He and his son are engaged in general farming

and specialize in raising white navy beans.

For years, Webb carried Plainfield's tax roll in his head, as well as having property descriptions listed in township records. One of his big jobs before retirement was, in cooperation with the county's tax department, to condense this information into more than 5,000 Addressograph plates.

"After the 1967 board of review is over, I think I'll just sleep for a few days," he said.

Historical Moment In Iosco County

A new governmental framework for Iosco County, as well as for other counties of the state—long in the talking stage as the result of the one-man, one-vote concept of state and federal supreme court decisions—looms on the horizon.

Effective at the next general election in 1968, Iosco County will name a nine-man commission to handle operational affairs of the county. This commission will replace the present 19-member board of supervisors.

Reapportionment of the county came about last Wednesday through adoption of a resolution from the board's own six-man committee which has studied various plans for the past several months and then had to hurry its action to meet the April 10 deadline.

As might be expected when changing a form of local government which has existed during the county's entire 110-year history, there were some mixed emotions... especially from townships which are to be grouped together to elect a single commissioner.

Historians have noted dramatic changes in every era of the American scene—and there have been those, rightfully or wrongfully, who have resisted change.

Since the 1930s, there has been a gradual whittling away of township functions. One of the first was the relief from the burden of local financing of township roads.

We are not shedding tears over this change in local government, as some streamlining is needed to fit the times. We do point out that last Wednesday was a historical occasion of significance, of which all residents of the county should be aware.

"Realty" is the subject of this week's lesson-sermon to be read in all Christian Science churches on Sunday.

Bible references open with a verse from Isaiah: "The sun shall be no more thy light by day; neither for brightness shall the moon give light unto thee; but the Lord shall be unto thee an everlasting light, and thy God thy glory."

The meaning of the Easter event is renewed when we begin to discover in ourselves the capacity for that "greater love" of which Christ Jesus spoke.

"Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends," Jesus said (John 15:13). And his total willingness to do this opened to all mankind a new estimate of reality—brought resurrection, showed us a new and unending life.

Our readiness to learn what Jesus' words mean in our lives can begin to open to us this vast view.

His words are a call for the most penetrating kind of self-sacrifice—for a spiritual devotion that overcomes human pride, fear and selfishness in a triumph of divine Love.

It is literally a call to be born again. Can the "average" person accept this call, this self-surrender?

It is really inevitable. And we know this in the first stirrings of our own deepest spiritual intuition. It can happen in July on a city street, in a classroom, in an office. Easter comes when it happens in the heart.

Writing of the new birth, Mary Baker Eddy, the founder of Christian Science, said: "It begins with moments, and goes on with years; moments of surrender to God, of childlike trust and joyful adoption of good; moments of self-atonement, self-consolation, heaven-born hope and spiritual love" (Miscellaneous Writings, page 15).

Our intuition grows into perception and understanding. Gradually, we gain the conviction that the lives of all men are ultimately bound together, in Truth. Then we begin to find the courage, strength, and intelligence we need to lay down our lives for each other, day by day—to sacrifice whatever is self-satisfied or self-seeking in our hearts, to break through the barriers of mortal ego.

Then Easter comes. And then we begin to see ourselves—and each other—in this new light. For this is where the "greater love" leads—to clearer views of what is actual, to resurrection, to a life that is new and to life that is endless.

Jesus said, "He that loseth his life for my sake shall find it" (Matthew 10:39).

Schoolmen Study Regional Data Processing Center Plan

Sixteen representatives of the North Central Michigan Polaris Apollo Study, meeting at East Tawas last Wednesday, voted to start action into five areas of education on a cooperative basis to provide a better education to each child in area schools.

At the same time, representatives took a bold step ahead by starting formation of a new 10-county central administrative unit with equal representation from all six of the intermediate districts involved.

In August 1966, the Counties of Alcona, Isosco, Oscoda, Ogemaw, Gladwin, Crawford, Roscommon, Clare, Missaukee and Wexford received a grant of \$88,350 from the United States Office of Education to study the completeness of educational experiences for pupils in their schools.

This step was based upon preliminary survey work of Dr. Rex Wood, planning director for data processing, Oakland County Intermediate School District.

Particular interest of those attending the meeting was shown in the field of data processing and an overall plan is being prepared for submission for federal funds which would provide basis for a regional data processing center.

The proposed 10-county supra-administrative unit with equal representation from all intermediate school districts would not replace any of the existing intermediate districts. At the present time, there is a lack of coordinated effort in the counties involved.

By pooling of service costs, a consequently larger amount would be available to obtain the best personnel and materials consistent with the effort.

Duplication of services costs in supervision, evaluation, fiduciary control and data processing would be avoided.

Dr. Wood's report stated that

goals of the project would be to establish a central facility and staff to bring the advantages of data processing technology to this rural area and to implement applications in pupil personnel services, business office services, research and curriculum.

Cost of the project would be borne entirely by the Elementary and Secondary Education Act during the first year, 50 percent the second year and 25 percent the third year. Local districts and intermediate districts would begin to help support the project during the second year through direct

funding with state help.

Calvin Bones is project director for the Polaris Apollo Study.

Forest Chats

Many people called our office last summer seeking advice to save their yard and shade trees which were being attacked by insects. Unfortunately for many, it was already too late to help.

Normally, a healthy tree has a much better chance of warding off insects and diseases than a weak or damaged tree. Proper care and protection from physical damage caused by activities around your home will give your tree a fighting chance if insects or disease should strike.

One thing to remember is that trees have a prime of life just as we do. Once past this prime, it takes more tender and constant care to keep them healthy.

It is possible for you to look after your yard trees individually, but out in the forest, this would be impractical. Because trees past their prime do require more individual care, we try to keep few of them around. If we had a great number of these weakened trees the normal population of insects could get a good toe hold and really cause serious damage.

Since it is impossible to look after each tree individually you might ask just what do we do. Well, we manage entire stands of trees as units. The goal is to not allow any stand to become insect food by letting them live past their prime. Sometimes a few

trees in a stand will be over mature. These are usually the first ones attacked by insects or disease. Some damage will always occur, but maintaining healthy stands will keep it at a low level.

Controlled harvest practices are our best management tool for keeping the forest healthy. Forester Stuart Bailey will discuss some of these practices in next week's "Forest Chats."

Test wells of the United States Geological Survey are reflecting winter snowmelt in improved ground water levels. February readings of these levels were above average throughout Michigan.

A stretch of warm days and cold nights would permit even greater recharge of ground water supplies. However, continuous thawing would result in fast surface runoff and flooding.




