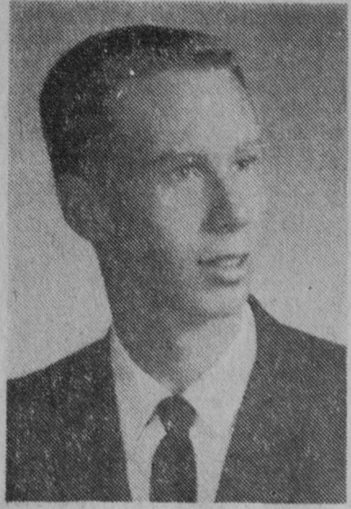


Hale Area HS Names 1967 Honor Students

Allocation Bd. Appointed by Probate Judge

Iosco Allocation Board, which is to hold its organizational meeting Monday, April 17, will have the same membership as last year.

Recent appointments of Probate Judge William McCready were Arden Charters, William Weryley and Russell A. Rollin Sr. Other members by law are the county treasurer, intermediate school superintendent and chairman of the board of supervisors' finance committee.

There will be three new faces on the board this year. Edward Neltie is the new treasurer replacing Mrs. Grace L. Miller, Ernest Jordan replaces William Tracy as the intermediate school superintendent. While not a voting member, D. Keith Pappas, the new county clerk replacing George A. Prescott, will serve as clerk of the board.

One of the first actions of the allocation board will be to accept 1967-1968 budgets from the county, four schools, the intermediate schools and townships.

Job of the allocation board is to establish the amount of millage to be split among the various units to meet budget requests.

Fishermen Warned to Remove Shanties

The conservation department's annual reminder to winter fishermen was issued last week. The time is now to remove shanties from the ice.

Submerged shanties can become hazards to boating and create litter problems. If not removed from the ice, owners are subject to arrest.

City Council Gives Nod to Housing Code

A new housing code with provisions to protect the health, safety and welfare of residents, establishes minimum housing standards, determines responsibilities of owners and occupants of dwellings and provides for administration, enforcement and penalties. It was tentatively adopted last Friday night by the Tawas City Council.

Formal action is expected to be taken at the regular meeting of the council April 3 and would become effective July 1.

The new code establishes minimum standards for basic equipment and facilities, including such items as sinks, flush water closets and lavatory, bathtub or shower, water heating facilities, water and sewage facilities, garbage and rubbish disposal, exitways.

It also establishes minimum standards for light, ventilation and heating; minimum space, use and location requirements; safe and sanitary maintenance of dwellings and nondwelling structures; minimum standards for rooming houses and motels.

Following discussion and expected passage at the next council meeting, full text of the ordinance would be published by this newspaper.

Long in Planning—

Radio System Being Installed at Iosco Jail

Iosco Sheriff's Department has received delivery on equipment for its new radio communications system and installation is to be made sometime this week.

Long in the planning stage, Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell said Tuesday morning that his department had first investigated the possibility of having its own communications system about 10 years ago.

Things came to a head last November when the board of supervisors authorized an expenditure of \$2,000 for a new base station to be located in the county jail.

The sheriff's department has had its patrol cars equipped with two-way communications since the late 1940s, operating on the state police network. The sheriff's department was unable to communicate directly from patrol cars to the jail and information under that system was relayed from the state police post at East Tawas.

"We believe this new communications system will improve the efficiency of our department by eliminating any possible delay through direct contact with the jail," said O'Farrell. "At present, we monitor state police calls and they will be monitoring our calls after the new system is installed."

The sheriff said that the new radio system would mean a great deal more work for officers on duty at the jail as preparation of a daily log will be required by the

Federal Communications Commission.

"We do not have enough man hours in a day now, but faster communications and an actual savings in money over the long run should offset some of the problems we encounter with the extra work," he said.

Since September 1, the sheriff's department has had an officer at the desk 24 hours a day. This was required by the state, under a regulation from the state jail inspector.

The sheriff's department will have five vehicles equipped with radios operating on the network. Included will be a new radio at Whittemore, being purchased jointly by that city and the county. The deputy sheriff's car at Hale is already equipped with a radio, as well as two patrol cars and a Jeep operating out of Tawas City. The department's patrol boat will also have direct communication with the jail.

Cost of the new base station was \$2,000. O'Farrell said he expected that the jail's long distance telephone bill probably would be cut in half through installation of the new system.

The county jail will be able to communicate directly with sheriff's departments in the northern half of the state. Only two counties in Michigan—Alcona and Osceola—remain without similar communications systems for sheriff's departments.

Preliminary Figures Show—

Real Estate Valuation Increase Nearly Offset by Personal Loss

An increase of slightly less than two percent on Iosco's state equalized valuation was anticipated last week by Henry Oates, the county's tax equalization director.

Of the 13 units furnishing valuation information to Oates' office, a \$176,530 increase was shown over last year's total. Figures were furnished by boards of review.

The above total does not include Osceola Township, where the board of review had not completed work as of Monday. A substantial increase from that township is expected to push the county above the two percent increase mark.

Last year, Iosco had a total state equalized valuation of \$59,783,813. As of Monday, the total, excluding Osceola Township, was approximately \$44,592,352. Osceola Township represents 25 1/2 percent of the county total.

Should the valuation increase reach two percent with Osceola's figure, this would be exactly one-half of the increase brought in last year. Totals for the past three years showed a one percent increase in 1964, a 2 1/2 percent increase in 1965 and four percent in 1966.

While the various taxing units brought in a \$1,982,395 increase in real property valuation, this was nearly offset by a \$1,835,865 loss on personal property. Eight units showed losses while five units brought in a \$280,412 increase in personal assessments.

Oates, who has been working very closely with assessors since assuming his new position last fall, said that much of the loss in personal property reflected errors in assessments which had been found and were being corrected in 1967.

The loss also represents the effect of the state's depreciation schedule for industrial, commercial and utility personal. It also includes a farm personal loss of \$438,700 in the county.

Oates said that state figures for utility personal had been found in error in several units and had

been compounded over a period of about 15 years. He said, however, no appreciable loss in utility personal is expected in Osceola Township, where the total appeared to be very nearly correct.

It is also expected that considerable new utility personal will be gained this year at Osceola.

Primary reason for the \$1,982,395 increase in real estate probably is the result of a new tax assessment schedule adopted by the board of supervisors last December. While complete information will not be available for another week, the total would also reflect new construction.

The new schedule was concerned with vacant land in the county—Lake Huron and inland lake frontage, hunting land and vacant farm land—and is believed to represent a more realistic approach in assessments.

For example, the assessment range on Lake Huron frontage was changed from \$6-\$46 per foot to \$30-\$50 per foot. Former valuation ranges on hunting land were from \$400 to \$1,395 per 40 acres while the new schedule will range from \$600 to \$1,400 per 40 acres.

The new appraisal guide is being used by assessment officials only as a "stop-gap" measure, as an entirely new system is to be adopted for use in assessing 1968 taxes. This will be achieved by adoption of a card file appraisal system being prepared by Gem Surveys.

Most units of the county will be listing state equalized valuations on tax receipts this year, thereby eliminating confusing percentage factors.

A resume of valuations is as follows: Alabaster Township, with a total valuation of \$4,375,467 in 1966, had a \$95,567 increase in real estate and \$37,834 loss in personal, for an over-all net gain of \$57,733.

Ausable Township's valuation, listed at \$4,616,362, had an increase of \$133,703 in real property. A \$404,386 loss in personal gives an over-all loss of \$270,683.

Baldwin Township's valuation increased by \$431,243. This township had a \$4,067,407 total in 1966 and brought in increases of \$385,979 on real estate and \$45,264 in personal.

Burleigh Township's total shows a \$207,849 decrease from last year's total of \$1,150,549. While \$26,770 was shown as an increase on real property, the township had a \$234,619 loss in personal.

Grant Township's total state equalized valuation is up \$430,879 from its total last year of \$3,397,654. Increases were noted in real estate of \$426,633 and personal of \$4,246.

Sherman Township suffered the heaviest loss in the county, down \$513,896 from its 1966 total of \$2,875,696. A real property increase of \$1,149 was noted, but there was a \$515,036 loss on personal.

Tawas Township's valuation of \$1,899,939 showed a loss of \$6,089, reflecting an increase of \$273,806 in real estate and a decrease of \$279,895 in personal.

Wilber Township's total will be \$43,528 less than last year's SEV total of \$1,489,919. Real estate was increased by \$294,415, but there was a \$337,943 loss in personal.

As reported last week, East Tawas' total real valuation of \$5,580,544 showed a \$69,450 increase over 1966. Personal property valuation of \$1,134,685 was \$85,400 higher than the previous year.

Tawas City brought in a \$94,347 increase to be added to its 1966 total of \$4,903,003. This included \$53,451 in real property and \$40,896 in personal.

Whittemore's new total will reflect a \$76,190 loss from its 1966 SEV of \$804,890. This unit had a \$19,353 increase in real property and a \$95,543 loss in personal.

Plainfield Township's board of review brought in a total increase of approximately \$286,694. This would add \$182,000 to its real property valuation of \$6,012,621 and \$104,696 to personal property valuation of \$899,042.

Renov Township had a gain of \$15,126 in real, a loss of \$211,021 in personal for a net loss of \$195,895.

Plan August Observance—

Grant Township Board in Centennial Meeting April 1

One hundred years ago, a petition of Pardon Worden and 14 other freeholders was honored by the Iosco Board of Supervisors and territory described in their application was detached from Tawas Township and erected into a new township known as Grant.

Anniversary of this event will be observed this August when residents of Grant Township hold a centennial celebration, the fourth such observance held in Iosco County in the past 13 years. Mrs. George Kindell has been named chairman of the centennial committee and the following were named to the program committee Monday night: Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Ball, Mr. and Mrs. Dale Butzin, Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Ponke, Mr. and Mrs. Dale Strauer, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Lenczewski, Mr. and Mrs. Hazen Warner and Mr. and Mrs. Kindell.

Next meeting of this group is to be held April 10, 8:00 p. m., at the township hall. Individuals with suggestions for the program are invited to call any of the above persons.

According to a record book of the township, Worden, Benjamin F. Chappell and William Webster were authorized by the board of supervisors to preside at an organizational meeting of the township on Monday, April 1, 1867. Anniversary of that event is to be marked at the township's annual meeting this Saturday.

Organization of Grant Township followed within two years of the close of the Civil War. While Tawas City had been founded in 1854 and Iosco County three years later, it was not until the late 1860s that real progress started on settling the county.

Population of Iosco numbered 175 in 1860, 395 in 1864 and jumped to 3,163 in 1870. While lumbering was the principal lure, many discharged veterans flocked to the area seeking free homesteads.

This was the case in the emergence of a new township named after Union Gen. U. S. Grant, one of three townships of Iosco honoring the names of Civil War officers.

Principal settlement in Grant Township was along the Iosco-Ogemaw State Road, which had been sanctioned and received some state aid in 1862. A thriving settlement of farmers grew up along the road near Sand Lake and it

was this group of people which carved a new township out of Tawas.

The old record book still in possession of the township reveals that 13 votes were cast for the office of supervisor. That honor went to Worden. Chappell was named clerk and Webster was the treasurer.

Other officers included Calvin J. Pine and John Waters, school inspectors; David Solomon, commissioner of highways; William Savage, Andrew Ellis, Pine and Webster, justices of the peace; Thomas Cooper, Solomon, Waters, William Dommer, constables.

The Sand Lake settlement grew by leaps and bounds. On December 23, 1868, 23 freeholders requested the township to aid in construction of a plank road, with suitable toll houses and gates, commencing at the bridge across the Tawas River at the foot of Mathews Street to connect with the state road.

This was not to be the last heard of the Plank Road, as it eventually turned into a great financial burden, resulting in numerous lawsuits.

The busy little community along the state road finally disappeared as farming did not prove successful on the sandy plains land. New roads were opened into the interior of the county and these families either moved to new farms within the township and Iosco or moved on to other areas. Only a cemetery remains today of the once busy community along the Iosco-Ogemaw State Road.

While farming proved to be the township's principal activity for 30 or 40 years, real estate development at Sand Lake and other inland waters within Grant in the 1920s provided an even greater lure to recreation and vacation seekers. A gypsum deposit was later developed along Sand Lake Road by National Gypsum Company.

Year-around as well as summer cottages now line the shores of these lakes and these families, along with farm families residing along M-55 and north-south connecting roads, will honor pioneer families with a week-long celebration in August.

One Contest Listed in April 3 City Elections

In case you have forgotten, next Monday, April 3, is election day in three Iosco County cities. Only mild interest has been shown in this year's balloting, to say the least, as no opposition is listed for incumbent candidates.

In Tawas City, candidates running without opposition are Mayor George Tuttle, Clerk Walter Nelson, Treasurer Ruth Albertson. Other unopposed candidates are Clement Stephan, First Ward supervisor; John Hosbach, Second Ward supervisor; C. S. Everett, Third Ward supervisor; Clark Tanner, First Ward alderman; Russell A. Rollin Sr., Second Ward alderman; Cecil Cable, Third Ward alderman.

At East Tawas, Mayor James Campbell is running without opposition. Also unopposed are Clerk

Fred Lomas and Mrs. Grace Pelton, treasurer. Unopposed for alderman seats are Richard Moss, First Ward; Earl McElheron, Second Ward; Charles Schreck, Third Ward.

Whittemore's candidates are Mayor George Blust, Treasurer Mary Wasilewski, Clerk Bert Fortune, Assessor Edward Graham, David Mills is candidate for First Ward alderman and Dennis Hoff, man is candidate for Second Ward alderman.

The only race in the entire county finds Irum Collins, Democrat, and Donald Dahne, Republican, competing for the First Ward constable post. Melvin Bowen is unopposed for Second Ward constable.

Township governments of Iosco County will be holding annual meetings this Saturday.

Editorial—

Let Lansing Do It?

With all of the current talk over a state income tax and a recent proposal by a local board of education member to turn over contract negotiations with teachers to the state, a few words concerning a different opinion might be appropriate.

Expense to the general public in operating schools and government continues to skyrocket and it follows that some sort of tax reform is needed in Michigan to relieve the already beleaguered homeowner and small businessmen.

The proposed state income tax seems to be the fairest method of financing state government and public school operation, but other state nuisance taxes will, of necessity, have to be removed in order to offer any help to the taxpayer. Whether taxes derived from income alone would provide enough funds to meet demands of both the state and schools is debatable.

While we are not offering this as an argument against state-wide income tax, the following view might be a point to consider. Should an income tax be adopted, all school financing would be handled at Lansing, excluding special school millage propositions adopted locally. This may be what professional educators would want, but we are wondering if this is desired by the general public.

One of the primary functions of a local board of education at present is to develop budgets (through hiring of an administrator), or in other words, to act as the public's representative on how money is to be spent. Also, to initiate policy guidelines for a local educational program. The task of a board of education member is not easy, but he does represent local thought as an elected official in regard to schools of an individual community.

The cry is heard daily that big government (meaning Washington) is assuming too much control over "sovereign" state governments. Locally, one has often heard that there is too much power being concentrated at Lansing, but we have yet to hear any objection to a state income tax based on the above reasoning.

Perhaps the easiest and most efficient way of handling school operation would be to centralize all administration and let Lansing do it. This would relieve boards of education from the duty of overseeing school operation and it would follow that all contract negotiations with teachers should be handled at Lansing.

Boards of education might just as well be abolished if this be true. Professionally trained administrators, it must be admitted, are far better equipped than laymen to develop curriculums and school policy direction certainly would be centered at Lansing if all financing is to come from there—the state would be "paying" (?) the entire shot for education, rather than on the present local participation basis.

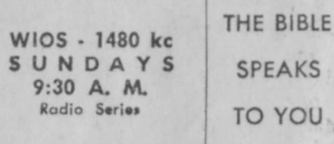

Apply Before Age 65 for SS-Health Benefits

You have much to gain and nothing to lose by applying for both social security cash benefits and health insurance during the three-month period just before you reach 65 according to Paul M. Ellifritz, district manager of the local social security office.

You should apply early even if you are still working. Although your benefit amount will be established at age 65, you will be given an automatic annual re-computation to take into account earnings after age 65 which may entitle you to higher benefits when you stop working at some later date.

You should apply for the voluntary medical insurance part of medicare during the three-month period before you reach 65 to have this protection start with the month in which you are 65. Ellifritz said. If you sign up in the month you reach 65 or later, your protection will not begin until one to three months later, he added.

Ellifritz warned that if you fail to sign up for medical insurance during the three months before you are 65 or during the three months after you reach 65, you will not have another chance to sign up until the next enrollment period which begins October 1 and ends December 31.

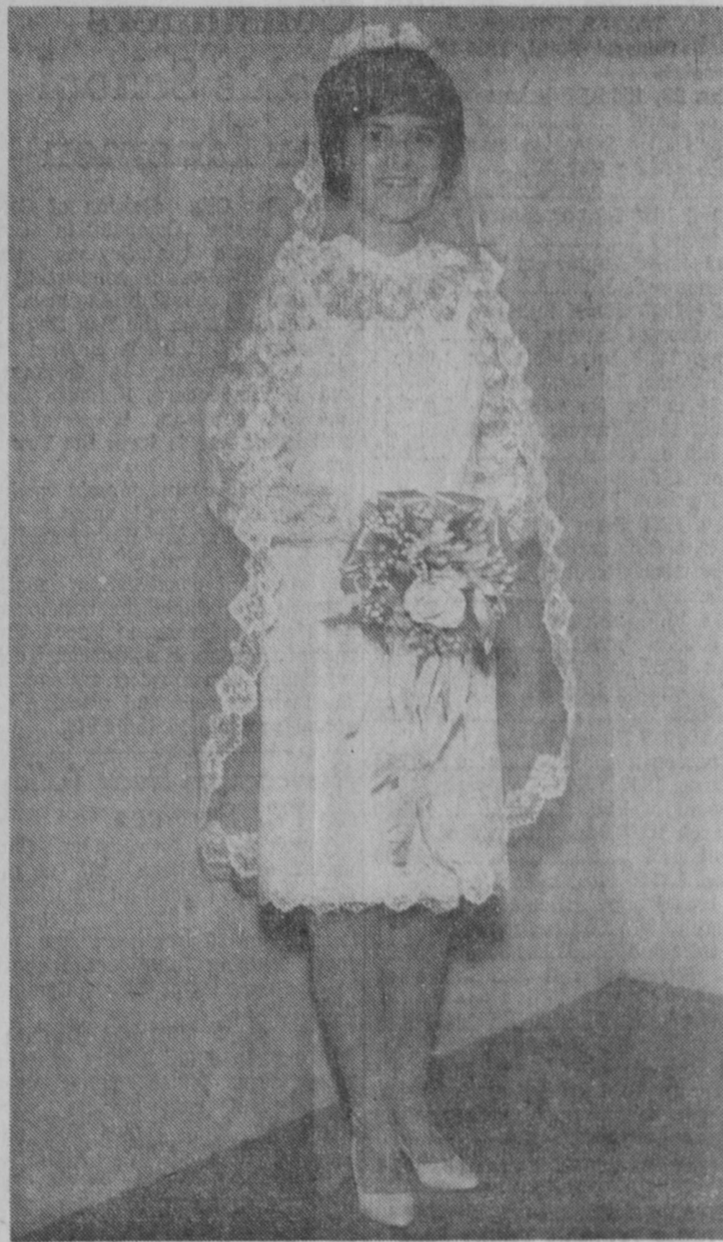

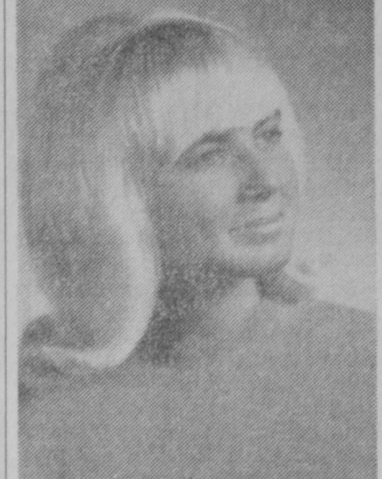

Milk Dumped in Iosco Strike Incident Near Five Channels

As the withholding action of the National Farmers Organization enters its 15th day today (Wednesday), Iosco County has escaped much of the violence and vandalism reported in adjacent counties and other areas of the state.

The only incident reported by state police was the dumping of a half a truckload of milk north of Hale last Thursday night.

LaVerne Peterson of Turner, who was making regular pickups in the north end of the county, stopped his truck on M-65 and entered Evergreen Market.

Unidentified persons dumped 32 10-gallon cans of milk which were loaded on his truck. State police said that the value of the milk was \$120.

Other incidents were reported along the Ogemaw-Iosco line where feelings are running high between

neighbors. Some of the dairy farmers in that area are members of the Michigan Milk Producers Association, which has continued to ship milk, while others are NFO members taking part in the withholding action.

County Agent Marvin Davenport said Tuesday morning that of the 165 dairy farmers listed in Iosco, about 43 are grade A producers. Only about four or five large producers are located in the eastern half of the county and milk shipments have continued.

NFO pickets showed up at dairies in a number of Southern Michigan cities Monday. The organization's request for intervention by the governor is under study.

The organization is withholding milk from the market in an effort to boost prices on milk. The strike covers a 29-state area.

Nonparticipating milk producers and milk truck drivers have reported milk spoiled by fuel oil and gasoline, tank trucks punctured by bullets and the dynamiting of one home.

Police Check on Long Lake B&E

Breaking and entering of a gasoline station at Long Lake March 25 is under investigation by state police from East Tawas.

Owner Arnold Edwards reported that the loot included 36 packs of beer, seven bottles of wine, 20 cartons of cigarettes and 40 packages of lunch meat.

Entry was gained by breaking a window.

Observe Kite Flying Safety Rules, Asks CP

"Fly your kite, if you must, but observe simple kite safety rules," said L. A. Vaupre, division manager of Consumers Power Company's Bay City Division.

"Each spring, we expect a number of calls from parents whose youngsters have tangled kites with electric equipment in their neighborhood," he said.

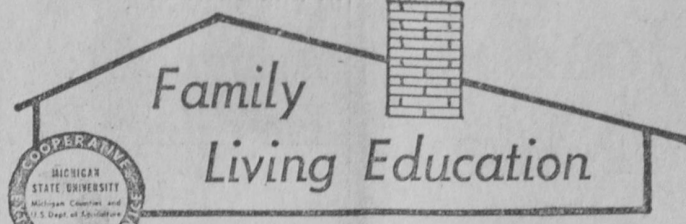
And, each spring, youngsters are asked to observe these simple rules:

1. Always use dry string, wood and paper in your kite . . . not wire or metal.
2. Always fly your kite on days when there is no rain.
3. Always avoid busy streets and highways while flying your kite.
4. Always fly your kite away from TV and radio aerials, electric or power lines.
5. Always keep away from fallen wires.
6. Always call your power company if your kite gets snagged in a power line. Do not pull the string or climb power poles.

"Consumers Power has distributed kite flying safety rules to a number of schools in this area," Mr. Vaupre said. "We hope there will be no unhappy incidents during March and early April, Michigan's kite season," he said.

"An 11-year-old Michigan boy narrowly escaped with his life last spring when his kite became entangled in electric lines while he was using metallic string to fly it," Mr. Vaupre said.

"That is why we ask parents, as well as children, to go fly a kite—but do it safely," he said.

What Are US No. 1 Potatoes?

Spring is in between time for potatoes. We are using the last of the fall crop or "old" potatoes, and though it is still pretty early for southern grown or "new" potatoes, we will see them soon.

Many homemakers are disappointed in their potato choices. Information required by law to appear on potato bags is not adequate and often leaves the food shopper disappointed with the quality and unhappy with the "cooked" product. Why does this happen? Most potatoes marketed in our area carry the US No. 1 grade. This is a wholesale grade and is actually the second grade classification. (The top wholesale grade is US Fancy.)

Potatoes sold as US No. 1 can range in size from 1 $\frac{1}{8}$ inches in diameter to as big as they grow.

(The grade standard limits the number of small potatoes allowed in the bag.) It also limits the number of defects allowed. For example, in a 100-pound bag of US No. 1 potatoes, up to six pounds may have external defects and up to five pounds may have internal defects. Many homemakers have not understood this grade and what to expect of it.

Grading regulations do not require that the potato variety be indicated on the package. This makes for dissatisfaction if a homemaker unwittingly bakes a potato meant for boiling or boils a baking potato. As a general rule, there are three basic groups of potatoes and they are not too difficult to recognize. The brown-skinned russet varieties (these are mostly from Idaho, although this marketing season saw more from Michigan) are excellent bakers and mash up well. Red-skinned potatoes are dependable boilers.

Because the chemicals are water soluble, the treatment does not last through washing. It would still be practical to treat again after washing such things as curtains, draperies, pot holders and some clothing items.

Dissolve seven ounces of borax and three ounces of boric acid in two quarts of hot water. Thoroughly wet the cotton items to be treated and dry them by any convenient method. The items will be flame resistant (but not fireproof, of course) until wet or washed.

They hold their shape well for cutting into cubes or slices. The round whites are a catch-all class and more difficult to categorize.

One easy test for "bakers" or "boilers" goes like this: Cut the doubtful potato in half and immediately rub the cut surfaces together. If a very white, frothy foam appears, the potato is mealy textured with a high starch, low sugar content and will be a good baker or masher. If a sticky substance, rather than foam appears, the potato is waxy textured with a high sugar, low starch content and you should boil or fry it.

Flame Resistant Cotton
You can make cotton fabrics temporarily flame retardant with two inexpensive chemicals that are easy to buy.

WB Hospital Addition Set for Completion

A \$630,000 construction program now under way at Tolfree Hospital, West Branch, providing 22 additional beds for intensive care patients as well as to improve and enlarge facilities for other use, will see the first phase completed about May 1.

The addition will increase the patient capacity to 72. The entire project, involving three separate phases, is expected to be finished about July 1 and will include a new maternity wing, a new X-ray suite and other facilities.

Funds for improvements at the city-operated hospital came from accumulated reserves in the hospital's depreciation and funding account of approximately \$300,000 and a \$300,000 federal Hill-Burton grant, plus a short term loan financed locally for \$30,000.

Construction of the addition and facilities being installed is designed so as to meet future requirements. A second and third floor could be added to bring the bed capacity of the hospital to 150 or more.
