Ask any oldtimer in Northeastern Michigan rural areas about Irish and one would learn that he was considered one of the best fiddlers that ever played at dances in

these parts. Here in Iosco County, Irish played with a three-piece "combo" at Alabaster for a number of years, along with Mrs. Harry Bolen on the piano and George Shotwell on the drums. He and his wife played for three years at Skidway Lake in Ogemaw County and at countless other dance engagements.

native of Prescott, Irish learned the sawmill business from his father, Edmund Irish, starting when he was only 16 years old.

"That first year, I lost my right thumb while working in the mill. I overcame that handicap but, as far as my violin lessons were concerned, I was more interested in sawmills than I was in studying music." he said.

Earl's first job was firing a Case steam traction engine and his love of steam power lasted nearly a lifetime. It was not until 1934 that he retired the old engine and replaced it with a gasoline tractor to furnish power for his mill and equipment.

Irish operated his portable mill in 10 Michigan counties over the years-Wayne, Washtenaw, Saginaw, Bay, Clare, Arenac, Ogemaw, Montmorency, Alcona and Iosco-besides operating threshing equipment in the Iosco-Ogemaw area for 32 seasons.

When he first started work with his father in the portable mill, they received \$2.50 per thousand feet of lumber, much of it being hemlock, which was still quite plentiful in those days. After three years, they received \$3 per thousand and, when he quit operating his mill in the 1920s, he was receiving \$6 per thousand. The price today for custom sawing runs from \$20 to \$22 per thousand




