In addition to your skill in the basic construction techniques, what are the details which would give this outfit a custom made look? The double-breasted coat front deserves the attention of bound buttonholes with fabric covered buttons or a little splurge on couture buttons. The front pockets hidden in the seams are a sign

of custom made clothes, easy to omit in an inferior copy. Unbutton the coat to show off the hip-hugging skirt with its very important belt. The loops, equally vital to keep the belt in its proper place, are constructed in one long piece, then cut into four parts; the length of each is determined by the width of the belt. After stitching the lower edge of each loop to the skirt at darts, the top edge is stitched into the seam of the skirt and waist facing. You might want to buy a gold chain or handsome leather belt to encircle your hips, or better yet, make yourself a fabric belt to match or contrast with the skirt. 


