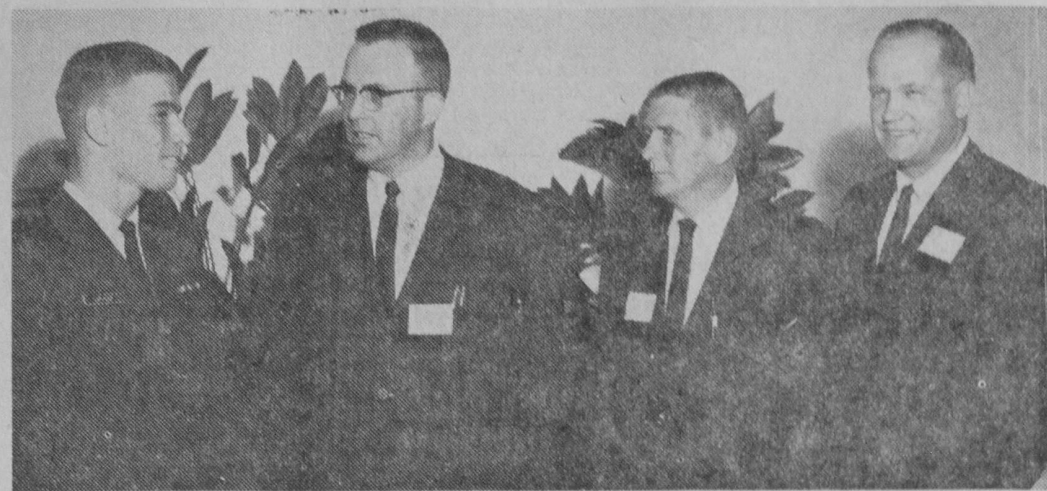


Vandals Destroyed Playground Ride

present. This possibility had been suggested by the chairman of the county board of supervisors last week, who said supervisors would offer their assistance in submitting millage proposals to school district voters.

Mrs. Norman Payea, trustee, felt that schools received a bad reputation by asking for additional operational money. She said, however, that "I think we have to understand the county's needs and try to learn more about the county's budget."

Trustee Robert Elliott Jr. was of the opinion that schools should not be at loggerheads with the county. "We should run our ship and they run theirs. We should go to the allocation board and tell them what we are going to lose."

Elliott was of the opinion that it was not easier for schools to obtain additional operational millage than it is for the board of supervisors. Looking at federal and state taxable methods with no local control, Elliott said that a millage vote "is the only time people have a chance to vote on additional taxes."

Should the preliminary allocation order stand, it would have no effect on the school's present staff. Teachers now on the staff must be re-employed for the 1967-1968 school year as the tenure law demands notification by April 1. The school has also made commitments to hire five additional

teachers.

Approximately \$35,000 could be gained by not hiring a French teacher (\$7,000), cut out all inter-scholastic athletics (\$4,000 in salaries), cut out grade physical education (\$7,000), cut out grade vocal music, cut out high school vocal music (\$7,000), limit pupils to four subjects, eliminate all extra curricular trips and eliminate purchase of new playground equipment.

Also included would be to hold back on a shop option to renovate rooms for class uses, study each department of the school to see what savings could be made by eliminating purchase of new buildings, maintenance would be at a minimum and there would be no replacement of furniture under such an austerity program.

Mr. Mick said that such cut backs, no doubt, would have some affect on the present school staff. "I think we might have more vacancies and some would be moving without a doubt."

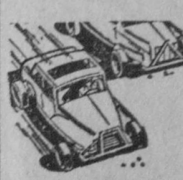

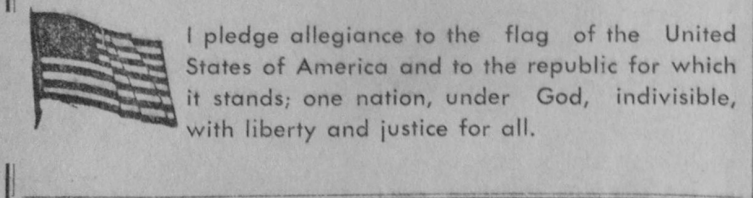

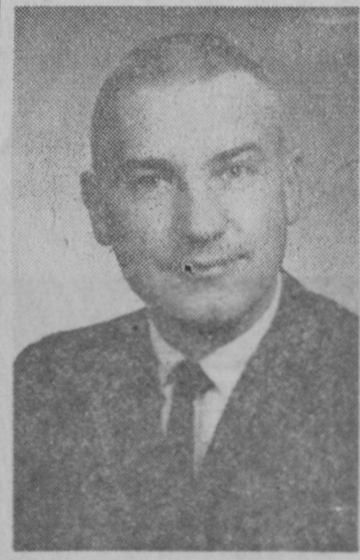

Iosco Seeks Hatchery-

Conservation Dept. Tells of Fishery Plans

Representatives of the Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation met May 10 with representatives of the Michigan Department of Conservation's fish division.

Pres. Charles Schreck, Dr. Norman Payea, Marvin Davenport and Kenneth Conn met with David Borgeson and Wayne Tody, chief of the fish division.

Aim of the Tawas group was to discover what the department's plans were with regard to salmon and trout programs in this area and to attempt to have the department step up its program to prevent further loss to the tourist industry. Further aim was to determine if it might be possible for the state to locate one of the proposed hatcheries in this county.

The group was told that until such time as the predatory lamprays that infest local waters are controlled to the extent that they will not make serious inroad on fish, there will be no plantings. Under the present program, small fish may be planted safely in the spring of 1969, at which time all suitable streams here are to be stocked.

To fulfill the department's program, money and other legislative considerations are necessary. The department asks that Iosco give active support to its program and will keep the area informed of needs as the program progresses.

There will be a complete report to the legislature in September with a request for appropriations and Iosco will at that time be asked to give active support by urging local government to get behind the program, as well as local civic, sports and conservation clubs.

In the complete program, there will be five hatcheries constructed, each capable of rearing 7 1/2 million fish. Completion date for these to be fully operable in 1972, with annual plantings of 30,000,000 that year and in succeeding years. Two hatcheries have been designated and programs for these are in the initial stages.

Studies are to be made of water and sites in this area to determine if there is sufficient flow of the type of ground water necessary for the rearing of fish. Every consideration is to be given this area as a hatchery location, if the study proves favorable.

Conn said the department believes the hatcheries will be an excellent tourist attraction, but, that as an industry, would employ only eight to 10 persons.

"The department indicates that as a purely industrial project, we should not be concerned with the hatchery location. Rather, the area should be primarily concerned with the stocking of fish, which will be sufficient numbers so that cities such as ours could have from one to 400 charter fishing boats operating from docks," said Conn.

"This, indeed, would be industry, with a tremendous impact on our tourist facilities."
