

# Allocation Board Sets Final Millage Order

Iosco Tax Allocation Board compromised on its action of two weeks ago and divided one mill between the county and schools.

The board's preliminary action had given the "extra" mill to aid operation of the county. That action came on a three to two roll call but, with a full board present last Thursday, six different roll calls on five propositions were required before a majority could be reached.

Final order adopted by the board resulted in the following allocation: Schools, 8.50 mills; county, 5.35 mills; intermediate school district, .15 of a mill and township one mill.

Except for the one mill it took away from the county last year and gave to schools and was finally split between schools and the county under the final order,

allocation board members were of the opinion that the remaining millage should be left the same as in previous years, regardless of eyes cast in various directions by those preparing budgets.

Arden Charters, allocation board chairman, said during the hearing that the "handwriting was on the wall," insofar as any action taken by the board could not meet the necessary funds for any budgets which had been submitted.

It is expected that Tawas Area School and Oscoda Area School will place millage proposals before voters sometime this summer. Anticipated action of the state legislature will probably require an 11-mill local levy for schools to receive full state aid participation. Tawas Area has one year to go on its one-mill special voted tax, while Oscoda's one mill tax expired this year.

Iosco County is expected to end the current year with a deficit of approximately \$67,000. L. S. Little, chairman of the board of supervisors' finance committee, believed the county could "struggle along" next year on an allocation of 5.55, which did not receive a majority vote of the allocation board. Taking the matter before voters by asking additional operational millage may be discussed at the June meeting, but such a move was unsuccessful last year and has received little encouragement. Officials of the county have stated that some services may have to be curtailed until 1969, when Iosco is expected to receive some help when it adopts the new Gem Survey property appraisal schedule.

With a budget of \$433,600, Iosco County would have required 7.21 mills. The final order of 5.35 mills will raise \$321,715, or \$111,885 under its budget.

Tawas Area School's budget of \$418,918 would have required 14.60 mills to meet. Under the final allocation of 8.5 mills, plus one voted mill, \$242,947 will be raised for operation, or \$175,971 less than its budget.

Hale Area School submitted a budget of \$170,327, which would have required an allocation of 17.50 mills. The final order of 8.5 mills plus the four voted will raise \$120,803, or \$49,434 under the budget.

Oscoda Area's budget of \$343,651 would have required 11 mills to meet. The final order of 8.50 mills will raise \$265,551, or \$78,100 under the original request.

Iosco Intermediate School District submitted a \$16,279 budget. It will receive \$12,209 under the 15 mill allocation, or \$4,069 less than its budget.

Two different moves to take one-half mill away from townships, and another taking away one-quarter mill, did not meet approval of the allocation board.

A meeting has been called for June 6 between representatives of the board of supervisors and schools to discuss current financial problems. While it is too late to place a pegged millage proposal before voters this year, it may come under consideration next year.

Under such a plan, up to three additional mills could be voted above the 15-mill tax limitation for a period of years. Millage so voted would be stabilized, thus going away with functions of an allocation board.

Currently operating under this system is Whittemore-Prescott Area School, with its larger area in Ogemaw County. It receives 9½ mills for operation and has special voted millage.

Members of the allocation board are Charters, William Weryley, Russell A. Rollin Sr., County Treas. Edward Nelkie, Intermediate District Supt. Ernest Jordan and Little.

## County Records Five Highway Deaths Within Seven-Day Period

Five traffic fatalities in a span of seven days has raised the death toll to seven on Iosco County highways thus far this year.

A week of tragedy started May 21 when Wilfred Hughes, Alabaster, was killed in an auto accident on South US-23, Tawas City. Three persons lost their lives and one person was injured in a crash Friday morning five miles west of the Tawas and a Whittemore mother was killed early Sunday morning on M-55, lacking only a few minutes and one week to the day that Hughes was killed.

Killed in a two-car head-on crash at 7:10 a. m. Friday were Frederick A. Rempert, 46, Tawas City; William H. Newhouse, 21, Tawas City, and Randy L. Roach, 19, East Tawas. The latter two men were home on leave from military service.

Rempert's son, Floyd, 16, was injured in the crash and taken to Tawas Hospital.

According to state police, the crash occurred when the Newhouse car, traveling east, swerved over the centerline and crashed head-on into the west bound Rempert vehicle.

Roach was dead at the scene while Newhouse and Floyd Rempert were rushed to Tawas Hospital by ambulance. Newhouse died at the hospital. Both Newhouse and Roach had been thrown from their convertible car by the impact.

Mr. Rempert was pinned in his smashed station wagon for more than an hour while a wrecker, state police, ambulance attendants and volunteers labored to free him. A wrecker and a gravel truck, pulling from opposite ends of the smashed vehicle, finally freed him. He was taken to Tawas Hospital but succumbed to chest injuries before reaching there.

Traffic was held up for more than an hour on M-55 before wreckers got the cars off the highway.

Another tragic accident early Sunday morning left two babies motherless in the death of Mrs. June R. Smith, 22, Whittemore. Harvey H. Smith, 32, Whittemore, husband of the victim, was driving on M-45 just south of Barr Road when the car suddenly veered across the center line. The car skidded 445 feet, eight inches after brakes were applied, skidding backwards across a ditch, hitting and jumping over an earth embankment, about 56 feet from the road.

When the car hit the bank, the right front door flew open and

## NLRB Gives Approval to Local Union Merger

National Labor Relations Board has upheld a January 24, 1967, ruling allowing merging of two Iosco locals of the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers International Union, AFL-CIO.

Local 7371 of the union had been certified August 13, 1964, as the exclusive bargaining representative of employees of United States Gypsum Company. On December 28, 1966, Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers International Union, AFL-CIO, and its Local 7-239 filed a petition to amend this certification by substituting the name of Local 7-239 in place of Local 7-371.

Prior to 1966, Local 7-239 had represented employees of a single employer, National Gypsum Company. In January 1966, its members voted to become an amalgamated local. It currently represents employees of several firms. In March 1966, members of Local 7-239 voted to accept into membership the members of the jointly certified Local 7-371.

According to NLRB findings, membership of Local 7-371 decided to consider the merger with 7-239 and notices were mailed to all of its members, comprising about 35 in the unit of approximately 50 employees. The question was put to a vote at a meeting held May 13, with 15 voting for the merger and two against it.

Since the merger, former members of Local 7-371 while participating with all other members of Local 7-239 in the election of its officers, also elect from their own unit a separate bargaining committee to represent them in bargaining with United States Gypsum Company. Chairman of this committee is automatically a member of the executive committee of the petitioning Local 7-239.

USG's contract with Local 7-371 expired October 17, 1966, and a request to open negotiations for a new contract was transmitted to the employer by letter on August 10, 1966.

According to the NLRB, the employees moved that the petition be dismissed on grounds that the substitution of Local 7-239 for Local 7-371 constituted a change of representatives which raised a question concerning representation resolvable only by an election and a majority of the employees in the certified unit were not afforded an opportunity to express their desires as to the merger.

"In all circumstances," said the NLRB, "we find that the requested substitution of Local 7-239 for Local 7-371 as jointly certified representatives of the employees in the unit insures to these employees a continuity of their present organization and representation."

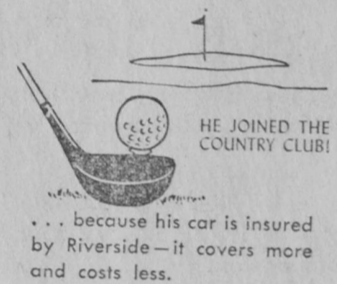

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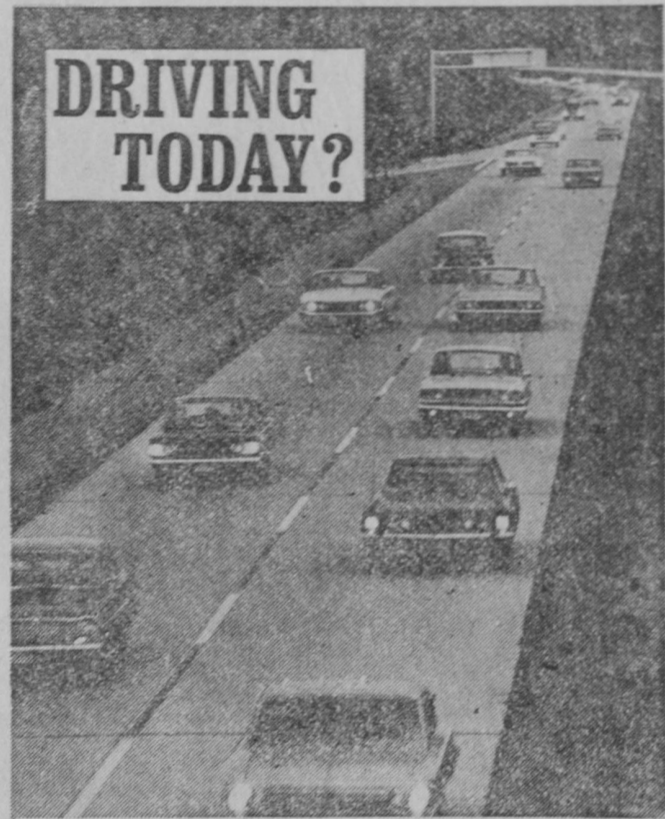

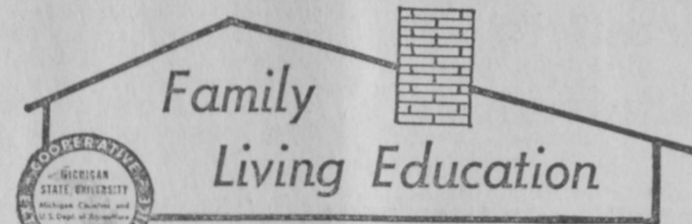

**End of Washday Wrinkles**  
Durable press sheets are solving the problem of wrinkled sheets on washday. The durable press process will permit, provide a smoother appearance.

Blends of cotton and polyester are available in a 50-50 or 65-35 ratio. However, recent studies indicate that durable press sheets wear through faster than sheets with no finish. This means we must decide if we want longer wear or a better appearance when purchasing bed sheets.

**Where Do You Store These Supplies—**  
With the rush of graduation, weddings, bridal and "school out" activities, you have been busily waxing floors, polishing windows and cleaning cupboards. Did you take time to put away all the supplies out of reach of children,

perhaps even finding new safe locations for their storage?

In spite of irritating fumes or horrid taste or smell, small children are prone to eat anything in sight. Camphorated oil, aspirin, oil of wintergreen, laxatives, antiseptics, prescription medicines, cough syrup may be dangerously close to children's reach even though the medicine cabinet seems too high to reach. Little children have no fear of climbing, you know.

Floor and rug cleaners, furniture waxes, bleaches, metal cleaners, matches, auto wax, glue, shoe polish, moth balls and crystals, rust remover are among items commonly left where children can get into them. Many adults have not realized that so many kinds of items are dangerous to children.

**Food Notes—**  
Lots of potatoes—spuds, taters or murrphies—whatever you call them, are coming to market from many growing areas in the nation. Keep in a cool dark place where they can get air.

All eggs sold through regular market channels must carry one of three grade level designations—all top quality grades. Grade AA is the highest quality,

then comes Grade A, third is Grade B. It is unlawful in Michigan to sell either Grade C or cracked eggs to the consumer by the egg processor or the retail store.

## SS Benefits Aid Disabled Workers

Paul M. Ellifritz, Social Security district manager, noted today that social security disability benefits can be paid to workers with disabilities that are expected to keep them from working for 12 months or more.

Until a short time ago, these benefits were payable only in the case of disabilities that were expected to be permanent or to continue indefinitely without recovery.

Under the new provision, a disabled worker may be eligible for disability benefit checks if he has been disabled or is expected to be disabled for at least 12 months. Any person who has an impairment that meets these conditions, should get in touch with his social security office.

Ellifritz added, however, that the work requirements necessary for disability benefits have not been changed. The worker must still have worked under social security at least five years out of the 10-year period ending just before he became disabled in order to qualify for disability payments.

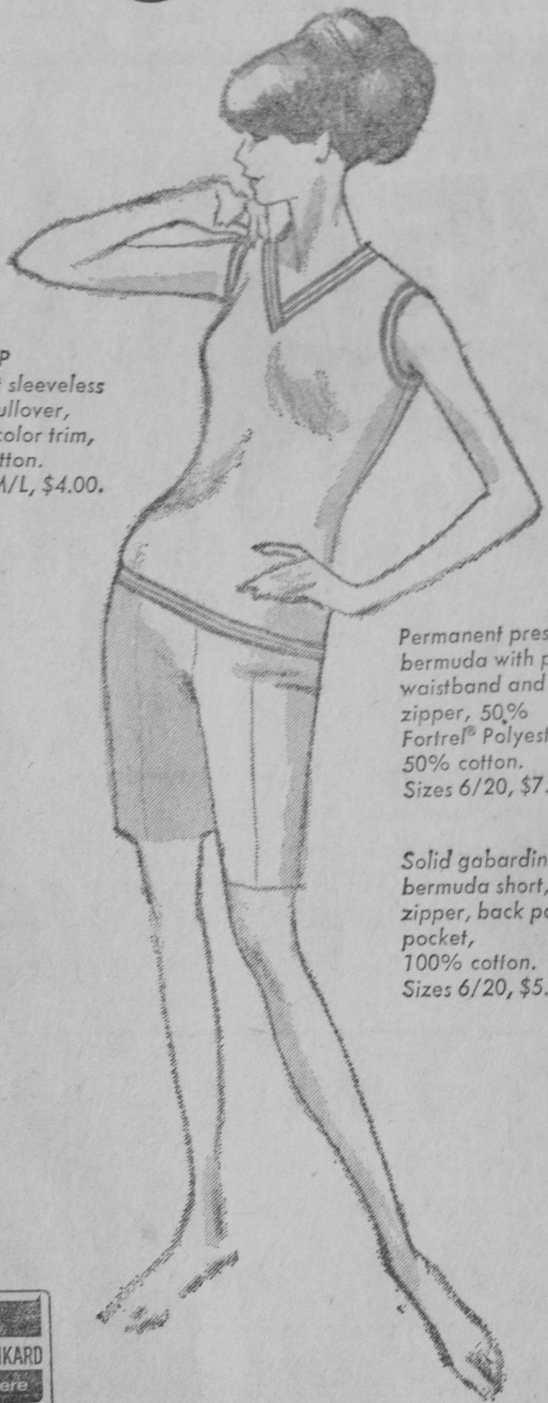

### Breast Cancer Leads Death Toll for Women

(This is the third of a series of six articles by the American Cancer Society on the six most common sites of cancer—uterus, colon and rectum, breast, oral cavity, lung and skin.)

**BREAST CANCER**  
Breast cancer is the leading cause of cancer deaths in women today. There were 63,000 cases in 1966 with an estimated 27,000 deaths. Dr. Harvey Brinkman of the Iosco County Unit of the American Cancer Society, said.

Breast cancer was the first site to be attacked on a massive scale by the society in its public education program. As part of its five-year minimum goal, the society is conducting a specialized education project on breast cancer through which it seeks to encourage the practice of monthly breast self-examination, by at least 50 percent of all women, Dr. Brinkman explained.

"Physicians know that earlier detection could save more lives. Despite all efforts to date, the breast cancer death rate remains high. This could change for the better if more women regularly practiced monthly self-examination and saw their physicians for a checkup once a year.

"Although breast cancer is most common in women of middle age and over, the society recommends that efforts now be directed toward educating girls of high school age by showing the 'Breast Self-Examination' film and film-strip and another film, 'Time and Two Women,' at school showings

while they are accompanied by their mothers."

How important this in-time discovery of breast cancer through self-examination can be seen by two figures, Dr. Brinkman pointed out.

(1) If detected in the still localized stage, before moving out from the original site of occurrence, breast cancer shows a five-year survival rate of 82 percent.

(2) Once "regional involvement" has occurred, however, the percentage of those still alive five years after treatment falls to a discouraging 47 percent.

"It should be emphasized that a substantial majority of breast abnormalities in women are not cancer—they may be cysts, abscesses, changes due to age or something else. But such abnormalities should never be ignored. If there is any doubt at all, a physician should be consulted at once."

The causes of breast cancer are not known. Some patients, when examined, recall having had a blow to the breast and suspect that this is related to the development of a breast tumor. However, a single injury, such as a blow, has never been proved to produce breast cancer. Possibly an injury may attract a patient's attention to her breasts, at which time she may notice a tumor that is already there.

Graduation exercises for the class of 1967 are to be held Thursday, June 1, 8:00 p. m., at Whittemore-Prescott Area High School.

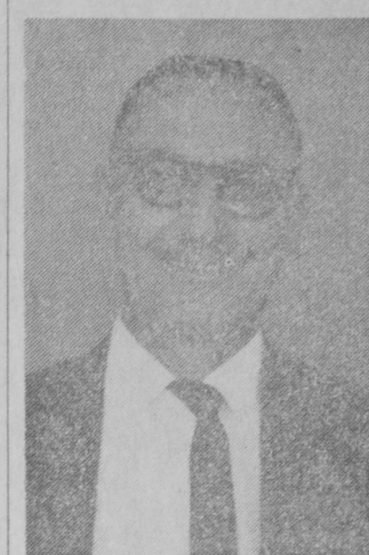
Principal speaker will be Benjamin E. S. Hamilton, an education consultant for the Michigan Department of Education.

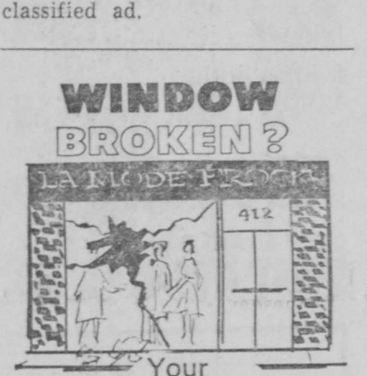
