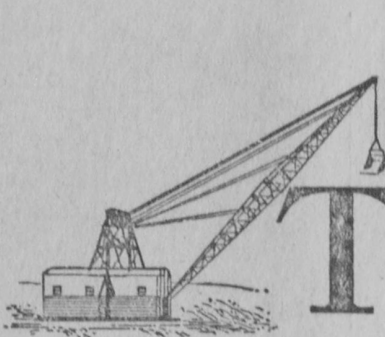

Iosco Had Fair Deer Kill Opening Week-End

Opening week-end on whitetails saw a fair to good kill of deer on Iosco's private hunting clubs and public lands, according to a report Monday morning by Cons. Officer Arthur G. Leitz.

At the same time, Leitz said that his surveys on Saturday and Sunday indicated a larger number of hunters in the area.

While there were only two hunters injured with minor gunshot wounds, area law enforcement officers were busy investigating deer stolen from hunting camps and numerous game law violations. Stolen deer were especially numerous along the AuSable River and at Jose Lake.

On his usual swing around Iosco on Saturday, traveling through public hunting lands of Sherman, Plainfield and Grant Townships, Leitz counted 20 deer, of which two had no antlers. On this same tour last year, he counted five deer.

The conservation department bountied three coyotes killed in the county, of which two were females. One albino deer was shot illegally in Baldwin Township and turned over to the conservation department.

First hunter to report success to the Herald Saturday morning was Norton Freel of Townline Road, who bagged a nice four pointer at 8:15 o'clock. This was followed by a report from Darl Durant, M-55 who bagged a six pointer about 15 minutes earlier. Roy McMurray reported that six hunters in his camp bagged six bucks by Sunday afternoon, including two large racks.

The week-end saw two excellent days of hunting with snow in the air and just the right temperature to keep venison on camp meat poles.

Hunting pressure in the area dropped Monday as indicated by the southbound flow of traffic Sunday afternoon on M-65 and US-23. Activity is expected to be increased Thursday when hunters return to the woods for concentrated drives.

IDC Proposes Committee for Merging Towns

A report from the Tawas Industrial Development Corporation indicates that a 10-man committee for consolidating Tawas City and East Tawas is to be named in early December.

The committee, five men from each community, would present petitions to the county clerk asking for a vote on the proposed merger of the two communities. If successful, the committee would then prepare a new charter.

At its regular meeting last Wednesday night, Tawas City Planning Commission, by a seven to two roll call vote, recommended that steps toward a merger not be taken at this time.

Two Hunters Wounded; One Case Still Open

Two hunters were wounded by gunfire in Iosco County on the opening day of deer hunting.

Charles Tesh, 24, Warren, was taken to Tawas Hospital for treatment of a leg wound while Daniel Landgraf, 41, Detroit, was treated at the Oscoda Medical Center and then transferred to Grace Hospital, Detroit, for a wound in the hand.

Investigating state police said that Tesh shot himself in the right leg at 6:00 a. m. in Oscoda Township. He had just gotten out of his car and was bending over to tie his shoe. A .357 caliber handgun strapped to his waist accidentally discharged and he sustained a minor flesh wound.

Iosco Sheriff's Department and Pros. Atty. J. Richard Ernst are continuing investigation into the shooting which put Landgraf into the hospital.

The victim was shot in the hand by a companion, Haley Hudspeth, Utica.

2 Men Escape Serious Injury in River Plunge

Two 20-year-old Tawas City men escaped serious injury Saturday night when their car struck the East Tawas bridge and plunged into the Tawas River.

Treated and released Sunday from Tawas Hospital was Gary S. Smith, driver. A passenger, Jerry Clements, was held at the hospital for observation.

East Tawas Police said that the Smith car, traveling east on Nunn Road about 45 miles per hour, was unable to stop at the intersection with Bridge Street. The driver applied his brakes but the road was slippery. The car went out of control, skidded into the bridge and then plunged into the river on its top.

Water in the river is about four feet deep at that point and the driver was able to make his escape. Clements was apparently knocked unconscious and Smith found him at the rear of the car.

Other motorists aided Smith in bringing Clements to shore and artificial respiration was given. They were both taken to Tawas Hospital by ambulance.

The car, removed from the river by a Huron Auto Parts wrecker, was a total loss.

Two Bids Accepted Monday Sewer Project in Tawas City Starts Soon

Two bids were accepted Monday night completing negotiations for construction of the Mathews Street sewer project in Tawas City.

The city council accepted the low bid of Gary D. Steadman, Incorporated, Bay City, of \$30,775.60 for construction of the project and accepted the bid of Kenower-MacArthur Company, Detroit, through Peoples State Bank of East Tawas as its local agent, for purchase of \$34,000 in special assessment bonds.

A report from Spicer Engineering Company, the city's consulting engineer from Saginaw, recommended the awarding of the contract to Steadman following a complete tabulation of all six bids which were opened last week.

Bid on the bond issue was four and three-quarters percent interest for bonds maturing in 1969 to 1977 and 4 1/2 percent on bonds maturing in the last year of 1978. Total interest rate to be paid on the project is \$9,913.

Joseph Peel, a representative of the Detroit law firm handling the city's financing of this project, felt that the lone bond bid was very favorable, considering events during the past two weeks which have tended to "dry up" money available on the market.

The project consists of 3,024 feet of sanitary sewer running along both sides of US-23 from Mathews Street south. There are to be slightly more than 30 property connections.

Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, said he expected the project would require about three weeks for completion and is to be commenced shortly.

In other business, a census report from Mrs. Alton Long was accepted by the council. This report, to be used in redistricting wards of the city for election purposes under the one-man, one-vote rule, gives a street-by-street listing of all residents. Councilmen John St. James and Daniel Ulrich, along with Bublitz, are to make the final tabulation from this report and present at the next council meeting. The city is required to have a redistricting plan by December 31 for submission to the state.

One building application was approved during the past two weeks. This was for Robert Rollin, 1129 South US-23, construction of 58 by 30-foot residence in the Brown Addition, \$15,000.

Four Braves Win Honors on All NBC Football Squad

Three schools dominated selections for the mythical 1967 NBC all-conference football squad at a meeting of coaches held last Wednesday night at West Branch.

Balloting by players and coaches saw four members of the second place Tawas Area Braves named to the squad, followed by three from the Oscoda Owls, conference champions, and one from West Branch.

Representing Tawas in the all-conference honors were Dale Koepke, John Crisenbery, Howard Rollin and Fred Look, all but one being seniors.

Koepke was the mainstay of the Braves all season. Running the team as quarterback in every game, he was the team's leading groundgainer, a standout on defense and an excellent punter. This was Dale's first year in football competition.

Crisenbery, in his second year at a tackle slot, was one of the standouts on Tawas' defense unit, which held opposing teams to 70 points in the nine games played. John was a leading tackler during the season which saw Tawas end with six wins, two losses (one being a nonconference game) and one tie with Pinconning Spartans.

Rollin and Look were both named to end positions. Rollin was a hard-nosed defensive player for two seasons and a team leader, blocking three punts and was the best pass charger in the league. Look, the lone junior among the four Tawas players, was the team's leading pass catcher. His most memorable play was against West Branch when he caught a tie-breaking catch with less than a minute to go.

On defense, Koepke averaged seven tackles per game, had 11 pass interceptions, was the third leading tackler on the team, averaged 25 yards on kickoff and punt returns. He passed for six touchdowns and ran seven touchdowns during the year. He had a 40-yard yard average.

Tawas Area had two boys receiving honorable mention. Jon Schirmer, co-captain with Crisenbery, was the team's leading tackler and averaged nine per game. Mark Harris, offensive right halfback, scored two touchdowns during the year and had one pass interception.

Representing Oscoda were Cory Gildersleeve, 210-pound junior tackle; Guy Savin, 225-pound sen-

ior tackle, and Jim Gates, 165-pound junior halfback, who scored the Owls' only touchdown in their 6-0 win over Tawas.

Essexville's three all-conference selections were Bob Vermeesch, 140-pound junior halfback; Jeff Davis, 190-pound senior center, and Dan Nemode, 200-pound senior tackle.

Only other school to place on the all conference team was West Branch with the Orioles' hard-hitting Doug Bell, a 195-pound senior, being a standout for two seasons.

Other players receiving honorable mention were: Ends—Russ Wittkopp of Essexville and Al Walker of Oscoda; linemen—Ken Meddaugh of Pinconning, Mike Babcock and Steve Pratt of Gladwin, Lenny Chaltrow and Ron LeClair of Standish-Sterling, Pat Johnson of Essexville, Len Matthews and Darrell Chinger of West Branch, Tim Hacker of Oscoda.

Backs receiving honorable mention were Jake Martonosi, Jeff Redmond and Jeff Juneac, Gladwin; Dale Lewis, Dan MacKenzie, Ken Kuehnemann and Terry Wilczek, Pinconning; Randy Gagnels and Jim Daniels, Oscoda.

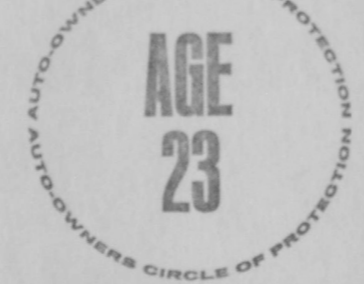

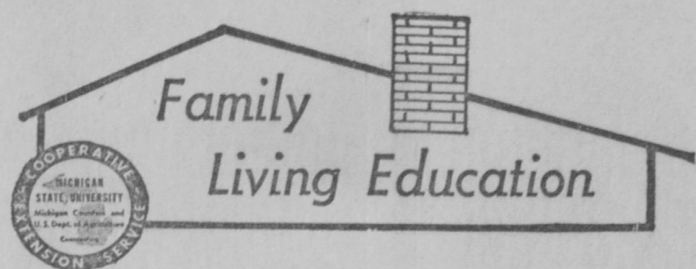

It was Moses who first asked for a feast of Thanksgiving after the great gathering from the threshing floor and the wine press. Governor Bradford of the Pilgrim settlement at Plymouth, also felt the need for a celebration in thanks for the abundant harvest which followed a year of starvation and death. Even the Indians contributed to the feast which lasted three days. Wild turkey, deer and fish heaped the tables. From then on New England set aside a day of Thanksgiving to close each good harvest season. Our first president, George Washington, proclaimed the first national day of thanks on October 3, 1789. It was President Lincoln, who established the fourth Thursday of November as the official date. Thanksgiving and Christmas are the two most important family holidays and really become treasures of family's memories. Roast turkey, cranberry sauce and pumpkin pie spell Thanksgiving throughout this country. Family members decide well in advance who has the largest dining room to accommodate the gathering and the largest kitchen for preparing the dinner. We really have it easy these days in the preparation of the Thanksgiving dinner compared to just a few years ago. Consider the turkey! Just a few years ago, an order for the turkey of the desired size was placed with a local farmer. The turkey was delivered a day or two before the big day and then the work began. First, it had to be dressed out. Then, all the extra pin feathers had to be removed and the fine fuzz singed off, before it could be stuffed and baked. In contrast—stop a minute and

think of our many choices! We go to the market, pick up a frozen bird—taking our choice of size from four pounds to 20, 22 and up to 30 pounds. Practically any turkey we choose will have been federally inspected (for wholesomeness) and graded (for quality). Look for those labels—they are important. Pink Color in Turkey Meat A commonly asked question concerns the pink color in the meat, black bones and bloody bones of the cooked turkey. Pink color is normal in meats cooked slowly and with moist heat. The nitrates in many usual seasonings will intensify the color. Meat can be completely cooked and still have a pale, pinkish appearance. Darkened bones are one of the best indications of a young bird. As the bird gets older, the bones mature and there is less blood in the bones. Glazed Cooked Vegetables For that special vegetable for a holiday meal, try glazed sweet potatoes, carrots or parsnips. Blend two tablespoons butter or margarine with one-fourth cup brown sugar and one tablespoon water in a heavy fry pan over low heat. Add three cups cooked vegetable. Cook over low heat, turning vegetables several times until sirup is very thick and vegetables are well coated—takes from five

to 10 minutes. Keep heat low to prevent scorching.

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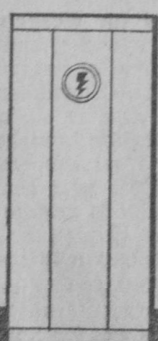

15 Years Ago—

One of the better known planning and development technicians of the country, Wood was chief of the area division of the Michigan Department of Economic Development prior to coming to the railroad.

All is in readiness at Silver Valley with the old wooden toboggan slides replaced with new steel slides and a clay bottom for the ice skating rink. The two projects were completed last week.

Seven lettermen returned to the Tawas City High School basketball team for the 1952-53 season. They are Art Anschutz, Rolli Gackstetter, Gary Humphrey, Roland Davis, Tom Morley, Duane Wright and Bill Brown. Moving up from the junior varsity will be Charles Binder, Edward Davison and Herb Wendt.

Mrs. Royden Parkinson was elected president of the Hale Health Unit at its annual meeting Monday. Mrs. George Lake is secretary and Mrs. John Mortenson was named treasurer.

Retail merchants of East Tawas met at Ossie's Lakeview Grill Wednesday. Howard Somers of Central Michigan College conducted a roundtable discussion on Christmas merchandising.

The loop in Dead Creek near the Elgin Hill residence on Sixth Avenue will soon be a thing of the past. About one more day will be required to fill the old creek bed. Completion of this project, which rerouted the creek bed, is a decided improvement to the property at this point on Sixth Avenue.

25 Years Ago—

November 20, 1942—A Standish man was shot and killed near Glennie when a hunters' bullet pierced his chest. Riding in the back seat of a car driven by two conservation officers, Charles Lentz, 35, died almost immediately. Officers held a hunter, who admitted that he had caught a glimpse of the car fenders through the brush, thought it was a deer and fired. He is now awaiting criminal charges at Harrisville.

Hale's business section just completed the biggest week-end in history. Stores were kept open from Friday morning until late Sunday evening when hundreds of hunters crowded into town. Many clerks went 24 hours without sleep. Atkinson's restaurant closed its doors about 2:00 p. m. Saturday, while fresh supplies of food were prepared for the hungry hunters.

Restaurants, hotels and other institutional users of coffee must register at the local War Price and Rationing Board where they are registering for sugar in order to purchase coffee after the effective date of the rationing order.

The Armistice Day tree planting program, sponsored by the Grange and assisted by various organizations of Hale, saw a tree being planted for each man in service from Plainfield Township.

The City of Algiers, important transportation nerve center in French Algeria, North Africa, surrendered to attacking American forces shortly after the long-awaited second front against the Nazis was opened. An army task force left New Caledonia in the Coral Sea to reinforce United States Marines fighting in the Solomon Islands in the north.

35 Years Ago—

November 25, 1932 — Unless commercial trucks are properly regulated, State Tax Commissioner M. B. tral is already considering petitioning the Interstate Commerce Commission for permission to abandon its line from Bay City to Mackinaw City.

E. A. Leaf of East Tawas moved his drug store this week into the new Henry building. The new building was designed for the requirements of a modern drug store.

Of the more than a quarter of a million dollars which will be spent on national forests in the lake states to relieve suffering and distress this winter, nearly \$80,000 will be spent in Michigan. Government-owned national forest lands in the state amount to 614,385 acres, of which 342,710 acres are within Huron National Forest. Men are to be hired from lists provided by the poor commission and camps are being considered along the AuSable River. Work will consist of construction of fire towers, telephone lines and other improvements.

The telephone "destroyers" were at their job again Saturday night in Sherman Township. It seems they are bound to keep the line west of the town hall out of commission. This time they took the wire and insulators for about one-half mile. Perhaps the next time, they will take wire, poles and all. It is hoped that the guilty ones will be caught in their bold-

ness and the law take them in charge.

Total cost of instruction for the current year for the county normal training class maintained at East Tawas was \$4,750, of which \$3,000 was appropriated by the auditor general, according to Margaret E. Worden, commissioner of schools.

The county road commission purchased an 80-acre parcel of land in Burleigh Township at a cost of \$800 on which there is a limestone pit. The commission is looking ahead with the possibility of furnishing cheap road materials for the entire county. Gravel pits are presently located near Long Lake and in Oscoda Township.

According to a resolution of the board of supervisors, when the county poor commission is asked for aid by an individual who is able bodied physically, the individual shall work and pay for the goods, or the amount supplied, by doing any work required by the poor commissioners as they shall direct until such amount is paid. Total debits of temporary relief and operation of the poor farm during the year amounted to \$13,839.
