

Discuss Possibility of Police Dept. Merger

Possible establishment of an intermunicipality police authority was discussed at Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council.

Mayor James Campbell said that under a recent act passed by the legislature, local governments are authorized to enter into agreements to provide mutual police assistance in emergencies and to provide compensation for service.

He said that the new statute also permitted adjacent units to create intermunicipal police authorities in nonemergency continuing situations. Such an agreement would create a joint police force.

Full context of the act is to be obtained by the council for further investigation.

Discussion was also heard on possible merger of East Tawas and Tawas City into one governmental unit. Mayor Campbell said that it appeared that such a merger would result in some economies, as well as to provide better service for tax money expended.

In other business, the council

authorized transferring an unspecified amount of money to the improvement fund to be used in conjunction with efforts of the Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation to promote business and industry in the area. It was felt that all local governmental units should follow suit.

Name Study Group for Iosco Museum

A six-member committee was appointed last week by Charles Smith, chairman of the Iosco Board of Supervisors, to determine possible interest in a county historical commission with the possible goal being establishment of a county museum.

Named as chairman of the study committee was John Weible, Alabaster Township supervisor, who proposed formation of such a committee on the first day of the October session.

Others named to the study group were Charles A. Pinkerton Jr., Sup. L. S. Little, Mrs. Hazel Silas, K. Berkeley Smith and Neil Thornton.

Named in an advisory capacity were Miss Edna Otis, county historian, and Joseph Barkman.

Tawas Teachers Introduced to P-TA

Teachers of Tawas Area Schools were introduced at Monday night's meeting of Tawas Area Parent-Teacher Association. Introductions were made by Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal, and Billy R. Wilder, secondary principal.

John Alexander explained improvements to the school's curriculum to the more than 250 persons in attendance at East Tawas Elementary Unit.

In other business, three persons were named as the county's building authority committee. This included Gordon Huck, Bruce Myles and Arthur Aulerich.

Much of the October session was concerned with final adoption of a 1968 budget. The final budget adopted was \$432,000. Total amount to be raised by taxes is \$331,000. With anticipated taxes of \$321,715, a deficit of \$9,284 is anticipated.

Other committee work of the supervisors included adoption of the 1967 tax spread, showing what each unit pays for county operation, medical care building voted, intermediate school district, special education, school operating, voted school operating, school building voted, school debt retirement and township voted.

The board waived a \$750 charge outstanding against Sherman Township for the Elm Creek Drain clean-out. This charge had been on the county's books since the project was completed two years ago.

A proposed ordinance for sanitation and garbage disposal was submitted to the zoning coordinating committee, drains and ditches committee and judicial committee for study. The ordinance had been recommended by District Health Unit No. 2.

The November session of the board was suspended, according to custom established in past years, and the next meeting was set for December 6.

Iosco Republicans to Pay Tribute to 'Al' Cederberg

Plan Tawas Bay Yacht Club Reception and Pot-Luck Dinner at Oscoda

Plans are now complete for the day-long program Saturday, October 21, in honor of Cong. Elford A. Cederberg, Bay City, who has represented the 10th Congressional District of Michigan for the past 15 years.

Sponsored by the Iosco Republican Committee, the tribute includes a party Saturday afternoon, 3 to 5 o'clock, at the Tawas Bay Yacht Club, followed by an old-fashioned pot-luck dinner to be held at Oscoda Area High School, 6:30 p. m.

County Republican Chairman Merton Killey said that speakers during the day would include State Sen. Robert Richardson, State Rep. George A. Prescott and

Jerry Rowe, state central committee.

A plaque is to be presented to Cederberg during Saturday afternoon's affair at the yacht club, along with a formal resolution from the Iosco Board of Supervisors.

"This local program has been arranged as a means of expressing our thanks to Congressman Cederberg for his long and faithful service to residents of the 10th district and to show our appreciation for all that he has done for residents of the area since 1952," said Killey.

Cederberg was elected to the 83rd congress on November 4, 1952, succeeding the late Roy O.

Woodruff, and has served continuously since that time.

He is presently a member of the house committee on appropriations and serves on two important subcommittees. One is the appropriations subcommittee on state, justice, judiciary and the commerce departments. The other is the appropriations subcommittee on military construction.

He previously served four years on the post office and civil service committee and on the merchant marine and fisheries committee. He is a part of the Republican leadership organization of the house of representatives under the Republican floor leader, Rep. Jerry Ford.

Cederberg was born March 6, 1918, at Bay City, where he and his family make their home. He attended public schools of Bay City and Bay City Junior College.

He served in the army from April 1941 to December 1945, winning five campaign battle stars after landing with the 83rd division at Normandy and fought with it across France and Germany. He was discharged with the rank of captain.

After managing a Bay City manufacturing firm, he first entered politics in 1949 when he was elected mayor of Bay City, serving four years at that post and also as a member of the Bay County Board of Supervisors.

City Attorney Thinks Annexation Unlikely

Following several weeks of discussion, City Atty. Alf C. Watson Monday night questioned the legality of a proposed annexation of property in Tawas City's First Ward by the City of East Tawas.

The property, comprising approximately 5.7 acres in the old fairgrounds site and owned by the City of East Tawas, had been sold to Tawas Industries, Incorporated, for its new industrial site. Part of the site has been retained by East Tawas for its city garage.

Watson told the Tawas City Council that in the short time available for study, it appeared to him that annexation by one city of territory granted by charter to another city was extremely unlikely.

"The statute appears designed for annexation by fourth class cities of unincorporated land from adjoining townships only," said Watson.

While in Lansing on other city business last Wednesday, Watson presented the case informally to the assistant attorney general. "His view proves stronger than ours that the statute does not permit annexation," said Watson.

He emphasized, however, that an official resolution had never been received from the East Tawas Council. He said that if resolutions were prepared by both city councils, annexation might be possible, although a vote of the people might be required. In any event, no action could be taken until an official petition was received.

In other business, a letter from the post office department indicated that Tawas City did not meet the 2,500 population requirement for door-to-door mail delivery. The council had sent letters to the department and repre-

sentatives of congress asking such service.

Exceptions to the population requirement were discontinued in 1948, according to the postal department's letter. The city is now conducting a new census for reapportionment of wards for next spring's election. The council is to await results of that census before taking further action on the mail delivery request.

After more than a year of work since establishment of a special assessment district for financing the Mathews Street sewer project, it appeared likely that the project would receive final approval from the state Tuesday.

Many delays have resulted in this project as the city became entangled in miles of governmental "red tape." The city attorney made a special trip to Lansing October 6 to determine progress on the application. He found that the state finance commission had given its approval and sent it on to the attorney general's office.

Requested legal documents were again produced from the now voluminous file and it appeared that the application would be approved. On Monday of this week, a request was received for a certified copy of the September 6, 1966, council meeting minutes. "We were assured that the application would be approved by Tuesday night," said Watson. Meanwhile, the construction season is nearing an end.

A public hearing is to be held November 6, 7:30 p. m., on proposed rezoning of property owned by Joseph Barkman.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bulbitz and City Police Chief George Westcott are to conduct a street survey to determine the need for changes or additions to the city's traffic control signs.

State Highway Dept. to Outline Long-Range Plans October 26

Residents of Iosco and surrounding counties will have the opportunity Thursday, October 26, to hear a discussion on future highway plans for Northeastern Michigan.

A meeting has been arranged at Tawas Area High School, 8:00 p. m., by Iosco Cooperative Extension Service, Iosco County Planning Commission and Michigan Department of State Highways.

W. D. (Mike) Nunn, East Tawas, a member of the state highway commission, emphasizes that this is not a hearing—this will come later—but it will be a meeting to discuss and acquaint the general public of proposed future highways.

Nunn said that an earlier highway needs study had indicated that a limited access highway between Standish and Alpena should be considered and a preliminary route was presented in 1961. The commissioner said that plans had not been completed as yet and the meeting would offer an opportunity for citizens to express viewpoints on the project. It usually requires about three years from the planning conception stage to the first public hearing and another two years would be required from the date of letting bids to actual completion.

Highway construction is dictated by traffic counts over a period of years. A highway needs study started in 1958 indicated that a limited access highway north of Grand Rapids should be considered. The proposed route along the eastern shore of the state is to be considered during the period between 1965 and 1985.

Edward Bellanbaum, chief of planning, along with Hendrick Starseth, acting director, will be among speakers at the local meeting.

Marvin Davenport, county extension agent, who has spearheaded the local meeting, said that he would like to have written ques-

tions concerning highway planning sent to his office in order that a presentation might be made for the program.

If time permits, questions from the floor are to be answered.

"Now is the time to present ideas on whether a scenic or limited access route is desired for this part of the state," said Davenport. "Plans for highways are made well in advance of construction and this meeting is not intended to be a debate, but rather a forum where residents have the opportunity to state their ideas."

Ronald Green, owner of the field where the plane crashed, said that the two men had come here to do some bow and arrow hunting for deer. The plane apparently experienced mechanical trouble on take-off and hit a fence. The plane then smashed into a tree, damaging its propeller and wing.

First total eclipse of the moon since 1964 was to have been visible, weather permitting, at 4:23 a. m. today (Wednesday). It was predicted that the moon would be completely covered at 5:45 a. m. The lunar eclipse is caused by the earth passing between the sun and the moon. Next total lunar eclipse is due on April 2, 1968.

Airman Died from Gunshot Wound Mon.

A 23-year-old airman from Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Glenn Wright, Monday became Iosco County's first hunting fatality of the year.

Receiving a fatal wound about 8:00 a. m. Sunday while hunting squirrels with his fellow airman, James Anderson, 20, Wright died at 1:10 a. m. at Bay City Mercy Hospital.

State police said Anderson told them he accidentally shot Wright with a 22 caliber rifle while hunting near Cooke Dam in Oscoda Township. The victim was fatally wounded between the eyes.

Anderson and an unidentified hunter rushed the victim to the base hospital for treatment. He was transferred to Bay City by ambulance.

A post-mortem was performed on the victim's body Monday and investigation is to continue.

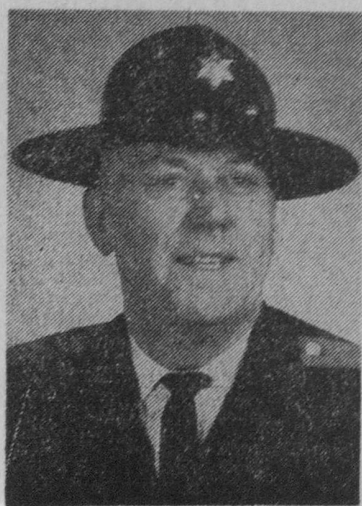

Detroit Files \$50,000 False Arrest Suit Against Lawmen

A \$50,000 damage suit claiming false arrest was filed against two local law enforcement officers Tuesday by a Detroit man.

Named in the suit filed by Roger Bauer were Iosco County Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell and East Tawas Police Chief Donald Docking.

Sheriff O'Farrell arrested Bauer on March 20, 1966, at the Holland Hotel. The sheriff was assisted by Chief Docking.

In his petition, Bauer claims that he was detained in a "vile and loathsome jail" and was restricted from his lawful freedom and liberty for a period of seven hours, "all of which acts were done illegally, with malice, without probable cause and without right or authority to any of the defendants and against the will of

the plaintiff."

Bauer claimed that the two officers, without any authority and without warrant or commitment of any sort, maliciously, wrongfully and unlawfully took him into custody.

He claims that he was going peacefully about his lawful business. "The plaintiff was seated in the Holland Hotel acting in a lawful manner, when the defendant (O'Farrell) appeared and accused the plaintiff of being under the age of 21 years."

Bauer, stated the petition, denied the charge and showed the two officers that he was over 21 years of age, "but was handcuffed, assaulted, battered and with great force and violence was pushed,

kicked and compelled to get into a patrol car."

The petition further claimed that the officers had no warrant for the plaintiff's arrest, made no charge against plaintiff, that he was held until the morning of the following day without taking him before a magistrate, or permitting him to furnish security for his appearance before a magistrate.

Bauer claims that the imprisonment caused him great physical inconveniences, discomfort in the jail as it was cold and he was furnished no clothing, blankets or anything else to alleviate the cold.

The Detroit man also claims he had a great mental suffering, humiliation, shame, public ridicule and public disgrace in asking for the \$50,000 damages.

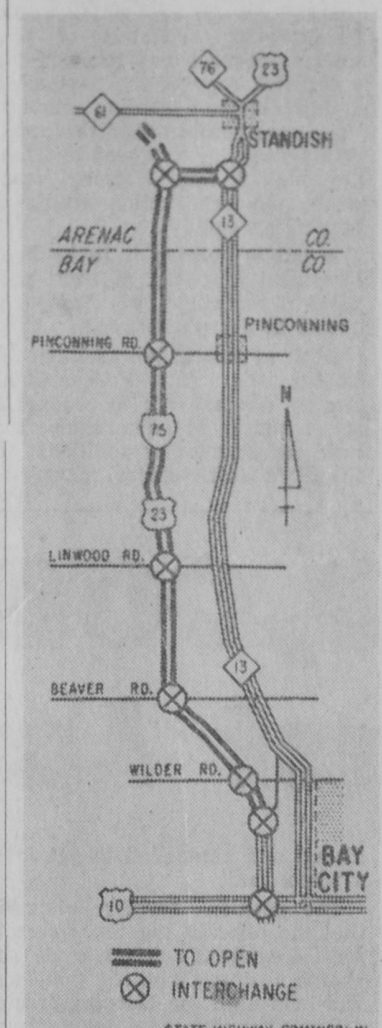

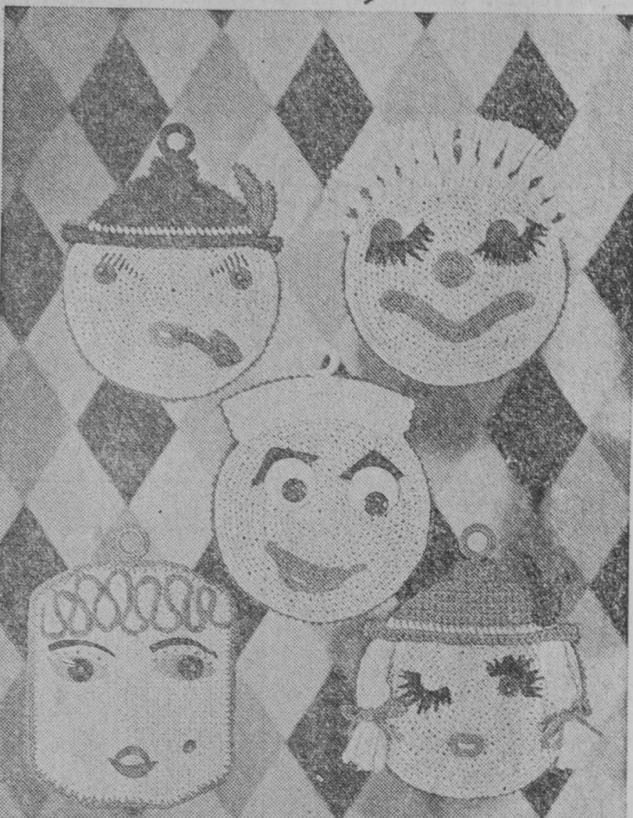

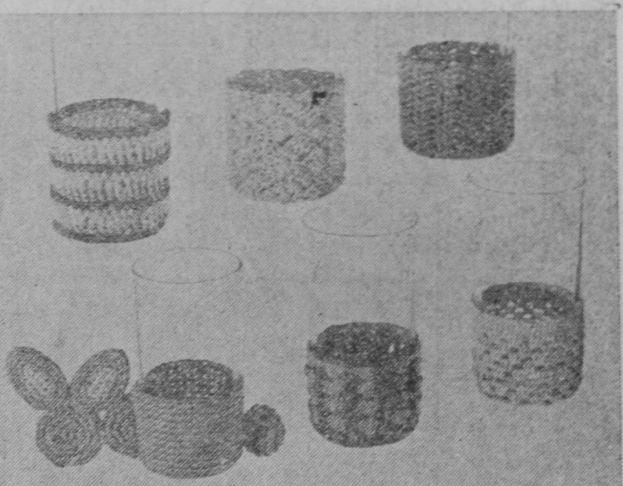

Will Use Welfare Funds—

Supervisors Accept Low Bids on Medical Care Facility Addition

Efficient operation of Isoco Medical Care Facility was credited last week with making enough money available to aid federal financing of a new 14-bed addition to the facility.

When bids were opened two weeks ago on the proposed new addition, it was found that low bids on the project had exceeded a \$50,000 federal grant by nearly \$40,000.

Isoco Board of Supervisors learned during the October ses-

sion last week, however, that a balance of \$85,000 remained in the Department of Social Welfare's fund. This included both state and federal funds along with money remaining from the annual appropriation from the county's general fund.

The board immediately authorized acceptance of low bids for the project, although actual construction will probably not make much headway until next spring.

Welfare Director Edward

Burgeson said Friday that the balance indicated the extent of the medical care facility's amazingly efficient operation during the past year. The facility started 1967 by borrowing money from the general fund. Before the month of January was completed, the entire 50-bed unit was filled with patients.

Burgeson said that state and federal funds for operation soon brought the financial picture to a point where cost of operation was

well below receipts. This enabled the welfare board to repay \$50,000 to the county, which had been loaned to open the facility in 1966, along with \$12,778 borrowed last December.

The following low bids were accepted: Gregory Construction Company, general contractor, \$50,680; Northern Plumbing, mechanical, \$28,619; Southeastern Electric, electrical contractor, \$9,690.

The board voted that no funds be transferred from the county's

general fund to the welfare fund before March 1, 1968.

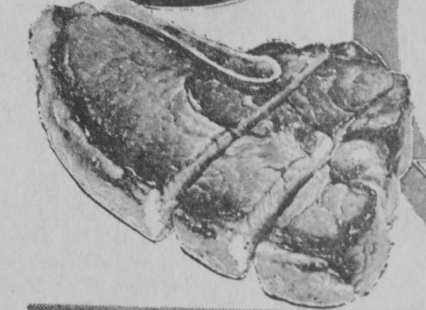
Despite repayment of the two loans, the county's general fund probably will end the year with a slight deficit. Because of an expanded budget in the child welfare fund, \$2,000 was transferred to the probate court's account. The probate court had requested an additional appropriation of \$3,000, as did the circuit court. No transfer was made to the latter account.

In other financial matters, the board authorized taking bids on a sterilizing dishwasher at the county jail to comply with an order from the state jail inspector.

The board unanimously authorized the following annual salary increases: Undersheriff Leon Putnam, \$500; Deputy Jerry Kruse, \$600; Deputy Charles Burke, \$400; Mrs. Marian Small, deputy to the tax equalization director, \$500.

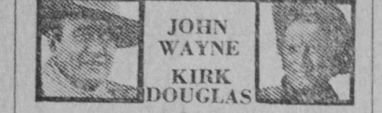

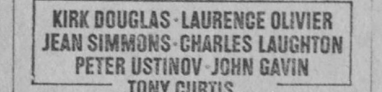

the Braves and undefeated Oscoda Owls.

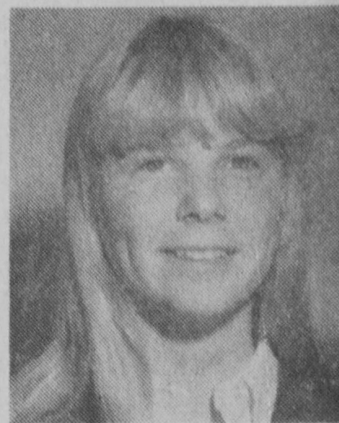

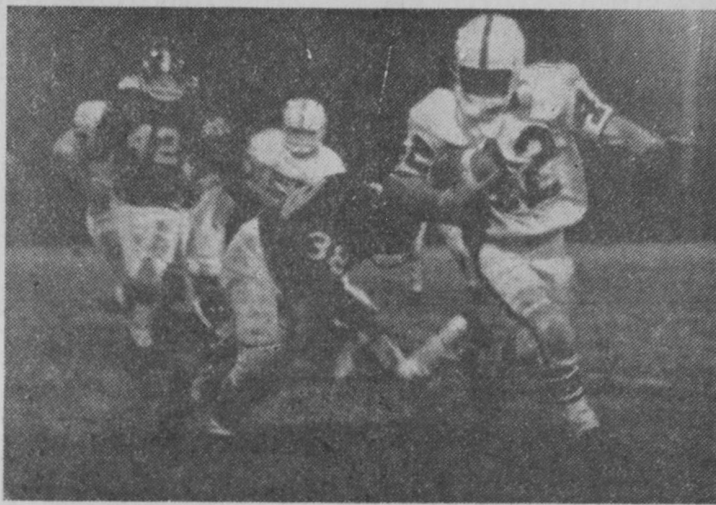

Hillman reached the scoring column in the second quarter, but Hale countered with another seven points when Maas threw a pass to Shellenbarger on a 90-yard touchdown play.

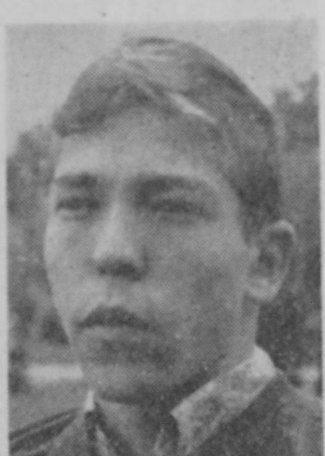

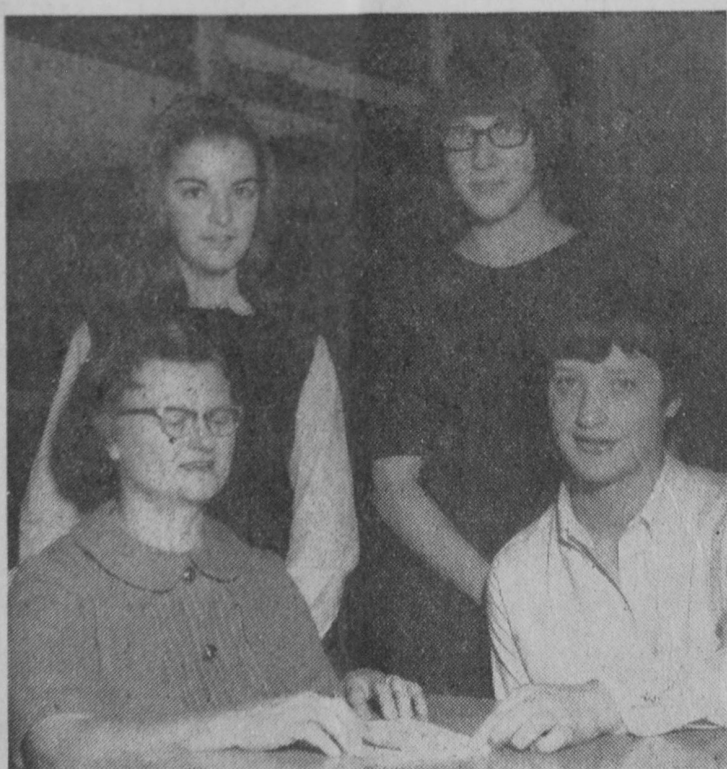
Fish Hearing Thursday at East Tawas

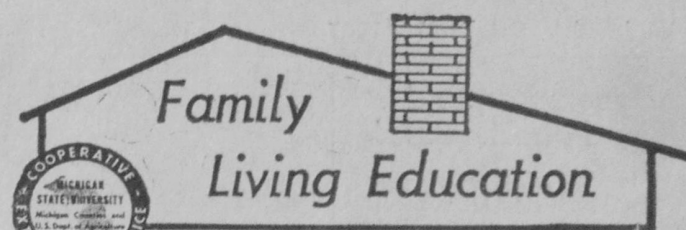

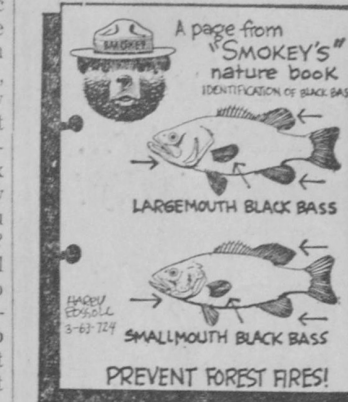

Coffee Custard Pie

From the coffee companies comes this idea of creativity in cooking. They suggest adding two tablespoons instant coffee powder to the standard custard pie recipe for a different taste treat. Sprinkle the top with one - fourth teaspoon nutmeg and a teaspoon of the instant coffee before baking. This may be a flavor addition to help get these nutritious, eggs and milk into the diet of someone who does not care for plain custard pie. I cannot see a thing wrong with the flavor of a good, plain custard pie!

Floor Care Products

Everytime we look at the display of supplies for caring for floors, we find new products. It is increasingly difficult to buy a new product and use it successfully without reading the label thoroughly; sometimes we even have to read between the lines! You need to know what wax to use for light or dark floors, for wood, cork, asphalt, vinyl or other type floors. Do you want self-polishing wax or do you have an electric polisher so you could easily utilize a buffing wax? If the floor is worn badly, a special type may be best, or maybe you have been unhappy because that worn floor needed at least two coats. You need to decide if you want to clean and wax in one operation. What wax may already be on the floor? Can you put the new wax over the old? Does your area require special heavy-duty wax and do you plan to remove it to prevent wax build-up? The label will tell you to thoroughly remove any detergent before waxing. And then do not forget to read the label for safety sake, either. All floor waxes should warn us that they can be poisons to children and should be

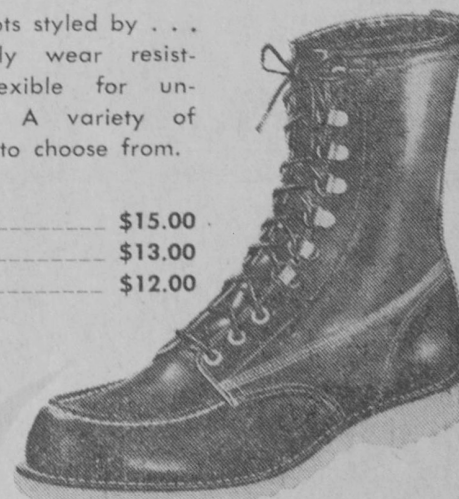

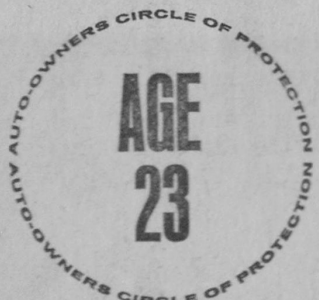

Young Families Learn About SS

Why should a man with a wife and young children concern himself with anything that seems far away as social security? A new booklet, "Social Security Information for Young Families," specifically designed to answer this question is now available. Social security district manager, Paul M. Ellifritz, announced today.

"Social security is not just a retirement program and it is not just for old people," Ellifritz said. This new booklet gives the young worker important information about the survivors and disability protection that he and his family now have.

Nine out of 10 families in Michigan have social security survivor protection which can amount to many thousands of dollars in benefits if the breadwinner in the family should die, Ellifritz pointed out.

Disability insurance is the other social security program of particular importance to the young worker. After just five years of work under social security, the worker and his family are eligible to receive monthly benefit payments if he should become severely disabled and the condition is expected to last a year or longer.

Ellifritz said that "Social Security Information for Young Families" explains in detail survivors and disability protection, what it can mean to a family and how to make an application should it become necessary. Also, included is information on how to check your social security account and the financing of social security.

Dear Editor:

The Tawas Area Board of Education feels that the local press has done an extremely fine job of keeping the public informed of our educational program and in rallying support for any help we need.

When this same press takes a united stand in objecting to our actions or policies, we feel that they deserve an honest answer.

We refer specifically to the fact that the press obviously feels that we, as elected representatives of the people in our school area, have the responsibility for carrying out our deliberations and action publicly.

Much of our work, however, involves our relationship with individuals and a closed meeting allows us to discuss pertinent facts without an invasion of privacy. It is often necessary to a person whether charges against a person are true or false. In this connection, we must realize that false charges against a person are

often as damaging as if they were true.

Should anyone be concerned about the fact that subjects discussed in closed meetings will soon be made public anyway, we would like to point to policy for these meetings, which states that the contents of these meetings will be discussed with no one.

We have a great deal of confidence in the common sense of the press in leaving unsaid the things that don't matter and that are purely personal. In this connection, we would like to assure everyone that closed meetings are called for one reason only to protect the privacy of the individual who is being discussed.

(Editor's Note: Mr. Soper and the Tawas Area Board of Education apparently missed the point of our article, "Freedom of the Press Belongs to the People," which appeared in our last issue. We have two comments:

(1. Publishers of this newspaper are not aware of the "united stand" of which Mr. Soper speaks in the second paragraph of this letter.

(2. The editor of this newspaper has been attending twice-month sessions of the board of education, alternating every other week with sessions of city councils, for the past 10 or more years. We are not now, nor ever have been interested in "personalities" discussed at meetings between board members, staff members or individual parents and students, referring to the fourth paragraph of Mr. Soper's letter. We have clearly stated the above on several occasions to the board of education and, in fact, excused myself from one meeting when such a subject was under discussion. (However, we would hate to see

meetings closed to the public under guise of an "executive session" any time a matter of controversy is discussed. Discussion on such "non personality" matters is of public interest, not because of its controversial nature, but because individual ideas expressed are often necessary for the public to determine reasons for final action.)
