Coroner Rules Wound Was Self-Inflicted

been conducted at Saginaw. Gallant, superintendent of the

Michigan Gypsum Company near Turner, and Eugene Silkowski, 25, Rochester, had been involved in an argument at the East Tawas Recreation bowling bar Friday night. Silkowski was asked to leave the establishment by the owner.

A scuffle between the two men resulted later on the sidewalk along Newman Street. Silkowski was treated and released from Tawas Hospital for knife slash wounds to the chest.

Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell said Gallant and his wife, Barbara, returned to their home at East Tawas following the fight. The couple decided to notify the sheriff's department and, while Mrs. Gallant was on the telephone, Gallant closed himself in a closet where, apparently despondent over the fight, fired a .22 caliber

bullet into his head. Police said they would ask Silkowski for a statement pending possibility of an inquest into the fight. Investigation is being continued by police.
