

# Coroner Rules Wound Was Self-Inflicted

Iosco County Coroner E. John Moffatt ruled Saturday that Max Gallant, 38, died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head early Saturday morning. A autopsy had been conducted at Saginaw.

Gallant, superintendent of the Michigan Gypsum Company near Turner, and Eugene Silkowski, 25, Rochester, had been involved in an argument at the East Tawas Recreation bowling bar Friday night. Silkowski was asked to leave the establishment by the owner.

A scuffle between the two men resulted later on the sidewalk along Newman Street. Silkowski was treated and released from Tawas Hospital for knife slash wounds to the chest.

Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell said Gallant and his wife, Barbara, returned to their home at East Tawas following the fight. The couple decided to notify the sheriff's department and, while Mrs. Gallant was on the telephone, Gallant closed himself in a closet where, apparently despondent over the fight, fired a .22 caliber bullet into his head.

Police said they would ask Silkowski for a statement pending possibility of an inquest into the fight. Investigation is being continued by police.

Gallant is survived by his wife; one son, Michael, and a daughter, Dawn, both at home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Gallant, Sand Lake; one sister, Mrs. Donna Jean Rossman, Saginaw; one brother, William Gallant, Holly.

Mr. Gallant was a member of Westminster Presbyterian Church, Bay City; World War II veteran, and a member of Bay Lodge No. 129.

The Rev. David Castronale officiated at funeral services Tuesday, September 26, at Gephart Funeral Home, Bay City. Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery, Hale.



## Paul Ropert Hurt When Road Caved

Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works at East Tawas, received serious injuries last Wednesday noon in a Washington Street cave-in.

Ropert was working at the bottom of an eight-foot deep hole during construction of a water line. While standing in a slightly stooped position, in the process of melting lead to cap the main, the roadway suddenly gave way.

Ropert was completely covered by falling sand from the roadbed, while Edward Likey, foreman, was also trapped when sand filled the hole up to his knees.

Other members of the crew quickly dug sand away until Ropert's belt was exposed. They then pulled him free. He had not lost consciousness.

Ropert was rushed to Tawas Hospital, where he is recuperating from a fractured vertebrae. He also received second and third degree burns to the face and neck when the falling sand pushed his head against the torch or hot lead.

Following the harrowing experience, Ropert told Police Chief Donald Docking that he was unable to breathe but still conscious while crew members worked frantically to free him. Unable to move, he knew he was completely covered but did not realize how much sand had fallen.

## Monday Hearing Limited Discussion on Gill Net Ban

Local residents attending a hearing at Bay City Monday night on a conservation department proposal to ban gill net fishing learned that the meeting concerned only Lakes Michigan and Superior.

Eel Minard of Singing Bridge Grocery told the Herald that department representatives handling the hearing would not allow any discussion on Lake Huron. "We accomplished little or nothing," he said.

Minard presented resolutions from city councils of Tawas City and East Tawas which voiced opposition to the use of gill nets by commercial fishermen in Lake Huron and especially, in Saginaw Bay. The resolutions were placed on file.

Both State Rep. George A. Prescott of Tawas City and State Sen. Robert Richardson of Saginaw attended the meeting.

## Three-Day Civil Suit Concluded

Following an out-of-court settlement by attorneys for the City of Tawas and Nelson N. Schlicker, an Iosco Circuit Court jury found no cause for action in a negligence suit against John Gulek and Gary Young of Suzuki Rental Systems, Incorporated.

The defendants had been named in a \$360,000 damage suit involving the July 1965 death of an East Tawas boy. Seeking the damages was William A. Smith Sr., whose son, William A. Smith Jr., died from injuries received in a motorbike-automobile collision at the corner of First Street and Fifth Avenue in Tawas City.

Prior to the start of the trial last Wednesday morning, the court record showed that the City of Tawas had settled out of court by paying damages of \$2,500, while Schlicker paid damages of \$10,000.

The trial then continued for three days against the motorbike rental firm. The firm had been named in the suit for failure to provide proper safety equipment for the boy while operating the motorbike, failure to supervise and failure to know that the youth was inexperienced in its operation.

The circuit court jury deliberated about 1 1/2 hours before bringing in its no cause verdict.

## Deer Poaching Proves Expensive to Three

Three Prescott men found last week that poaching deer can be tough on the pocketbook, since enactment of a new law by the state legislature requiring a replacement cost for all illegally killed game animals.

Frank Fasbender Jr., 22, Dale W. Tester, 20, and Edwin D. Durance, 20, were assessed \$1,119.90 in justice court September 19 for killing four deer in Reno Township.

Michigan conservation officers arrested the three men following an early morning complaint of shooting in the farming area of Reno. A juvenile involved was turned over to Ogemaw County Probate Court authorities.

C. E. Eckman, East Tawas justice of the peace, fined each man

\$100 and \$7.30 costs, along with 30 days in the county jail. If the fine is not paid within 30 days, they are to serve another 50 days in jail.

In addition, each was charged a penalty of \$266 under the new state law for reimbursing the cost of the deer to the state. Two rifles, a high powered search light and the four deer were confiscated by officers.

Law enforcement officers are hoping that the new reimbursement law will help to curb an increase in illegal kills. Locally, Cons. Officer A. G. Leitz said last week he believed that poaching was at its highest point in history. In addition, "shiners" have killed numerous farm animals in the Iosco area.

## Boundary Change Discussed T. City Planners Seek Annexation Solution

Tawas City Planning Commission is to delay action on any proposed boundary change between Tawas City and East Tawas at the old fairgrounds property until an official petition seeking such change is received, or until state laws are clarified.

This action was taken Wednesday night following a meeting between representatives of the City of East Tawas and the planning commission.

The matter was turned over to the commission last week by the Tawas City Council following receipt of information that East Tawas had requested discussion on possible annexation of approximately three acres of land located in the old fairground property.

The land in question is included in a 10.7 acre parcel sold last week by the City of East Tawas to Tawas Industries, Incorporated, as a site for a new warehouse and, eventually, for its entire filter manufacturing operation. The plant is located at present between First Street and Court Street in Tawas City.

Mayor James Campbell appeared before Wednesday's planning commission session and outlined provisions of Michigan law altering boundary line changes. He said that East Tawas planned to petition the board of supervisors seeking such change. Under his plan, a vote of the people would not be required because the property is uninhabited. A public hearing would be held.

Members of the planning commission said they were "completely in the dark," insofar as any legal question that might arise. It was recommended that an attorney who is familiar with this type of work be hired and that the city ask for clarification from the state attorney general.

One of the questions to be decided is the matter of the proposed boundary change being handled by the county board of supervisors. It is not known if the act provides legal machinery for a boundary change between adjoining cities of if it pertains only to a city and an adjoining township. It was also felt that Tawas Industries, Incorporated, should initiate any proposed boundary change, inasmuch as the firm is now owner of the property. Other questions to be resolved included street maintenance, should the change be received, or until state laws are clarified.

## School Board Adjourns for Secret Session

Handling business matters briefly Monday night, Tawas Area Board of Education closed its regular session and went into a secret meeting.

Business conducted prior to adjournment included appointment of Carl Helmer to act as the board's representative to work with Curriculum Coordinator John Alexander on the vocational training program.

Donald Shaver, 38, an air force retiree with a degree from Central Michigan University, is to be hired November 13 to teach either fifth grade or junior high school. He and his family live in this district and his children attend school here.

Action on blacktopping half of the East Tawas Elementary Unit playground was tabled until the next meeting. The school received a price of \$4,430 for the project.

The board authorized school administrators to contact Mrs. David Featheringill to determine if she would be interested in teaching fifth grade. She is presently employed as a reader or assistant to the three English teachers at the high school. She is eligible for a 60-day substitute teacher certificate.

Her hiring would allow placement of Mrs. Marian Kramer in the remedial reading program. She is presently teaching fifth grade and is a fully certified remedial teacher.

The board approved purchases of \$899 in wood shop tools from Broadhead-Garrett and Company.

## Gem Appraisal in Final Hearing Days at Oscoda-AuSable; Protests Heard

Anything having to do with taxes is always a controversial subject—particularly if it may mean an increase—and one of the hottest topics to hit Iosco County is the current reappraisal program.

Public hearings on the Gem Survey property reappraisal are to be concluded in this county next week with sessions being held from October 2 through 7 for Oscoda-AuSable.

Property owners wishing to examine information cards compiled by the survey firm, including land appraisals, may attend sessions held daily at the Oscoda Township Hall, 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m.

Following hearings conducted in other sections of the county during the past two weeks, a delegation of property owners appeared at last Wednesday's meeting of the board of supervisors to protest Gem's appraisals.

Three persons addressing the

board included Herbert Steele and T. R. Winstead, both of Plainfield Township, and William A. Martin of Grant Township.

It was felt by protesting property owners that appraisals brought in by Gem Survey were unrealistically high, although most admitted that previous assessments had been too low.

Following a long history of controversy at tax equalization time, the board of supervisors in 1965 contracted with Gem Survey to appraise taxable real estate in Iosco. Purpose of the reappraisal was to equalize property tax assessments throughout the county.

Under the old system, unequal assessments resulted because each township supervisor and city assessor had different opinions of property values.

In addition to compiling information on each parcel of land and listing it on a separate index file card, a study of sales for the past three years was made to help determine proper value of property.

An up-to-date manual, approved by the state tax commission, was used to determine replacement costs and depreciation percentages.

One Plainfield property owner believed that the survey firm had not used all help available and asked the board of supervisors to delay use of the appraisal in spreading tax rolls until such time as a series of meetings could be held within the various townships.

Dennis Chrivia, Plainfield Township supervisor, who has about 30 years experience selling real estate in his township, said that while he believed two areas of his township had been appraised in excess of true cash value, he felt that, on the whole, Gem Survey had been competent in its appraisal work.

Chrivia asked to be given the opportunity to sit down with representatives of the survey firm in order to discuss some adjustments where there were legitimate com-

plaints. He said that most complaints were not justified, but felt that there was room for discussion in some areas.

Glen Mask of Gem Survey said that he was willing to sit down and discuss problem areas with any supervisor. Reviews had already been held in a number of areas where complaints were voiced at hearings.

Charles Smith, chairman of the board of supervisors, pointed out that all hearings had not been concluded as yet and that "perhaps we are jumping the gun a bit." He emphasized that the board would have to wait for reports from all units in order to determine the end result.

Smith also pointed out that the state tax commission had conducted its own appraisal of land values during the past two months, which unofficially indicated that Iosco was due for approximately a 50 percent increase in valuation.

The chairman said that regardless of any valuation increase in Iosco County, millage to be spread could not be in excess of actual budgets submitted.

After property assessments are made in January, dissatisfied property owners may appeal to the board of review, which meets in March. If the taxpayer is still dissatisfied, he may appeal to the state tax commission at no cost to himself.

"All it takes is a letter and a five-cent postage stamp," said Smith.

## Oscoda Divers Probe Old Huron Shipwreck

Following several days of exploration, scuba divers from the Oscoda area have uncovered the remains of an old sailing ship which sunk off the coast of Oscoda Township in Lake Huron.

Oscoda-AuSable Fire Department, in cooperation with the AuSable Diving Club, along with firemen, had taken instruction from Maj. Richard Bonde, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, a certified scuba diving instructor.

Using the fire department's amphibious "duck," the two anchors weighing about one ton each were hauled out of the water about two weeks ago. Approximately 500 feet of anchor chain was recovered, along with blocks and other specialized equipment used in rigging sails.

In addition to this find, the divers uncovered a rail tram car used during the lumbering days along with several sets of wheels. These items were hoisted from the lake bottom near the former site of an Oscoda lumber company dock.

Curley said that the department hopes to see a display of these relics made at the township park. Possible formation of a museum, displaying items from the wrecked ship and other relics of the lumbering days, is also being discussed.

Lake charts show the sites of about four ships which were wrecked in Lake Huron storms in the Oscoda-AuSable area.

Diving operations are to continue this fall and are to go into full swing next summer.

It is believed that the hooks were dropped during a violent storm in an unsuccessful attempt to prevent its grounding in shallow water.

Actual exploration of wreckage began about six weeks ago. Members of the diving club, along with firemen, had taken instruction from Maj. Richard Bonde, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, a certified scuba diving instructor.

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Tawas City Police Chief George Westcott first learned of the arson from other children. He notified school authorities and the parents were called.

Iosco Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell was called to investigate and the boy admitted he had started a fire in a paper bag and then threw it under the stage of the auditorium. Fire departments received a call around 8:45 a. m.

At the time of the fire, school authorities said it was fortunate the blaze was discovered before it gained further headway. Fire departments from Tawas City and East Tawas confined flames to the stage area.

Flooring of the stage was repaired following the blaze and the auditorium, blackened by smoke, was repainted during the past summer.

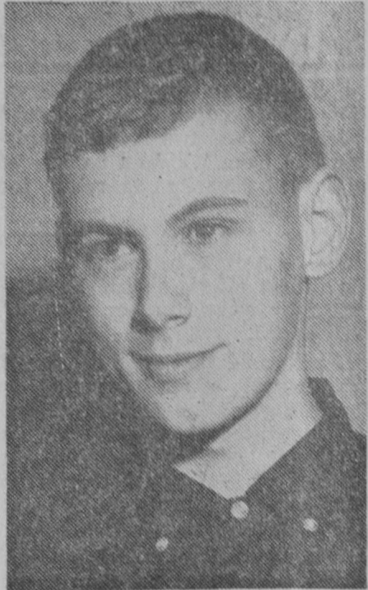

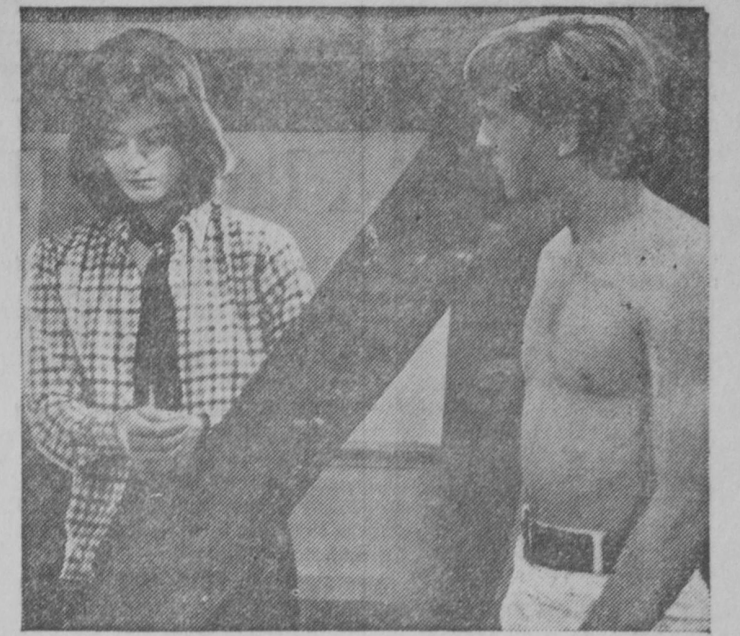

# Supervisors Adopt Planning Resolutions

Three resolutions were adopted Wednesday by the Iosco Board of Supervisors authorizing this county's participation in the East Central Michigan Economic Development District.

Besides adopting rules for the commission, the resolutions established an eight-member advisory council to be named for Iosco County and adopted \$315.90 as this county's share of the commission budget.

James P. Mielock, Reno Township supervisor, has been named as the commission member to represent Iosco, Arenac, Gladwin and Ogemaw Counties.

The organization is a multi-county planning district having charge of developing an over-all economic development plan and to stimulate plans for the region.

Still in the planning stage, the organization would be formed about the first of the year.

In other business, Sup. L. S. Little expressed concern over the proposed closing of Sand Lake Road from McIvor to M-55. Requested by National Gypsum Company, which owns property on both sides of the road and is considering development of the west side of its quarry, the proposal is now in the hands of the road commission.

Little said this stretch of highway was the first blacktop constructed in Iosco County and questioned the need for closing.

Sup. George Blust of Whittemore said that an alternate route was being planned, the entire cost to be borne by the gypsum company.

In cooperation with the Iosco Republican Committee, the board of supervisors proclaimed October 21 as Elford A. Cederberg Day in

Iosco County. A special program is to be arranged as a tribute and recognition of Congressman Cederberg for his representation in the 10th Congressional District.

The board approved signing a note by Long Lake Property Owners Association with Farmers and Merchants State Bank for construction of a dam on Long Lake. Entire cost of the \$7,026 project is to be paid by the special assessment district over a period of one year.

The board approved passage of the June 21 ordinance, recently approved by the governor's office, providing a penalty for any person under the age of 21 years who consumes, transports or has under his control any alcoholic beverage. (Complete text of the ordinance is printed on page 5, section two of this newspaper.)

Edgar Sells, probate judge of Oscoda County, addressed the board urging support of a house bill establishing one lower court in each county to handle work of justices of the peace, a position soon to be abolished under the constitution. The bill provides that in smaller counties, the probate judge's office would assume duties of justices of the peace.

State Rep. George A. Prescott addressed the board on the same subject. An outspoken critic of the state's "blue ribbon committee" suggested reorganization plan, Prescott feels that probate judges in smaller counties could assume duties of the justice court.

He has expressed concern that the planned systems are more than small counties need and financing them would create impossible hardships on counties and the state.

Probate Judge William McCready addressed the board concerning possibility of establishing a juvenile home in the county to meet the needs of Iosco and adjoining counties. The matter was referred to the county's building authority committee.

Members appointed to attend the state convention at Lansing October 12-14 were Mielock, Earl McElheron, Richter Lixey, Aubrey Belson, Percy Jocks, Edward Higgins and Chairman Charles Smith. Attending a tax assessors' conference at Traverse City will be Little, Dennis Chrivia, Lixey, Jocks and Smith.

boundary change be approved.

Alderman Cecil Cable was of the opinion that any action of the planning commission or city council should not jeopardize an industry in the area for three acres of land upon which the city has never received any taxes. He said that the only question in his mind was for the city to transfer property without receiving anything in return.

George Staudacher, plant superintendent of Tawas Industries, Incorporated, stated that the main reason for asking the boundary change was to clarify any possible taxation question by having the plant located in one taxing unit. He said that, under the present boundary line, the firm's warehouse might be situated in both cities, which would result in confusion over tax assessing.

Paul Chevish, chairman of the planning commission, said, "In all sincerity, we should just drop city lines and do away with all arguments of this type."

In other business conducted at the meeting, the commission heard a request from Mrs. Bess VanPopelen, 929 West Lake Street, on a proposal to develop a mobile home park on her 3 1/2-acre site in the Third Ward.

The property includes 372 feet of bay frontage and 216 feet along US-23. Her proposal is for a permanent type mobile home park with seven 35 by 65-foot lots and a 20-foot-wide asphalt street.

The planning commission felt the project came within the city's ordinance, but that detailed engineering plans and specifications would be required before any action could be taken.

A public hearing would be required under the ordinance and approval from the state would be required.

A report was given of the recent joint meeting between the council and planning commission concerning possible purchase of property from Whittemore Street to the city park for park and recreational use.

A request was made by Herbert Hertzler, attorney for Joseph Barkman, to change the classification of property on which the

Barkman Lumber Company is located from industrial and residential to commercial. The commission authorized a study to be made for determination of the commercial property.

## Prescott Learns

# East Branch Slated for Salmon Planting

In response to a question raised by State Rep. George A. Prescott, Tawas City, information has been received concerning planting of coho salmon in Michigan.

A letter to Prescott from State Rep. James F. Smith, a member of the conservation and recreation committee, said that the conservation department had planted coho salmon in just two rivers emptying into Lake Michigan because of a limited capacity to raise the small fish.

"They felt that the program must be proven in two areas before their efforts should be dissipated by planting other streams," said Smith.

Smith said that another factor was control of sea lamprey in Lake Huron. The federal government reduced aid to Michigan for lamprey eradication in the amount of \$100,000 this year and Michigan congressmen are attempting to get this restored.

The Davison representative said that the conservation department plans to plant some adult females and males, probably in the East Branch of the AuGres River, sometime this fall. These will be surplus fish and they do not know if the plant will be successful or not.

"I have been assured that the only thing that will stop the department from planting all over the state is the amount of capacity which they have to raise the small coho," said Smith. "If we are able to supply them with funds to expand their hatcheries, you can be sure that the fish will be put in every possible stream where their chance of survival is good."

Prescott and State Rep. Swallow co-sponsored a resolution that passed the house almost unanimously calling for restoration of the needed federal money to treat Lake Huron for lamprey control.

"I am gaining the impression that our eastern side of the state is being slighted in many ways," said Prescott in a letter to the Herald last week.

"It appears that we will receive some token plantings of coho salmon this fall in the East Branch. To my way of thinking, there is nothing wrong with our Rifle River

and about 18 miles of beautiful water in the AuSable River to Foote Dam."

Prescott said he was exerting every pressure for the eastern side of Michigan "to receive some long neglected consideration on those things which are so economically important."

He was to have attended a meeting Monday night concerning gill net removal at Bay City.

## Lamprey Eel Control May be Restored

United States Sen. Robert P. Griffin said Tuesday that a senate appropriations subcommittee has restored an earlier house cut of \$100,000 in the Great Lakes lamprey eel control program.

He predicted approval by the full senate appropriations committee, which was scheduled to meet Tuesday on the bill.

"I am extremely pleased by the subcommittee's decision," Griffin said. "This action follows a concerted effort by Great Lakes senators and representatives, who strongly believe that this is no time to cut back on the lamprey eel control program."

Griffin cautioned, "We still have a way to go in holding the funds, because the restoration must also be approved by the senate as a whole and by a joint senate-house conference committee." The senate subcommittee's decision was the crucial one. "I believe the chances are now for keeping the funds in the appropriation bill," he said in a telegram to the Herald.

The lamprey eradication program is largely responsible for the re-emergence of high value fish in the Great Lakes including coho salmon, trout and whitefish.

Last month, Griffin wrote to Chairman John L. McClellan of the appropriations subcommittee urging reversal of the house action which cut the budget of the Great Lakes fisheries.

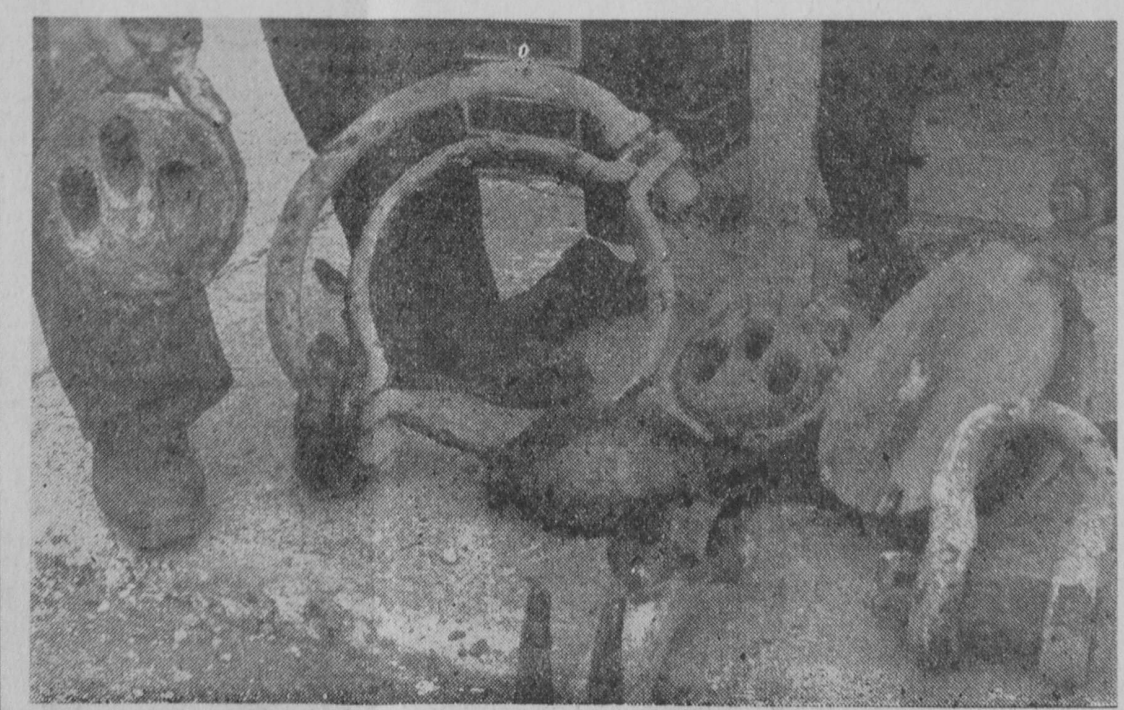

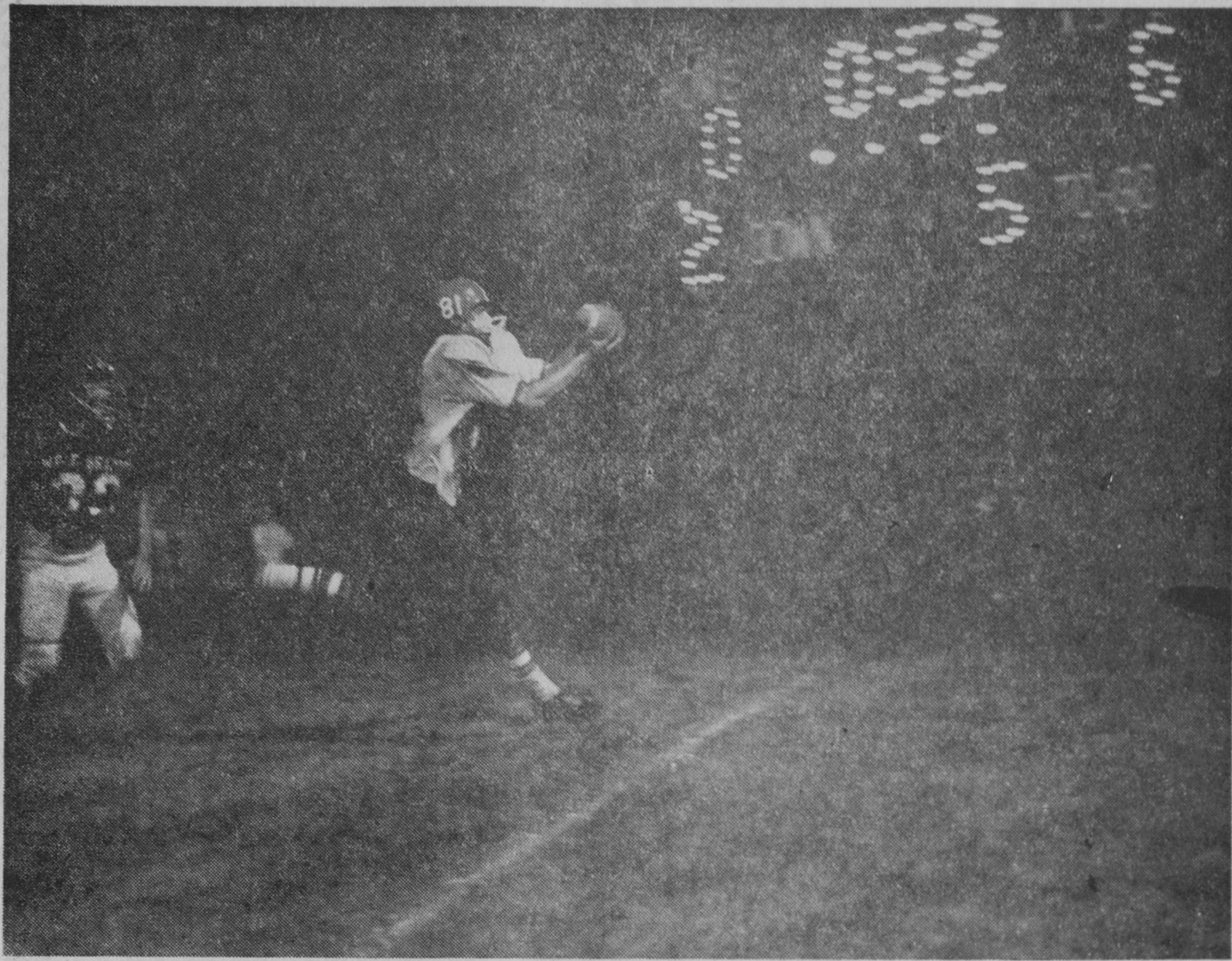

# Last Ditch Pass and PAT Kick Gave Braves 7-6 Win in Conference Opener

A last-ditch touchdown pass and a soccer-style kick from placement, coming by way of Denmark, gave Tawas Area Braves a 7-6 victory over the West Branch Orioles in Friday night's NBC opener.

In what can easily be called the most exciting cliffhanger ever played on the local gridiron, the Braves roared from behind in the waning minutes of the game to down a hard-hitting Oriole 11.

After failing to score on several good opportunities, one inside the WB 10, the Braves had their backs to the wall with 52 seconds to go in the fourth quarter. Tawas tied the score, 6-6, when Halfback Dale Koepke hit End Fred Look with a touchdown pass in the endzone. This set the stage for a dramatic international finish as Esben Pedersen, exchange student from Denmark, calmly booted the point after touchdown to set off pandemonium in the Tawas stands.

West Branch was down but not out as, with 50 seconds left in the game, Halfback Doug Bell of the Orioles took the kick off and raced 25 yards to the WB 46. Quarterback Terry Ehinger then connected on a pass to Bell behind the Tawas secondary. Koepke finally dropped the hard-running Oriole with a shoe-string tackle on Tawas Area's 12.

Bell picked up three yards to the Tawas nine yard line on the next play. With five seconds to go, a key delay of the game penalty hurt the West Branch cause, moving the ball back to the WB 14. The final play of the game saw the Tawas defense stopping Bell for a three-yard loss.

First half play was a near duplicate of last week's defensive battle with Bangor. Tawas kicked off to the Orioles and recovered a fumble on the WB 46. The Braves could not move the ball against a tough Oriole line and had to punt.

The Orioles scored in the second quarter on a good sustained drive with six first downs. Ehinger hit Bell with a pass in the endzone to give West Branch a 6-0 lead. Tawas' line stopped the key PAT attempt.

With 12 seconds to go in the half, Tawas had the ball for two pass plays from the West Branch 28 but could not connect.

West Branch's hard hitting fullback, Dennis Saari, was forced to the sideline early in the game with a leg injury. Missing from the Tawas lineup was End Howard Rollin, who sustained a side injury last week and will not be ready to go until this Friday

night. Action picked up in the second half as Tawas' offense began to pick up steam. The Braves reached the West Branch 16 and were finally stopped on fourth down. The Orioles took over the ball, could not move and punted to the Tawas 24, where Dave Lixey had a good 20-yard return to the West Branch 27. The Braves were again stopped and it looked as though the Branchers were heading for a 6-0 victory.

Late in the fourth quarter, West Branch punted to Koepke on the Tawas five and he returned the ball to the 29. After Krish recovered his own fumble, Koepke hit Look with an 18-yard pass. Koepke lost five yards on the next play, but Mark Harris then picked up three yards to the WB 31. Tawas continued its aerial offense and officials called pass interference on a toss to Look, giving

Tawas a first down on the West Branch 15.

This set the stage for Koepke's pass to Look in the endzone for the tying touchdown. Pedersen, who missed last week's opener because of illness, came off the bench to boot the point after touchdown. This was the first time he had ever kicked a football from placement in competition. Kicking off the side of his foot, soccer style, Pedersen boomed the ball over onrushing Oriole defenders for the winning point.

While Tawas' defense was ragged during the first half, Coach Steve Sventko had high praise for the defensive play of Tackles John Crisenbery and Al Lickfelt, along with Jon Schirmer, who each had 10 tackles during the game. Koepke, the mainstay on Tawas' offense, contributed 12 tackles and these four players had 42 of the Braves' 62 tackles during the night.

Although losing the game, West Branch had the edge in the final statistics. The Orioles had 11 first downs, as compared to four for Tawas. The Branchers picked up 175 yards on the ground and 43 in the air, compared to 55 yards rushing and 40 yards passing for the Braves.

Tawas attempted nine passes during the night and did not connect until the last three aerials in the fourth quarter. Tawas had two passes intercepted.

Koepke continued his play as a triple threat with three great punts of 41, 50 and 45 yards. The middle spiral was downed on the West Branch one-yard line.

The Braves play host this Friday night to Carrollton. Tawas Area High School Band turned in another fine halftime performance last week and will entertain fans this Friday night in the third straight home game.

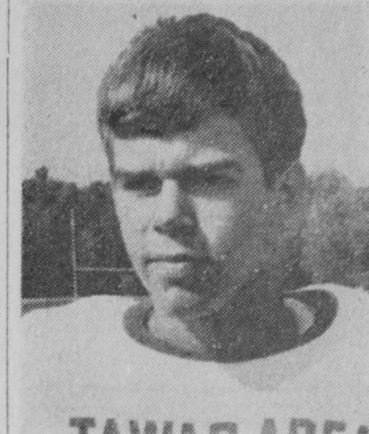

The team showed good blocking and hustle in the opener. The Junior Braves go against Alpena High JV Thursday night.

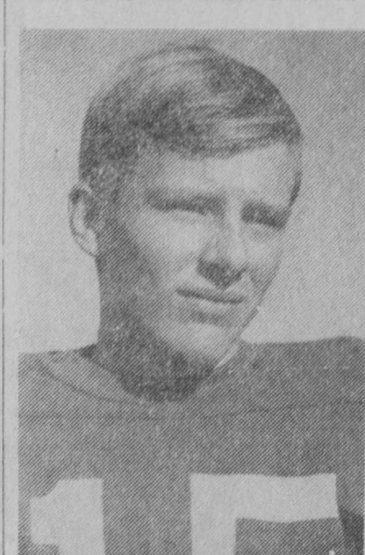
## Hale Eagles Down A. Eastern, 34-0, for Second Straight Win

Hale Area Eagles racked up victory No. 2 with a 34-0 shutout over Arenac Eastern Friday.

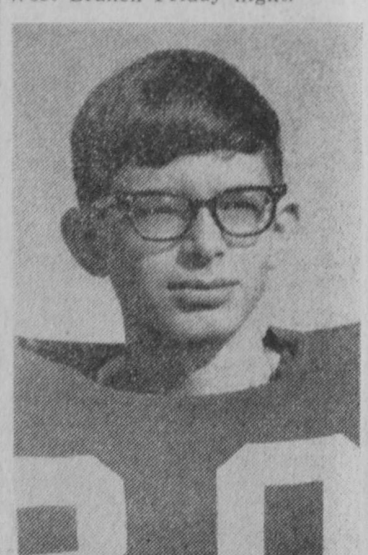

## Testing Important to Student Scholarships

Juniors and seniors of Tawas Area High School desiring to participate in state competitive scholarships and tuition grants will soon be taking two important examinations, according to Thomas Pinkowski, guidance counselor.

The preliminary scholastic aptitude tests will be administered on Tuesday, October 10.

The PSAT is a two-hour version of the college board's three-hour scholastic aptitude test, which more than 800 colleges require of some or all applicants for admission. While the PSAT is not intended as an admission test, it measures the same kinds of scholastic ability—verbal and mathematical—as the college aptitude test.

On Saturday, November 11, students will be writing the Michigan Competitive Scholarship Examination. Application forms are to be returned by October 10, along with a \$1.75 fee.

Competitive scholarships are awarded to Michigan resident students up to \$800 per year, or the equivalent of tuition and fees at

any of the public or private colleges and universities in Michigan.

Last fall, more than 25,000 Michigan high school seniors and graduates participated in the competition. Some 14,400 qualified for further consideration and 9,335 were announced as competitive scholarship winners. Of these, 5,731 received monetary scholarships and 3,604 received honorary scholarships.

Approximately one out of every four students taking the competitive examination received a monetary award. Monetary scholarships are renewed each year during undergraduate study, as long as the student continues to demonstrate financial need and remains in good academic standing.

As an example of the importance of this program, Pinkowski said that nine Tawas Area seniors received scholarships last year.

Any qualifying applicant who is not a monetary award winner may receive a residual award any time during undergraduate study when he meets all the eligibility requirements for a monetary scholarship.

Requirements for eligibility include participation in the examination on November 11, that the student is a continuous resident of Michigan for 18 months prior to the examination, be a high school graduate or senior in good academic standing, has had no previous college training prior to taking the examination, be of good moral character, demonstrate financial need according to the parents' financial statement and to comply with all other provisions of the scholarship law and rules and regulations of the authority.

Pinkowski said that he would be interviewing individual students during the next two weeks. Forms and information are to be sent home with students for study by parents.

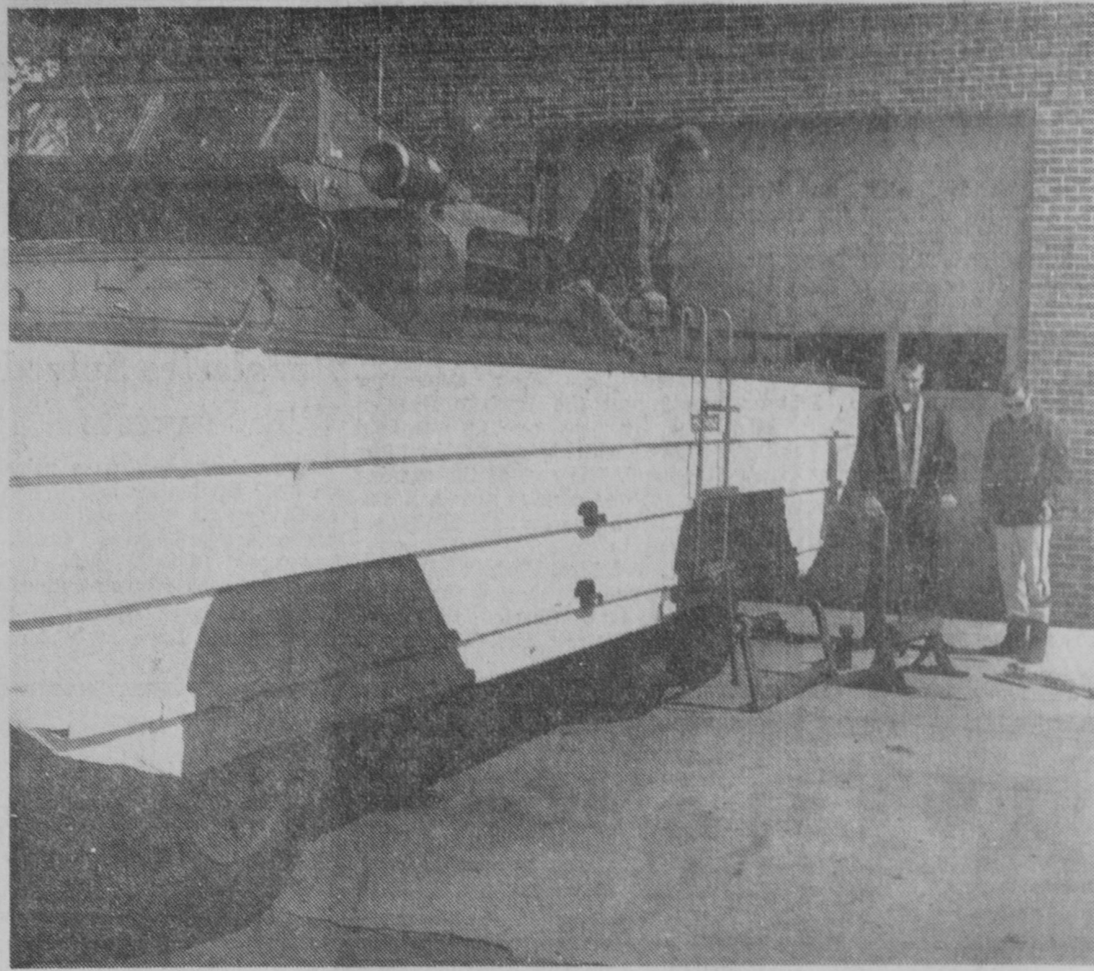

Last year's drought along with the old age of the jack pine and insect attack left us with considerable volume of dead and down material available for fire wood.

Caution: Don't cut or take fire wood from national forest land, no matter how much, unless you stop at our office in East Tawas post office for a permit first. We will be happy to help locate areas where you can get what you need. Specifically, we are interested in getting dead and down material out of the roadsides of the Monument Road, River Road and Plank Road to improve the scenic view of these roads.

Questions often asked: Why are the red pine trees turning brown? Nothing is wrong. This time of year, they always shed needles along the branches back of the current year's growth. We agree, they look a little sick but it happens every year. No cause for alarm.

You might be wondering why the trees did not put on much growth this year even though it was a good, wet summer. Last year's drought again is the culprit. Growth of trees reflect the previous season's conditions as the tree stores in its roots and tissues food and energy one season

An ordinance relative to the creation of a County Planning Commission as provided in Act 282 of the Public Acts of 1945, as amended, and to provide for the future planning in Isco County in accordance with the terms and provisions of said Act.

THE COUNTY OF IOSCO ORDINANCE:

SECTION ONE: There is hereby established an Isco County Planning Commission consisting of eleven (11) members representing important segments of the economic, governmental, and social life of the County in accordance with the major interests as they exist as follows:

Agriculture, Forestry, Government, Human Resource Development, Communications, Education, Industry, Transportation, Recreation, Sanitation.

SECTION TWO: The members of the Isco County Planning Commission mentioned in Section One shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors; provided, however, that the majority of the members of the Planning Commission shall hold no other office or position in county government. Initially, the terms of appointments shall be as follows: 3 members shall be appointed for terms of one year each, 4 members shall be appointed for terms of two years each and 4 members shall be appointed for terms of three years each; all appointments shall become effective on the effective date of this Ordinance. Thereafter, appointments shall be made by the Board of Supervisors at the April session to fill vacancies then existing or any vacancies which will exist prior to the following January 1st.

SECTION THREE: The duties and powers of the Isco County Planning Commission shall be in accordance with said Act 282 of the Public Acts of 1945 as amended.

SECTION FOUR: All members of the Isco County Planning Commission shall serve without compensation; provided, however, that they may be reimbursed for actual, reasonable and necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties.

SECTION FIVE: This Ordinance shall be published in a newspaper circulated with the County in accordance with the Statute and shall be effective November 1, 1967.

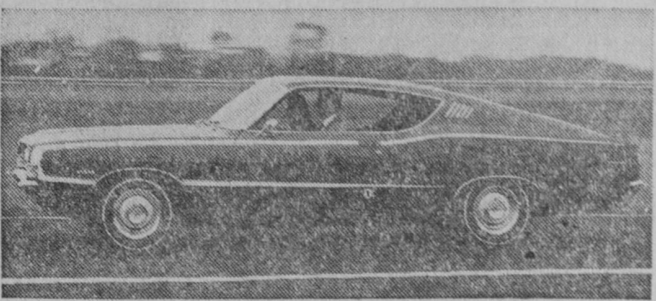

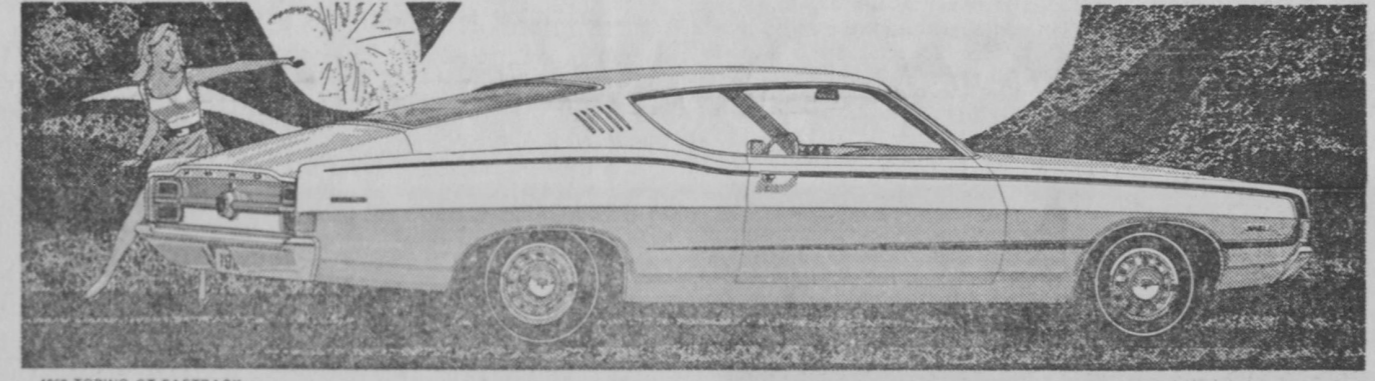

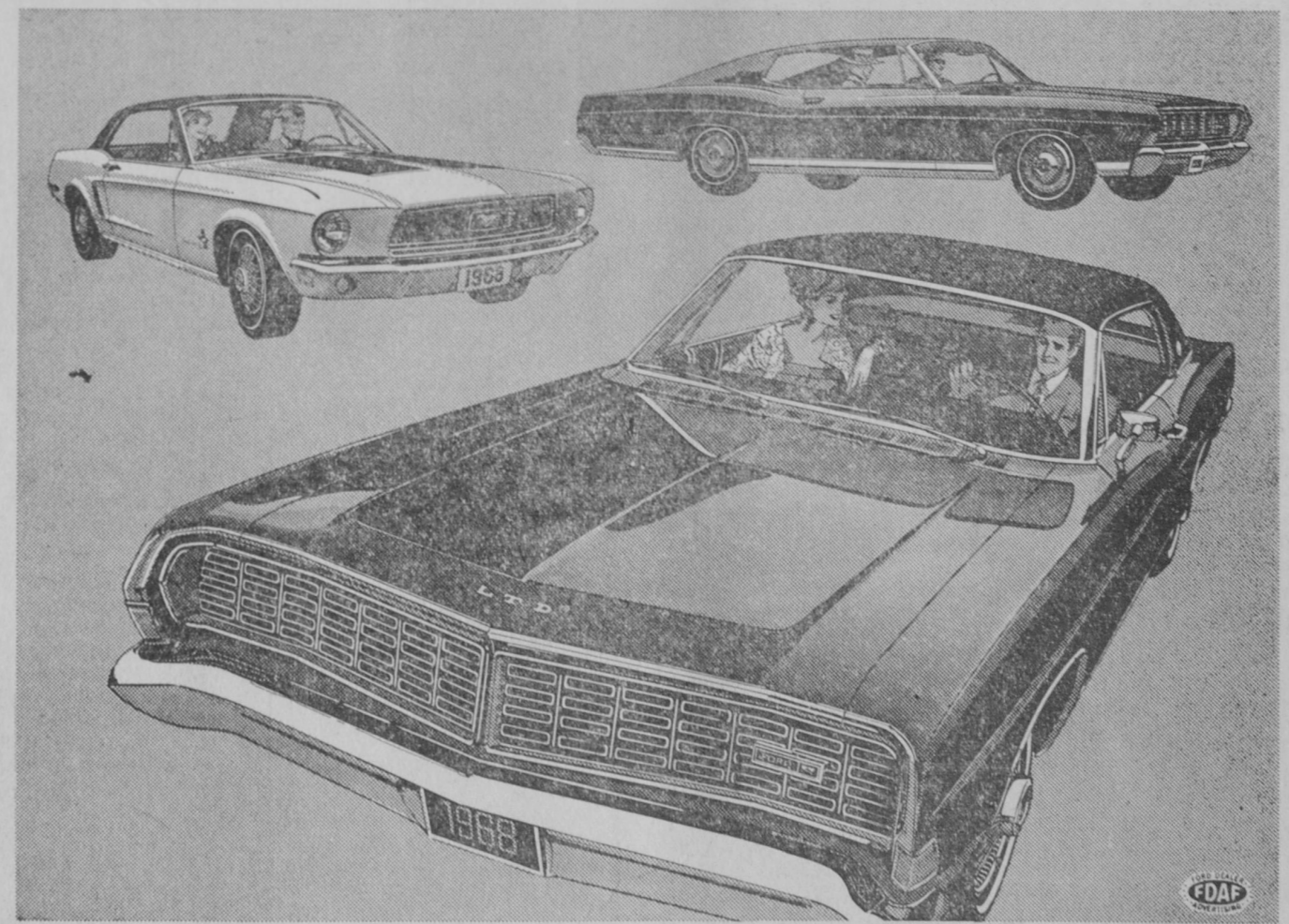
