Adopt Iosco Budget; Slight Increase Seen

An operating budget of \$467, 821 for 1969 was adopted Monday for the county by the Iosco Board of Supervisors. This is \$32,812 higher than the final budget for 1968 as adopted last October.

L. S. Little, chairman of the finance and apportionment committee, said that the final budget adopted next October would probably be adjusted downward, as was the case last year when approximately \$25,000 was slashed from the preliminary budget.

With estimated fees of \$113, 000, the amount to be raised by taxation is \$354,821. Fees last year amounted to \$68,000, but an additional \$9,000 is expected from the register of deeds office in revenue stamps and \$42,000 is anticipated from state income tax.

The new budget allows an in crease for county officers, effective January 1. Salaries for county officers next year will be \$7,200, as compared to \$6,500 this year. Only variance from this schedule is in the county clerk's office, where the salary is \$7,000 plus \$1,-200 as court clerk, and \$4,450 for probate judge, which is matched by the state.


