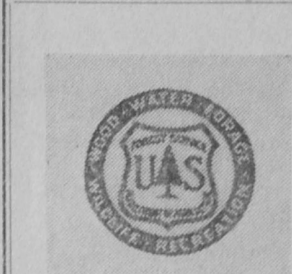

Joseph A. Pfeiffer Died April 11

Joseph A. Pfeiffer, 79, Tawas City, died April 11 at Isoco Medical Care Facility.

Born June 22, 1888, in Tawas City, he attended school here. When 17 years of age, he left for the Canadian Northwest Territory where he spent seven years trapping and prospecting.

From 1905 until 1912, he and a partner roamed from Athabasca Landing, northwest of Edmonton, to Fort Good Hope near the Arctic Circle, prospecting for gold and selling furs at Hudson Bay Company posts.

On his return home, he entered employment of Barkman Lumber Company, served on the Detroit Police Department for several years, then returned to Tawas City where he and the late Clark Tanner operated a sawmill business. He later was employed by Huron Rustic Furniture Company and retired from the saw filing business in 1954.

He was an avid philatelist and collector of pictures dealing with early history.

He is survived by two brothers, Matthew Pfeiffer and Edward Pfeiffer of Tawas City; one sister, Mrs. Celia McArdle, Tawas City.

His wife, the former Ida M. Reinke, Tawas City, passed away December 10, 1964.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday, April 13, at Jacques Funeral Home, Tawas City, with the Rev. William Lindholm officiating. Interment was in Tawas City Cemetery.

Road Commission Submits 1967 Report

Iosco County Road Commission had total construction expenditures of \$399,094.91 during 1967, according to a report last week to the board of supervisors.

This included primary construction of \$341,241.22, paid 100 percent by the road commission, and local construction of \$57,853.69, shared equally by the road commission and township participation.

Total operating expenditures for the year amounted to \$724,125.52, which included the above construction costs, maintenance expenditures of \$109,612.92 on primary roads and \$125,338.12 on the local road system. Total equipment expense amounted to \$247,336.67, while administrative expense amounted to \$47,163.40.

Primary construction expenditures saw the road commission complete with its own forces, 1.60 miles of grading, drainage structures and gravel surfacing of the Kokosing Road, east from the South Branch Road; the east two miles of Kokosing Road was constructed under contract with the Domres Construction Company and financed on a 50-50 basis with the Bureau of Public Roads; three miles of the Alabaster Road from Lorenz Road to Jordan Road was constructed under contract with Domres Construction Company.

Eating "High On The Hog"

Means you are really living... an expression that probably originated from the fact that the most popular pork cuts, chops and loin roasts, come from the upper part of the animal or high on the hog.

During this month, many will eat high on the hog for supplies of market weight pigs is two to three percent higher than that of a year ago. In addition to increase in pork, there are generous supplies of beef, broilers and turkeys for a variety of pleasant meals.

Practically all fresh grapes are gone from storage so will have to look forward to the new crop this fall. The orange and grapefruit supply is about to decrease, but the lemon supply will increase in time for spring lemonades. Strawberries and asparagus are appearing from the south and west and fruits from Puerto Rico. Strikes in Hawaii are cutting into our pineapple supply from there and typhoons in the Philippines have made coconuts almost nonexistent. With the short supply of nuts, we may find more candies without nuts and coconut.

The dealer should offer service and well-trained employees to handle repairs.

So far, the operation has accounted for over 500 Viet Cong dead and has shoved the enemy away from My Tho, the capital of Dinh Tuong Province.

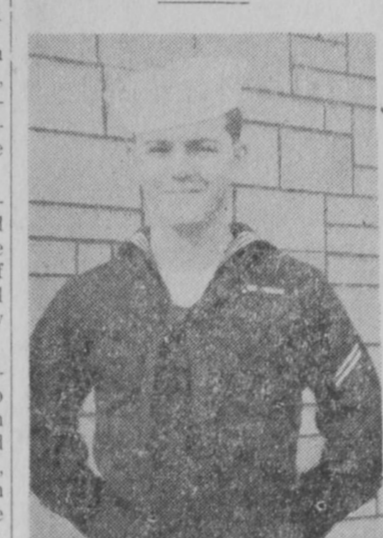
