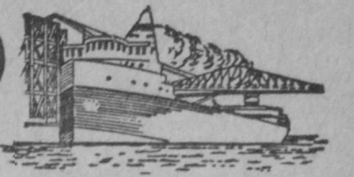

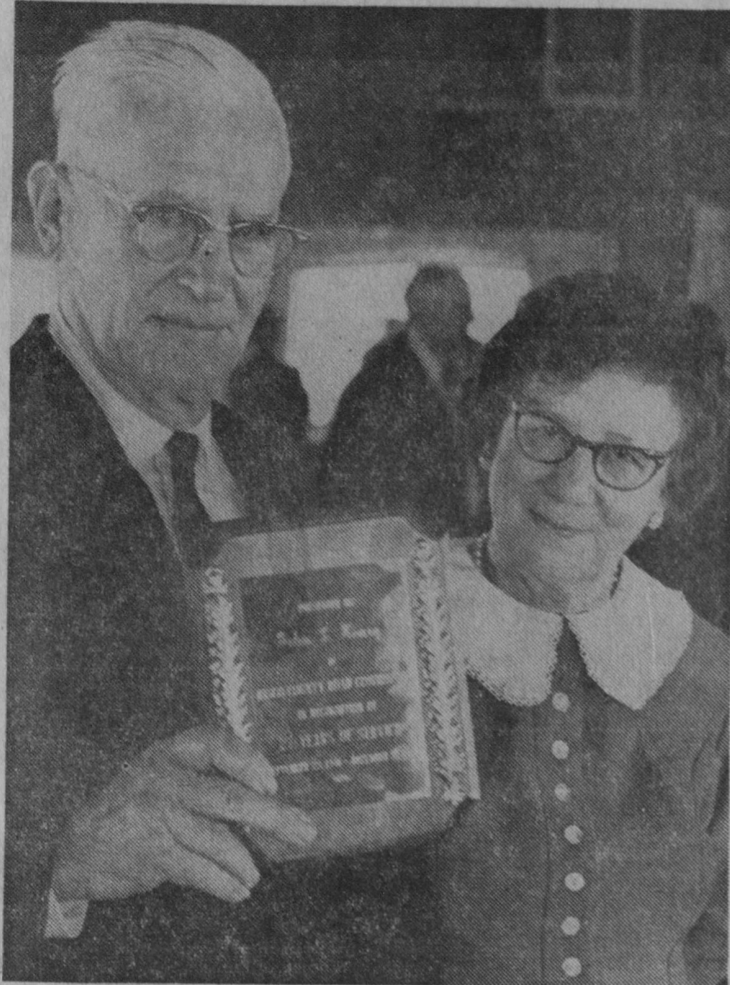

## Veteran Roadman Retiring in Iosco

John Henry, 69, who closes a 27-year career with the Iosco County Road Commission effective December 31, was honored Thursday at a luncheon held at Tawas Golf and Country Club. There were 52 persons in attendance representing five counties.

Toastmaster was Robert Orr, representing Jennison Bridge Company, Port Huron. Road supervisors from throughout the state were in attendance, as well as members of the Iosco Road Commission, Iosco Board of Supervisors and Michigan Department of State Highways.

Mr. Henry was presented with a plaque in recognition of his many years of service to the county. Joining the county road commission September 23, 1941, Henry

had been road foreman from 1941 until 1950. He then became superintendent.

The 860 miles of local and primary roads are a far cry from 1941, according to Mr. Henry. "In those days, we had to put a grader on each end of a road when there was a funeral during the spring breakup. The county now has many miles of paved roads, as well as much improved gravel roads."

Henry recalled that road commissioners hiring him in 1941 were Chairman Ernest Crego, Elmer Britt and John Mielock.

A native of East Tawas, he was one of the early resort owners on Sand Lake. He opened a dance hall and five-cottage resort at the lake in 1923.

He had been an employee of the stores department of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway for 12 years.

In addition to his service with the road commission, Henry has been a member of the Iosco Welfare Board for 33 years. After integration into the Michigan Department of Social Welfare two years ago, Mr. Henry was the only member remaining from the old Iosco County Poor Commission.

"I guess I'll fool around on my farm for awhile," was the way Mr. Henry described plans for his retirement.

The honored guest's wife, Elsie, and wives of road commissioners were in attendance.

Representing the Michigan Department of State Highways was William Brickley, Lansing.

Employees of the road commission are to honor Mr. Henry later this month.

## CUBE Petitions for TA Millage Vote

### Ask Board for Vote in Early February

Petitions requesting a school millage operational vote were presented to Tawas Area Board of Education at Monday night's regular meeting.

Presented by representatives of CUBE, Citizens United for Better Education, the petitions signed by 470 electors asked that a 4½-mill proposition for two years be placed before the electorate on February 7 or 14.

Compliance with such an initiative petition by the board of education is mandatory according to state election law. Dates requested are now to be submitted to the newly-formed election commissions of Iosco and Arenac Counties to determine if any conflict would exist between either one of the dates selected and other scheduled elections.

Once a date for the election is established, the board of education's attorney would set the legal wheels in motion for required notices and printing of ballots.

This would be the third time within eight months that additional school millage has been sought by the district. The first two elections—June 10, which lost by 53 votes, and July 29, which lost by 229 votes—were initiated by the board of education. In order to hold a third vote, state law required that it would have to be at the request of petitioners.

Appearing before the board of education to present petitions were Mrs. Donald Mooney and Mrs. Leonard Hintz, who were active with the CUBE organization during its study of school financial problems over the past three months.

"We intend to give taxpayers the opportunity to ask questions about school financing and operation and CUBE intends to be in a position to give some answers," said Mrs. Mooney.

Supt. Reynold Mick praised all members of the committee who have spent a considerable amount of time studying the school's financial problems, as well as taking a look at the school's entire educational program.

"Members spent considerable time looking at budgets and estimating necessary expenditures over the next two years. They came up with a figure of 4½ mills to finance the school program," said Mick.

Other than asking people to vote on the question, the board of education will be unable to urge a vote one way or the other in the proposition, according to state law.

CUBE will present a series of newspaper articles and radio broadcasts informing residents of the needs of the school district.

### War Surplus Welders Cause Concern at TA

War surplus equipment, no matter how cheaply it can be obtained, is not always a good buy. This is the conclusion reached at Tawas Area School.

The school purchased four "brand new" electrical welding machines from government surplus two years ago for its new shop. Cost of the machines, valued at around \$500 each, was only \$75 each.

John Alexander, curriculum coordinator, told members of the board of education Monday night that the large welding machines draw more power than what was intended when electrical service was designed for the shop. When more than two of the machines operate at one time, circuit breakers shut off the power.

On recommendation of electricians, use of two machines is to be discontinued. The school is to investigate the possibility of selling one of the large industrial type welders and purchase a smaller unit which would be suitable for a school shop.

In other business, bids were received from three firms for bus bodies. Bids included Great Lakes Coach, \$4,313 per unit; Superior, \$4,544 per unit; McFadden, \$4,295 per unit. Cost of truck chassis is in addition to the bodies and bids would be taken at a later date.

Bids are now being taken for either repair of the boiler at the Tawas City Elementary Unit or replacing with a new one. A defective control caused extensive damage.

### File Petitions Soon for City Primary Votes

Last day for filing nomination petitions for city offices in Tawas City, East Tawas and Whittemore is December 30.

Nomination petitions for mayor, treasurer, clerk, ward aldermen and city supervisors are to be made in Tawas City. Petitions are to be filed for mayor, treasurer, clerk and three aldermen at East Tawas.

If more than two candidates file for any one office, a primary election would be required on February 17.

Signatures of from three to five registered electors is all that is needed for a candidate to qualify for the primary.

The three Tawas City aldermen whose terms expire next April are Clark Tanner, First Ward; John St. James, Second Ward; and Cecil Cabbie, Third Ward.

The council is to appoint a successor to fill the vacancy of the late Clyde Evril, Second Ward alderman. Also to be named is a successor for Clement Stephan, present Second Ward supervisor, who was elected last November to the new county board of supervisors.

Following the appointment, the candidates named to fill vacancies would be required to file nomination petitions on or before the December 30 deadline.

Terms of Ben Brewer, First Ward supervisor, and Clarence Everett, Third Ward supervisor, are to expire in April and nomination petitions for these two offices should be filed before the deadline.

City supervisors are to retain their present roles of assessing officers and would act on the board of review.

## Judge Miller Announces He'll Name Myles Iosco Prosecutor

Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller announced Monday that he was to appoint Kenneth J. Myles as this county's new prosecuting attorney sometime next week.

Myles, who topped "write-in" candidates in the November general election, passed his state bar examination last week.

Granted a juris doctor degree upon his graduation last June from Wayne State University Law School, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Myles of Tawas City.

Since graduation, Myles has been working in the office of the state attorney general.

Myles is to succeed J. Richard Ernst, who was sworn in last week as district judge.

Prior to his study at Wayne State University, Myles served with the United States Army in Germany from April 1963 to May 1965. He graduated from Tawas Area High School in 1958 and graduated from Central Michigan University in 1962 with a major in economics. He also studied one summer at the University of Vienna.

He is married to the former Miss Leslie Stebbins of Quincy, Illinois. She received a master's degree in political science from Wayne State and is currently administrative assistant to the president of Metropolitan Fund, Incorporated, Detroit.

Another Iosco resident admitted to the state bar last week was Gary K. Mielock, who received his juris doctor degree from Wayne State University on June 18.

He holds a bachelor of art degree from Michigan State University and is a graduate of Whittemore-PreScott Area High School.

He is married to the former Cathleen Tobin. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. James P. Mielock of Whittemore.

### Property Sold Last Week

## Coho City Marina Planned at Mouth of Tawas River

Purchase of the west side of the Tawas River mouth and plans for development as the new Coho City Marina were announced Friday by Edward Whalen, Mt.

Clemens, president of a corporation which purchased the property. The transaction was completed Friday by Robert N. Rollin, salesman for Merschel Real Estate,

who had been negotiating this sale over the past two months. Whalen and Capt. Hank Bradley, St. Clair Shores, who will have charge of charter boat fish-

ing, said that the corporation plans to expand about \$150,000 in developing the property as one of the finest marinas on the Lake Huron side of Michigan.

"We believe that this location has one of the greatest potentials for a marina on the Great Lakes," said Whalen. "And if the City of Tawas City can complete its current negotiations for purchase of the east side of the river mouth for public access to Tawas Bay, the Tawas River mouth could be developed into one of the finest small boat harbors on Michigan waters."

The purchase includes 393 feet of highway frontage on US-23, along with frontage on Tawas River and Tawas Bay. In addition, the corporation purchased the Matthew Hoag property directly across US-23 which will be utilized for parking.

Whalen is a fishing tackle manufacturer and wholesaler at Mt. Clemens. His True Action Manufacturing Company is to be located here.

Bradley, who has 20 years experience as a charter boat captain in Michigan and on the East Coast, said the firm expects to provide facilities for approximately 30

charter boats during the coho fishing season.

Bradley, who operated his boat out of Manistee, Ludington and Frankfort last summer, said that nine licensed captains had already made reservations for use of the port facilities and more were expected shortly. He plans to attend sport and boat shows at New York, Chicago, Illinois; Cleveland, Ohio, and Detroit during the winter to advertise the new facility.

Immediate plans call for construction of a seawall around the property, along with construction of six boat ramps, installation of four gasoline pumps and a parking lot. An overhead crane will be used to launch 40-foot cruisers.

Smaller boat sheds on the property are to be removed and new facilities provided, along with remodeling of the large boat shed. The large home located on the site, which has a beautiful rustic log interior with large fireplace, is to be converted into a restaurant and snack bar.

Whalen said that the small tackle shop located on the river bank is to be enlarged and fitted out with a \$10,000 stock of tackle.

"As you can see with this planned development, we are expecting big things from Michigan's

coho season next year," said Bradley. "For instance, J. L. Hudson Company has opened a new coho department and predicts \$200,000 in annual sales from salmon fish-

ing gear. Chrysler Corporation says fishing boat sales are up 40 percent in the Great Lakes. One of the nation's largest tackle

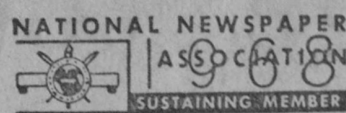

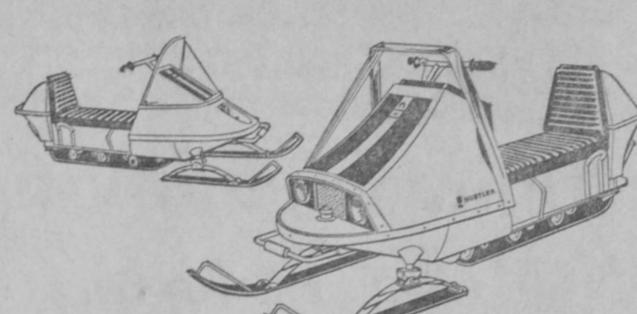

Since the first Christmas Christians have followed the Star to the stable-grotto beneath the church of the Nativity, the traditional birthplace of Jesus of Nazareth in Bethlehem.

Bethlehem is even poorer than most people would believe. A recent visitor said "Wanderers fill the streets — anyone can see why Mary and Joseph found no room in the Inn."  
 Every Christmas, shepherds watching their flocks outside Bethlehem, had to be especially watchful that the sheep did not trap themselves in the barbed wire separating Jordan and Israel. Bethlehem, on the Jordan side of the wire, has been sorely affected by the hostility and the uneasy truce. It is crowded with Arab refugees who formerly lived in Israel.

The effect of the conflict has been crippling of Bethlehem's chief industry; the making and selling of objects of piety from olive wood, Dead sea stone and mother of pearl. Except at Christmas, pilgrims are so few that the profit had gone from the business.

On Christmas eve, however, the dusty city takes on new life. Christmas diplomats living in divided Jerusalem expect to be escorted to the little town over the unusual highway through no-man's land. Pilgrims from the Israel side pass through the Mandelbaum Gate.

Rich and poor pilgrims worship together in the fourth century church of the Nativity. There is a high mass, during which the image of the Christ Child is carried from the church through the Mandelbaum Gate.

The ceremonies come to a climax before three adjacent shrines. The Altars of the Nativity, The Wise Men and the Manger. Outside, Christians from many lands will sing, as angels sang nearly 2,000 years ago; "Glory To God In The Highest", and on earth peace and good will toward men.

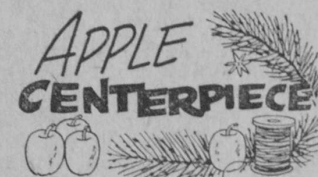

**APPLE CENTERPIECE**

Apples and evergreens from your own garden will make the perfect centerpiece for your holiday dinner table.  
 Remove the stems of eight shiny red apples and scoop out holes large enough for 5-inch candles. If you want your centerpiece to last through the holidays, coat the apples with a clear lacquer to prevent shriveling.

String the apples on a piece of heavy wire (14 gauge) about 38 inches long, spacing the apples evenly. Bend wire into a circle and secure both ends in one apple. You could, of course, just stand the apples in a circle. But the wire holds them securely, so that if something should bump into them they won't topple over.

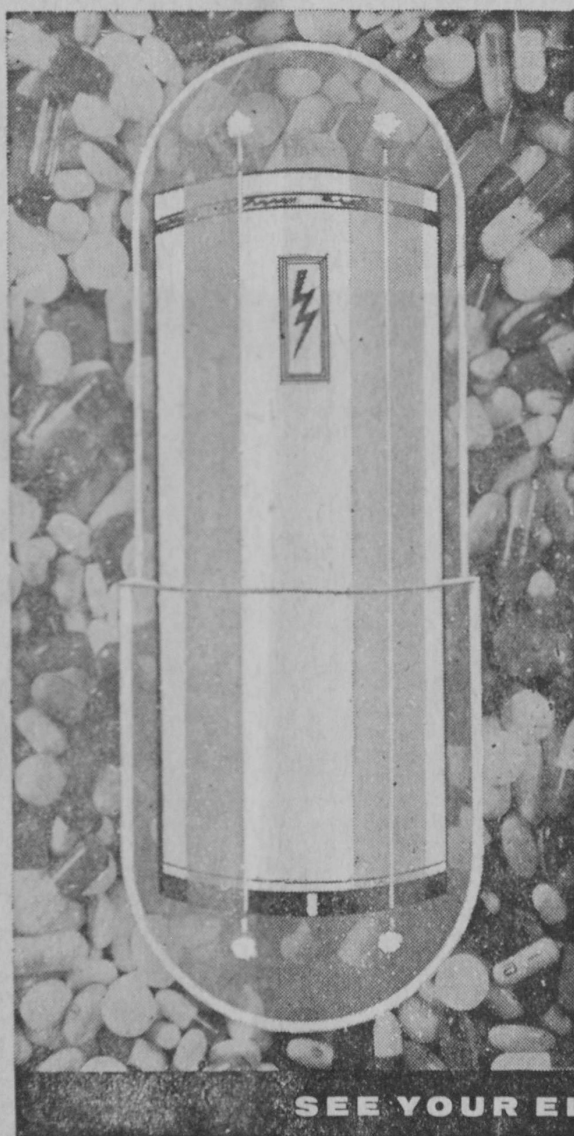
Fasten the candles with a few drops of melted wax. Cover wire with sprigs of evergreen or strands of pine.  
 For the center, choose the largest apple you can find, scoop out the stem, and wedge a tall candle in the hole by using springs of evergreen.

You can achieve a color scheme to suit your holiday decor by the kind of apples you choose — red or yellow, or even green; by the kind of evergreens you use; and by the color of candles you select. Use red apples with red or white (or both) candles and evergreens such as cryptomeria, white pine, balsam; use yellow apples and yellow or white candles with yellowish-green foliage; green apples and blue candles with bluish-green evergreens.

If there is a flickering in your fireplace, toss in a few scraps of apple peel and some twigs of evergreen — they will give a lovely aroma!

**Turkey is Choice With Americans**

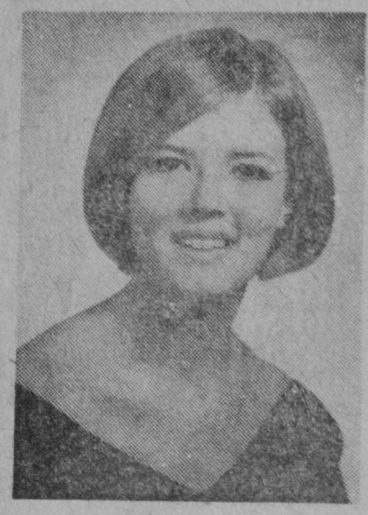

## Sheriff Lists New Laws for Snowmobiles

Iosco Sheriffs Department reminds residents that effective January 1, all snowmobiles must be registered with the secretary of state's office. Registration number is to be painted on the front of each machine.

The new state law which became effective September 1 states that no person shall operate a snowmobile at the main portion of any roadway, with the exception of county roads not having a 10-foot shoulder.

The new law specifies rules for operation, including a lighted headlight and tail light for operation of a snowmobile one-half hour after sunset and one-half hour before sunrise. All machines are to be equipped with a muffler and rifles or bows must be encased while on a machine.

Any personal injury accident or property damage accident of \$100 or more must be reported immediately to the state police or sheriff's department.

### AMENDMENTS TO ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE IOSCO COUNTY BUILDING AUTHORITY

The Articles of Incorporation of the Iosco County Building Authority heretofore adopted by the board of supervisors of the County of Iosco, State of Michigan, at a meeting duly held on the 6th day of December, 1967 under the provisions of Act No. 3 of the Michigan Public Acts of 1948 (1st Ex. Sess.) as amended, are hereby amended as follows:  
**ARTICLE III**  
 The purpose of this Authority is to acquire, furnish, equip, own, improve, enlarge, operate and/or maintain a building or buildings, automobile parking lots or structures, recreational facilities and the necessary site or sites therefor, for the use of the County of Iosco.  
**ARTICLE X**  
 The powers of the Authority shall be exercised by its governing body which shall be known as the "Commission" and shall consist of three members to be appointed by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Iosco, each of whom shall hold office for a term of three years, except that the terms of the commissioners first appointed shall expire on December 31, 1967, December 31, 1968, and December 31, 1969, respectively. Thereafter each commissioner shall be appointed for a full three-year term beginning on January 1 of the first year of the term and expiring on December 31 of the last year thereof. Each commissioner shall serve during the term for which he was appointed and thereafter until his successor is appointed. No member of the Board of Supervisors or the County of Iosco shall be eligible to appointment or membership on the Commission. Members of the commission may be paid such compensation, and such per diem and mileage for attending meetings, as may be provided by the commission with the approval of the incorporating unit or units. The first members of the Commission shall meet for the purpose of organization within twenty (20) days after their appointment and thereafter the Commission shall meet for the purpose on the first day in January, in each year which is not a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday, at 10:00 o'clock A. M., at the usual place of holding the meetings of the Commission. At each of such organization meetings, the Commission shall select a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman and a Secretary, who shall be members of the Commission, and a Treasurer who may or may not be a member of the Commission. The office of Treasurer may be held by any member of the Commission not withstanding that he holds some other office on the commission.  
 Such officers shall serve until the organization meeting in the following year and until their respective successors shall be selected. The time and place of such original organization meeting shall be fixed by a majority of the members of the Commission and notice thereof served personally upon all members, at least twenty-four hours prior to the time of the holding of the meeting. No appointment to the Commission and no election of an officer of the Commission shall be deemed to be invalid because it was not made within or at the time specified in these Articles. Any member of the Commission may be removed for cause at any time by action of the Board of Supervisors of Iosco County. Any officer of the Commission may be removed by action of the Commission.  
**ARTICLE XVI**  
 These Amendments, upon their adoption by the Board of Supervisors of said County of Iosco, shall be executed in duplicate for and on behalf of said County, by the Chairman of said Board of Supervisors and the County Clerk of said County. Said duplicate executed copies shall be delivered to the County Clerk of said County, who shall file one of said executed copies in his office and the other with the Secretary of the Authority, when selected. The said County Clerk shall cause a copy of these Amendments to be published once in The Tawas Herald, a newspaper circulating within the County of Iosco. He shall file one printed copy of these Amendments with the Secretary of State of the State of Michigan and one printed copy thereof in his office, attached to each of which printed copies shall be his certificate setting forth that the same is a true and complete copy of the original Amendments on file in his office, and also the date and place of the publication thereof. These Amendments to Articles of Incorporation shall become effective upon the 13th day of November, 1968. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Iosco, State of Michigan, has adopted these Amendments by the affirmative vote of the majority of its members elect, and in witness thereof has caused the same to be executed for and on behalf of said County of the Chairman of said Board of Supervisors and the County Clerk of said County, this 13th day of November, 1968.

manufacturers has set up his headquarters in Michigan and his business increased fully 25 percent over the previous year."

Because Lake Michigan salmon already show effects of DDT that may make eggs sterile, the conservation department hinted last September that coho eggs for future hatchery stocking may come from Lake Huron fish.

Last spring, young salmon were planted in the Tawas River and AuSable River. A number of "jacks" were caught here during early fall, but the big spawning run is expected starting next August and continuing into the fall.

Charter boats operating out of the river mouth will be seeking the coho in deeper water of Lake Huron during the summer months prior to the spawning run.

"It will not surprise us in the least that there will be some coho taken through the ice of Tawas Bay this winter," said Whalen.

"Can you imagine what will happen if this is the case? It will mean that thousands of fishermen will be trying their luck for a different method of fishing for coho and we intend to be ready for this possibility by opening our tackle shop in the very near future."

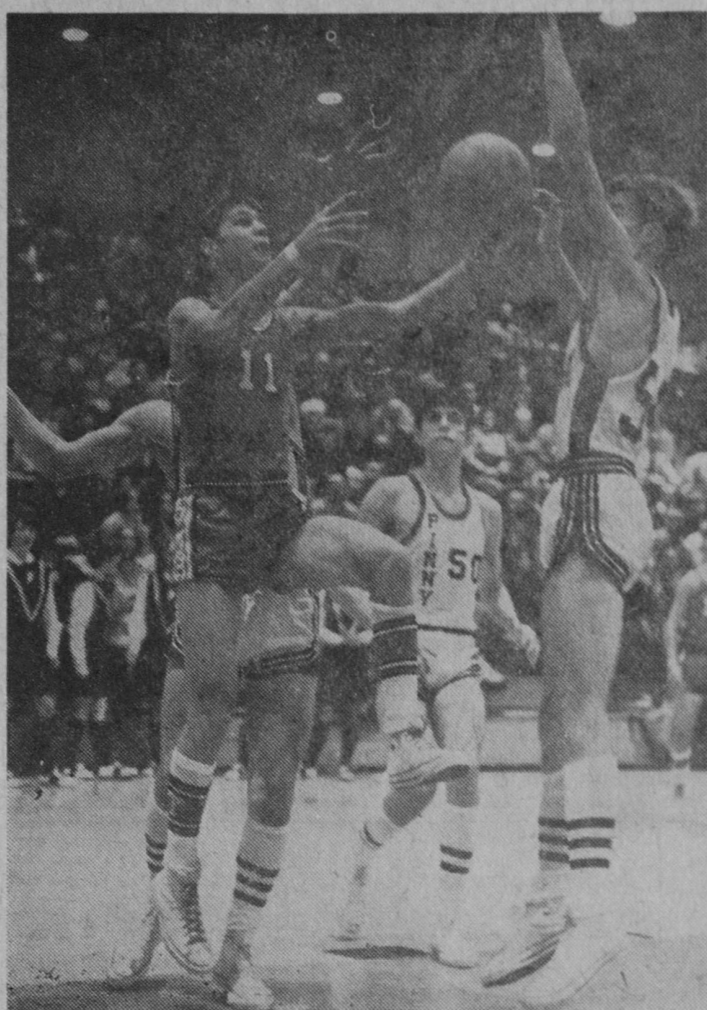

The pay, except on highway projects, is 50 cents per hour for unskilled labor, with a graduated scale for foremen, semiskilled and skilled labor. Approval has been given to the Tawas City sewer project, East Tawas sewer project, Alabaster Township Hall project, Oscoda Auditorium alteration project, several highway projects and the general county school project.

Tawas City Council offers a \$5 reward for information leading to the arrest of the party or parties stealing lanterns from the sewer project.

Location of the state liquor store in this county had not as yet been announced.

**'Preview of Progress'**

GENERAL MOTORS' research-in-action stage show, "Previews of Progress," appeared Tuesday, December 3, at Tawas Area High School. **Forest  
Chats**

The Christmas season means that for several weeks many of us will be sharing our living room with a familiar friend, O'Tannenbaum. So in the interest of friendship, let's talk a bit about

that tree you might have this year.

Just about every kind of evergreen tree has been used for a Christmas tree throughout the world. Some are more preferred than others.

In the northern lake states, balsam fir at one time was the most popular. This tree has single needles, about one-inch long attached singly to the branchlets. Compared to spruce trees, the needles are soft. Balsam fir has a lot of pitch bubbles in smooth gray to black bark. The advantage of balsam is that its needles will stay on the tree for the several weeks it is in your house, however, too often these trees are a little thinner than people like a tree today.

We have two kinds of spruce, white spruce and black spruce, around Tawas that are used for Christmas. Spruce, like balsam, has short needles, from one-half to one inch long. Each needle is attached singly to the branch. The needles are stiffer than balsam and sharply pointed on the ends.

Black spruce usually comes from the swamps. White spruce grows out on the edge of swamps on higher ground. The needles of black spruce are shorter and thinner than the white spruce and the branches of the black spruce appear to droop down more than white spruce. The bark of spruce is rough and scaly.

Spruce is a fuller, heavier shaped tree than balsam but its needles readily fall off as it dries out inside the house. It will help to freshly cut off a piece of the base just before putting it in the stand and then keep the tree well watered.

The most popular cultured Christmas tree is the scotch-pine. The pine is a different family of evergreen. It has long needles about two to three inches long. There are two needles attached together as it joins the branch in scotch pine and the needles are twisted.

Scotch pine is not a native American pine. It was brought over from Europe. Though it was found that it did not grow as well here as in Europe, tree growers discovered that the tree could be well groomed into a thick, well shaped Christmas tree. It also had the advantage that it could be cut well ahead of time and the needles still would not fall off. Scotch pine Christmas trees can not be found growing wild in the forest.

Finally, we have the red or Norway pine. While some have used this tree for Christmas, it is not too desirable because, as it grows naturally, it is a thin looking tree. It can be cultured like Scotch pine but not as easily. Red pine has longer needles than Scotch pine, they are not twisted, but have two needles in a clump.

For those hearty families that still prefer to go to the woods to get their Christmas tree, we would like to remind you that you must have a permit tag to take them from the national forest. These permit tags are available at our of-

ice in the East Tawas post office at a nominal cost.

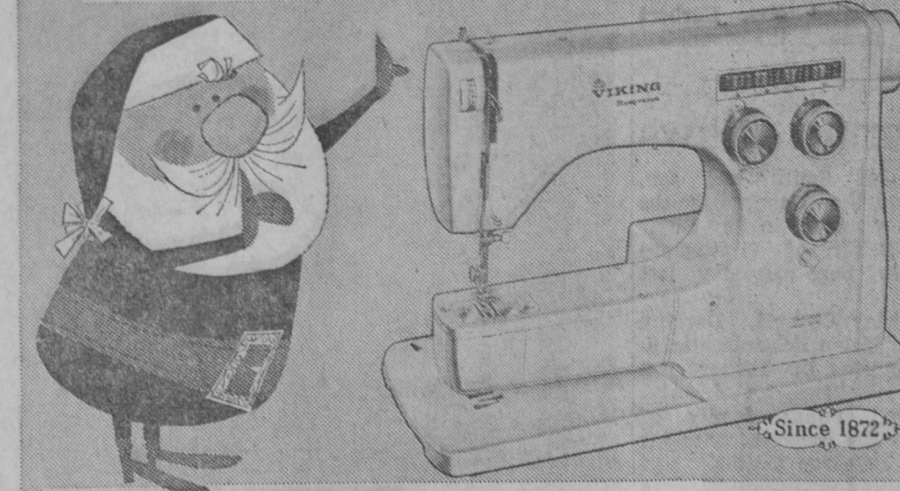

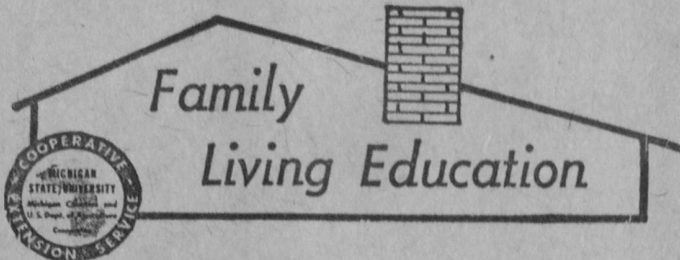

### Christmas Trees

Christmas is nearly here and most of us will soon be confronted with the problem of selecting a Christmas tree. Today, we have the assistance of the United States Department of Agriculture to pick the best tree for your money. USDA marketing specialists have devised standards and quality levels for Christmas trees, grading them for shape, density, freshness, cleanness and absence of defects.

The three grades of Christmas trees in order to quality are US Premium, US No. 1 and US No. 2. Premium trees have a fresh, clean, healthy appearance with at least a medium amount of foliage. US No. 1 and No. 2 trees have the same characteristics but they may be less well shaped or have some minor defects, such as, a slightly crooked trunk. Grades are used mainly by large scale buyers, although you may find some individual trees tagged.

But you can do your own grading. Look for freshness (the needles should not fall off when you rap the base on the ground), for shape (it should be symmetri-

cal on three sides (unless you are going to put two sides in a corner) and for density—you do not want large open spaces between branches.

### Care of the Tree

Quality specialists with the USDA say these four easy steps can keep your Christmas tree fresh, green and safe during the holidays:

1. When you get the tree home, saw a half-inch piece off the butt so it absorbs water.
2. Stand it in water in a cool, shady place, preferably outside, and if you wait a week before trimming, cut the butt again.
3. Set up the tree in a stand that holds water and be sure to keep water in the stand after the tree is decorated.
4. Set up the tree in a spot away from radiators, televisions, fireplaces and other sources of heat.
