The time and the total payments may well compare favorably to those received by the persons who draw the widow's retirement at age 62.

> For example, if the deceased husband's retirement could be computed at \$100, the widow at age 62 would draw \$82.50 a month, while the disabled widow at age 50 could expect to receive a \$50 monthly payment. However, the \$50 payment can be made in many instances for 144 months before the disabled widow reaches age 62. If the disabled widow feels that she does not wish to take the disability payment and waits until 62 to file for the unreduced retirement amount, she will have to live for 17 years after her 62nd birthday before the full widow's benefits check would make up for the checks she might have had if she had claimed bene fits as a disabled widow.

> Considering the fact that most disabled people will not live to the average life expectancy, disabled widows would be wise to explore the possibility of establishing a disability claim on the records of their deceased husband.
