Reach Agreement on New TA Contract

Tawas Area School Board of Education and Tawas Area School Education Association announce that they have arrived at agreement on a contract for 1968-69 school year. The agreement awaits inclusion in a written contract and signing by both parties.

Essential parts of the contract are:

1. Teachers gave up the status of head of the family which, since 1961, has been paying \$200 to each person qualifying.

2. Fringe benefits remain the same as in the 1967-68 contract except that sick leave can accumulate to 75 unused days rather than 60.

3. Salaries for a bachelor degree will be \$6,600 to \$9,519 in 10 steps. This compares with a starting salary of \$6,000 in 1967-68 and a top of \$8,653.

4. Salaries for a master degree will start at \$7,000 and the maximum will be \$10,500. This compares with \$6,400 starting salary and \$9,216 top for 1967-68.

5. Teachers being employed in Tawas Area will receive full credit for years taught in another system. Contracts already approved in other schools in Michigan would make this contract fall among the average group, said Supt. Reynold Mick. "The starting salary seems favorable and continues the agreement arrived at in 1965 that the starting salary was higher, but the first two increments are cut in half so that at the end of the second year, the salary becomes similar to many schools with a starting salary of \$6,400."

Tawas Area has very few fringe benefits in comparison with other schools in Michigan and all fringe benefits cost money to any school. "The board of education wishes to commend the teachers of Tawas Area and negotiators for their professional attitude during negotiations," said Mick.

He started his employment with McKay's Monday morning.

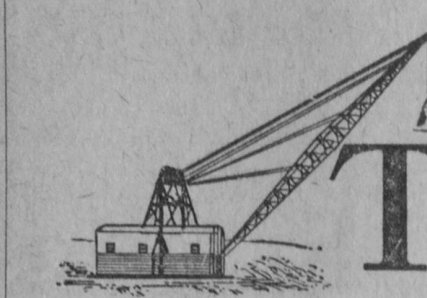
Make Final Plans for Tourist Festival

Hospital's New Coronary Care Unit Dedicated

\$20,000 Unit Aids Heart Patient Care

Formal dedication of Tawas Hospital's new \$20,000 coronary care unit was held Monday morning. Hospital officials dispensed with the usual ribbon-cutting as the long sought-after unit has been in operation for two weeks.

This new unit provides care for coronary patients and it is hoped that it will salvage some of those people with heart disease, who previously would have died.

"As commonly known, people can die suddenly from a heart attack," stated Dr. Larry S. Kelly, physician in charge, Monday morning. "Death is usually due either to cessation of heart beat, or to the appearance of an irregularity of the heartbeat which is incompatible with life."

Function of this new unit is to detect the presence and treat these serious complications before death has occurred in the individual. An electronic device, called a cardiac monitor, constantly checks the heartbeat of the patient.

When a patient is admitted to the coronary care unit, electrodes are attached to his chest which are then attached to the monitor. This instrument gives a continuous reading of the individual's heartbeat on an oscilloscope, a device which looks somewhat like a television screen.

"Thus, any abnormality in the heartbeat can be spotted immediately by the trained person in attendance," said Doctor Kelly.

The machines in the coronary care unit have alarms which will sound if abnormality in the heartbeat occurs. If abnormalities in the heartbeat should begin to de-

velop, proper therapy can be instituted to return the rhythm of the heart to normal.

If the heartbeat should cease entirely, the machine is so designed that within a period of several seconds it would automatically commence giving electrical stimuli to the chest at a regular rhythmic rate to stimulate the heart to beat normally again.

Another condition that can develop is called ventricular fibrillation; that is, a very irregular ineffective heartbeat which, within a few minutes, causes death.

When this situation occurs, a trained person can, within one or two minutes, give defibrillating shocks to the heart to return the beat to normal. A cardiac defibrillator is used for this purpose.

Nurses in Tawas Hospital's CCU have had special instruction in coronary disease and in interpreting electrocardiograms, which are graphic recordings of the electrical activity of the heart. Only those nurses having passed a written examination are permitted to work in the unit.

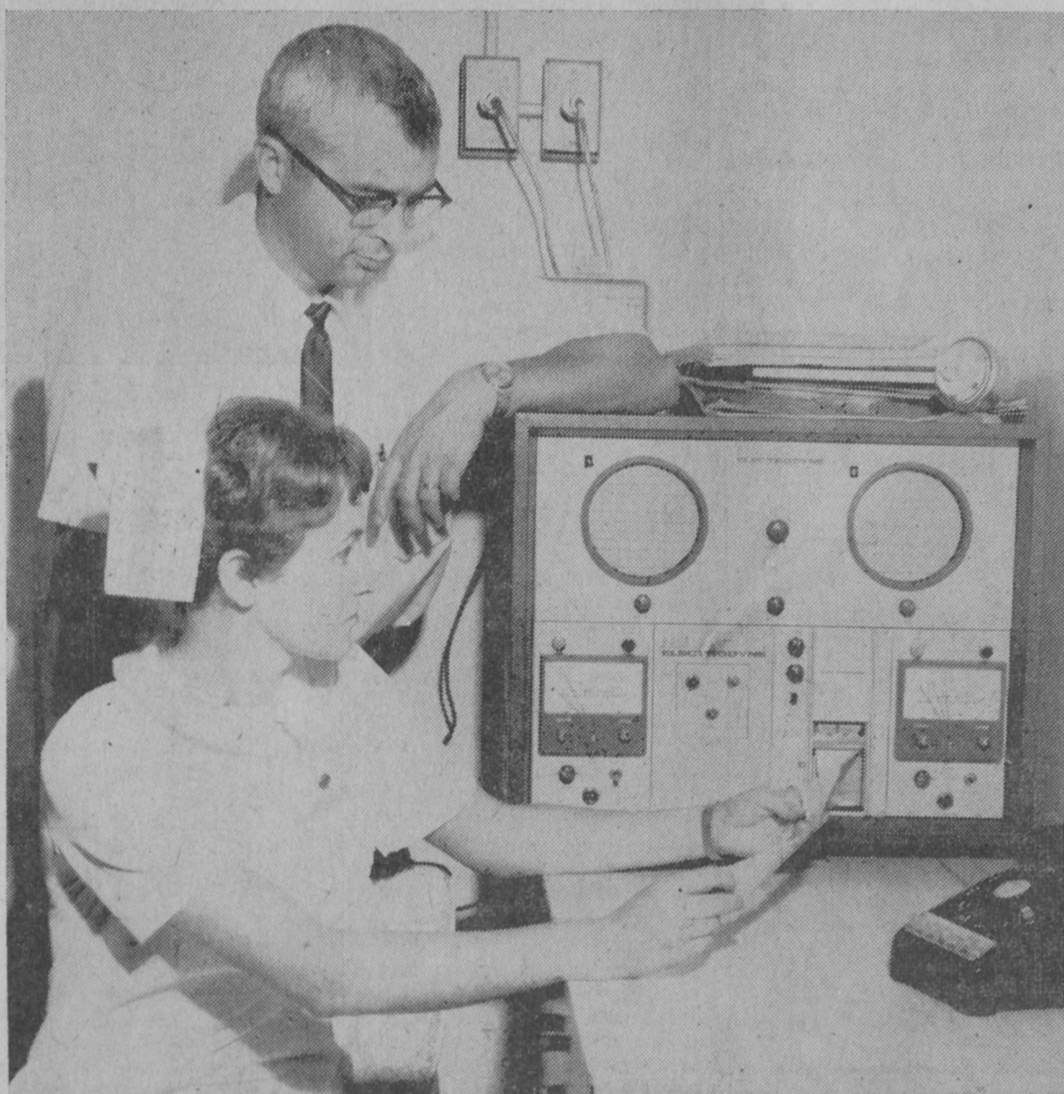
"Coronary care units are being added to hospitals throughout the entire United States," said Doctor Kelly. "Results are shown in those units that have been in operation several years that people are being saved who would have previously died. Certainly, it cannot be expected that all people who suffer heart attacks will be saved, but just a few that do survive is an accomplishment."

M. Jerry Norwood, hospital administrator, said that most recent contributions to the new unit were from the Kennedy family, Robert and John Elliott, Oscoda Lions Club and St. Joseph Altar Society.

Fifteen rooms have now been redecorated in the hospital through contributions from local clubs and individuals. "We still have four to go," said Norwood.

Contributions for continuing the program of room redecoration would be greatly appreciated, said Norwood.

Representing the hospital's governing body at the dedication were Richard Harris and L. G. McKay Jr.

Outline Program Cuts Should Proposal Lose

"I don't like the idea of a threat—you do this, or else—but I feel that the people should know the possible outcome should this millage proposal prove unsuccessful."

So stated Supt. Reynold Mick of Tawas Area School during a discussion at Monday night's meeting of the board of education.

With a second vote due Monday, July 29, on a 2.92-mill operational proposal, meetings with citizens have been held during recent weeks concerning the need for additional school financing. Other informal discussions are planned.

The new proposal for one year

replaces the 3/4-mill proposal defeated by 53 votes on June 10. Reason for the lower millage now asked is that action on the vote was necessary prior to the final meeting of the county allocation board. School officials had assured voters, however, that only enough millage would be spread to meet the budget.

Leonard Sarki, board president, and Trustee Waldo Curry agreed that it was not a wise policy to make threats as to cuts in the school program prior to an election, but both agreed with other members that the people have the right to know, inasmuch as July 29 is the last time that the proposal can be placed before voters this year.

As a result of this discussion, the school administration is to map out a program to make use of existing funds received under the 10.08 allocation from the county, should the millage proposal fail.

The program is to be announced next week.

Mick said that under the present allocation and based on the new budget, the school would have a deficit of approximately \$130,000 at the end of next year. While drastic program curtailment probably would not be felt until the following year, some cuts would have to be made in 1968-1969.

"We would be in for severe criticism from citizens if we do not let them know about possible program curtailment, as to re-submit the proposal at a later date would require petitions signed by 500 taxpayers," said Sarki.

"We are here to set policy for the school. This is not a 24-hour job and it is at low remuneration, other than knowing that what we do is for the children. We have our regular employment, too, and I don't know who would carry the ball for another vote," said the board president.

Monument Would Honor Paddlers

Formal dedication ceremonies for a new monument dedicated to past, present and future canoe paddlers on the AuSable River will be held Sunday, July 28.

Located west of Lumbermen's Monument, construction of the new monument is sponsored by the Michigan Canoe Racing Association and was constructed by Jerry Wagner, Oscoda, former champion of the AuSable River Valley Canoe Marathon.

The monument is nine feet tall and measures eight by eight feet square. It is topped by a pair of crossed paddles made of stainless steel.

A plaque on one side is to bear the names of two men who lost their lives paddling the names of two paddlers who died of

other causes. Included are the names of Jerry Curley, who drowned in 1952; Henry Feldhauser, who drowned in 1964 while trying to save the life of one paddler; Arthur Furtaw and Jerry Lauwers. The latter was killed in an automobile accident.

A special racing program will be included in the day's activities. There will be a professional-amateur race, racing for three trophies; the MGRA junior championship race, a girls' race, mixed race and boys' channel cruising race. The first race starts at 2:00 p. m. Five Channels Dam will be the starting point and Jargo Springs will be the finish line.

In addition, there will be a drawing for positions for the AuSable River Valley Canoe Marathon to be run August 2-3-4.

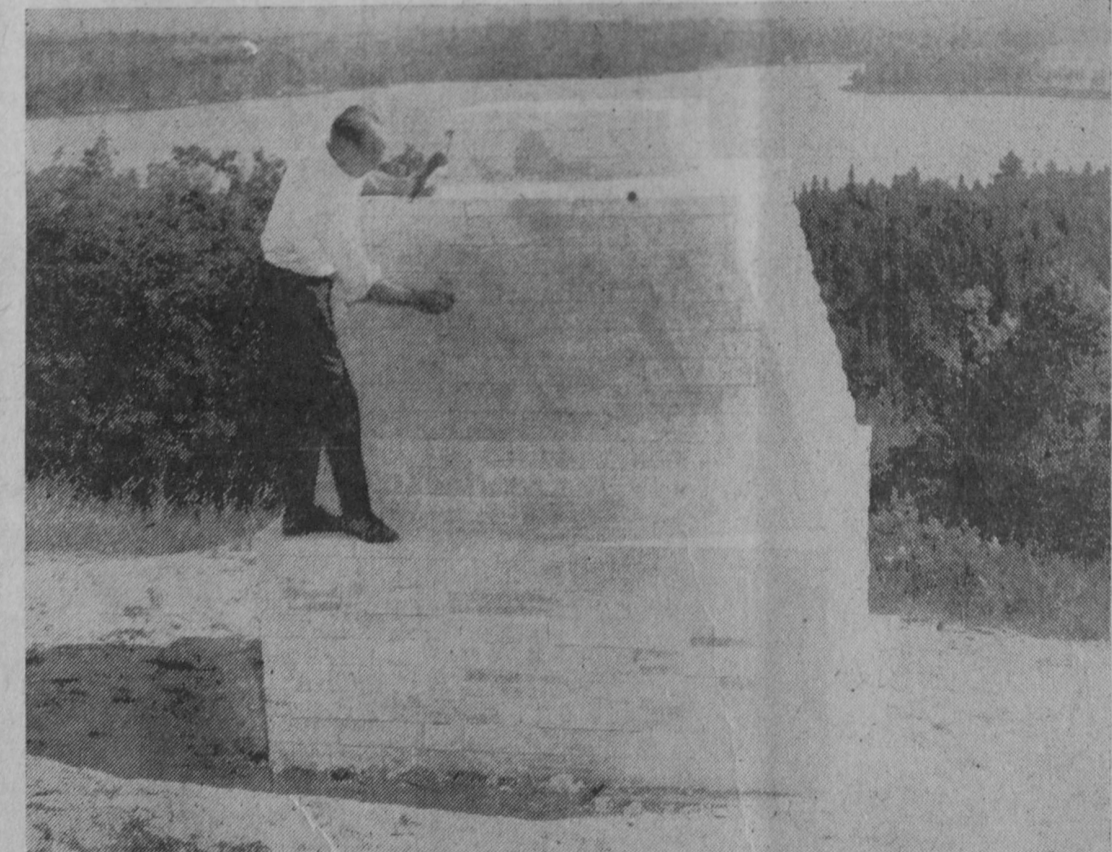
A member of Headquarters, Fifth Special Forces Group (Green Beret), Hauptert was based at Nha Trang. He was a veteran of seven years of service.

Supervisor Jobs Draw 24 Candidates

Contests in seven out of the nine districts for the new office of Iosco County supervisor have been assured for the August primary election with late filing of nominating petitions at the July 2 deadline.

Three Democrats and 21 Republican candidates have filed nominating petitions, according to D. Keith Pappas, county clerk.

Only districts with unopposed candidates are No. 1, Plainfield Township and Precinct No. 3 of Oscoda Township, where William G. Woreley Jr., a Republican, was the lone candidate to file, and District No. 6, City of East Tawas, Wards Two and Three. A contest is assured there in November as R. E. McElheron, Democrat, and Carlton Merschel, Republican, have filed nominating petitions.

A three-way race has developed in District No. 2, comprising Precinct No. 1 of Oscoda Township, Jack W. Allen, Frank W. Parks and C. L. Wilcken are Republican candidates.

In District No. 3, Precinct No. 2 of Oscoda Township, Robert K. Foster and Roger J. Curley are Republican candidates.

Two Republican candidates are listed in District No. 4, all of AuSable Township, Dale E. O'Farrell and J. Berkeley Smith.

District No. 5, all of Wilber and Baldwin Townships with First Ward of East Tawas, lists four Republican candidates, Fred B. Lomas, Peter A. Lichtfus, Henry Ray Mead and Clarence R. McMullen.

Tawas City's three supervisors are Republican candidates for the one office to represent District No. 7, all of Tawas City. They are Benjamin F. Brewer, Clarence S. Ev-

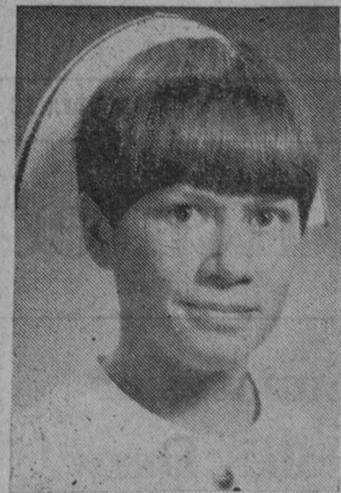

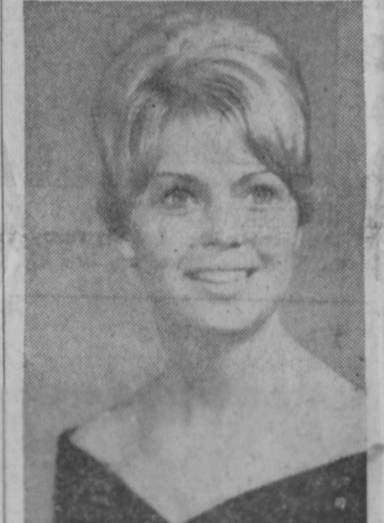

Board Heard Report on TA Hot Lunches

Tawas Area School served a total of 155,360 hot lunches during the past school year, according to a report at Monday night's board of education meeting. This was an increase of 13,620 meals over the preceding year. Cost per lunch served amounted to 37.6 cents and income per lunch was 35 cents. Total receipts in the hot lunch program amounted to \$66,438. This included \$45,353 from students, \$2,820 from adults, as well as \$3,427 for ice cream, \$2,613 from milk sales, \$2,968 for alcaarte and miscellaneous. The school received reimbursement of \$9,233 from the federal government. Supt. Reynold Mick said that the \$3,000 loss last year in the hot lunch program was due to the fact that charges for the lunches had not maintained pace with rising costs of food. In addition, 14,000 more lunches were served than during the previous year due to an increase in enrollment. The board went on record as holding the line on the cost per lunch to students and any deficit in the program be paid from the general fund.

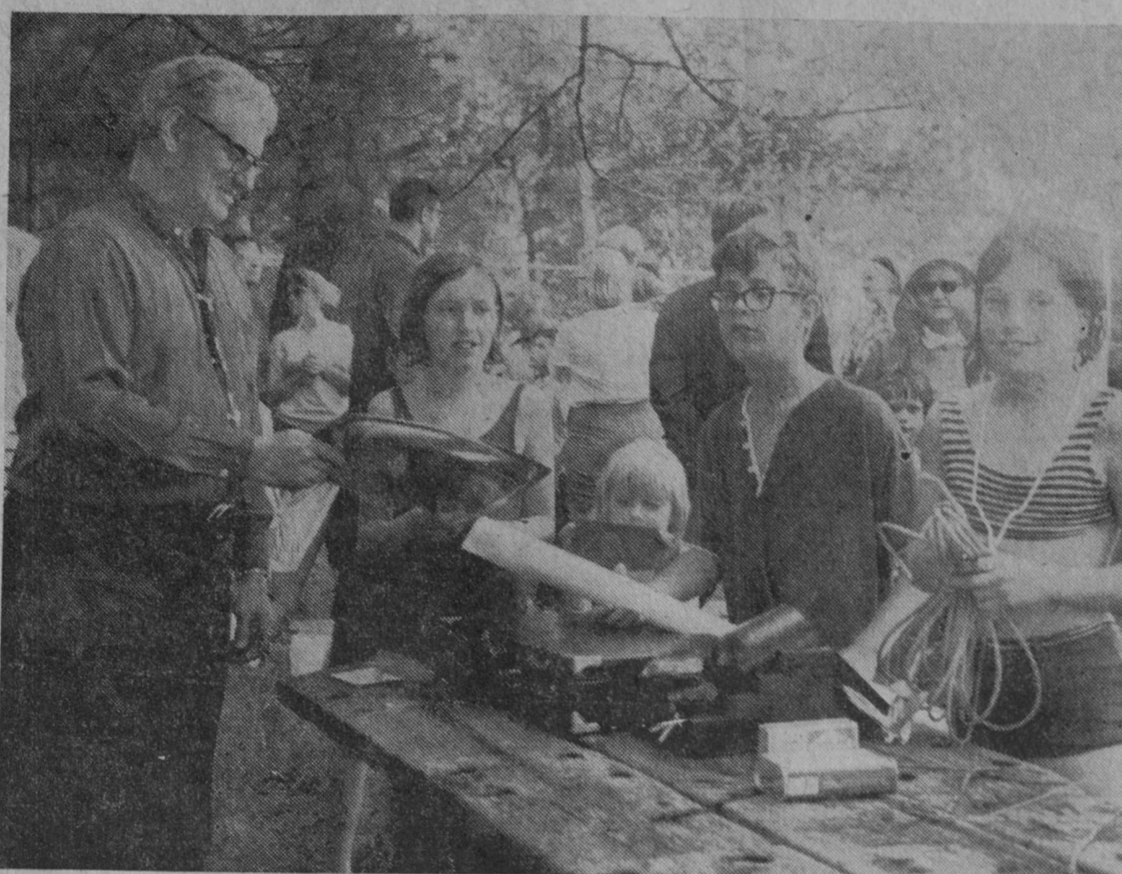

A GIRL'S GARDEN OF WASH-AND-WEARABLES

A flowerful wardrobe of easy-wear, easy-care clothes makes the summer life as light-hearted as a butterfly's. A girl's garden of summer dresses can grow from a single seed.

This daisy of a dress (McCall's 9267) possesses the simple virtues of an A-shape with diagonal bust darts, a plain neckline, sleevelessness and a back zipper. It is easily beguiled by a number of designing ideas.

Discover Your True Flower Self

Sweet as a rose—make the same style with puffed sleeves and dainty lace edging around the neck and hem. Turned on as a tiger lily—try contrasting bias bands around the neck and hem. Groovy as a snapdragon—put on big patch pockets and a high-riding belt, with checkered fabric. Gentle as a pansy—use an "Art Nouveau" print, bloused at the waist with a wide sash. These favorite flower styles are all created from one basic pattern. Take off from here and do your thing with touches of decorative trims, appliques and embroideries.

the JOYS...

A flower can bloom and fade in a day, but you want a dress to thrive through a vacationful summer. The secret of a long and witless life lies in one of the many types of wash-and-wear fabrics. A wash-and-wear tag means that a fabric is washable, quick-drying, requires little or no ironing and is often crease-resistant. It may be made entirely of synthetic yarns or of synthetic yarns mixed with natural fibers or a chemical finish may be applied to cotton, wool or rayon.

... and SORROWS —

The qualities which make wash-and-wear fabrics a joy to care for, also make a few demands on the home sewer. The fabric is smoother and harder; the fabric itself, less pliable and more resistant to handling. This means that it cannot be shaped by steaming, such as easing a sleeve cape into an armhole. Because of its springiness, it is more difficult to obtain sharp creases at the hemline and other garment edges. The most common problem is seam puckering. A wash-and-wear fabric has a strong mind of its own, but is easily managed when you understand its special personality.

— how to COFE

The pattern shown here in two versions is a perfect style for wash-and-wear fabric because the design is uncomplicated, with a minimum of seams and top stitching. For putting the pieces together, "Dual Duty," a cotton covered dacron thread, is especially good. The polyester coil zipper is right for a garment which will receive frequent washings, but be sure to pre-shrink the cotton twill tape. The pins and needles you use should have fine, sharp points and your shears should have sharp cutting blades.

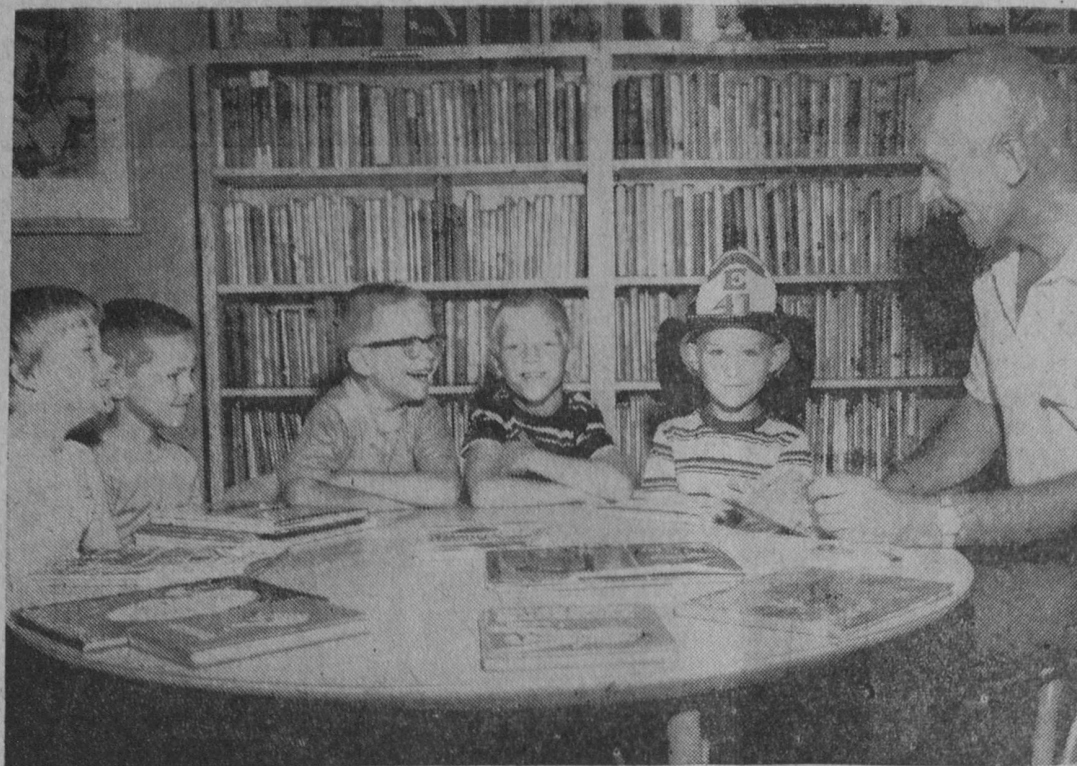

Last week was a busy Fourth of July holiday, but we also celebrated our new year. During a calm moment during that stormy week, I stopped to reflect back over the past fiscal year. These are some of the things that come to mind.

Recreation use has again increased over last year. Hiking youth groups have surprisingly become a significant use. Sand Lake beach was redeveloped last fall. Two snowmobile trails were laid out and were extensively used when we had snow. More work was done to fix up the Lumbermen's Monument area.

For the first time, wildlife watering holes were blasted open last winter out in the jack pine area. The five ponds made in low swales are so successful that this appears to open up vast possibilities of improving deer summer range. Five thousand wildlife food shrubs were planted in our pine plantations put in this spring. This district has pioneered in developing a shrub planting system using the regular tree planting machine. Past years trials have showed up as successful last year.

Four hundred fifteen thousand trees were planted on 588 acres. Aspen stands were released for optimum growth on 270 acres and pine released on 90 acres. Wolf jack pine trees were cut off of 100 acres of new red pine plantation. Planting sites were prepared on 60 acres using a brush chopper, the first one of its kind ever to be used in Michigan.

Over 16,000 acres of national forest lands were examined by our foresters to plan management on these lands for the future. A new inventory system was developed by Forester Bailey and instituted this year to provide a most intense coordinated multiple use management planning.

Over nine million board feet of pulpwood and sawlogs were prepared and offered for sale. Because of poor markets, only 2.7 million board feet were sold. That not sold is available this year to purchasers.

Permits for over 500 cords of fuel wood were given to 114 people free for their personal use in homes in the National Forest area.

Nine special use permits were issued for a variety of uses. Five trespass cases were initiated and four cases completed. Two land exchange cases were initiated. One with Grant Township for a location for a new fire department and the other with Tawas Industrial Development Corporation. Both are for community betterment purposes.

Last fall's fire season was a wet one but this spring made up for that. Lack of snow cover started us to our first spring fire on April 8. By the time rains came in May, we had five fires with two of them burning 137 acres. April and May were tough on forest fire fighters all over lower Michigan. Forest fire fighting training was given to over 50 men this spring using a new fire simulator device for the first time.

Fuel breaks were cleared by hand tools for about two miles in high hazard areas east of Hale. Two miles of fuel breaks were built around the Oscoda Area High School to use in the event a fire was to start near the school.

I could go on and recall all of the people we talked with and all of the day to day work and problems we solved and some we still have to solve. It was a busy year. With even more new frontiers

ahead of us next year, more exciting times are to come.
