A BRIEF HISTORY OF IOSCO COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT - 1949 - 1968

In 1949 when I took office, the Sheriff's Department was re-organized as follows:

That year, our department was the first uniformed department north of the Bay and Muskegon County lines.

In 1950, losco County had the first marked and lettered Sheriff car in the northern part of the lower peninsula, north of Bay and Muskegon Counties. Also, in 1950-51 we started our present "criminal and jail record system." This was made retroactive as far back as possible.

In the early and middle 1950s Sheriffs from most of the medium and smaller counties came to inspect and copy our methods of operation. Today, most all of the counties have the above mentioned improvements.

We regard our department as the standard bearer of the smaller county sheriff department, as we pioneered most of the system now used.

Those early years were rough going through lack of man hours and funds. We bought our own uniforms, which we do to this day, and paid for the cost of lettering of my own personal car. In those days until the year 1960, the county only allowed me \$1 per day for the use of my own car. The county also paid for the insurance.

Wages were small, and the department was small, only-two full-time men and four part-time men. Leon Putnam, the under-sheriff and myself were the only full time officers and it was necessary for us to be on duty 12 to 16 hours per day to keep in operation. I owe Leon Putnam an eternal debt of gratitude for the way he stood by me through the years.

In the year 1958, watercraft became a problem, with numerous calls on reckless operation of boats. Our budget could not stand purchase of a boat so I bought one myself and had this boat two years, later selling it at a loss. At this time, the state worked out a program of matching funds with the counties and losco took advantage of this program and we were in business. The county furnished a third man for this job and this man helped in dog enforcement and other duties in the wintertime.

The board of supervisors through the years made it plain that, as more tax money became available, it would help us build providing that we did a good job. Incidentially, we had good relations with the board in those early years as well as today.

In the spring of 1968, the board of supervisors adopted a resolution that a patrol was needed on M-65, the cost to be shared with the townships in the west side. This venture has proven very successful, but put an additional load on our

At this time, our personnel file lists a drivers license man, one marine officer, one deputy for patrol and criminal investigations, the undersheriff and myself, in addition to the two deputies assigned to road patrol on M-65, for a total of seven men. The county owns two patrol cars and leases one for the

We invite any of our citizens at any time to come into the office and visit the jail, inspect our operations, ask any question that you might be interested in concerning the department. As this is your department and institution you have a right to know! And you can rest assured that we will deal in the truth, backed up by receipts and records.

We get very concerned over some of the recent estimates that are publicized that are far from being accurate. Incidentially, there were 416 prisoners who went through the jail in 1967. Prisoners' meals are 75 cents each, the same as established by the board of supervisors in 1955.

Many problems have arisen: such as, increase in personnel at Wurtsmith Force Base, heavy increase in county population, recent supreme court rulings that hindered enforcement causing increase in crime.

The recent planting of Coho in the area will be a police problem, but with the backing of businessmen and the board of supervisors, as well as citizens, these problems will be met.

Recent organization of the Riot Squad and the Sheriff's Posse adds quite a bit of reserve strength to the department.


