Richard Harwood is New Bank President

Richard L. Harwood, 41, was named July 16 as president and cashier of Peoples State Bank of East Tawas. Announcement was made following a meeting of the bank's board of directors.

Harwood, who has been associated with the bank for the past 18 years, succeeds the late Grant N. Shattuck, who passed away June 30.

A native of East Tawas, Harwood graduated from East Tawas High School in 1944. He served in the United States Navy during World War II. He attended Bay City Junior College and the University of Michigan.

He joined Peoples State Bank in 1950 as a clerk, receiving on-the-job training under the GI Bill through the American Institute of Banking, the educational division of the American Banking Association.

Harwood became a vice president and a member of the bank's board of directors in 1962, was named vice president and cashier in 1964 and was elected executive vice president and cashier in January 1965.

He recently completed one year of office as chairman of Group Five, Michigan Banking Association, comprising banks in 14 counties of Northern Michigan.

He is a member of the East Tawas Lions Club and a member of Baldwin Lodge F&AM. He is a member of Grace Lutheran Church, East Tawas.

Harwood and his wife, the former Louise Aistrom, are parents of six children, Dale, Debra, Donna, Diane, Dawn and Dean.

Glennie Man Killed Monday in M-65 Crash

A 72-year-old Glennie man, Henry Busch, was killed instantly Monday afternoon in a head-on crash with another automobile on M-65 south of the Iosco-Alcona County line.

Witnesses told investigating sheriff's department officers that Busch, traveling south, crossed the center line and had a near brush with a truck before striking a car driven by Keith L. Collins, 44, Mikado.

Collins, his wife, Eugina, and daughter, Holly, eight years old, were treated for injuries at Tawas Hospital and transferred to Alpena and Bay City hospitals.

The driver told officers he was heading north and, when he saw the oncoming car approaching, moved to the shoulder of the road. The two cars met head-on.

Officers said it was one of the worst crash scenes they had ever witnessed. The Glennie man was trapped in the wreckage.

An autopsy was ordered by Coroner E. John Moffatt, who investigated.

Alan J. Compo, 21, Tawas City, was injured at 12:45 a. m. Monday when his car ran off M-65 and struck a guard rail at Tawas River Bridge. He is undergoing treatment at Tawas Hospital.

District Lightning Regatta Set on Bay

Tawas Bay Yacht Club will play host to its seventh Michigan District International Lightning Class Association championship regatta starting today (Wednesday) through Sunday.

Approximately 30 boats are expected to be entered in the regatta, always one of the most colorful events to be staged on Tawas Bay.

This year's regatta should be even more interesting to spectators. Stake boats on the triangular course are to be equipped with radio communications and information is to be relayed to the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock where the race is to be narrated on a public address system.

Defending international champion is Bill McKinley of Tawas Bay Yacht Club. Competition will be at a peak with four other past champions in the visiting fleet.

The first 10 winners in this regatta will go to Chicago, Illinois, in August for the North American Lightning Regatta.

Registration and measuring of

sails starts Wednesday and Thursday with a tuneup race set for Thursday afternoon.

First official race starts Friday morning at 9:30 o'clock, followed by a second race at 2:00 p. m.

Third and fourth races are set for Saturday at the same times, while the fifth race is set for 10:00 a. m. Sunday.

Visitors are to be entertained Friday and Saturday nights at the clubhouse on Tawas Point.

Charles Schreck is general chairman of the event. L. G. (Ladd) McKay is race chairman.

Tawas Bay will finish line Tuesday evening for a race from Alpena by midget ocean racing class sailboats. Some 62 boats in this class took part in a race Sunday from Sarnia to Alpena. Following dinner Tuesday night at Tawas Bay Yacht Club, trophies were awarded to winners.

TA MILLAGE VOTE NEXT MONDAY

Approval of 2.92 Mills Sought for One Year

Tawas Area School District voters go to the polls Monday, July 29, for the second time in 1½ months to approve or disapprove a school operation millage proposal. It will be the last opportunity for such a vote this school term.

School officials are seeking approval of a 2.92-mill levy (\$2.92 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation) for a period of one year. The millage, which would raise \$120,215.83, coupled with \$38,323 in the school's operating fund which is being closed out, would offset an expected budget deficit next year of \$120,000.

Expiring at the end of the last school term were 4½ mills of special voted taxes—2½ for operation and two mills for a pay-as-you-go building program.

If next Monday's proposal is successful, total millage to be levied for school purposes in Tawas Area School district would be 10.08 mills received from the county allocation board, 2.92 mills in special voted millage and only 1.09 for debt retirement.

The proposal defeated June 10 asked for a levy of 3¼ mills for three years. This millage was established prior to final action of the allocation board and the board of education is seeking only enough millage to meet the new budget.

After careful analysis of the school budget for 1968-1969, school officials have been able to find very few instances where cuts are possible. Should Monday's proposal fail, the school district will be many thousands of dollars in debt on June 30, 1969.

The majority of teachers are now under contract for 1968-1969 and, even with the most drastic

cuts in future employment, the budget will remain in the red.

Cutting out all athletics would only reduce expenses by about \$6,000. At the present time, the school is shy three grade teachers. Failure to employ these three teachers would raise the pupil-teacher ratio from 28 to 32 pupils. This would cut about \$20,000 from the budget.

If the three teachers needed in high school were eliminated, the school would have a saving of another \$20,000. This would mean that English would have to be taught by teachers whose preparation lies in other fields.

In a formal statement Monday night, the board of education said that during the year 1968-70, if no more funds are made available, it would be necessary to eliminate at least 18 teachers, eliminate two custodians, call a moratorium on purchase of buses and institute half-day sessions to eradicate the deficit created in 1968-69 and run the school program within state aid and allocated millage.

These drastic cuts would lead to a question of whether Tawas Area Schools would continue to receive accreditation from the University Bureau of School Services. "It is hoped that the board of education will never have to make these choices. An affirmative vote by the electorate will prevent consideration of these actions during the 1968-69 year and leave the way clear to meet only the problems of 1969-70 as these problems arise," said the board of education.

Take Positive Look at Education; Students Need Added Help Today

Taking a positive look at next Monday's school millage proposal, students of Tawas Area need a little added help for the 1968-69 school year if they are to have the continued good opportunities of the past year.

Tawas Area, with the level of support offered in the past few years, has been able to make vast improvements in the educational program.

The community has furnished funds to construct or renovate all the school facilities. This phase has, for the present, ceased to be the matter of prime importance in an educational program.

There are some additions still needed to make Tawas Area into a complete community school, said the board of education. "Many people feel that we should have such things as a swimming pool, a modern track, tennis courts, vocal music facilities, added facilities for special education, a vocational technical school, a junior college available and many other needs. These all have merit and need careful consideration as to whether the community desires to support them."

Tawas Area School has made notable strides in offerings to pupils, including making physical education available for the entire student body, an excellent art program, expansion of drafting courses to allow many more opportunities in this field.

Basic requirements for an excellent mechanics program are available. A number of factors prevented this program from reaching its full potential in 1967-68, but most

of these have been corrected and it is expected that this program will become an excellent contributor to the education of students.

The school's English program is one of the best and meets the majority of recommendations from outstanding authorities. It has met the test of students attending college.

The mathematics program has been nearly all transferred to the new mathematics and teachers have taken in-service training to master the techniques so that students will be better able to make the transition to other schools and colleges.

The commercial program has been improved by addition of second year typing, second year shorthand and office practice. Persons who have the desire and the ability should be ready for immediate limited secretarial employment after completion of these courses.

Facilities for audio-visual education, as well as the library, have been expanded. Team teaching has been started in social studies. This program has many good points and it will be continued and improved. Shop, homemaking and French have been offered as exploratory courses to junior high school. Remedial reading has been offered to selected students of the grades and high school.

Also on the "plus" side of the school program is that the number of students per certified teacher has been reduced to a very favorable ratio, both in grades and high school. The staff, as a whole, is excellent and its academic preparation is very good.

The holding power for teachers is better than most schools in the state.

The band has consistently made Tawas Area proud of its achievements, while athletic teams, debate and forensics teams have commendable records.

The board of education is initiating, with the aid of the Mott Foundation, a Tawas Area Mott program which will offer adult education to the people of the district. Success of this program will

depend on how much the people use the program. It is the wish of the school that Gene Gerber, the director, will be a very busy man in 1968-69.

"These programs have cost money and will continue to cost money," said the board of education. "If the community wishes to have pride in its school and wishes to give comparable and improving opportunities to the students of Tawas Area, it must furnish the added money this will cost."

Supervisors Approve Sunday Liquor Sales

In a 17-1 roll call vote July 17, Iosco Board of Supervisors adopted provisions of the Michigan Liquor Control Act, as recently amended, to provide for sale of liquor by the glass on Sundays after 2:00 p. m.

The new law effects only Class C, Class B, hotel and club licenses.

The board had 60 days to take action on the amendment to the liquor control act. The law provided that if the county failed to take action within the 60-day period, a county-wide referendum could be called on the question at the next regular state election.

Sale of liquor on Sunday cannot be permitted in any city, village or township in which the sale of spirits is prohibited. Fifty percent or more of the business place's gross receipts must come from other than liquor sales.

Seven bar and restaurant owners appeared before the board urging adoption of the measure. Also urging adoption was a representative of Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

In other business, supervisors discussed means of controlling dumping places for septic tank services. Supervisors who attended a recent district health meeting said that the problem was becoming serious in many areas.

Iosco County will host the Fourth District Supervisor Association August 8. The group is to meet at the East Tawas Park and will enjoy a trip on the AuSable River Queen.

Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell and Undersheriff Leon Putnam appeared before the board and requested that dog control be divorced from activities of the sheriff's department. It was stated that the sheriff's department had more than enough police work to keep all members busy and believed much valuable time was being lost in handling dog complaints.

It was believed that through more active enforcement, dog license fees could be doubled. The county has a vehicle which could be used if a separate department is established.

Supervisors Oppose Gun Registration

A resolution opposing federal firearms registration was adopted unanimously last Wednesday by the Iosco Board of Supervisors.

Meeting during its one-day July session, supervisors took note of two bills which were in the United States Senate which would require registration of all firearms in the nation under a system to be established by the secretary of the treasury.

"The Iosco County Board of Supervisors believes that any national or state legislation aimed at crime should be against the criminal," said the resolution. "And further, there is no proof that gun registration would prevent a crime of any kind and registration would require expenditure of large sums of money for enforcement at the federal, state and local level."

Supervisors believed that registration would be the first step toward confiscation of all firearms and noted that in Michigan, this would deprive sportsmen of the right of wholesome activity, as well as the citizen of "his historic constitutional right for protecting his family and home under the second amendment of the constitution."

To the Editor:

Dear Citizens of Tawas Area,

We are on the brink of a quality education for our school area. A great deal of study and work has been done to make this possible. Speaking for the English department, I would say that in the last few years we have increased effectiveness from the point where we were below the national average to where our graduates can begin to compete now in civil service, armed service and college entrance exams.

Passage of the school millage July 29 is crucial to maintaining and improving our school system. Again, speaking for the English department, I would point out that the passage of millage would mean continuance for the high school English teacher of a program that allows time for themes and correction of themes, that might make possible an advanced placement program now or in the near future

to open doors for our top students just as our remedial program this past year has helped slow students get their footing; it might even make possible help for the sadly overloaded junior high English teacher.

If the millage does not pass, and if as a result no new teachers are hired (one suggestion for helping solve the financial problems that would result), the English department, still lacking one high school and two junior high school teachers, would be hit disastrously. If millage does not go through and if no new teachers are hired, teachers who have little or no background or interest in teaching English may be utilized. No one wants a wasted year under an ineffectual teacher . . . especially in English, the basic skill to communication, to education and to success in life.

Back our schools, our teachers, our young people. Help build a better tomorrow for our community. We need your vote for the financial backing of education here. It's vitally important and it is in your hands to decide, Monday, July 29.

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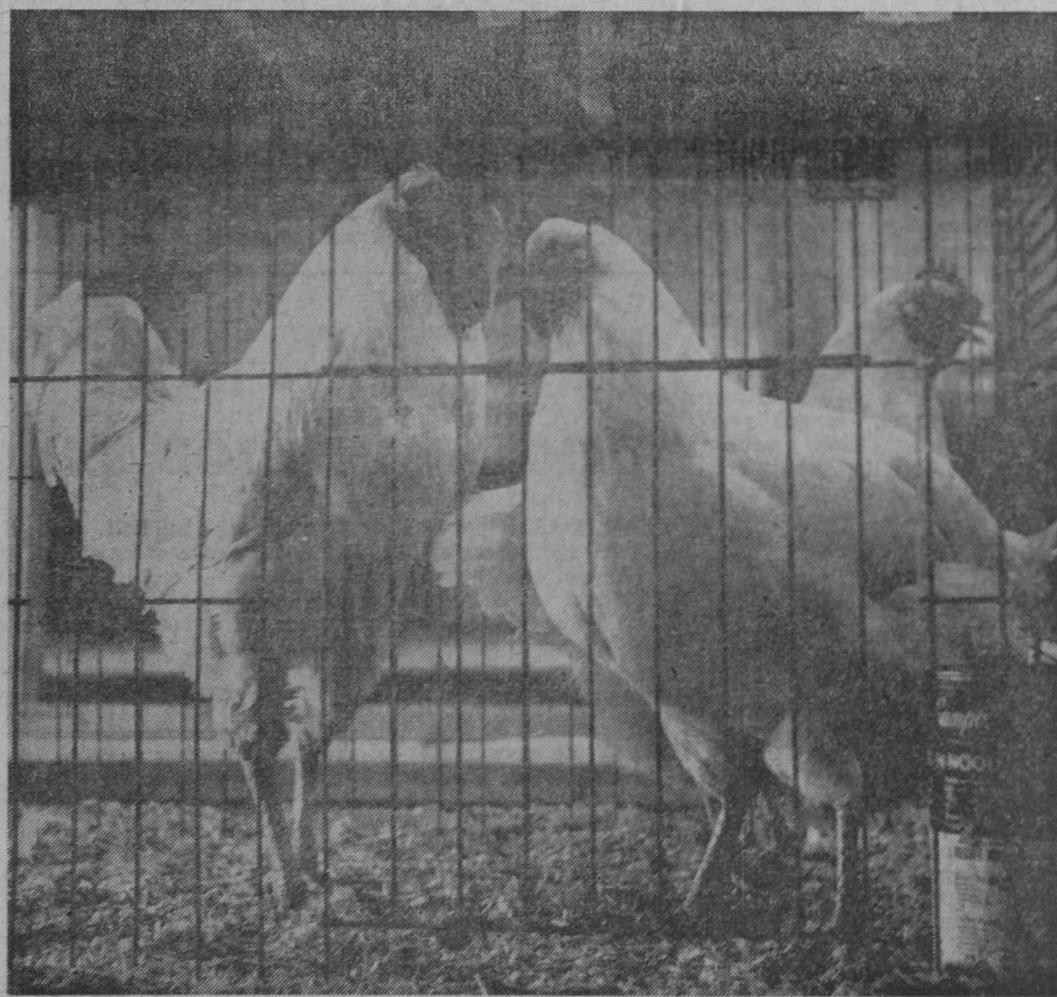

Post Office Cutbacks are Announced

Because of the congressional mandate to cutback federal employment to the June 30, 1968, level, including 83,238 employees for the postal service nationally, and many in this area—mail service limitations will start locally, July 27. Postmaster Martin Kasischke said today.

The local postal head has been advised by Postmaster Gen. W. Marvin Watson to comply with the cutback required by congress under the recently enacted tax bill (Public Law 90-364) by reducing some postal services and curtailing new hiring.

Curtailments as follows will take effect locally:

Effective July 27, all regular Saturday window service will be discontinued.

Effective July 27, the last collection of mail from street deposit box will be at 3:00 p. m.

At East Tawas, all Saturday window service will be discontinued except for a two-hour period from 10:00 a. m. until 12 o'clock noon, for delivery of general delivery mail. There will be no stamp sales, acceptance or delivery of parcel post through windows, money order sales or other business transacted, according to Richard Price, postmaster.

No change will be made in window service hours currently provided at East Tawas, Monday through Friday.

For the present, there will be no change in city or rural deliveries, said Price. Mail and parcel post will be delivered as usual.

Saturday collection service at East Tawas will be adjusted to conform to existing Sunday and holiday service. The last mail collected for dispatch will be 2:00 p. m.

The post office department agreed to the reduction in funds for the 1969 fiscal year that began July 1 and is not asking for a restoration of any money cut from its budget. The postmaster general explained, "We could operate within our budget and maintain postal services at or near their present level if we did not have to reduce employment to the June 1966 level."

The exact total of the over-all employment cut that will apply locally is not yet known and it will be affected to some extent by the rapidity of job turnover in the local staff in the months immediately ahead. However, the postmaster said he expects the cut to be serious.

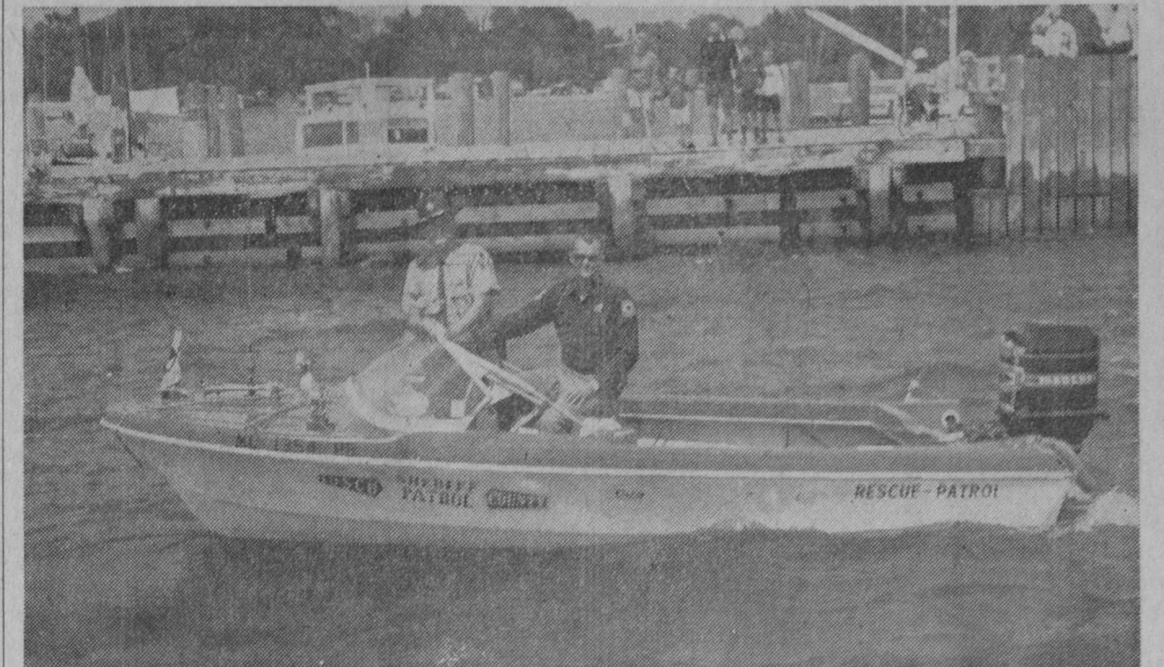

After visiting several workshops in the state, Milostan will develop workshop services for the handicapped. Emphasis will be on developing the maximum potential of handicapped individuals, enabling them to become useful citizens in their communities.

The awareness of the need for workshop rehabilitation facilities and services will be stressed. Involvement of community resources including schools, industrial, governmental and voluntary agencies, social service and philanthropic organizations, will be necessary.

A federal project development grant of \$9,945 has been approved with the initial payment already received. The share of the several counties is 10 percent of the total, some of which has been donated by area groups and individuals.

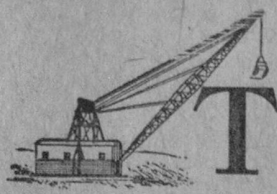

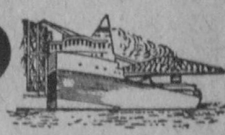

Assembly of Fair Exhibits All Day

A newly-remodeled arts and crafts building will greet visitors to the Iosco County Fair which opens today (Wednesday) at Hale and extends through Saturday, July 27.

A program has been arranged by the Iosco County Agricultural Society which offers a wide variety of activities for all ages and "fun for everyone" is again the fair theme.

Starting this morning, exhibits were arranged in livestock, poultry, farm produce, flowers and plants, domestic arts, home economics, antiques, arts, crafts, hobbies, conservation and 4-H Club work. These exhibits are located at the township hall and at various buildings on the grounds.

Newest addition to the fair grounds is renovation of the arts and crafts building, located south of Plainfield Township Hall.

This building has been covered with galvanized steel and the interior remodeled.

A new feature of the building is construction of several store fronts for display of antiques. Displays are so arranged that visitors may look through windows without touching valuable antiques. Full-time guard protection is provided during the fair.

This is to be followed by a pig scramble with three contests for boys or girls through eight years, nine through 12 years and 13 through 15 years. Pigs have been donated by the Northern Michigan Feeder Pig Association.

The annual parade will be held at 12:30 p. m. and units are to line up at the fairgrounds, move onto M-65 and proceed through the Hale business district. Final day of harness racing starts at 2:00 p. m. and exhibits are to be released at 9:00 p. m.

Department superintendents this year include: George Erickson and Robert Robinson, livestock; Perry Shellenbarger and Glenwood Streeter, poultry; John Dooley, farm produce; Agnes Bodenhorn, flowers and plants; Dorothy Mielock, home economics; Mrs. Gerald Ruckie, domestic arts; Mrs. Adell Brown, antiques; Mrs. Gladys Goodrow, art, hobbies and handicraft; Elwood Ruckie, games and contests; Lyle Bielby and Jack Lake, conservation; Norman Sibley, 4-H Clubs; Bruce Goupil, superintendent of speed for harness racing.

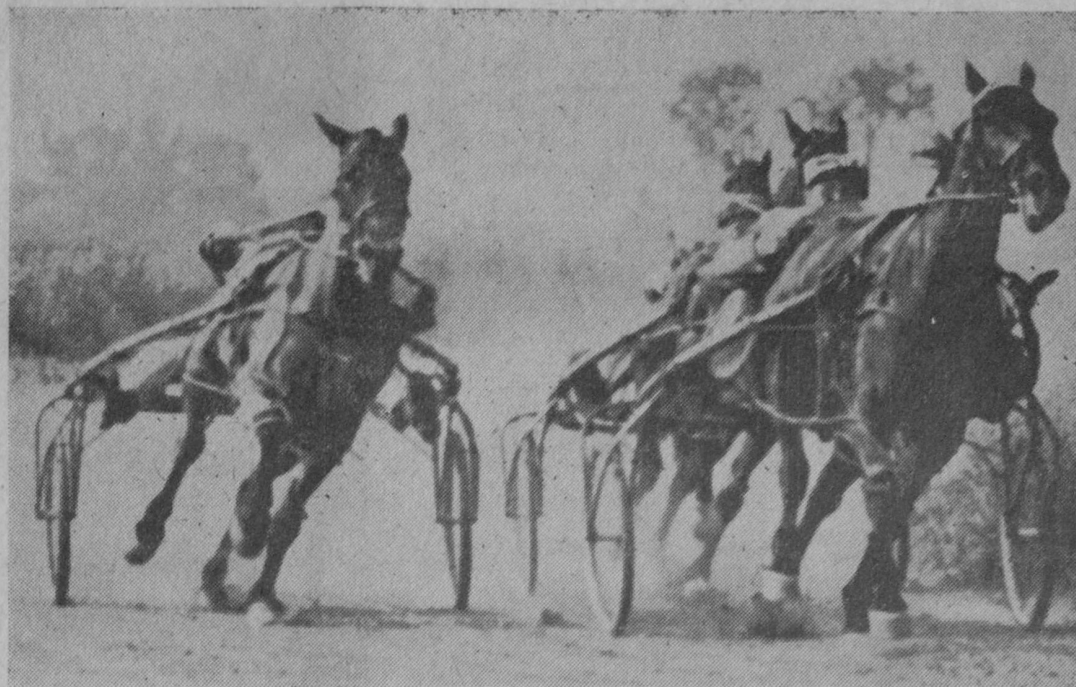

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Forest Chats

HURON NATIONAL FOREST

This summer, I have been watching an elm tree outside my window die limb by limb. The leaves on a limb turn yellow and then brown. This limb is quite conspicuous among the green foliage of the tree. When this is observed, it is the first obvious sign indicating that the tree has the Dutch elm disease. Also, it indicates that it is too late to save the tree and that it should be cut down and removed.

The history of the Dutch elm disease is an example of what occurs in nature when a new organism is introduced into a community that is not able to cope with it. This disease came to the eastern United States from Europe about 1930. Now it is in 30 states and three provinces of Canada. It was first identified in Michigan in 1950 at Detroit. Since then, it has spread throughout the Lower Peninsula and occurs in scattered areas in the Upper Peninsula.

There exists on our district many small stands of elm that are growing in low moist areas. Trees infested with the Dutch elm disease have been seen in some of these stands, but the cost of treating the stands to protect them from the disease is prohibitive. The best and only solution we have is to sell the infested stands for lumber as soon as possible. This does not eliminate the disease, but it helps slow down its spread.

In a community, the situation is different in that the elm trees have a very high value for shade

and aesthetics. The cost to replace a lost elm tree would be quite high, probably higher than the cost of protecting it from the disease. The expense will include the cost of removal, cost of another tree and the long time that the new tree requires to grow into a shade tree.

It is possible to protect elm trees from the disease by removal of infected trees and spraying the remaining healthy trees. To be most effective, the control should be on a community-wide basis. If the disease is not checked, every elm tree in the Tawas will eventually succumb.

Link, 22, was killed June 14 in Vietnam.



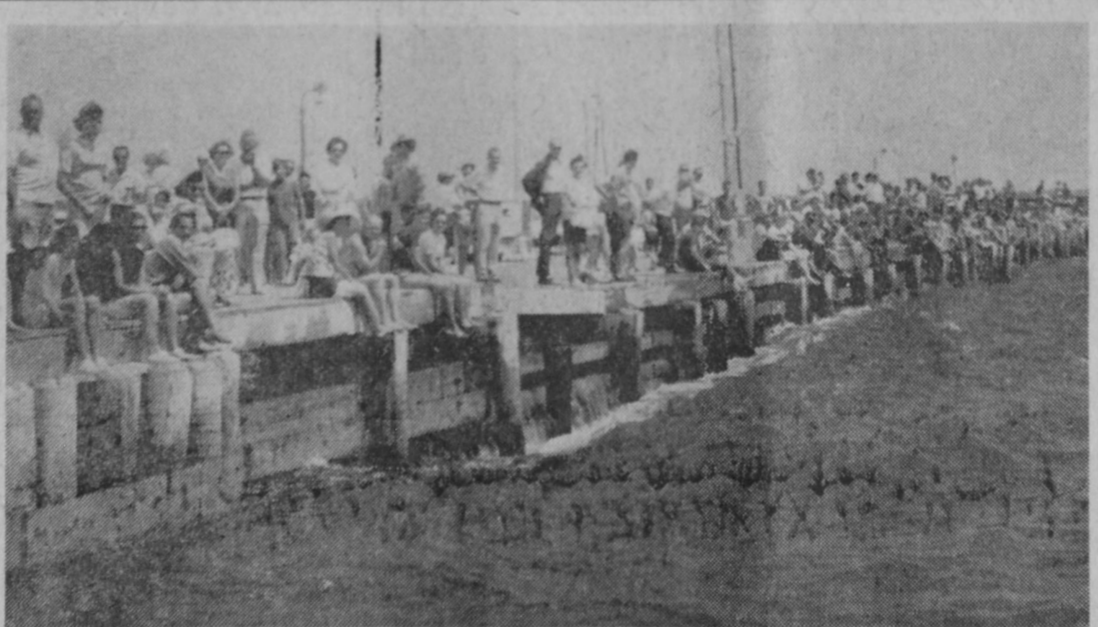
