## Detroit Sailor Wins 9th Lightning Toga

Henry Cawthra, Detroit, the old master of Michigan Lightning skippers, sailed to the Michigan District championship in three days of sailing on Tawas Bay last week.

Cawthra never won a race on Friday, Saturday or Sunday but his steady sailing gave him 145 points to nose out Herm Nickels of Tawas Bay Yacht Club and Lake Fenton.

The Crescent Sail Yacht Club sailor in winning his ninth district championship had finishes of seventh, fifth, second, second and fourth. Nickels had a fifth, sixth, eighth, fifth and second for 139 points.

In third place was Bill McKinley of Tawas Bay, defending champion, who had 138 points on a third, first, seventh, 10th and sixth.

Herbert Cox, formerly of Tawas and now of Lansing, nailed down fourth place with a 15th, second, third, 16th and seventh.

The hottest sailor throughout the three days was Leo Wasserberger, former district winner, who won fifth place. He had two firsts, a fourth and a fifth for 121 points. He was disqualified in one race on a port tack infraction and it cost him the championship.

There were 32 boats sailing in the fleet and the top 10 are to go to the North American race to be held at Chicago, Illinois, in August. Charles Schreck of East Tawas

## Complete Work on Moving Water-Threatened Main

Work is to be completed this week on moving 430 feet of the Mathews Street sewer line away from its existing location along the shore of Tawas Bay.

Construction was completed on this project only last May, but a higher water level in Lake Huron caused undermining of the sewer line by wave action. Emergency repairs were made to prevent disruption of this critical line, which serves restaurants and motels as well as residences south of the US-23-Mathews Street blinker light to a point near the river bridge.

Reconstruction of the new main at a point about 40 feet from the water's edge, along with a new manhole, will cost \$4,396. The added cost is to be shared by the water department and city at large on a 50-50 basis, according to action at a joint meeting of the council and water board last week.

It had been hoped that there would be funds remaining in the special assessment funds to relocate the line, but an accounting proved otherwise.

The project, which had been under discussion for more than 15 years, was financed through a special-assessment district. Work was commenced last winter.

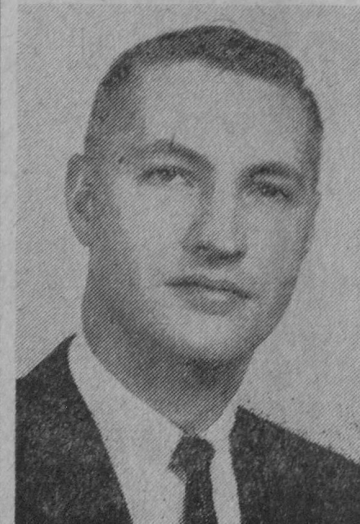
## Two Candidates for 81st District Judge

A two-way race for 81st District Judge (Iosco and Alcona Counties) will be one of four ballots to be presented to voters in the November general election. Only two candidates filed, eliminating the need for a primary runoff.

Competing for the position are J. Richard Ernst of Iosco County and Kenneth E. Ralph of Arenac County.

Ernst has been Iosco prosecuting attorney since October 1964, when he ran as a sticker candidate on the Republican ticket to fill the vacancy caused by William H. McCready, who was successful in his bid for probate judge.

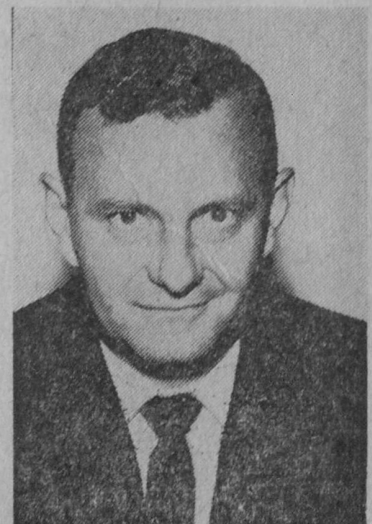
A native of Mt. Clemens, he graduated from the University of Michigan Law School in 1963. He received his BA degree from Yale.

# Primary Election August 6 Has Contests

Next Tuesday, August 6, will mark one of the most active state elections in recent years. The two principal political parties—Republican and Democratic—are to name candidates for congress, state house of representatives, as well as a full slate of candidates for county and township offices.

In addition, three constitutional amendments are to be placed before voters, along with selection of delegates to county political conventions.

While Elford A. Cederberg is running unopposed on the Republican ticket for 10th representative in congress and his opponent next fall will be Wayne Miller on the Democratic ticket, three Republicans seek the 102nd seat in the state house of representatives.

George A. Prescott, incumbent, Tawas City, is being opposed by Kit Carson Jr. of Standish and

Sanford E. Charron of Pinconning. Carson is a former school teacher and coach at Standish-Sterling High School, while Charron formerly held the post as a Democrat, being defeated two years ago by Prescott.

Running unopposed on the Democratic ticket for this seat is Connor D. Smith of Bay City.

There are three races at the local level, featuring a three-way race for sheriff on the Republican ticket. Months of campaigning have gone into this race with Ivan O'Farrell, veteran Republican incumbent, being opposed by James W. Finley and Robert Rollin.

Louis L. Sokola is unopposed for sheriff on the Democratic ticket.

Another race finds D. Keith Papas, Republican incumbent appointed to fill out the unexpired term of Prescott when the latter was elected to the legislature, be-

ing opposed by Robert G. Allen.

The third contest is for coroner where two men are to be named from three candidates, including E. John Moffatt and Edward D. Jacques, incumbents, along with Warren S. Bennett of Oscoda.

There is no candidate on either ticket for prosecuting attorney as J. Richard Ernst is a candidate for the district judge post.

Republican candidates for county office unopposed are Edward J. Nelkie, treasurer; Albert H. Buch, register of deeds; John A. Mielock, drain commissioner.

Three constitutional amendments to be voted upon include: 1. Shall the state constitution be amended to establish a judicial tenure commission and to provide for its membership and duties; 2. Shall the state constitution be amended to provide for a state officers compensation commission

and to provide for its membership duties and limitations; 3. Shall the state constitution be amended to provide that the governor shall fill judicial vacancies and to extend existing constitutional provisions to appointed judges?

Candidates for township trustee are as follows:

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# Decisive Defeat for TA School Millage Program Faces Budget Cuts to Meet Existing '68-69 Funds

## Largest Ballot Since Building-Site Votes

In the largest turnout of voters in recent school history, Tawas Area School's millage vote Monday went down to a decisive defeat, 750-521. The total of 1,271 votes was the largest in any school election here since the building and site votes of the mid-1950s.

The school had sought approval of 2.92 mills for one year. Raising \$120,215.93, money from the millage would have been added to \$38,323 remaining in the school's operating fund to balance out an expected budget deficit.

The proposition won in only one precinct—Alabaster-Whitney, with 50 "yes" votes and 46 "no" votes. The voting precinct at Ta-

was Township Hall turned the measure down, 150-56. Tawas City and East Tawas voting precincts defeated the measure by substantial margins. Tawas City's vote was 166 "yes" and 234 "no," while East Tawas defeated the measure, 320-249.

While no organized resistance to the proposition was noted in the election 1½ months ago, when electors defeated a 3¼-mill proposition for three years by 53 votes, organized opposition was apparent Monday. A telephone campaign urging a "no" vote was conducted by one group.

Other factors having an important bearing on the final outcome included the mailing of city tax statements earlier in the month and receipt by East Tawas residents of quarterly sewer bills, which reflected an increase for construction of the new sewer disposal system.

Another factor having an important bearing on the election was that voters apparently could not bring themselves to believe that school could be in need of additional finances when property assessments were increased greatly by a county-wide reappraisal. The school's tax base was hiked by approximately 40 percent.

Besides the normal increase in educational costs which is sweeping the country, several innovations adopted last year led to a higher budget for 1968-1969—a hike of approximately \$120,000.

One of those innovations was five required subjects for each student in high school. The program, which required hiring of additional teachers, was financed last year by spending approximately \$120,000 in the school's operating fund, gained through transfer of state aid money over a period of years.

A special meeting has been called for next Monday night to discuss ways and means of reducing the budget for this coming year. The board of education directed administrators to immediately develop a program to "live within" available finances.

Taking the results of Monday's election as a mandate from the people to reduce spending, a greatly disappointed Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night took immediate steps to cut the school program for 1968-1969 in an attempt to live within available finances.

With an eye on a budget which would have a deficit of approximately \$120,000 next June, board of education members rolled up their sleeves and took a look at possible cuts. The job will not be an easy one.

One of the first suggestions was not to hire three additional English teachers being sought for next fall. By shuffling teachers around, this would mean classes would average from 37 to 38 students.

Another possibility discussed—and it probably will hold true next Monday—will be dropping one class and returning to the four required subjects for all students. The policy of five required subjects, to reduce size of study halls, was adopted last year following a curriculum study and required hiring of eight additional teachers.

While a reduction in athletics was touched upon, there probably would be little saving as coaching salaries amount to \$6,000. Other than salaries, the program is supported by gate receipts from basketball and football. Spring sports probably would be curtailed, however.

All spectator buses would be eliminated and it will probably mean the end of any school support toward band trips and other extra curricular activities. Most of

the expense of band trips have been paid by students, other than actual cost of buses and salaries of drivers.

Also to be discussed next Monday will be raising fees to students and to charge for all student supplies, elimination of gym periods for elementary students and curtailment of the beginner band. The federal remedial program during the regular school year will probably be dropped.

Trustee Robert Elliott stated at the meeting that any where there are cuts, the children are bound to be hurt. "I am concerned about what the result of this election will mean to the children," he stated.

Trustee Carl Helmer said he was not afraid of deficit spending to maintain the school's excellent program, but believed that cuts should be made if at all possible.

"If we don't cut something, no one will believe us," said Trustee Waldo Curry. "When one looks at this vote, it shows that the people are dissatisfied."

Curry said that the people apparently did not believe that the school would be in trouble if the millage vote failed. "Until we make some cuts," he said, "we are going to be in serious trouble."

Mrs. Helen Payea, treasurer, said she was in favor of a medium reduction in spending. "I don't think the board should be vindictive about any cuts," she said.

"We will have to give the students an education exactly as the parents wish," stated Leonard Sarki, board president. "We will have to look over our staff and decide just what is the best educational program we can give with the available money. We cannot cut back enough to balance the budget completely—but we can cut."

Sarki also pointed out that the board of education would have to establish its program for 1969-1970 based on the same finances to be received in 1968-1969. "If the people want the program improved, then the people will have to petition the board and ask for a millage vote."

Sarki said that the board had not taken administrative salaries under consideration as yet and would be subject to discussion at next Monday night's special meeting.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal, said that two second grade and one first grade teachers were needed next year. If the second grade is cut to four sections, every teacher would have 35 or more children.

"I don't see how we can do with less teachers—if the children miss out on their education in these early grades, they are lost the rest of the way through school."

## Races for New Supervisor Posts to Feature Primary

Contests in seven out of the nine districts for the new office of Iosco County supervisor will be one of the features of the August 6 primary election. Three Democrats and 21 Republican candidates have filed for office.

Only districts with unopposed candidates are No. 1, Plainfield Township and Precinct No. 3 of Oscoda Township, where William G. Weryley Jr., a Republican, was the lone candidate to file, and District No. 6, City of East Tawas, Wards Two and Three. A contest is assured there in November as R. E. McElheron, Democrat, and Carlton Merschel, Republican, have filed nominating petitions.

There will be a three-way race in District No. 2, comprising Precinct No. 1, Oscoda Township, Jack W. Allen, Frank W. Parks and C.

L. Wilcken are Republican candidates. In District No. 3, Precinct No. 2 of Oscoda Township, Robert K. Foster and Roger J. Curley are Republican candidates.

Two Republican candidates are listed in District No. 4, all of AuSable Township. Dale E. O'Farrell and J. Berkeley Smith are candidates.

District No. 5, all of Wilber and Baldwin Townships with First Ward of East Tawas, lists four Republican candidates, Fred B. Lomas, Peter A. Lichtfuz, Henry Ray Mead and Clarence R. McMullen.

Tawas City's three supervisors are Republican candidates for the one new office to represent District No. 7, all of Tawas City. They are Benjamin F. Brewer, Clarence

S. Everett and Clement J. Stephan. There will be a two-way race in District No. 8, all of Reno, Grant and Tawas Townships. James P. Mielock and Walter Miller are Republican candidates.

District No. 9, all of Burleigh, Sherman and Alabaster Townships, plus the City of Whittemore, lists the largest number of candidates. George D. Blust and Robert A. Oates are Democratic candidates, while Aubrey F. Belson, George M. Strauer and Donance Bellville are Republican candidates.

Effective January 1, 1969, reins of county government are to be turned over to this new nine-man board to be elected at the November general election. Present township supervisors would remain at that position, but would handle township affairs only.

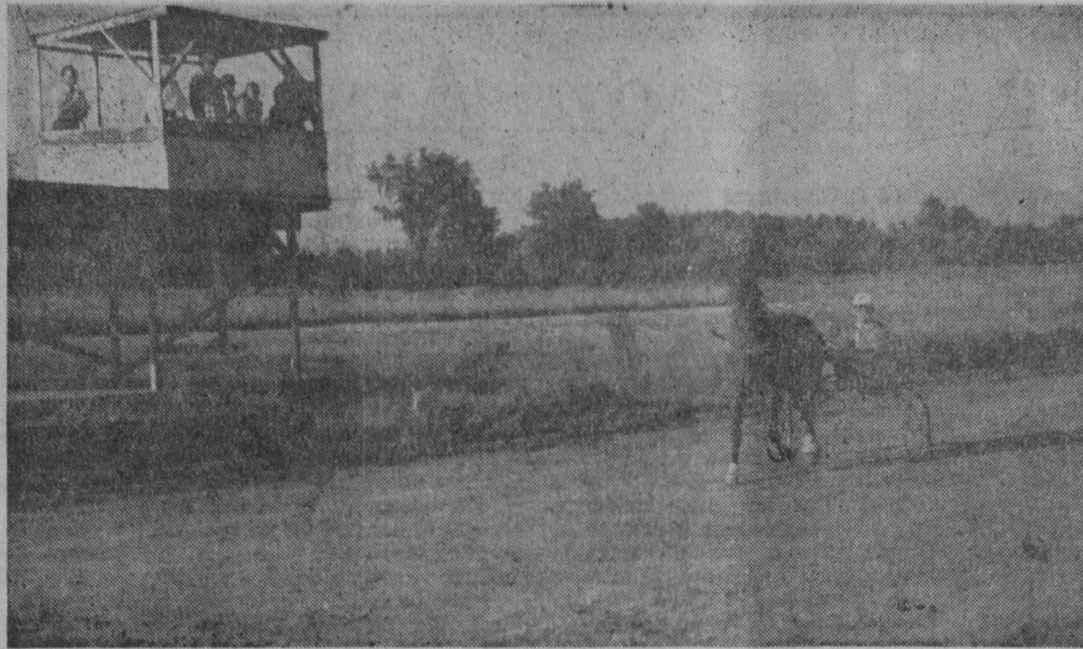

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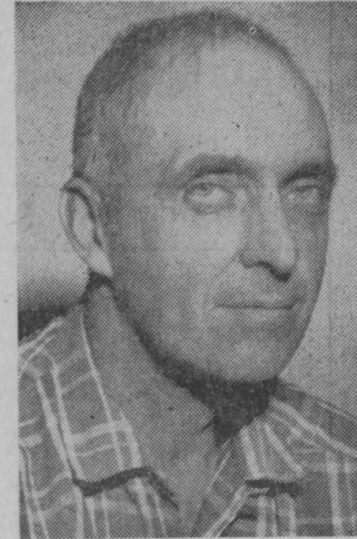
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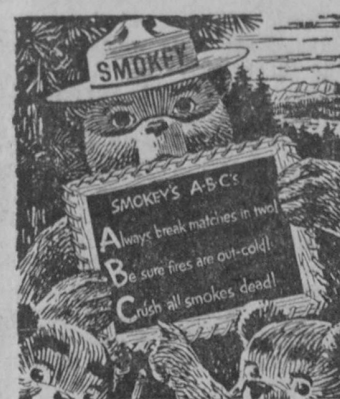

# 85th Year for Large Food Chain Kroger Marks Anniversary

Kroger stores in this area are celebrating the 85th anniversary of the founding of the retail food company during the next four weeks. The history of the nation's third largest food chain reads like a Horatio Alger story and can be labeled "Only In America."

The first tiny Kroger grocery was opened by B. H. Kroger, son of a German immigrant, near the river front in Cincinnati, Ohio. The total investment was \$722. Mr. Kroger was 23 and had already been working for 10 years. And he was willing to work harder than anyone else to achieve his dream.

He had something else going for him, too, notes H. A. Gifford, vice president of the Detroit division of The Kroger Company, which operates stores in this area. "Mr. Kroger's mother always told him," says Mr. Gifford, "be more particular than your most particular customer—and you'll please them all." He adopted the slogan as his policy, a policy still maintained by Kroger today.

The present Kroger Food Foundation, which is the organization responsible for quality control of Kroger products, was an outgrowth of Mr. Kroger's own informal testing in that first store.

He blended and roasted coffee and tea in the back room of his first store but he tested each lot personally to be sure it was the flavor his customer's wanted.

He would also open cans of fruits and vegetables, examine the contents, smell and taste before he would buy. His attitude was unheard of back in the days when the rule was "buyer beware." But he felt it was important and so did his customers.

Mr. Kroger believed in selling food at low prices, too, relying on a small profit on a lot of sales rather than the then-prevailing method of depending on selling a few items at a high profit.

Today's food store takes a small profit on a lot of sales for granted, making just about a penny net profit on a dollar of sales. But "way back then," the idea was revolutionary.

Other developments taken for granted in today's retailing world were pioneered by Mr. Kroger.

He was the first grocer to bake his own bread to supply his customers (at 2½ cents a loaf).

He was the first to combine meat markets and grocery stores under one roof, a development which foreshadowed today's supermarkets and "one stop shopping."

He was among the first grocers in the country to use newspaper display ads on a regular basis to tell people about the values available at B. H. Kroger's stores.

That first small Kroger store could be tucked into a corner of a modern Kroger supermarket. Instead of a few hundred items, stores now carry upwards of 7,000. Most of those 7,000 items were unheard of in Barney Kroger's day.

Today, that one tiny store has grown to 1,486 supermarkets in 24 states. And now the company is owned by 53,000 shareowners, who live in every state and in several foreign countries.

But, says Mr. Gifford, one thing remains the same. Kroger stores in 1968 still believe that shoppers want value for their money, just as did the thrifty German Hausfrau of Cincinnati in 1883.

"That is why," he says, "that in addition to reasonable prices, insistence on quality control and cleanliness is high at Kroger. So, too, is friendliness and courtesy to customers. These are, after all, the people who have made possible the progress of Kroger during the past 85 years."

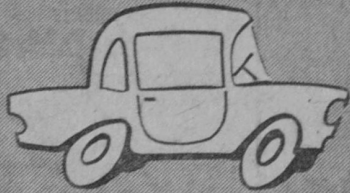

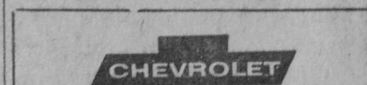

During the course, he was trained to repair internal combustion engines and wheeled vehicle chassis components. Instruction was given in the fundamentals of electrical and transmission systems.

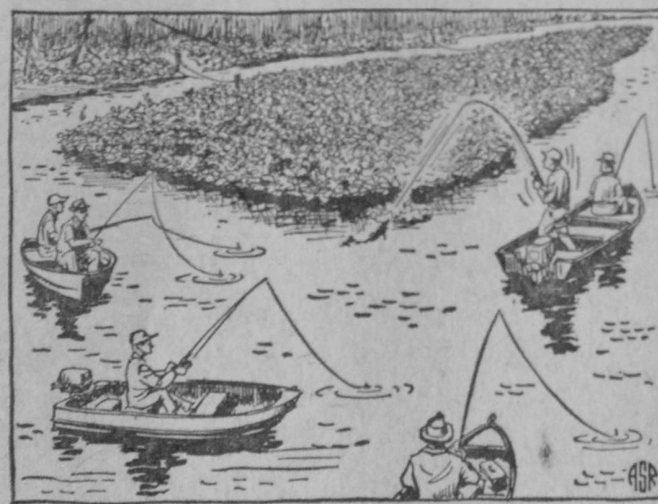

### Jigging Can Whip The Dog Days

By Tom Andrews

Jigging, a fishing method that's easily as old as the hills, is now riding a new wave of interest. You're not part of angling's "in" group if your tackle box doesn't hold a few basic jigging-type lures. Personally, I've always liked a sturdy red/yellow or white-feathered lead-head jig for ocean use. My preference for inland lakes and rivers, however, is a "Lucky" Lujon—a hard bait to describe because it's so deceptively simple.

The Lujon is a sliver of forged brass with a few angles in the heavy (hook) end. Near the treble hook is an eye-catching pink plastic tab.

But you never judge a lure by its looks; only performance counts. And my old friend Art Schumann of Lockport, Ill., told me a story recently that really makes this point.

Seems Art and his family were fishing Rest Lake near Manitowish Waters, Wis., late last summer—and having the kind of bad luck that makes anglers think fish take vacations, too.

Just a bare handful of crappies were being taken near a floating bog anchored to an island in the lake. Then along came two guys with Lujons. Only nobody knew that's what they had. All anyone could see

was the walleys they started pulling out from under that bog!

"When they left with their limit that night, and the next, and the next," Art told me, "you can bet we were all worn to a frazzle trying to find their key to success."

Well, toward the end of the week the two men finally showed their audience the Lujons and told how they used them. They'd cast close to the bog, let the lure sink quickly in the 30 ft. of water there, then retrieve with a slow, rhythmic pumping action of the rods.

With the lure still in 5-10 ft. of water, they'd stop reeling and just jig the Lujon till they got a strike. And they got strikes!

Says Art: "I've fished for too many years, and I've never seen such consistent success with an artificial lure during 'dog days.'"

Maybe there's a tip there for all of us during July, August and September.

**Home Health Service Available in Iosco**

"Anyone needing home health services in Iosco County may receive them from District Health Department No. 2, according to Dr. Ophelia Baker, Director Baker, director of the health department, said that skilled nursing care and/or physical therapy services for home-bound patients are now being provided on an hourly basis.

The type of nursing care includes giving baths, changing surgical dressings, giving hypodermic injections, demonstrating prescribed exercises and teaching others in the home nursing procedures to families.

"A patient may be referred to the health department by his physician, family or friends," Doctor Baker continued. "The only stipulation for receiving home care is that the services be prescribed by the person's private physician."

To apply for the program, the person desiring services should contact his own doctor. When the physician orders the services, a health department nurse will make a home visit to carry out the plan.

Although there is a fee charged to cover the expense of providing home care, no one will be denied the services because of inability to pay, Doctor Baker said. In addition, people covered by medicare or medicaid will have a part or all of the fees paid for by the health insurance program.

**Senior Citizens Enjoy Cruise on Tawas Bay**

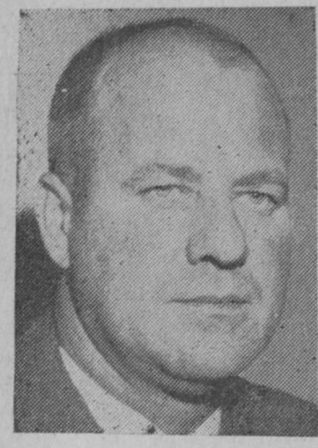

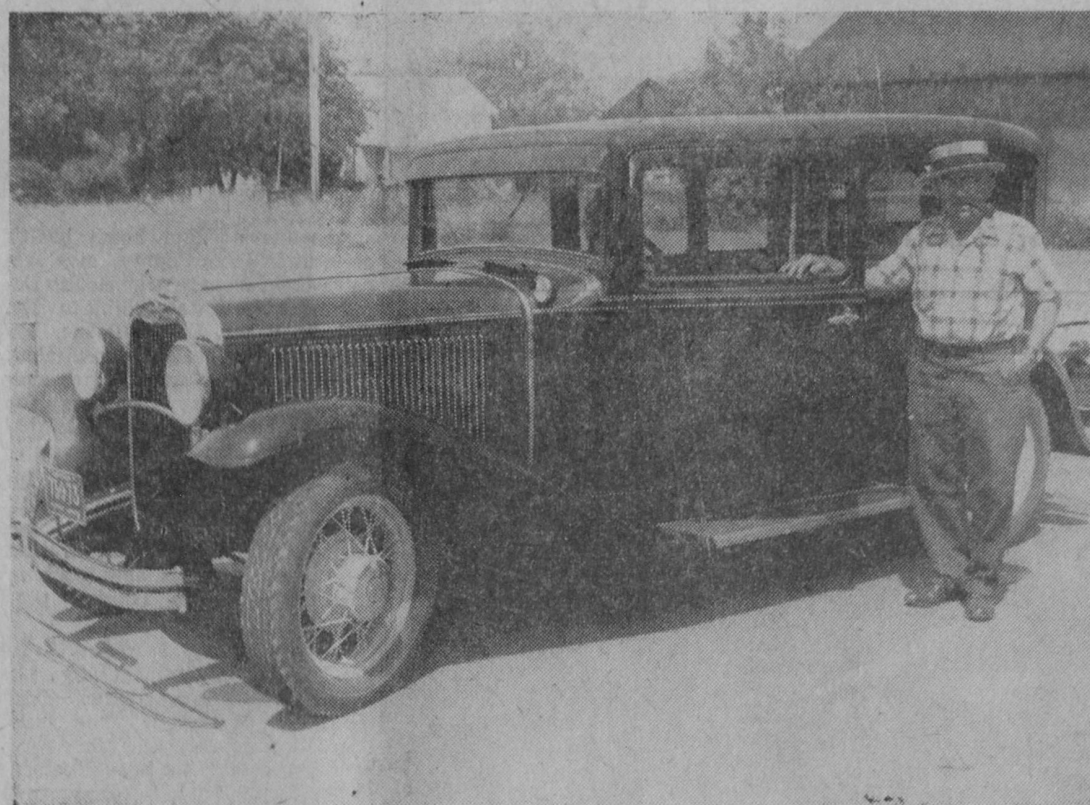

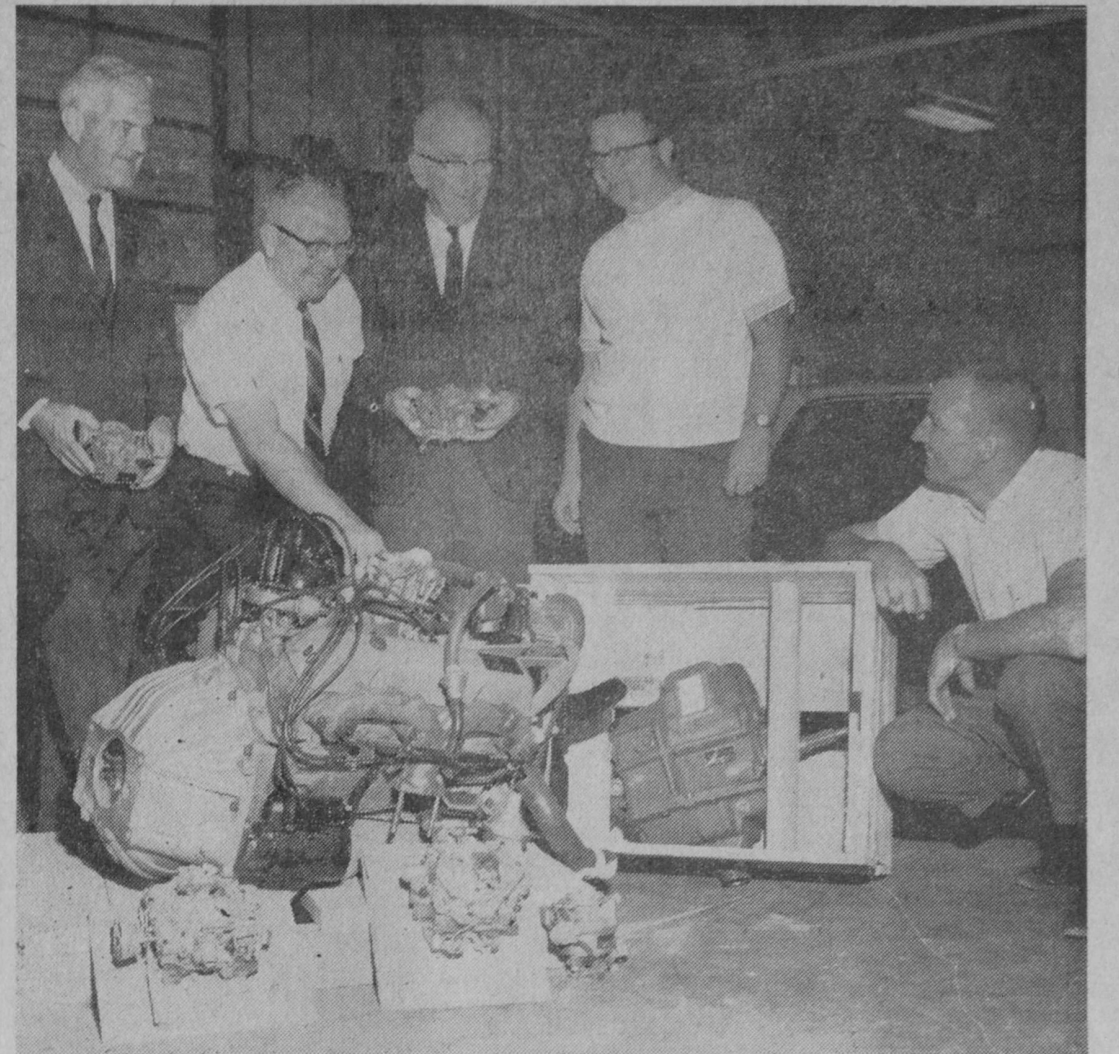

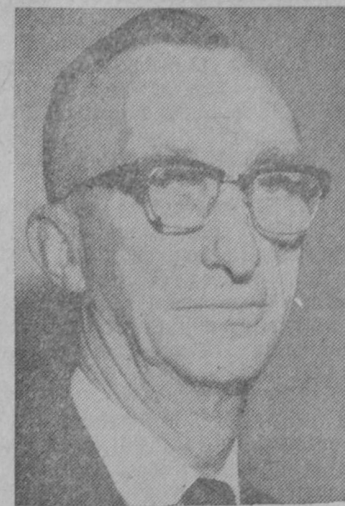

Technical action panel committee members are Jack Lake, Mrs. June Scott, Ray Smith, Loren Woerpel and Marvin Davenport.

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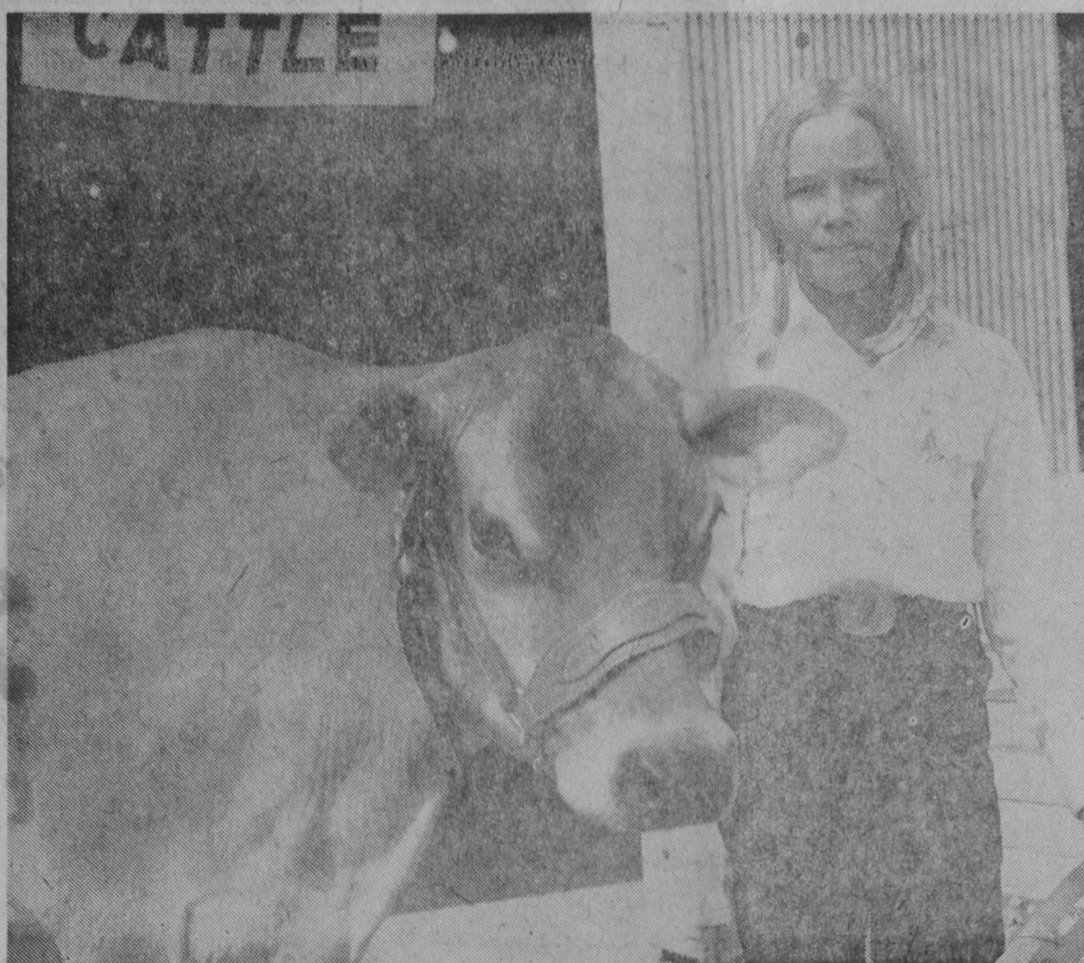
## Eagle Park Grocery Owner Died July 24

## TA Summer School Ends '68 Program

Tawas Area School's summer program financed by federal Title I funds concluded last Thursday. The six-week program was conducted at Tawas City Elementary Unit under direction of Robert H. Crawford, federal program coordinator.

There were 124 children enrolled in the program with concentrations on reading improvement, arithmetic improvement and physical education.

Crawford announced last week that he was now writing a program for the summer of 1969 to be presented to the state for approval.

Because of cuts demanded by congress, next year's Title I project budget will be \$23,751, a cut of \$8,858 from this year's program.

Crawford said he had made a comprehensive survey to determine basic needs of children and all evidence shows that they need help with reading and, to a certain extent, arithmetic.

Evaluations are not completed for the summer school as yet, but some facts on the regular school year are revealing, said Crawford.

There were 41 students enrolled in the reading program during the regular school year. Crawford said that the average gain was 1.35 years in the students' reading ability. The maximum gain was 3.7 years.

According to a questionnaire given students at the end of the year, 34 said they would take the instruction if offered again, one student thought he had improved his reading skill to a point where he did not need it and one student said he would not take the course again if offered as "it was no good."

Preliminary evaluations show that the summer program is also valuable. "We are able to note students' problems earlier and it is easier to correct them before they become stabilized," said Crawford.

The summer program reaches more children than the regular program during the school year and the per pupil cost is much less. The guidance counselor has found that students enrolled in the summer program are more receptive to group counseling techniques and that they are more apt to change attitudes than are those in the secondary school.

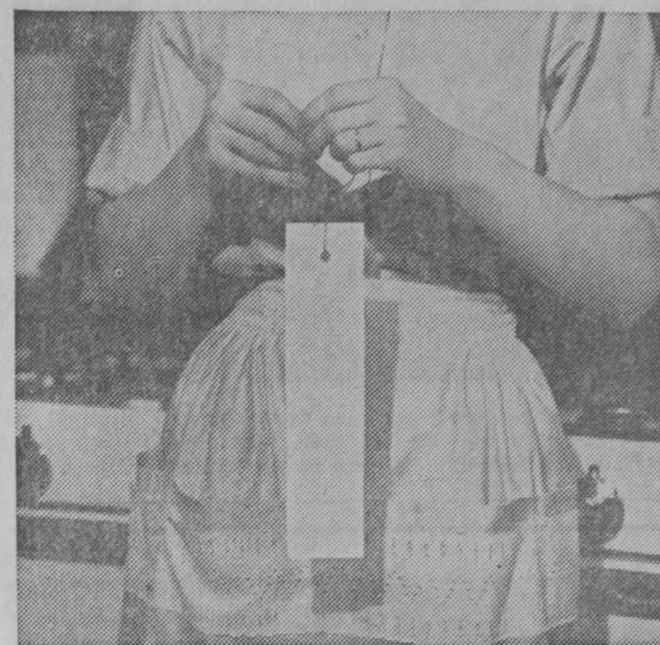
It was also noted by Crawford that the summer program makes use of school facilities which otherwise would remain idle during this period when costs are down.

Depending upon finances available next year, the board of education has indicated great interest in the remedial program and any loss in Title I funds would probably be made up from general school funds.

## Vote Aug. 1-15 on Marketing

Michigan's Christmas tree producers will vote on a state marketing program August 1 through 15. Official ballots will be mailed to all known Christmas tree producers prior to that time. Christmas tree producers not receiving ballots may get them from Marvin Davenport, Cooperative Extension Service Office, Federal Building, East Tawas, phone 362-3449.

Christmas tree marketing program provides for an opportunity for industrywide cooperation in advertising and promoting Michigan Christmas trees. Other provisions would allow efforts in merchandising, research, price and information gathering. The actual program would be developed annually by the Christmas tree committee.

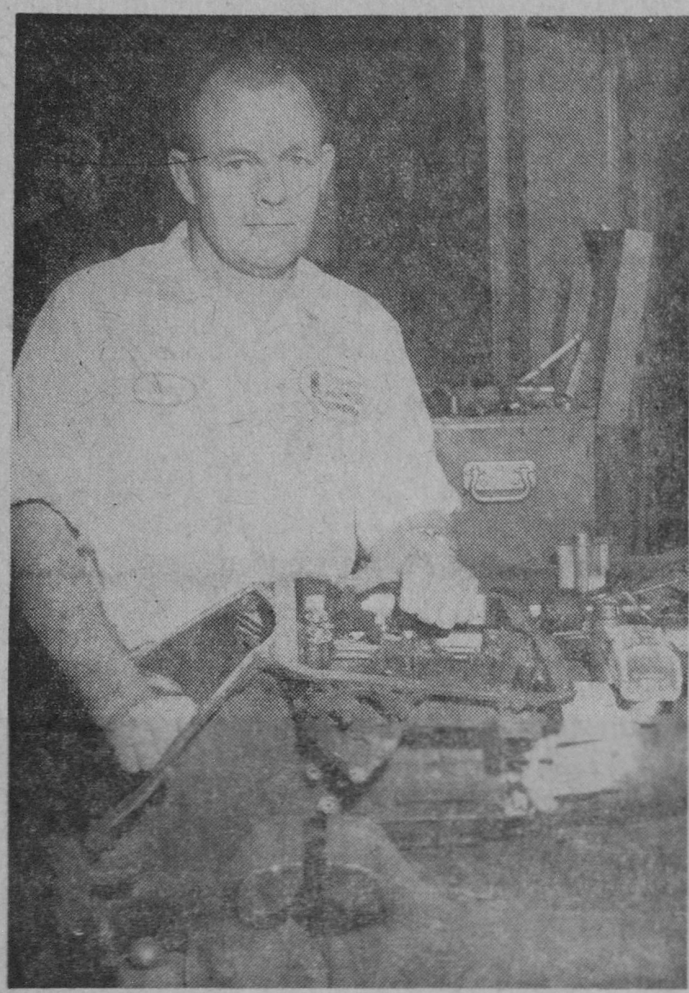
Christmas tree marketing program is to be administered by a committee of 13 Christmas tree producers nominated by the growers and appointed by the governor. These committeemen would be selected by elections held by growers in 13 geographical districts in the state. The Michigan Department of Agriculture will work with this committee to insure that they operate within the framework of the program and to assist in enforcement of the program's provisions.

A maximum assessment of two cents per tree sold will finance the program. All those who qualify as producers would be required to pay this assessment. Only those who meet the definition of the state marketing enabling legislation will be able to vote or pay the cost of the program.

The law defines a producer as any Christmas tree grower who sold over \$800 worth of Christmas trees in any one year during the last three producing seasons. The producer is the one who owns or controls both the land and the tree at the time it is cut.

The program does not contain provisions for controlling quality, price or the amount of Christmas trees that can be harvested or planted by producers. It is primarily designed for the development of better markets for Michigan Christmas trees.

Approval of the program requires the affirmative vote of 66% percent of the producers representing 51 percent of the volume of Christmas trees, or 51 percent of the producers representing 66% percent of the volume of Christmas trees sold.
