



Hale Area School voters gave approval to a special operational tax proposal by a substantial margin in Monday's school election. A two-mill proposal for one year, which replaces four mills expiring this year, was approved, 134-95.

There was one spoiled ballot. Supt. Paul Southerland said Tuesday morning that the board of education wished to express its appreciation to the district voters for

this vote of confidence. Returned to the board of education were Dale Brumfield and Herman Maas, who were re-elected without opposition on the ballot. Each man received 190 votes. There were a number of write-in candidates.
