Legislature Clarifies Elections and Court

According to word from State Rep. George A. Prescott Monday, all township officers elected in 1966 are to serve until November 20, 1970. Terms would have expired in April 1969, but action Friday by the legislature made this change.

Terms of trustees elected in 1964 will expire November 20, 1968, and candidates must file petitions for the August primary.

The legislature finally disposed of numerous questions raised in regard to the new county supervisors, following reapportionment of counties under Public Act 281.

The filing deadline for the new supervisors has been extended to July 2, 1968, and names are to appear on ballots immediately following the county offices.

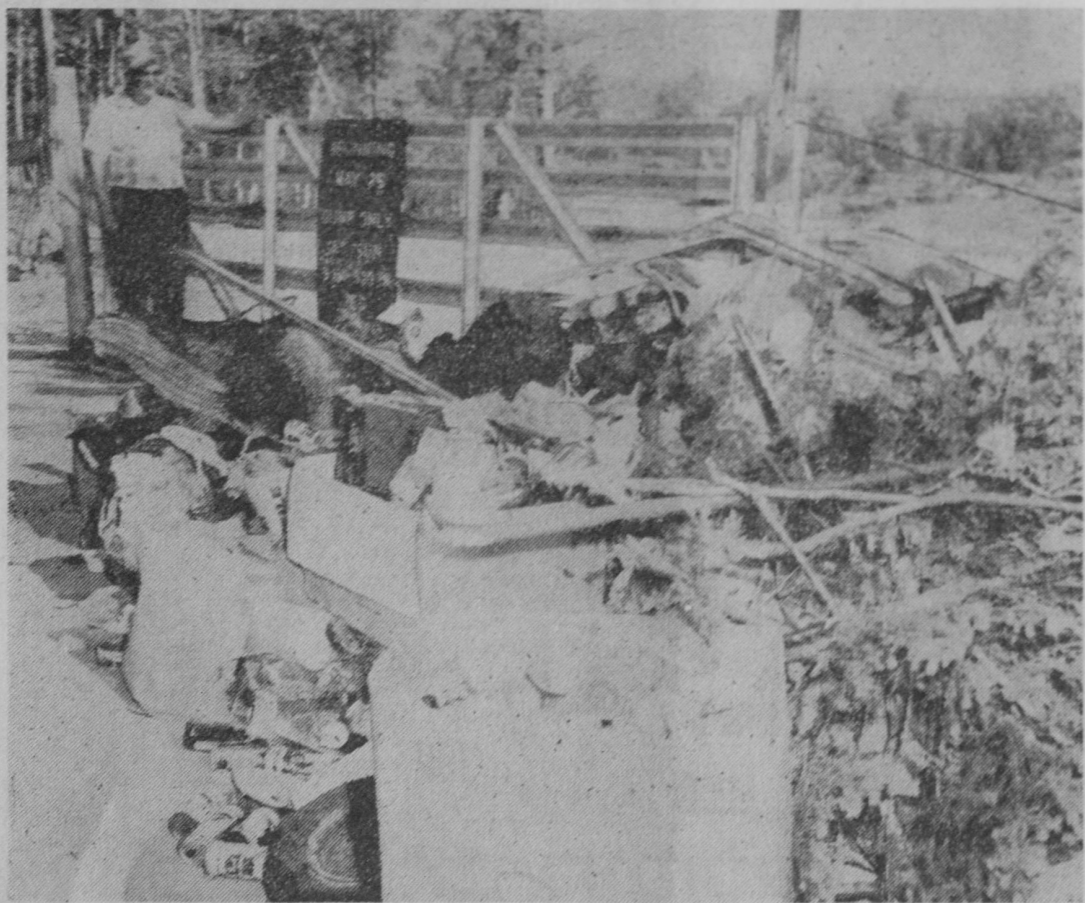
Under court reorganization adopted last week by the legislature, Iosco and Arenac Counties have been combined into one district court. Justices of the peace are to be eliminated effective January 1, 1969, under the terms of the 1963 state constitution.

The new district court judge would appoint at least one magistrate in each county. The district judge would sit at least once a week in the county of which he is not a resident.

Candidates for district judge are to file with the secretary of state by July 2. The new act requires

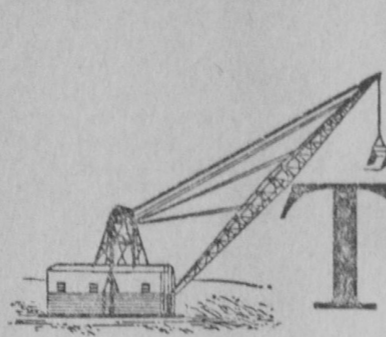
Cpl. Frank Harris Retires July 5

TA School Millage Proposal Defeated

Lost by 53 Votes; Resubmit in July

Tawas Area School's special operational tax millage proposal lost by a mere 53 votes in Monday's annual school election. This was practically a reversal of last year's winning margin of 58 votes.

Immediately following tabulation of votes Monday night, disappointment was voiced by members of the board of education and administrators as to the outcome of the vote. Steps were taken immediately to place the proposal before voters after the required waiting period—expected to be about the last week in July.

"Results of today's election do not change the problems facing the district in the least," said Supt. Reynold Mick. "Defeat of the proposal is no solution at all."

With 374 persons going to the polls (there were three spoiled ballots), only the voting precinct at East Tawas gave a margin in favor of the proposal, 212 to 182. This precinct includes voters of East Tawas, parts of Baldwin and Wilber Townships.

The proposal was turned down by 32 votes in the Tawas City precinct (including parts of Baldwin and Wilber Townships), 157 to 125; Alabaster-Whitney voted against the proposal, 39-30, as did voters of Tawas, Grant and Sherman Townships, 84-42.

Faced with higher operational costs and a reduction in state aid, the board of education sought approval of a 3 1/4-mill tax levy for three years.

Last August, voters of the district approved a one-year proposal calling for a levy of 1 1/2 mills by practically the same margin as Monday's proposal was defeated. In that election, voters approved additional millage, 462-404, with the East Tawas precinct approving, 218-192; Tawas City precinct gave its approval, 147-116; Alabaster precinct approved, 37-19. The precinct at Tawas Township Hall turned down the 1967 proposal, 77-54.

The need for additional millage to carry on expanded educational programs in the school had been emphasized for several months by the board of education.

While schools received 10.08 mills from the county allocation board this year, an increase from

last year's 8 1/2-mill allocation, the school is faced with a budget increase of \$125,000.

In addition, the school faces a 37 percent loss in state aid brought about through a change in the deductible millage formula for state aid and a higher district valuation.

School officials have pointed out that drastic curtailment of the school program is almost an impossibility.

The board of education again emphasized Monday night that only enough millage would be levied to meet the budget. This would mean that the actual levy would be about 2.9 mills, should the proposal be approved at the next election.

The board directed the superintendent to contact state officials at Lansing Tuesday to determine the earliest possible date to resubmit a proposal to voters.

Mrs. Payea and Earl Davis Win TA Board Seats

Mrs. Helen Payea of East Tawas and Earl Davis of Tawas City were elected to four-year terms on Tawas Area Board of Education for Monday's annual school election.

Mrs. Payea, who has served on the board since 1964, received a total of 617 votes. Davis, who was appointed to fill a vacancy last December, received 595 votes.

Arnold Zierow, a newcomer to the school election, made an outstanding showing with 342 votes in his favor.

Election 'Violation' Noted; No Change Seen in Outcome

A possible school election law violation brought to the attention of the county clerk Tuesday morning probably would have no effect on the final outcome of the race for one trustee in Tawas Area School District.

Clerk Keith Pappas said he had received two telephone calls questioning the legality of a school board member acting on an election board. On reviewing school election laws, Pappas said that a member of a board of education may act on an election board unless he is a candidate.

The point being questioned is in Tawas City, where Earl Davis, a school board member for only five months and a candidate for election, had acted late Monday afternoon as an election inspector.

School officials were told on good authority Tuesday morning that, if the complaint was carried forward, it probably would mean that Davis' vote in Tawas City would be subtracted from the total number cast in his favor.

His total vote of 595, less the 226 votes received in Tawas City, would give him a new total of 369 votes. This would still give him a slight margin over Arnold Zierow, the third candidate, who had 342 votes in all four precincts.

Sawyer - Hall Paddle to Another Canoe Win

Ralph Sawyer and Stan Hall, veteran Oscoda paddling team, won their fourth consecutive championship in the 15th running of the Tawas River Canoe Race Sunday.

The Oscoda team was pressed from the very start on Tawas Lake down the Tawas River course by Jerry and Jeff Kellogg of Muskegon. This competition, along with

higher water in the river, helped the winners to establish the new record of 50 minutes, 23 seconds, seven minutes less than last year's time.

The Muskegon team finished one minute and one second behind the front runners, while Jack Kent of Atlanta and Jack Kolka of Detroit finished in a time of 52 minutes, 36 seconds.

The 15-year-old team of Kirby Clayton and Dick Gillings of Prescott successfully defended their junior title, finishing the course from Tawas Lake to the river mouth in 44 minutes, 30 seconds.

A real race developed between Bob Gillings and Ronald Raynak, who ended in a fourth place tie with Ed Adams and Alan Near.

Most paddlers had little trouble in Tawas Bay this year, as compared to numerous turnovers in last year's race near the park dock.

Two canoes were swamped between the river and dock, but fishermen and rescue craft were on hand to aid the paddlers.

For their efforts, \$75 in prize money went to Sawyer and Hall, along with trophies. The next two places won prize money of \$25 and \$15, plus trophy. Hugo Wajohn, race chairman for the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, presented trophies to the first 10 places.

Second place in the junior division went to Doug Lee and Craig McDougall, Oscoda and Glennie, Florin Widing and Albert Widing Jr., Holly, won third place.

Other finishers in the senior division were Al Widing and LeRoy Widing, Harold W. Marion and Ron Balash, Charles H. Versteeg and Dave Kruger, Steve Tripp and Tom Bacon, Richard D. Gillings and Cecil Lane, William Staples and Norman Brown, Alan M. Butcher and Wayne F. Paolisse, Mike and Dick Lovelless, Dennis Sears and Randy DeWitt.

Participation in this two-day conference is a rare honor for the high school band. One college and three high school bands have been selected from the state to perform required selections for music educators from several different states.

Hale A. School Voters Okeh Two Mills

Hale Area School voters gave approval to a special operational tax proposal by a substantial margin in Monday's school election.

A two-mill proposal for one year, which replaces four mills expiring this year, was approved, 134-95. There was one spoiled ballot.

Supt. Paul Southerland said Tuesday morning that the board of education wished to express its appreciation to the district voters for this vote of confidence.

Returned to the board of education were Dale Brumfield and Herman Maas, who were re-elected without opposition on the ballot. Each man received 190 votes. There were a number of write-in candidates.

At Oscoda, one incumbent member was upset and two new members were elected to four-year terms. A second incumbent member was re-elected to a two-year term.

Hugh Bissonette and Glen Highfield, with 328 and 367 votes, respectively, were elected to four-year terms. Frederick Lockhart, incumbent, received 275 votes. Vern Amley received 193 votes and Martin Jacques received 63 votes. There were two vacancies for four-year terms due to one resignation.

Jess Skimin, incumbent, won the two-year term over Hayward Massey, 425-247.

At Whittemore-Prescott Area School, two incumbents, George Erickson and Wayne Survant, were re-elected with votes of 129 and 108, respectively. Leonard Frey received 87 votes and Earl Stone tallied 93.

Lightning Bolt Strikes - Kills Oscoda Youth

Larry I. Cooper, 16, Oscoda, was struck by lightning and killed instantly Sunday afternoon.

Oscoda Township Police Chief Robert Foster reported Cooper was walking near VanEttan Creek, five miles north of Oscoda off M-171, when he was struck in the head by the lightning bolt. His two companions were across the stream and not hurt.

Dr. Blake Kutsche ruled him dead at the scene.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Cooper, who reside on M-171 near King's Corner. He would have been a junior next fall at Oscoda Area High School.

Funeral services will be conducted at 11:00 a. m. today (Wednesday) at Oscoda Baptist Church with burial in Bloomfield Cemetery, Saginaw County. The Rev. Lloyd Streeter and the Reverend Hauck will officiate.

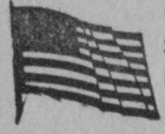
Rev. Tousley is New Methodist Church Pastor

The Rev. Donald Turbin, who has served the churches for the past five years, has been transferred to the Cass City Methodist Church.

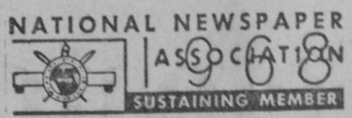

Mr. and Mrs. Turbin are moving to Cass City where he will commence his new assignment.

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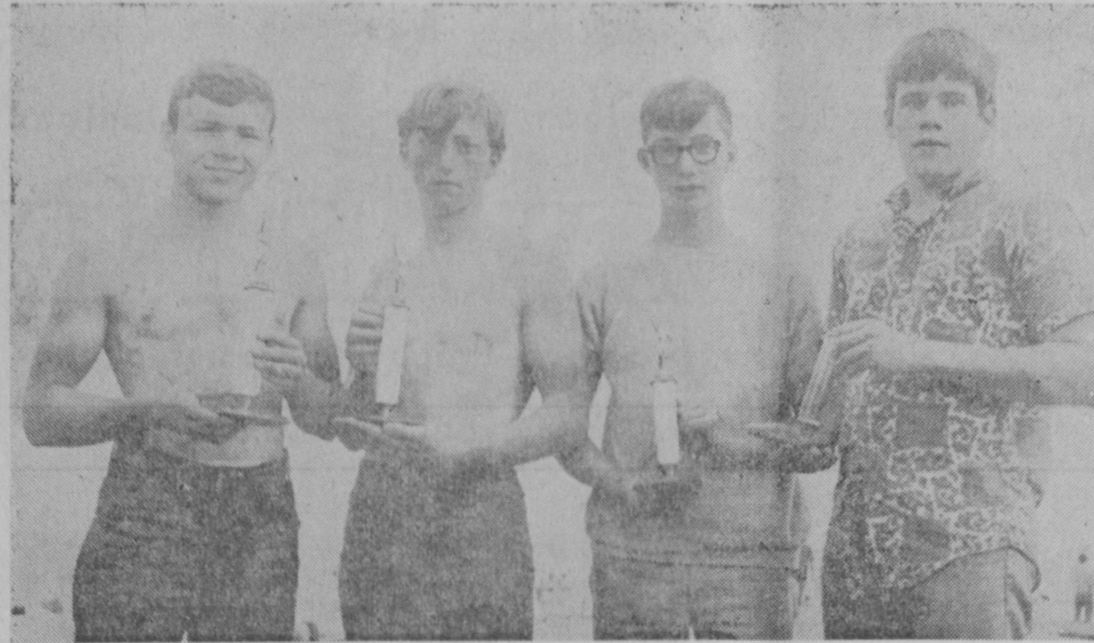

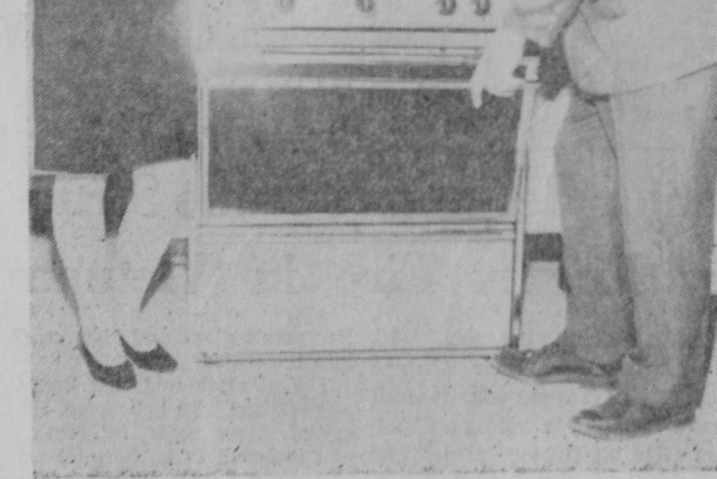

Christian Science Annual Meeting Held June 3

Today's world of destructive upheaval and tremendous change calls men to be spiritual builders. This appeal from The Christian Science board of directors was heard June 3 by over 7,000 Christian Scientists, gathered around the world for the annual meeting of The First Church of Christ, Scientist, Boston, Massachusetts.

The message from the board of directors, read by Arthur P. Wuth, its new chairman, stressed individual effort as the first step in any attempt to help solve the world's ills.

"Poverty, ignorance, war, racial conflict, immorality, civil disorder, mental and physical enslavement, exemplify standards torn down, spiritual ideals desecrated, the best of civilization fallen into disuse," Mr. Wuth said.

Mary Baker Eddy, who discovered and founded Christian Science, taught the need for each individual to contribute to the progress and regeneration of society through spiritual building, he said.

Gordon V. Comer, newly-elected president for the coming year, said that whatever the turmoil of the present times, spiritual values and all the blessings they bring to humanity will survive.

The Christian Scientists visiting Boston this year noticed many changes resulting from the large building project now underway. Considerable demolition and foundation work has already been completed. Construction is expected to

begin this month on a new administration building, a new Sunday school building and a large multipurpose building.

At present, the activities at the headquarters of the denomination are carried out in eight different buildings, so that centralization of facilities and personnel is long overdue. The new church center is expected to be under construction for about 2 1/2 years.

Detroit Conference to Hear Plans for Church Union

A plan of union for the merging of the former Evangelical United Brethren Church and the former Methodist Church in the State of Michigan will be presented to the 127th session of the Detroit Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, meeting at Adrian College, Adrian, June 11-15. The plan of union covers many things, including the merging of the three conferences, now existing into two, to be known as The Detroit Annual Conference and The West Michigan Annual Conference, the United Methodist Church.

Lay delegates arriving in Adrian will be guided by Harold M. Karls of Saginaw, conference lay leader and head of the lay delegation at the recent United General Conference in Dallas, Texas. Downey Presnal of Highland, associate conference lay leader, will speak at the layman's banquet Saturday on "My Greatest Thrills."

The service of ordination for new ministers will be witnessed Friday evening. Conference will adjourn Saturday afternoon after all boards and agencies have met and organized for the coming year.

Rain! Rain! Rain! Our measurements at Silver Valley weather station registered over five inches starting Sunday evening, May 25, until Tuesday noon. The rain lowered the fire danger to rock bottom and we all relaxed over Memorial week-end. This made us happy, of course, but we began to consider some of the other effects that may have resulted from so much rain during a short time. What concerned us most was that at this time of year, the ruffed grouse, woodcock, pheasant and waterfowl are either nesting or had just hatched their broods.

These birds lay a large clutch of eggs, usually eight to 14. Naturalists attribute this characteristic to the fact that many birds are lost through failure of eggs to hatch, loss of newly-hatched birds to predators and weather conditions. The birds start with many eggs to produce a few grown offspring.

Another characteristic of these birds is that they nest and raise their broods in areas of dense cover. These areas are usually low and wet and were flooded by the rain. I imagine that many nests and young birds were destroyed. As a result, there could be a low population of game birds this fall around Iosco County.

Not only is the weather mixed up in the spring, but so are many of our wild friends, for spring is their mating time. For an example, two springs ago, I was driving down a woods road and came upon a small brown animal in the middle of the road. A close inspection from my Jeep made the brown blob a muskrat. He wobbled to the road edge and began eating new grass shoots. I climbed out of the Jeep for a closer look, but got too close and he sprang at me. I was so surprised that I jumped back into the Jeep. Rather than bother him anymore, I started to drive off. That muskrat, his ego now inflated, chased the Jeep and me down the road.

Then, there is the story my fellow employees told me about the "lonely woodchuck." They were driving to work one morning and passed a woodchuck trotting along the shoulder of the road. On their return trip home, they passed him again going in the same direction about four miles farther down the road. I guess that even woodchucks go a courting out of town, too.

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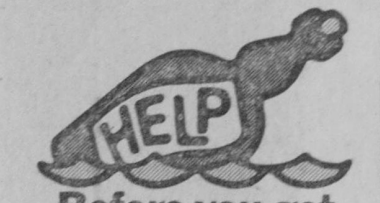

New Wheat Allotment May be Set

A new farm wheat allotment may be established for 1969 crop wheat for farms that did not have a 1968 allotment and meet eligibility requirements, Grant Bessey, chairman of the Iosco County ASC Committee, announced today.

As last year, a producer eligible to file such an application is one with a farm for which no wheat allotment has been established and for which neither the owner nor the operator has an interest in the wheat allotment on any other farm, who has available land and adequate equipment and facilities for the successful production of a wheat crop on the farm, who during the last five years has had at least two years experience in producing wheat and who as an operator expects to receive more than 50 percent of his current year's income from the total production on the farm (not including the anticipated income from wheat produced on a "new farm" allotment).

Applications for a new farm allotment must be filed in the ASCS county office on or before June 30. Any interested producer who can meet these requirements should contact the county office before the final date for filing an application.

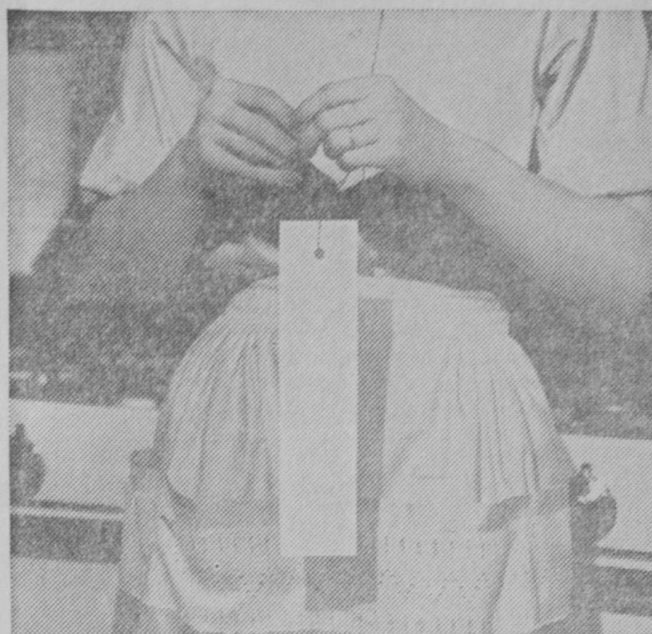

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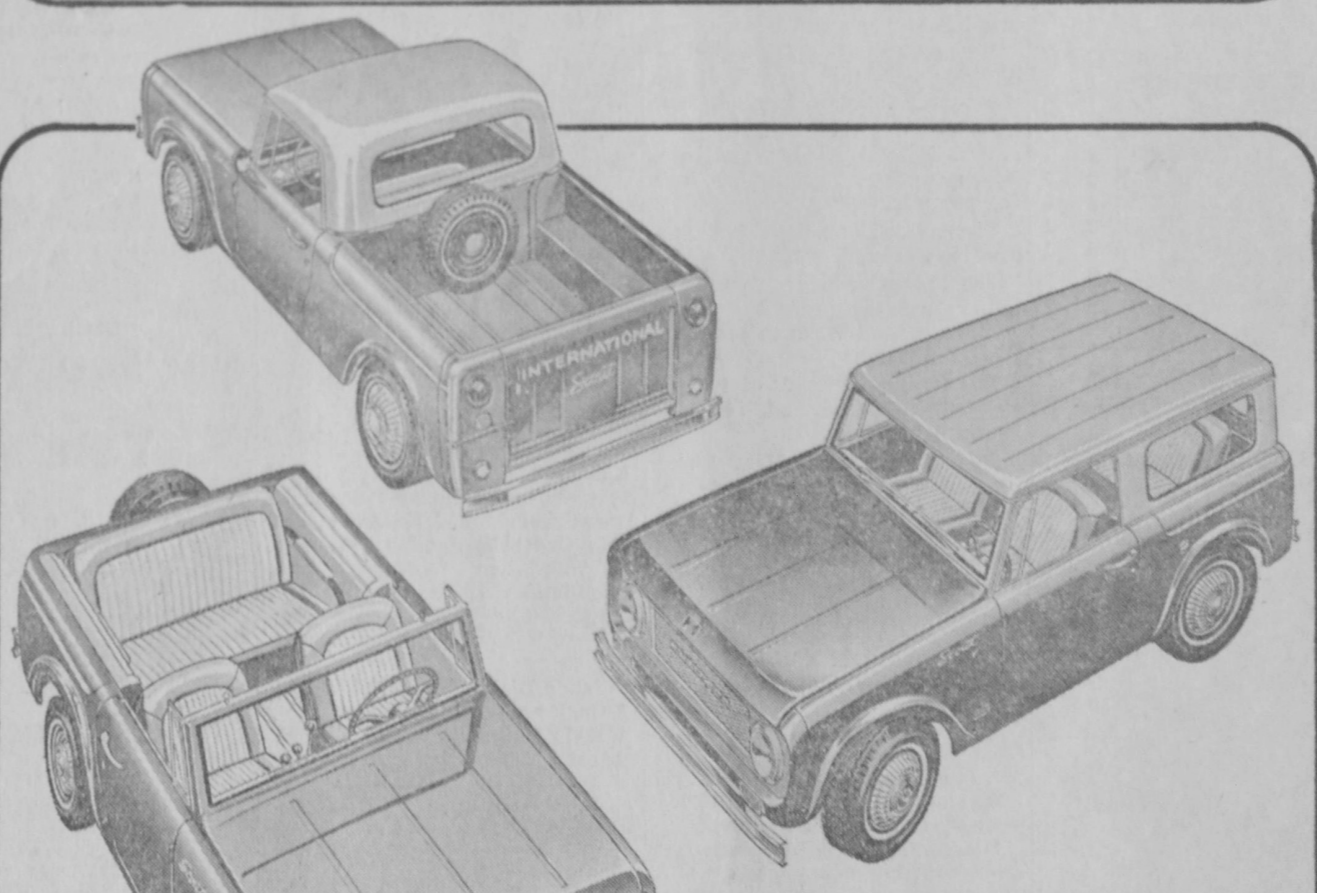

We will have a patrol car on duty 24 hours a day. These deputies will check our business places and cabins at night. I will personally check to make sure that they do. 5. Trustees will be used only for county work, such as cleaning the jail, washing the patrol cars, picking up trash along our county roads, etc., under supervision. 6. Some of the attitudes of the deputies towards the public will have to change. 7. Our Pastors and Priests will be welcome at the jail any time. 8. Persons going south during the winter can have their homes checked by leaving their names and addresses at the Sheriff's Department.

It will take you the People and the Sheriff's Department working together in harmony with all other Law Enforcement Agencies to have a safe County for our loved ones to live in. Before closing I would like to thank everyone of my faithful workers who started with me in March on this campaign drive and you who have just UNITED with us the last few days. Provisions for full-time study in the area of mental retardation will be established in Northeastern Michigan through the Intermediate School District under Title VI of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. The program is offered to qualify enrollees for approval as special education teachers following a course of study held during the summer, 1968.
Priority for enrollment will be established on the following basis:
1. Present teachers without special approval who desire to teach in type A classrooms or trainable classrooms during the 1968-69 school year.
2. Present teachers with temporary approval who need further training toward full approval.
3. Former teachers who desire to return to employment as special education teachers.
Courses will be offered at central locations in Northeastern Michigan in three, three-week blocks. Each block will provide the enrollee with three semester hours of credit. Six credits must be earned for temporary approval. The blocks and courses are:
June 17-July 5: Alpena, West Branch, Education of Exceptional Children (555)
July 8-July 26: Harrisville, West Branch, Adjustment of the Mentally Handicapped (473)
July 29-August 16: (Courses to be determined)
Resident professors from Central Michigan University will be teaching the courses. Tuition, fees and a daily stipend of \$3 will be paid to participants.

50 Percent of TA Seniors to Continue Their Education
Of the 124 seniors graduating last Thursday night at Tawas Area School, 64 students are definitely going to attend a school of higher learning this fall.
Billy R. Wilder, high school principal, said Monday that another 10 students are as yet undecided as to the school of their choice, but would be attending colleges and universities this fall.
Wilder told the board of education that the total represented about 50 percent of the graduating class, which was higher than average.
He announced that 23 students had received scholarships to assist them in attending schools of higher learning. This total is expected to be slightly higher when the official list is received from Ferris State College. Last year, 17 students received scholarships.
