

No Objections Heard on ET Zoning Code

No objections were heard Monday night to East Tawas' new zoning ordinance adopted at the regular session two weeks ago. The ordinance became effective 10 days after its passage.

Several suggestions pertaining to the new code submitted by Gordon Huck on behalf of Consumers Power Company were taken under advisement by the council.

The new ordinance, which repeals all previous codes, regulates the location of trades, industries and location of buildings designed for specific uses. It also regulates and limits the height and bulk of buildings hereafter erected or altered.

The ordinance regulates and determines the area of yards, courts and other open spaces surrounding buildings, as well as limiting the density of population.

Provisions of the ordinance governs the minimum requirements,

as adopted "for the promotion of the public health, safety, convenience, comfort, prosperity and general welfare."

It provides for a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$100 for each violation, or a jail sentence not to exceed 90 days, upon conviction of the offender.

Also created under the ordinance was a zoning board of appeals, which would have power to hear and decide requests or applications for special exceptions to the zoning map, or to grant temporary uses and permits.

W-P School Drops New Shop Addition

Possibility of a county-financed technical training center halted Whittemore-Prescott Area School officials from asking voters for more money to build a shop addition at the high school, according to Supt. Ray Kesler.

Previously, a shortage of funds caused authorities to consider a special bond election to finance this portion of the system's construction program.

The school now awaits further development of the training center which would house the same equipment planned for the shop addition. This center would be supported by revenue collected throughout the county.

Another reason for not holding another bond election is that Sherman Township School has shop facilities like those planned for the new addition.

The facilities could be used for the cost of transporting students some eight to 10 miles between the two schools. This cost is fractional of that for a new shop addition.

Anticipated completion of the classroom additions at Prescott and a multipurpose room at Whittemore, covered by the bond issue approved last June, is next October.

As a result of the construction strike, work has not started on these projects. A new target completion date depends upon when work begins.

High Wind Damaged Trees

High wind the night of Tuesday, June 11, caused extensive damage to trees in Alabaster Township, according to Richard Backus, who operates a tree service in Tawas City. Several trees toppled over on houses.

That same night, high wind caused damage to electrical power lines in the Pincinning area and Consumers Power Company crews were rushed there to make repairs in order to resume electrical service.

Two Burglaries Investigated in Western Iosco

Two breakings and enterings, a larceny and vandalism reports are under investigation by Iosco Sheriff's Department.

A Reno Township cottage owned by Marvin Navarre, Trenton, was burglarized and two hunting bows stolen.

Neil Erickson, Midland, reported the breaking and entering of his cottage on Keystone Road. Stolen items included an antique clock, transistor radio, cowboy boots and other items.

Kenneth Salisbury of Hale reported the larceny of tools from his pallet mill.

Dr. Lisle Cooper, Detroit, who owns a cottage on Chain Lakes Drive, Plainfield, reported that eight windows had been broken in his cottage by BB gun pellets. Other vandalism to the grounds was also reported.

Sheriff's department officers investigated vandalism complaints to mailboxes on Sparta Road, Tawas Township, owned by Carl Schmalz and Stanley Blury. The department is also investigating a complaint at Hale where one mail box was destroyed by explosives.

The department handled six property damage automobile accidents over the week-end.

Tawas Welcomes Michigan Sheriffs

Accept Lease for Expanding Boat Ramps

Formal acceptance was given Monday night by the Tawas City Council on a lease with the Detroit and Mackinac Railway for expanding the city's boat ramp on Ninth Avenue near the river mouth.

The city obtained permission from the railroad several years ago to construct a boat ramp at the southwest corner of the West Tawas yards. The ramp has been used extensively during the boating season.

Believing that the area should be ready to handle expected large numbers of coho fishermen in the fall of 1969, the council at its last meeting requested additional property from the railroad for expansion purposes.

An additional 125 feet of river frontage was secured for an annual rental of \$75. Two new boat ramps are to be constructed on the property.

The city has made application to the Michigan Municipal Finance Commission to issue tax anticipation notes for the purchase of property from Gordon Clute, to be used as a future industrial site and for parking purposes near the ramp.

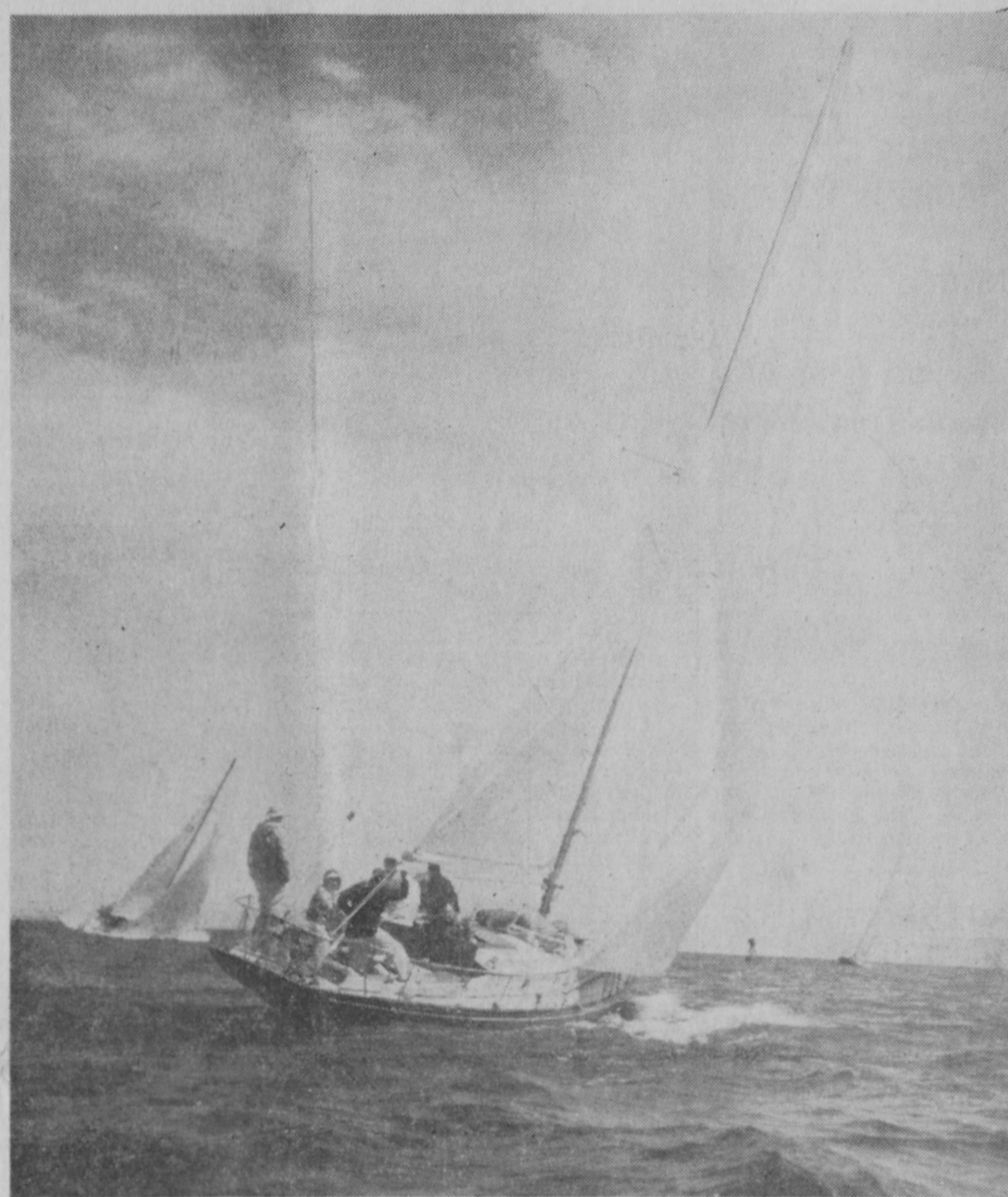

The council authorized removal of the building this fall and to replace it with a new backstop and service building.

East Tawas Sailboat Wins 3rd Annual Memorial Race

John W. Sutton, owner-skipper of "Sea Fever II," was crowned over-all champion in the third annual Memorial Race held Saturday and Sunday under the sponsorship of Tawas Bay Yacht Club.

While finishing 12 minutes behind the "Shadow" of Charles Moulthrop, Saginaw Bay Yacht Club and Tawas Point, Sutton's Tetterburg 40-footer had a handicap of 21 minutes and won on corrected time.

Finishing in third place was Harold "Buzz" Bowman, in "Thunder," a 31-foot Islander.

Race officials termed Saturday's start off the Michigan Waterways Dock as one of the finest ever witnessed on these waters. "Shadow," "Sea Fever II," "Crow's Nest," skippered by A. B. Crow of Alpena, and "Thunder" crossed the starting line in nearly a dead heat.

The boats wasted little time in Tawas Bay with a wind ranging up to 25 knots and the first three finishers began to pull away from the

fleet shortly before reaching the No. 1 buoy.

Course for the overnight race saw the boats sailing to Port Austin, then returning to AuSable Point. The course then turned to Gravelly Shoals and returned to the finish line in Tawas Bay.

First to cross the finish line was "Shadow" at 3:58 a. m. Sunday, followed by "Sea Fever" at 4:10 and "Thunder" at 4:55 a. m.

Sailing conditions were perfect for boats of this size, although "Sea Fever II" gained some advantage over the heavier boats when the wind lightened Saturday night. The final leg from Gravelly Shoals saw the wind freshen and boats came in on a spanking breeze.

Sutton has now won two of the three Memorial Races, while Moulthrop was last year's winner. Sutton and L. G. (Ladd) McKay were co-chairmen for the race.

Trophies were presented following dinner Sunday evening at the Tawas Bay Yacht Club. Members of Sutton's crew were

Clarence Holman, Fenton; Henry Porter, Detroit; Donald Pyne, Flint; Meryl Amos, East Tawas; Mike Stitt, Kalamazoo and Oscoda; Bill Mack, Florida.

This was the third race this season for boats of this class and Sutton plans to enter 13 more races during the summer. Other boats participating included "Happy Talk," skippered by Dr. Otto J. Preston, Flint; "Gino II," Robert Marsh, East Tawas. One boat, "Pandemonium," skippered by Dr. Tony Ponsetto, Flint, dropped out due to rigging failure.

ET Lions Club Joins Move to Employ Youth

Lt. Gov. William G. Milliken, heading a state-wide effort through service clubs to help find summer employment for youth, announced today that the effort is being supported by the Lions Club of East Tawas.

"I am very pleased," he said, "to have the assistance of this club and to know that the contact person will be R. M. Harris."

Club members have pledged to locate job opportunities, inform applicants about any openings and serve as "coaches" to provide job guidance on an individual basis. Wherever possible, the club will cooperate with other local summer job placement efforts.

In a unique approach to matching available jobs with unemployed youths which already has attracted national attention, Milliken has secured the cooperation of state and local leadership of Lions, Jaycees, Kiwanis, Rotary, Optimist, Civitan and High Twelve organizations.

He also has secured cooperation of the department of labor and its Employment Security Commission, Department of Education, the Office of Economic Opportunity and the Michigan Youth Commission.

Estimating that several hundred thousand of Michigan's 2.5 million public and parochial students will be in the job market this summer, Milliken hopes to stimulate what he calls "an unprecedented attack on the traditional joblessness of our youth during the summer months."

The connection of the "two ends of the world" was completed in the prayer of consecration made by Bishop Loder in the commissioning of the Rev. and Mrs. William George Trudeau, as missionaries who will serve in Douglas, Alaska, held in the Dawson Auditorium on the campus of Adrian College. Thus the gavel from Southeast Asia and the prayer of consecration for the missionaries who are to serve in the extreme Northwest of this continent has world-wide significance and relevancy. The gavel that Bishop Loder used had been given to him by the Rev. Joseph R. Lantz in October of last year when Bishop and Mrs. Loder were making an episcopal visit to India. The donor of the gavel is the executive secretary of the Board of Christian Social Concerns of the denomination in India.

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Proceedings of Iosco Board of Supervisors

MAY SESSION

May 15, 1968

Pursuant to adjournment April 15, 1968, the Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order at 9:30 a. m. by Chairman Smith who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Belson, Blust, Campbell, Chivia, Everett, Gerard, Moss, Higgins, Brewer, Jocks, Kasischke, Little, Lixey, McElheron, Mead, Mielock, Smith, Stephan, Weible. Communications were read and referred to the proper committees by the chairman.

Mr. Little, Grant Township supervisor, commented on his opposition to the proposed closing of a section of Sand Lake Road and submitted a petition signed by fifty-nine area residents expressing their opposition and a desire for action against the Iosco County Road Commission.

The matter was referred to the judiciary committee for consultation with the prosecutor.

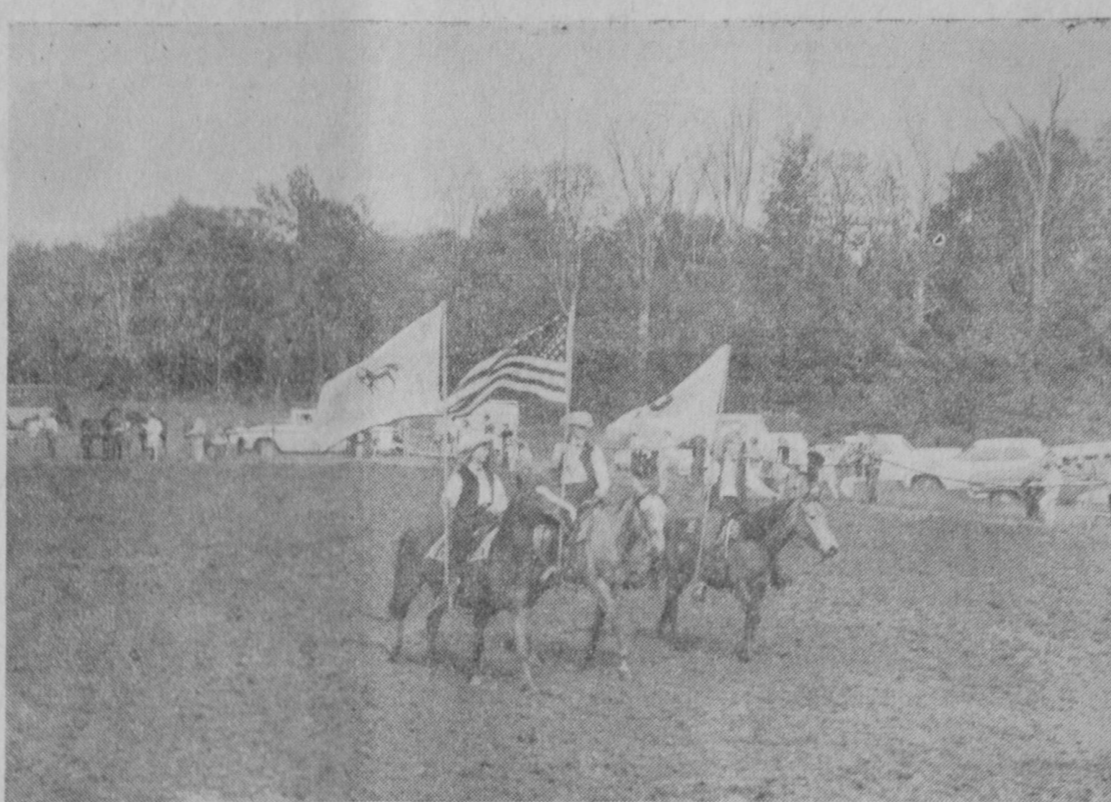

Forest Chats

In May, we didn't believe we could be involved in any more varied tasks than we were doing that month. Then, June came! And so did some new tasks.

One task which will be of interest to the folks around Oscoda is the fuel-break being constructed around the Oscoda Area School on River Road. This fuel-break may be described as a strip of land on which the "dog hair" jack pine, which surrounds the school, is being permanently converted to a different type of vegetation. The vegetation that will occupy the 60-foot wide strip will be of the grass and low shrub type. This will make it easier to construct a fire line if it should become necessary.

This strip of low vegetation will also serve as a no-hunting boundary around the school. Over the past several years, concern has been growing for the safety of pupils on field trips around the school. AuSable Township will post no-hunting signs along this strip to

close the area between it and the school to the use of firearms and bows and arrows.

The fuel-break is being constructed with a new implement in this area called a brush chopper. It weighs 12 tons and makes a swath eight feet wide. Because it is so large, we had to borrow a large caterpillar tractor from Hoxey Civilian Conservation Center in Wexford County. Roy Shedenhelm was given the new task of learning how to drive it and pull the brush chopper.

Another project we are working on is the National Forest identification sign being erected along Monument Road. Presently, the site is cleared and the foundation has been poured for the sign which will be completed in July. This type of sign is replacing the old entrance sign that was hung from poles.

In the future, the site will be made into a wayside and information stop. Here, the people entering the Huron National Forest will be able to get information about recreation areas and things to do and see in the forest.

Order Isoco to Correct Jail Defects

15 Years Ago—

June 19, 1953—The county jail, which has been continuously under criticism by the Michigan Department of Corrections for a number of years, was emphatically brought to the attention of the Isoco Board of Supervisors at its two-day June meeting. The department of corrections threatened to close the jail within 90 days if some concrete action was not taken. Defects include overcrowded conditions, a serious fire hazard, no segregation among male prisoners, poor electrical wiring and poor physical structure of the building.

Grants of \$1,518.86 were approved by the Isoco disaster advisory committee of the American Red Cross. The gifts represented clothing to the recent tornado disaster victims and, in one instance, material for replacement of a small home. The federal government has placed Isoco County in the tornado disaster district along with five other Michigan counties.

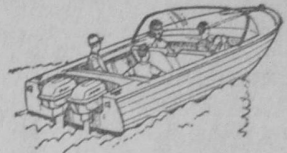

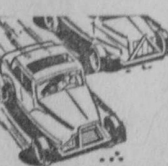

paid during vacation periods. If a student works during the summer months or part time during the school year and earns \$1,000 or less all of his social security benefits, if his earnings go above \$1,680, he gives up some of all his benefits, depending upon the amount of his total earnings and how steadily he works."

Secretary Cohen said a 1967 change in the dependency requirements for the children of women workers made about 175,000 young persons eligible for payments. A large number of them are in the 18-22 group and are attending school. They must apply for benefits before their payments can start.

Young people in the 18-22 group whose mother died after working under social security or whose mothers are retired or disabled, should get in touch with the nearest social security office if they are not already receiving social security student's benefits, Secretary Cohen advised.
