

Two Schools Seek Millage Approval

Faced with higher operational costs, coupled with a reduction in state aid, two Iosco County school districts will go to the voters June 10 to seek approval of additional operational millage.

Despite the fact that all schools of the county (with the exception of one) are to receive a larger slice of the 15-mill allocation next term—from 8½ mills in 1967-68 to 10.08 mills in 1968-69—the need for additional millage to carry on educational programs has long been a foregone conclusion.

With a budget increase of approximately \$125,000 and a 37 percent loss in state aid, Tawas Area School District will ask voters

to approve a 3¼-mill tax levy for three years.

At the same time, Hale Area School is to ask voters to approve a two-mill proposal for one year to replace the four mills operation which has expired.

The only exception to the county school allocation is Whittemore-Prescott Area School District, which is controlled by Ogemaw County's allocation. The district is pegged at 9½ mills. In addition, the district has one year remaining on a two-mill tax levy approved last year.

It has been emphasized by Tawas Area Board of Education that should voters approve the 3¼-mill proposal next Monday, only enough

millage would be levied to meet the budget. This would mean that the actual levy would be about 2.9 mills, as remainder of the budget deficit would be balanced by final reduction of the school's surplus fund, estimated at \$45,000.

While some portions of Tawas Area School District will be paying a larger share of school costs, due to the county equalization by Gen Surveys, actual millage to be levied would be less than last year. In 1967-1968, the voted levy was 2.5 mills for operation, two mills for building and site, 1.569 for debt retirement. This was a total of 6.069 above the 15-mill limitation.

Should the June 10 election prove successful, millage for 1968-

1969 would be 3.25 for operation, 1.1 mills for debt retirement, for a total of 4.35 above the 15-mill limitation.

Of 553 schools in the state, only 14 had less operational millage than Tawas during the current year. Ten schools had a levy of 30 or more mills for operation.

One of the most important factors being stressed in the need for approval of operational millage is that Iosco schools are in competition with other schools for personnel. "If one wants to get the most competent teachers, then we must have the money with which to compete."

Last year, average state aid paid to schools was \$218.75 per pupil.

Tawas Area received \$207.88. For the year 1968-1969, Tawas will receive \$184.58, due to increased valuation and deductible millage.

The school plans to add another science teacher to the staff for 1968-1969 and to introduce an adult education program with assistance from the Mott Foundation. This, coupled with ever increasing costs, will mean that additional funding is a necessity.

Drastic curtailment of the school program is almost an impossibility, and as pointed out recently by Supt. Reynold Mick, any and all alternatives to a successful millage election would rob pupils of their opportunity for a complete educational program.

The same need for voted millage holds true at Hale Area School. The new state aid formula, with an increase in deductible millage from 5.28 to seven and the increase in valuation of the school district, will cause a decrease in state aid of approximately \$25,000.

Supt. Paul Southerland stresses that the board of education has been studying building needs and probable solutions to overcrowded conditions. Progress is going as fast as the board can proceed on the local level of planning. Delays are taking place in discussions with the state department.

Tawas River Canoe Race Slated Sunday

High water caused by recent rain is expected to benefit the 15th annual running of the Tawas River Canoe Race scheduled Sunday, June 9.

A spokesman for the Tawas Chamber of Commerce's race committee said that the river portion of the course would definitely be improved with higher water conditions.

Hugo Wojahn, race chairman, announces that registration is to be held at the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office until noon Sunday. Late entries may register at Grove's Landing on Tawas Lake.

Approved by the Michigan Canoe Racing Association, entry fee for each two man canoe team in the senior division is \$4, of which \$1 goes back to MCRA.

There will be two divisions as in past years. Cash prizes in the senior division are \$75 for first, \$25 for second place and \$15 for third. Trophies are to be awarded to the first 10 places.

The junior division, for racers up to 15 years of age, will award trophies to winners of the first

three places.

Rules and regulations for the race are available at the chamber of commerce office.

Between 15 and 20 canoes are expected to enter the senior division. Starting at 2:00 p. m., race course for the senior division is approximately seven miles in length. It starts on Grove's Landing, Tawas Lake, and proceeds northerly to Cliff's Landing. There, canoeists round a buoy and proceed back down the lake to the Tawas River, paddling to the river mouth and into Tawas Bay. Finish line is at the Tawas City Park dock.

The junior race starts at 1:45 p. m. at Grove's Landing. The course for juniors is the same except that the race ends at the river mouth at Tawas Bay.

The race originated as part of Tawas City's centennial observance in 1954 and last year's winners were Stan Hall and Ralph Sawyer. The latter is a five time winner while Hall teamed with Jerry Lawwers in 1962-1963 to win top money. Dick Gillings and Kirby Clayton of Prescott have won the junior title two straight years.

Assisting Wojahn on the committee are James Dillon, Walter Champion, Hugo Keiser, Cecil Gable, Richard Lee.

Council Approves Street Opening

Opening of Provoast Street was authorized Monday night by the East Tawas Council.

On recommendation of the street and sidewalk committee, it was decided that before any work would commence, it would be understood that a structure would be built on the lots for which the street would be open.

Cost of constructing a water main would be borne by the city, while the sewer cost would be discussed further by the council.

In other business, the council authorized raising the grave opening fee at the cemetery from \$50 to \$60.

The council is now negotiating a new contract with Edward Schanbeck for garbage collection, due to additional miles on the route.

The city is to amend its electrical ordinance concerning inspection. The new fee will be \$3 for inspection of main and branch service and \$1.50 for inspection of temporary service, rather than the old combined fee of \$3.

Veteran City Treasurer Has New Job at County Building

Mrs. Ruth Albertson, who has served as Tawas City treasurer for slightly more than seven years, announced Monday night that she now has a full time job in the county treasurer's office and that the city council would need to take steps in order to secure a replacement for her elective office.

The treasurer told councilmen that she would fill out her term if that was the city's desire. She said also that she would help to train a replacement for this position.

During general discussion, it was pointed out that the treasurer's work load, as well as that of the clerk and other city offices, was increasing to a point where a full-time clerk could be hired.

Mrs. Roy Bergeron is presently hired by the department of public works as a clerk and it was felt that there was enough work in that department, plus her regular city secretarial work, to keep one person busy.

Mayor Russell A. Rollin Sr. pointed out that, in recent years, much of the city's clerical work had fallen on Reginald Bublitz,

Deadline for filing nominating petitions for the August primary election is June 18. According to a report from the Iosco County clerk's office, five candidates had filed as of Tuesday.

Filing for the office of sheriff on the Republican ticket are Ivan O'Farrell, incumbent, and James Finley.

Three persons have filed petitions for the new office of county supervisor, following the recent redistricting plan adopted for a nine-man board.

Filing were Aubrey F. Belsou, Burlight; Clarence S. Everett, Tawas City; Ray Mead, Wilber Township.

Other candidates have secured nominating petitions for the various offices and are expected to file before the deadline.

School Board Seats Contested

Annual school elections June 10 find contests in three of Iosco's four districts.

Three candidates have filed for two vacancies on Tawas Area Board of Education. Seeking reelection is Mrs. Helen Payea of East Tawas, veteran treasurer, who was elected to a four-year term in 1964, after having been appointed that year to fill out the unexpired term of Joseph Dimmick.

Seeking election to the board is Earl Davis of Tawas City, who was appointed last December to fill out the unexpired term of Clyde Soper, who resigned.

Newcomer to the election arena is Arnold Zierow of Alabaster Township, an employee of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company.

Whittemore - Prescott Area

School has four candidates seeking two vacancies. Wayne Survant and George Erickson, incumbents, are opposed by Earl Stone and Leonard Frey.

Five candidates have filed for a four-year term and two candidates filed for a two-year term at Oscoda Area School. Frederick Lockhart, incumbent, is being opposed for the four-year term by Vern Amley, Hugh Bissonette, Glen Highfield and Martin Jacques. Jesse Skimin, incumbent, is being opposed for the two-year term by Haywood Massey.

There are no contests on the ballot at Hale Area School. Dale Brumfield and Herman E. Maas, incumbents, seek re-election.

Police Busy Over Holiday and Week-end

The Memorial Day holiday and week-end proved to be one of the busiest in years for Iosco Sheriff's Department.

Some 12 persons were lodged in the county jail Sunday on complaints ranging from malicious destruction of property to reckless driving.

The sheriff's department reports that only one minor personal injury accident in Oscoda Township marred the holiday.

Two malicious destruction complaints investigated included the breaking of eight windows at Camp Maqua YWCA Camp, Hale, and removal of an aid tombstone from the grave of a Civil War veteran at Silver Valley.

Three youths were held on a minors in possession count following the theft of two purses at A & W Drive-In, Tawas City Park. A warrant is being sought for theft against one youth.

Officers were involved in a high speed chase in Oscoda Township in which three minors were jailed for having beer in their possession. Three more youths were issued traffic summons for drag racing.

Four Flint youths were arrested for minors in possession at the Midway Drive-In, following a disturbance in the parking lot. A fifth man was charged with furnishing beer to minors.

Officers also investigated theft of a 14-foot aluminum boat from the AuSable River, along with five breakings and enterings of trailers at Old Orchard Park.

City Seeks to Borrow on Anticipated Taxes

Application for \$9,500 in tax anticipation notes in order to purchase property on Ninth Avenue has been filed with the Michigan Finance Commission by the City of Tawas City.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz, who prepared the application, said that the report had been mailed to Lansing last week.

The city is hoping for an early approval by the commission—by June 24—in order to speed negotiations for the purchase of approximately 19 acres owned by Gordon Clute. The site would be for future industrial and recreational purposes.

Bublitz said he had contacted State Rep. George A. Prescott to enlist his help in speeding the application through the state office.

It is felt that acquisition of this property is most necessary to provide needed parking for the expected rush of coho fishermen to this area in the fall of 1969.

In other business, the council approved transfer of a liquor li-

cense at the Barnes Hotel to Larry Renaud and Edward Lier of Flint. Kirk Krake, real estate agent, introduced Renaud and Lier to the council.

Police Chief George Westcott was authorized to attend the state association of police chiefs convention to be held at Traverse City July 1, 2 and 3.

Annual examination and audit of city books during the period March 11, 1967, to March 10, 1968, was presented by Joseph Ruth of Yeo and Yeo, public accounting firm of East Tawas.

Bublitz announced that a letter had been sent to the Department of Housing Urban Development withdrawing the city's application, following recommendation of the planning commission and recent action of the council.

Payment of \$3,110 to Gary Steadman Contractors, Bay City, for construction of the Mathews Street South sewer project was authorized, subject to final inspection and adjustment of complaints.

Yockey Brothers Paving Contractors are to start work on Tawas City streets in late June or early July, according to the superintendent of public works.

Word from United States Sen. Philip Hart Tuesday revealed that Tawas City had been awarded \$15,875 as a matching grant from the interior department for acquisition of land on Tawas Bay for expansion of the city park.

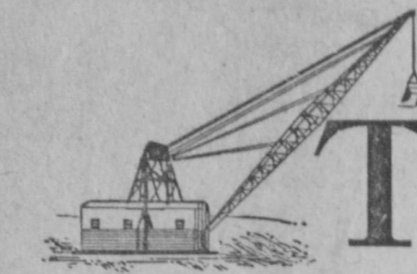

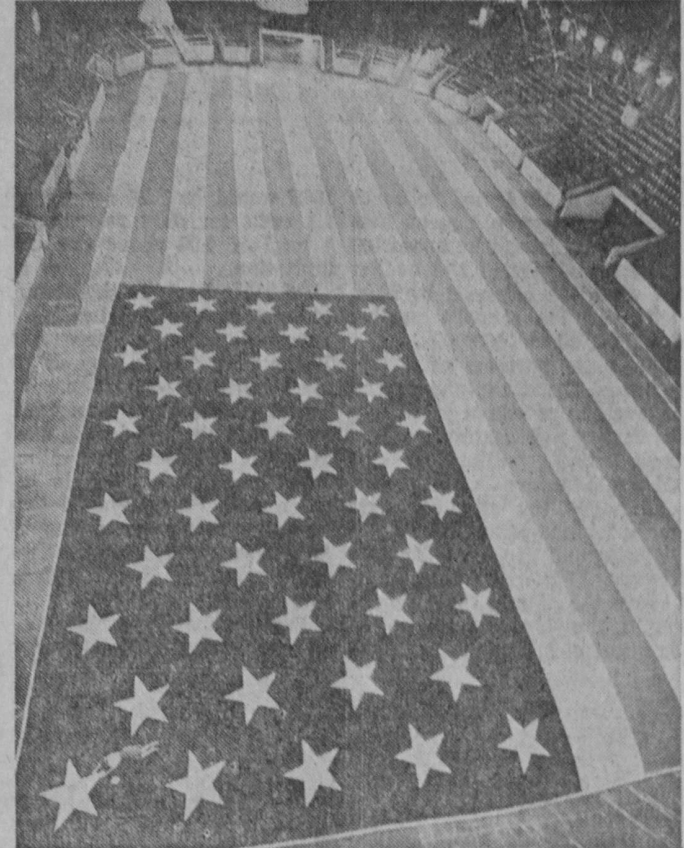
Rev. Saulsbury to Accompany Group on Trip

Jet Engine Drives New CP Generator

Lowell L. Shepard, division manager of Consumer Power Company's Bay City Division, announced Monday that the installation of \$1,500,000 jet engine-driven emergency generating unit at the Karn-Weadock complex is now complete and in operation.

The 20,000 kilowatt "peaking" plant which is capable of starting up the Karn and Weadock generators, will also provide power to help meet "peaks" in day to day electricity demand. These peaks usually occur during early morning and late afternoon when home-makers and businesses are busiest and using large amounts of power.

The jet engine, fueled by natural gas and similar to that used in aircraft, was manufactured by Pratt and Whitney, Incorporated.

Until the company's Midland nuclear plant is completed, the Karn-Weadock complex remains the largest steam generated power plant in Consumers Power Company's system.

Sam Charron of Pinconning and a former Democratic representative from the 102nd District, announced this week that he would be a candidate for the house of representatives on the Republican ticket.

Charron was the new 102nd District's first representative in Lansing when elected in 1964. Improvements Are Noted in Tawas Area School Curriculum

 In reviewing the operation of

Tawas Area Schools during the current year, a considerable number of changes and improvements have been made.

With the completion of the new shop facility, updating of the vocational training curriculum was begun. Classes in wood shop were made available to boys in the junior high school to enable them to get an introduction to shop procedures and basic tools of wood-working and also to help them decide whether they wanted to take advanced training of this type in high school.

Other improvements in the curriculum resulted in additional equipment, facilities and classes in mechanics training as well as offering a metal working class and an additional year of mechanical drawing. An evening welding class for 30 adults of the community was held during the spring.

The number of art classes was increased this year, including an introductory session for junior high students and an evening class in ceramics for adults. These were made possible through the completion of the art room in the new facility.

Problems with the completion and equipping of the facility caused considerable delay in getting these programs into operation, but school officials have stated that full utilization of the vocational facility and a well-coordinated course of study are to be instituted next fall.

The program of offering enrichment classes to students in the junior high school also included exploratory units in home economics classes for girls as well as an introductory class in junior high French. Through these classes, students will be better prepared to make decisions concerning their high school courses of study when the time arrives for them to decide.

The business education classes were fortified by the addition of a course in office machines, second year typing and shorthand II. This should equip many students for acceptance of immediate employment upon completion of the school's commercial program.

Expansion of a school's curriculum also requires an increase in the library facilities and audio-visual materials for teaching. The high school library was enlarged by one-half and equipment for re-

producing training aids was added, partially through federal funds. A part-time worker in this area has aided in increased usage of this facility and more utilization of audio and visual materials for teaching.

One of the most pressing needs of an English class is more time to do written work. A teacher aide has been utilized during the past year to assist English teachers in clerical duties, thus freeing teachers for more time to handle individual problems and handle more assignments of a written nature.

In line with current practices of stressing physical fitness, more classes in physical education and health education are now being taught in the high school and during the winter months the gymnasiums of the district were opened on Saturdays for supervised recreation. Additionally, playground supervision at noon has given the elementary teacher a well-deserved break during her lunch time.

More adequate playground equipment has been made available at both of the elementary schools and partial blacktopping of one unit's yard have gone a long way toward making these facilities more useful for recreational areas for the younger children of the district.

Continuation of the reassignment of the science and mathematics offerings of the school district has been progressing well and with the proposed changes in high school courses in physical science and biology Tawas Area Schools will be fully up-to-date in these departments.

Much publicity has already been given this year to the changes brought about in the social studies department of the system through the addition of the team teaching concept to the instruction. Studies have shown that this technique should produce improved instruction and will also better prepare those students who go on to further training as variations of this system of teaching are frequently utilized in both colleges and technical schools.

The requirements for graduation are gradually being increased to keep pace with other academic institutions and all high school students are presently required to take five subjects during the six-period day.

Continued emphasis on giving special help to those students

with particular difficulties is producing favorable results. This year has seen the addition of classes in remedial reading in both the elementary and junior high schools. One member of the high school faculty will be fully prepared to teach special education for slow students in the junior and senior high next fall. In cooperation with the Iosco County Intermediate School District, Tawas Area is providing space for instruction of students with speech defects and similar problems. No decrease in this effort is anticipated.

Another special project of the district has been the approval of a program for the initiation of community school program which the Mott Foundation of Flint will be aiding. Adult enrichment classes, high school completion courses for adults and recreation programs will be directed through this program.

In past years, the schools of the district were plagued with a condition of overcrowded classrooms, not allowing adequate opportunity for students to receive the degree of individual help often needed. The school population increased by some 70 students this year and this along with an expanded curriculum required staff increases of nine instructors. Through this increase, Tawas Area School has both increased its course offerings and reduced class sizes to a more effective level.

To maintain the same offerings to students and keep the district in a competitive position with surrounding schools, funds will have to be made available beyond what the tax allocation board will allow. The total amount of millage requested of the voters of the district will be no more than 3 1/4 mills, a reduction from the 4 1/2 which was paid last year.

School officials point out that the only way that expenditures can be cut is by cuts in services to children, thereby short-changing a child during his only chance for an education.

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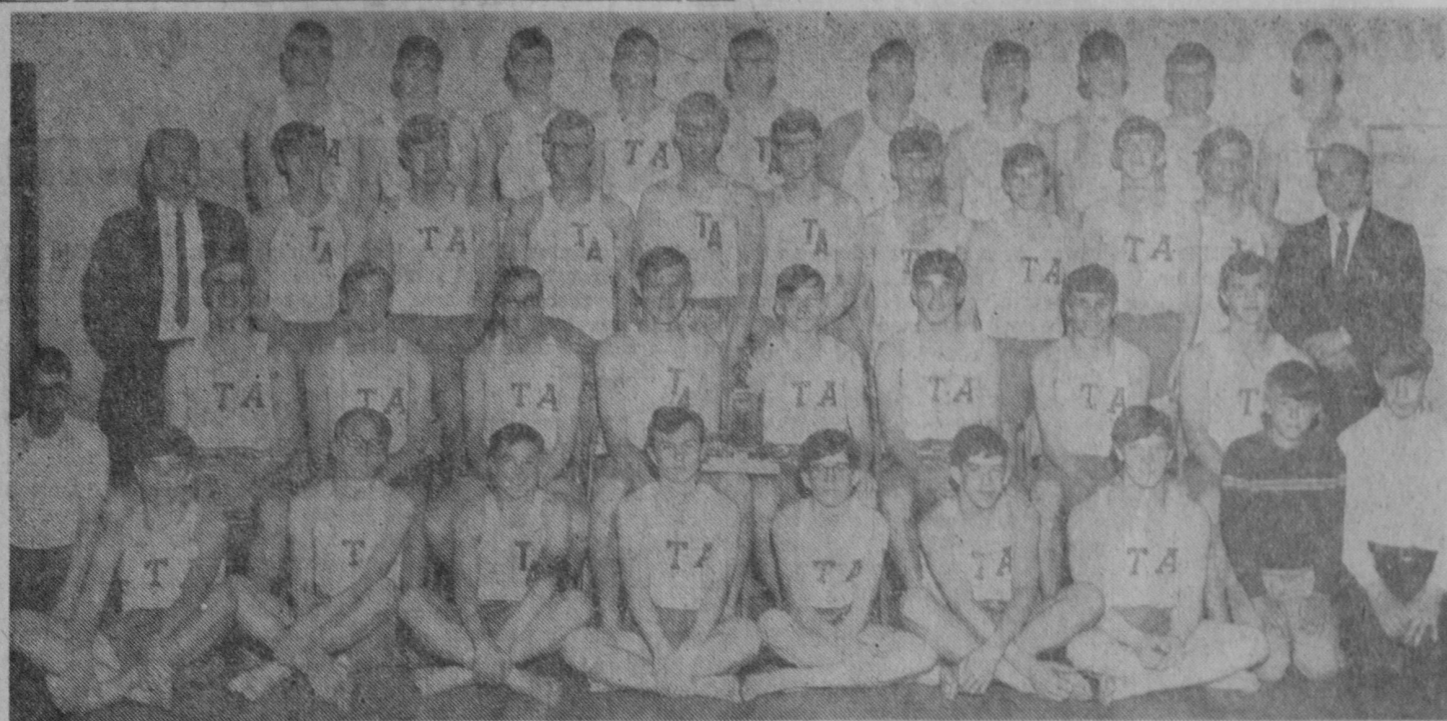

Forest Chats

Finally, at long last, the leaves have come out and the barren winter scene has disappeared before the onslaught of spring. Hopefully, the main part of the spring fire season on the Tawas district has come to an end with the recent rains and the greening of the vegetation. Although high winds and drought can still make for dangerous days.

The warmer weather also announces the beginning of the charge season at three campsites: Round Lake, Rollways and Monument campgrounds. Charges will be similar to those in effect last year with the exception that it will be required to charge an additional dollar for a user fee charge at the Round Lake campground, the most popular one on the district. Charges required for entrance to the other two sites will be either the \$1 daily ticket or possession of the \$7 Golden Eagle Pass, this is usable in any federal recreation area throughout the country for one year.

Golden Eagle passes may be purchased at the ranger station office in the Federal Building, stores at the Monument and Rollways campgrounds or from the national forest collection officer that will be working at Round Lake. Daily tickets can be purchased at either of the two stores above or from the collection officer at Round Lake.

No charges will be made at the following recreation areas this year: Silver Valley, Corsair campground and picnic area, Sand Lake beach and picnic area, Gordon Creek Trail Camp, Monument and Rollways picnic grounds.

Many ask why charges are now made at many national forest recreation areas. This charging was begun in 1965 as a result of the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act that was almost unanimously approved by congress. All money received from entrance goes into the fund and is used for acquiring and development of recreational areas throughout the country.

Up to this fiscal year, about two thirds of the fund have been appropriated to the states and the territories to help plan, acquire and develop local parks and recreation areas. About one-third of the fund has been appropriated to the national parks, national forests and national wildlife refuges. Support of this fund will help preserve land for hiking, riding, camping, boating, fishing, swimming, hunting and other outdoor recreation in the battle for the "shrinking outdoors."

We hope you all enjoy the summer camping season and can make good use of the recreational areas on the district and forest.

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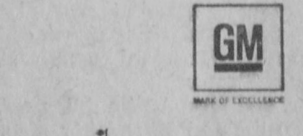
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
