

New Sanitary Landfill Facility Opens May 27

Operation of the new Tawas area sanitary landfill facility is to commence Monday, May 27, according to a joint announcement by public works department of Tawas City and East Tawas.

All residents of the corporate units of East Tawas, Tawas City and those living in the western sec-

tions of Baldwin and Wilber Townships may use it. Industrial and commercial users requiring extra privileges may be granted special use permits on proving need. Application for a special permit must be made at either city hall.

The sanitary landfill facility is the result of many months of planning and effort by the governmental units involved and the United States Forest Service. It is designed to meet all of the many requirements of the Michigan solid waste disposal act and will operate under license issued by the Environmental Health Section of the Michigan Department of Health.

Located on a 20-acre parcel of forest land in the southwest quarter of Section 33, Wilber Township, the entrance road is on Galion Road, nine-tenths of a mile west of Monument Road. Total distance from the East Tawas business district's entrance is 7.5 miles. From the Tawas city business district, the distance is 7.3 miles.

A single sign is placed at the intersection of Monument Road and Galion Road and two signs are at the entrance road.

A landfill operation is the depositing of garbage and rubbish in a deep trench, compacting it into a dense mass and covering each day's deposits with a light layer of sand to prevent the emission of odors and the breeding of rodents. This is repeated each day until the trench is filled before excavation of a new trench.

As the area is used, it is restored for recreational uses. The burning of rubbish is eliminated. Branches and brush are piled in a separate area where it can be burned when weather conditions and surface moisture permit.

The facility will be open to the above named residents on the following schedule: Monday, 12 o'clock noon to 6:00 p. m.; Wednesday, 12 o'clock noon to 6:00 p. m.; Saturday, 9:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m. It will be closed on all holidays.

Combined loads of limbs, brush and rubbish will not be permitted. Rubbish and garbage are to be deposited in trench at the direction of the caretaker. Brush and tree limbs are to be piled by the hauler at a place designated by caretaker. Stumps will not be permitted.

All materials should be covered while in transit to prevent littering of roadsides. Brush is to be securely tied down to vehicle. Michigan anti-littering laws are to be enforced.

Zoning Ordinance Gets Council OK

Approval of East Tawas' new zoning ordinance was given at the Monday night meeting of the city council. A public hearing is to be held June 17.

The new ordinance regulates the location of trades, industries and the location of buildings designed for specific uses. It also regulates and limits the height and bulk of buildings hereafter erected or altered.

In addition, the ordinance regulates and determines the area of yards, courts and other open spaces surrounding buildings, regulates and limits the density of population and divides the city into districts.

Developed by Raymond W. Mills and Associates, Incorporated, planning consultants of Midland, in conjunction with the city's planning commission, the ordinance is part of an over-all comprehensive development plan for East Tawas and Baldwin Township.

Preparation of the report was financially aided through a federal grant from the Urban Renewal Administration.

In other business Monday night, Edward Doak appeared before the council and requested that Provoast and Nelson Streets in the First Ward be opened. The matter was turned over to the street committee.

Hale School Asks Extra Voted Millage

The new state aid formula, with an increase in deductible millage from 5.28 to seven and the increase in valuation of the school district, will cause a decrease in state aid of approximately \$25,000 to Hale Area Schools.

In considering the increase in valuation and the decrease in state aid and anticipating 10 mills to be allocated by the county, Hale Area Schools will be asking voters at the annual June 10 election to approve a two-mill operation for one year to replace the voted four mills operation which has expired.

The school board has been studying buildings needs and probable solutions to overcrowded conditions. Progress is going as fast as the board can proceed on the local level of planning. Delays are taking place in discussions with the state department.

The school board feels that if possible, anything proposed to the voters of the Hale School District will be done as close as possible to the regulations set down by the state department so that the school district will not be handicapped in any future building or other school matters.

Petition Asks Removal of Rd. Commission

A petition signed by 59 persons and presented to the Iosco Board of Supervisors last Wednesday asked that the Iosco County Road Commission be removed from office, "as they are knowingly wasting the taxpayers money."

The petition stems from an objection by Grant Township residents to the relocating of Sand Lake Road between Townline Road and the old Meadow Road intersection.

At the request of National Gypsum Company, the road commission proposed to close the present Sand Lake Road and move it to a point east of the old highway. Starting at Townline Road, it would curve around the quarry and hit present Sand Lake Road near Meadow Road and then extend on to M-55.

Considerable objection has been heard to this proposed move from property owners and residents of the area, who feel that the change will have an adverse effect on the business of the Sand Lake area.

The petition presented to the board Wednesday stated that "the added miles the mail carriers and school buses will have to travel in a period of years will be a direct burden to the taxpayers."

Upon checking with the prosecuting attorney, the board of supervisors learned that it had no statutory powers in any road closing.

Local Government Receives Rebate on State Income Tax

Income tax rebate of \$25,087, representing the first quarterly distribution of state income tax funds to local government, is to be in the hands of the county treasurer by the end of May.

In announcing distribution of income tax funds to local governments in the 102nd District, State Rep. George A. Prescott said that under the tax structure, each county will receive \$1.52 per person. Of this amount, 50 percent of the total goes to the county treasury and the other 50 percent is to be divided among cities, villages and townships in the county on a population basis.

In other area counties, \$162,615 will go to Bay County, \$14,979 to Arenac County and \$14,713.60 to Ogemaw. As soon as county treasurers can process checks, funds are to be distributed to the various cities, villages and townships.

10.08 Mills to Iosco Schools in Preliminary

Monday's meeting of the Iosco Allocation Board has to go down as one of the mildest in its 35-year history. The board has responsibility for dividing the 15-mill tax limitation between the county, township and schools.

One board member said that there were no visitors at the Monday session—a far cry from previous years, when the meeting room was packed with representatives from schools and the county board of supervisors, all looking for an extra slice of operational millage.

And probably another "first" was that the preliminary order was passed on the first ballot.

Under this order to receive final approval May 28, schools of Iosco are to receive 10.08 mills for operation, intermediate school district is to receive .17 of a mill, townships showing a budget need are to receive one mill and the county is to receive 3.75 mills.

The only place where the above does not hold true is at Whittemore. Being controlled by Ogemaw County's allocation, Whittemore-Prescott Area School District's millage is pegged at 9½. As a result, Burleigh Township showed a need and is to receive 1.25 mills for operation.

Last year, schools received 8½ mills and the county received 5.35 mills, while .15 of a mill went to the intermediate school district and townships received one.

Reason for the larger slice of the 15 mills going to schools is that Iosco's valuation jumped from

\$60,483,798 in 1967 to \$94,218,410 this year. As a result, the county required less millage to meet its budget.

The higher county valuation, however, has added to the problems of schools because, as the local tax base increases, state aid generally lowers. Two schools, Tawas Area and Hale Area, have announced they will ask voters for additional operational millage to replace that which expires in 1968.

In Tawas' case, having \$16,700 per student valuation last year, the school received 47 percent of its money from state sources. With the higher valuation this year, the school will receive in the neighborhood of 37 percent of its operation-

al money from the state. The remainder will have to be raised locally.

The board of education announced last week that it would seek approval of an additional 3¼ mills by a vote of the people. If the 10.08 mills allocated Monday remains the same on the final order, only 2.92 mills would be required

to meet the school's budget, plus present money held in its treasury. While the 3¼ mills would be printed on the ballot, only enough millage would be spread to meet its budget.

Budget requests to the allocation board, to be raised by local taxes, were as follows: Whittemore-Prescott Area School, \$180,000; Hale Area, \$188,814.47; Osgoda Area, \$650,000; Tawas Area, \$578,122; intermediate school district, \$20,000; Iosco County, \$354,821.

Members of the allocation board are Arden Charters, William Weren, Russell A. Rollin Sr., Edward Nelkie, Ernest W. Jordan Jr., L. S. Little.

Say Reapportionment Headed for New Bind

Michigan's reapportionment of county government on a one-man,

one-vote basis may be headed for another legal hassle, according to reports from Lansing.

Iosco is one of almost 60 counties in the state which adopted reapportionment programs. The plan for reapportioning this county had been ready for use last year, but was shelved after one delay and then dusted off and adopted earlier this year.

However, there was a warning Friday from Lansing that a newly discovered legislative error puts existence of some city supervisors on county boards in legal jeopardy and the whole question may bring challenges and lawsuits.

It was reported that the legislature is considering and may soon debate proposals to enact quick repairs to the laws and others to call the whole thing off and live with county government as it is for two more years.

Research of state laws has revealed that the county reapportionment act has repealed one section of the home rule act. While this apparently would have no effect on charter cities, it could mean that several new cities would not have representation on county boards of supervisors.

Also uncertain is who is to set the pay of new supervisors elected under reapportionment. Last week, the Iosco Board of Supervisors established pay of this new nine-man board at \$25 per day, \$5 higher than the present per diem being spent in Iosco.

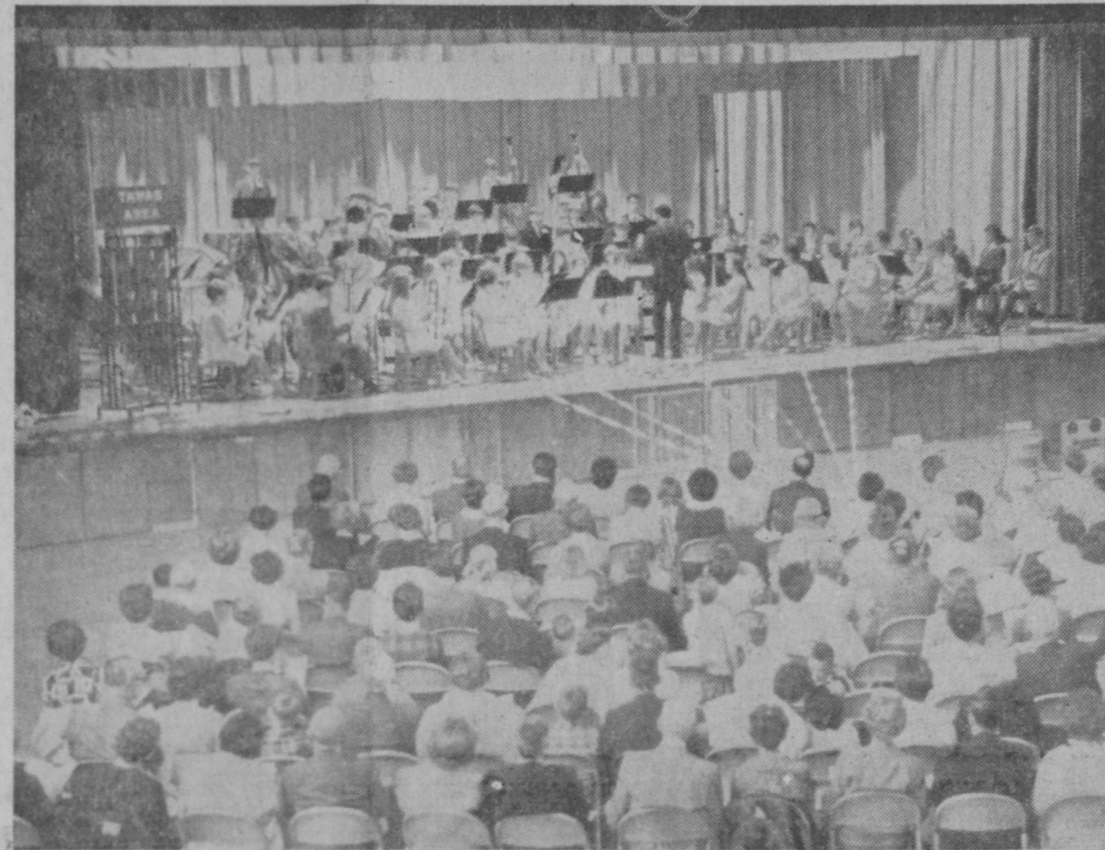
In any event, this confusing situation soon will come to a head as the final filing deadline for would-be supervisor candidates under reapportionment — June 18 — draws near.

The reapportionment plan for Iosco, approved March 15, 1967, by an 11-6 roll call of supervisors, followed a deadlock on the six-man reapportionment committee which studied two different plans.

Under the nine-man commission, Alabaster, Sherman, Burleigh and the City of Whittemore would be grouped into one district, as would be the case of Reno, Grant and Tawas.

The Third Ward of East Tawas was grouped with Wilber and Baldwin to form one district. Tawas City, East Tawas, Plainfield and AuSable would have one repre-

Supervisors Again Set Saturday Hours at County Building

Three offices in the Iosco County Building are to remain open Saturday mornings according to action taken by the board of supervisors.

At its May 15 session, the board instructed offices of the clerk, treasurer and register of deeds to remain open Saturday mornings during June, July and August on an experimental basis.

The board had taken similar action in April, indicating an effective starting time of May 1, but offices remained closed Saturday mornings.

In other business, appointments to the planning commission were approved as follows: Kenneth Blake, James Mielock and Frank Wilkusi, three years; Fred Kaiser, Wilbur Roach, two years; the Rev. Charles Boeder, one year.

Resignation of A. P. Brandemuehl as civil defense director was accepted and a letter of commendation was sent to him by the board. Named as his successor was Henry Gage.

The board adopted a retirement plan effective July 1, availing to all eligible county employees a pension plan as provided by the Michigan Municipal Employees' Retirement Act.

County officers and full-time employees would be included in the program.

Council Adopts New Street Paving Work

Adopting recommendations of its street committee, Tawas City Council Monday night approved a street construction program for this coming summer costing \$4,555. The program includes nine streets and covers approximately one mile.

The following streets are to receive prime and double seal coat: First Street, from Harris Avenue to Bradley near the Iosco Medical Care Facility, 700 feet; Maple Street, from railroad track to German Street, 600 feet; Court Street, from M-55 to Maple Street, 400 feet; Eleventh Avenue, from Harris Avenue to North Street, 450 feet; Eighth Avenue, from Second Street to First Street, 600 feet.

Elms Avenue and Crocker Boulevard, from Bay Drive to US-23, 1,000 feet, and Townline Road, 225 feet; Beech Street, from German to Cedar Street, 650 feet; Maple Street from German to Cedar Street, 650 feet; Cedar Street, from

Maple Street to Oak Street, 650 feet.

In other business, Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz reported that the Detroit and Mackinac Railway was agreeable to expansion of the city's boat ramp site on railroad property off Ninth Avenue. Immediate planning is to be made for the addition of another boat ramp. The property is being made available to the city on a 30-day cancellation clause, should the railroad need the property for its operation.

Bublitz reported that city equipment started work Monday in dredging the mouth of the Tawas River in order to allow passage of small craft. Work was to have been completed Tuesday.

Action recommended concerning an insurance program was tabled in order that the council's building and grounds, finance and audit committees may conduct a complete review of insurance policies with the city's two agents.

submarine net fishing. Hamell Fisheries is owned by Frank Hamell, one of the younger men in the industry here. In the face of depression, lack of confidence and low fish prices, fishing is one of the few industries in the county which is employing normal sized crews, building and buying equipment and showing courage. Over 120 men are employed at the present time in fishing here and the average wage is \$18 per week. Fishermen are spending \$60,000 for new equipment this year and \$5,000 more will be spent with local merchants for hardware and small items, plus about \$2,000 per month in fuel for equipment. There are 13 major fisheries in this county, along with a number of smaller operators.

More than 200 persons attended a banquet Tuesday night for officers and men of the reforestation corps, given by the East Tawas Chamber of Commerce. The meeting was for the purpose of showing the friendly feeling and interest which exists in this locality toward the corps.

Read Smith will catch it (or at least try) in ceremonies opening Tawas City's first game of the season in the Northeastern Michigan Baseball League.

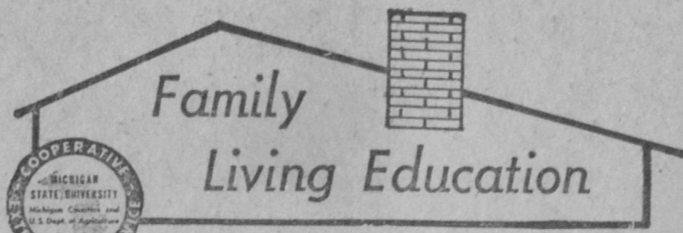
Wilber Extension Group Held Final Meeting of Season

IS IT A FRAUD?

Fear, insecurity and greed, these human failings cost consumers thousands of dollars every year when fast-talk artists and unscrupulous salesmen bilk susceptible people.

An example of common current fraudulent sales, according to the state attorney general in his newsletter, is the free 1968 stereo console as a gift. All one has to do is purchase four LP records a month for 15 months. Total cost could be twice what the stereo and records would have cost bought separately and from reputable local dealers.

Another example that "takes" consumers because of fear is the fire alarm system that does not work when needed. It is usually sold by door-to-door salesmen using a high-pressure scare technique.

It is spring with the influx of door-to-door salesmen so arm yourself with resistance and common sense and rely upon reputable local people who can locate after purchase and who will stand behind their product.

If you have questions, or are concerned about a pitch from out-of-towners, ask the salesman to come back after you have investigated. In the meantime, you may call your county prosecuting attorney for an opinion and talk to local dealers about similar products for prices and quality.

CANNED HAM LABEL WORTH READING

With summer just around the corner, you may be buying a canned ham for a spur-of-the-moment picnic or to replenish the emergency shelf. Where will you store it?

Check the label on canned ham weighing more than three pounds before storing. Labels on federally inspected hams must carry the statement "Perishable—keep under refrigeration" if the ham has not been heated to a high enough internal temperature for room temperature storage. If your canned ham has no statement specifying storage in the refrigerator, it can be safely stored in a cool, dry place as you do other canned food. Most canned hams requiring refrigerator storage weigh three pounds or more though recently the USDA has permitted perishable packs on sizes smaller than three pounds.

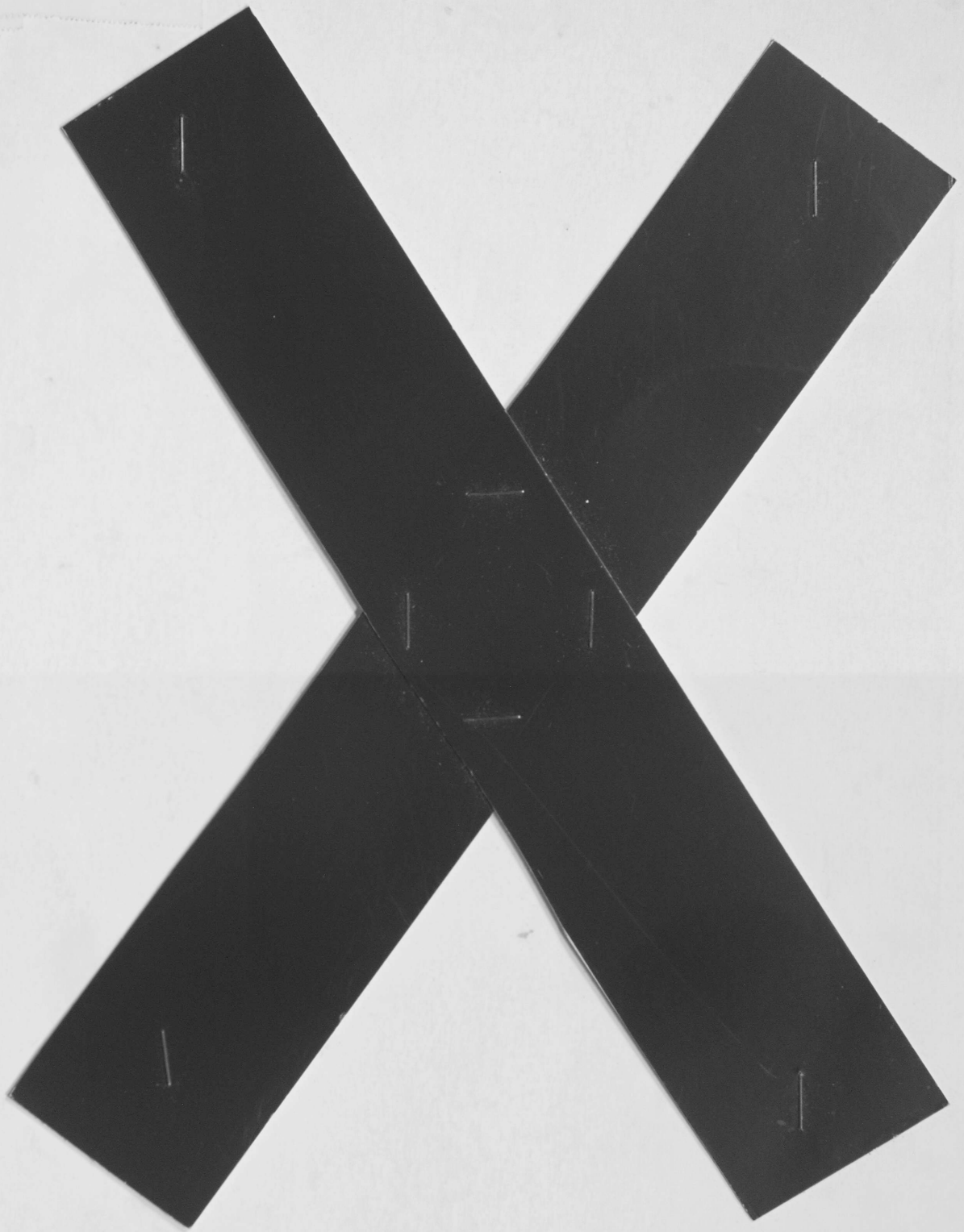
