**Elderly Oscoda** Man Charged With Murder Benjamin Nedwash, 75, Oscoda, has been charged with first degree murder in the shooting

death of his nephew, David Stevens, 32. Nedwash was arraigned last Thursday, the morning after Oscoda Township Police arrested

him at his rural Oscoda home. Stevens was found slumped in a chair, fatally wounded in the heart by a .22 caliber rifle bullet. Nedwash had called police short-

ly after 8:00 p.m. to report the shooting and surrendered a rifle to police

Robert Foster, township police chief, said a drinking party had been in progress for several hours before the shooting and the men had been alone for a considerable time after others had left the home. He said the shooting was apparently a "spur of the moment thing" and no argument was involved
