Legion Gives Memorial Day Schedule at ET

The Rev. Richard L. Broome, pastor of Seventh-day Adventist Church, East Tawas, is to be speaker during Memorial Day services Thursday at the East Tawas Cemetery.

Francis Drumm, commander of Audie Johnson Post, American Legion, invites all veterans to participate in a solemn tribute to America's war dead.

A parade of veterans, Tawas Area High School Band, boy scouts and girl scouts is to leave the American Legion Hall on Newman Street starting at 10:30 a. m.

A salute to naval dead is to be given at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock.

John Mielock, officer of the day, said that assembly would be called at 10 o'clock for the parade.

The program is to be preceded by raising a flag at the memorial flag pole on US-23 erected in memory of Lt. Douglas Evans, who died while exploring a cave in New Mexico last fall.

State Rep. George A. Prescott is to be principal speaker at Memorial Day services Thursday at Tawas City Cemetery.

Prescott's address will be a general tribute to the dead of past and present wars.

Fred Luedtke Sr., former commander of Jesse O. Hodder American Legion Post, under whose auspices the program is being held, will be honorary officer of the day.

People of the community will pay tribute to dead of the past and present wars starting with an 8:00 a. m. assembly at the Legion Hall on River Street.

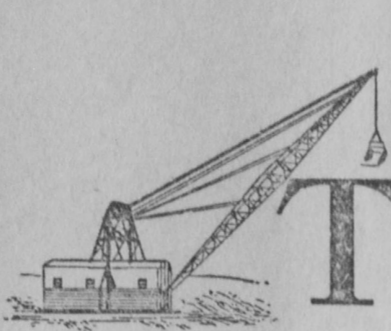
Marchers will include Tawas Area High School Band, firing squad and members of Jesse Hodder Post, boy scouts and girl scouts.

Decide Millage Proposal June 10

Compare TA Schools With Others in Area

In comparison with other school districts of similar size and located in the northeastern part of the state, Tawas Area Schools stack up well in some areas and not too well in others.

One measure often used for comparison is that of spending. Various factors are considered in this, commonly the cost per child of instruction, current school operation and general fund expenditures. Other factors could include cost of instructional salaries per pupil, amount of millage voted and state equalized tax value per child.

Using the latest state figures in a comparison with 11 other school districts in this part of the state, Tawas ranks at the bottom in funds expended per pupil for instruction and current operation; next to the bottom in the areas of general fund expenditures per student and instructional salaries costs on a per-pupil basis.

Funds for operation of schools are received principally from three sources: Local taxation, state aid and federal participation. State aid is based on a complicated "ability to pay" formula. The amount of state equalized property evaluation per child is the chief yardstick for measuring this. As the local tax base increases, the state aid generally lowers.

For example, in the 12 schools

listed, the lowest state equalized valuation per child is in the Pinconning district (\$7,800). It receives 64 percent of its money from state aid. At the other extreme, Gerrish-Higgins school district has state equalized valuation of \$26,400 per student and, therefore, received only 35 percent of its funds from state sources.

Tawas, having \$16,700 per student valuation, received 47 percent of its money from state sources. The remainder must be raised through local taxation. As a result of the recent work of Gem Surveys, increasing the valuation of the school district, Tawas Area Schools will receive a considerably lower percentage of its funds from the state, probably in the neighborhood of 37 percent.

In order to conduct a well-rounded program, therefore, it will be necessary to increase the local level of support to replace the percentage reduced by the state. In placing the question of millage before the voters, Tawas Area Schools will actually be asking for less millage than that which was received last year. The only debt retirement taxation is for the bonded debt on the high school building. The tax rate for this year is to be 1.100 mills, a drop from last year's rate of 1.164 mills. This millage is not subject to a vote, as it was approved when construction of the high school became a reality

following the consolidation of the district in 1952.

The voted operational millage last year was 2½ mills and an additional two mills for building and site fund purposes to construct the new shop facility. This total of

4½ mills has now expired. Voters are being asked to vote a maximum of 3¼ mills for three years in order to provide 13 mills for operation of the schools. The county tax allocation board has increased the school's share and the

3¼ mills would not be completely levied; only that portion necessary to obtain 13 mills for operation. As competition for job placement and college entrance becomes more acute, schools must also compete with other areas for

qualified personnel. Competition at all levels of government for tax dollars is keen. Taxpayers of the school district need to study factors involved in the millage election and determine how the school will stand in the competition.

TA Braves Win NBC Track Championship

Tawas Area Braves won their third NBC track title in the past six years last Wednesday night by outpointing their nearest opponent, Oscoda, 64-52. The remaining schools finishing in order were Essexville, Standish-Sterling, Pinconning, Gladwin and Carrollton. West Branch was unable to participate because of its hepatitis quarantine.

Coach Bob McDonald, who has piloted Tawas teams to three NBC crowns, said that the win showed an effort of more than 100 percent by his boys. "And we had some pleasant surprises from our freshmen," added McDonald.

Scoring in all running events and failing to hit the ledger in only two field events, the Braves dominated the Essexville meet all the way.

Most outstanding were the high jumpers and sprinters. Gary Haglund, Shaun LaBlance and Paul Beyer took the first three places in high jump, while Rick Payea sprinted to first place victories in the 100 and 220-yard dash events.

Both Haglund and LaBlance have had jumps of over six feet this

spring but, in Wednesday night's light drizzle, had to settle for tying the conference record at five feet, nine inches.

Another first went to the 800-yard relay team of Dale Rieger, Dave Lixey, Haglund and Payea.

Other Tawas scoring included: Long jump, Payea, fourth, and Beyer, fifth; Bill Deckett won fifth place in the two-mile run; two freshmen provided nice surprises in the mile run, Mike Sventko winning second place and Tom Becker winning fourth; Lixey finished third and LaBlance took fourth in high hurdles; Chris Miller's third place finish in the one-half mile run set a new Tawas school record at two minutes, 3.9 seconds; Bob Brugger won third in the quarter mile.

Scoring in low hurdles found Lixey with a third and LaBlance, fourth; Rieger won second place in the 220. The mile relay team of Miller, Paul Becker, Haglund and Brugger won third place.

This was the last regular track meet of the season for the Braves, who were to participate Saturday in the state final at East Lansing.

Rev. Lindholm Named to Board

The Rev. William C. Lindholm, pastor of Grace Lutheran Church, East Tawas, was elected to the Executive Board of the Michigan Synod of the Lutheran Church in America by the 250 delegates of the church in convention at Ann Arbor. Pastor Lindholm will be one of six clergymen on the 12-man governing board of the Michigan jurisdiction of the Lutheran Church in America.

J. Richard Ernst of East Tawas was also a delegate to the convention. The delegates to the convention made known their conviction for more humane abortion laws for the State of Michigan and approved abortion for grave causes such as the preservation of the life and health of the mother, pregnancy as the result of violence and a reason to believe a serious defect exists in the fetus. Dr. Franklin Fry of New York City, New York, president of the church, called for an awakening to the racial crisis. He said that "there are those who believe the problem is simply one of increased law enforcement and in heavier repression, but as Christians, we must lead in compassion and justice, no matter the consequences." The delegates ordered the budget of the synod increased in the amount of \$20,000 and that amount set aside to aid the emerging social needs.

Delegates heard that parents are showing less concern for the education of their children as Sunday school enrollment dropped three percent again this past year.

Iosco Indian Lore Featured Meeting

"To be ignorant of what happened before you were born is to remain a child," said Mrs. Hazel LaVoie in her talk on the Indian history of Iosco County at last Wednesday night's meeting of Iosco County Historical Society.

"This state has an exciting Indian history and I feel that we should take a fresh look at the Iosco Indians and the part they played in this state's history," said Mrs. LaVoie. "Their history is our history."

Because of illness, Mrs. LaVoie's mother, Mrs. Estelle Silas, was unable to participate in the program held at Oscoda Township Hall. About 45 persons were in attendance.

A full-blooded Chippewa herself, Mrs. LaVoie said that Michigan had been the home of the red man for centuries before the coming of the white man. She said that the Indian trails had become today's highways and former village sites were now cities.

She talked of the foods raised by



Indians, their use of birch bark in construction of houses and canoes and explained the peculiar social institutions of the family clans.

Several Indian artifacts were displayed by Mrs. LaVoie, including a 200-year-old cradle with which Indian mothers carried babies on their backs, a basswood bag, porcupine quill box, bead work, a ceremonial pipe, mortar and pestle. She explained the dyes used in decorating various articles. She also displayed a genealogy which traced her family history back to the 1760s. A copy of this interesting document is now in the collection of Clarke Memorial Library, Mt. Pleasant.

Michigan's Indians were hunters and fishermen and roamed the state looking for game. Iosco never had a large population of Indians, but Mrs. LaVoie believed that there were probably 200 or more located in the VanEtan Lake area during one period.

The first Indians to make their permanent home here came from the Indian town settlement near the present day site of Foote Dam, later moving to the north end of VanEtan Lake.

In the late 1840s, fishermen established the first white settlement at the mouth of the AuSable River and other Indians from the Seginaw area moved to VanEtan Lake about the same time. This Indian settlement was later moved to its present location on the Iosco-Alcona line where a church was established.

There are eight graves located in the Indian cemetery and permission has been granted to erect a new fence enclosing the property. It will also be the site of a future historical marker.

John Weible, program chairman for the society, announced that the organization's next meeting Thursday, June 13, would feature a film on Michigan lumbering and a round table discussion on "white pine days" of Iosco County.
