

Nixon Wins, Anyway—

## GOP Votes Do Not Count in Michigan

Although all of Michigan's electoral votes will go to the Democratic presidential candidate, Iosco County voters favored Richard M. Nixon and Spiro T. Agnew in the November 5 general election. Iosco voters gave 736 ballots to the American Independent Ticket of George Wallace and Curtis LeMay.

Iosco gave its traditional lip-sided support to the Republican Ticket, registering 4,068 ballots for Nixon-Agnew and 2,633 for the Humphrey-Muskie slate.

George A. Prescott of Tawas City, Republican candidate for reelection as 102nd District representative in the state legislature, won handsomely over his Democratic opponent, Connor D. Smith of Bay County. Iosco voters gave a big edge to Prescott, who registered 4,905 ballots as compared to 2,016 for Smith, indicating considerable spitting of ballots by Democrat voters.

Elford A. Cederberg won out in his bid for re-election as 10th District representative in congress and Iosco voters gave him a margin of 4,865 to 1,983 for Wayne Miller.

The only contest at the county level was for Iosco sheriff and Ivan O'Farrell won in his bid for re-election, 4,707 votes to 2,360 for Louis L. Sokola, Democratic candidate.

J. Richard Ernst had 5,988 votes in his bid for district judge. Kenneth Ralph of Standish, whose name was also printed on the ballot but who withdrew from the race in late September, received 1,551 votes from Iosco.

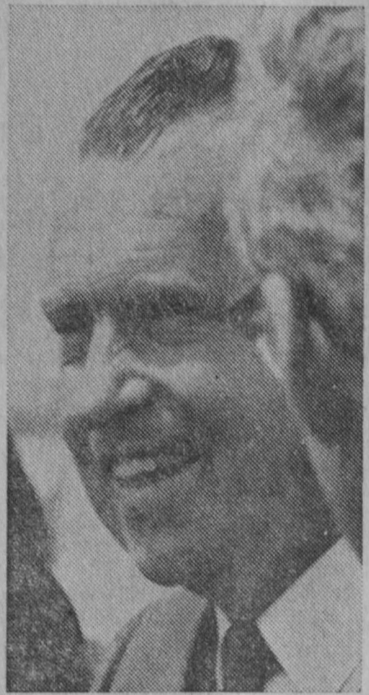
As the result of Ernst's candidacy for district judge, there was no candidate listed for prosecuting attorney. Four write-in candidates were noted in the election, headed by Kenneth Myles with 12 votes. Michael Freel received 10 votes, Jerry Cotter had eight and Herbert Hertzler, four.

Other county candidates received the following totals: D. Keith Pappas, county clerk, 5,157; Edward Nelkie, county treasurer, 5,237; Albert H. Buch, register of deeds, 5,166; John Mielock, drain commissioner, 5,097; E. John Moffatt, coroner, 4,996; E. D. Jacques, coroner, 5,131.

Iosco voted as follows on the five state propositions: No. 1, graduated income tax, 1,432 yes, 4,719 no; No. 2, daylight savings time, 3,292 yes, 3,490 no; No. 3, water pollution, 4,352 yes, 2,145 no; No. 4, recreation, 3,335 yes, 3,003 no; No. 5, permit election of members of legislature to another state office, 1,679 yes, 4,567 no.

of the University of Michigan, trustees of Michigan State University and board of governors of Wayne State University received large margins over Democratic candidates from Iosco voters.

On the non-partisan ballot, Thomas G. Kavanaugh received 2,998 votes as compared to 2,589 votes for Michael D. O'Hara, for the one seat on the supreme court; Thomas M. Burns received 3,745 votes and Stuart Hoffius, 1,314 votes, for the court of appeals.



IOSCO COUNTY voters favored the above presidential candidate, Richard M. Nixon, by a large majority, but Republican ballots cast in Michigan will not be included in the Nixon-Agnew ticket's margin nationally. The state majority favored the Democratic Ticket and Michigan's presidential electors will cast their ballots in favor of the Humphrey-Muskie ticket. It is expected that another bipartisan move will be made in congress to eliminate the electoral college and elect a president on a popular vote.

## TC Park Expansion Could be Stymied

After months of preparation, Tawas City officials learned Monday that the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation would be unable to process a request for payment of federal-state funds until the city has submitted a copy of a deed, plus an attorney's opinion showing satisfactory evidence of title, proving ownership of property intended for expansion of the city park.

"This, of course, means that you will be unable to purchase the four tracts on a land contract basis," said Raymond D. Schofield, federal aid supervisor, Michigan Department of Conservation.

The city had filed application, with assistance of Marvin Davenport, county agent, for one-half of the appraised price of four parcels of property lying between the southwest end of the city park and Rainbow Service. Approval of the grant had been given and final city approval of a \$15,000 land

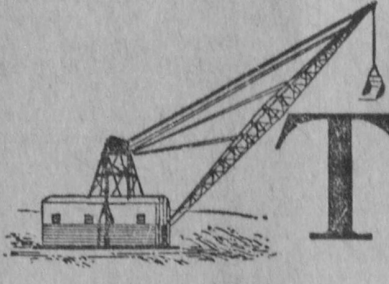

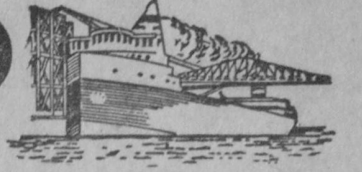

## CUBE to Petition for Millage Vote

# Lop \$65,822 from TA School Budget

Lopping \$65,822 off its preliminary budget of last April, Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night adopted a "final" 1968-1969 budget calling for an expenditure of \$911,640, \$23,395 higher than what was expended during the previous year.

The quotation marks around the final in the above paragraph are there for emphasis, as attempts are being made to hire additional teachers needed to handle an increase in school enrollment.

Following the district's second unsuccessful millage attempt at the start of the school year, nine teachers needed as replacements for retirees and to handle expanding classes were not hired.

If administrators are successful in hiring one or more teachers for the second semester, the above budget would not be final and a deficit would be reflected at the end of the school term, instead of a balance of \$6,665 projected at present.

Looking to the future, Tawas Area Schools will face serious financial problems as 1969-70. Surplus money will have been expended and additional teachers will be needed. In order to reduce this year's budget deficit, some programs were curtailed, student fees were increased and the athletic department is spending its fund built up over a period of 11 years to finance the athletic program on a one-shot basis. Ade-

quate financing is unavailable to cover the cost of spring sports next term.

Because of this financial problem facing the school system, a group called CUBE, Citizens United for Better Education, organized following defeat of the second millage proposal, is to meet tonight to work out details for a third millage election. The group is to circulate petitions and present them to the board of education prior to the Christmas vacation with a tentative election date of February 6.

As it stands at present, Tawas Area Schools can expect \$855,506.57 in total revenue for the current year. Added to this will be \$62,799.66 remaining in the school treasury, which completely wipes out the surplus built up over a period of years. This had been used to finance operations during the period of the school year prior to tax collections.

As the result of including this surplus in the regularly budgeted revenue for 1968-1969, the school is now in the process of issuing short-term bonds on anticipated tax revenue in order to finance school operation prior to the December tax collection.

A look at the revenue budget indicates that the increased student enrollment is not all bad, despite higher classloads for teachers. Net state aid to be received will amount to \$357,354.61, as compared to a figure of \$321,180 estimated last April. State aid last April had been figured on 1,740 students, but the enrollment is now 1,855.

Local taxes will amount to a larger share of the total revenue than received the previous year. With a total district valuation of \$41,169,341 and 10.08 mills allocated to schools by the county, total tax revenue will amount to \$414,986.96. This compares to \$323,122.34 received in 1967-68. The increase is the result of a county-wide property appraisal as the district's former valuation was \$29,240,489.

A breakdown of the 1968-1969 budget indicates that total elementary expenses amount to \$277,834.50, as compared to \$286,715.23 last year. Of this amount, the major expense is teacher salaries of \$237,258.50.

Total secondary expenses for the term will be \$380,112, as compared to \$353,716.27 last year.

Again, the largest single expenditure is for teacher salaries which amount to \$306,771.

Other expenses include Tawas

## In Circuit Court

### 'No Cause' Ruling in ET Land Dispute

A ruling of no cause for action was given Friday in Iosco Circuit Court concerning a complaint brought by Mrs. Elizabeth Oakes Moore vs. Ottawa Equipment Company.

The opinion, handed down by Judge Allan C. Miller, denied the plaintiff's request to recover possession of contested property on Tawas Beach Road, East Tawas, and abatement of a nuisance.

Mrs. Moore asked to have a fence erected by Ottawa Equipment Company removed and the boundary line between her property and that owned by Ottawa be established by judgment.

After purchasing property east of the Moore summer home, Ottawa Equipment procured a survey by R. J. Cooke, a registered land surveyor, who established a boundary line between the two parcels. A shortage of land was found and the surveyor prorated the shortage throughout the plat and recommended new lines for all parcels.

The judge noted that the case involves many parcels of land, but, primarily, only two adjoining parcels in this cause. His opinion was limited only to the claim of Mrs. Moore against Ottawa Equipment Company.

Judge Miller found that the plaintiff had not sustained her burden of proof as to any line based on the principle of acquiescence or adverse possession.

"There being no clear legal or equitable basis for disturbing the title and possessions of defendant, a judgment of no cause for action is presented," said Judge Miller in his opinion.

In addition, Judge Miller, ruled that a six-foot woven wire fence by the defendant did not constitute a nuisance. At the time the fence was erected, city ordinance permitted four-foot fences, but the ordinance provided a procedure for procuring a variance. The city zoning chairman granted the variance and, in May of this year, the ordinance was amended to permit fences six feet in height.

## Schultz Hardware Hit by Fire Early Monday

Fire early Monday morning completely gutted Schultz Hardware in Tawas City. Loss was estimated at between \$35,000 and \$40,000.

Allen Schultz, owner, whose

residence is located about 200 feet to the rear of the store, was awakened shortly before 3:00 a. m. by two women, who saw the smoke as they were passing the

store.

The Tawas City Fire Department was called to the scene and an immediate call was made to the East Tawas Fire Department for assistance.

Firemen battled the blaze for about three hours and brought it under control at 6:00 a. m. Seven water lines from hydrants were used to combat the blaze, with two lines being used to feed high pressure pumps on fire trucks.

No immediate reason was given for the blaze, although the owner stated at the scene he believed it could have been caused by faulty electrical wiring. Schultz told Fire Chief James Lansky that he had no immediate plans for the future.

At the request of the fire chief, Walter Wiedbrauk, Michigan State Police Fire Marshal's Division, Lansing, investigated the wreckage Tuesday in an effort to pinpoint cause of the blaze.

A total of 33 firemen, 16 from Tawas City and 17 from East Tawas, battled the blaze. When firemen arrived at the scene, the interior was filled with smoke and heat. Brick sidewalks and ceiling insulation prevented flames

from damaging adjacent buildings, although most of the roof collapsed into the interior.

"After receiving the call on the fire phone, my wife notified the East Tawas department immediately," said Chief Lansky. "I knew that a call coming in at that hour of the morning would mean that the fire was out of control." Both cities have mutual aid agreements in such cases.

Lansky said that Schultz had told both he and Police Chief George Westcott that he had checked the building shortly after 2:00 a. m.

Schultz purchased the store in the summer of 1966 from Cecil Cabbie. Cabbie purchased the store in December 1956 from Randall Fox. The latter had purchased the store from the late Eugene Bing in January 1946.

The store had been constructed by Mr. Bing in 1919, following a fire which swept the north side of the business district from Mathews Street to the Iosco Hotel. Bricks used in its construction came from the chimney of the old sugar beet plant at East Tawas.

This is the second hardware in Tawas City to be completely demolished by fire. On December 19, 1962, the Tuttle Hardware was leveled by flames and never resumed business.

## Fisherman Sees Need for L. Huron Study

Emerald LaBlance, Tawas City commercial fisherman with the largest gill net operation in American waters of Lake Huron, told members of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association Thursday that he hoped to see the Michigan Department of Conservation expand its experimental work concerning commercial and sports fishing in Lake Huron.

With 40,000 tons of coho salmon eggs expected to be processed and sold to Japanese outlets this year, along with other fishing, LaBlance said that Michigan could become the nation's largest producer of fish products.

He said, however, that he was personally disappointed in the take last year of coho salmon by sports fishermen. He felt that the 32,000 fish caught by approximately 200,000 fishermen was a rather low take, as compared to the amount of money expended on introduction of this species to Michigan waters.

LaBlance was of the opinion that additional research should be made in Lake Huron toward reintroduction of native species of fish, which would help both the sports and commercial fishermen.

As a member of an advisory group assisting the Michigan Conservation Commission, LaBlance said he would request such a survey of Lake Huron.

LaBlance displayed several different types of nylon gill nets used in his fishing operation. Because of the low market conditions, he is not fishing for perch this fall, although he said his equipment could produce approximately 5,000 pounds a day had the large catches in Lake Erie not forced the price of perch down to seven cents per pound. He is presently fishing with large nets for carp, which presently has

an excellent market.

LaBlance explained the use of his fishing equipment, which includes a 55-foot steel boat with 15-foot beam. Four of his sons operate the boat and share profits. The diesel-powered boat travels at a top speed of 12 miles per hour and is equipped with a fish finder, radar and automatic pilot.

Nets with a mesh of two and nine-sixteenth inches are used for perch, which is slightly larger than the legal minimum size. Fishing out of Point Lookout last summer, nets were set at 8:00 a. m. and lifted three hours later, producing as high as 1,500 pounds of top quality perch.

Through a cooperative permit

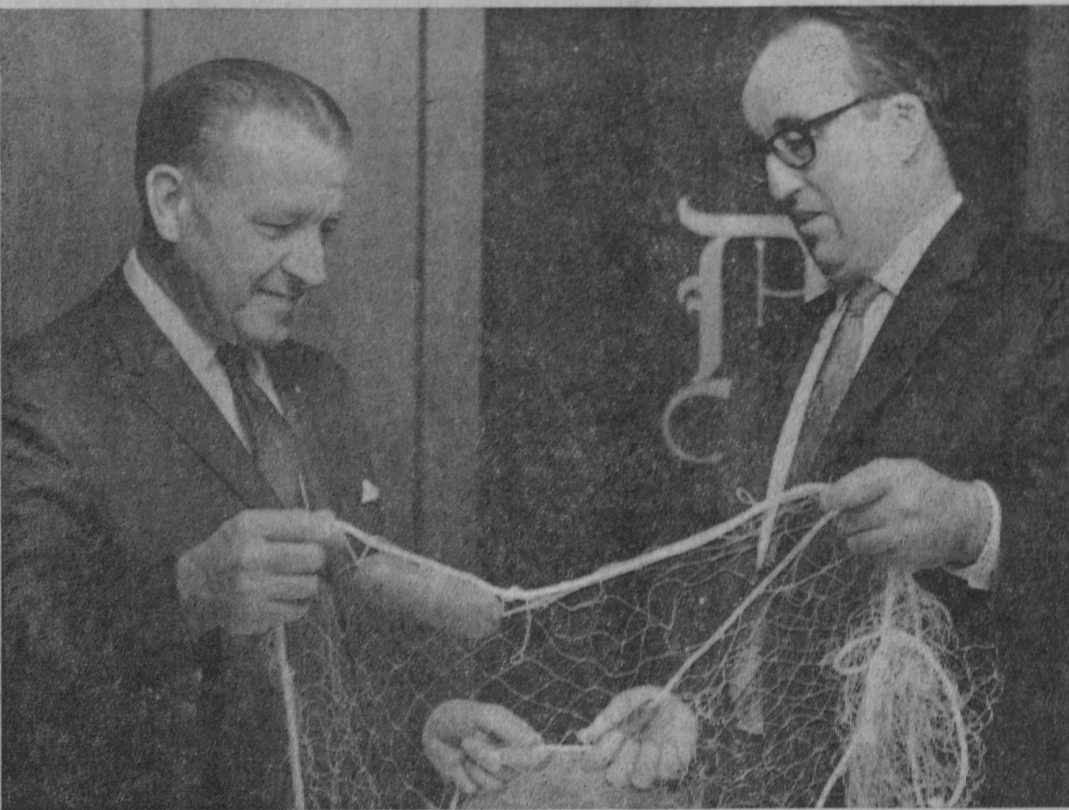
## UF Drive Stalled by Slow Collection

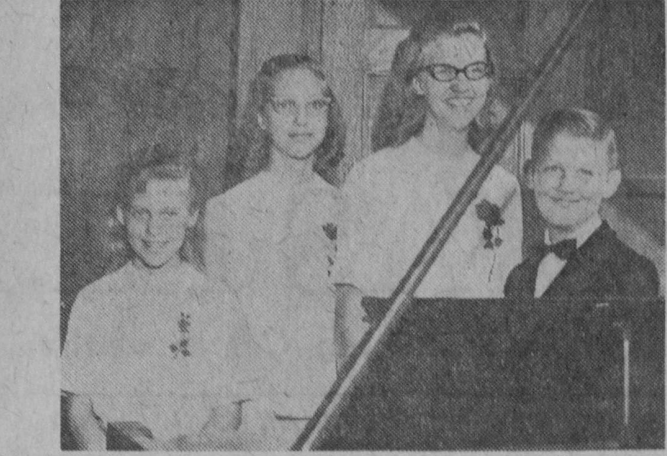

**Widows Eligible for Training Benefits, Reports VA**

For the first time, Veterans Administration education and training benefits are available to widows of men who died—and the widows of veterans totally and permanently disabled—as the result of military service.

In Michigan, an estimated 12,000 widows and wives could benefit from Public Law 90-631 which was signed by President Johnson on October 23 and becomes effective December 1, according to Mr. FitzGerald, manager of the VA's regional office in Detroit.

The new legislation extends to eligible wives and widows the same VA educational assistance now available to sons and daughters of veterans who died or are permanently disabled as a result of military service, Mr. FitzGerald explained.

Payments will range from \$130 a month for full-time training (up to a maximum of 36 months) to \$95 for three-quarters time training and \$60 for half-time training.

The new law also gives veterans separated from service after January 1, 1955, 1½ months of education and training entitlement under the current Post Korean GI Bill for each month of military service after January 31, 1955. This is a change from the present ratio of one month of entitlement for each month of service.

Under another provision of the new law, veterans with 18 months or more service after January 31, 1955, who have satisfied their military obligation, will be entitled to 36 months of VA educational assistance.

Other provisions are: Increase from 36 to 48 months the aggregate period for which a veteran may receive educational assistance under two or more veteran benefit programs.

Authorize the payment of the VA allowance to veterans in flight training on a monthly rather than a quarterly basis.

Permit three-quarters and half-time cooperative training with proportionate reductions in the VA allowance paid for such training. Currently, a veteran employed in related agricultural work who is enrolled in farm cooperative training must take a minimum of 12 clock hours of institutional agricultural courses a week. The new law authorizes VA benefits for nine and six-hour schedules.

The monthly average of veteran trainees taking three-quarters or half-time institutional farm cooperative training is estimated at about 18,000 in the nation.

Mr. FitzGerald said that VA estimates some quarter of a million widows and eligible wives can qualify at this time for education and training. Something like 9,000 a month are expected to enter training in the first year.

Cost of the new law in the first year is placed at 71 million dollars.

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning, November 12, at the Moffatt Funeral Home, East Tawas, with the Rev. Kenneth Tousey officiating. Interment was in White Chapel Cemetery, Troy.

## Judge Rules No Fence Blockade in Road Dispute

Following a show cause hearing Friday on a road dispute, Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller ordered that no obstructions be placed on the so-called South Imperial Drive from M-55 to McIvor Road in Great Township.

Marshall W. Prince, Genesee County plaintiff, has asked the circuit court to issue an order restraining Russell Anschuetz and other "John and Mary Doe" defendants, from interfering with a new boundary line fence which the plaintiff had constructed.

The plaintiff also asks damages of \$10,000.

Prince claims that a new fence which he constructed in no way interfered with the defendant's right of ingress and egress across his property, which Prince must provide pursuant to his contract purchase.

The defendants claimed, however, that the new fence blocked passage across a road which, at one time, had been maintained by the township.

For temporary purposes, the court ordered that there be no blockades by Prince, that there will be no interference with free passage south from M-55 on the county road to the northwesterly route going through the NE 1/4 of the SE 1/4 and thence southerly along the section line between Sections 32, 33, 5 and 4, to McIvor Road.

Judge Miller said that Friday's order would be pending the further order of the court and trial on the merits.

## Curriculum Report Outlines TA Needs

A report on curriculum improvements to be presented at tonight's meeting (Wednesday) of CUBE, Citizens United for Better Education, was outlined to the Tawas Area Board of Education at Monday night's regular session.

John Alexander, curriculum coordinator, outlined both immediate needs for a minimum satisfactory program and future needs for a top quality program in elementary and secondary grades.

Immediate needs in both elementary and secondary levels included providing teachers to meet staff shortages. Included in elementary were one remedial reading teacher, a type A special education teacher, two physical education instructors and 1 1/2 music teachers to serve both units as well as the junior high and/or high school.

Future needs for a top quality elementary program included a remedial reading teacher in each unit, a second type A teacher and an elementary librarian, plus blackout curtains for both gymnasium and 250 folding chairs for the Tawas City Unit, as well as folding tables.

A summary of needs for secondary curriculum improvement included 2 1/2 teachers and approximately \$4,194 for equipment. For a top quality program, an additional three teachers would be required, along with one to two teachers and approximately \$9,850 for equipment.

In other business, the board released Mrs. Thomas Davis, girls' physical education instructor, effective November 22. Her husband is being assigned to Vietnam.

Bill R. Wilder, high school principal, reported that he visited Central Michigan University on Monday to interview prospective English teachers who are to graduate at the end of January. One elementary teacher was to be interviewed Tuesday. Two teachers are to leave the faculty at the end of the semester.

The board authorized an expenditure of \$158 for parts to be used in the automotive shop.

Area's share of the Mott Foundation program, \$8,800; \$33,000 for administration; transportation, \$73,410; operation (custodians, heat, water, sewer, electrical, telephone), \$82,590; maintenance, \$27,100; fixed charges (insurance for property and employees), \$15,336; capital outlay, \$12,600.

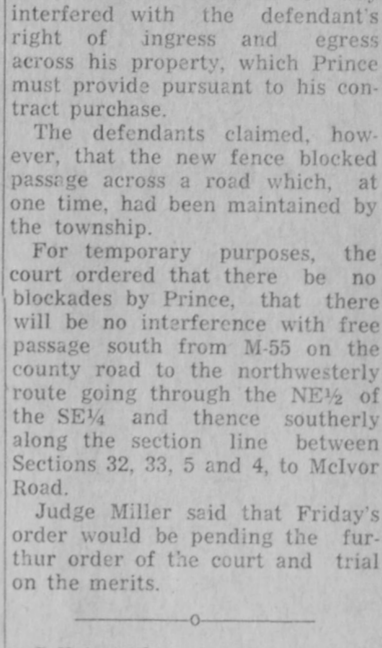

basis with the conservation department, the LaBlance boat fished for trout and whitefish out of Mackinac City earlier this year. Complete records are maintained for state use on every fish netted.

LaBlance touched on the problem of pollution in Lake Huron. He said that probably 90 percent of the perch in the lower part of Saginaw Bay were infested with red worm, which is believed to be caused by human pollution. Such fish are not marketable. Before low market conditions called a halt to perch fishing, he was setting his nets in an effort to find clean water.

He explained how wind direction effects fishing conditions and pointed out that some coho sport fishermen might find the water of Saginaw Bay very treacherous next fall because of high winds and dangerous shoal water.

## "Finders Keepers" Not Safe Rule For Treasure, Says WSU Prof.

On a Lake Michigan beach, Margaret Johnson, a WSU freshman from Hancock, Mich., digs at a promising object.

DETROIT — "Finders keepers, losers weepers" doesn't actually have validity in law, points out Prof. Kenneth R. Callahan of Wayne State University's Law School.

With coho fisherman by the thousands added to those who frequent Michigan beaches, the possibility of picking up washed-in articles of value has increased, he points out.

Not only are there many more small craft on the lakes today — with each a potential loser of floating valuables — but 6,700 ships are known to have sunk in the Great Lakes over the years, beginning with the disappearance of La Salle's *Griffon* in the Straits of Mackinac in 1679.

These ships carried cargo totaling \$20,000,000 in value, even at long-ago money values. The *Griffon* herself carried gold for fur purchasing. "If you find a 'treasure,' either modern or historical, don't assume it's all yours," warns the professor.

Although there are practically no Michigan court cases on the rights of finders, there's a certain law, still on Michigan's statute books, passed by State fathers 122 years ago.

Called the law of "lost and unclaimed property," it deals with such matters as posting notice of having found treasure. (In two public places within the township if value is \$3 or more, and also in newspapers if value is \$10 or more), appraisal and certification of value by a justice of the peace, restitution to the owner if he appears, and actual turning over to the township a portion of the treasure's value if the owner does not appear.

The statute has teeth in it, too, with ominous words like "fine" and "imprisonment."

"And the same law applies to treasure which is not the 'flotsam and jetsam' of the lakes, but just plain buried treasure," says Professor Callahan. There's plenty of this, too, some it probably buried so close to the surface that a few kids at the earth would expose it. The problem is to know where to kidnap!

Each nation that has occupied Michigan has left treasure buried in her waters and soil. There is Indian silver, French louis d'or, and English sovereigns. From more modern sources, there is loot hidden by criminals and riches of law-abiding citizens who have secreted them without revealing their location to others.

There aren't any authentic treasure maps, except charts of sinking sites for the boats that have gone down on the Great Lakes. But for the land treasure, you'll find plenty of tales, fascinating legends and theories provided by Michiganders as you travel through the State.

So when you have a few hours to pass — on a lakeshore awaiting good coho weather or on one of the State's inland campsites — try looking, kicking, or digging, and you'll be joining an increasing group of Michigan treasure hunters.

It will be fun, even though the treasure may not be all yours when, and if, you find it.

## Association Urges National Diabetes Tests

Each year, the American Diabetes Association conducts a nationwide campaign urging persons in a high risk group, over 40, over-weight, with a family history of diabetes, to be tested. The Michigan Diabetes Association, a Torch Drive service and a member of the Michigan United Fund, is launching a Diabetes Detection Week from November 18 through 23, in association with the American Diabetes Association. This campaign is an intensification of the year-round detection program whose goal is to find and help as many as possible of the estimated 1,600,000 undetected diabetic men, women and children and, at the same time, remind the public of the early indications of diabetes and the importance of early detection and control.

Free testing for diabetes will take place at Tawas Hospital in Tawas City, during detection week from 8:00 a. m. until 2:00 p. m. This testing program will be limited to persons over 21 years of age and those who are not known diabetics.

Diabetes is best detected by testing the patient after he has eaten a meal. Therefore, the following diet is included:

Instructions for your two-hour postprandial blood sugar test: It is important to include all the following foods in the amounts listed in the sample meal plan. DO NOT drink (other than water), eat, smoke, chew gum, candy, cough drops, etc., following the meal until the blood sample is taken.

**BEFORE 9:00 a. m.**, eat the following: One cup milk, two slices toast, one egg (if desired), one tablespoon jelly, one tablespoon sugar, one cup orange juice, hot beverage (if desired), one cup cornflakes or oatmeal.

Finish meal within 15 minutes. Report to Tawas Hospital for test one hour and 45 minutes later.

## Some Medicare Bills May Get Carry Over

In this, the last three months of the year, a special "carry-over" rule may allow some medical expenses of Medicare enrollees to be counted twice toward the \$50 deductible provision. For this reason, it is important that bills for covered services received in October, November and December not be discarded even though total medical bills for the year are not over \$50. Mr. Carr, manager of the social security district office, said.

There are two situations in which this special "carry-over" rule applies, Carr noted. In each case, an understanding of the deductible provisions of the medical insurance, Part B of Medicare, can save money for the beneficiary who has incurred expenses for doctor's or other medical services covered by the insurance.

The first of these is when the covered expenses for the calendar year are \$50 or less. Then any expense for services rendered in October, November or December can count toward the \$50 deductible next year. For example, total medical expenses in 1968 amount to \$40. Of this, \$30 was for services received in the last three months of the year. Although Medicare can make no payment for 1968 because the \$50 deductible has not been exceeded, the \$30 can be counted toward the 1969 deductible. This means that the first \$20 of covered expense next year will fulfill the deductible and Medicare can pay 80 percent of all covered expenses over this \$20.

The second instance in which the "carry-over" rule can be applied occurs when covered expenses do not exceed \$50 until the last three months and then additional bills in this period bring the total over the deductible amount. For example, expenses were \$20 for January through September, but in October through December period an additional \$100 expense incurred. Of this amount, \$30 would be added to the first \$20 to make up the \$50 deductible for this year. Medicare would pay 80 percent of the \$70 balance (\$56). The special "carry-over" rule provision allows the same \$30 that completed the 1968 deductible to be counted again toward the next year's deductible.

Mr. Carr pointed out that in this second example a claim would have been filed with the Medicare carrier and the \$30 would be automatically credited to the beneficiary's deductible account for both 1968 and 1969. In the first example, however, no claim

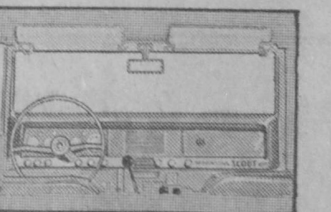

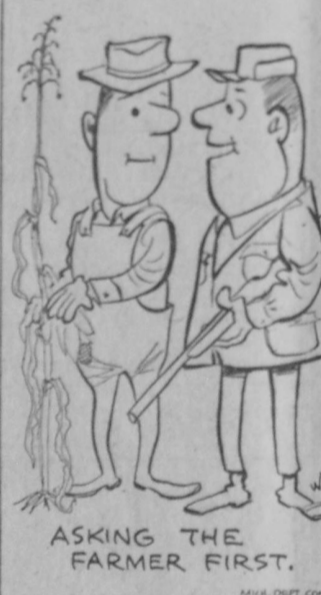
## Penny Parkin is FHA President

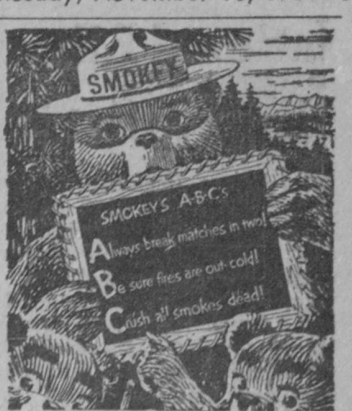

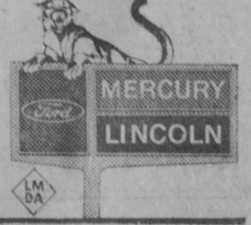

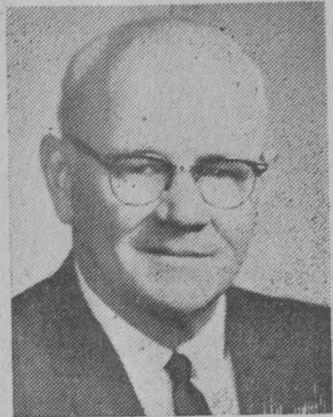
