Ragweed Confuses State Health Experts

Felony charges have been dropped against a juvenile, who had been apprehended Thursday with what was believed to be marijuana. The juvenile was arrested when he entered Tawas Area High School at the start of the school day, he was turned over to the Iosco Probate Court authorities. During the course of investigating the use of narcotics here during the past several weeks, Iosco Sheriff's Department had sent five samples of marijuana to the state health department at Lansing.

On each occasion, health department authorities confirmed that the various processed and raw materials sent to the laboratory for analysis were definitely the narcotic, marijuana. After receipt of the material taken from the Tawas Area youth, health department authorities notified the sheriff's department Friday by telephone that this sixth sample sent to them was not marijuana. Other samples were again analyzed, with the same negative report.

The health department spokesman said that, in all his years of investigation, the exhibits sent to Lansing for analysis were the nearest thing to marijuana that he had ever seen. The raw plants had the same characteristics as Cannabis Sativa. He was to confer with other specialists at Michigan State University in an effort to identify the plants.

The health department spokesman advised that the plants sent to Lansing could be harmful. A fungus was found on the leaves, which quite possibly could have the effect of a narcotic. The plants have been found growing wild in various sections of the county. One large patch was discovered during the course of investigation in September. Sheriff's department officers

US-23 Freeway Not Dead, Yet

Possibility of a freeway development of US-23 between Standish and Wurtsmith Air Force Base is not completely dead yet, according to a spokesman for the Michigan State Highway Department.

Such an extension was included in a highway department over-all request for about 1,500 miles of new freeway developments in the state.

But all such developments are largely financed by the federal government and federal approval is needed for any particular project. And this is the main roadblock to US-23 development in the immediate future.

"We think there is a definite need for this improvement, so we are asking for and hoping for the best. But it is still a low priority project from the federal viewpoint, even though it would provide a first class link between the air base and the state and Midwest freeway complex," the highway department spokesman said.

The way things stand now, it will be at least 1975 before any consideration would be given to this project.

Circulate Petitions Asking Third Tawas Area Millage Vote Authorize Election Procedure Study for Nine-Man Charter Commission

On recommendation of the city planning commission, Tawas City Council Monday night authorized steps to be taken to arrange for election of a charter commission. The council directed Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, to contact the Michigan Municipal League for information concerning election of a nine-man commission to prepare a new city charter.

It was the general feeling of the planning commission that the city ought to operate under the home rule type of government, rather than under the present fourth class city designation.

Reasons for favoring home rule include a more efficient mode of operation through combining certain city offices. The council has been considering combining the city clerk and treasurer offices into one full-time job.

Other reasons for favoring the city manager type of government included removal of fourth class city restrictions and easier management of financial problems.

Adoption of a home rule charter had been recommended several times in recent years by the city's planning consultant, Vilican, Leman and Associates.

In other business, the council is to request Marvin Davenport to appear at its next meeting and outline latest information on the city's application for federal-state funds for assisting with expansion of the city park.

While two recent letters from the Michigan Department of Conservation indicated that there may be an obstacle in the path of such a grant, Davenport telephoned Lansing last week and learned that there was no real problem in completing arrangements.

The council asked that a request be made to the agency handling the grant to send a letter verifying latest information, in order to assure the city that if the property is purchased, one-half of the cost would be received from land and recreational funds.

A letter last week had indicated that there would be no participation unless the city held title to the property, located between the

Anticipate Change of Venue in Iosco False Arrest Suit

A change of venue is anticipated in a \$50,000 false arrest suit being brought against two Iosco County lawmen.

Following a pre-trial hearing November 12, Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller indicated that he was to contact the court administrator for assignment of a judge to hear a motion and preside at a trial brought by Roger Bauer of Alpena against Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell and Donald Docking, East Tawas police chief.

A hearing will probably be held the first week of December. Instituted last October, this is a tort suit alleging a false arrest, with the defense of justification by reason of the allegation that the plaintiff was drunk and disorderly.

Judge Miller ruled that the defendants may file a claim of libel or slander within 15 days.

The suit involves an incident which took place on March 20, 1966, when Sheriff O'Farrell arrested Bauer at the Holland Hotel. The sheriff was assisted by Chief Docking.

Grand Opening Scheduled at New Whittemore Branch Bank

Residents of the Whittemore area will get their first official look at the new office of Farmers and Merchants State Bank, Whittemore Branch.

Open house is to be held at the new quarters Monday, November 25, 9:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. There will be door prizes of a \$25 savings bond, other gifts, free coffee and doughnuts. A ribbon cutting ceremony is set for 9:00 a. m.

Bank officials began planning new facilities at Whittemore following two different encounters with criminals. The first came in October 1965 when a bandit held up the bank; a year later, burglars entered the bank at night and broke open a safe.

But it was not until about a year ago that plans began to be outlined for a new structure and construction was started this summer by Tawas Area Construction, Incorporated, Tawas City.

The new 32 by 60-foot brick and concrete block building is located on a beautifully wooded site on M-65, about three blocks north of the former location.

The structure contains four windows for tellers, an 11 by 13-

foot private office, an 11 by 18-foot money vault, a storage vault measuring 11 by 18-feet and an employee lounge.

Decor of the building is a mixture of tan and green, with tan brick forming the wall of the private office. The new bank has broken with the tradition of a shiny steel vault door. The huge door of the new vault is painted green.

Located on a 132 by 132-foot lot, one of the important features of the new location is the large parking lot, measuring 90 by 100 feet. The planners left a row of evergreen trees which fences the property on the west, adding greatly to the landscaping.

In addition to all these features, the bank is completely "bugged" with an extensive alarm system.

Farmers and Merchants State Bank has shown tremendous growth since it was first established in 1952 with an office at Hale. In 1959, a branch was established at Rose City in a modern, new building. In 1960, the branch was established at Whittemore. In 1962, the main office at Hale was moved into a beautiful modern building.

"Due to the fine support we have received in the area, we have found it necessary to build a larger and more modern building to better serve the area and to provide the service desired by patrons," said Richard L. Pfahl, assistant cashier and new branch manager.

"We want to thank all of our many friends and customers and invite them to visit us during our

grand opening," he stated. Other employees at the bank include Mrs. Irene Jordan, assistant cashier, and Mrs. Hilda Barnes, teller.

Killed Near Guiley Pond Detroit is Gunshot Victim on 2nd Day

A 26-year-old Detroit policeman, shot and killed Saturday morning near Guiley Pond west of Sand Lake, became Iosco's first hunting fatality since 1965.

William A. Gancitano was struck in the head by a .30 caliber rifle slug about 9:10 a. m., in Section Five, Grant Township, north of the old State Road.

Hunting with his brother, Peter, and two others, Dennis and Ray Coon, Gancitano was struck under the right ear by the slug, which lodged in his head. The shooter has not been identified.

Witnesses told officers that they heard a shot, followed by the victim's screams that he had been hit. Authorities were first notified of the shooting when Carl Smith, a Sand Lake deputy sheriff, heard an excited call for help over the citizens band network. Smith telephoned the sheriff's office and a patrol car was immediately dispatched to the scene.

Because of sketchy information, officers were unable to locate the shooting scene for about one-half hour. The victim's brother brought the body to State Road. Assisting in the investigation was E. John Moffatt, coroner, who ordered an autopsy.

Officers learned that this was the victim's first hunting trip during the firearms season. He had hunted deer with bow and arrow. Other survivors beside his brother include his wife, Janice. The Gancitanos had no children.

Officers conducting the investigation were Charles Burke, Joseph VanDette and Ronald Ponke, all deputy sheriffs.

Another man, hunting about 100 yards northwest of the fatal accident, was later struck below the belt by a spent 30.06 caliber rifle slug. The slug apparently hit a stump or some other object before hitting the hunter.

Penetrating his heavy clothing, the slug stopped before touching the hunter's body. Officers said he immediately left the woods and quit hunting for the day.

CUBE Seeks Support for TA Program

Petitions are now being circulated by CUBE (Citizens United for Better Education) to hold an operational millage vote in Tawas Area School District.

To be presented to the board of education prior to Christmas vacation, CUBE has recommended that an election be held on February 6. If the board deems that it is not advisable to hold the election on the recommended date, it would have 60 days in which to take action.

CUBE, which was organized by a group of citizens immediately following defeat of the school's second millage proposal at the start of the school term, is requesting a special operational levy of 4 1/2 mills for two years.

The above amount of taxes would restore school activities of the preceding year, some of which were dropped during the current term, and a supposition as to what additional expense would be required for next year.

Mainly, the millage would allow hiring of additional teachers to restore curriculum and to handle an increased school enrollment.

All of the school's voted millage expired at the end of the last school term. Included were two mills for a pay-as-you-go program to finance building construction, plus 2 1/2 mills for operation.

On June 10, voters defeated a 3 1/4-mill proposal by 53 votes. On July 29, a 2.92 proposal was turned down, 750-521.

The regular meeting of CUBE is to be held Thursday night, 7:30 o'clock, at the high school. Residents of the district are invited to attend these sessions.

"Any prayer group that gathers together to shine each other's halos and do nothing more is a danger to the church," Bishop Lance Webb of Springfield, Illinois, told some 500 persons gathered there for the sixth annual meeting of The Twelve.

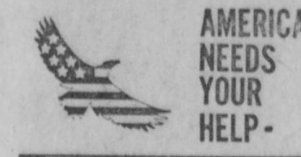

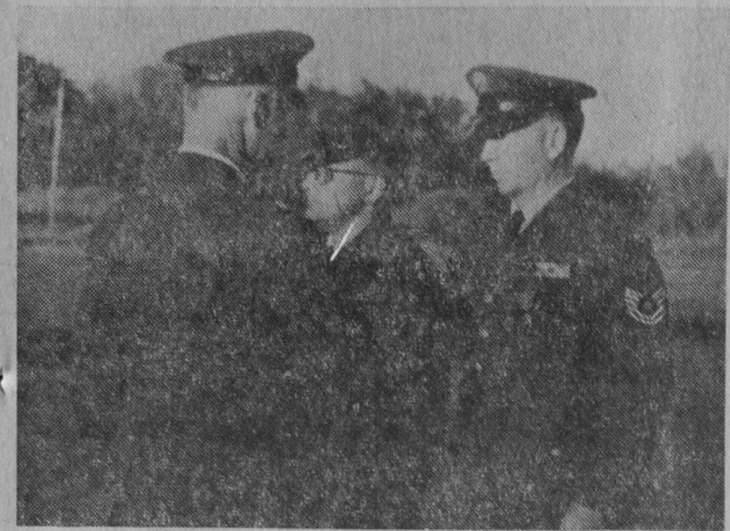

Isoco's Best Voting Percentage Nov. 5

A report from County Clerk D. Keith Pappas indicates that 7,418 persons voted in the November 5 general election. Total number of votes cast for president was 7,340. With 8,864 registered voters, an over-all average of 83.7 percent of Isoco County's voters went to the polls.

The City of Tawas City had the highest percentage, 89.6, with 822 out of 915 registered voters casting their ballots.

Other percentages included: Alabaster, 85.8; AuSable, 82.8; Baldwin, 83.2; Burleigh, 83.2; Grant, 81.4; Oscoda, 80.3; Plainfield, 84.1; Reno, 88.1; Sherman, 75.6; Tawas, 84.1; East Tawas, 86.4; Wilber, 78.1; Whittemore, 85.3.

New Wage Scale Adopted for City

A new wage and salary scale for hourly workers and salaried employees was adopted Monday night by the Tawas City Council. Total cost of the salary package is \$3,720 per year. The water and sewer department's share of the total salary increase would be about \$675.

A 10-cent per hour increase was given to hourly workers. Laborers now receive \$2.45 per hour; truck drivers, \$2.55, and equipment operator, \$2.75. In addition, the city is to pay 66 percent of Blue Cross insurance, rather than 38 1/2 percent, which was paid previously. This amounts to an additional five cents per hour in fringe benefits.

The new salary schedule is as follows: Chief of police, \$7,000, an increase of \$600; office secretary,

\$3,200; for 35-hour week, an increase of \$120; librarian, \$1,970, an increase of \$120; superintendent of public works, \$8,200, an increase of \$480; foreman, \$6,000, an increase of \$200. The foreman also receives about \$875 in overtime pay per year.

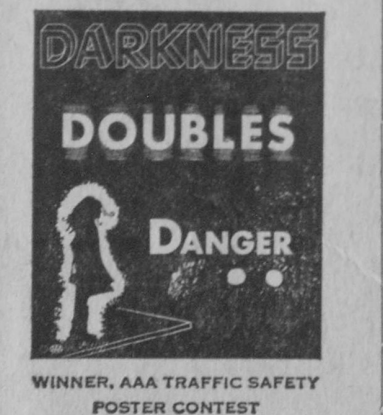

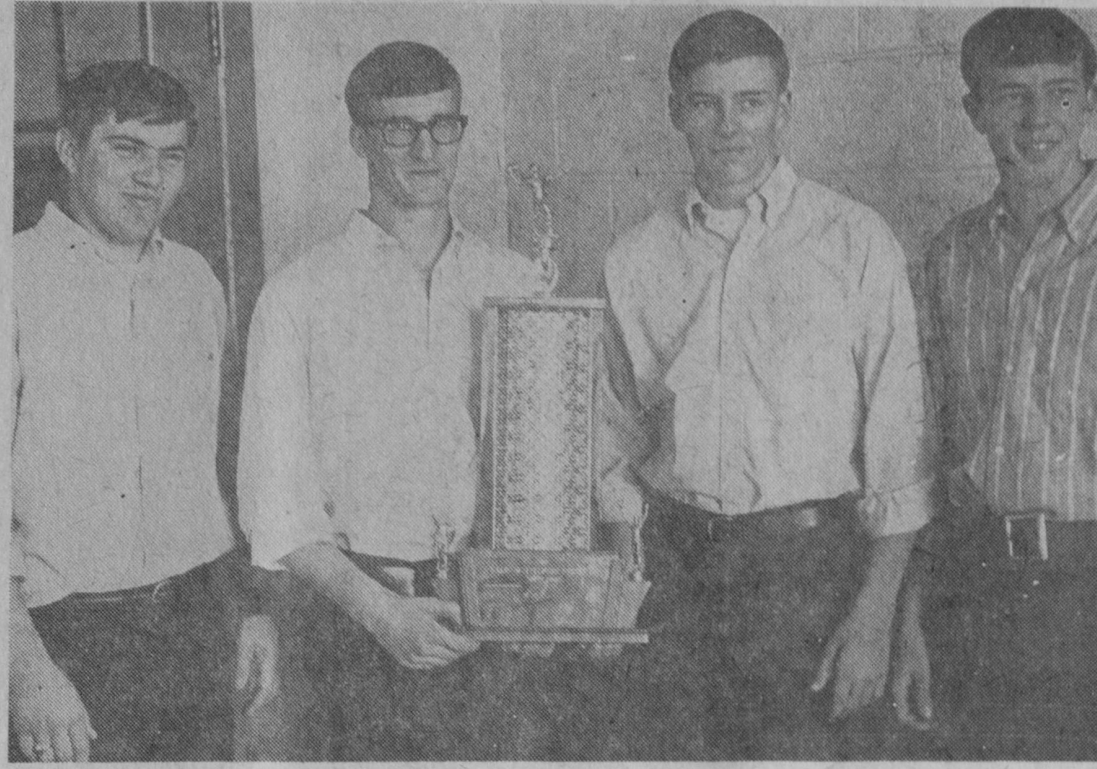

Classroom Shortage Studied at Hale A.

Problems concerning lack of adequate classroom facilities is under study at Hale Area School and possible correction to these problems is to be presented to district voters in the very near future.

A six-room elementary unit was built in 1963 to house 175 students with 25 students per room while using the kindergarten room to hold a morning session and a separate afternoon session. The building is very functional and very good without frills. At present, however, 204 students are housed in the building.

The wood frame structure composing the main building has many deficiencies. It is made of flammable materials, students are exposed to huge amounts of glass and room sizes are all under minimum standards.

The standard minimum size classroom for classes of 25 is 28 by 28 feet. The structure contains six rooms measuring 23 by 31 feet, two rooms of 14 by 23 feet and one room measuring 17 by 21 feet. Two of the small rooms house a fourth and sixth grade class.

Using minimum standards for computing pupil capacity, no more than 175 students should be housed in this area. During the day, 185 to more than 200 students are housed in the structure at various times.

The two smaller rooms were never meant for regular classrooms. One was designed for a dressing and storage area for the home economics room and the other was used as a custodial storage room until last year.

The brick west wing contains six rooms, one of which is the library. Two rooms are being used for the fifth and sixth grades, one science laboratory designed for 24 students, one music room and one commercial room. The library is used for classroom purposes which is a violation of accreditation standards. The music room is utilized all day by both high school and elementary music. More than 150 students are in the area which was designed for 100 students as regular classrooms.

The west wing and wood frame structure, as well as the gymnasium, is heated by forced air coming in from the ceilings. It causes wide variation in temperature

throughout the buildings. Ventilation is practically nonexistent in some rooms and on cold days the blinds are pulled in an attempt to maintain heat. Duct work is exposed in the hall and, when cooling off or heating, causes loud rumbling noises which echo through the halls.

There are eight furnaces in operation. Only the one in the new elementary unit uses hot water heat, which is efficient. The school gets very little in return for the cost of operating the other seven furnaces.

Facilities do not permit space for special education, guidance, expansion of curriculum. Speech correction classes are being held in a hallway. Spanish classes and seventh grade mathematics classes have been held in the shop which does not allow full utilization of the shop.

County Hires Muskegon Firm to Aid Development of AuSable River Park

Iosco County has engaged Thomas Browne and Associates of Muskegon Heights for architectural services in the development of the AuSable River Park.

This action was one of two dealing with the new park which were handled last Wednesday during the November meeting of the board of supervisors.

The architectural firm is to formulate detailed plans necessary to permit prompt action with a view toward an early construction date. Cost of the service would be \$500.

The other action involved the county entering into agreement with the firm of Recreation Research Associates of Muskegon for development of the park. This firm would assist in securing federal and state funds, provide various types of analysis and general supervision at a total cost of \$1,800, half of which was authorized for immediate payment from Old Orchard Park funds.

On recommendation of the conservation committee, the county accepted a gift of the old state fire tower on M-65, Reno Township, from Norman Sibley. This site would become a roadside park and for historical marker development. The county extension agent is to proceed with arrangements.

In other business, the board adopted rules and responsibilities for the newly-created position of dog warden. A resolution adopted by the board specified rules for housing and disposal of dogs at the dog pound, as well as dog control.

The new warden is to act on all emergency complaints at once and

other complaints as soon as possible. The warden is to check each residence in the entire county at least every other year for unlicensed dogs. Any dog picked up must be held at the dog pound for at least 72 hours before being disposed. If the owner is known or can be determined, the warden is to notify that the dog is being held.

The new warden is to be paid \$100 per month and is to receive \$1 for each dog disposed of, as well as \$1 for each license that he issues. The warden would receive credit for all licenses issued after March 1 of each year, regardless of who issues the license.

The warden would collect from owners \$1 per day for each dog housed and cared for at the dog pound. The county is to furnish and maintain the dog shelter, furnish dog food, furnish and maintain a vehicle for dog control, furnish gasoline, oil, insurance and all supplies.

The new warden, by state law, would be under the direct supervision of the county sheriff.

A new four-man election commission was appointed according to new state law. This commission would determine if a proposed election date conflicts with any other scheduled election in the county. If the commission determines that a substantial conflict exists, it would notify the clerk of the governmental unit, explaining the conflict and disapproving the date. State law would prohibit such an election. Named to the commission were Al Mead, Oscoda Township clerk; George Erickson, Whittemore, representing school boards; Walter Nelson, city clerk of Tawas City; D. Keith Pappas, county clerk, who would act as chairman.

County Treas. Edward Nelkie reported a balance on hand of \$27,729 in the county general fund as of November 1.

A letter from Mrs. Olivia Prough, Five Lakes Association, was referred to the Townships of Grant, Plainfield and Wilber, along with Iosco Road Commission and Consumers Power Company. Mrs. Prough's letter said there were no road or street signs around Round, Indian, Big Island, Bass and Little Island Lakes and that a very confusing situation existed because of road names and lack of signing.

The board approved of and urged an exchange of land proposed by Tawas Area Industrial

Development Corporation with the United States Forestry Department. Seeking to secure 99.93 acres of land in Baldwin Township near the county airport, the industrial development corporation proposed to exchange 160 acres in Oceana County and 80 acres in Muskegon County, presently held by that group, for the property in question.

Albert H. Buch, register of deeds, is to be an instructor at a conference for newly elected county officials to be held December 2, 3 and 4 at Lansing. The board authorized the county clerk and county treasurer to attend the sessions.

Richter Lixey, Baldwin Township supervisor, reported to the board on a recent trip to Western Michigan where the impact of coho fishing on that section was

studied. Edward Higgins, East Tawas supervisor, proposed that a county ordinance for coho fishermen control be adopted. This ordinance would control camping and parking. A report is to be made by the prosecuting attorney.

A meeting was held concerning condemnation of property for the proposed Tawas Lake Dam. Attending the meeting were the drain commissioner, representative of the Tawas Lake Association and Michael Freil, the attorney representing the county. Higgins reported that the property is to be condemned and legal steps are now in progress. A report is to be made at the December meeting of the board, which will mark the last meeting of the board of supervisors under the present organization.

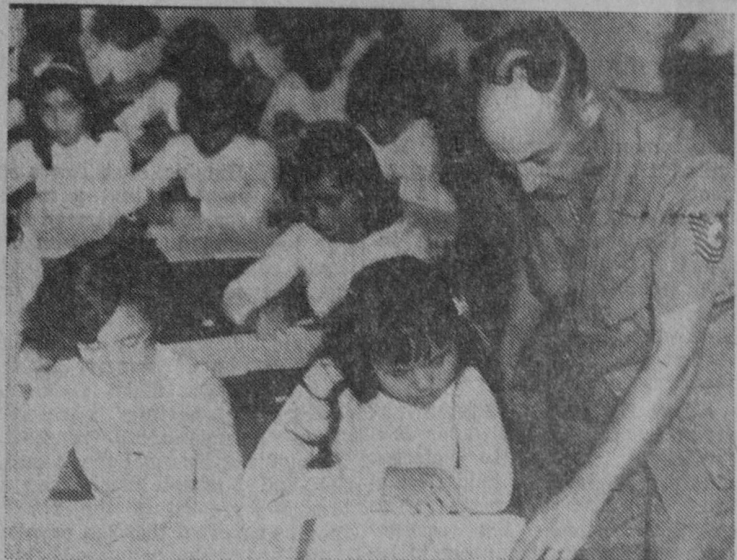

IRS Details Gun Registration Under New Act

Detailed procedures for registering machine guns, sawed-off shotguns, sawed-off rifles, silencers, deactivated war trophies and other destructive devices were announced today by A. M. Stoepler, district director of Internal Revenue for Michigan.

The Gun Control Act of 1968 requires that weapons and devices of this type "must be registered with the Internal Revenue Service by December 1.

Mr. Stoepler said that copies of Registration Form 4467 are available at Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and other IRS offices.

The forms are prepared in three copies, two of which should be mailed to the Director, Alcohol and Tobacco Tax Division, Washington, D. C. 20024. The third copy may be kept by the owner of the firearm or destructive device.

"Firearms or destructive devices should not be brought to an IRS office to be registered," Mr. Stoepler said.

Under the new law all firearms and destructive devices requiring registration must be identified by a serial number. If a firearm or

device does not have a serial number, the owner should phone, visit or write the nearest IRS Alcohol and Tobacco Tax office and a number will be assigned.

After obtaining the number, the owner is responsible for affixing it to the firearm or device before completing the registration form. Additional information may be obtained by contacting the nearest Alcohol and Tobacco Tax or other IRS office.
