

Would Overcome Crowded Conditions

Hale Area Planning School Building Program

Currently in the planning stages is a building program designed to overcome crowded conditions at Hale Area Schools.

The board of education announced last week that the program would be completed as soon as possible in order that it may be presented to district voters.

Last building project at Hale Area School was in 1962 when a six-room elementary unit was constructed, along with renovation of the brick west wing for high school uses.

Enrollment in 1963 was 452 students. The project was immediately filled to capacity with no allowance for future growth. A small room adjacent to the office was used to take care of overflow students who could not be handled by the new facilities.

Since 1963, enrollment has increased to 540 students. A storage room has been converted to an undersized classroom and other students have been added to classrooms which have presented grave overcrowded conditions.

hindering the education of the children.

In a formal statement this week, the board of education asked: "The question is what are we going to do with the students next year and the next year when our overcrowded conditions are so acute today?"

School enrollment is expected to jump to 566 in 1969. The 1970 projection calls for 584 students and total enrollment is expected to reach 597 in 1971. Enrollment increase this year 12.

Actual enrollment this year is as follows: Kindergarten, 45; first grade, 49; second grade, 40; third grade, 40; fourth grade, 48; fifth grade, 38; sixth grade, 50; seventh grade, 34; eighth grade, 48; ninth grade, 32; 10th grade, 45; 11th grade, 43; 12th grade, 28.

By 1971, total enrollment is expected to be as follows: Kindergarten, 42; first grade, 53; second grade, 48; third grade, 49; fourth grade, 55; fifth grade, 43; sixth grade, 46; seventh grade, 54; eighth grade, 43; ninth grade, 52; 10th grade, 34; 11th grade, 49; 12th grade, 29.

Announced expansion at Wurt-smith Air Force Base is expected to influence all communities within 50 miles or more of the base. Extension of the expressway and other factors indicate any projection based on growth experience of the past five years would be a low figure.

According to the three-year projection, there will be an increase in grades seven through 12 as the larger elementary grades move up.

Authorities Check Dope Allegation

Investigation of an allegation that "dope is being peddled on the streets of Iosco County" is being conducted by Pros. Atty. J. Richard Ernst.

A political advertisement appearing in area publications last week (not including this newspaper) stated that during the last eight days between October 22 and October 29, Iosco teenagers had been approached by persons on the streets, both in daytime and nighttime, and "offered the following for sale: Metadine pills, \$5 per pill, 'Pops' to those who use them."

A meeting was arranged November 2 between those persons claiming knowledge of the incident and local law enforcement officials, including the Michigan State Police.

"The possibility of apprehension of those allegedly involved seems remote because of the delay of one week before information concerning this incident was furnished to authorities," said Ernst.

LaBlance Slated as Luncheon Speaker

Emerald LaBlance, a local commercial fisherman, will speak at the noon luncheon Thursday of Tawas City Businessmen's Association.

Members are requested to attend and bring a guest. Weekly luncheons are held at the Barnes Hotel.

LaBlance will give his experiences as a commercial fisherman and his observations on the supply of fish, change of habits of fish and other interesting information.

This will be a repeat performance. LaBlance appeared before the Tawas Kiwanis Club several weeks ago.

At 3:30 a. m. Wednesday, Hubert Humphrey and Richard Nixon were still running neck and neck, each with approximately 42 percent of the popular vote. Nixon was leading in electoral votes, 162-137, with George Wallace, the third party candidate, garnering 45 electoral votes.

Outcome of the election quite possibly will be known after the Herald's presstime (5:00 a. m.), although there was some speculation that neither of the two major candidates would receive a clear-cut decision and the final outcome could be decided in the electoral college or possibly the United States House of Representatives.

The Democrats scored a major victory in Michigan where Mr. Humphrey had a projected margin of about one-half million votes.

Meantime, the race for 102nd District house of representatives was having a slow tabulation. George A. Prescott, Tawas City Republican, was leading Connor Smith, Democrat, 8,056 to 5,470, with only about one-half of the precincts in four counties counted.

Prescott received a substantial margin in Iosco County, as expected. East Tawas gave Prescott 843 votes to Smith's 211. Tawas City gave Prescott a 616-157 margin.

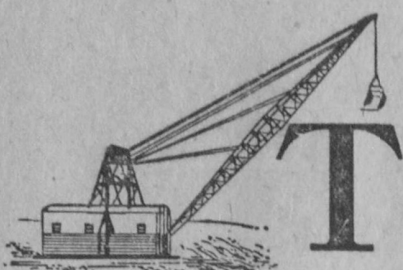
The vote in Tawas Township was Prescott, 325, Smith, 122; Prescott had 165 votes in Grant, as compared to 95 for Smith; Reno voted 117 to 31 in favor of Prescott.

In two races for the new board of supervisors, Aubrey Belson won the Ninth District seat over George Blust, 377 to 277. Belson, a Republican, had 158 votes in his home Township of Burleigh to 72 for Blust; Blust, a Democrat, topped Belson in the former's home City of Whittemore, 78-72; Sherman favored Belson, 74-58, while Alabaster gave the nod to Belson, 73-69.

At East Tawas, Carlton Merschel, Republican, won over Earl McElheron, Democrat, for District Six supervisor, 527-240.

Burleigh Township voters approved liquor by the glass, 149-93.

Voters turned out in heavier than usual numbers throughout Iosco County and an estimated 7,900 persons went to the polls. According to the Prescott vote, there were approximately 1,054 ballots at East Tawas and 773 in Tawas City.

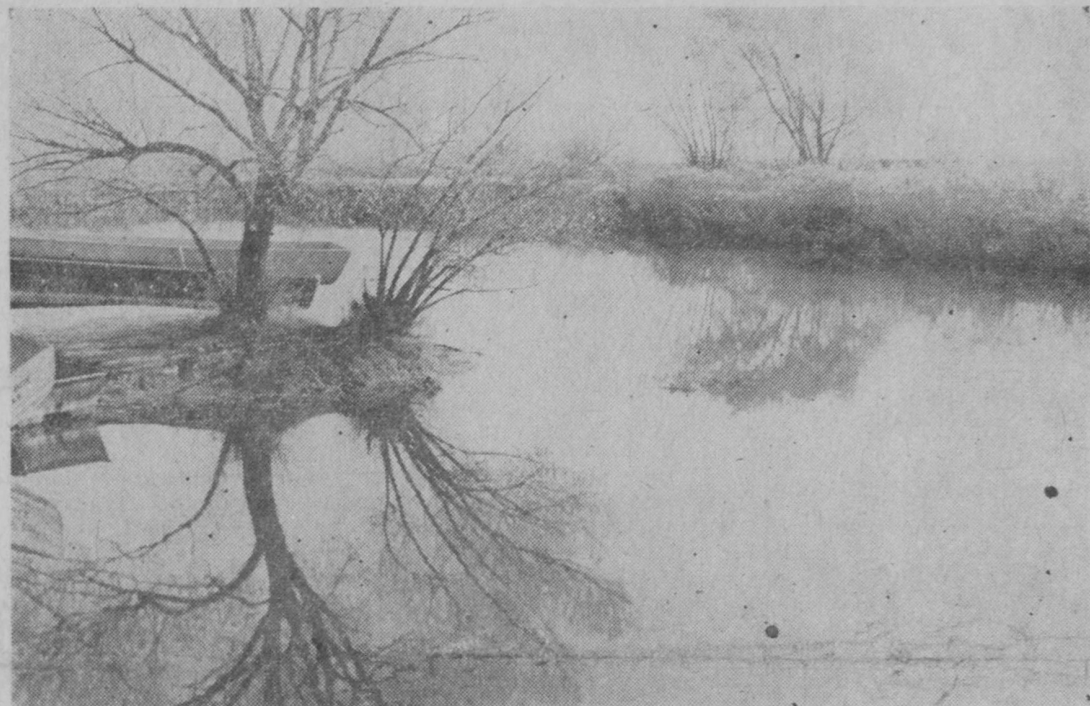

River Mouth Small Craft Harbor May be Realized; City Studying Finances

A long-standing dream of many Tawas City residents has the possibility of realization, although the old problem in any public undertaking — financing — still remains to be solved.

At Monday night's regular meeting, the city council authorized steps to be taken to secure a one-year lease with option to purchase the east side of the Tawas River mouth for development as a small craft harbor.

This property was purchased more than 40 years ago by Joseph Lubaway of Wyandotte. A native of Tawas City, born on Ninth Avenue only two blocks from the river mouth, he, too, had a dream concerning this property which was only partially realized. As a youngster, he had worked on commercial fishing boats operating out of the river and believed the

mouth held great promise for development.

During his development of considerable resort property and subdivisions in the Tawas area during the 1920s and 1930s, Lubaway organized a yacht club and began development of the river mouth for a harbor. The national depression practically ended his dream for a yacht club, although the Lubaway family improved the property with a boat well and filled the remaining portion of the old Hale mill dock with broken concrete.

Discussion on possible renewal of this development has been in the talking stage for many years. In 1947, the United States Army Corps of Engineers held a hearing here on a proposed harbor, but federal money was not available due to the lack of public ownership of property at the river

mouth held great promise for development.

Discussion concerning the property had been renewed several times in the past 20 years and gain began in earnest last year.

About a month ago, Mr. Lubaway reported to the Herald he was agreeable to development of the property by the city. Two weeks ago, after consultation with his family, he opened the door for negotiating purchase of the property by the city — and only by the city — when he announced that the property was available at the appraised value formulated by Gem Surveys — \$18,000, or possibly less. He also offered a lease-option arrangement in order to give the city time to work out details of financing.

Council members were enthusiastic Monday night about the potential for future development of this property as a small craft harbor. The city presently has two other "irons in the fire" concerning property. It purchased the Clute property on Ninth Avenue on a land contract earlier this year for development as an industrial site and as parking for the municipal boat ramp on Tawas River. The council has also authorized purchase of land between the south line of the city park and Rainbow Service for park expansion.

Total purchase price for all three parcels would be \$45,000. Discussion was held on the possibility of levying additional millage in order to finance the project. It was reported Tuesday by Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, that an additional one mill for 10 years would raise more than \$60,000.

for property acquisition. Majority of the members felt this project should not be dropped, as expansion was necessary and that a considerable amount of time has already been expended on the proposal.

A meeting was held October 31 between city officials and Charles Lattimer of the Michigan Waterways Commission. Lattimer was here in September to view possible sites for state assistance in development of small boat launching sites.

The council presently has three boat ramps on property leased from the Detroit and Mackinac Railway. Should a longer term lease be available, the city could receive funds for improving facilities.

In any event, Lattimer reportedly stated that the state would

assist in developing four or five acres of the former Clute property for parking purposes, regardless of the length of lease which the city has for its boat ramps. Such an improvement, of which 90 percent would be financed by the state, would call for a gravel parking lot. Further clarification is to be sought by the city this week.

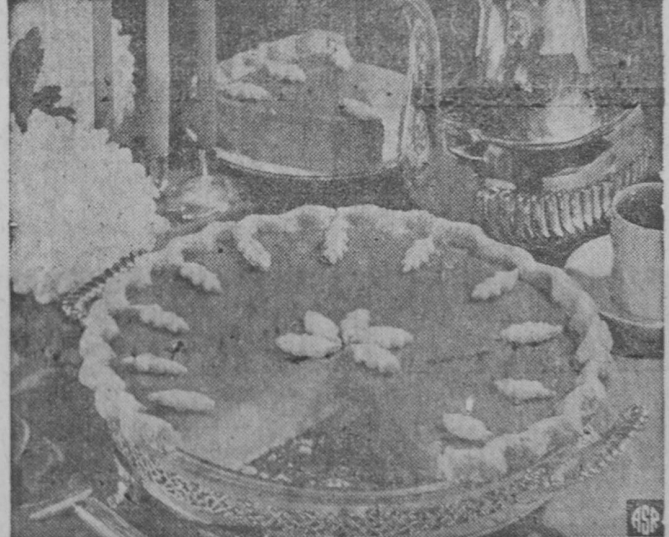

Though apple may be the year around pie favorite, pumpkin has its acknowledged season of heading the dessert list. Acknowledged, too, is the fact that evaporated milk makes the best pumpkin pie, providing smooth richness to the golden and fragrantly spicy custard filling.

Favorite Pumpkin Pie

2 eggs	1 1/2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
1 can (1 lb.) pumpkin (about 2 cups)	1 tall can (13 fl. oz.) evaporated milk (1 1/2 cups)
3/4 cup firmly packed light brown sugar	9-inch unbaked pastry shell
1/2 teaspoon salt

Proceedings of Iosco Board of Supervisors

OCTOBER SESSION

October 14, 1968
The Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order in statutory session at 9:30 a. m. by Chairman Smith, who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Belson, Blust, Campbell, Chrvia, Everett, Gerard, Moss, Higgins, Brewer, Jocks, Kasischke, Little, Lixey, McElheron, Mead, Mielock, Smith, Stephan, Weible. Absent: None.

Also in attendance at the board's invitation were candidates for the new nine-man board, Walter Miller and William Weresley. Communications were read by the clerk and referred to the proper committees.

At 10:35 a. m., committees were ordered to their respective duties, balance of the board to be at ease subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 11:45 a. m., State Representative George Prescott addressed the board briefly concerning the activities of the legislature, and discussed possible state action on firearms legislation, indicating registration and licensing legislation is not likely to be adopted.

Upon motion by Mielock, supported by Jocks and prevailing, the board recessed until 1:30 p. m. AFTERNOON SESSION

Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., roll call was ordered by the chairman. All the supervisors were present.

Communications were read and referred to committees. The chairman reminded all supervisors that their township statements of money to be raised by tax are to be filed with the county clerk today.

Mr. McElheron reported for the building and grounds committee pursuant to a request from the Health Department for additional office space, indicating that part of the Equalization Department space could be used three days per week, according to Mr. Oates. He also advised that they are investigating the \$100.00 quarterly water meter charge for the courthouse to determine if it is necessary to have a three-inch meter.

Supervisor Mielock reported on the activities of the East Central Michigan Economic Development Commission, of which he is vice chairman, advising that they are in operation and can be of assistance in the pursuance of federal grants, etc.

The chairman reminded the board of the meeting scheduled with the building authority tomorrow and proposed that the building authority committee bring in their ideas and suggestions for discussion.

The appointment of a road commissioner to succeed Arthur Aulerich whose term expires December 31, 1968, was designated as a special order of business for 10:00 a. m., October 15, 1968, by Chairman Smith.

At 2:15 p. m., committees were ordered to their respective duties, balance of the board to be at ease subject to the call of the chair. Upon call to order at 4:00 p. m., the following resolution was read by Mr. Weible, who moved that it be adopted. Supported by Gerard and carried.

Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen: WHEREAS, Iosco County's Plan and Agreement with the Michigan State Employees' Retirement Board, which was signed May 8, 1952, excludes all services in any class or classes of part-time positions of county employment from Social Security deductions.

AND WHEREAS, the Michigan State Employees' Retirement Board recommends that all units establish somewhere in their records a definition for part-time positions.

AND WHEREAS, membership in the county employees' retirement plan if dependent on the deduction of Social Security as one of the requirements.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that it is the determination of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors that hence forth all positions of county employment that require six hundred (600) hours or less per year shall be classified as part-time positions, and in accordance with the plan and agreement with the State Employees' Retirement Board, no Social Security shall be deducted from these positions.

OFFICERS SALARY COMMITTEE Weible Mielock McElheron Jocks Gerard

At the request of Supervisor Little of the finance committee, the following resolution was read aloud by the clerk.

Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen: RESOLUTION October 14, 1968 County of Iosco

WHEREAS the Board of Supervisors of the County of Iosco con-

siders it necessary that a marine safety program be conducted by the sheriff of said County, and WHEREAS Act 303, Public Acts of 1967, provides for State Aid to counties conducting a marine safety program on a reimbursement basis of a sum equal to 3/4 of the county's estimated authorized expenditures for the calendar year, but not to exceed 3/4 of the county's authorized expenditures actually incurred for the calendar year.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the County of Iosco hereby appropriates the sum of Twelve Thousand (\$12,000) dollars for personnel compensation, subsistence and marine program equipment costs for the calendar year 1969 and that the State of Michigan Department of Conservation Boat and Water Safety Section is hereby requested to authorize reimbursement to the County of Iosco a sum equal to 3/4 of the county's estimated authorized expenditures for the calendar year 1969 but not to exceed 3/4 of the authorized expenditures actually incurred for such calendar year.

Such reimbursement to be paid to the County subsequent to the close of the calendar year, and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT THE County Treasurer is hereby authorized and instructed to establish a restricted marine safety program account and to deposit therein all sums hereby appropriated, all of which is to be used solely for payment of salaries, subsistence and equipment costs of the marine safety program.

Voting in favor of this resolution, 19. Voting against this resolution, 0.

Upon motion by Little, supported by Campbell, the resolution was adopted on the following roll call: Ayes: Belson, Blust, Campbell, Chrvia, Everett, Gerard, Moss, Higgins, Brewer, Jocks, Kasischke, Little, Lixey, McElheron, Mead, Mielock, Smith, Stephan, Weible. Nays: None.

Pursuant to a request by the Northeast Michigan Mental Health Board (created under Public Act 54 of 1965) for endorsement and approval of the 1969 budget as submitted with the application for a State Matching Grant to the Department of Mental Health, the following resolution was read by Mr. Little who moved its adoption.

Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen: The Iosco County Board of Supervisors concur in the budget request of the Northeast Michigan Mental Health Board.

Signed: L. S. Little C. E. Smith A. F. Belson Motion was supported by Mead and the resolution adopted on the following roll call. Ayes: Belson, Blust, Campbell, Chrvia, Everett, Gerard, Moss, Higgins, Brewer, Jocks, Kasischke, Little, Lixey, McElheron, Mead, Mielock, Smith, Stephan, Weible. Nays: None.

Mr. Higgins reported for the judiciary committee concerning the necessity for a resolution to set the compensation for the various board etc. in accordance with P. A. 351 of 1963. After a brief discussion, the matter was scheduled as a special order of business for 10:30 a. m. on October 15th, by the chairman.

Mr. Higgins reported concerning a letter received from the Tawas Lake Association relative to the construction of a dam in the Tawas River pursuant to an order of the Circuit Court 10 years ago, indicating that he has contacted the prosecutor, Attorney Mike Free, the chairman of the Tawas Lake Association, and will contact the drain commissioner and others, for a meeting scheduled in Mr. Free's office at 1:00 p. m. Thursday. He advised that he will have a report after the meeting.

Tax Equalization Director Henry Oates reported to the board briefly regarding the 1968 tax levy. Upon motion by Higgins, supported by Brewer and prevailing, the board recessed until 9:30 a. m., October 15, 1968.

October 15, 1968 The Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order in October session at 9:30 a. m. by the chairman and roll call ordered. The following supervisors were present: Belson, Blust, Campbell, Chrvia, Everett, Gerard, Moss, Higgins, Brewer, Jocks, Kasischke, Little, Lixey, McElheron, Mead, Mielock, Smith, Stephan, Weible. Absent: Lixey and Weible.

Carlton Merschel, a candidate for county supervisor district No. 6, was also in attendance. Communications were read by the clerk and referred to the proper committees.

A brief discussion arose concerning proposal No. 3 on the State Proposal Ballot for the November 5th General Election, relating to state bonding for the

abatement of water pollution, as a result of a letter from the E. C. M. E. D. D. urging support in favor of the proposal. The appointment of a county road commissioner having been slated for a special order of business at 10:00 a. m., the chairman called for nominations for the term beginning January 1, 1969, and expiring December 31, 1974. Mr. Everett nominated Mr. Arthur Aulerich to succeed himself. Seconded by Mr. Mielock. There being no other nominations, it was moved by Higgins, supported by Little that the nominations be closed. Motion carried. Mr. Aulerich was appointed on the following roll call vote: Ayes: Belson, Blust, Campbell, Chrvia, Everett, Gerard, Moss, Higgins, Brewer, Jocks, Kasischke, Little, McElheron, Mead, Mielock, Smith, Stephan. Nays: None.

Mr. Higgins read the following resolution for the judiciary committee and moved its adoption. Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen: WHEREAS, Public Act No. 351 of the Public Acts of 1968 which became effective July 30, 1968, provides that members of the County Boards, departments, authorities and commissions receiving statutory compensation the same as members of boards of supervisors, shall receive compensations as determined by the board of supervisors.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That it is the determination of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors that compensation for the above named boards, departments etc. shall be set at \$20.00 per diem.

Signed: Your Judiciary Committee Edward W. Higgins Percy Jocks George Blust R. Moss Motion was supported by Moss and carried on the following roll call. Ayes: Belson, Blust, Campbell, Chrvia, Everett, Gerard, Moss, Higgins, Brewer, Jocks, Kasischke, Little, Lixey, McElheron, Mead, Mielock, Smith, Stephan. Nays: None.

Mr. Higgins reported briefly regarding the meeting scheduled for 1:00 p. m. on October 17th at Attorney Mike Free's office concerning the Tawas Lake dam issue and a general discussion ensued relative to the special assessment district etc.

At 10:20 a. m., committees were ordered to their respective duties, balance of the board to be at ease subject to the call of the chair. Upon call to order at 11:45 a. m., Register of Deeds Albert Buch addressed the board to request an additional clerk for his office. Referred to the officers' salaries committee.

Mr. Kasischke reporting from the floor on behalf of Mr. Mielock and himself, read the following resolution drafted in tribute to retiring Iosco County Road Commission Superintendent John Henry and moved that it be adopted and recorded in the minutes of the proceedings. The motion was supported by Little and carried unanimously.

Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen: With the upcoming retirement of John Henry from the county road commission staff it is only fitting that the Iosco County Board of Supervisors give recognition over an extended period of time.

Mr. Henry's many years of faithful service and devotion to duty in a managerial capacity have been largely responsible for a smoothly functioning road program. This is evidenced by an exceptionally fine record of maintenance and construction in this county, a record which brought about a present road system of which we can be justly proud.

In view of the foregoing, it is recommended that a letter of commendation and appreciation for services rendered by transmitted to Mr. Henry by the clerk of this board as an expression of thanks from the Iosco County Board of Supervisors.

Respectfully Walter Kasischke James Mielock Mr. Campbell, reporting for the finance committee, moved that the 1969 county budget be laid on the table until 11:00 a. m. tomorrow, October 16th. Supported by Little and carried.

Absent: None.

Also in attendance were county supervisor candidates, Fred Lomas, Jack Allen and Carlton Merschel. Communications were read and referred to the proper committees.

A letter to Mr. Charles A. Pinkerton, Jr. from the Iosco County Board of Supervisors in response to a complaint received from Mr. Pinkerton relative to radio communications at the Iosco County Airport was read and approved.

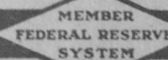
