Ex-Butcher Boy Ends Long D&M Career

Fred Lomas, who served as a "butcher boy" on Detroit and Mackinac passenger trains as a youth and then entered regular railroad employment after graduation from high school, retired effective Monday after 48 years of service.

The oldest railroad employee in terms of service, Lomas recalls that he was interested in railroading when a youth of 13. During summer months, he would board the morning passenger train at East Tawas and would sell newspapers as far as Bay City. He would return on the evening passenger to Onaway, staying overnight at the Conover House.

That was a "heady" experience for a youth and he often sold 50 papers on the trip, even though he only started with 25. "After the passengers would get off the train, I would rush around the cars and pick up the newspapers—and then sell them again," he said.

He particularly liked the Gleaner excursions, "where I could sell anything." He always used an oily rag to polish apples "for a shiny apple always sold best."

Fred's father, Charles F. Lomas, was a fireman for the D&M. He was killed in 1913 at Pinconning while filling the tender of a locomotive with water. H. K. McHarg Jr., general manager of the railroad, told Fred and his brother, Wade, that a job was waiting for them after graduation from high school.

On June 20, 1920, Fred started with the D&M as an engine wiper, while Wade became a clerk in the mechanical department. The brothers later exchanged jobs, as Fred was interested in clerical work and Wade wished to become a machinist apprentice. "Scraping grease off wheels and building fires in the locomotive was not for me," said Lomas.

He later became caller for the mechanical department. During the snow and ice storm of February 19-

22, he worked three straight days calling crews as three engines and the snow plow were off the tracks at South Rogers Junction.

"Snow was covered with three inches of ice, trees were down and only one engineer had a telephone. The telephone lines were not operating and I had to make the rounds on foot all over the two towns to call or cancel the different crews," recalls Lomas.

In 1922, he became a clerk in the general office and worked under C. E. Glass in the audit department. He found this work to his liking and he has been in this department since that time, working under such auditors as George Bergevin, A. J. Sevensen and the present auditor-controller, Paul Sullivan.

Lomas has been assistant auditor of disbursements since 1952, handling all payrolls of the railroad and its subsidiary companies. He is also contact official for the railroad's retirement board, was local chairman for five years of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks and has been a member of the credit union committee for 12 years.

Lomas has been active in city affairs at East Tawas and is to retire next January 1 after 30 years as city clerk. His service to the community is not expected to end there, however, as he was nominated at the recent primary election as Republican candidate for District Five supervisor, comprising the First Ward of East Tawas, Baldwin and Wilber Townships. As a Republican candidate, he is unopposed in the November election.

In 1930-31, he was master of Baldwin Lodge, F&AM, and is a life member of the Masonic Order. He was a member of the East Tawas Club for 30 years.

Lomas is well known throughout Northeastern Michigan as an active bowler for 45 years. He was a member of the Silver Valley team which won the state championship in 19-50 at East Lansing.

He and his wife, Genevieve, who is city librarian, plan a trip through Canada and down to Boston, Massachusetts, during October. After that, he has no definite plans but believes his wife will find plenty of work for him around the house.

"I may do some bird hunting this fall and I always look forward to working in my garden during the summer months. I don't think it will take too long to get adjusted to retirement," he said.

At a luncheon held last week in the railroad's private car, attended by D&M executives, Lomas was presented with an engraved railroad watch by Charles A. Pinkerton Jr., president of the railroad. He was honored at a Monday noon luncheon at Genii's Restaurant, attended by fellow general office employees. A dinner is being given in his honor Saturday night at the Barnes Hotel by the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks.

Attending the Saturday night banquet will be the Lomas' two children, Darrell, who is a graphic designer for Chrysler Corporation at Detroit, and Mrs. F. William Kerr, a teacher at Oscoda Area School.

Chamber Seeks Help Perchville May Die Because of Lack of Leaders

Unless leaders are found to head up the annual Perchville Festival shortly, this event scheduled to be held next February will be canceled.

This was the word following last Wednesday night's meeting of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, which has sponsored the annual ice fishing festival since 1964.

Gar Bassett, chamber of commerce president, said that attempts had been made to secure a chairman for the festival, but no response has been forthcoming.

"The board of directors plans to take final action October 9 on the program. If there is no interest in the annual Perchville program, it will be eliminated from chamber functions," said the president.

Any club or organization wishing to assist the chamber of commerce is urged to contact Bassett immediately.

The annual festival has been the major winter attraction in the Tawas since discontinuance of the annual Silver Valley winter sports festival.

Perfect weather conditions have had been made to secure a chairman for the festival, but no response has been forthcoming.

"It would be a shame to discontinue this event because of the interest and entertainment it provides," said the chamber president.

James W. Hill, 24, Lansing, who was arrested last Monday and brought to Isosco County to face a charge of possession of narcotics, is to be turned over to Osceola County authorities on a similar charge.

Arrested at Tustin on a warrant issued by J. Richard Ernst, Isosco County prosecuting attorney, Hill demanded examination when arraigned here and justice court bond was set at \$3,000.

Authorities say that Hill allegedly had narcotics in his possession at the time of his arrest.

Two Tawas youths, Douglas Orton, 18, and Michael Straley, 17, waived examination in justice court on a charge of possessing narcotics. They were bound over to circuit court and released on \$1,000 bond each.

The three arrests followed intensive investigation by city, county and state police agencies, which had been gathering evidence concerning use of marijuana by Tawas youths during the past summer.

The case came to a head two weeks ago when a Tawas youth was examined by physicians and said to be under the influence of a narcotic.

Hill Faces Second Narcotics Charge

Investigation since then disclosed that a large number of local youths had smoked marijuana during the past summer. Through discussions with youths and parents, a list of those taking part in "pot parties" is being compiled by police agencies.

Authorities say that following prosecution, an educational program is to be held acquainting youths and parents of the danger involved in the use of narcotics. Also, the legal consequences which can be expected.

Joseph Klish Retires; Rabbits Should Hide

Joseph Klish, 62, Monday completed 44 years of service as an employee of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway.

Starting in 1924 at the age of 18 years, he first became a yard laborer and then moved to the stores department.

As fireman on the crane, he worked on clearing a number of wrecks from the main line. He recalls one wreck in particular between Cathro and Bolton. Twenty cars were derailed and the D&M wrecking crew worked day and night for a week to clear the tracks.

Klish moved into the machine shop where he became a helper apprentice for four years and then was promoted to machinist.

One of his final jobs with the railroad last Friday was to rebuild a set of trucks for one of the diesel locomotives.

He worked for many years on steam locomotives, performing daily inspection of engines. He performed such maintenance as re-

pairing steam and air leaks, tightened side rods, checked brake shoes and any other maintenance required.

Maintenance has changed considerably since the change from steam to diesel locomotives. "In the old days, parts were made in our own machine shop," said Klish. "When something goes wrong now, replacement parts are provided."

The maintenance crew in the Tawas shop provides an important function in the railroad operation. It is necessary for locomotives to be in operational order and the crew has worked around the clock many times to maintain the big diesels.

But that is all in the past now for Klish, who says he is going to do a little fishing and hunting in his retirement. "I just bought a new beagle and I can hardly wait for those rabbits," he said.

He has a large garden every year that requires a lot of attention and he does not believe he will have much time to sit in the rocking chair.

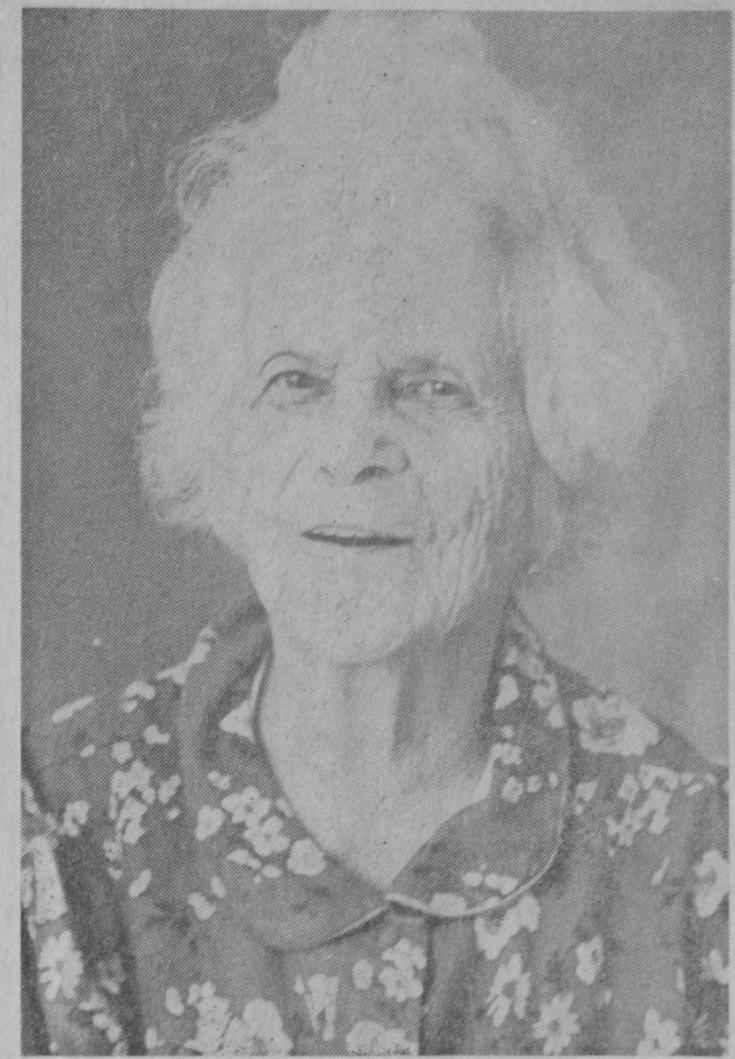

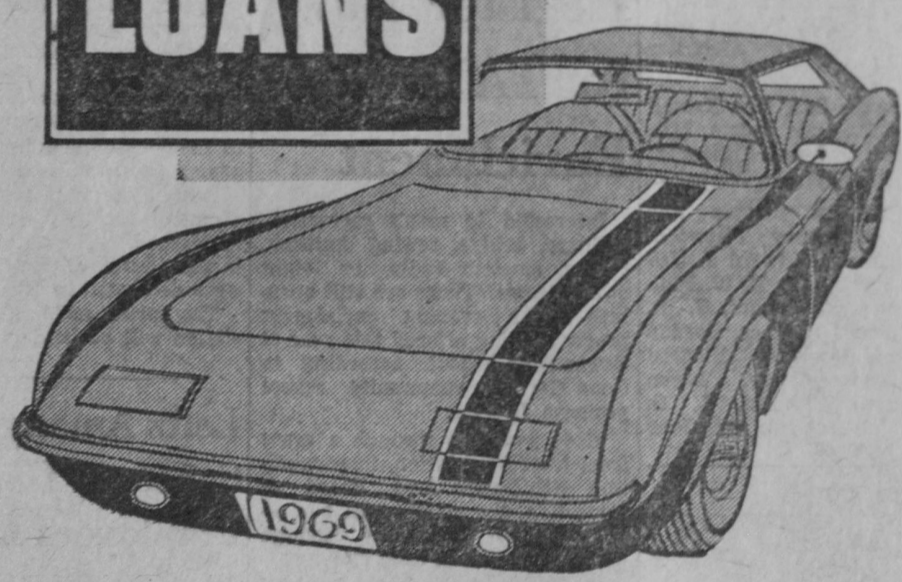

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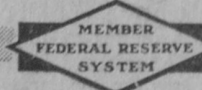

The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954).

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME SEC. 505. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

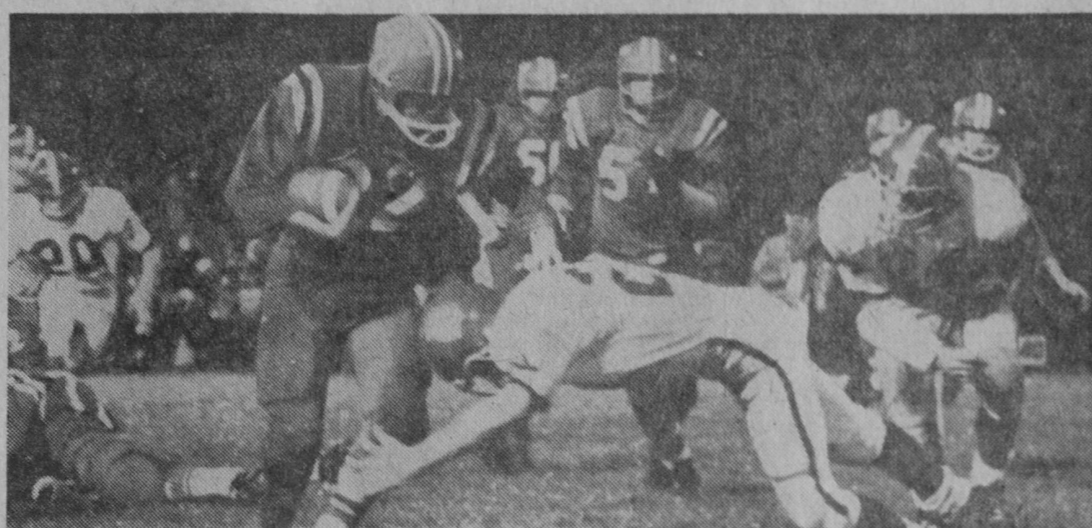
Tawas scored its lone touchdown of the night as Dave Lixey plunged from the one-yard line and Steve Crisenbery kicked the conversion.

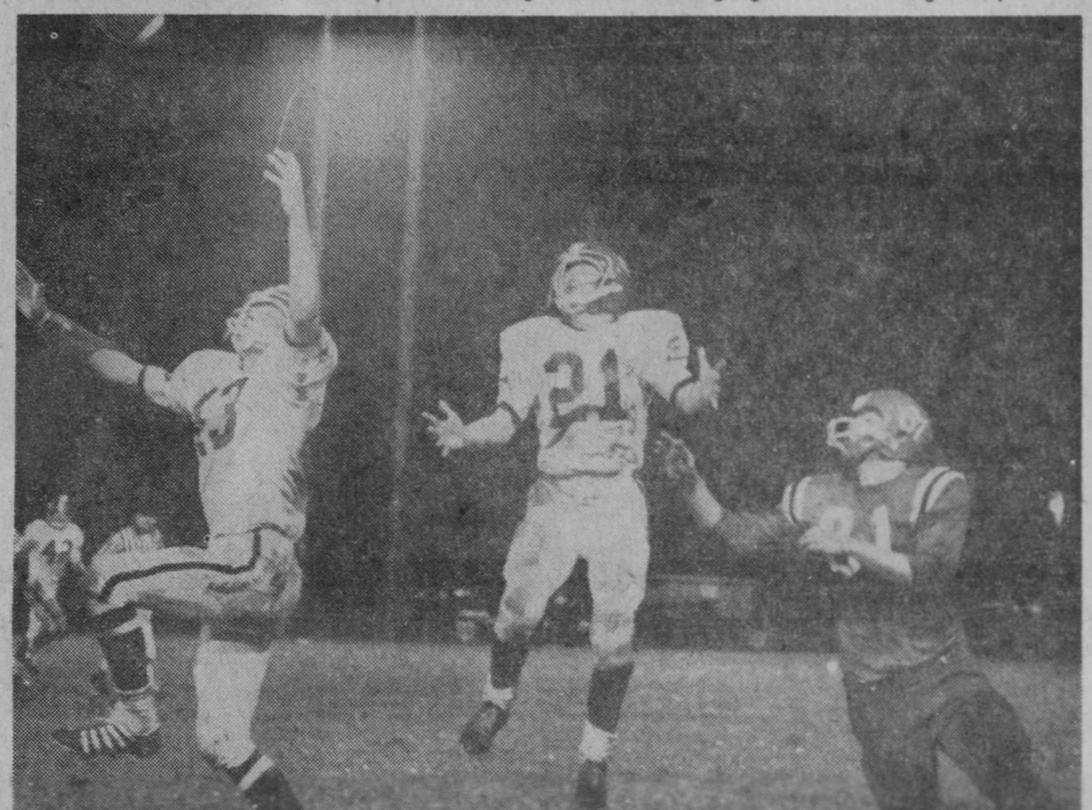
Halftime entertainment was provided fans by bands from Pinconning and Tawas Area.

Discuss Music in TA Curriculum

(This week CUBE, Citizens United for Better Education, presents an article by Band Director Gene Salamony regarding his feelings as to what a band program does for a student. This is the third in a series of articles written to inform the citizens of the area of the needs of Tawas Area Schools.)

Consider the qualities which participation in a well-organized orchestra, chorus or band develops. The individual member must cultivate a high type of responsibility and cooperation. He must be punctual and faithful; he must be alert; he must respect authority, and yet, he must not suppress his individuality but rather develop it within the legitimate scope of a rational concerted plan. He must strive for accuracy, but if he falls short of perfection, he will be so corrected as to aid his improvement. He must adapt himself to the initiative of a leader without losing his own initiative.

He must be courteous and develop enthusiasm; but his enthusiasm must not degenerate into gush or preoccupation with fads, and if he is sulky or selfish, he will become very unpopular. His pride must be in his organization rather than in his individual prowess; if he is exceptionally efficient, he may legitimately be proud of the fact, but vainglory will not help him to meet the special responsibility of a first chair. In a word, the very qualities which he must cultivate to improve his skill also develop in him some of the fundamental qualities of good citizenship.

Any concept or function of music education must be experienced significantly — deeply, intensely, personally; it must become an integral part of the individual. It must provide newer insights, newer attitudes, newer skills, newer experiences and newer consummations of dispositions toward music.

Their totality must eventually furnish insight for a conception of a philosophy of music education. Their final consummation will be the fruition of a cultural message of significant proportions.

The individual, if he is to live at a high level of creativity, must feel the overpowering possession that comes to him as he undergoes the many conceptual experiences of music. We are sure that musical experience, even though it may be an all-consuming aesthetic and cultural pulsation, always possesses attraction and interest for men. The experience of simply being as-

sociated with music is not enough. There must be "living" music through which the individual experiences self-satisfaction from its many creative functions. However, this is dependent upon insight and insight demands continual experimentation and exploration.

The total enrollment for instrumental music at the end of last school year was 197. This included a 73-member senior band, a cadet band of 84 and 40 beginners. The school board has regularly given the band a budget of \$1,000 per school year. In addition to this, all travel expenses (buses and drivers) were paid by the school. For the past three years, we have received \$1,500 per year in an effort to improve the number and quality of instruments available to our students.

With the exception of the bus expense and the extra money allowed for instruments, the cost for

our total program, as paid by the board, is \$5 per student.

This is not enough to finance our program. To offset the cost, the Tawas Area Music Boosters raise approximately \$1,000 for our use and the bands, themselves, raise roughly \$1,000.

Sixty-five percent of our students are using school-owned horns. Although we are charging \$7.50 for upkeep on these instruments no provision is made for capital outlay. From the total amount collected last year, we are carrying a balance of \$5.38 into this year.

Quarterback David Brumfield hit Elite Shellenbarger for Hale's lone

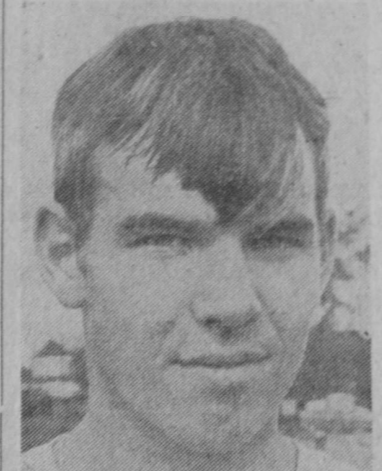
score with 27 seconds to go in the game.

Hale had a total of 169 offense yards, 96 on the ground and 73 in the air. The Eagles had six first downs and Brumfield completed two out of eight passes.

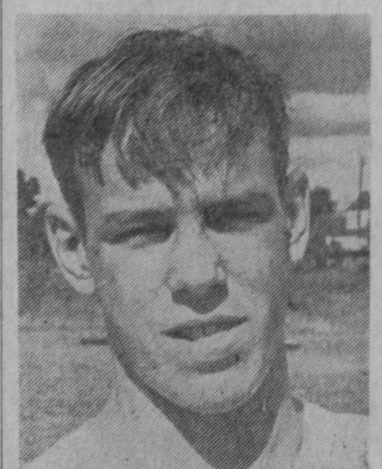
Dale Miller's 77 yards on the ground proved to be tops in offense, while his brother, Warren, was Hale's top defensive player.

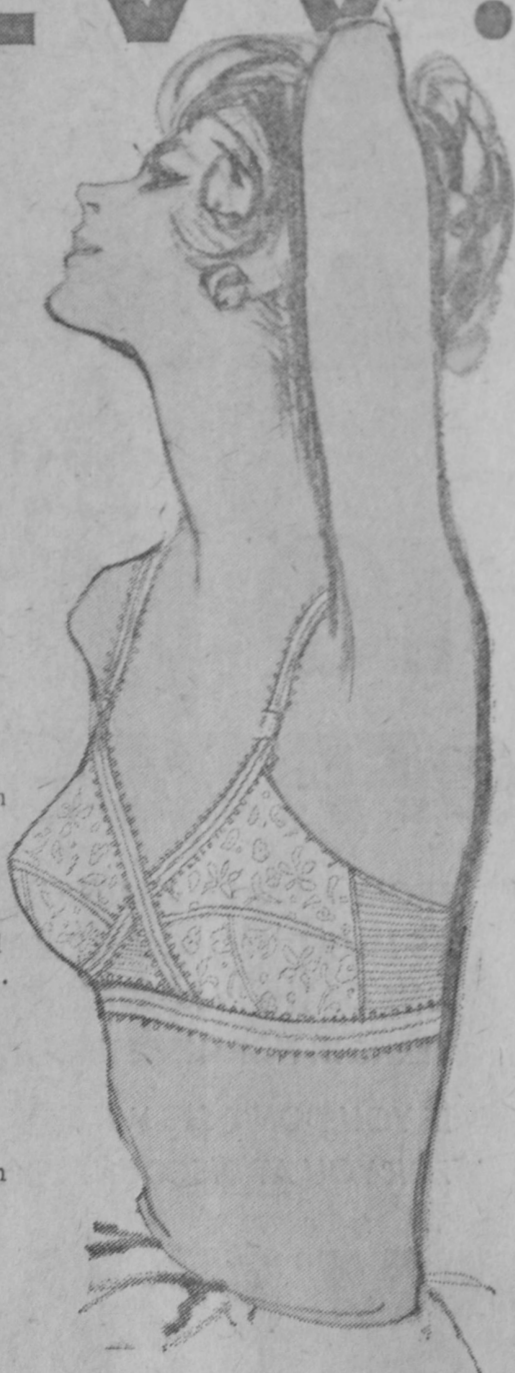

colors) or anthocyanin (red color).

Now that we're in the leaf, we can see what causes the leaves to turn color. These pigments show up in different parts of the plant such as flowers and fruits. But some are also retained in the leaves. When fall comes around, a thin layer of cells form across the base of the stem of the leaf. These cells stop the flow of materials into the leaf ceasing production of food and pigments.

Gradually, the chlorophyll is used up by the sun light. As the chlorophyll vanishes, the other pigments begin to appear. The leaf color is determined by the kind and amount of pigment present.

For example, red maples have more of the red pigment; therefore, their leaves are usually the most brilliant of all. Sugar maples, elms and aspens have mostly yellow pigment. If you look closely at the leaves, you may see splashes of different colors on one leaf. Each splash is a pocket of pigment in the leaf.

What happened to Jack Frost? Let's say he sews the leaf stems shut so that his paint in the leaves show through. Sort of like unvelving his canvases.

Bay City Office Now Handles Change of Address for SS

Social security beneficiaries who need to report changes of address or other events that affect the payments of their monthly benefits may now do so through the social security office at Bay City. John Carr, district manager, said today. Reports may be made by mail, telephone or personal visit.

Mr. Carr said that up to now beneficiaries were encouraged to notify the Social Security Administration about the occurrence of these events on post card forms preaddressed to one of six social security record centers throughout the country. Beneficiaries received the post card forms when they initially applied for monthly benefits.

Mr. Carr said that the change in reporting methods is designed to reduce the time needed to change addresses and process other information having an effect on payment of monthly benefits. The change is prompted by the increased capacity of social security district offices to transmit the information over high speed communication circuits to record offices.

In addition to address changes, Mr. Carr said that events that effect receipt of monthly social se-

curity checks include employment, marriage or remarriage in some instances, divorce and death.

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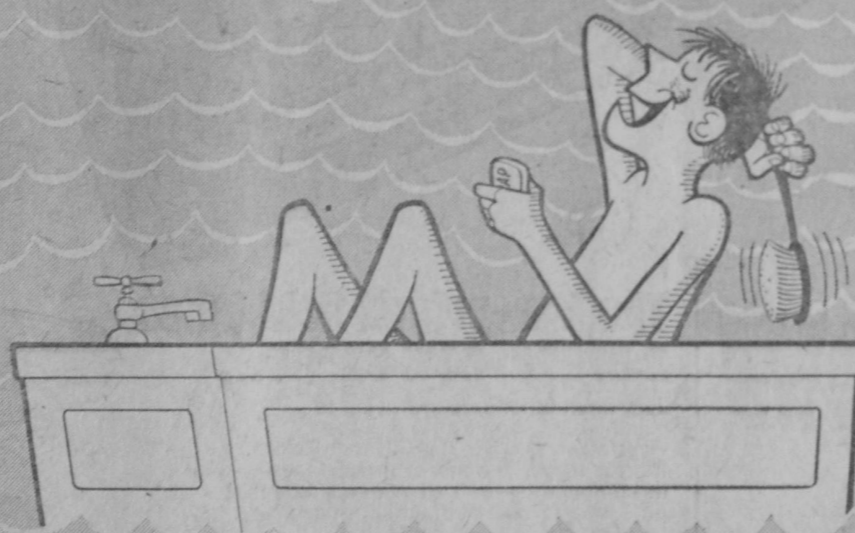
