## New ET Commission to Study Housing for Senior Citizens

An ordinance establishing a housing commission was adopted Monday night by East Tawas Council.

A five-man commission is to be appointed to investigate the possibility of obtaining federal assistance in constructing housing for senior citizens.

In other business, the council authorized purchase of two lots owned by Jakesch estate at the corner of Main and Westover Streets. Cost of the property, to be used for future parking, was \$15,000.

The council discussed the possibility of adopting a uniform traffic code, which allows establishment of a parking violation bureau. Under terms of legislation recently enacted the district court justices of the peace are to be abolished. Such a bureau would be needed to retain present justice court fines for parking violations.

Possible adoption of an ordinance prohibiting nighttime occupancy of campers on city streets and public property was discussed. Councilmen said that serious sanitation problems could result if no action is taken before next year's coho fishing season.

## Table Petitions on Merger Vote

Petitions filed last Friday asking the county clerk to call a consolidation election in Tawas City and East Tawas on Thursday, November 14, have been tabled.

County Clerk D. Keith Pappas, in accepting the petitions signed by 38 East Tawas residents and 21 residents of Tawas City, said that an election on the requested date would be illegal in that the last day for accepting voter registrations—the fifth Friday preceding an election—had passed.

In a telephone conversation with the state election commission, Pappas learned that failure to provide a last day for registration would be sufficient cause for the court, on petition, to declare the proposed election illegal.

Pappas said that promoters of the proposed merger apparently ran out of time in their attempt to hold an election prior to the effective date of new state legislation which establishes a state boundary commission handling all future mergers or boundary changes.

The new act, becoming effective 90 days after adjournment of the legislature—November 15—precludes Act 390 which had been the legal basis for calling an earlier merger election.

One provision of the new act states that no petition for consolidation shall be acted upon when a consolidation proposition affecting the same municipalities has been voted on within the preceding two years.

Pappas said that Harris Barkman, who has spearheaded the merger vote, had asked him to obtain an opinion from the attorney general's office to determine if an election could be held later this year, or if the new act would prohibit a vote until two years had elapsed. Last April, a merger proposal was turned down by four votes.

Under the new act, the governor is to appoint a three-member state boundary commission. The law provides that in counties where petitions are received for consolidation or boundary change, the probate judge is to appoint two persons to serve as commissioners during such time as the state commission would have under consideration municipal boundary adjustments for territory lying within his county.

The state commission would review proposed incorporations taking into consideration steps under an established criteria. The commission would be responsible for holding a public hearing and an election.

Saturday night's square dance filled Plainfield Township Hall, while Sunday afternoon's harness racing events drew a crowd almost equaling annual county fair races. This event was followed by a 4-H Club horse show and, despite cold weather toward the end of the show, the grandstand remained packed for the outstanding display of horsemanship by youngsters.

## Supervisors OK New Dog Warden Dept.

Included in action by the Losco Board of Supervisors during its four-day session last week was establishment of a dog warden department.

Formerly handled by the sheriff's department, salary of the new dog warden was established at \$100 per month. Additional fees include \$1 for disposal of each dog, \$1 for licensing each dog and \$1 per day for boarding each dog.

The county is to furnish and maintain the dog shelter and all supplies.

Supervisory control is to be retained by the sheriff's department, which is to submit a list of duties, responsibilities and limitations for this new position at the November meeting of the board.

In other business, the board adopted a resolution calling for an expenditure of \$12,000 for marine safety, of which two-thirds is to be reimbursed by the state.

The board reappointed Arthur Aulerich to a six-year term as a member of the road commission. Aulerich was also reappointed to the building authority. Arthur Johnson was reappointed to the social welfare board.

The board adopted a resolution recognizing the many years of service of John Henry with the road commission.

## Five Persons Killed in Head-on Collision

In one of the worst traffic accidents in the history of Losco County, five persons were killed in a station wagon-truck collision on US-23, five miles north of East Tawas, shortly after 3:00 a. m. Saturday.

All of the victims, four of them in one family, were riding in the station wagon.

The tragedy raised the county's traffic death count for the year from five to 10. The county had 18 traffic deaths last year, which was a record.

The dead, all from Livonia, were identified as Mrs. Janice Smillie, 29, who was driving; her husband, Gordon, 31, two daughters, Cynthia, eight years old, and Linda, seven; Bradley Kyle, 15, a neighbor of the Smillie family.

State police said the Smillie station wagon, traveling north, crossed the centerline and crashed head-on with a truck loaded with scrap metal, driven by Raymond Doboer, 32, of Alpena.

Doboer and his nephew, Douglas Grove, nine years old, also of Alpena, a passenger in the truck, were released after treatment for minor injuries at Tawas Hospital.

John Moffatt, Losco County coroner for 28 years, said as far as he knows the accident is the worst in the history of the county.

All victims were dead at the scene. All the bodies were in the station wagon, which came to a stop against the front of the truck on the shoulder of the highway.

## Zoning Code Violation to be Prosecuted

Authorization was given by Tawas City Council Monday night for the zoning administrator, Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz, to retain legal counsel for prosecution of a building and zoning code violation.

Bublitz told the council that a resident had started work enlarging a dwelling without obtaining a building application. The building is located in a B-2 business district south of the river bridge and is in conflict with Ordinance 162.

In other business, the council authorized its committee to sign a land contract at seven percent interest for purchasing property adjacent to the city park. At a previous meeting, the council had authorized six percent interest. To be purchased in cooperation with the federal and state governments, the city's share of the cost is \$15,870, not including interest which would be approximately \$1,111 per year.

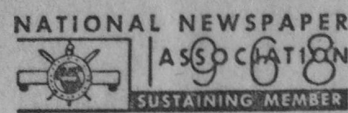

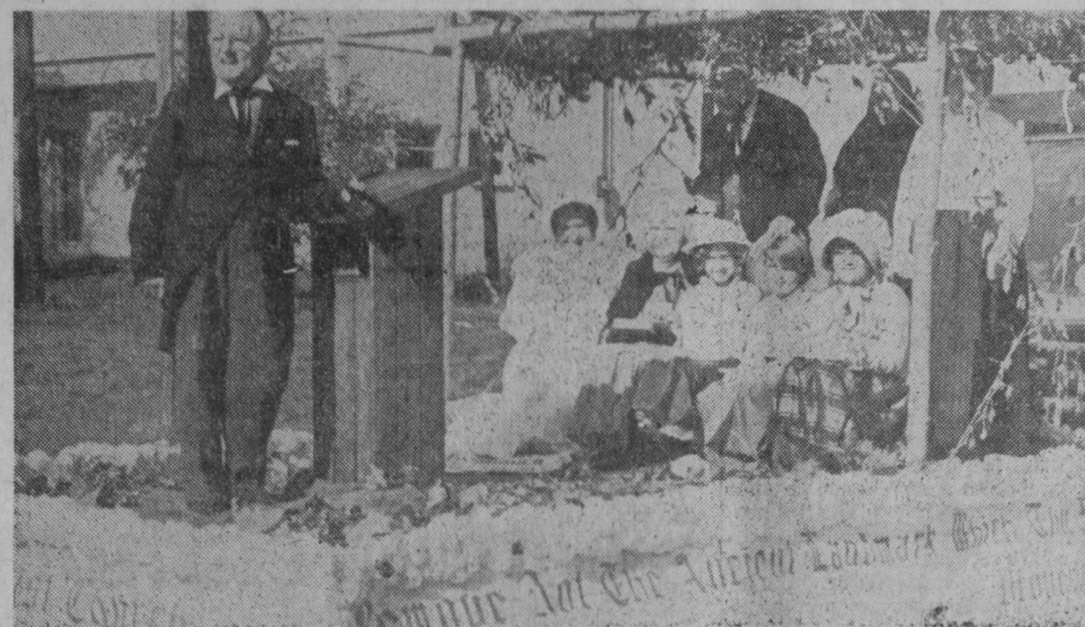

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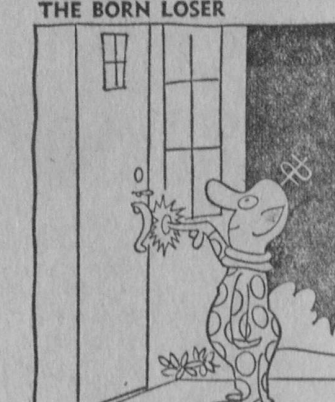

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# Forest Chats

This week, starting October 20, has been proclaimed by Pres. Lyndon Johnson as National Forest Products Week.

In setting aside the week, the president pointed out that, "After nearly two centuries of our nation's growth and development, forests still cover one-third of the American earth."

Even with all the technological changes of today and all of the so-called substitutes for wood now on the market, people the world over lean with tremendous dependency upon the forest for life's necessities.

Selling forest products on a sustained yield basis from the national forest is a highly important part of our job. It is through our harvest program that we can improve the forest for wildlife habitat, better water yields, and insure a thrifty forest environment for recreation for the future. And equally important is the economic values of the products which are harvested from the national forest.

Recent figures released by our regional office help put into perspective the values derived from the 17 national forests in the northeast part of the United States.

A record \$6,118,985 which was payment received for forest products stumpage from buyers, was returned to the national treasury during fiscal year 1968. This was payment for cutting over one-half billion board feet of wood, a mixture of both pulpwood and sawtimber.

Our regional office estimates that the job of harvesting this raw material provided some 50,000 full or part-time jobs. They estimate that the value of the products

produced was approximately 220 million dollars.

Keep in mind these figures only include the 17 national forests in the Northeast. Add in all of the products coming from the state forests, private and industrial lands, and you can get the idea that a good deal of raw wood is needed to keep our nation going.

The practice of forest land management on all lands, federal, state and private, has come a long way in the 60 some years of recognized forestry practices in the United States.

This week, we should be reminded that the needs of the future will not let us relax our effort to improve our management of the forest on public as well as private lands, remembering that we expect to have more wood, more wildlife, more clean water, more recreation in the future from that land that is forested.

As the president stated, "All of us should contribute wherever and whenever we can to the renewal and wise use of our forest."

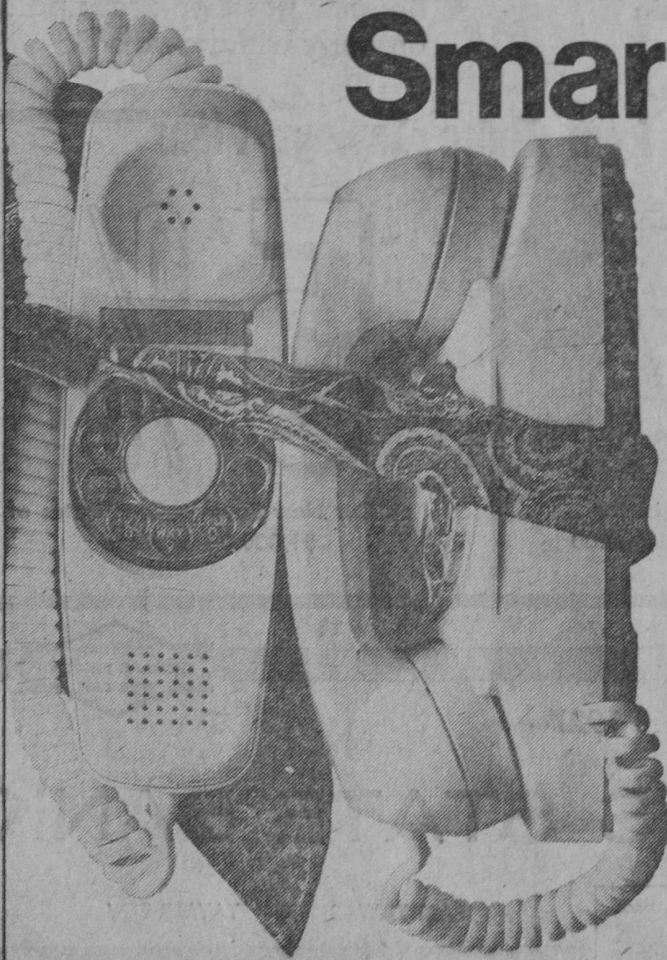

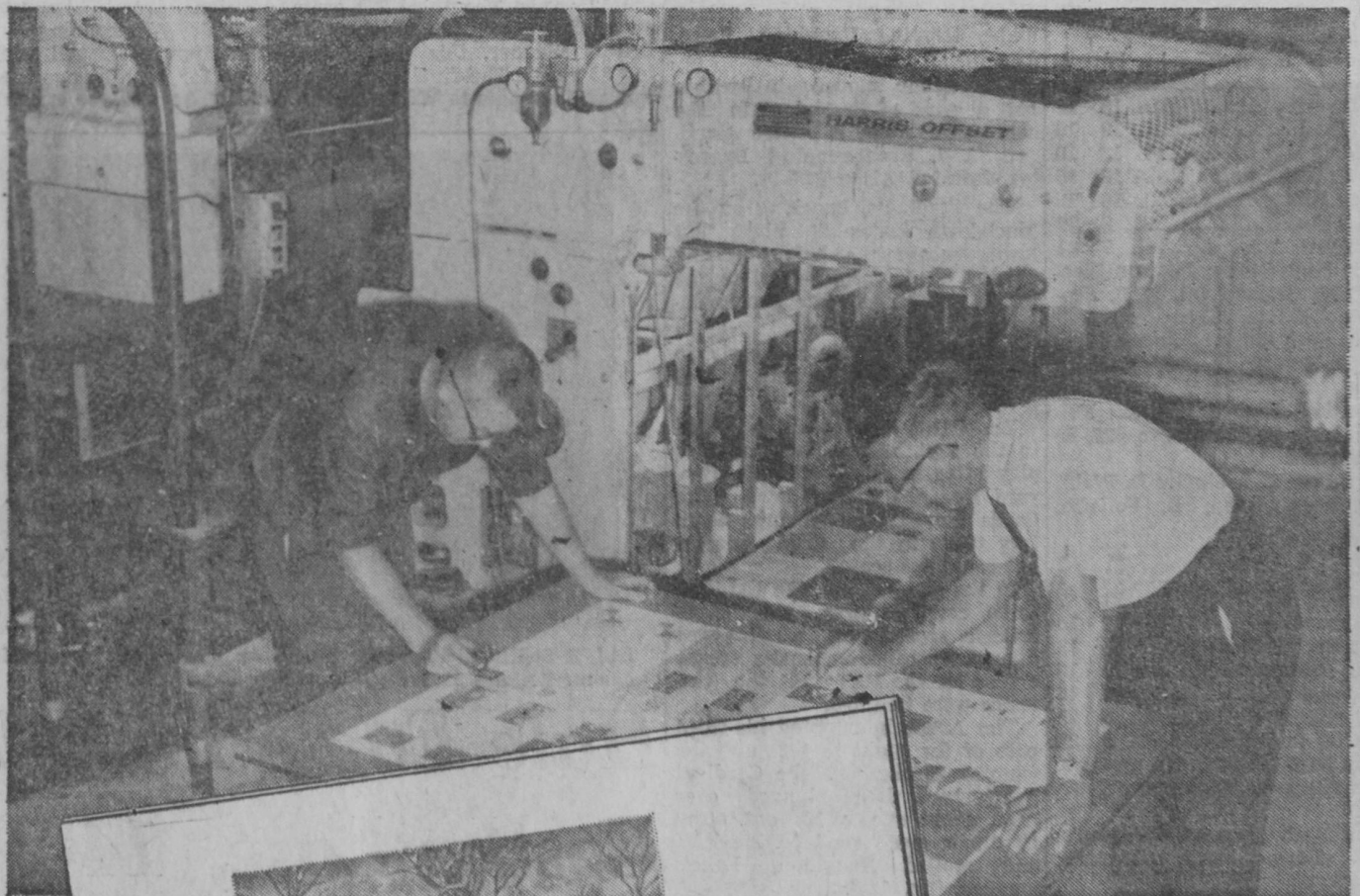
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**Parcel Post and Catalog Rate Hike Now in Effect**

Postmaster Martin C. Kasischke reminded postal customers that higher parcel post and catalog rates went into effect Saturday, October 19.

The rate increase will average 10.5 percent and in most cases will mean an additional 10 cents postage per parcel.

The higher rates were approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission in July.

Under the new rates, the minimum charge for local parcel delivery went from 40 to 50 cents. The minimum charge for parcels destined outside the local delivery area will be raised from 50 cents to 60 cents.

Almost all parcels that are charged up to \$1.10 under previous rates, increased 10 cents. This accounts for more than 80 percent of all parcel post. Postmaster Kasischke pointed out.

There is a 15-cent hike on most parcels previously charged between \$1.10 and \$4, and a 20-cent increase on parcels previously charged over \$4.

Parcel post rates are based on the weight of the package and the distance it is mailed.

Higher rates for the delivery of packages and catalogs are required to bring revenue from this type of mail within four percent of operating cost, as required by law. Postmaster Kasischke explained. The higher rates are designed to put parcels and catalogs, which are fourth-class mail, on a break-even basis.

**Initiate Community School Plan at W-P**

The Whittemore - Prescott Area High School has initiated a community school program, which consists of high school completion, recreation and enrichment classes.

The classes in high school completion are arranged so that any adult, regardless of residence or age, may enroll. These classes are offered throughout the school year beginning in September and lasting until early in May. Enrollment in these classes has closed for the fall semester and will be open again in January for the second semester work. High school completion classes consist of English, mathematics, science, bookkeeping, government, United States History, American literature and typing. In addition, others will be added for the 1969-70 school year so that those beginning in the first year of high school can earn a diploma.

The recreation classes are in the planning stages for the second semester. They will institute physical education classes for both men and women as well as classes in other recreation areas where an interest is shown by the various communities. Recreation covers a broad field. Think about the number of visitors to Michigan and you realize there must be more recreation in our area than we have utilized.

The enrichment classes are designed to enable persons from any area to attend the classes which interest them. These classes are started through the efforts of persons interested in learning about "any area." The initial step is to send word of your interests to the community school director at the Whittemore-Prescott Area High School and he will find the proper meeting place, instructor and material for the class. As an example, one class has been meeting with J. Richard Ernst,

Iosco County prosecuting attorney, to discuss law. The material has included a brief summary of the law system here in the United States, discussion subjects dealing with wills, mortgages, suits and contracts.

Other enrichment classes soon to start are welding, cake decorating, TOPS and upholstery. Contrary to popular opinion, enrichment classes may begin any time throughout the school year. In that most classes run regularly for six-10 weeks, the program is flexible enough to enable the students to choose the dates of meetings and concentrate their wishes. Classes can meet any day or evening of the week.

Jerry Humerickhouse stated, "I find very few subjects we cannot offer. As community school director, I find the difficulty has been in getting small, scattered groups interested in a particular class together with others who are also interested. Two or three here and there form a large group if they only know about each other."

He added, "Without restrictions

such as school districts and ages, the program can be larger and more detailed than most of us imagine, other community school programs have large classes for every age group from preschoolers to senior citizens. I hope I can interest the whole community to use the community school program as a focal point in that we have the facilities at the high school for nearly every need."

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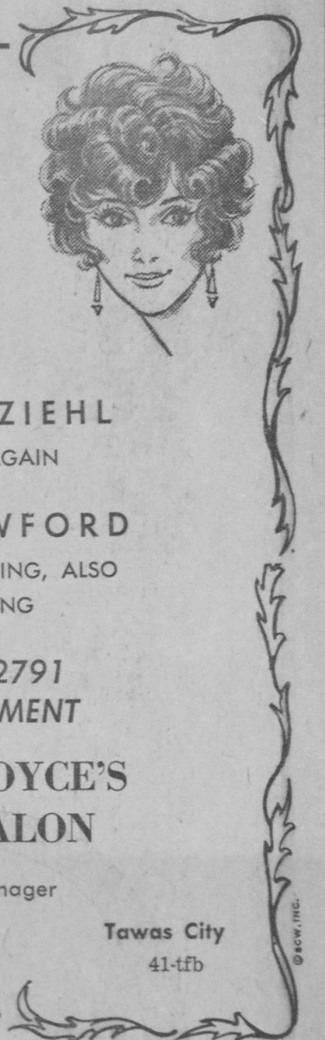

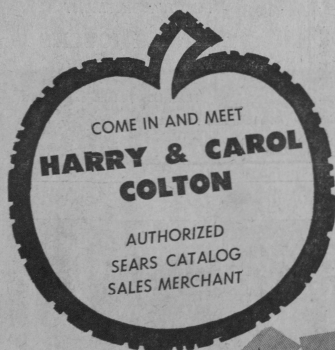
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
