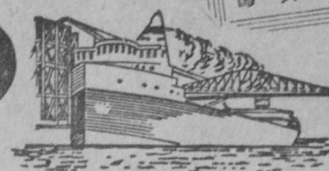

General Election Next Tuesday---Vote!

Presidential Contest Has Nation's Interest

Voters are to receive three ballots when they go to the polls November 5—the general election ballot, non-partisan ballot and state proposal ballot.

While the three-way race for president will be of principal concern to voters, there are races at the state and local level, as well as five proposed constitutional amendments, which should bring out voters in greater numbers than ever before.

Heading tickets of the two major political parties are Hubert H. Humphrey for president and Edmund S. Muskie for vice president on the Democratic Party, while Richard M. Nixon for president and Spiro T. Agnew for vice president on the Republican Ticket.

George C. Wallace is candidate for president on the American Independent Party. In Michigan, Marvin Griffin is listed on the ballot as Wallace's running mate, but Curtis LeMay is the actual vice presidential candidate. The latter's name was announced too late to be printed on ballots.

Three other parties list candidates for president and vice president in Michigan: Fred Halstead and Paul Boutelle, Socialist Workers Party; Henning A. Blomen and George S. Taylor, Socialist Labor Party; Eldridge Cleaver and Larry Hockman, New Politics Party.

In other state races, Elford A. Cederberg, Republican 10th District congressman, will be opposed by Wayne Miller, Democrat; George A. Prescott, Republican incumbent, 102nd District representative in the state legislature, will be opposed by Connor D. Smith.

Other major party candidates are as follows: Michael J. Deeb and Marilyn Jean Kelly, Democrats, and Barbara Dumouchelle

and James W. TenBrink, Republicans, for state board of education; Gerald R. Dunn and Robert E. Nederlander, Democrats, and Lawrence B. Lindemer and Fred Matthaei Jr., Republicans, regent of the University of Michigan; Warren M. Huff and Blanche Martin, Democrats, and David Diehl and Richard Ernst, Republicans, trustee of Michigan State University; Augustus J. Calloway and George C. Edwards, Democrats, and Kurt Deydel and Victor G. Raviolo, Republicans, Wayne State University Board of Governors.

Only one contest is listed at the county level. Ivan O'Farrell, who was successful in his renomination as Republican sheriff, defeating two opponents in the August primary election, will be opposed by Louis L. Sokola, Democrat.

Unopposed candidates are D. Keith Papas, clerk; Edward J. Nelkie, treasurer; Albert H. Buch, register of deeds; John A. Mielock, drain commissioner; Edward D. Jacques and E. John Mofatt, coroners. There is no candidate listed for prosecuting attorney.

Five proposals being placed before Michigan voters include: No. 1. An income tax at flat rates or graduated as to rate or base may be imposed by the state or any of its subdivisions.

No. 2. Shall the State of Michigan observe daylight savings time.

No. 3. Shall the state borrow the sum of \$335,000,000 and issue general obligation bonds for the purpose of planning, acquiring and constructing facilities for prevention and abatement of water pollution.

County Prints Extra Ballots to Meet Voter Registration

Iosco County election officials are preparing for one of the largest general elections in national history November 5. Voters will receive a fistful of ballots and County Clerk D. Keith Papas has taken precautions to insure that ballots will be available for every registered voter in the county.

Since the last presidential election in 1964, when 7,044 votes were cast in Iosco, voter registration here increased to 8,864 as of October 4, the last day for registration. Because of national, state and local interest in the upcoming election, voter registrations jumped 956 since the last day of registration for the August primary.

With voting machines handling two of Oscoda Township's three precincts, totaling 1,914 registered voters, Papas ordered 7,040 paper ballots to be printed last September. All ballots and supplies were delivered prior to the September 24 deadline, but registrations continued to pour in before the October deadline for registration. Papas had to order another 320 sets of printed ballots.

Voter registrations has increased 2,002 over the actual number of ballots cast in the 1968 presidential election.

Total number of workers on the various election boards of the county are to be increased in order to handle the more than 8,000 voters expected at the polls.

Iosco County to Pick New 9-Man Board

Two races are to feature balloting for the new nine-member Iosco Board of Supervisors. Candidates are listed on the general election ballot for each precinct.

At East Tawas, Carlton Merschel, Republican, and Earl McElheron, Democrat, will vie for the District No. 6 seat, while Aubrey Belsion, Republican, and George Blust, Democrat, will vie for the District No. 9 seat comprising the Townships of Alabaster, Burleigh, Sherman and the City of Whittemore.

Other candidates include: William G. Weresly Jr., Republican, District No. 1; Jack W. Allen, Republican, District No. 2; Robert K. Foster, Republican, District No. 3; J. Berkeley Smith, Republican, District No. 4; Fred B. Lomas, Republican; District No. 5; Clement Stephan, Republican, District No. 7; Walter Miller, Republican, District No. 8.

No races are listed for township officers. In Wilber Township, John Newberry is Democratic candidate (See TRUSTEES, page 6.)

M-65 Accident Fatal; Highway Toll Climbing

A 72-year-old Whittemore man, John A. Bowlsby, died at 12:40 a. m. Sunday, October 27, of injuries received 12 hours earlier when his farm tractor was struck by an auto on M-65, one mile south of Whittemore.

Michigan State Police said that Bowlsby, traveling south along the shoulder of M-65, made a left turn into the path of an automobile driven by Leo Skupin, 52, Detroit. The crash occurred at the Leggett Road intersection. Driver of the automobile was not held.

Bowlsby was taken to Tawas Hospital and later transferred to Mercy Hospital, Bay City. His death brought Iosco County's 1968 highway traffic toll to 11.

He was born in Sandusky on January 14, 1896, and had lived many years near Whittemore.

His wife, Sadie, survives him. One son, Walter, lives at Whittemore. Daughters are Mrs. Irene McGillis, Turner; Mrs. Rita Lambert and Mrs. Gladys Nickell, both of Whittemore. There are 13 grandchildren.

Services will be held Wednesday (today), 1:00 p. m., at Forsee Funeral Home, Twining. Burial will be in the Latter Day Saints Cemetery, Whittemore.

Tawas Students Favor Nixon

Republicans won a clearcut victory in a "mock" election conducted last week at Tawas Area High School, as could be expected in a traditional stronghold of the GOP. About the same margin of victory can be expected by Republican candidates when parents of these students go to the polls next Tuesday.

Despite the landslide for regional GOP candidates, Hubert H. Humphrey and Edmund S. Muskie made a rather surprising showing among student voters. Richard Nixon and Spiro T. Agnew outdrew the Democratic presidential hopeful, 240-134, but the Nixon margin was much less than that given other Republican candidates.

In addition, the third party candidate, George C. Wallace, garnered 54 votes.

George A. Prescott of Tawas City, Republican candidate for 102nd district representative in the state legislature, drew 334 votes from students while Connor D. Smith, Democratic candidate, had 73 votes. Congressman Elford A. Cederberg had 300 votes as compared to 107 for the Democratic candidate, Wayne Miller. J. Richard Ernst received 350 votes to 80 for Kenneth Ralph for district judge.

There were 133 straight Republican ballots, 38 straight Democratic ballots and 16 straight ballots for Wallace's American Independent Party.

Student voters favored three of the five constitutional amendment proposals. The referendum daylight savings time passed 278-157; students favored bonding to abate water pollution, 338-102; the proposal relative to bonding for public recreational purposes was favored, 257-161. Students did not approve of the adoption of a grad-

TA Board Would Issue Notes on 1968 Taxes

Advertising for bids on tax anticipation notes in the amount of \$50,000 was authorized Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education. This action followed recent state approval, noted on another page of this newspaper.

Borrowing money was necessary this year due to depletion of the district's surplus fund account, which had been used to pay expenses until receipt of property taxes.

The district has about \$23,000 in outstanding bills at the present time. With four payrolls to meet during November and December, board members were of the opinion that borrowing additional funds was necessary to meet outstanding obligations.

Supt. Reynold Mick reported that the last state aid payment amounted to \$76,840. The December payment, the first this year to be based on the district's changed deductible millage formula, will be \$60,000.

Interest cost for borrowing the \$50,000 for four months would be approximately \$500, depending upon the fluctuation of the money market.

On the brighter side financially, the school superintendent made note of the fact that while classrooms are at nearly 100 percent capacity, an additional 75 students this year would mean higher receipts in state aid than anticipated.

In adopting last minute changes for its 1968-1969 budget, the board announced that a public hearing

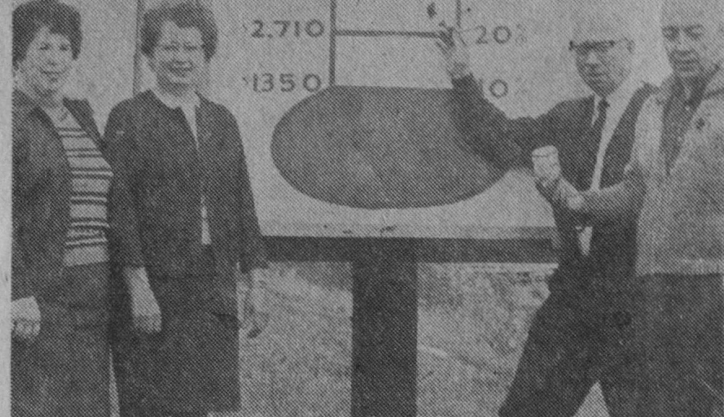
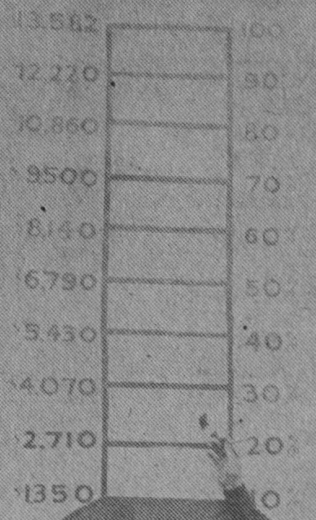
on the new budget would be held Monday, November 11, 7:30 p. m. Copies of the new budget are to be made available to all interested residents attending the meeting.

Following this hearing, the school is to make monthly statements which will show the amount budgeted, the amount spent to date and the amount committed.

"We believe that this will give a more accurate picture of the school's financial status from time to time," said Mick. "The figures for the amount committed may not be completely accurate as prices may change or such items as freight may be more or less than expected, but this will give the board of education and the

John Skrocki, campaign chairman, stressed that more cooperation was needed. "If the contributor would fill out his pledge card as soon as possible, the volunteer worker would be able to return this to campaign headquarters and be given the proper credit immediately."

Adopt Requirements for Adult Diplomas

With 25 adults enrolled in high school completion courses at Tawas Area School, new regulations for awarding diplomas to those successfully completing this course of study were adopted Monday night by the board of education.

Eligibility for this program includes any person, 18 years of age or older not enrolled in a regular school program, who can profit from the educational program. Students under 18 years of age may be admitted upon written approval of the high school principal.

A minimum of 16 credits are necessary to earn a diploma. Besides elective subjects, the 16 credits must include three units of English, one unit of American History, one-half unit of American Government, one unit each of science and mathematics.

A unit of credit in adult high school completion programs is to be awarded for a body of knowledge, skill or competency equal to that normally required to earn credit in an equivalent course in an accredited secondary school.

One-half unit of credit may be earned with 45 teacher contact hours and 15 study hours. Students are to be required to earn a

minimum of two credits in Tawas Area School in order to receive a diploma and satisfy minimum requirements listed.

No diploma would be granted prior to the time the student would have received the diploma if he had remained in school.

An evaluation would be made of any work received by the student through any approved trade or business school accredited by a regional association, work completed in other approved high schools, community colleges or courses completed during military service.

Adults would be allowed to take either the Iowa Test of Educational Development or the General Educational Development after successfully completing one evening course.

The adult high school evaluation committee, which would make an educational appraisal of the student, would include the high school principal, adult high school counselor, adult education director, superintendent and curriculum coordinator.

Both satisfactory scholarship and attendance would be necessary to be eligible for credit. Failure to meet standards would prevent students from receiving credit in the designated area.

Whosoever doth not bear his cross, and come after me, cannot be my disciple. (Luk 14:27)

On Monday, April 9, 1945, at Flossenbürg, Germany, Dietrich Bonhoeffer was executed as an enemy of the Nazi government. He was a great disciple of Jesus Christ. His death ended two years in prison and concentration camps because he refused to remain silent on matters of conscience.

In a story of Bonhoeffer's life by Payne Best, a British officer, we read that he shared the final months of Bonhoeffer's imprisonment. He wrote in his diary: "Sunday 8th April, 1945, Pastor Bonhoeffer held a little service and spoke to us in a manner which reached the hearts of all." The service had just ended when two men came for Bonhoeffer, Payne Best continues: "We bade him goodbye—he drew me aside—'This is the end,' he said 'For me the beginning of life.'" What a price discipleship!

In this present day of turmoil and chaos, do we dare to witness for Christ as we should? What a sacred and glorious opportunity we have to be disciples of our Master and His witnesses!

O God, forgive us for failures to take our discipleship seriously enough to witness in the face of opposition and danger. Help us to be the kind of disciples upon whom the Master can depend at all times. For His sake, Amen.

Report Given on Overseas Aid

Word received from officials of the American Protestant and Catholic overseas aid agencies announced that during the month of September and the first week of October over 2,800 tons of food and medicines were flown into blockaded Biafra by church-sponsored airlifts from the Island of Sao Tome.

According to Church World Service and Catholic Relief Services, the United States Protestant and Catholic overseas aid agencies, respectively, 200 mercy flights were completed during September and 50 such flights from October 1 to October 7.

Pastor Viggo Mollerup of Denmark arrived in New York a few days ago to confer with representatives from Catholic Relief Services, Church World Service and UNICEF about these relief operations for the starving population in the blockaded former eastern region of Nigeria.

Pastor Mollerup recently made a fact finding tour to Sao Tome, the Portuguese west African island, where international church agencies are supplying the mercy airlifts into Biafra. In addition to Catholic Relief Services and Church World Service, the agencies include the World Council of Churches, Caritas Internationalis and many other European relief church agencies.

Michigan people have been helping with these food shipments through CROP, the community hunger appeal of Church World Service. CROP campaigns are being conducted in Michigan during November—the Thanksgiving season.

Gordon Hackborn, representing Tawas Council, Knights of Columbus, presented a check to the St. Joseph - Immaculate Heart Home and School Association at its first meeting of the school year held recently. The donation is to be used toward the payment of playground equipment the association purchased last year. 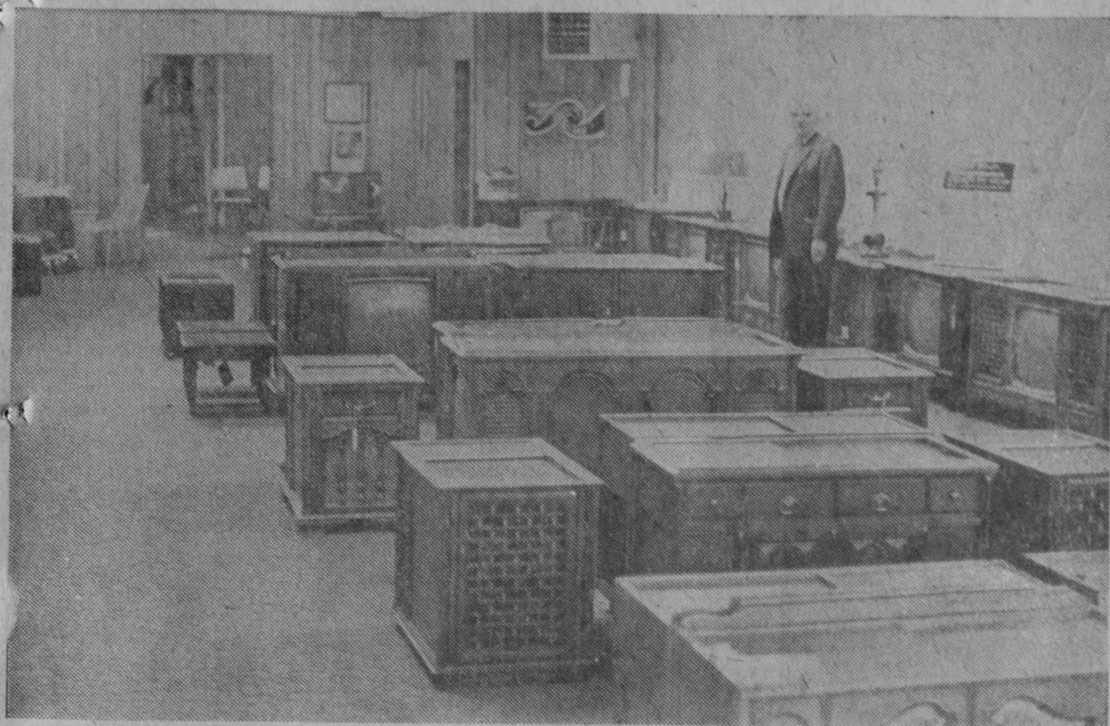

Annual Income Questionnaire Due Early for Veterans

For more than 78,000 Michigan veterans and dependents on Veterans Administration pension rolls, the end-of-year annual income questionnaire will come a month early this year—and it is more important than ever.

Robert M. Fitzgerald, manager of VA's Regional Office in Detroit, said today that check-sized reports will be enclosed with pension payments mailed about November 1, instead of the usual December 1. Deadline for returning the questionnaire to VA has also been moved up from January 31 to January 15.

Rearrangement of the reporting dates was necessary to ensure that checks to be mailed February 1 can be properly adjusted under restructuring legislation enacted by congress this year. VA must have the pensioner's report of outside income in order to compute his continued entitlement or to increase his rates under the new Public Law 90-275, which becomes effective January 1.

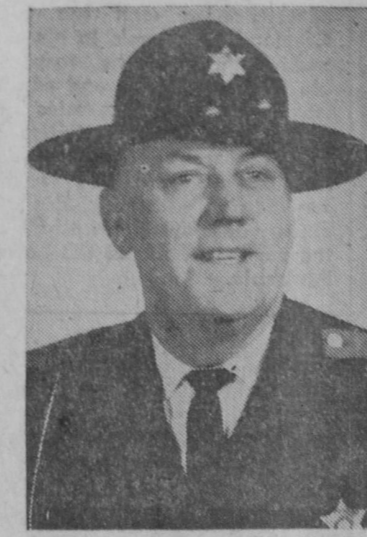

J. Richard Ernst and Kenneth E. Ralph are listed as candidates for 81st District District Court. Although his name is printed on the ballot, Ralph has announced that he is not a candidate for this position.

Ralph made the following statement this week: "In July of this year, I filed for the office of district judge for Arenac and Iosco Counties. I later decided not to run for this office and to remain as Arenac County probate judge. While my name is listed on the ballot for the office of district judge, I am not seeking the office, am not campaigning and fully support the candidacy of J. Richard Ernst of Tawas City for district judge."

Teacher Contract Signed at Oscoda

Board of education of Oscoda Area Schools voted five to two Monday night to ratify a new work contract with district teachers.

The teachers, members of the Oscoda Education Association, approved the contract last week.

Negotiators for the board and teachers reached agreement about the last four major points outstanding early last week after a two-day teacher walkout.

Concessions were made by both sides in the final agreement. A two-year sealed contract agreement asked by the board was accepted, while the board compromised on the school calendar. Teachers will work through June 18 and the board conceded some lost days can be made up during the course of the school year.

New teachers entering the system will be given credit only for their experience rating, but no retroactive pay will be given. This restriction will principally affect teachers entering and/or returning from military service.

Agreement was reached for an eight percent increase in secretary salaries. This will amount to \$135 increase this year and a \$150 increment next year.

Signing of the formal contract draft, now being prepared, is the final step remaining before complete settlement.

Gunshot Wound

Robert L. Fusina, Lincoln Park, was treated for a gunshot wound to the right leg Friday at Tawas Hospital. He was hunting in Oscoda Township. Officers said he drew a .22 caliber handgun from a holster on his hip and the gun discharged.

Not a Candidate

Iosco friends of Kenneth Ralph of Standish, who placed a political advertisement to be published in the Herald this week, announced Tuesday they had received word from Ralph that he was not seeking election as district judge and had endorsed J. Richard Ernst for this position. Ralph's official statement is printed in the Herald's election story.

Election Information Concerning 'Third' Party Candidates

If George Wallace were to win the presidency, Curtis LeMay would be his vice president, no doubt about that. But here in Michigan, LeMay's name will not even appear on the ballot.

The Wallace-LeMay ticket represents the tandem running for the American Independent Party. But because Wallace waited so long to name his running mate, the Michigan ballots—which had already gone to print—were printed with the names of Wallace and Marvin Griffin. The latter was certified to the Michigan Elections Bureau of the Michigan Department of State some time ago.

"There isn't a thing we can do about this," says Sec. of State James M. Hare. "Griffin's name was submitted by the Wallace party and was printed on our ballots. So he stays. Actually, it has no effect on the ballot anyhow, because Wallace-LeMay run as a ticket and not as individuals."

At the same time, said Hare, votes cast for candidates for president and vice president for the Prohibition Party must be counted in compliance with an attorney general's opinion of September 16.

The ruling applies only to the Prohibition Party, the only party which filed names of presidential candidates with the secretary of state, which was not on the ballot. Candidates are E. Harold Munn for president and Rolland E. Fisher for vice president. There was also a list of presidential electors.

Most of the voting for these candidates, said Hare, will be done by stickers. On paper ballots, if a sticker bearing the names of Munn-Fisher is placed over the names of presidential candidates for one of the six parties now on the ballot and a cross appears in the circle at the top of the ticket or in the square below the space where the sticker has been placed, it will be a vote for the Prohibition Party.

This means that on the party column where the sticker appears, no vote will be counted for that party's candidates for president and vice president. Votes will be counted for the balance of their candidates voted on that ticket. This will be a split ticket and will have to be tallied.

On voting machines, write-in votes or stickers will appear on the write-in roll.

On Presidential Campaign Trail

Last minute visits to Michigan by Hubert Humphrey and by Curtis LeMay are scheduled this week. Humphrey is to visit Battle Creek and Kalamazoo on Thursday and then fly to Dearborn on Friday. LeMay plans to hold a press conference Thursday, 2:30 p. m., at Tri-City Airport. Several Michigan visits have been made during the election campaign by Richard Nixon and George Wallace.

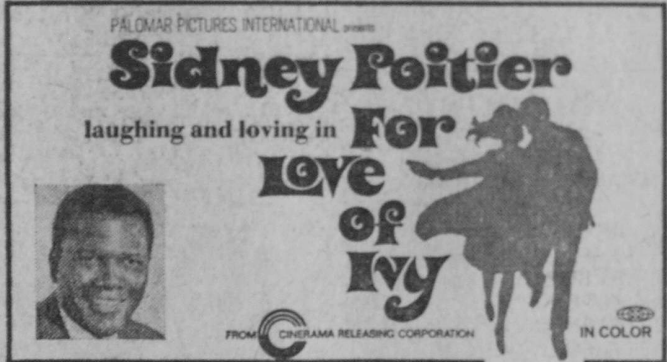

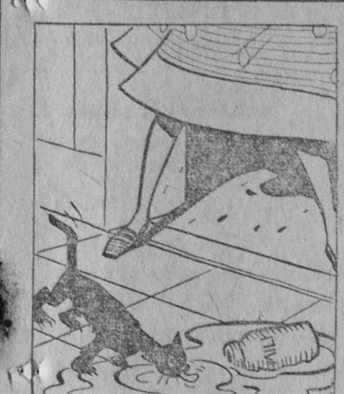

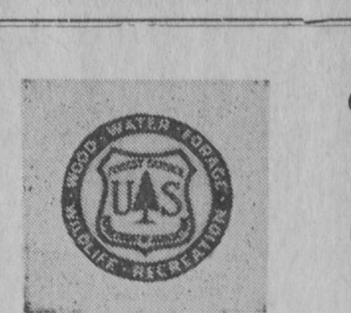
State Approves TA School's Tax Anticipation Notes

HURON - MANISTEE NATIONAL FOREST

Now that the cold, wet weather of fall has set in, we in the recreation business can set back and relax—well almost relax. The summer crowds are gone, and the recent visitors that came to watch the changing autumn colors have also left. The picnic areas and campgrounds are only receiving a little use—mostly by hunters. So, we are finally going about the business of putting the recreation areas to bed for the winter.

Last week, the consensus on the district was that cold weather was on the way, so we decided to stop gambling and close down our water systems at Lumberman's Monument and Rollways campground and picnic area. Floyd Hall spent two days draining the water tower at the monument, the pressure tank at Rollways and then completely winterizing the system.

We are also in the process of pumping our pit toilets before they freeze in preparation for the next season. Our sanitation crew continues to make the rounds, but now the crew only has two men and they only work one day a week. Once the hunters go home, we will go out and bring in the garbage cans and that will be the end for the winter—well, all except for snowmobiles.

We are now just beginning to make preparations for the coming snowmobile season. The work this year will consist of clearing some new trail, making and setting up signs, bulletin boards, trail markers and printing up maps for distribution. This year, we plan to have the same 13-mile trail at Gordon Creek as we had last year but this season, we expect to have more and better trail markers. Our Silver Valley trail will be enlarged into a trail system having

several loops of different lengths and difficulty. Most of these loops will have some distance of woods trails rather than following roads and thus, they will have to be traveled at slower speeds, but the enthusiast should find them more challenging.

Although plans are still not definite at this time, we are also hoping to have a trail leading from the country club to the Silver Valley area and a short trail loop to the west of Sand Lake. This work will be accomplished with considerable help of the new snowmobile club, Iosco Snow-drifters, who have volunteered to work with us.

Now, if we only get some snow this winter.

Filing Deadline for SS Claims

The 1967 amendment to the Social Security Law have set a deadline on the length of time allowed to file claims for medical insurance reimbursement under Medicare, according to John Carr, district manager of the Bay City social security office.

Mr. Carr explained that all claims for medical services (doctor bills, ambulance fees, bills for medical equipment and supplies, etc.) received prior to October 1967 must be filed with Medicare by December 31. After that deadline, the bills cannot be paid under the medical insurance program.

"All Medicare beneficiaries should check through their old medical bills to be sure that bills for services performed prior to October 1967 have been sent in. Any bills from the period before October 1967 which have not been filed should be sent in immediately. Prompt action will insure that each beneficiary receives his full protection under Medicare," Mr. Carr said.

Mr. Carr emphasized that only those bills for services received before October 1967 need be submitted by December 31. Any bills incurred since October 1967 are valid until December 31, 1969. Anyone needing assistance in filing his medical insurance claim should contact the Bay City district office for assistance. The office is located at 1009 North Madison Avenue, phone 893-9579.

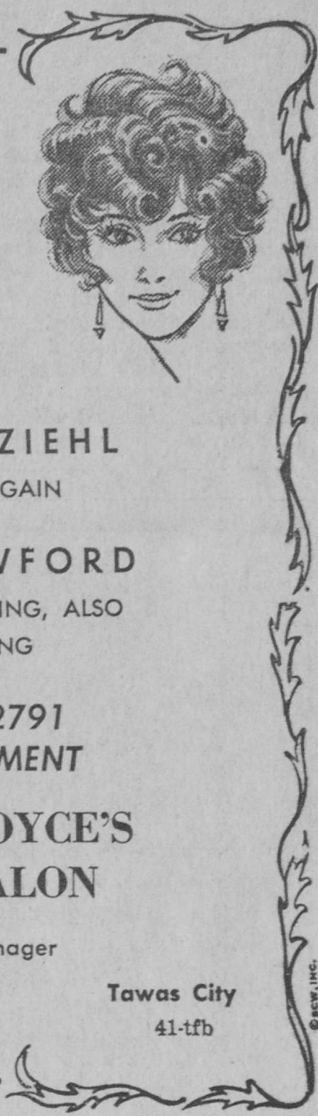

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal, introduced the elementary teachers and Billy Wilder, high school principal, introduced junior and senior high school faculty members.

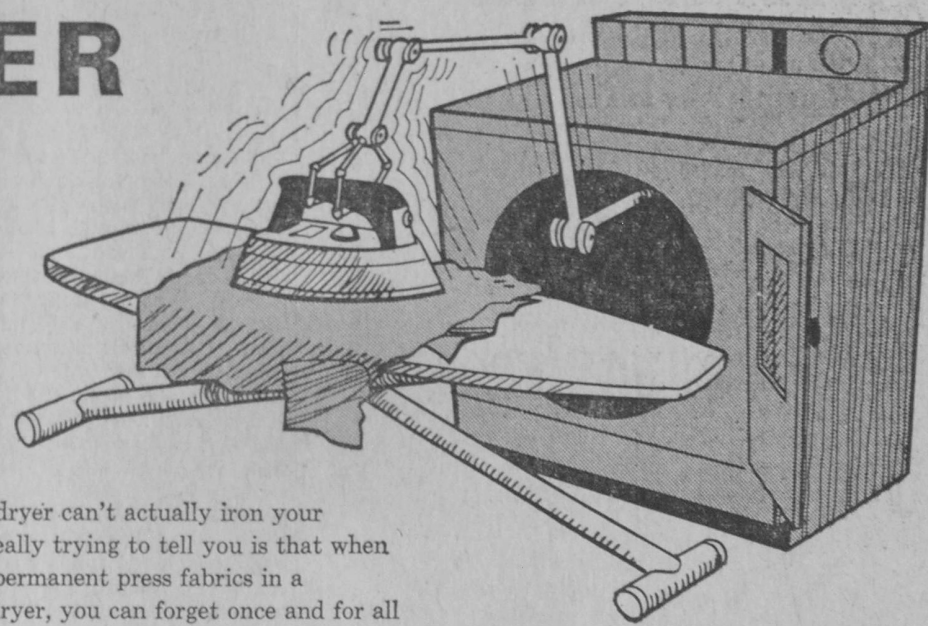

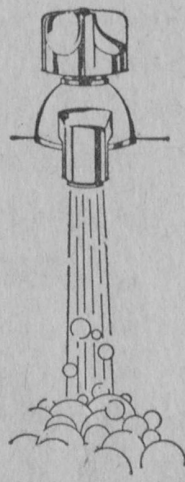

Announce Change in Enlistment

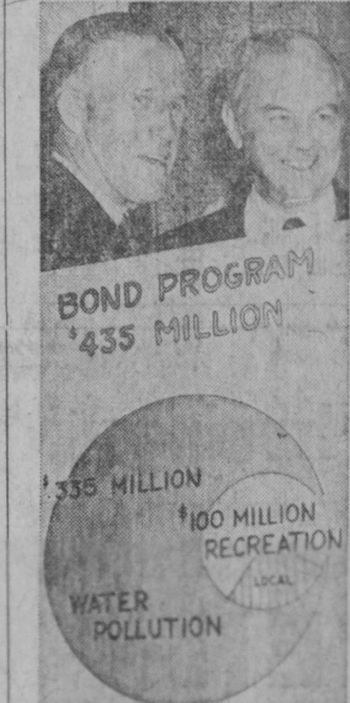

Clean water and recreation are running. Funds for clean water and more recreation in Michigan are being sought through two bonds to face Michigan voters November 5.

Gov. George Romney, who urges passage of both proposals poses with J. Thomas Smith, chairman of the governor's citizens committee to inform voters, to tell how the tax dollar will be spent. Smith is also president of Dura Corporation and Automobile Club of Michigan's first vice president. Proposal No. 3, water pollution, asks for 335 million dollars while Proposal No. 4 seeks 100 million dollars for recreation. Romney points out that no additional state taxes are necessary to finance the bonds.

Growing Pains Hits Standish-Sterling Schools

Growing pains have hit Standish-Sterling School District with such intensity during the past three years that schoolmen say that a sinking fund for future school construction may now be inadequate.

Since 1963, enrollment at Standish-Sterling has grown from 1,677 to an amazing fourth Friday count two weeks ago of 1,971. (For comparison, Tawas' count 1,868.)

The type of growth the S-S district has experienced can never be predicted and leaves school officials with the massive problem of finding classrooms to fill the need.

Supt. Wallace Schnetzler said last week he thought the system might need 50 new rooms within five years. The cost is a staggering \$1,000,000.

It was anticipated that the new school constructed in 1956 would fill the districts expansion requirements for 20 years. No one foresaw, however, the industrial expansion at Standish or the effect of the new expressway. More and more families are moving out of the metropolitan areas, with parents commuting to the cities for work.

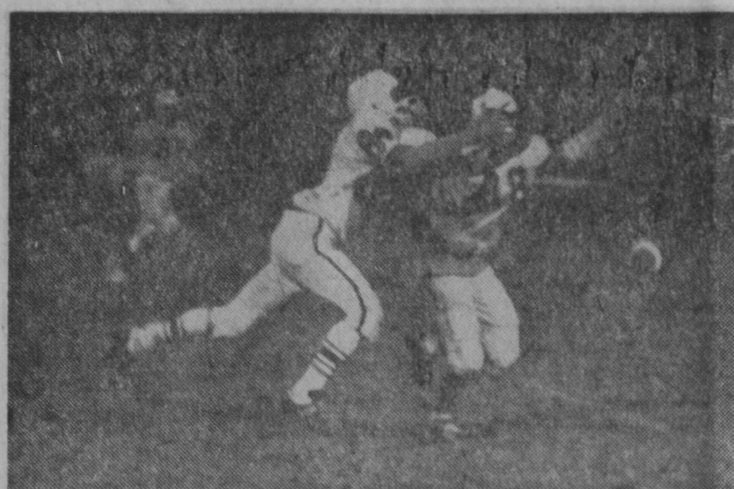

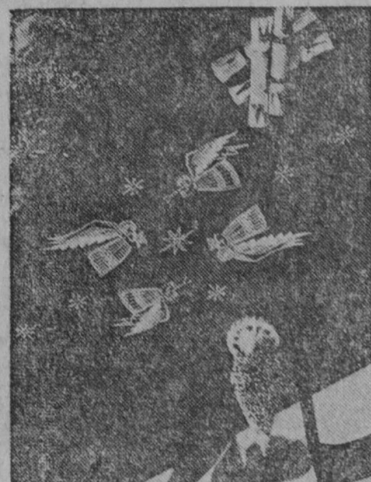

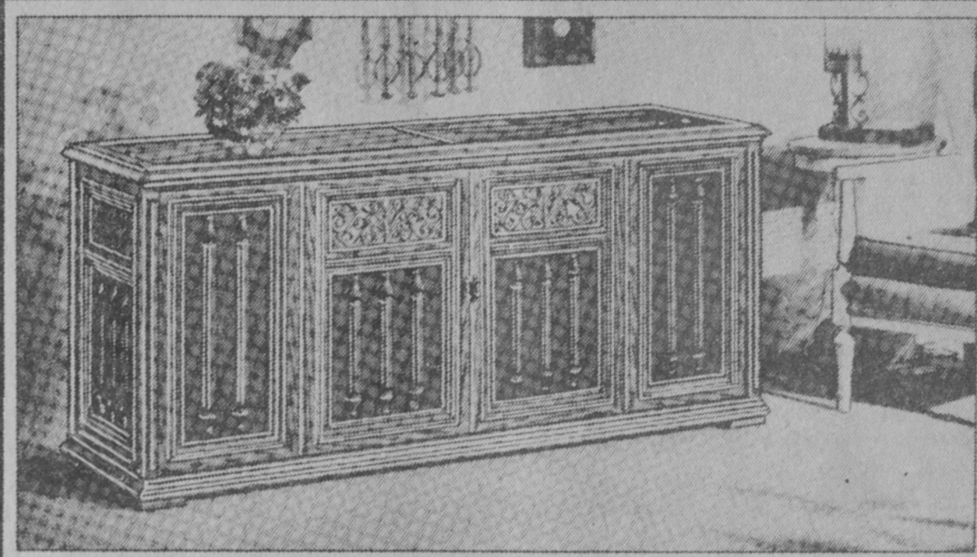
