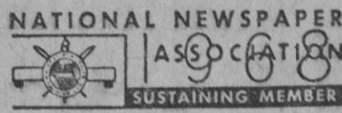

Adopt New Charter in Special Program

Service of celebration and charter meeting organizing the new Women's Society of Christian Service was held Thursday night at Tawas United Methodist Church, West Parish.

This service was similar to others held around the country during October marking the merging of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Methodist Church with the Women's Society of World Service of the Evangelical United Brethren Church. The two churches had merged earlier this year.

The WSCS was first organized in 1939-40, but its roots go back to 1869, when eight women met at the Tremont Street Church, Boston, Massachusetts, to organize the first Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Organization of home missionary societies soon followed and eventually all the locally organized societies became national bodies.

Some 35 members and four guests were present to witness signing of the new charter by Mrs. J. A. Mark, president, and other officers of the organization.

A musical prelude was followed

by invitation to membership and statement of purpose of the meeting. Call to worship was followed by the Hymn, "Now Thank We All Our God," and a silent prayer. There was presentation of the histories of parent groups.

Presiding at the charter signing table was Mrs. Charles VanHorn. Mrs. Maynard VanOrnum was program chairman. Others participating in the service were Mrs. Earl Davis, Mrs. Byron Mark, Mrs. Waldo Leslie, Mrs. Myron Trafelet, Mrs. Howard Staebler, Mrs. Carl Schaff, Mrs. John Hatton, Mrs. Edward Goodman, Mrs. Nelson Ulman and Mrs. Frances Sheeks. Mrs. Harold Knight was soloist.

During the business session, Mrs. Mark stated that the fall assembly of the Detroit Conference of WSCS would be held at the First Methodist Church, Midland, October 22.

Report on the upcoming bazaar was given by Mrs. Goodman, chairman.

New WSCS Charter Signed Tuesday Night

In April 1939, representatives of three branches of Methodism (The Methodist Episcopal Church; The Methodist Church, South, and The Methodist Protestant Church) met in Kansas City, Missouri, to consummate union and form The Methodist Church.

Seven years later in 1946, the Church of the United Brethren in Christ and The Evangelical Church came together, through their official representatives, and formed The Evangelical United Brethren Church.

From April 21 to May 4 of this year, the General Conferences of the Evangelical United Brethren and of The Methodist Church met in Dallas, Texas, to form a new church, The United Methodist Church.

This union brought together more than 11,000,000 members,

nearly 2,000,000 preparatory members, 43,070 local congregations, 32,721 ministers, 121 annual conferences and 64 active bishops.

Tuesday, October 8, the members of East Parish of the Tawas United Methodist Church, Women's Society of Christian Service met to sign the new charter of the new union.

Hale United Methodist Church WSCS will meet Thursday evening at 7:30 at the church. This is the charter meeting.

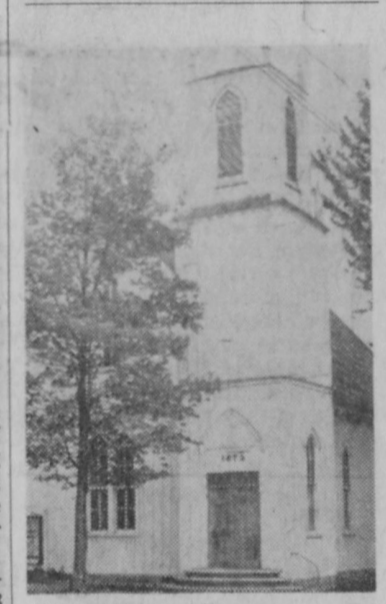

A pot-luck dinner will begin at noon. Families are to bring table service and a dish to pass.

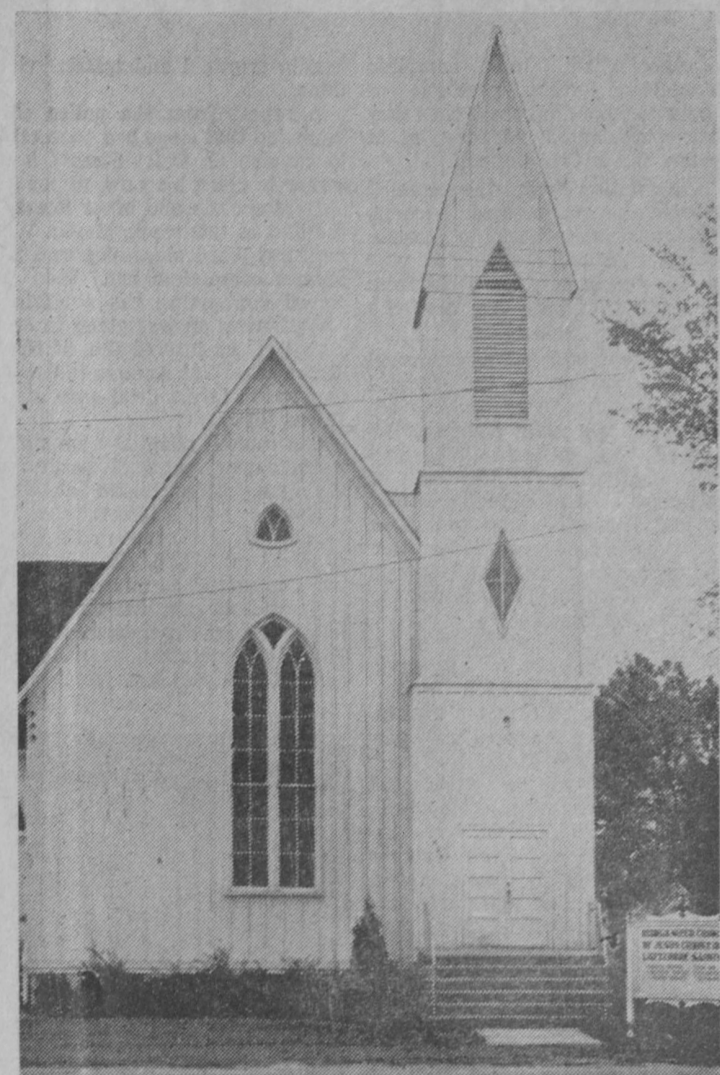

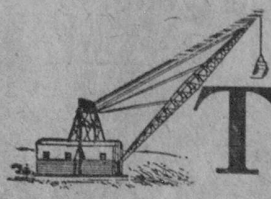

Long Pass Costly to Tawas Braves, but Central Happy---End Long Losing Streak

One defensive lapse late in Friday night's game cost the Tawas Area Braves a homecoming victory as an elated Standish-Sterling Central squad walked off the field with its first win in 20 games, 19-15.

Going into the last three minutes of the game, Tawas held a 15-13 lead on the strength of a 26-yard third quarter field goal by Steve Crisenbery.

Tawas' joys turned to sorrow as Larry LaLonde raced through the line and outdistanced Tawas' secondary to haul in a 35-yard pass from Greg Stanley and Central was able to break its losing ways for Coach Mike Hart.

Tawas Area started the game looking like a winner as the Braves picked up a S-S fumble and returned 22 yards. Mark Harris went in from the Central seven-yard line and Tawas held a 6-0 lead.

The Braves again started a drive in the second period with Harris again going over from the 15 to cap the 65-yard team effort.

Central came to life in the second period as Mike Demura went six yards to end a 50-yard march. The Panthers recovered a Tawas fumble just before half and Stanley passed 11 yards to LaLonde to score six points and Dubiel kicked the PAT.

The Tawas defensive line, led by Dave Rose, was able to contain Central's running game but the visitors' aerial game proved to be disastrous for the Braves.

Crisenbery had several good punts during the night to keep the Braves out of trouble.

Action this week finds the Braves going to Oscoda for its traditional eastern county rivalry. The Owls are tied with five other teams for leadership in the NBC.

Other NBC action last week saw Oscoda bound back from its 7-6 loss to Essexville Garber a week ago to hand Gladwin its first loss, 31-13. Garber was edged out at Pineconing, 21-18, while Ogemaw Heights rallied for a fourth quarter score to turn back Carrollton, 25-19.

Cards Blanked by Visiting Beaverton, 25-0

Whittemore-Prescott Cardinals were blanked by visiting Beaverton, 25-0, in Northeastern Michigan Conference action Friday night.

Carter Schuhmacher scored three touchdowns for Beaverton, his first on a five-yard option; the second with a one-yard quarterback sneak and the third in the last period 25 yards off tackle.

Lone conversion was added by Bill Bishler after the opening TD with a place kick. The other score came after Mike Cingano blocked a Cardinal punt and Mike Loar scooped up the ball and took it over the goal.

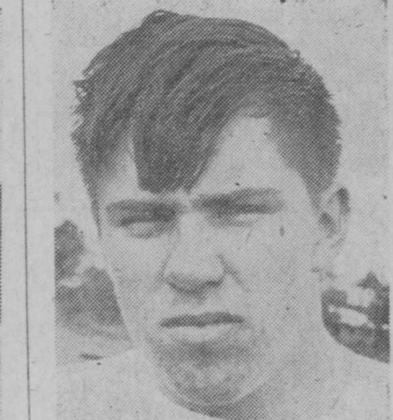
both. Shellenbarger caught five passes for 61 yards and Warren Miller pulled in three passes good for 52 yards.

The Eagles play at Atlanta Saturday.



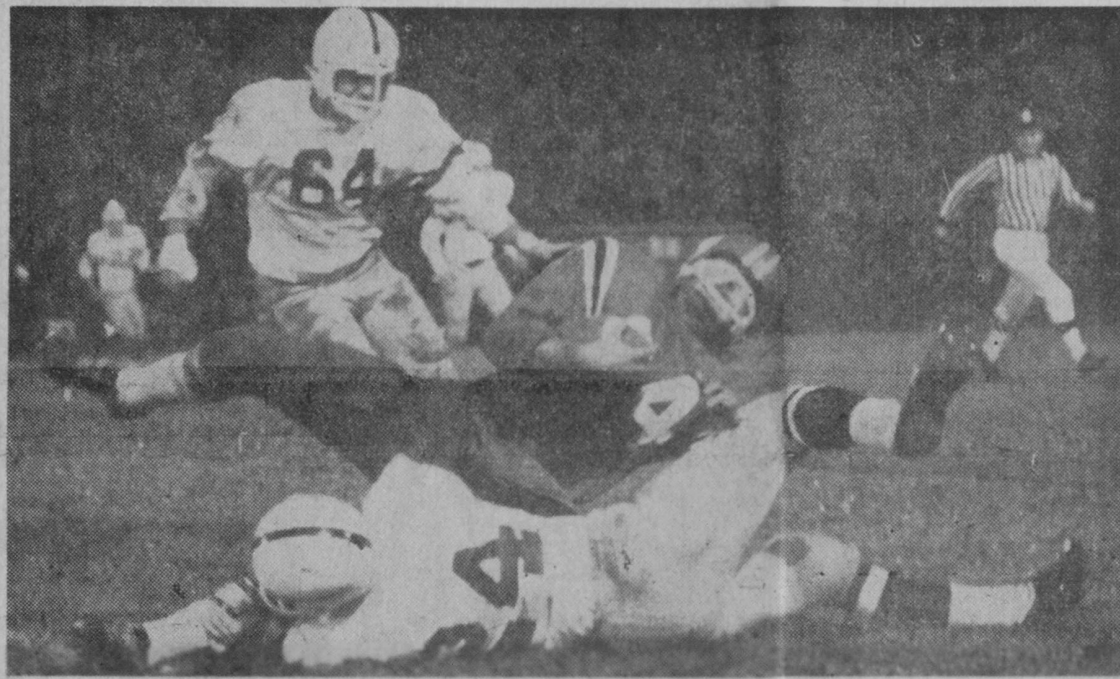

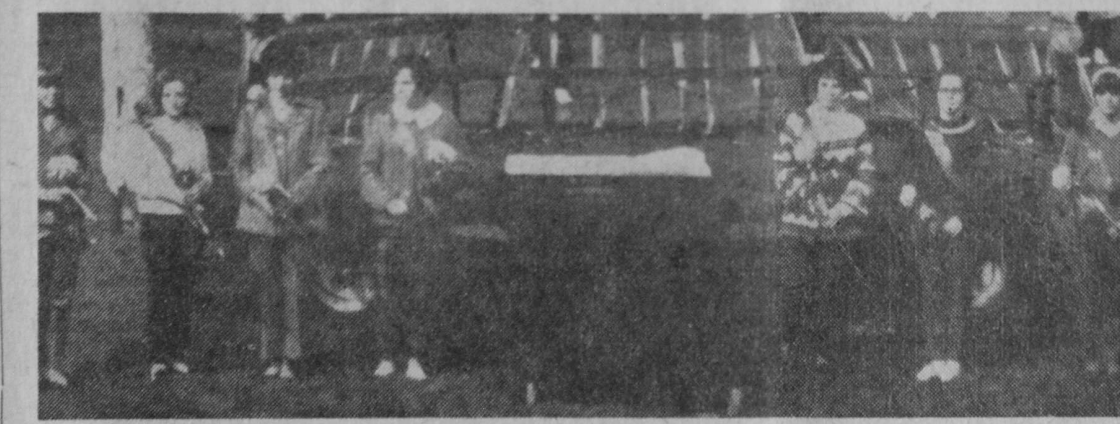

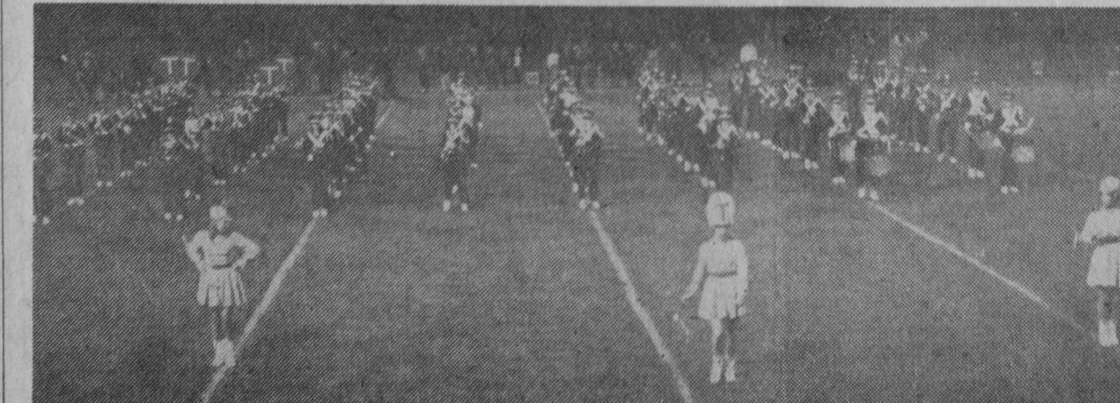

Initiate Proof of Age Early To Assure SS

Proof of age continues to be the single largest problem in processing social security claims. John Carr, district manager of Social Security in Bay City, noted today. "And this is unfortunate," Mr. Carr said, "since all too often the first social security check is delayed because action in securing proof of age was not initiated early enough." If steps are taken ahead of time to get the necessary evidence before making an application payments can be speeded up.

Mr. Carr listed the types of evidence that can be used as proof of age. After a third of a century of experience in evaluating proof of age, the social security administration has concluded that the best evidence is a birth certificate or a church baptismal record, established before age five. If either of these is not available, an effort must be made to obtain a record established early in life. The older this record is the better, because old records are generally reliable. Records which may be available are school records, church record showing date of birth or age, state or federal census records established shortly after birth, a statement signed by the physician who was in attendance at the birth as to the date of birth shown on records, Bible or other family records, insurance policy, marriage record, passport, employment record, military record, delayed birth certificate (one that was established after age four), child's birth certificate which shows age of parents and many others.
