

# Student Influx Causes Concern at TA Schools

An "immigration" of 60 students over the total enrollment anticipated this fall has created what could be a serious problem for Tawas Area Schools.

According to a report Monday night from Supt. Reynold Mick, total elementary enrollment as of Monday was 890, an increase of 36 over what was anticipated last spring. Total high school enrollment as of Monday was 940, 24 students more than anticipated.

The head count in high school on Friday was 932, but eight new students showed up Monday morning.

As has been the trend here in recent years—with the exception

of 1967-68 — kindergarten enrollment has been decreasing. This is believed to be caused by younger families moving out of the area and being replaced by families with older children. Last year, kindergarten was at an all time high of 174 pupils in six sections, compared to four sections for the two preceding years.

Elementary enrollment as of Friday was as follows: Kindergarten, 122, an increase of four over last spring's estimate; first grade, 174, an increase of 12; second grade, 117, four lower than what was estimated; third grade, 99, four higher than estimated; fourth grade, 130, 15 higher than anticipated; fifth grade, 128, an increase of three; sixth grade, 116, the figure exactly as estimated last spring.

Included in the first grade total are 10 pupils from St. Joseph School. This transfer had been anticipated last spring.

According to school census figures, an enrollment of 100 kindergartners is expected next year and the same for the year following.

The real pinch for school officials is now coming in the high school, as predicted five years ago by Supt. Reynold Mick. The high school, constructed in 1957, was originally designed for 625 students, utilizing classrooms at 100 percent capacity. The five-classroom addition under the first five-year expansion plan, plus facilities offered by the new shop, provides classroom space for an additional 360 students.

Total quarters, utilizing classrooms at 100 percent of capacity, can handle 985 students.

A very grave problem would exist next year, should the immigration of high school students continue. He said that temporary facilities would have to be provided, because classrooms cannot operate at 100 percent of capacity.

As it now appears, crowding would be alleviated once present elementary grades begin to enter high school.

Junior and senior high school enrollments as of Monday morning were as follows: Seventh grade, 153, five more than expected; eighth grade, 153, five less than anticipated last spring; ninth grade, 158, the exact number expected.

# Harris is President of Hospital Trustees

Sister M. Verence, SSJ, superior general of the Sisters of St. Joseph at Nazareth, today announced the election of Richard Harris, East Tawas, to the presidency of the board of trustees of Tawas Hospital.

Harris has served on the board since May 23, 1967, when he, along with two other Tawas area residents, L. G. McKay Jr. and Maynard VanOrnum, became the first laymen to serve on the hospital board.

Harris is plant manager for National Gypsum Company at National City.

Also announced was the appointment of James W. Reynolds as trustee. Reynolds is executive vice president of the Oscoda State Savings Bank, Oscoda, and is the first resident of Oscoda to serve on the board.

Other board members are Sister M. Aloysis, vice president; Sister M. Rosalind, secretary; Sister M. Laurentis, treasurer; Sister Mary Cox, trustee, all of Nazareth.

Besides McKay and VanOrnum as trustees, Jerry Norwood, hospital director, is ex officio member of the board.

## Would Tide Expenses Over Until Taxtime

For the first time in 10 years, Tawas Area School will have to borrow on anticipated revenue to tide its operation expenses over until receipt of property taxes in December.

The board of education Monday night authorized Supt. Reynold Mick to set legal machinery in motion seeking permission from the Michigan Finance Commission to borrow approximately \$40,000 on anticipated state aid.

After permission is granted from the state, the school must advertise for bidders on this money, according to state law.

Estimated school expenses for the first four months of the term amount to \$278,900. Total funds available during that time would amount to \$238,236.

This would include two state aid payments totaling \$120,000, a balance on hand in the treasury of \$74,556, estimated delinquent taxes of \$15,000, student fees of \$14,000, certificates of deposit of \$10,000, driver training money of \$3,900 and vocational education money of \$780.

While borrowing on anticipated revenue has been normal procedure for a number of schools in the state, Tawas Area School, since 1958, had maintained a large enough balance in its treasury to tide operations over until receipt of property taxes.

Ten years ago, nearly all schools in the state had to borrow on anticipated revenue when the state was late with its payments. When revenue was finally received, state aid checks were distributed by state police patrol cars.

Because of the extra cost involved in borrowing money—attorney fees, advertising expenses and interest—the board of education at that time started to build up a surplus fund through the legal transfer of approximately five percent of its state aid funds each year. At one time, this operating balance amounted to approximately \$175,000.

In recent years, the board of education came under severe criticism locally for maintaining such a large balance in its treasury. As a result, the school began reducing the surplus by including the money in its annual operational expenses.

Much of the surplus was used last year for much needed curriculum improvements and hiring additional teachers.

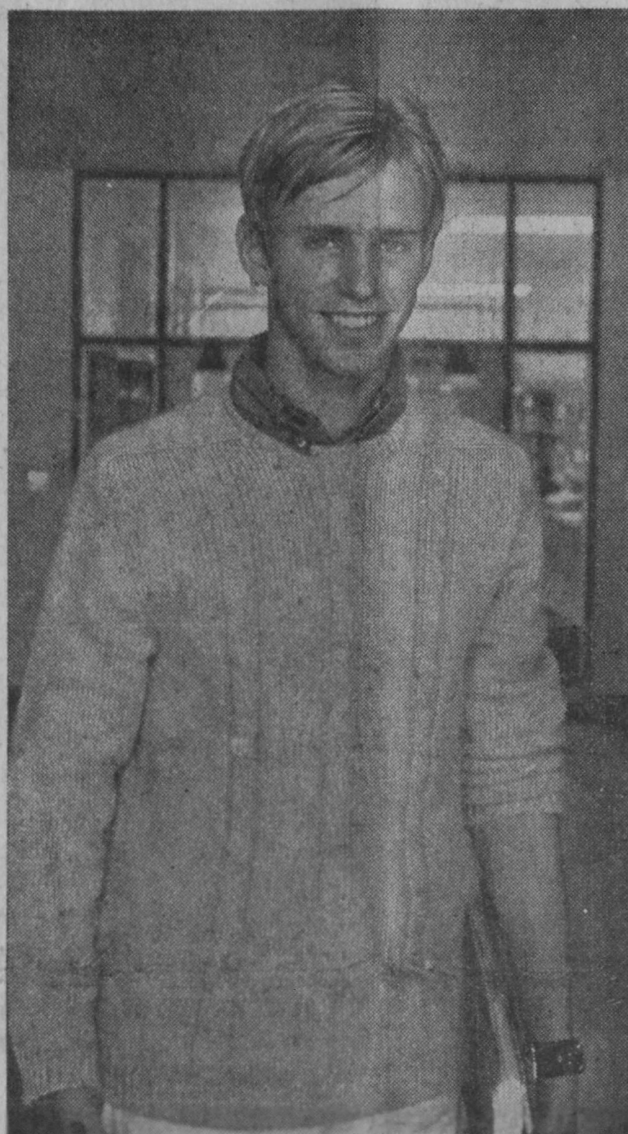

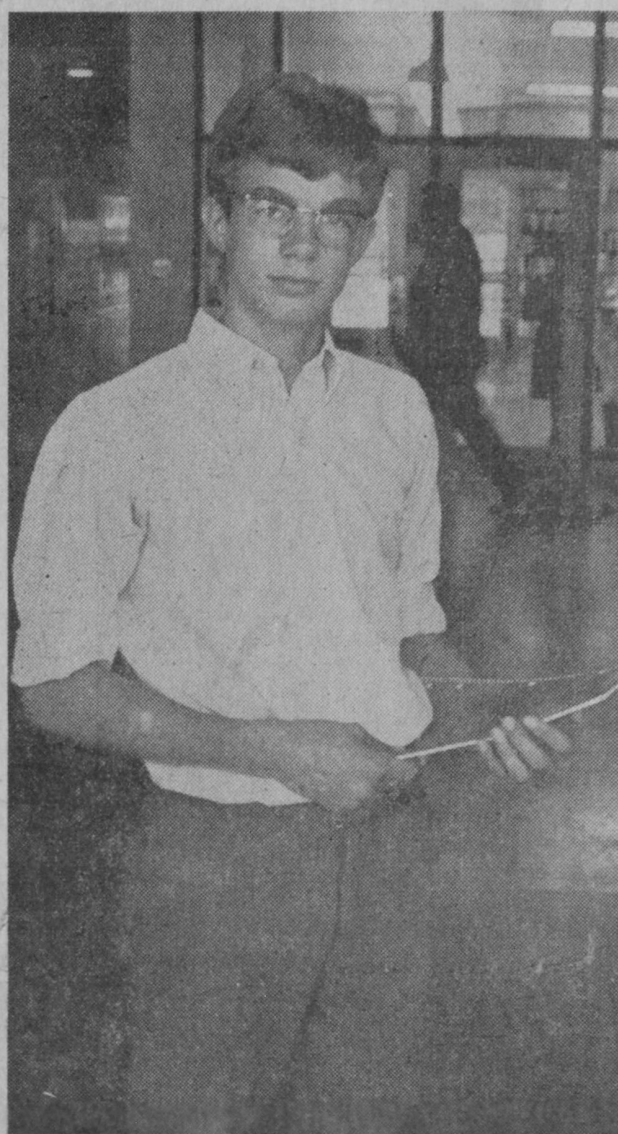

# Three European Exchange Students Begin Senior Year at Tawas A. High

Three European youths entered their senior year at Tawas Area High School last week through the Youth for Understanding program. Their next year spent with "adopted families" in the community will provide a valuable experience in life for themselves, as well as giving local citizens an opportunity to better understand people in the country which they represent.

The boys are Per Rudman, 18, who lives near Gothenburg, Sweden; Michael Flohr, 17, Hamburg, Germany; and Morten Spro, 17, Oslo, Norway.

"I am curious to learn more about the entire country," said Rudman, who confided that he is particularly interested in schools and how schools are administered. This curiosity is natural for his father, Eric, is a school principal.

"If people can understand each other, they can get along together," was one point which he expressed.

Rudman, who is residing with the Rev. and Mrs. Ronald R. Farah in Tawas City, likes to meet people and talk with them. At home, he belonged to a discussion group among pupils, although it is not a school activity. Literature is one of his main interests.

He is planning a career as a medical doctor and his high school education has been along a science track with emphasis on mathematics, physics, chemistry and biology. Other subjects include German, English, French, history, government, art and music, as well as physical education.

Per has a sister, Charlotte, who is 22 years of age.

Like all exchange students, his required subjects here will be United States History, government and English. His two elective subjects are journalism and speech.

Flohr, who is living with Mr. and Mrs. Robert Elliott of East Tawas, is interested in following in the

footsteps of his father, Adolf, who is a building engineer in Hamburg.

Michael attended the Friedrich Ebert School and his 15 subjects last year included Latin, Greek, German, English, mathematics, world history, geography, biology, physics, chemistry, music, art and physical education.

Such a schedule for a high school boy usually amazes most Americans, but Michael points out that five of the subjects are considered "solids"—that is, he has five classes each week in Latin and Greek, four classes in German and three each in English and mathematics. Two classes are devoted each week to the remaining subjects.

While Michael is the smaller of the three boys, he is very much interested in sports and he belongs to the soccer club at his home school. "I might even try out for football," he said. Tawas football fans will always remember the

kicking last year of another exchange student here, Esben Pedersen.

Michael said he learned of the exchange program through his English teacher. "I filled out the required forms and was selected for the trip after participating in three days of discussion in class," he said.

"The Youth for Understanding program stresses that we come to this country without any preconceived ideas on what to expect—we have an open mind," said Spro, who is living with Mr. and Mrs. Stuart Bailey of East Tawas.

Like the boy from Sweden, Morten's father, Aage, is principal in a secondary school. He is still undecided as to a future career.

Morten's subjects last year included Norwegian, composition, mathematics, German, English, physics, geography, history, literature and physical education. His course of study has been in a tech-

nical track. He spends 38 hours a week in classes.

Living in Northern Michigan will be quite a change for Morten, who has always resided in a metropolitan area. He hopes to visit Detroit before returning home.

While he attended school six days a week at home, he found time to work as a lifeguard during summer months and usually worked in small shops at Christmas to earn extra spending money.

His hobby is stamp collecting.

# Citizens' Group Adopts Name; Weekly Meetings on School Problems Continue

Official name of a new group organized to aid Tawas Area Schools is Citizens United for Better Education—to be known as CUBE.

This group is to meet every Thursday night, 7:30 o'clock, at the high school. Meetings are to be adjourned at 9:00 p. m.

At last week's regular meeting, Neil Luedtke, chairman, emphasized that when speaking as a member of the citizens group, members should be sure to have the facts. "Do not argue, present the facts," said Luedtke.

In answer to one question raised recently, it was reported that use of other than qualified teachers in

the study hall is contrary to state law and any school which follows this practice would be violating the law.

Plans were formulated to have representatives of various student groups present at future meetings, in addition to a representative from the senior citizens group.

Mrs. D. A. Evans and Mrs. Robert Erickson of the English department reported on problems created due to cutbacks in the program of that department. English teachers now have five classes with approximately 150 students, thereby greatly increasing the correction and preparation load, necessitating

extensive reading and week-end work. Since English is one of the vital educational subjects necessary in communicating one's skills in future job placement or education, it was felt restoration of an assistant to correct English papers should be made, if at all possible.

Plans were made to have each department head report on the most pressing problems due to cutbacks.

Supt. Reynold Mick reported that the two teachers who the school had hoped to hire were now under contract to the Oscoda Area School. He saw no possibility of securing additional teachers before

the end of the semester. Mick further reported that the assistant high school principal is now handling three study halls and the curriculum coordinator is teaching two mathematics classes and may handle a study hall.

Progress reports were received from the various committees and chairmen were instructed to have reports finalized for the next meeting.

Clyde Soper, co-chairman, suggested that the board of education meet in a larger room so citizens would feel free to attend meetings and that the board have a permanent

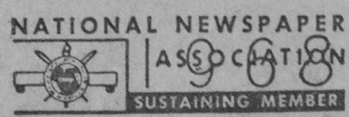

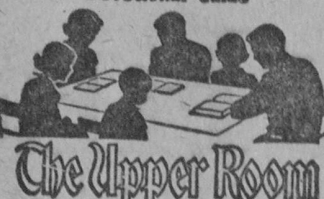

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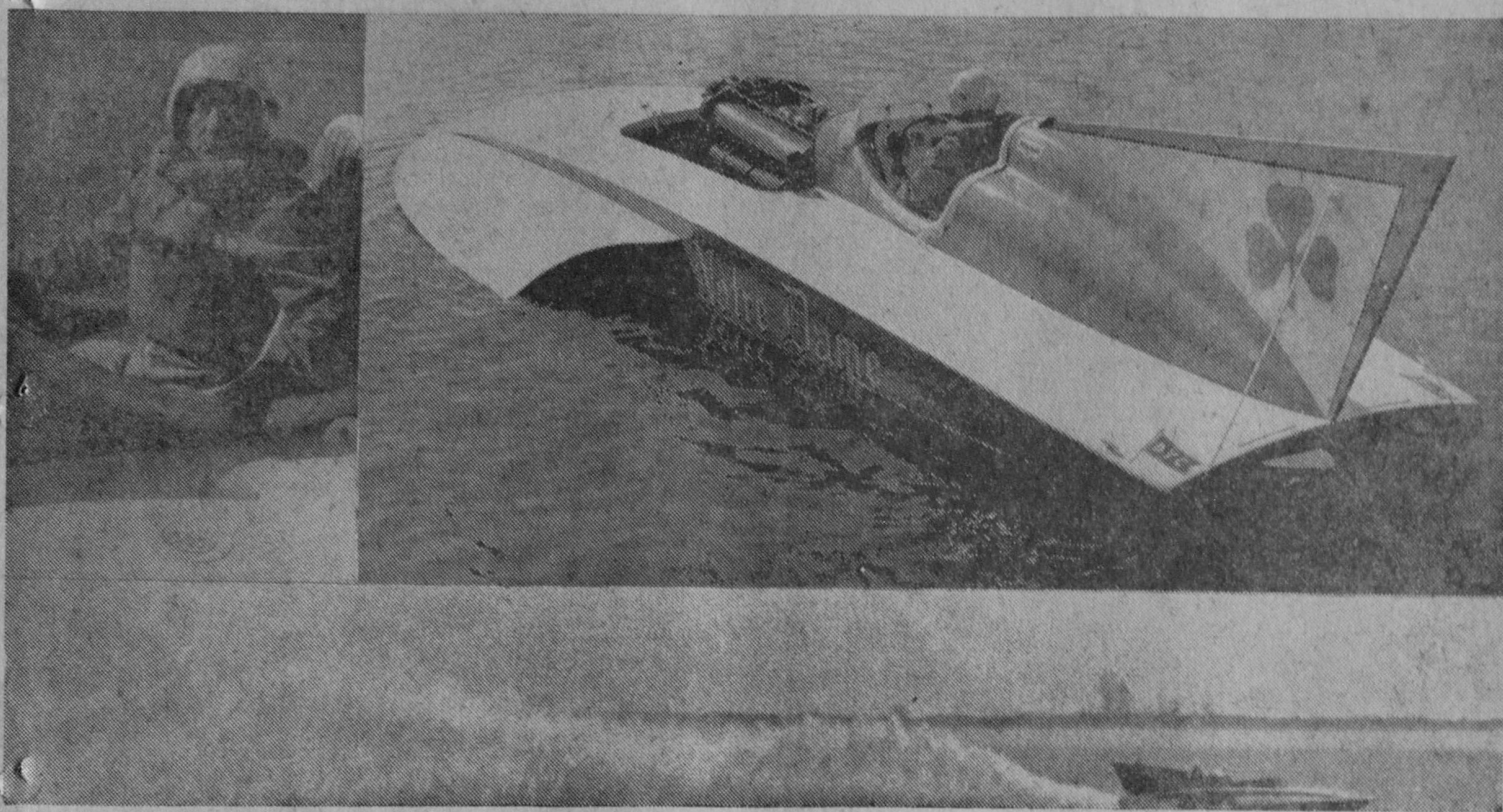

## Gold Cup Race Injuries Fatal to Col. Gardner, WW II Ace

Col. Warner Gardner, 52, formerly stationed at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, died Monday nearly 23 hours after he was pulled lifeless from the Detroit River and brought back to life by a team of doctors in the intensive care unit of Detroit General Hospital.

His injuries, a massive blood clot at the base of the brain, along with seven fractured ribs, were too extensive.

Gardner's hydroplane, Miss Eagle Electric, crashed at 155 to 160 miles per hour during the final heat of the Gold Cup race. After the boat became airborne, its right sponson dug into the water and then flipped, pieces of the ship flying high into the air.

One hydroplane was ahead of him winding up the second lap and Gardner had not slowed when he hit a roller. The brown and yellow hydroplane, powered by a Rolls Royce engine—the kind that powered P-51 Mustangs and Spitfires in World War II—lifted up. Gardner was an ace in World

War II. He had six enemy kills over Africa and Europe and stayed in the air force after the war, moving on to jets. As a hobby, he began driving class power boats. Six years ago, he got the big boat bug when he was operations officer at Wurtsmith.

While visiting designer, Les Staudacher, at Kawkawlin, Gardner got his first ride on an unlimited and he loved it.

Shirley Mendelsohn McDonald of Detroit bought Staudacher's boat and named it the Notre Dame. In April 1963, Gardner used Tawas

## No Eligible Teachers Available for Hire

In a report to Tawas Area Board of Education on its directive to cut some services offered by the school as the result of inadequate financing this year, school administrators reported Monday night that no eligible teachers were available for elementary or secondary vacancies.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal, reported that teachers who stated an intention to teach here are to teach at Oscoda Area Schools.

In an effort to assist the English department, which averages 32 students per teacher, the board authorized hiring Mrs. David Featheringill to correct papers.

Following reinstatement of the cadet band program last week, the board thought it only fair to reinstate cross-country and authorized hiring of Robert McDonald at a salary of \$300.

Elementary band was not reinstated as Gene Salomony, director, has one study hall. It had been suggested that John Alexander take this one study hall, but the board of education felt that taking of two mathematics classes by Alexander, plus operation of the audio visual department, would not leave enough time for his work as curriculum coordinator.

Bill McIntosh, assistant principal, who has charge of three study halls this year plus noon duty, said that additional help was needed to handle corridors during the lunch hour, particularly in the junior high wing where part time administrators were returned to teaching duties.

After a two-week delay while finances were studied, a salary increase of five percent was granted to cafeteria workers. Total estimated cost to the school would be \$1,028. It is anticipated that the increase in individual lunch costs

may offset this expense, although it was pointed out that participation by students may show a reduction at the end of the year due to the increased hot lunch fee.

The annual audit of school finances was given by Yeo and Yeo, certified public accountants, East Tawas.

The board authorized the Future Teachers Club to operate a paper back book store adjacent to the library. It would be open before school starts in the morning, during noon hour and after school. Billy Wilder, principal, said that selected paper back books would be offered, other than those obtainable locally.

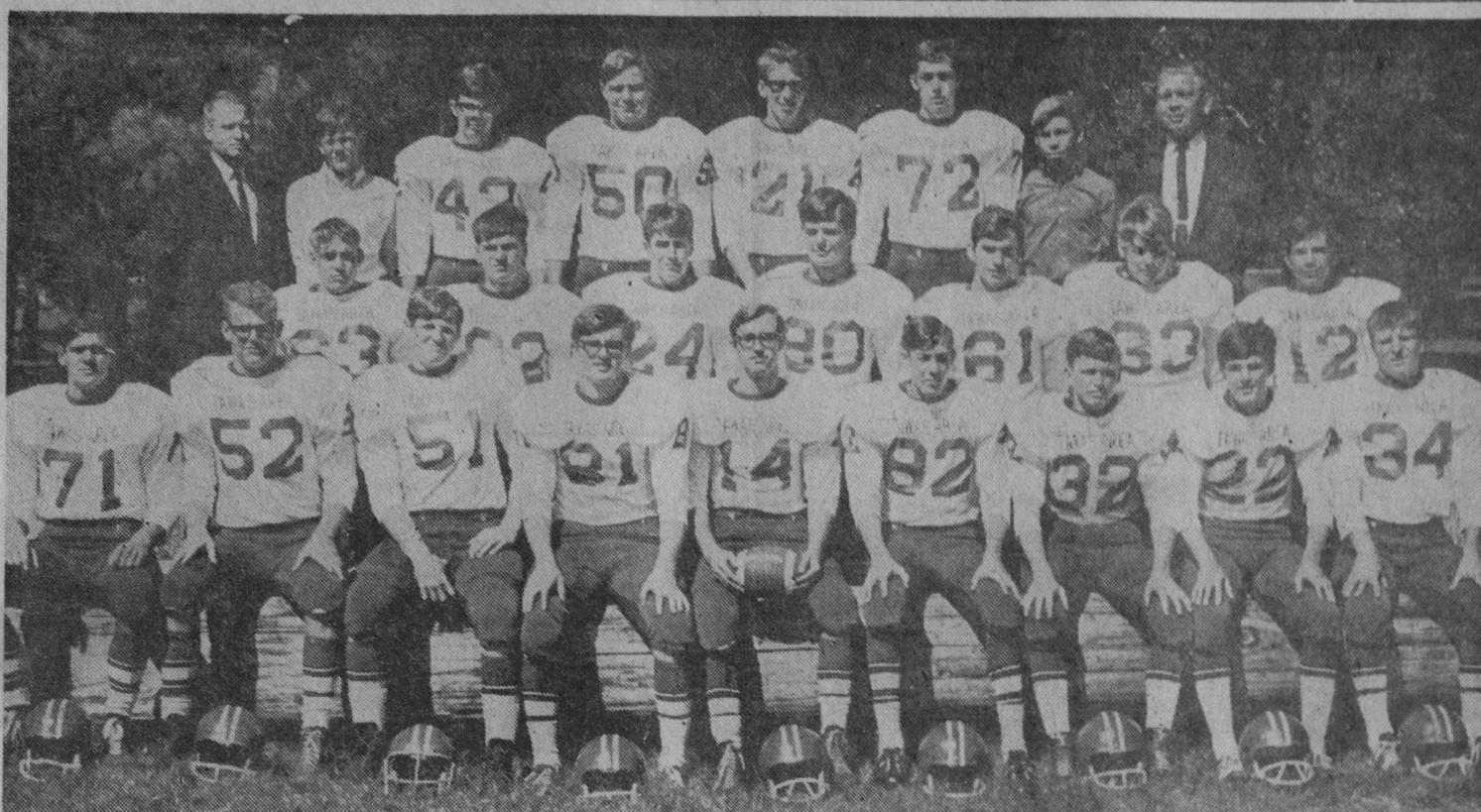
