## Survey Seeks Needs in Community Ed.

All postoffice boxholders in the Tawas Area School District received a questionnaire Saturday pertaining to implementation of the community school program adopted for this year by the board of education.

The community school philosophy stems from the idea that schools belong to the people of the community and that the school's facilities should be made available for utilization by the people. This not only includes school-age students, but all people of the community.

"Because of the wide and varied interest of people," said Gene R. Gerber, community school director, "we must know what your wants, needs and interests are in order to implement the community school program."

Instead of sending out periodic questionnaires, the director decided to send one comprehensive survey to answer all the immediate questions that must be known, as well as to answer any questions for future programming.

"Preferably, all members of the family should be involved in completing this survey as many of the questions pertain to the entire family," said Gerber. "This survey provides to you the opportunity to convey your interests and needs."

Deadline for returning this survey is October 1. He suggests that the survey be completed and returned as soon as possible, either to elementary school offices, the high school or the administration office on Newman Street, East Tawas.

The survey asks such questions as the number of persons living in a household, organizations attended by the family, special interests or skills that could be used in the program and a list of 90 possible offerings in the educational program.

Registration for adult basic education, adult high school and adult enrichment courses opened Monday and are to continue through Thursday. Registrations will be taken daily at the high school, 7:00 to 9:00 p. m., or anyone interested may telephone Gerber at 362-2381.

A counselor will be available to assist prospective adults set up a

program for a high school diploma. This program is designed to allow adults, who have not completed high school, the opportunity to do so.

All classes for the first term are to begin September 23 and finish by December 13. Adult high school classes are offered at no charge to any adult interested in working toward a high school diploma.

Classes offered this term will be determined by needs of those who enroll. A suggestion of classes available would include United States History, American Government, typing, bookkeeping, auto mechanics and art.

Adult basic education classes now being offered free of charge include basic English, beginning reading and basic mathematics. These classes are designed for adults needing help in basic education. Anyone not finishing high school would be vitally interested.

Many students have bettered themselves in their jobs and even obtained work by completing classes. Upon receiving the education from these classes, students may continue with high school credit.

Registration also opens for adult enrichment courses. It is not necessary to pay fees in advance for this part of the program, as registration may be made by telephoning the community school director.

Classes to be offered include beginning sewing, oil painting, beginning bridge, square dancing, lapidary, typing, ballroom dancing, basic auto mechanics, amateur radio, men's recreation and women's figure control. There will be a fee for most of these classes.

## State May Help Area to Expand Launching Sites

Officials of the Tawas are to make a joint presentation to the Michigan Waterways Commission Wednesday morning (today) seeking expansion of area facilities to handle next fall's expected deluge of coho fishermen.

Charles Lattimer, commission chairman, is to meet with representatives of both cities at the Barnes Hotel, where presentations are to be made by Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works of Tawas City, and Mayor James Campbell of East Tawas.

Following this meeting, Lattimer and other state officials are to be taken on a tour of waterfront facilities to see first hand what is being planned by the cities.

Carl Babcock, chairman of the Tawas Harbor Commission, has emphasized that officials from both communities have seen the need for cooperation in this joint venture.

The waterways commission has funds available to assist local communities in development of waterfront boat launching facilities, as well as to develop parking and comfort stations. Funding would be 90 percent from the state and 10 percent from the local community.

The harbor chairman said that the Lake Huron shore communities could benefit from the experience gained last year in Western Michigan, where communities were swamped with fishermen.

"Those attending a preliminary meeting Tuesday noon to establish spokesmen for the presentation

were pretty well agreed that development of local facilities to handle coho fishermen in late summer and fall would be extremely beneficial to the community through year around use," said Babcock.

Tawas City's presentation is to include the two launching ramps already constructed on the Tawas River along Ninth Avenue, along with two new ramps presently under construction. Located on leased property from the Detroit and Mackinac Railway, there is room for a third double launching ramp.

Located adjacent to the ramps and west of Ninth Avenue is a site of 19 acres recently purchased by the city for industrial use. Part of this property could be utilized for parking. Installation of range markers at the river mouth is also contemplated.

"The city realizes its needs and its limitations in such a project," said Bublitz.

Proposed expansion at East Tawas outlined by Campbell included construction of 16 12-foot ramps on city property at the old Anderson Coach site. An additional six ramps could be constructed at the rear of the state police post.

The parking area at the foot of Newman Street would be expanded to 242 spaces. In addition, the city would utilize the old county airport for 600 parking spaces for cars and boat trailers. A shuttle bus would operate between ramps and this parking area.

East Tawas also proposed to purchase the former MacAndrew dock to be used as a small boat harbor. Babcock expressed the opinion that the inventory of recent land purchases by the two cities, as well as development of present boat launching facilities, would be more than enough to account for the cities' 10 percent share for state participation.

The fire was discovered about 5:00 a. m. by a neighbor. A nearby barn was saved, but the house was practically demolished by the time firemen received the alarm.

## Committee Lists Reasons for Hiring Assistant Principal

(Following is the first of a series of articles formulated by CUBE (Citizens United for Better Education) to inform the community of our needs in providing quality education for our children)

Up until the 1954-1955 school year, supervision of junior high was the responsibility of individual teachers. During that year, the principal supervised the high school only—about 330 pupils. It soon became obvious, as enrollment increased, that joint supervision and coordination of junior high and senior high was necessary and, in the 1957-58 school year, Tawas Area School had a full time principal and a part time junior high principal, who taught part time and was administrator for the rest of the time. During that year, the school had 585 students in junior and senior high.

Ten years later in the fall of 1968, the junior-senior high count had risen to over 900 pupils and it was felt that a full time assistant

principal was needed. In addition to freeing the principal for trips to various campuses in order to contact new teachers, organize conferences with the teaching staff, school board and auxiliary community organizations, make regular visits to classrooms to instruct and evaluate teachers and the general administration of a thousand students and teachers, the assistant principal also was given the duties of director of athletics, director of driver education, and far from least, the organization of preventive assistance in disciplinary matters.

By far, the most significant need for an assistant principal, however, came into being with responsibilities imposed on the school by the Teacher Tenure Act. This act made it mandatory for the principal to visit classrooms regularly, keep a continuing record of teacher ability and performance and make recommendations as to whether or not a teacher should be granted tenure. Once a teacher is accepted by the school and given

tenure, it is a difficult, time consuming job to dismiss him. The principal must spend enough time in each teacher's classroom to be able to make proper judgment. In the case of experienced teachers hired from other schools, who were previously under tenure, the principal will often have only six months to decide whether the teacher should or should not be given tenure.

As can be seen from the above reasoning, one principal for 330 pupils in 1954-55 would indicate three full time principals with today's enrollment of 940 pupils. We the Citizens United for Better Education (CUBE) feel that our school definitely needs two full-time administrators—a principal and an assistant principal.

## East Tawas Gives Extra Time for Sewer Work

Fraser Brothers Construction Company has been granted a 60-day extension of time to complete East Tawas' new sewer disposal system.

In granting the request, East Tawas Council Monday night noted that the contractor had been delayed by severe weather conditions last winter resulting in deep frost, plus flooding conditions this spring.

No objection to the extension was given by Spicer Engineering Company and the department of public works recommended the action.

Fraser Brothers Construction Company was to have completed the project by August 29. The project now has a November 30 completion date.

Negotiations are being completed this week on obtaining easements across the final three parcels of property to construct a sanitary sewer parallel to Tawas Beach Road to serve that area. Construction is to start later this week or early next week.

In other business, the council adopted recommendations from the finance committee calling for the following salaries to be paid city employees:

Assessor, \$600 annually; librarian, \$210 per month; office manager, \$335 per month; office clerk, \$155 per hour; superintendent of public works, \$650 per month; foreman, \$525 per month; truck driver, \$255 per hour; heavy equipment operator, \$265 per hour; laborers, \$230 per hour.

Water plant assistant, \$260 per hour; police chief, \$600 per month; patrolman, \$475 per month; janitor, \$220 per hour; meter reader, \$160 per hour; park manager, \$6,800 per year; assistant manager, \$5,650 per year; election board members, \$150 per hour.

The committee recommended that hourly rated employees be given six holidays per year. Alderman Earl Hester and three other members of the council are (See ET COUNCIL, page 6.)

## Death Takes Former Chamber President

Roy J. McMurray, 72, retired physical education supervisor for Saginaw schools and a past presi-

dent of Tawas Chamber of Commerce, died September 10 at his home in East Tawas.

Born in East Tawas, July 26, 1896, McMurray was graduated from Michigan State Normal College in 1918 and was named physical education supervisor for Saginaw's east side schools February 1, 1919. He also coached basketball and baseball at Saginaw High School in 1919-20.

When the east and west side school districts of Saginaw were consolidated in 1926, McMurray was named physical education supervisor.

He served as president of the Michigan Physical Education Association from 1935 to 1938. He was president of Saginaw Valley Junior High Association from 1926 to 1937 and head of the Saginaw Teacher's Club in 1928-1929.

He had been a member of numerous health, physical education and recreation associations, serving on the state athletic council starting in 1935.

In addition, McMurray headed safety work in Saginaw schools and was organizer and mentor of the Junior Citizens' Council.

On June 11, 1949, he received an honorary master of education degree from Eastern Michigan University, Ypsilanti, in recognition of his distinguished service in the field of education. He had taken postgraduate work in physical education at the University of Michigan, Central Michigan University, Michigan State University, Western Michigan and Valparaiso University.

Following his retirement in 1958, McMurray and his family returned to Tawas City where he operated his bait shop on the shore of Tawas Bay.

He served two terms as president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce and was a charter member of Audie Johnson Post, American Legion, East Tawas. He was a veteran of World War I.

Funeral services were held September 13 at St. Joseph Church. Burial was in Greenwood Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Hortense; three sons, Roy and Eugene, both of Flint, and John, Saginaw; three daughters, Miss Anneige and Miss Betty J., both at home, and Mrs. Joan Emmington, Lincoln; 19 grandchildren.

## 3-3 Tie Mayor Casts Deciding Vote on Treasurer

Tawas City Council named Mrs. Frank Byrd as the new city treasurer to fill out the unexpired term of Mrs. Ruth Albertson, but it took a tie-breaking vote by the mayor to decide the issue.

When Mrs. Albertson presented her resignation to the council, to become effective October 1, she had recommended Mrs. Lester Klein as her successor.

Mayor Russell A. Rollin Sr. announced Monday night that he had received a letter from Mrs. Byrd seeking the position. He also stated that John Forsten, retired Tawas Area School teacher, had made verbal application.

Rollin told the council that it was the duty of councilmen, according to state law, to submit names of candidates for the office to be filled. A study of statutes revealed that the mayor may fill vacancies only for appointive officers—not elective. The city could also have held a special election to fill the vacancy.

When asked for a recommendation, Rollin suggested the name of Mrs. Byrd, who formerly served as office manager for the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Committee at the Federal Building. The name of Mrs. Byrd was then entered into nomination by Alderman Martin Wellna, while Alderman Cecil Cable nominated Mrs. Klein.

A vote by secret ballot among councilmen gave three votes for Mrs. Byrd and three votes for Mrs. Klein.

Mrs. Byrd will fill out the balance of the treasurer's term and a treasurer is to be named at the annual spring election next April.

## 'Bert' Stoll Dead; Veteran State Newsman

Albert E. "Bert" Stoll, 65, of East Tawas, whose outdoor column, "Northern Trails," was featured in the Detroit Free Press and other Michigan newspapers, died early Saturday at Tawas Hospital after a lingering illness.

Funeral services were held Tuesday from Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas. The body was taken to Flint for cremation.

He is survived by his wife, Anita; one son, Peter; four grandchildren; brother, Robert A. Stoll, Leawood, Kansas; one sister, Mrs. D. C. Kies, Battle Creek.

Born at Oxford September 22, 1902, he attended Hillsdale College and graduated from the University of Michigan in 1929.

He began his newspaper career in 1924 as a Detroit newspaper correspondent, continued with a five-year stint on the Detroit News and had considerable free lancing.

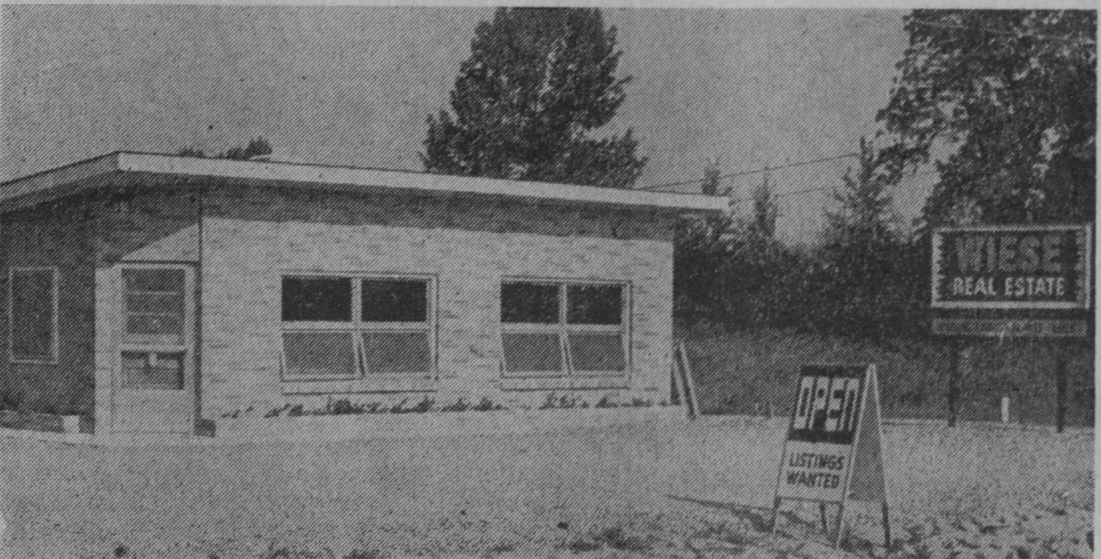
He came to East Tawas in 1937 and worked as a reporter for the Tawas Herald for several months before joining the editorial staff of The Bay City Times. He was named outdoor writer for Booth Newspapers in 1945, a position which he held until returning to free lancing in the middle 1950s.

A member of Sigma Delta Chi, he had served as president of the Michigan Outdoor Writers Association.

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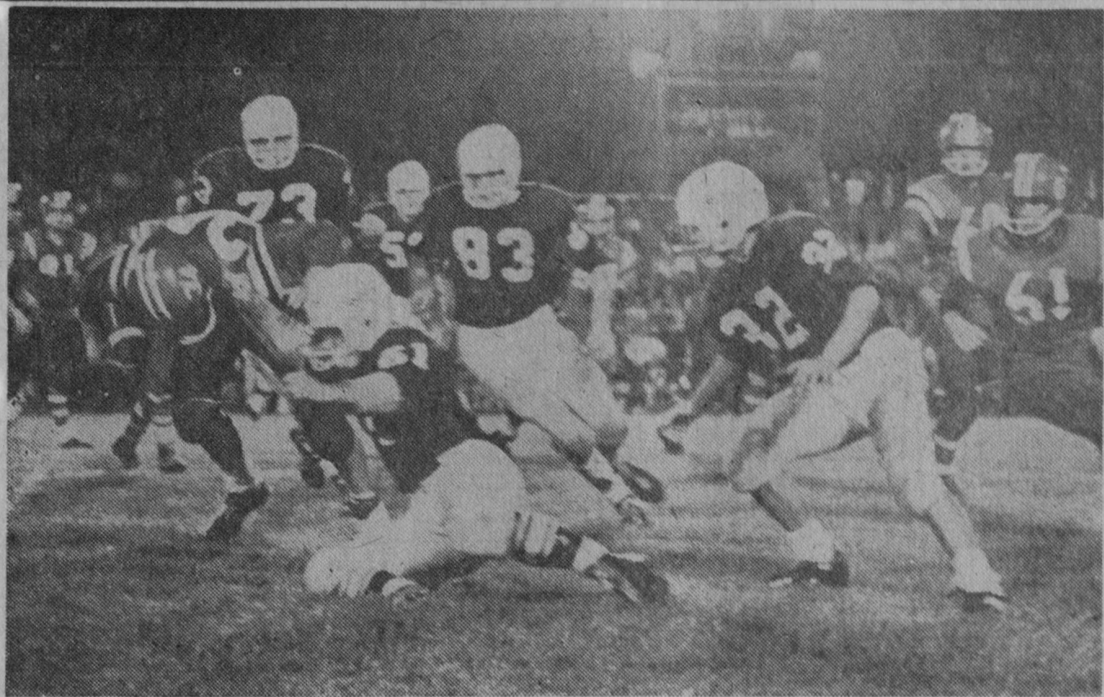

Then with five minutes, 14 seconds, left on the clock, Wrzesinski pitched out to Halfback Kevin

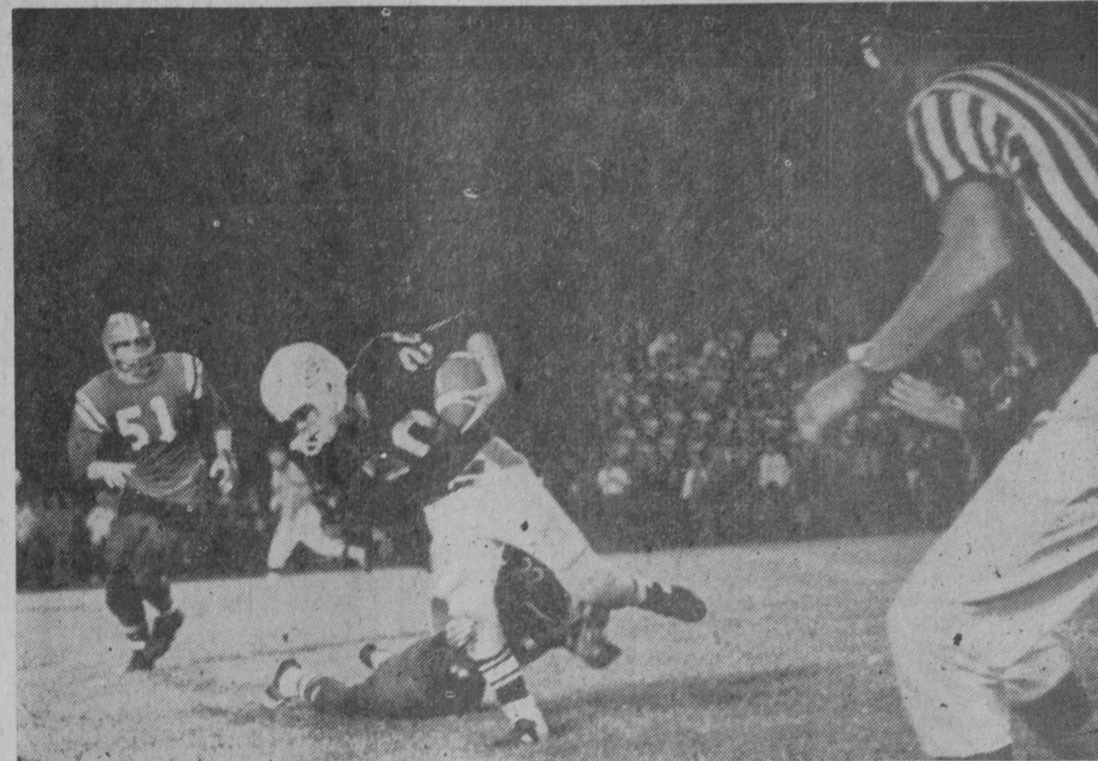
Rase for a four-yard touchdown run. A pass to Mueller added the extra point, giving Glenn its final tally.

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# Proceedings of Iosco Board of Supervisors

## AUGUST SESSION

**August 21, 1968**  
Pursuant to adjournment July 17, 1968, the Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order by Chairman Smith and roll call ordered. The following supervisors were present: Belson, Blust, Campbell, Chrvia, Everett, Gerard, Moss, Higgins, Brewer, Jocks, Kasischke, Little, Mead, Mielock, Smith, Stephan, Weible. Absent: Lixey and McElheron.

The regional library treasurer's reports for the months of June and July were submitted by Mr. Gerard to be placed on file in the clerk's office.

Communications were read and referred to the proper committees by the chairman.

A discussion concerning the new lower court system arose as a consequence of a letter to the board from Circuit Judge Allan Miller, indicating the estimated costs to the county for operation and supplies and the problems of courtroom and office space that will be required. Prosecutor J. Richard Ernst was called in to join the discussion and answer questions pertaining to the new court.

Judge Miller's letter was referred to the finance committee, and the matter of courtroom and

office space was referred to the building and grounds committee for study.

The clerk advised the board of the increase in the soldier's burial allowance from \$200 to \$300.

Supervisor Kasischke reported to the board on Public Act No. 342 of the Public Acts of 1968, which increases the veterans' homestead tax exemption from \$2000 to \$2500 or more of state equalized valuation depending on classification, and establishes a limitation on taxable real property owned of not to exceed \$10,000.00 state equalized valuation. After a brief discussion, Prosecutor J. Richard Ernst was called in to interpret section 2 of the act dealing with an increase of exemption from \$2,000.00 to \$2,500.00 for the period of December 31, 1967 to December 30, 1968 only, which took immediate effect.

Chairman Smith requested that supervisors of townships having bridges to be inspected pursuant to the announcement at the last session, submit the locations to him before the end of the day.

Mr. Higgins, reporting for the civil defense committee, read the following resolution and moved it be adopted:

Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

**FEDERAL SURPLUS PROPERTY RESOLUTION**

WHEREAS, the County of Iosco has an active Civil Defense organization eligible to participate in the Federal Surplus Property Program, and

WHEREAS, it is a requirement that a resolution be adopted by the governing body specifically designating an individual to be responsible for accepting Federal Surplus Property, such individual to be empowered with full authority to sign for Surplus Property.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. The Board of Supervisors for the County of Iosco State of Michigan, hereby designates Henry W. Gage Civil Defense Director, National City, Michigan as the person responsible for accepting Federal Surplus Property, with the power

and full authority to sign for such Surplus Property.

2. That money is available to pay the service charges on surplus property received.

3. That Henry W. Gage is further hereby authorized to direct the payment of such Surplus Property service charges in order to complete each transaction.

Motion was supported by Stephan and carried unanimously.

It was moved by Mielock and supported by Everett that a letter of appreciation be sent to Mr. Howard Brubaker to thank him for his courtesy and kindness in providing his boat for the use of the supervisors who hosted the District No. 4 Supervisors Association meeting on August 8th. Motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Jocks moved that the clerk be instructed to send letters to the candidates for the new nine (9) man county supervisors board, inviting them to attend the meetings of the present board, and to also notify them by card prior to each session. Supported by Mielock and carried.

Mr. Little reported for the health committee concerning the following resolution which was read by the clerk at his request.

Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

**RESOLUTION**

BE IT RESOLVED that the Alpena Area Community Mental Health Board, to be selected pursuant to the provisions of Act 54 of the Public Acts of 1963, is authorized to designate the Treasurer of one county to be the custodian of the joint funds.

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that the Alpena Area Community Mental Health Board as an agency of Iosco County is designated and empowered to directly administer the local community mental health program without a program director.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chairman or other officer of the Alpena Area Community Mental Health Board, may be designated to serve as the official liaison between the Alpena Area Community Mental Health Board and the Department of Mental Health.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Alpena Area Community Mental Health Board is empowered to employ (as county employees) program staff, program supervisors and consultants necessary to carry on a comprehensive community mental health program which conforms to the provisions and regulations of Public Act 94 of 1963.

It being the intent of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors to establish a clear-set of procedural steps which will provide an audit trail for state and local public funds expended in behalf of the Alpena Area Community Mental Health Board Program as follows:

"1. IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that endorsement for submission of the budget to the Department of Mental Health annually be made by the person designated as liaison between the Alpena Area Community Mental Health Board and the Michigan Department of Mental Health.

2. IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the fiscal officer of Iosco County certify that the budget as submitted is in conformance with County fiscal policies, County procedures and 'in order' as a fiscal document.

3. IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that endorsement for submission of the budget to the Department of Mental Health annually be made by the Iosco County Board of Supervisors.

"IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that as Alpena, Alcona, Iosco, Montmorency, Ogemaw and Osceola Counties are without a common merit system or a standardized personnel classification system, Iosco County hereby requests the State Department of Mental Health establish as a standard, a classification and pay scale 'paralleling that in current use by the Department of Mental Health.'"

The resolution was adopted on the following roll call upon motion by Little, supported by Blust, Ayes: Belson, Blust, Campbell, Chrvia, Everett, Gerard, Moss, Higgins, Brewer, Jocks, Kasischke, Little, Mead, Mielock, Smith, Stephan, Weible. Nays: None.

Mr. Gordon Huck and Mr. Arthur Aulerich, members of the Iosco County Building Authority, were in attendance in response to the board's request, and a brief discussion was had concerning organization and functions of the authority. In connection, the clerk was instructed to send copies of the articles of incorporation to the three members.

Mr. Mielock reported that some county residents have indicated to him that they have raised pheasants which they plan to release and would like to have the board seek a temporary suspension of pheasant hunting for Iosco County this year in the form of a resolution to the conservation department. It was determined in an ensuing discussion, however, that hunting schedules and areas have already been set for this year.

At 11:20 a. m., committees were ordered to their respective duties, balance of the board to be at ease subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 11:55 a. m., it was moved by Blust supported

by Belson, that the board recess for lunch until 1:30 p. m. Carried.

**AFTERNOON SESSION**

Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., roll call was ordered by the chairman. The same supervisors were present as at the morning session with the addition of Mr. Lixey and Mr. McElheron who took their seats for the afternoon session.

Chairman Smith announced that the conference for assessing officers will be held at Traverse City on November 11th and 12th and that the supervisors' state association convention will be at Lansing in December. In connection with this, the names were taken of those planning to attend and the clerk instructed to make reservations at Lansing.

The Clerk informed the board of the new act which eliminates local canvassing boards in all municipalities of five (5) precincts or less and all school districts, and transfers the duties to the county board of canvassers.

Tax Equalization Director Oates addressed the board briefly concerning public act No. 342, indicating that veterans' homestead exemptions were increased to \$2500.00 effective with the period beginning December 31st, 1967 to December 30th, 1968, but that anyone making application for a refund had to do so within 30 days of the effective date of the act, or by August 19th, 1968.

Mr. Oates also reported that tax statements will be printed as soon as the school levy reports are received indicating the rates required to be printed on the statements. Oates also distributed cop-

ies of a report of sales studies made of inland lakes properties.

Supervisor Little reported relative to the formation of a separate dog control department which was discussed at the last session, advising that Alpena and Ogemaw Counties pay their dog wardens \$600.00 and \$300.00 respectively in addition to fees for various functions.

Undersheriff Putnam commented briefly on the problem and a general discussion followed concerning a workable arrangement. A show of hands indicated a majority of the board to be interested in pursuing the matter.

At 2:10 p. m., committees were ordered to their respective duties, balance of the board to be at ease subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 3:10 p. m., a letter from Mr. Gidley, probation and parole agent, was read, advising the board of his transfer to the U. S. District Court at Bay City, and thanking the members for their past cooperation. Thereupon, it was moved by Stephan, supported by Mead, that the clerk be instructed to transmit a letter of appreciation to Mr. Gidley for his service to the county. Carried.

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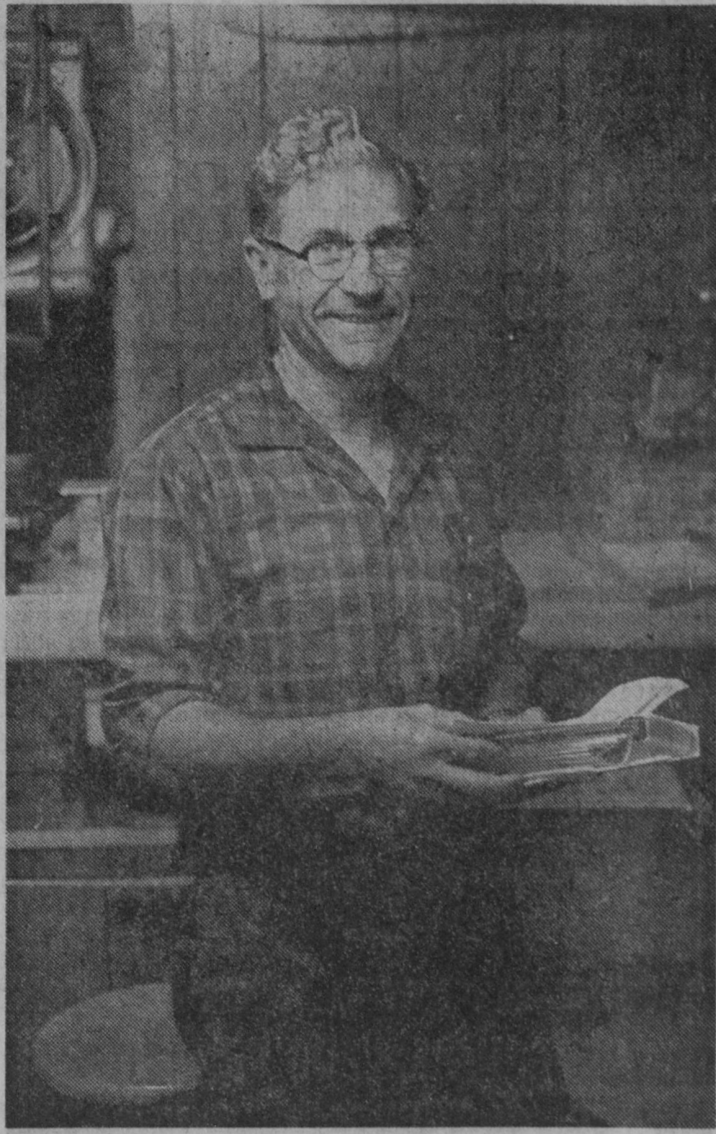

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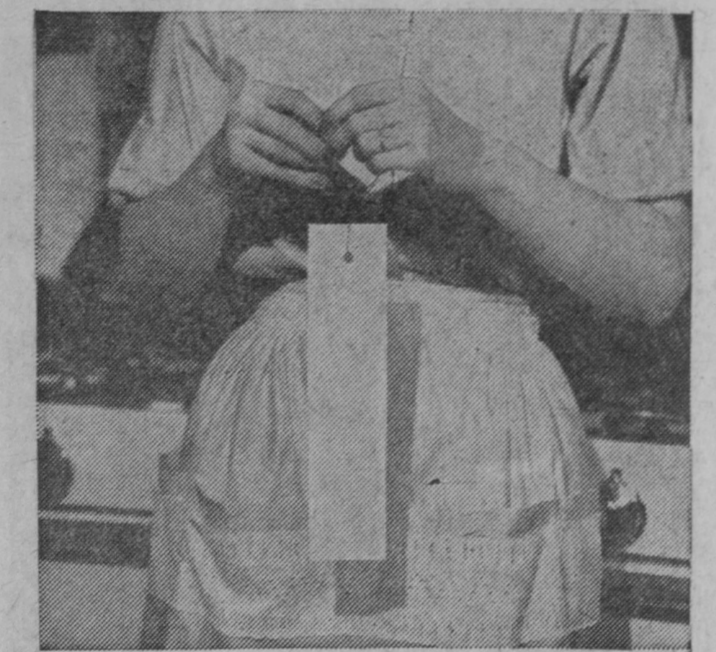

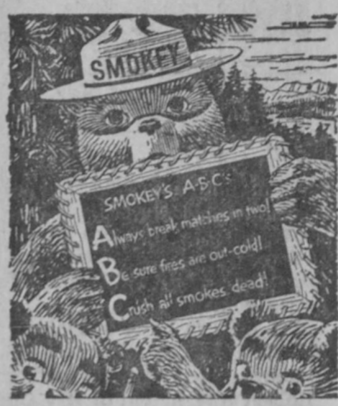

**NROTC Test Slated December 14 for Seniors-Grads.**

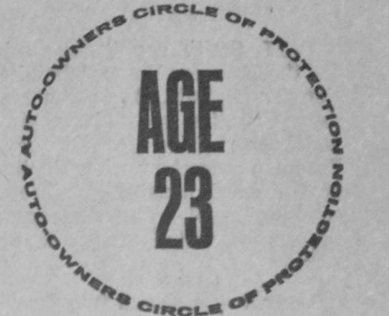
Test date for the 23rd annual national competitive NROTC examination has been set as December 14. Parents and high school officials should remind eligible high school seniors and graduates to submit their applications before November 15.

The regular NROTC program offers an outstanding opportunity for a young man to gain a regular commission while studying at one of the 53 NROTC colleges and universities. The navy furnishes tuition, fees, books and uniforms, plus a subsistence allowance of \$50 per month to NROTC midshipmen. Each summer, NROTC midshipmen go on interesting and rewarding at-sea training periods. After completing his college course and all military requirements, an NROTC midshipman is commissioned as a regular officer in the United States Navy or Marine Corps and goes on active duty with the operating forces.

The program is available to male high school seniors and graduates who will have reached their 17th but not 21st birthday by July 1. Those who make a qualifying score on the navy college aptitude test will be interviewed and given thorough medical examinations early in 1969. Approximately 1,700 young men from those remaining in competition will thus be selected to attend college next September to prepare for their naval service.

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### Tells Features of Rural Housing-Planning in Act

Ras L. Smith, county supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration for Gladwin, Bay, Arenac and Isosco Counties said today that he had been notified by Orville L. Freeman, secretary of agriculture, of the rural housing and rural community planning features of the newly-enacted 1968 Housing Act.

The act was signed into law August 1 by President Johnson.

Secretary Freeman's statement pointed out the new housing pro-

gram is part of the president's drive to remove all substandard housing in the nation within a decade, including the three million substandard houses that exist today in rural America.

Mr. Freeman announced that benefits of the New Housing and Urban Development Act will be channeled into rural area through the 1,600 local county offices of the Farmers Home Administration and through the rural system of technical action panels.

The Farmers Home Administration, a department of agriculture supervised credit agency for housing, farming and community facilities, carries on rural housing programs, established by the new act and previous legislation, for farmers and for other people in the countryside and in rural towns of up to 5,600 population.

Freeman said the USDA assistance will be extended through the state and district technical action panels. Arenac County Technical Action Panel meets second Monday of each month at community room, State Bank of Standish; Bay County Technical Action Panel, first Friday, Soil Conservation Service Office, South Euclid Street, Bay City; Gladwin County Technical Action Panel, third Thursday, Soil Conservation Service Office, USDA Building, Gladwin; Isosco County Technical Action Panel, East Tawas Soil Conservation Service Office, third Tuesday.

# Kroger Introduces New Plastic Trays for Meat Packaging

The mystery of meat shopping will be eliminated by The Kroger Company in this area today. The supermarket chain will introduce new, clear, plastic meat trays for the packaging of fresh, red meat and poultry at the company's supermarket in Tawas City.

It is the first time a supermarket has adopted this newest development in meat packaging material in the Tawas area.

The trays, developed by Monsanto Company, enable consumers to get a clear view of the entire product at a single glance, eliminating the poking, prodding and sheer guesswork traditionally associated with buying packaged cuts of meat.

H. A. Gifford, division vice president of Kroger, said, "Our introduction of the clear-meat tray is in keeping with our desire to serve our customers better at no cost to them. For the first time, shoppers at Kroger's will be able to examine an entire cut of meat to determine the quality, bone and fat content before purchasing the meat."

He stated that the clear, plastic trays also allow the housewife to place the prepackaged meat directly into the freezer without rewrapping or labeling. The meat, even if frozen, will not stick to the tray. The meat separates cleanly and easily from the clear container.

In addition, the trays will prevent absorption of the precious juices and retention of foreign odor or taste, according to Gifford.

He said that the new trays are being adopted by Kroger in this area as another service to its valued customers.

Consumers have already shown a preference for the plastic meat trays. Monsanto conducted a number of surveys which illustrate this fact.

In one survey, over 80 percent of the housewives who were interviewed liked the meat packaged in the clear tray better than identical meat packaged in other meat trays. Four out of five women stated that the meat was better protected in

the plastic tray than in conventional trays. Two out of three women who normally would not freeze meat would freeze it in the plastic trays, according to the survey.

Another survey conducted by Survey Research Services of San Francisco turned up the fact that four out of five housewives would prefer to buy their meat in a store using clear, plastic trays.

The survey indicated that 82 percent of the housewives questioned would shop at a supermarket featuring the clear trays, if the distance to each of the two supermarkets was the same.

Results also showed that the housewives believed the clear trays

enhance the appearance of fresh, red meat. Fifty-nine percent of the housewives surveyed stated that they believed the cuts of meat packaged in the clear trays were of better quality than those packaged in conventional meat trays.

In this section of the survey, housewives were asked to judge only the meat. Identical cuts of steak and roasts were used in the study.

The chief reasons for preferring meat packaged in the clear tray were less waste, better marbling, grain and color. The housewives also said the meat looked fresher and more tender and moist, according to Survey Research Services.

Other findings of the survey indicate that 99 percent of the housewives preferred the clear tray itself over a conventional tray. It was preferred because meat flavor and juices are not absorbed, all sides of the meat are visible, the package is freezer ready and it has a clear and fresh appearance, it was stated.

In a survey conducted by Monsanto, 97 percent of the housewives surveyed liked the plastic tray better than a white pulp meat tray. Of those who preferred the plastic tray, 73 percent cited its visibility and 24 percent thought the meat package had a cleaner, more sanitary appearance.
