Thompson is New Corrections Officer

William F. Thompson, 45, became the Michigan Department of Corrections new field service officer here Tuesday morning. He is parole and probation agent for Los-

co, Alcona and Oscoda Counties, comprising the 23rd Judicial Circuit, and for Arenac County.

Thompson succeeds Philip Gidley, who moved to Bay City recently as parole officer for the Federal District Court.

A native of Detroit, Thompson had served as parole agent in the field office there since August 15, 1960.

He attended Northwestern High School at Detroit, served four years in the army air force during World War II and then attended Wayne State University, where he received a bachelor of art degree as a sociology major.

With the addition of Arenac County to his district, Thompson will be handling approximately 50 active cases referred to his office by circuit court.

While his past experience in the department has been as a parole agent, Thompson said his work here probably would be concerned mainly with supervising young offenders on probation.

Thompson's first morning at the county building was an active one. He had five conferences with persons on parole or probation assigned by the circuit court, as well as starting monthly conferences with persons having been assigned to his office in the past.

Detroit Woman Dies in Holiday Traffic; Losco's Fifth Fatality

A two-car headon collision on M-65 five miles north of Hale Sunday killed a Detroit woman and left two persons seriously injured in Tawas Hospital.

Mrs. Irene Poblock, 52, a passenger in a car driven by her 52-year-old husband, George, was dead at the scene.

According to Michigan State Police and Losco Sheriff's Department officers, Poblock's vehicle was attempting to slow for a string of cars in front of his when he apparently lost control and skidded over the centerline into the path of an automobile driven by Michael J. Lyons, 30, Pontiac.

Poblock and Lyons' wife, Marilyn, were listed in serious condition at Tawas Hospital. Also hospitalized were Lyons and three of his children, Pamela, six; Michael Jr., five, and 18-month-old Susan.

Neither Lyons nor the children were believed to be hurt seriously. Mrs. Poblock's death raised the traffic toll on Losco County highways for the year to five. There were 395 deaths from traf-

fic accidents throughout the nation and Michigan led all states with a toll of 25 deaths late Sunday.

Headon Crash Near Tawas City Hospitalized Three

A headon crash south of Tawas City on US-23 Saturday noon sent three persons to Tawas Hospital.

Injured were William Neithercut, 79, Flint; Nina L. Sprayman, Harrison; Ida Konechny, Lansing, and Joseph Konechny, 75, Lansing.

Investigating state police said that a pickup truck slowed in front of Mrs. Sprayman. Upon applying her brakes, she lost control of her car, crossed the centerline and collided with a car driven by Mrs. Lena Neithercut.

An accident early Wednesday morning resulted in slight injuries to Edison Refrou, 46, Oscoda. State police said he lost control of his car and hit a mailbox.

Two US-23 Bridges in Area Under State Load Restrictions

Load limits will be posted soon on four state highway bridges in Delta, Losco and Marquette Counties, Michigan State Highway Commission announced today.

The commission said the restrictions are necessary because of slight deterioration in certain bridge members controlling gross loads. The deterioration was noted during recent inspections.

Two of the bridges are on US-23 in Losco County, over the AuSable River in AuSable Township and over the Whitney Drain three miles south of Alabaster.

The AuSable River span was built in 1932 with trusses salvaged from an older bridge in Saginaw County and the posted gross limits will be 31 tons for one unit, 34 tons for two units and 38 tons for three units.

The bridge crossing Whitney Drain, known as the Singing Bridge, was also built in 1932 with trusses salvaged from a St. Clair County span built in 1914. Its posted gross limits will be 30 tons for one unit, 48 tons for two units and 54 tons for three units.

TA Citizens Committee Assigns Study Areas

At the Thursday evening meeting of Tawas Area Board of Education's citizens committee, Neil Luedtke and Clyde Soper, named recently as temporary chairman and vice chairman, were elected permanent co-chairmen. Rosemary Klenow, who had served as secretary since the committee's inception August 12, was elected secretary.

Individuals attending the meeting were assigned various problem areas to study in an attempt to answer questions which have arisen regarding Tawas Area Schools. Included in the study will be taxes; curriculum; teacher-student ratio; tenure; building operating costs; the value of physical educa-

tion, music, band and sports; the history and present status of the shop program, and selection of a name for the citizens committee.

"We had an attendance of more than 100 persons at the board of education meeting three weeks ago, 75 persons at the board meeting last week and about 17 persons at our Thursday night meeting. We sincerely hope that parents and other interested citizens will attend these citizens committee meetings and get involved in school affairs," said Luedtke.

Basic reason for the new organization is to serve as a liaison between citizens and taxpayers of Tawas Area School District and the board of education, in order to insure that a quality education is available for district children, said Luedtke.

Soper stated that since defeat of two millage proposals this year, it has been found that numerous persons had questions which have apparently gone unanswered. "It will be our job to dig out and present the facts to better acquaint the

people with needs of the district in order to insure a favorable attitude toward financing school operation," said Soper.

Target date for the next school millage vote is December 6 and the committee has about two weeks to complete its work on gathering facts. Petitions must be filed 60 days prior to the election.

"We want to inform the general public on general facts concerning the election," said Luedtke. "We want to insure that all electors will vote on this proposition and that their decision will be based upon fact, not rumor," he said.

Another meeting of the group has been called for Thursday, September 5, 7:30 p. m., at the high school. Progress reports on the study areas are to be heard.

Interested citizens and parents are urged to attend Thursday night's meeting.

The basic summer camp provides active-duty training in lieu of two years on-campus study, allowing him to enter the advanced ROTC program at the university.

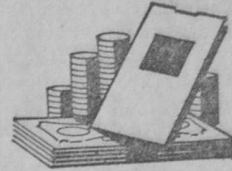
During the six-week encampment, he received intensive training in leadership, rifle marksmanship, physical conditioning and other military subjects.

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Forest Chats

Labor Day is another one of those corners we turn four times a year. Cool mornings signal that summer is in its 11th hour and it's time to grease up the bearings on the tree planting machine, double check the firefighting equipment, begin putting the recreation areas to bed for the winter and to be spending more of our time out on the timber sales which are beginning to go full tilt.

The early morning fresh smell of heavy dew on the grass and chilly temperatures that seep to the bones at breakfast time are welcome changes from the sweltering heat of August.

Not so welcome is the fall fire season. Green grass has turned to rust. Heavy rains and heat of summer this year produced an abundance of light fuels, just right to be ignited by a match thought to be out or a cigarette thoughtlessly flipped through the open window. During September and October, according to past statistics, people will start an average of six fires on the district. All will be due to carelessness. All will be preventable. We would rather plant trees and wildlife shrubs this fall than to fight fires. Planting is just as hard work as fighting fires but it is a lot more gratifying. It is building instead of destroying.

So let us all tighten up our

Let us enjoy the fall colors of blazing red, orange and yellows and keep the disastrous black out of the scene.

100-Year-Old Farm Receives State Marker

A farm owned by Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Schroeder of National City has been designated as a centennial farm by the Michigan Historical Commission.

The farm, located in Sherman Township, has been in the possession of the family since 1868. It was originally acquired in January of 1868 by Julius Schroeder, grandfather of the present owners, from the United States Government.

According to Sec. of State James M. Hare, whose department directs the activities of the historical commission, the centennial farm program in Michigan was established in 1948. Since that time, certificates and metal markers have been awarded to more than 2,500 Michigan farms.

The program is administered under the direction of the commission, while markers are provided by Detroit Edison and Consumers Power Companies.

According to Hare, a centennial farm is one which has been in the continuous possession of the same family for 100 years or more. For this purpose, the historical commission considers a farm to be 10 or more acres having estimated sales of more than \$50 yearly or less than 10 acres but having estimated sales of \$250 annually.

Persons owning farms who wish to apply for centennial farm certificates are asked to write for an application to Centennial Farm Program, Michigan Historical Commission, Department of State, Lansing, Michigan 48918.

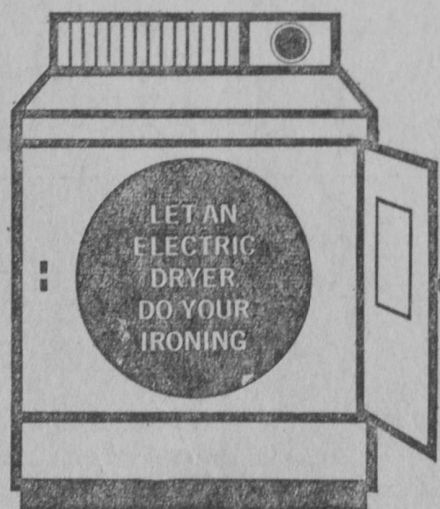

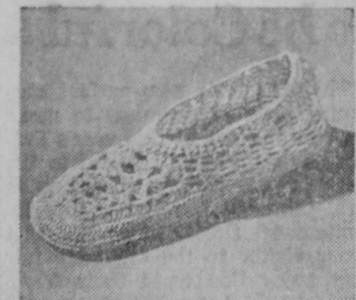

in an off white lace dress.

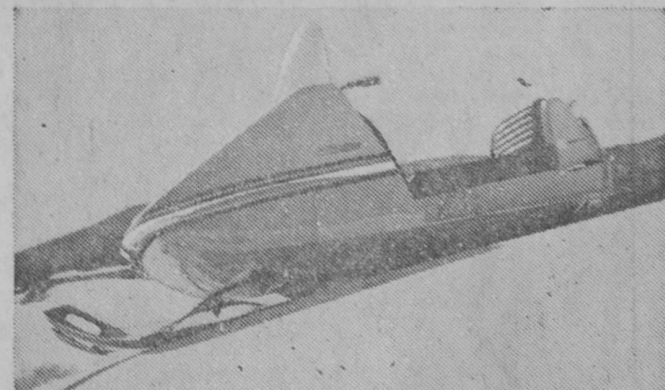

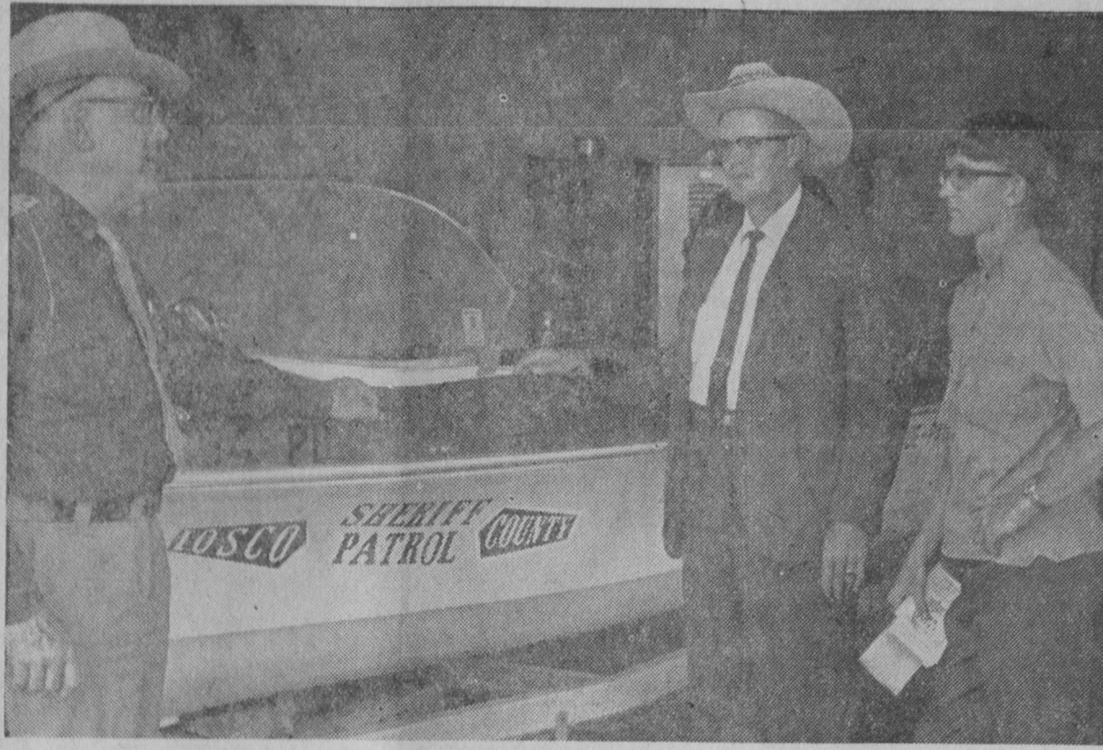

Dreams Provide A 'Plus' for Man Says Wayne State Psychiatrist

DETROIT — Dreams, long the intriguing province of hopeful young lovers, soothsayers, wisemen, and Biblical prophets, have come to the examining room of a psychiatrist at Wayne State University for intensive study.



Dr. Elliot Luby, professor of psychiatry, has used the brain-wave machine and other scientific apparatus in years of research with patients. He has reached these conclusions:

1. Although dreaming has a psychological meaning, it is a biological process found in all mammals.
2. Infants and children spend a much higher percentage of sleep time in dreaming than others. There is speculation that infants experience 50% and premature infants 80% dream time; also that unborn infants at one stage do nothing but dream. This provides the necessary activity for the developing nervous system.
3. At young-adult age, human beings spend from 20% to 25% of their sleep time in dreaming.
4. This percentage continues to decrease with age. Elderly people have the lowest percentage, not only because of this percentage decrease but because they sleep less. (At least until far advanced age.)
5. Drugs and food affect dreaming. The old folk myth that cheese sandwiches bring bad dreams has some merit in that cheese contains large amounts of tryptophan, which will affect dream content.

deep sleep and, although you haven't completely awakened, you begin to dream. Later instinctual causes originating from within you will create still another dream.

"Usually, within the course of a night, five such dream periods will have occurred. The last dream is usually frustrating in that it seems 'unfinished,'" says the doctor.

Our physical side needs sleep to create energy for the new day, and the psychological side of us needs sleep "in the sense of withdrawing from the daily struggles and frustrations of the day."

Dr. Luby divides sleep into two kinds: "slow-wave" sleep (from the slow waves shown on the brain-wave machine) and "dreaming" sleep, which is a more active type. The dreaming sleep has been found to be uniquely necessary for our emotional stability.

"Dreams provide a big plus for man," points out Dr. Luby. "Dreaming is the only way man can escape the bonds of time and space. He can dream fantasies without being criticized."

"So if you think you've had a bad night's sleep just because of dreaming, consider that it may have been a good night for the mind, which in turn helps the body."
