REGISTRATION CHECKS on Michigan vehicles has been speeded considerably with adoption of a new microfilm system by the secretary of state's office. The new system went into effect last week in losco County with receipt of a microfilm reader installed in the sheriff's office, being demonstrated here by Undersheriff Leon Putnam. The more than 8,000 license numbers for losco vehicles are now photographed on microfilm, which replaces several large books

formerly furnished by the state. When an officer wishes to obtain the name of the owner of any vehicle, personnel in the sheriff's office merely dial the reader to the proper page and the number is secured within seconds. 




