

City Boosts Millage to Meet Higher Costs

As a means of expanding and upgrading some of its services to the community, Tawas City Council Monday night adopted an appropriation budget calling for a 1 1/2-mill tax increase to meet a \$152,400 operational budget for 1969-70.

The resolution passed by a five to one roll call vote. Voting yes were Aldermen Frank Ahonen,

Howard Hatton, John St. James, Clark Tanner and Martin Wellna. Voting no was Cecil Cabbie.

Total appropriation bill approved by the council included nine mills for general operation, 1 1/2 mills for streets and 1 1/2 mills for bond and interest.

With the increase in the city's tax base in recent years, one-half mill was taken from the two mills formerly in the bond and interest account and added to the general operation fund.

Based on a state equalized valuation of 6.2 million dollars, the 1 1/2-mill increase will add about \$9,300 to the general fund. The one-half mill transfer from the bond and interest fund will bring an additional \$3,000 into the general fund.

While the approximate \$12,000 increase would seem insignificant in the budgets of other local units of government, it will provide the council with means to help meet rising costs of operation, as well as to "sweeten" funds for street improvement, equipment purchase and regular services.

Receipts under the budget calls for \$62,500 from city taxes, \$3,000 in delinquent taxes, \$21,500 from sales tax, \$29,300 from Act 51 highway fund, \$11,700 in trunk-line maintenance.

It is estimated that traffic fines will be \$1,300, a drop of about \$2,000 from the preceding year, due to the city's smaller share of traffic fine money under the new district court arrangement. Arrangements were also made in the disbursement budget to provide additional money for legal services, due to increased cost of prosecution.

Intangible and liquor tax will bring in \$3,800, cemetery receipts are estimated at \$1,500, licenses and permits will bring in \$150, fire department calls will bring \$3,800 and \$6,300 is expected as the city's share of the Michigan income tax.

Other receipts include \$900 from gas tax refund, \$200 from the Michigan Bell telephone booth, \$100 from Tawas River Trailer Park, \$150 from trailer rentals and \$5,600 in miscellaneous money.

Some of the major expenses include \$17,150 in the category of city hall, garage and equipment; \$15,098 for police department, \$7,975 for fire department, \$7,600 for street lights, \$8,800 for new streets, \$20,500 for local street maintenance, \$9,800 for refuse and disposal.

Other disbursement categories include \$8,200 for employee benefits, \$6,050 for insurance, \$5,230 for cemetery and \$3,050 for library.

The budget includes \$17,200 in the general ledger account. Included is \$2,000 as partial payment for purchase of the city's industrial park on Ninth Avenue, \$7,000 for a new truck, \$1,000 for a small tractor and \$5,200 to retire two notes of long standing.

Martin Wellna, finance and audit chairman, described the city's finances as being in excellent condition.

Williams received a traffic summons for an improper left turn.

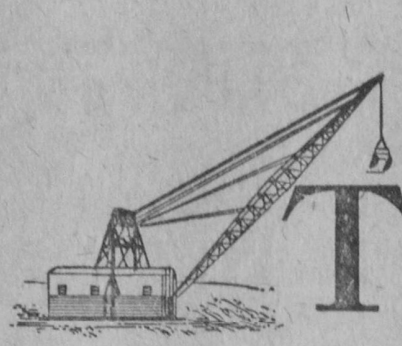
Plan Parking Expansion at ET

Supervisors Sidestep Ambulance Issue

After several months of discussion concerning a county-operated ambulance service, Iosco Board of Supervisors Friday washed its hands of the entire affair and referred establishment of such service to local units of government—

townships and cities. This was a complete reversal from what was expected during the April session. Only last Tuesday, it appeared as though the board was going to authorize an expenditure of approximately

\$30,000 to purchase van-type trucks to be used in five county communities and operated by volunteers. The only supervisor opposed to the above plan at the start of the April session was Clement Steph-

an of Tawas City. A member of the board's health and welfare committee which had studied the problem, Stephan argued that the county could expect to take over other similar services (wrecker) should private enterprise announce a similar discontinuance.

Discussion opened Friday morning with the idea that the county would assume this operation. A number of supervisors had second thoughts as to this, however.

It was suggested that each county unit, city or township, with a fire department, take the responsibility of setting up the ambulance service. This, it was said, would cover all of the county because every township has fire protection, either its own or through an agreement with a unit which has fire protection.

Each unit would purchase an ambulance unit. It was pointed out that most, if not all taxing units, are in a position financially, to assume this responsibility. The cost could be spread to other units to be covered by an agreement.

The board suggested that each unit would then undertake to establish a corps of volunteers to staff the ambulances. Cost of staffing without volunteers, based on the number of calls received, would not allow for full-time professional staffing of ambulances, either by the county or local units. It was pointed out that a training program is available through several sources, including Tawas Hospital, American Red Cross and other qualified individuals in the county.

As compared to answering fire calls which require the full complement of from 10 to 20 men and equipment, the law requires only that one trained and qualified attendant-driver be on the ambulance. One man would have to be available at all times.

If one volunteer is available, a corps of 30 would require only 30 per unit to have this volunteer subject to one day of service a month.

In the event of a call, the charge would be shared by the volunteers making the call and the unit with the ambulance. Mileage for the call would revert to the unit to defray maintenance and replacement of the vehicle.

Each unit would need a "chief" to assure that the volunteer of the day is aware of his call status. The chief could be compensated for the responsibility through a portion of the fee charges for each call.

It was stated that Tawas Hospital should be responsible to enter into an agreement with a downstate firm for ambulance service to other areas of the state. In case of extreme emergency, the local units could be dispatched.

Through this system, the county would not be burdened with the great financial responsibility and it was stated that local units have funds or access to funds for vehicle purchase. It was also stated that local units are in a

County's Tax Base Now at \$95.8 Million

Iosco County was equalized Friday at \$95,808,300, an increase of \$1,789,890 over the previous year, to end the board's four-day April session.

This year's session contrasted sharply with equalization of the county last year, when several stormy sessions were required before the final equalization report was adopted.

The change might be attributed to the fact that, under the new nine-man board, district supervisors are no longer assessors and, with only two exceptions, board members represent combinations of local governmental units rather than separate units.

According to Henry Oates, county tax equalization director, ratios of each unit are at or within a few points of 50 percent of true cash value, which represents the state equalized valuation. As a result, none of the 14 units will be penalized.

There were several changes by the equalization committee after studying the footing committee's report, but the tax director said that changes were so small that the difference would be minimal.

Allocation Board Gets Budgets; Open Study

Arden Charters, Whittemore, who has served on the Iosco Tax Allocation Board since 1952, was re-elected board chairman during

the annual reorganizational meeting Monday afternoon at the county building.

Three new faces are on the board this year including Ralph Western of East Tawas and Ronald Dane of Hale, appointees of Probate Judge William McCready, along with J. Berkeley Smith, chairman of the board of supervisors' finance committee.

Other members include Edward Nelkie, county treasurer; Ernest Jordan, intermediate school superintendent; County Clerk Keith Papas is secretary.

The board has responsibility of dividing the 15-mill tax allocation between schools, county and township governments.

All but one township submitted a budget requesting one mill for operation. The lone exception was Tawas Township, which receives adequate operational funds through its valuation and receipts from sales tax diversion and state income tax.

Budgets were accepted by the allocation board for study. The next meeting is set for statute for the third Monday in May.

Budgets submitted by townships included: Oscoda, \$221,210; Wil-

ber, \$12,500; Burleigh, \$21,088; Tawas, \$22,100; AuSable, \$56,300; Reno, \$13,624; Alabaster, \$17,855; Baldwin, \$33,546; Sherman, \$9,241; Grant, \$22,000.

School budgets submitted included:

Intermediate School District, \$53,618, up \$10,133, with a request of \$29,250 in local taxation; Iosco School District, special education, \$131,358, up \$8, with a request of \$87,750 in local taxation.

Oscoda Area School, \$3,348,606, with a request of local taxation of \$490,000. Latest state equalized valuation is \$49,000,000.

Whittemore-PreScott Area School, \$540,600; up \$56,600 with local tax request of \$171,000. Latest state equalized valuation is \$13,204,528.

Hale Area School, \$336,725, up \$35,582, with a local tax request of \$235,262. Latest state equalized valuation is \$18,000,000.

Tawas Area School, \$1,075,001, up \$156,654, with a local tax request of \$430,456. The district has a valuation of \$41,165,457.

The county's budget, as described elsewhere in this newspaper, is \$617,087.75, with \$471,478 to be raised by taxes.

County's Preliminary Budget Hikes Salaries

Iosco County, similar to all levels of government—local, state and federal—continues to set a new record for annual cost of operation and 1970 will be no exception.

The county board of supervisors Friday adopted a tentative budget of \$563,087 to be presented April 21 to the county's tax allocation board. This was \$89,787 higher than the final budget adopted last October for the current year.

And, faced with deficit spending this year, supervisors included an additional \$54,000 which County Treas. Edward Nelkie estimates will be needed to balance the 1969 budget.

Last December, Iosco closed its books for 1968 with a balanced budget by transferring \$40,000 from the county airport fund. This amount had been allocated as

matching money for state and federal funds to finance airport expansion. The federal and state money was not forthcoming and the money was transferred back to the county general fund.

Nelkie, in reviewing all county funds, said earlier this year that there was no money available which can bail the county out of a \$34,000 deficit at the end of this year.

With total expenses estimated at \$617,087, including the budget and 1969 deficit, the board estimated revenues from county offices at \$145,609. This leaves \$471,478 to be raised by taxes, requiring an allocated millage of from 4.75 to 4.90 mills. The county's allocation during the current year is 3.75 mills.

In addition to the normal operational increase this year, the

board has granted a 10 percent increase in salaries to county officers and employees. In some instances, this increase is higher than the 10 percent.

Salaries of four county officers were raised from \$7,200 to \$8,000. Two county officers were raised to the \$9,000 level.

The preliminary budget includes the following departments: Prosecuting attorney: Salary, \$9,000; recorder, \$5,000; department expense, \$1,808; total, \$15,808.

Treasurer: Salary, \$8,000; deputy, \$4,152; clerk, \$4,840; extra help, \$1,000; department expense, \$4,780; total, \$22,772.

County clerk: Salary, \$8,000; deputy, \$5,307; clerk, \$4,895; district court deputy clerk, \$3,600; part time, \$2,000; department expense, \$5,140; total, \$28,942.

Sheriff's department: Sheriff's salary, \$9,000; under sheriff, \$8,000; deputies, \$39,000 (six deputies at \$6,500); turnkeys (two), \$5,400; matron, \$1,000; part time deputies, \$1,000; marine enforcement, \$15,000; department expense, \$33,300; total, \$111,700.

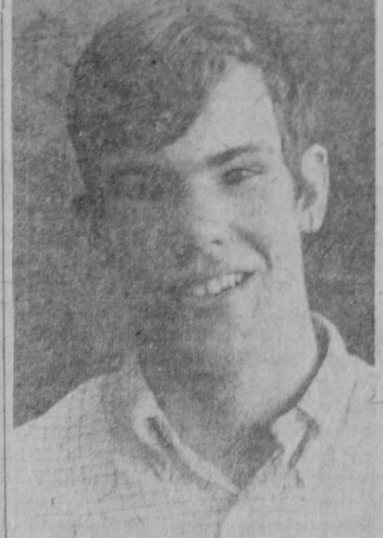

Dear Mr. Editor:

This letter is being sent because I've heard enough now against parochial aid! So it's time to mention the other side of the story. State aid to nonpublic schools should pass the legislature for many good reasons but I'll only mention a few of the better ones.

First, and very simple arithmetic, Michigan's 900 plus nonpublic schools save Michigan taxpayers a cool 200 million dollars each year! The Educad bill is only asking for 45 million dollars. Is that a bargain or not? How high will our state taxes go if the public schools have to educate the 315,000 students now attending parochial schools?

At the present time, it's hard to tell who is financially worse off, the public or nonpublic systems! I was very surprised to see our local board of education come out against the Educad bill. Apparently, they don't know all the facts or didn't want to. Nor do they realize how nicely two school systems could operate with state aid to both. Time magazine must be well informed when they wrote (March 28, 1969) "Whatever else Catholic (nonpublic) education may be, it is a bargain for society."

Do you know that one out of four persons in the state can vote for millage but don't have to pay it because they aren't property owners! For that reason and others, I'll never favor millage again—and my wife worked hard for CUBE last fall. Maybe the fairer income tax is the answer.

Secondly, all children will be better educated with the coexistence of public and parochial schools! Competition is good for the business world, why not for education? If you don't think two systems will work then you might as well say that recognizing the civil rights of negroes will destroy the civil rights of the white man.

It is my civil right—not just a prerogative—to send by children to whatever school I freely choose. But my educational freedom ends when I pay my taxes—to operate only one school that can't teach "good" or "wrong" because morals or "a belief" might be mentioned. If all schools become like that, where will the morals of future generations end up?

Thirdly, what's wrong with using public money to help teach the Three-Rs in a nonpublic school? After all, public funds are merely your tax dollar and mine thrown together and later distributed for education; why not for the education of all?

Now don't argue constitutionality because that great document was drawn to prevent a state-wide religion. The nonpublic schools don't want such a religion—they already have their own.

The Educad bill simply boils down to this: State aid to help pay state-approved teachers, hired by the nonpublic school boards. The state would be "renting," so to speak, the educational services of the approved teachers.

Let's face the real issue—all we are talking about is money for children, it's that simple.

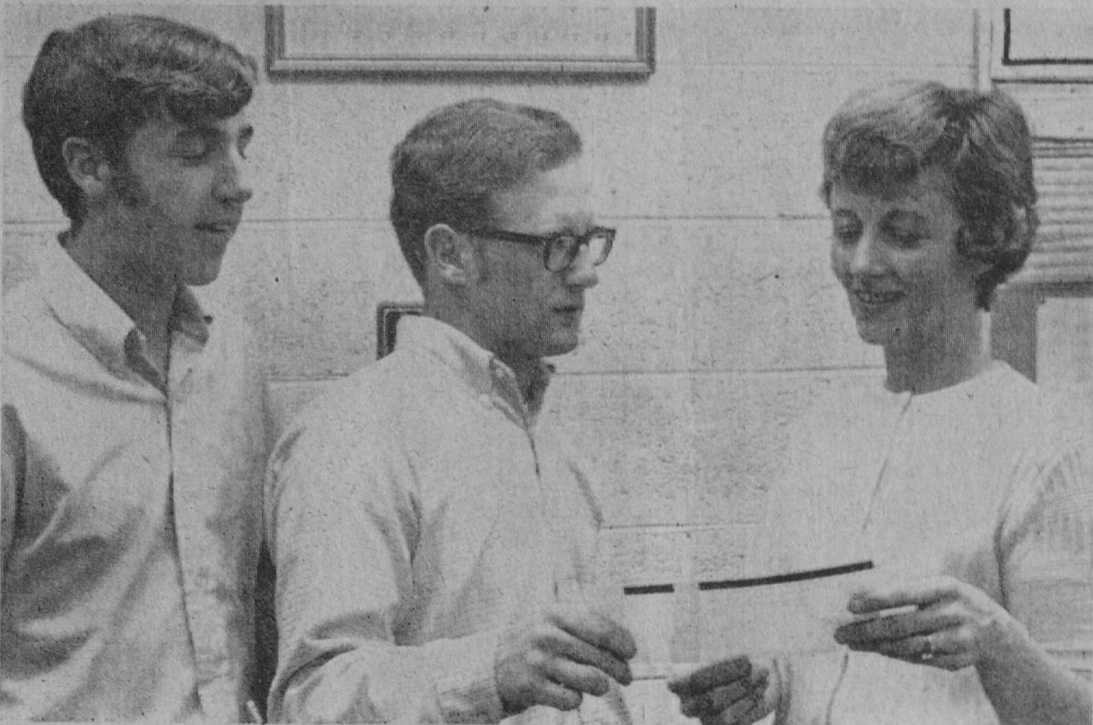

Warn Elderly of Medicine Fraud Scheme

John J. Carr, district manager of the Bay City Social Security office, said today that he has received reports from offices in neighboring states of an individual selling medicine door to door while posing as a "social security doctor." This individual also promises increased social security benefits to elderly persons. While there have been no reports of such activity in this area, Mr. Carr said that the public, especially elderly persons who are usually the target of these schemes, should be alert to operations of this type.

Mr. Carr stated that all representatives of the Social Security Administration carry identification. Furthermore, if a Social Security representative calls at your home, the Bay City Social Security office, phone number 893-9579, can verify the representative's identity and the reason for the visit. Mr. Carr emphasized that the Social Security Administration does not sell any items or services. Anyone attempting to sell any product or service who claims to represent the Social Security Administration should be reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation or to local police.

Community Action Receives Quota of Glasses

Region II, Northeast Michigan Community Action, formerly Seven CAP, has received a quota for 70 cards from "New Eyes for the Needy." This is for the four-county area of Ogemaw, Iosco, Arenac and Oscoda Counties. The last three years, the local Lions Clubs have joined with the Community Action Agency to collect old eyeglasses and jewelry, which are then sent to New Eyes for the Needy, a nonprofit charitable corporation in Short Hills, New Jersey, who in turn classify the lenses and donate them to missions and social welfare agencies throughout the world. The precious metal from old jewelry and broken eyeglass frames is melted and sold to obtain money for the purchase of new glasses.
New Eyes for the Needy then sets up a quota for the area and cards are issued which will buy a new pair of glasses for a needy person not qualifying for help from any other agency. This does not pay for the eye test.
The first year this four-county area participated in this program, the quota was 35, increasing in 1968 to 53. Due to the successful

drives made last year by the Lions Clubs and Community Action, the 1969 quota has been increased to 70.

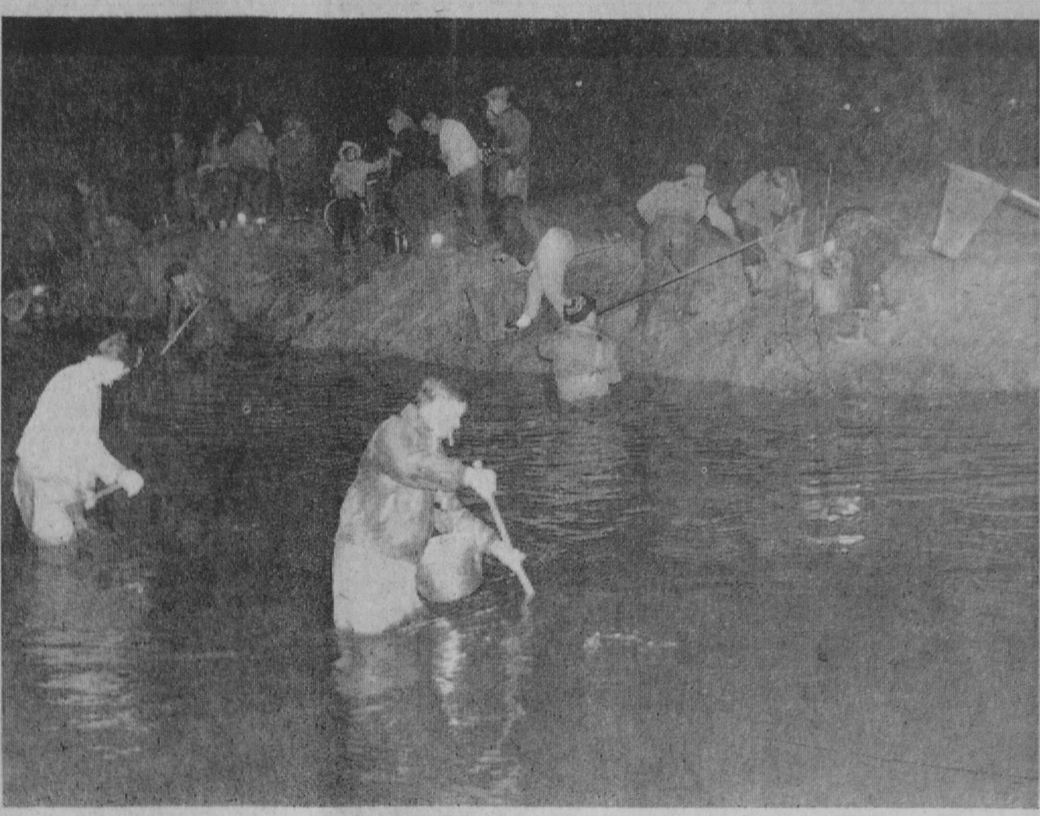

Nutrition in a Nutshell

It is no trick to provide nutritious meals on a low budget and you need not serve stone soup, either. Foods which would provide all the nutrients for a 25-year-old, active man can be bought for just 21 cents per day or \$1.47 per week. The menu consists of one pound enriched flour; two-thirds cup dry, skim milk (powder); one sweet potato; one cup raw cabbage, one-fourth pound margarine.

True, most Americans would have trouble working up any enthusiasm for this austerity diet, especially in view of the marvelous variety of foods available today and increased incomes with which to pay for it. And yet for at least 20 percent of our United States' population, this diet would be preferable to what they are presently eating—nutritionally, if not flavorfully.

According to information recently released by the Department of Agriculture, only 50 percent of the households surveyed nationwide had diets that could be classified as "good," 10 percent less when the last survey was made in 1955. There was also a higher percentage of "poor" diets—20 percent now, as compared to 15 percent in 1955.

Why, with higher incomes and a greater selection of foods to choose well balanced meals from, should we be going backwards in terms of good nutrition? Changes in food purchasing patterns over the past 10 years reveal some of the reasons. Our decreasing use of milk and milk products and of fruits and vegetables has resulted in deficiencies of calcium, vitamin A and vitamin C.

Nutritionists generally recommend three glasses of milk daily for children, four glasses for teens and two glasses for adults unless cheese, ice cream or other dairy foods are included. They suggest four or more servings of fruits and vegetables in a variety that includes both green and yellow vegetables and citrus fruits or tomatoes.

Each day, you should have two or more servings of protein foods. The choice is a wide one including red meats, fish, poultry, eggs, cheese and dry beans or peas. The final group of foods to be considered in building nutritious meals is the group featuring breads and cereals with special emphasis on enriched or whole grain cereals.

We do not consciously consume vitamins or minerals or proteins. Instead, we eat and enjoy those good foods that just happen to contain the nutrients we need for good health. Obviously, some do better than others, a sad state of affairs, when all we need is available in the markets.

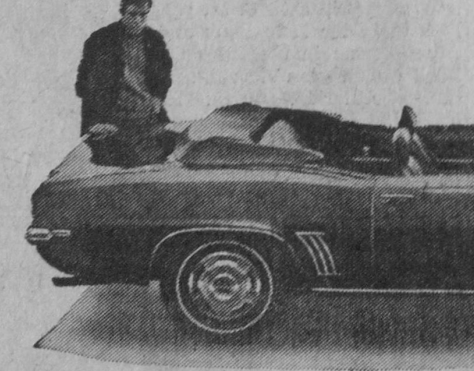
