

TA Board Approves 2-Week Band Class

Tawas Area Board of Education voted four to three Monday night to allow the band instructor an additional two weeks this summer to work with 1968-69 sixth grade students, who missed the first semester of beginner's band because of a curtailment in the school curriculum.

This request had been made at the last meeting by Gene S. Salamony, band director, who said that these sixth grade students had missed a considerable amount of instruction and would not be on a par with present seventh graders.

The school was forced to discontinue beginner's band for one

semester due to the lack of funds at the start of the fall term.

The board authorized the two weeks of instruction at an added cost of \$251 per week.

In addition, the board authorized an additional expenditure of \$500 for this year to replace a number of instruments being used by the beginner's band. A number of the instruments were more than 25 years old and unfit for use. This brings the total expenditure for band equipment and supplies next year to \$1,500.

In other business, the board directed the administration to negotiate agreements with the various voting precincts for use of polling places during school elections.

This action followed a billing by Alabaster Township for use of the township hall in the last election. Following an investigation by the school attorney, it was found that cities or townships are under no obligation to provide the facilities for school elections.

The board granted a one-year leave of absence to Mrs. Richard Powers, East Tawas Elementary Unit kindergarten teacher.

Bill R. Wilder, high school principal, reported that numerous candidates are being interviewed for openings on the school faculty. While the school lacks candidates for girls' physical education, Wilder said that other teaching positions have a surplus of candidates due to financial problems in many downstate school districts.

Sgt. Treichel Dead at 42 of Heart Attack

Sgt. Wilbert I. Treichel, 42, commander of the Gladstone State Police Post, died of a heart attack Sunday night at his home.

A 21-year veteran of state police service, Treichel had served as corporal at the East Tawas post from 1961 until August 1965, when he was promoted and transferred to command at Gladstone.

Born October 30, 1926, at Sterling, where he graduated from high school, Treichel joined the state police March 22, 1948, serving at Jonesville and Reed City before being promoted in 1957 and assigned to Bridgeport.

He is survived by his wife, Norma; a son, Eric; daughters, Paula, Johanna, Roxanne and Margie.

Funeral services are to be conducted Wednesday, April 30, 1:30 p. m., at First Lutheran Church, Gladstone. Interment will be in Friendwood Cemetery, Gladstone.

Rate Boost Studied for Big Water Users

A study of water costs with a view toward increasing rates to high users is now being conducted by the Tawas City Water Board.

At Monday night's monthly meeting of the water board, it was pointed out that customers in the 100,000 gallon-per quarter classification were paying 25 cents per 1,000 gallons of water. Cost of distribution to the water department is 26½ cents per 1,000 gallons.

In analyzing costs in order to come up with a more realistic and justified figure, the water board is thinking in terms of increasing the rate to 28 or 29 cents per thousand gallons.

The proposed increase, which probably will be adopted at the May 31 meeting would have no effect on residential or small business rates.

"This increase on the high side of the water rate is just natural," said Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works. "You cannot sell water for less than it is costing you."

In other business, the water board adopted budgets for the water and sewer departments.

Anticipated revenue of the water department for 1969-70 is \$43,130, while operating expenses are estimated at \$35,530. Other obligations including bond and interest would bring the total expense to \$43,630.

The sewer department's anticipated revenue is \$16,200 and anticipated expenses are listed at \$17,200. A cash balance on hand would offset the deficit.

Last year, the water department had revenue of \$39,425 and expenditures of \$34,600, while the

sewer department had revenues of \$14,200 and expenses of \$12,400.

While operating costs have had a normal increase, the water board made provisions to finance cost for a survey of future treatment plant needs being prepared for the city by Spicer Engineering Company.

Herald Notifies Subscribers of Rate Increase

Blame the price increase on inflation, but it was a long time in coming!

Publishers of The Tawas Herald this week announced an increase in subscription rates and individual copies of this newspaper sold at newsstands effective May 1.

Annual subscription rates have been increased from \$2 to \$3 per year in the county and from \$3 to \$4 per year out of the county. Newsstand price for a single copy will become 10 cents with the May 7 issue.

While out-of-county subscribers have been paying \$3 a year since 1961, it was the first price increase to Iosco subscribers in more than 50 years. The last came on May 31, 1918.

There have been many drastic changes in the cost of living during those 50 years, but the Herald absorbed numerous price increases in mail rates, to name but one cost item in the production of a newspaper.

Many are the changes since May 31, 1918. For instance, in that issue of the Herald, A. Steinhurst and Son, the square deal harness store, advertised they would half sole auto tires for \$4.50 and give a 1,500-mile guarantee; Wilson Grain Company advised that it was time to order coal, to insure a supply for the next winter; Tawas Butter Company was paying the highest market price for cream and eggs; R. G. Harting's auto livery and garage advertised repairing, vulcanizing and supplies for Ford and Dodge cars.

As we said, the price increase was a long time in coming.

Alexander is New Principal at Tawas Area

John Alexander, a member of the Tawas Area School faculty for nine years, was named Monday night as the new high school principal.

This action was taken following an interview with the board of education. A list of 46 candidates had been considered.

He succeeds Bill R. Wilder, who has held the post for two years and recently submitted his resignation to become effective at the end of the school term.

Alexander had served as the school's curriculum director since July 1967. His administrative duties prior to that had included direction of the school's summer remedial program and federal coordinator.

Coming here in September 1959, Alexander had taught elementary, junior high and high school classes.

Alexander received his bachelor of art degree from Michigan State University in 1958 and master degree from MSU in 1967.

Cemetery Cleanup Delayed by Rain-Stormy Weather

Annual spring cleanup of the Tawas City Cemetery has been somewhat delayed by rainy weather and brisk winds, making leaf raking difficult.

A recent inspection by members of the cemetery board revealed a large number of artificial flowers that have deteriorated and are unsightly. The board requests that anyone desiring to salvage them do so at once.

A number of flower pots which have been sunk into the ground leaving holes when removed presents a hazard when mowing a grave. This practice is discouraged.

The board also wishes to advise all grave owners that the planting of trees or shrubs on graves is prohibited.

Answer Questions Concerning Hale Area School Proposal

Hale Area League for Education met last Tuesday and mailed out questionnaires to registered voters of the school district concerning the upcoming school bond election in June.

The letters showed the floor plan of the proposed new junior and senior high school building and offered the voter the opportunity of sending his questions regarding the building.

Questions are to be mailed to Mrs. Alice Weryley. Responses to the questionnaires have been received and the group plans to answer as many of these questions as possible.

One of the first questions received is as follows: "Why does

Hale need a new school building?"

According to HALE, the pressing need is due to increases in student enrollment. At the time of the last building program in 1963, total enrollment was 452 and all the rooms were filled to capacity. Enrollment through 1969 has increased by 100 students. Crowding these 100 into already filled classrooms has created major handicaps to teaching and learning. Conservative statistics point to an additional 78 students within the next two years.

The citizens group asks, "What are we going to do with the students next year—and the next year, when overcrowded conditions are so acute now?"

Another question submitted was: "What is wrong with what we have now?"

The answer given by HALE is that nine rooms in the wood structure are less than the recommended 28 by 28 feet and two rooms are only 14 by 23 feet. Classes are held in converted storage rooms.

No room is available for special education of mentally and physically handicapped students, speech therapy, clinic services. Senior high mathematics classes are held in any available room because there is no classroom for the mathematics teacher's station.

Equipment is limited in science, chemistry, commercial and home-making classes, with no room available for long-range projects. The forced air furnaces produce unreliable and uneven heat and the noise of operation is distracting. The library has to be used as a study hall and is not available for private study or research.

The shop building is used part time for academic classes, prohibiting expanded shop courses. The gymnasium is in use from 7:00 a. m. to 9:00 p. m., most of the school year, with no time allotted

to elementary use. Two hours of the day are required for cafeteria use. The gymnasium cannot accommodate the entire student body at one time and special events create a hazard from overcrowding.

In answer to "Why can't we remodel or add on to what we have?" HALE answers by saying that some remodeling of the present brick wing for elementary use is planned. The old wood building cannot be remodeled to meet present building codes for new or remodeled schools. Estimates to renovate run higher than the cost to build the same rooms.

No changes in facilities can alleviate such problems as constant distractions from mixing elementary and high school students in the same building, playground and service areas being next to classes in session, as well as the service area being a part of the playground.

Additional information is to be given concerning the school during the next several weeks through future newspaper articles.

Health Districts Adopt Administrative Plan

Representatives of four counties comprising District Health Department No. 2 voted Thursday to join four other district health departments under an associated plan arrangement to strengthen public health administrative service in the Northern Lower Peninsula.

Among those attending the meeting held at Mio were Carlton Merschel, Clement Stephan and Aubrey Belsion, all members of the Iosco Board of Supervisors' health and welfare committee.

The new association is classified as a demonstration project program for a two-year period, with renewal each year based upon an evaluation by each participant.

District Health Department No. 2, comprising the Counties of Iosco, Ogemaw, Oscoda and Alcona, has a population of 38,000, which represents 16 percent of the four-district association.

Annual cost of the association, budgeted at \$153,575, would be shared on a percentage basis. This district would pay 16 percent of the total cost.

It was said that some of the advantages under the new plan would be distribution of administrative costs over a larger local population base, as well as providing for maximum utilization of administrative personnel.

Three regional public health administrative teams would be employed, each consisting of a medical health officer and an administrator, along with a secretary to serve the four health departments.

Other counties involved include Alpena, Cheboygan, Montmorency, Presque Isle, Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, Otsego, Crawford, Wexford, Missaukee and Kalkaska.

ICSC Enters 23rd Annual Competition

Iosco County Soil Conservation District has entered the 23rd annual Goodyear competition to select the nation's top 53 conservation districts, according to Harry Krueger, district chairman.

Activities of the district will be weighed against the performance of other districts in the state in determining the outstanding district in the annual event sponsored by the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, Akron, Ohio.

Key agricultural leaders will serve as judges and will select the state winner. Soil conservation efforts from January 1, through December 31, 1969, will be considered.

Grand award for the 53 districts selected nationally will be an expense-paid, work-study trip to Arizona in December 1970 for one member of the district's governing body and the outstanding farmer-cooperator in each winning district.

Hospital Auxiliary to Buy Flag Pole

A large turnout of the members of the Tawas Hospital Auxiliary from the Tawas and Oscoda for the Monday night meeting at the hospital allowed them to decide to buy and install a flag pole for the hospital.

Following the business meeting, an interesting wig demonstration was presented by Mrs. J. K. Snoddy of Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

At the May 26 meeting in the hospital conference rooms, yearly election of officers will be held. All members are urged to be present.

Attended Session at Boyne Lodge

Mrs. Ellen Evans, head of Tawas Area School's English Department, was one of 40 Michigan English teachers who participated in a week-long workshop April 18-24 under sponsorship of the Michigan Council of Teachers of English and the United States Office of Education.

Workshop participants, meeting at Boyne Mountain Lodge, discovered new procedures for evaluating English programs and new techniques for implementing changes in the teaching of English.

Premiere Tonight at Grayling for New Film on AuSable River

Premiere showing of the film on the AuSable River, "The River That Came Back," will be held tonight (Wednesday) at the Chief Shoppenagon Motor Hotel, Grayling.

The film, produced by Bill Murray and Portafilms of Drayton Plains for Consumers Power Company, is to have its general release during Michigan Week.

Individuals and representatives of the various organizations which assisted in the production have been invited to attend the preview. Included is The Tawas Herald, which furnished photographs for two segments of the film—the lumbering and construction of hydroelectric power dams.

"We are very excited about the successful completion of this

film," states Romney Wheeler, director of public relations for Consumers Power Company.

Portafilms has produced several historical films concerning Michigan for Consumers Power Company. The films have been shown locally and have proven most popular and informative.

"The River That Came Back" deals with the early history of the AuSable River, from a standpoint of an avenue for Michigan Indians, the lumbering era and fishing. The film emphasizes the need for conserving water resources and illustrates steps being taken to eliminate water pollution.





Attention people of the Tawas, especially parents of the Tawas! Are you aware that the board of supervisors is showing an interest in building a juvenile detention and diagnostic center near the medical center? Are you parents aware of how close this is to the Tawas Elementary School? Call your supervisor and ask!

Just what sort of juvenile home is this to be? How secure? What sort of delinquents are to be held there? How safe will our children be? Why isn't it put out of town at a sufficient distance, so if one of the delinquents decides to run away he would have to have a 10 or 15 mile hike before he could get to town so he could steal your car, or harm your children or family.

True, it may be more convenient at the medical center location, but convenient for whom—the young car thief that runs away? Sure, there's all the cars of the people who work at the medical center, plus all the visitors. For the young child molester, the elementary school is only two blocks away. For the problem child with homicidal tendencies, very convenient for he is right in a very populated area where most folks hunt and have guns and ammunition in their homes. Won't we feel safe? Maybe you will, but I won't!

I was told by one of the supervisors that this property was fast becoming one of the most valuable pieces of property in the county. Already, they are planning on adding a juvenile office to the medical care building because the office in the courthouse wasn't large enough. Fine, well and good—put the offices out here, but not a jail. If we need more of this land already, why give it to the state? Then when we need to expand or build more offices, we will have to go buy other land. Let's keep it for our use, let the state use some of those acres and acres of government land way out and away from us, our schools and our children.

Family Living Education

What is Margarine?

Seems like a ridiculous question, since we use so much of it these days, but still, exactly what is that butter like substance that we spread on bread or melt on vegetables?

Essentially, margarine is a food fat that is generally made by blending selected fats and oils together with some form of milk or cream and other ingredients to produce the desired flavor, consistency and composition.

By federal law, any product to be called margarine must contain 80 percent fat. Margarine generally contains only vegetable oils such as soybean, cottonseed, corn and safflower, but can have some animal fats added.

Margarine usually contains skim milk which has been pasteurized and cultured with harmless bacteria to create flavor. But some margarines are made without milk and contain water in-

stead. About 1 1/2 to three percent salt is used for flavor and as a preservative. In addition, all margarine is fortified with vitamin A and some have vitamin D added. Other ingredients may be added in small amounts to improve usefulness and keeping qualities.

A wide variety of margarines are available. To find out what is in the margarine you buy, read the label carefully. All ingredients are listed in order of decreasing predominance by weight.

Regular margarines are generally made from soybean and cottonseed oils and are usually less expensive than the other types. Soybean oil is the least costly of the oils used in making margarine, followed by cottonseed oil.

Whipped margarine has inert gases injected into it to increase its volume by 50 percent. Six sticks are packed in a one-pound package, instead of the usual four. Pound for pound, whipped margarine has the same number of calories as nonwhipped margarine.

On a volume basis, cup for cup, pat for pat, whipped margarine has about one-third fewer calories than regular margarine.

Premium margarines generally are made from more expensive oils and cost more than regular margarines. Some brands, for example, are made entirely from corn oil, which is twice as costly as soybean oil. Premium margarines must always be refrigerated to protect their delicate flavor and this adds to their distribution cost.

Unsalted margarines are made without salt for people on low-salt diets or those who prefer an unsalted table spread.

Low-calorie or diet spreads are imitation margarine because they contain about half the fat of regular margarines, and have fewer calories. The ingredient listed first and present in the largest amount is water. Because of their low fat and high water content, imitation margarines are not recommended for baking. If you use them for pan frying, you must take care to avoid spattering because of the high water content. Refrigeration is required to keep it firm.
